Co-op Angle To Area Gas Company Maneuver

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Ernest T. Lindsey, president of Farmland Industries of Kansas City, Mo., was elected to the board of Kaneb Pipe Line Co.

The election was at a special meeting of the Kaneb board in Kansas City, at which it was announced that Farmland Industries had made a sizeable investment in Kaneb.

Farmland Industries, a regional farm supply cooperative engaged in petroleum production and

refining, and in the manufacture of fertilizers, feeds and other supplies, has been a major customer of Kaneb for 15 years. It participated in financing an expansion of the Kaneb system in 1959.

Kaneb, with operating headquarters in Wichita, operates a 1055 mile common carrier pipeline in Kansas, Nebraska, South and North Dakota and is presently expanding its system into Iowa.

It handles a major portion of the refined fuels moving from the Farmland Industries refinery at Phillipsburg, Kansas.

This is true also of the National Cooperative Refinery Association (NCRA) plant at McPherson, of which Farmland Industries is a 30 per cent owner.

Herbert E. Fisher, Kaneb president, said Lindsey brings to

the board the viewpoint of a major customer, not only of Kaneb, but of Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co., Hastings, Neb.

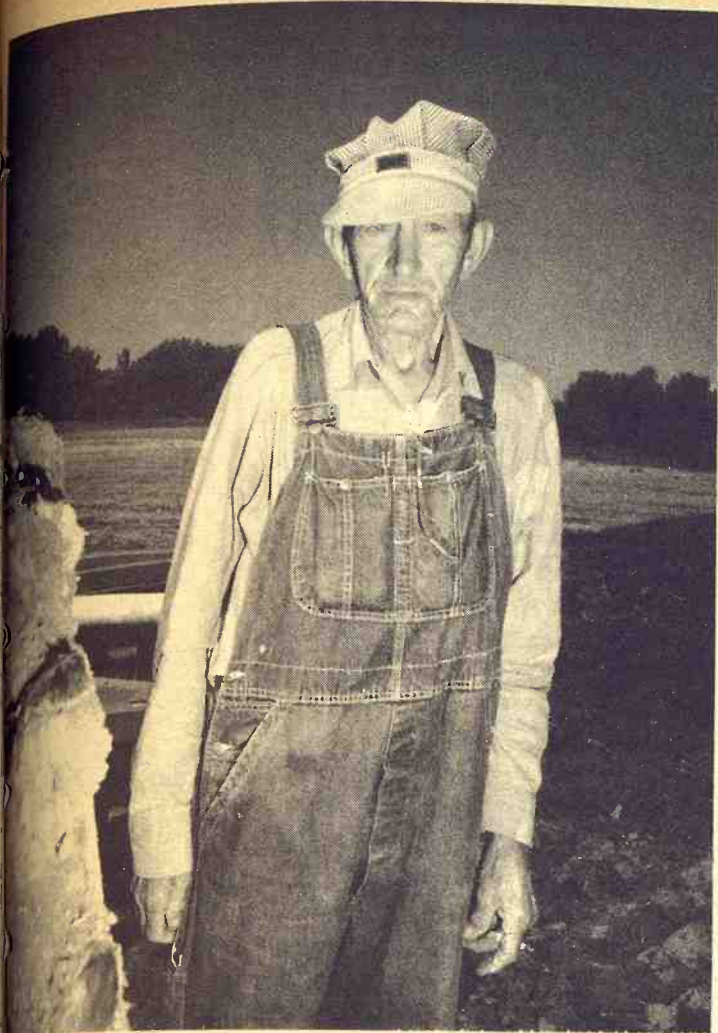
Kaneb announced recently the acquisition through tender offer of some 20 per cent of Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas stock.

Refineries owned by Farmland at Phillipsburg, Kans., and Scottsbluff, Nebr., and its nitrogen plant at Hastings, Nebr., take their gas supply from Kansas-Nebraska lines.

