they Grain Reserve - Can It Pass, Would It Do Any Good?

"It's wishful thinking to assume wheat prices are going anywhere in the near future." rumbles Don Moore, a Kansas wheat farmer.

And the status quo is never satisfactory, of course. No. 2 ordinary hard wheat sold at Kansas City for \$1.59 % a bushdown from \$1.8834 a year

Because of the run on gold in European money markets, wheat prices have moved upward from the mid-winter lows investors have rushed to purchase commodities generally. But that's no substitute for the wild price gyrations that spured frantic trading on wheat markets a year ago.

Some wheat men are pinning their hopes on a bill pending in Congress to establish a wheat reserve of 400 million bushels, thinking that removing that uch grain from the market would stir some action.

Herschel D. Newsom, master of the National Grange, claims that if the bill "were in effect

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today, the price of wheat would be 20 to 30 cents a bushel above the present level." Other analysts, however, don't think passing the bill would have much impact.

The problem is that last year's record 1.5 billion-bushel wheat crop so far has outweighed the government's efforts to help jack up prices.

Exports are likely to hit the official target, counting food aid shipments, but domestic use is predicted to decline. As a result, experts see the carryover at the end of the crop year on June 30 totaling 545 million bushels, a four-month supply, up from a year-earlier holdover crop in the same year, putting of 426 million bushels.

Moreover, if normal spring rains start falling there's little no bed of roses," concedes an chance of things improving. Forecasters think the 1968 U.S. wheat crop could match or even exceed last year's output, and that bigger harvests overseas will greatly stiffen competition under loan right now, and pricin export markets.

Grain Reserve Bill

The latest grain reserve bill (one version was killed late last year) before the Senate Agriculture Committee would have the Government hold up to 200 million bushels of wheat and farmers privately store another 200 million under the reseal program. (This allows farmers who receive Government crop loans on stored grain to extend the loan into the next crop year; farmers use it because they can wait for better prices). Unless there was an emergen-

cy, the reserve stocks wouldn't be released except when prices were fairly high.

The American Farm Bureau Federation and grain dealers oppose the measure, mainly because they think the Government could use the reserves to keep prices from going too high.

Other farm groups support the bill, and most of them say passing it would bolster saging wheat prices.

At least one analyst for a large brokerage firm doesn't think so. "The Government's surplus stock of wheat is currently 105 million bushels so that all they woud be authorized to buy and take off the market is 95 million bushels. That won't push up prices very much."

He doesn't think the reseal program for private storage will work very well either because it could force a farmer to market stored wheat and a new him in a higher tax bracket.

"The tax angle makes reseal Agriculture Department official. Another analyst also has doubts that extended storage of wheat under loan will help prices. "We have 238 million bushels es haven't budged," he says.

In any event, the reserve bill is given only a fair chance of passing. Some Washington insiders say the bill may get entangled with Senate hearings on new farm-program legislation, which could delay a vote until next year. "I have hopes that we can get the reserves bill passed," says one proponent, but he admits it's not certain.

May Shift To Flat Rate **Cattle Indemnity**

WASHINGTON - Payment of a flat rate indemnity for cattle reacting to the brucellosis, tuberculosis, or para-tuberculosis test would be permitted under an amendment to federal regulations proposed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This amendment would benefit cooperative state-federal disease eradication efforts by facilitating the payment of indemnity claims of these diseases, explains Dr. E. A. Schilf, senior staff veterinarian in the Animal Health Division of

USDA's Agricultural Research Service.

Under the changed regulation, a flat rate indemnity would be paid without the appraisal and salvage reports previously required, and federal veterinarians in charge would have full authority to approve qualifying claims.

PORTUGUESE EASTER BREAD


The Portuguese make this bread only at Easter and al-ways give a loaf to friends. To the basic recipe I add the grated rind of 3 large lemons. If desired, add 1 cup each blanched al-monds (silvered) and golden raisins, but the bread is sweet and delicious enough without such additions. A powdered-sugar glaze, flavored with the rind and juice of 1 large lemon, is excellent. Anyway you slice it, it makes excellent toast. The recipe as given makes 4 large loaves but is easily cut down to make 2 loaves." make 2 loaves."

- **3 yeast cakes** 1 cup lukewarm water 12 cups flour 1 tablespoon salt 3 cups sugar 12 eggs, well beaten 1 pint lukewarm milk ½ pound butter

¹/₂ pound butter Dissolve the yeast in the lukewarm water and set aside. sift the flour and salt together in a large pan. Mix the sugar and eggs with the lukewarm milk. Add the mixture with the flour. Stir in the yeast. Knead until the dough has the consist-ency of bread dough. Now add the melted butter, kneading a little more, and adding more flour as necessary. Cover and let rise until doubled. Divide dough into round, slightly flat-fened loaves, roll the leaves in flour and place in buttered pie pans. On top of each loaf if desired, press into dough a raw egg in its shell. Place 1 or 2 strins of dough over the egg and let loaves rise again until doubled. Bake in a 350-degree oven until loaves rise again until doubled. Bake in a 350-degree oven until golden brown and done, about 45 minutes.

'Farmers Don't Have Monopoly On Inflation And High Taxes'

Kansas farmers are too critical of Kansas businessmen, the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce president has told a Farm Bureau group in Salina. The chamber president, Henry E. Jameson, editor-publisher of the Abilene Reflector-Chronicle, said "We businessmen recognize that agriculture is the state's largest business and that farmers are in trouble.

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"But, you don't have a monopoly on the dual impact of inflation and higher taxes."

Jameson said because businessmen and chambers of commerce constantly talk about attracting industry and tourists to

the state, farmers have gotten the idea that businessmen don't care about them.

This is mistaken because the talk and newspaper coverage of new industry and tourism are directly related to the farm crisis, he said.

The decrease in farm population, the increase in farm size, rapidly rising farm debt and the farmers' inability to pass on higher operating costs is forcing farmers to "Get big or get out."

The result is an exodus of farmers to the cities and a loss of population to the state. "We have to provide 15,000

new jobs a year just to keep even," said Jameson. "And, the new jobs are not going to be on the farm."

To illustrate, he said there were 135,000 farms in Kansas in 1950 but only 95,000 in 1968. About 400 Kansas small towns are expected to "dry up."

"We not only have to supply jobs for the displaced farmer but because you lost your farm Joe Doakes lost his job in a store in town," Jameson said.

"How many farm wives do you suppose work at Westinghouse here in Salina?"

At the Ersham plant at Enterprise in Dickinson county, about 75 per cent of the employees are farm wives or about a third of the company's labor, Jameson said.

Jameson told the farmers they shouldn't knock the efforts of the Kansas Department of Economic Development, the

chambers and local businesses to attract tourists to the state, either.

"In Abilene, we have learned the value of the tourist dollar," he said. Tourism to the childhood home of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Old Abilene bring in more than \$1 million a year. "And this money changes hands six or seven times before it goes to the bank."

Farmers also should help recreate a new image of Kansas, he declared. People across the country think of this state as a dustbowl filled with long-eared jackrabbits and tornadoes.

"There are seven states that have more tornadoes than Kansas. We have a few hot days in the summer but we have more sunshine than Miami."


Jameson told for one instance where a large industry failed to locate in Kansas after an executive said "I have a new boat and children. What would I do with a boat in Kansas? How would I educate my children?"



Kansas wheat growers have asked the government to mount a nationwide campaign to return the slice of bread taken from the American diet 22 years ago.

A resolution submitted to the Agriculture department by the Kansas Wheat commission recalled that in 1946 the government supported a successful effort to get Americans to cut down on bread eating by one slice a day to save wheat for the relief of famine sufferers in France and Italy.

The resolution said the consumption of one additional slice daily would result in increased use of wheat products and "better health, better wheat farmer income and general national prosperity."