Lindsey said that Farmland Industries looks upon the new relationship with Kaneb as a strengthening of its position in both the petroleum transportation industry and the natural gas business.

Too Much Federal Farm Investment'

A study made for the President's National Advisory Commission on Food and Fiber finds that the United States probably has too much invested in agriculture and blames major federal policies and programs for encouraging waste of farm resources.

The study of 1930 food and agriculture requirements emphasizes the "rapidly-dwindling need" for farmers, indicating that in 13 years the United States will require about one-third fewer farming man-hours than matter what farm policy follow."

The commission's analysis, made by Dr. Early Heady and Roy Mayer of the Center for Agriculture and Economic Development at Iowa State University, contends that new capital and new technology flowing into agriculture are replacing manpower. "Even if U.S. farms were asked for maximum output in 1980," the authors say, "man-hour requirements would be down 31 percent."

Unemployment

Noting substantial underemployment on many farms now, they contend the country "must expect to find nonfarm jobs for the equivalent of 40 per cent of its current farm manpower (about 59 million) by 1980 to avoid continued depressed incomes for farmers."

The change in labor requirements would vary by regions, the projection showed. It would mean finding non-farm employment for 53 per cent of agricultural workers in the Mississippi Delta states, but for only 18 per cent in the Pacific Coast area.

The study indicates the country is farming "millions more acres than we need . . . and essentially wasting the labor and capital that farmers invest in those extra acres."

Farm Programs Blamed

The "major contributors" to this misuse of resources," the authors state, are federal farm commodity programs which use temporary land retirement to regulate acreage allotments and temperate production.

These programs, they contend, tend to preserve existing production patterns, instead of encouraging output to shift as technology and markets change the comparative advantages of production regions.

Underscoring their contention, the authors say that if farm output followed current comparative advantages without government intervention more cotton production would shift from the Southeast toward the Southwest, wheat growing would shift from the Corn Belt toward the Eastern Great Plains and feed grain production would concentrate more in the Corn Belt.

The study maintains that the overall result would be production of food and fiber at less cost to consumers without necessarily reducing farmers' financial returns.

Acreage Shift Suggested

The authors suggest the more economical and effective longer range solution is to shift some more excess acreage to grazing and forestry.

Advise Further Cut In Acreage For Feed Grains

The Agriculture Department's national advisory committee has recommended diversion of an additional 10 million acres from feed grain production next year to cut carryover stocks by five million tons. A carryover of 40 million to 45 million tons now indicated for the end of the 1967-68 marketing year.

The department announced recommendations after the group met with Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman for two days to discuss the situation resulting from record high corn and sorghum grain crops in 1967.

The committee represents various farm interests throughout the country. As to soybeans, the committee recommended no change from this year's loan rate of \$3.50 per bushel.

Here's Fall Pig Report

The June-August pig crop in Kansas totaled 533,000 head, 7 percent more than this quarter in 1966 and the highest of record, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Sows farrowed during this quarter were estimated at 71,000, 3 percent more than the 69,000 farrowed during the same period a year ago and 13 percent more than the 1961-65 average.

Farrowings by months during the preceding quarter were all above last year except July. The number of sows farrowed in June, July and August were 23,000, 21,000 and 27,000 respectively, compared with 19,000, 24,000 and 26,000 in 1966.

The average litter rate, at 7.51 pigs per litter, was the highest of record for this quarter.

Intended farrowings of sows on Kansas farms during the September-November quarter is forecast at 80,000 head, 1 percent less than last year but 16 percent above the average.

By months, prospective farrowings in September are expected to be less than last year while October will be slightly above and November the same as last year.

For the December 1967-February 1968 quarter, early intentions forecast prospective farrowings at 62,000 head, down 10 percent from farrowings in this comparable period a year earlier.

Inventory numbers of all hogs and pigs on Kansas farms as of September 1 were estimated at 1,531,000 head, 4 percent more above the 1961-65 average.