The 7-man group, led by Lawrence Brennan, Dodge City, vice-president of the commission, was received by John A. Schnittker, undersecretary of agriculture. He said the suggestion was a "fascinating idea that the department would certainly look into."


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

India Expects To Grow Own Grain Needs By 1971

The agricultural revolution now taking place in India will help the country attain selfsufficiency in food grains by 1971 and do away with foreign aid, C. Subramaniam, India's former food minister said in Kansas City last week. He spoke to about 130 persons at a meeting of the International Relations council. **On Lecture Tour**

Subramaniam, who is on a lecture tour, said the problem of food shortage in India has been accentuated by the population explosion in recent times and efforts are being made to attack both the problems simultaneously.

"If you look at the agriculture picture of India 30 years ago, you will find that we used to export food grains to many of the European nations," he

said. "But today the picture is different. The tremendous increase in population since we became independent has made us an importer of food grains."

He said India's population before independence in 1947 was about 330 million. Today it is more than 500 million.

"India was the first country to accept family planning program as a national policy and in the last three years considerable progress has been made in this direction," he said.

On the agricultural front, he said, the introduction of modern varieties of seeds, new chemical fertilizers, and better storage facilities have completely changed the agricultural picture.

Expect Big Harvest "Our harvest this year is expected to yield as much as 100 million tons when our target was 90 million tons," he said.

India received more than 10 million tons of food grains from the U.S. in the last two years because of drought.

Subramaniam said by 1971 India will not only become selfsufficient in food but will be able to create enough to buffer stock to meet peak demands.

"I have assured your President that we are not going to be eternal beggars," he said. "I have assured him that by 1971 we will be in a position to do away with all foreign aid and become a self-sufficient country."





Various government programs are expected to idle about 3.3 million acres this year, compared with 2.3 million last year.

Wheat Off

Last fall's seeded wheat acreage was off nine per cent from a year earlier, and Kansas farmers are expected to plant eight per cent less sorghums as well.

Soybeans, barley, oats and sugar beets are expected to get considerably more emphasis than a year ago, with soybeans up 10 per cent, oats 20 per cent and barley up 22 per cent. No percentages were given for sugar beets and dry beans, but these also should increase, the report said.

The Service said if early season planting intentions are realized, the acreage of feed grains (sorghums, corn, barley and oats) planted will amount to 5,778,000 down four per cent from last year.

Prospective corn acreage, at 1,380,000 acres, is forecast to be down one per cent from last year but up six per cent from the five-year average.

Sorghum, at 3,991,000 acres for all uses, is down eight per cent from last year and six per cent from average.

Barley acreage, as 145,000 acres, is up 22 per cent from a year ago but still the third smallest total in more than 50 years.

Oats, at 262,000 acres, are expected to be up 20 per cent from '67 but only amount to about

half the five-year average.

The intended 931,000-acre soybean planting would be the second largest of record, up 10 per cent from 1967 and nine per cent above average.

Sugar beets, at 33,000 acres, would be up by 8,000 acres.

Potatoes, at 1,500 acres, would be down six per cent from last year while the intended 1,100 acres of sweet potatoes is unchanged. Hay acreage, at 2,440,-000, shows a one per cent decrease.



Picket Lines In Cornfields?

Union labels on watermelons? Strike pickets in the corn field?

That day hasn't arrived yet and, in fact, isn't even on the. horizon. But union officials aiming to organize farm workers yow the time will come when organized labor will swing weight on the farm as well as in the factory.

A comparative handful of the nation's farm workers carry union cards today. The only large union bloc in the field claims 12,000 members of the nation's

3.7 million farm workers. Union officials estimate that close to a million farm workers could eventually be organized, leaving out such groups as the families of farm operators and part-time help.

The effort continues steadily if slowly, despite opposition among some farmer groups and sometimes violent clashes with farm operators.

"The farm workers union is here, it's going to stay here and nothing is ever going to work it off the track," says William L. Kircher, director of the AFL-CIO's organization department.

The American Farm Bureau federation insists that "compulsory collective bargaining by unions of farm workers would not result in equalization of bargaining power but rather the submission of farmers to la-bor leaders."

Charles Schuman, president of the federation, said the group opposes bringing farm workers under the jurisdiction of the National Labor Relations board. The farm union movement, which has been around in one

form or another for many years, got its greatest impetus two years ago from walkouts at vineyards in California.

That state, and to a lesser extent Texas, has been the focus of most of the recent activity.

Key figure in the movement is Cesar Chavez, a 32-year-old Arizonan who formed the National Farm Workers Association in 1962 with \$1200 of his own money. That group, with Chavez still the leader, was merged with the AFL-CIO Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee.

Membership varies with the growing seasons, but the merged committée's last membership claim was 12,000. Most work in California grape fields for firms that run the wineries.

"This is not an attempt to set up any superunion structure" said Chavez. "It's just an effort to explore how we can help each other through cooperation."

To date, however, this union has been limited to picking off a few.grape growers at a time. In addition to the strike, the major union weapon is the boycott in which wide labor support beyond the farm industry is sought against the products of the target. company.

The boycott is a simple matter to organize when the grower markets wine under his own label. But the union has a tough time when a grower sells table grapes, which can't be labeled. Some 125 pickets have been

arrested in the two years since the farm union started organizing field hands in the melon area of Starr County, Texas. The effort was highlighted by a

Labor leaders in California have their eyes on a minimum wage of about \$1.75 an hour. They say many workers get as little as 40 cents an hour.

Farm operators dispute this. They say none of their workers gets less than \$1 an hour and many get twice that. They also contend that their profit margin is so thin that they could not pay any major wage increase.

A primary union target is the migrant laborer and others who work on perishable vegetable and fruit crops in California, Texas and Florida.

Little effort is aimed at the Midwest, where widespread use of machines lets farmers plant and harvest crops with a minimum of hired help.


TO VOTE ON SCHOOL CLOSING AT MANCHESTER

Stanton, Washington and Grant counties followed in orer, each having a production of over 4 million bushels, while Republic, Brown and Finney ounties each exceeded 3% milion bushels.

Stevens County, with 129,000 ecres, had the largest acreage of sorghum harvested for grain in 1967. Morton County ranked second with 109,000 acres followed by Marshall County with 106,000 acres.

Haskell County led the state in average yield per acre with second, while Brown, Lyon, Wichita and Cherokee all re-

yields of 60 bushels or more per acre.

24% Under Irrigation

Production of sorghum grain on irrigated land in 1967 totaled 36,051,000 bushels or 24 percent of the total state production.

Irrigated sorghum grain was harvested from 421,300 acres or 13 percent of the State's total acreage of sorghums for grain. The average yield per acre on irrigated land was 85.6 bushels per acre compared with 40.1 bushels on non-irrigated land.

Irrigated yields ranged up to a high of 97 bushels per acre in Grant County and were 90 bushels to the acre or more in Morton, Stevens, Sheridan, Gray and Haskell counties.

High yields per acre for nonirrigated land included 79 bushels in Doniphan County, 73 bushels in Brown and Lyon counties and 70 bushels in Cherokee County.

Haskell County was the lead-81.2 bushels in 1967. Doniphan ing producer of sorghum grain County with 79 bushels ranked from irrigated land, followed by Stanton, Grant and Finney. Haskell County also led in the corded yields of 70 bushels or acreage of sorghum grain harmore, A total of 21 counties had vested from irrigated land in

1967 with 49,400 acres followed by Stanton with 47,000 acres. Finney with 40,800 and Grant with 37,200.

On non-irrigated land in all counties sorghum grain production totaled 113,357,000 bushels from 2,826,700 acres harvested.