Hogs and pigs being kept for 000 head, a 6 percent increase from a year earlier. The remaining 1,301,000 head being kept for marketing purposes was 4 percent more than the previous year.

Corn Belt States

The number of hogs and pigs in the 10 Corn Belt States on September 1, 1967 is estimated at 45,500 head. This is a decrease of 1 percent from the 46,114,000 head a year earlier.

Hogs and pigs kept for breeding September 1 this year, totaled 6,241,000 head — about the same as the number kept for breeding on farms a year earlier. Other hogs and pigs declined from 39,863,000 on September 1, 1966 to 39,259,000 on September 1, 1967.

The June-August 1967 pig crop in the 10 states is estimated at 16,217 head, 1 percent below the June-August 1966 pig crop of 16,327,000 head. Sows farrowed during June-August 1967 totaled 2,198,000 head — a decrease of 3 percent from the year earlier period.

The average number of pigs per litter increased to 7.38 pigs from 7.20 a year earlier. On June 1, 1967 farmers in the 10 states reported intentions to decrease sow farrowings 5 per-

cent during June-August from the same months in 1966.

The number of sows farrowed during June 1967 was 766,000 head, 1 percent less than the number farrowed in June a year earlier. July farrowings, at 653,000 head, were 8 percent less than July 1966 and August farrowings, at 779,000, were 2 percent below August 1966.

Sows bred far farrowing in the 10 States during September, October and November totaled 2,132,000 head, 1 percent less than a year earlier.

Only two states, Nebraska and South Dakota, indicated in increase in farrowing intentions compared with a year earlier.

Iowa and Illinois expect to farrow the same number as last year. Decreases in the other 6 states ranged from 1 percent in Kansas to 10 percent in Ohio.

Breeding intentions are for 1,703,000 sows to farrow during the December 1967-February 1968 quarter, 2 percent less than the same quarter a year earlier.

Three states, Minnesota, Missouri and South Dakota expect increases.

Welfare Gets Most Of Per Capita Increase In Federal Spending

Per capita spending by the federal government increased 2.3 times over the last 20 years when adjusted for inflation — with outlays for health, labor and welfare showing the most rapid growth, a private research group said today.

Based on 1965 price levels, it said federal spending of all types totaled \$776 for every American in the fiscal year which ended last June 30, compared

with \$333 in 1948.

It foresees total federal spending of about \$667 billion for a single year by the end of the next two decades if the trend of the last 20 years continues.

Spending for health, labor and welfare jumped from \$29 per capita in 1948 to \$190 in fiscal 1967 when allowance is made for inflation, the study showed. National defense spending rose

from \$119 to \$344 per person and all other functions went from \$185 to \$242.

Analysis Nonpartisan

The analysis entitled "The Price of the U. S. Government 1948-1967" was prepared by the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research which describes itself as a non-partisan, nonprofit research and educational organization.

It noted that the actual volume of federal spending more than quadrupled during the 20-year period but said the federal debt as a proportion of the national economy dropped

sharply despite a \$68.3 billion increase in dollar volume.

Replacing Groundwater A Regional Goal

SALINA — Kansas must move quickly to explore artificial replenishment of ground water losses, Gov. Robert Docking said here last week.

"As the first step to implement this, I intend to support and recommend to the 1968 Legislature, an appropriation of \$30,000 to begin studies which will maximize the efficient use of this valuable natural resource," Docking said.

In remarks prepared for delivery at the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee meeting here, Docking said the Kansas Water Resources Board would use the initial appropriation of \$30,000 to purchase equipment in cooperation with the U.S. Geological Survey, the Kansas State Geological Survey and the U.S. Agricultural Research Service.

Docking said the program will take two years to implement.

Docking said that if artificial groundwater re-charge is found to be practical, an entirely new field will be open.

He said that in Grant and Stanton counties in southwest

Kansas reports show that the rate of withdrawal of underground water is eight to 10 times that of the rate of replenishment.

Estimates are that the state's groundwater reserves are more than 250 million acre-feet — enough water to cover the entire state to a depth of five feet.

Kansas must begin research, planning and development of these reserves on the same basis with the surface water problems," Docking said.

Docking said that irrigation, especially in western Kansas, made possible by the groundwater resources, is responsible for "hundreds of millions of dollars in benefits."

The governor emphasized he will support legislation for groundwater management.

"I believe that legislation should implement local administration, to promote conservation and management with technical assistance and guidance from state and federal agencies," he said.

The regional director of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation,

James Ingles of Denver, specifically noted that Kansas, once considered a segment of the great American desert, annually creates new problems for map-makers in that they must make additions of lake and reservoir designations to keep pace.

Since the mid-1940's, 16 dams have been completed by the Corps of Engineers and Bureau of Reclamation and four more are under construction in the state.

These provide a combined surface area of over 100,000 acres bounded by hundreds of miles of inland shores, all provided at a federal government investment of more than a half billion dollars "to help give Kansas her new look."

He said the bureau's first undertaking in Kansas was in 1949, when work began on Cedar Bluff Dam and Reservoir in Trego County.

The 1951 flood then hastened construction of at least two of the bureau's dams, Kirwin and Webster, both of which were started the following year.

This spokesman said that major floods further prompted a

re-analysis of flood storage requirement in the Kansas River Basin.

Among the recent and new projects is Glen Elder Dam and Waconda Lake on the Solomon River in Osborne and Mitchell counties near Beloit.

Ingles said Glen Elder will be the bureau's largest Kansas dam, with a reservoir having nearly one million acre-feet capacity. This will exceed the combined capacity of any three existing Kansas reservoirs.

That project and its related features is nearly 70 percent complete.

Funds are included in the fiscal 1968 budget to initiate required feasibility studies for irrigation facilities of the Glen Elder Unit.

Following a series of legal actions in 1965-66 involving the Kanopolis irrigation district, with the ultimate determination that it was legally formed. Ingles said a report for reauthorization is scheduled for completion in 1969.

This lengthy study, he added, is necessitated since relocation of some recreation areas and adjacent military operations are involved. Re-evaluation of irrigation potentials and the ability of irrigators to repay the investment must also be studied. The bureau spokesman said no substantial revisions are expected in the 1960 plan proposed for the irrigation of 16,500 acres along the Smoky Hill River in Ellsworth, McPherson and Saline counties below Kanopolis Reservoir.

Approximately 80 miles of

underground concrete laterals from the two main canals would be the heart of the system.

Salina would also be benefited through provision of a new water-supply source.

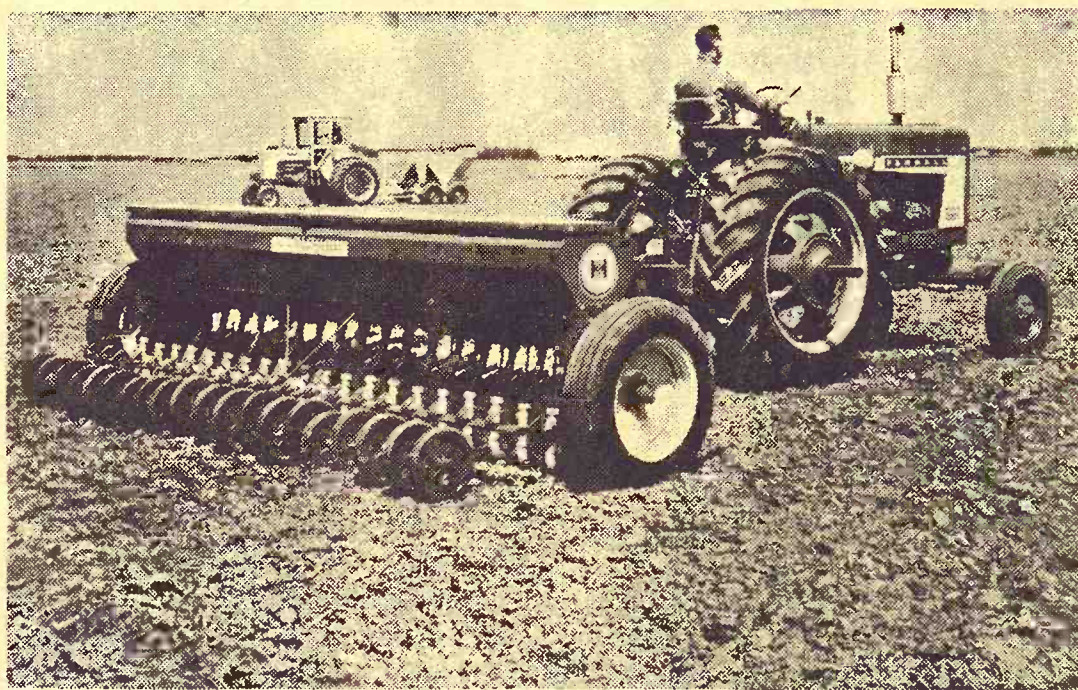
The bureau has completed feasibility studies on two prospective units not included in previous authorizations. These are for construction of Round Mound Dam and Reservoir near Ellis, and for Nelson Dam unit in Rawlins County.