Dickinson Tops Silage

Dickinson County was the leading sorghum silage producing county in Kansas in 1967 with a production of 227,500 tons from 17,500 acres.

Washington County was second with 137,100 tons and Butler County third with 130,000 tons.

Average yields per acre were the highest in several of the western irrigated counties although some counties with primarily dryland fields had exceptionally high yields.

Sorghum grain production for the entire state totaled 149,408,000 bushels in 1967, the second largest crop on record, having been exceeded only by the crop of 167,544,000 bushels in 1960.

This year's yield, at 46.0 bushels per acre, was 3 bushels below the 1966 previous high but 5.8 bushels above the 5-year av-

erage

The acreage harvested for grain totaled 4,338,000 acres, 14 grain totaled 3,248,000 acres, 14 percent more than in 1966 and 4 percent more than average.

Acreage of sorgums planted for all purposes, including grain, silage and forage, totaled 4,338,-000 acres, 14 percent above last year and 3 percent above average. Sorghum silage, harvested from 532,000 acres, yielded 10 tons per acre to produce 4,320,-000 tons. Sorghum forage was harvested from 538,000 acres with a production of 1,237,400 tons.

Stevens County had the largest acreage of sorghums seeded for all purposes at 142,000 acres, followed by Morton with 117,-000, Hamilton with 116,000 and Marshall with 113,000.





Another Side To Incorporating **Family Farm**

The individual family farm is not on the way out but it might be profitable for some to investigate the possibility of incorporation, T. Ross Wheatley, of E. F. Hutton & Company, Investments, said in Kansas City last week.

Wheatley, head of the company's commodity department, addressed the Balanced Farming Recognition meeting honoring more than 100 Missouri farm families.

Wheatley spoke on "Trends in Corporation farming."

"The family farm corporation does not have to be a huge thing with big business connotation,' he said. It can be very much a family affair showing family continuity of ownerships, permitting earnings to be distributed in the most appropriate way."

Whealey listed four advantages of incorporating a family farm — the possibility of borrowing more capital, the advantages of distributing and transferring ownership, limited individual liability and a wider spread on employee benefits such as insurance.

"Then, of course, there are some disadvantages," he said, "such as more bookkeeping problems, the possibility of income tax reduction being offset by corporation taxes, filing of more reports to the state and the payment of numerous fees, such as legal, filing and corporation.

"This trend does not mean that the farm family is on the way out but I think it means we have to be aware of the trends in the exciting business we are in."




G&G Area Farmer In National Sorghum Program, DeKalb Talks A recent meeting held in Kan-, ty, who preirrigated part of his

A recent meeting held in Kansas City by the DeKalb Agricultural Association shed some new light on what is happening with grain sorghums.

Altho the meeting obviously was a commercial one, the discussions applied to the entire area of raising livestock feed, regardless of commercial brand.

One of the farmers in the group was Harold Travelute of Bremen, Marshall County, who got a 160 bushel per acre yield in a program of DeKalb, which was led by a New Mexico irrigation farmer who got 205 bushels yield.

Travelute did irrigate his field once, as contrasted with another Kansas farmer, Otis Daniels of Rolla, Morton coun-



bought his farm where the grain sorghums were grown early in 1967. He applied a weed killer at planting time but because of almost continuous rain in June, ran into weed trouble and had to cultivate three times. He used 112 pounds of nitrogen and 35 pounds of phosphate. His yields ran up to the 160 bushels per acre.

"Now that I am irrigating I see that I am not using enough fertilizer," Travelute said.

Two principal observations appeared over and over in the De-Kalb discussion. One is that it has become obvious that sorghum yields have gotten to the point that they can equal or surpass the output of corn. The other is that the use of herbicides has in many cases reduced cultivation to nothing. Travelute's case was an exception, but many of the farmers in the DeKalb discussion agreed that they poured on the fertilizer to get high yields, used herbicides to kill weeds, and often didn't have to touch a field until harvest time.

to Kansas farmers represented 12 per cent of their total cash receipts from farming.