Ingles said, "We hope eventually to get around to reconnaissance studies of two other units."

One of these would serve some 18,000 acres of land along the Smoky Hill River in Saline, Dickinson and Geary counties from existing regulated water supplies.

The other would call for construction of a multiple purpose dam near Oberlin.

States participating in the conference include Kansas, Missouri, Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Montana, Iowa, North and South Dakota and Minnesota.



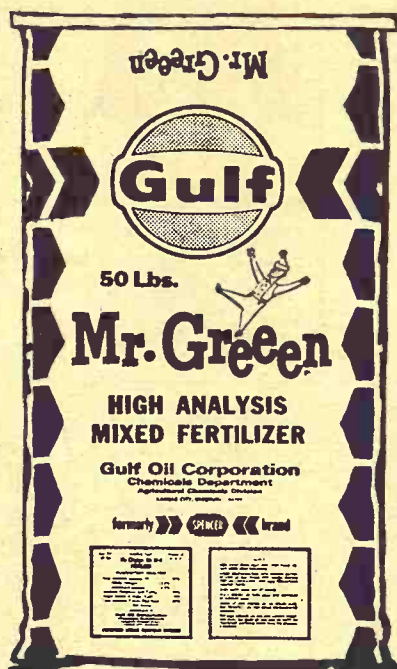

1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup milk
Pour milk mixture over peaches and continue baking until set.

Welcome Addition To Winter Meal — Homemade Applesauce



While apples are plentiful, take advantage of the price and good flavor by making applesauce for use all winter long. The easiest and best way to make the sauce is with a food

mill. There's no need to peel or core the apples. Just wash them, cut them into quarters and cook them in the barest amount of water until soft. Then strain the cooked apples—peel, core and all—through the food mill. Add sugar to taste and if needed for sharpness, add a little lemon juice. With the food mill doing the straining, you will actually get 25 percent more sauce.

To can applesauce: Pour the hot sauce into clean hot canning jars, filling to within one-half inch of the top. Cover following jar manufacturers' di-

rections. Put the jars on a rack in a deep canner or kettle and cover with boiling water one inch over the tops of the jars. Cover kettle and when water starts to boil, let boil gently 15 minutes for pint jars, 20 minutes for quart jars.

To freeze applesauce: Spoon chilled applesauce into plastic freezer containers leaving one inch air space at top of each container for expansion. Cover, label and place in freezer.

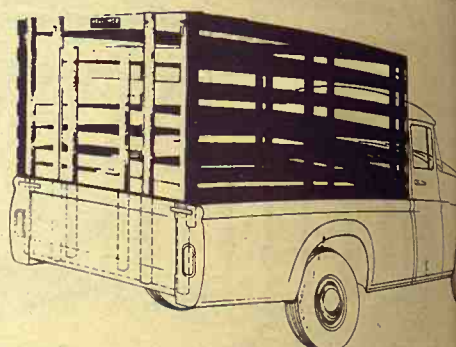

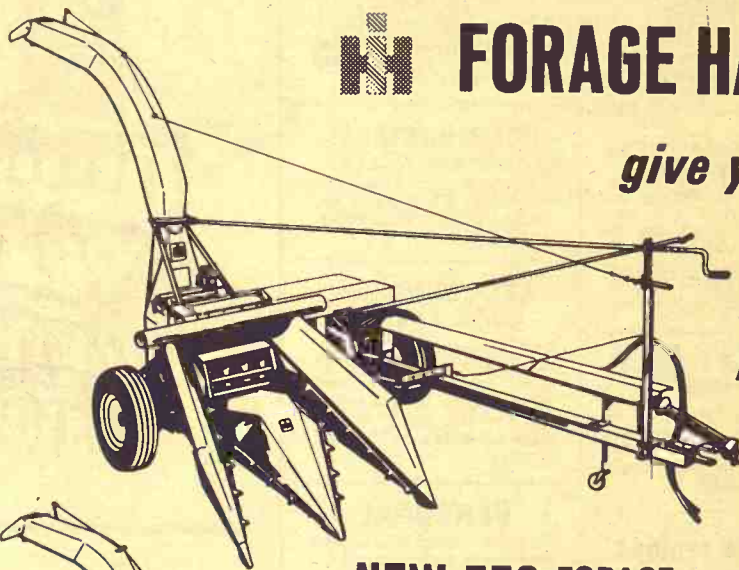

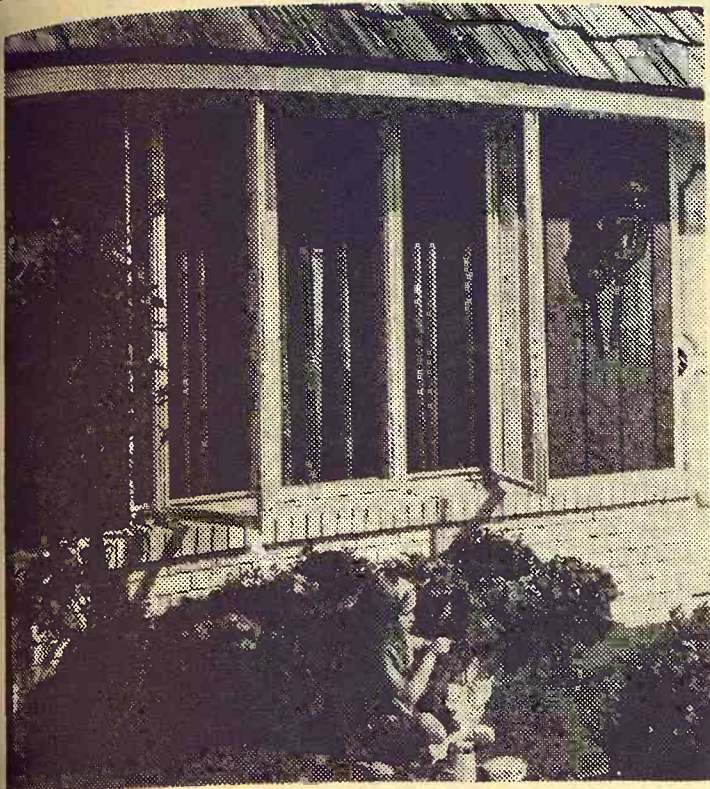

When installing windows in your house, take care to select the right type window for every room. The variety in styles available today allows you to have whatever window advantages you desire: visibility, ventilation, ease of operation, durability, lower heating costs — preferably all these benefits in the same unit.