Realized net income of Kansas farmers was about \$499.6 million in 1967, some 15 per cent below the record set in 1966 but otherwise the highest in records dating back through 1949.

Cash receipts from farm crops totaled \$529 million in 1967, down about 5 per cent from 1966 and 4 per cent below the 1961-65 average.

The lower total cash receipts during 1967 reflected decreased receipts from wheat, soybeans, eggs and corn that were partial. ly offset by increased receipts from sorghum grain, dairy products and hay.

On a per farm basis net income averaged \$5,259 in 1967, some 13 per cent below the record high of \$6,036 set in 1966 but 30 per cent above the 1961. 65 average. Realized gross income per farm was down less than 1 per cent from 1966 but was 28 per cent higher than the 1961-65 average. Farm production expenses reached an alltime high in 1967.

If You Must Burn Pastures, Here's How

Burning pastures and fields should be a controlled operaion, because such an operation often results in uncontrolled wildfires, Bill Loucks, area Extension forester at Kansas State University, says.

The person setting the fire is responsible for confining it to his own land. If he carelessly permits its escape to a neighbor's property, he may be liable for the full amount of resulting damage, the forester reminds.

Before setting a fire, contact local rural fire personnel or the district Extension forester for fire hazard information and other assistance.

Objective of controlled burning is to get a fire that is hot enough to remove plant residues but not hot enough to damage root crowns. Time the operation so soil is moist but the fuel is dry enough to carry a fire. Burn a few days after a rain to get best results.

With proper timing, the fire will remove undesirable residues and move fast enough so not to produce enough heat to harm grass plants, Loucks says.

Select a day when wind velocity is 8 to 15 miles per hour and temperature is 50 to 80 degrees. Optimum time of day is between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Relative humidity should be 25 to 50 percent.

Prepare firebreaks before starting a fire to protect buildings, windbreaks, and other property. Plow or disc a firebreak, or use a previously burned strip. There is always the possibility of wind carrying burning material across a firebreak, Loucks cautions. So, be sure to have sufficient men and tools available to control spot fires that occur.

Tools around the farm can be used to control grass fires. Keep shovels handy. And a livestock sprayer works good for applying a spray of water at the base of flames. Of course, a gunney sack is most commonly used.

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Drop In U.S. Livestock Values

The Agriculture Department says 1967 brought a downturn in the value of livestock on farms.

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A livestock inventory report estimates the value of livestock and poultry on farms on January 1 at \$18,700,000,000 compared with 19 billion dollars a year earlier. Most of this decline reflected a drop in the unit value of livestock.

The number of meat animals _ all cattle, hogs and sheep __ showed little change. Milk cows, included in the meat animal class, declined 4 per cent to the smallest number since 1888. Poultry numbers declined 2 per cent.

The number of all cattle totaled 108,813,000 head, up slightly from the 108,645,000 at the beginning of 1967. Milk cows totaled 14,662,000 compared with 15,198,000 a year ago. Hog numhers were reported at 54,263,000 head compared with 53,249,000 at the beginning of 1967. Sheep numbers totaled 22,122,000 com-

pared with 23,898,000. Chicken numbers totaled 424,550,000, down 1 per cent from the year earlier, 428,550,-000, while turkey numbers were down 7 percent, 7,289,000 birds compared to 7,817,000 a year earlier.

wheat plants easier prey for the hot winds and rust during late June. This causes a decrease in grain yield due to small and shriveled kernels, King observes.

Random county agent surveys in eastern Kansas during recent years have shown that losses may average 5 to 10 bushels per acre. A 1961 variety test in Johnson County showed a 22-bushel reduction due to soil-borne mosaic — a \$35 per acre loss.

Soil-borne wheat mosaic built up to a peak in the middle 1950's when 25 percent of the wheat fields in some counties contained diseased areas. The greatest losses — totaling \$14 million — came in 1954, 1957, 1961 and 1962. State losses have averaged somewhat under \$1 million annually since 1962, King says.

Eastern Kansas growers have met this problem in the past by switching wheat production Sedgwick counties.

to fields where the virus was not present, or by planting the K-State recommended varieties that have high resistance to soil-borne mosaic. These varieties, in the order of their introduction, have included Commanche, Concho, Ottawa, Tascosa, Gage and Shawnee.

But now the disease is spreading westward, King points out, and is becoming a problem in south central Kansas where Triumph is a popular variety. Growers in this area may wish to consider switching to Shawnee or Gage varieties.





Pay For Priests Goes Up

Catholic priests in the Kansas City-St. Joseph diocese will get substantial raises in pay April 1. Bishop Charles Helmsing said the increase is principally an atempt to equalize the cash income of priests, which has varied with the amount of mass stipends and fees received for baptisms, weddings, funerals and other clerical functions.

Presently priests receive \$150 a month in addition to stipends and stole fees. Under the new scale they will receive either \$200 or \$325 a month, depending on whether they choose to continue receiving stipends and stole fees or placing such fees in the parish treasury.

REMINDER

Assistant pastors, who now make \$100 a month and fees, will receive \$150 or \$275, depending on what they choose to do with the fees.

Priests will also get a \$25 a month increase after three years of service in the diocese, \$15 more a month after six years and \$10 more a month after nine years' total service.

Priests also will receive 5 cents a business miles compensation over 10,000 miles a year driven in their cars.

Rectories will also assume the expenses of dry cleaning, as well as laundry, which already is afforded priests by the rectory. Housing and meals are provid ed by the parish or institution the priest serves.



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

Some 'Bargaining' Points On Wheat

WHEAT is our nation's num- year for which USDA estimates ber 3 cash crop. Only corn and soybeans produced more cash for farmers in 1966, the last

are available. In that year, farmer's cash

receipts from sales of wheat



totaled \$2 billion, while soybeans and corn each brought \$2.5 billion. Sales of wheat provided 4.5 per cent of all cash receipts from the sales of all farm products.

Most wheat producers receiv. ring the same period, exports ed additional cash, from the U.S. Treasury - about \$700 million in 1967. This money was distributed to wheat producers who restricted their acreage as requested by the Government. The money is collected by a levy on flour millers. The levy is passed on to consumers in the form of higher prices for flour, bread, and other bakery products.

About one-third of the money that wheat producers receive directly from the sale of wheat also comes, indirectly, from the U.S. Treasury: About one-third of the wheat farmers sell is shipped to hungry nations under our surplus disposal - foreign aid programs. Our government pays for this wheat. The government also pays a small export subsidy, or bounty, on most other wheat that is exported. In early March, these payments varied from 0 to 24 cents a bushel, depending on the kind of wheat and the loading point involved. Altogether, wheat producers get about half of their income from the market and about half from the Government.

During the latest three wheat marketing years (ending last June 30), the average yearly U.S. wheat production was about 1,300 million hushels. Du-

averaged 778 million bushels per year. We used 509 million bushels for feed, 69 million bushels for seed, and fed about 100 million bushels to livestock and poultry. The percentages of the total disappearance were (1) exports, 53 percent; (2) food, 35 percent; (3) seed, 5 percent; and (4) feed for livestock and poultry, 7 percent.

The preceding acts will be very important if and when wheat producers begin to "bargain" for higher prices for their product.

Present suppplies of all class. es of wheat are at least sufficient to last until the next crop becomes available. Harvest of the 1968 crop will begin in Texas in a few weeks. According to USDA estimates, the carryover of old wheat on July 1 will be around 545 million bushels, or about two-fifths of the amount being used and exported this year. The carryover last July 1 was only 425 million bushels.

Wheat production in 1968 will be around 1500 million bushels - if the weather is average. Such a production likely would be more than could be used and exported. If so, the excess would provide for an increase in the carryover in 1969.