Casement — Hinged on one side, it swings outward like a door for maximum ventilation. Special advantage is its ease of operation — it opens and closes with the turn of a handle. 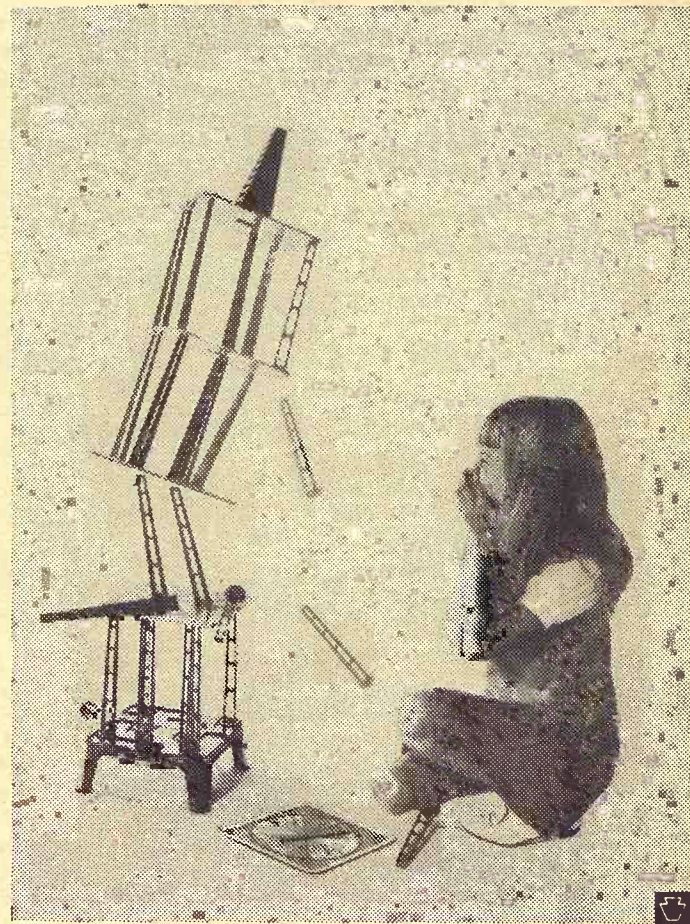

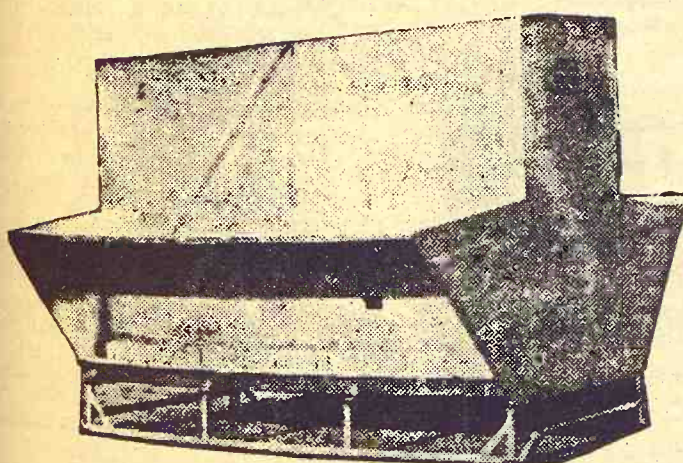

Need To Revise Rules To Meet Export Goals

Wheat farmers and farm organizations recently have been expressing doubts about the ability of the United States to live up to forecasts it will export more than 750 million bushels of wheat in the 1967-68 year.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman last week in Omaha, however, cleared up a few doubts with a report he has scheduled negotiations with "several nations" in the near future to expand exports.

These sales are to be under the Public Law 480 section allowing sales of wheat and feed grains. There were indications in Freeman's talk that the strict "self-help" and "matching aid"

provisions of current regulations may be eased to help boost these sales.

Current plans are for an easing of restrictions for India to receive more shipments of food grain.

It would follow that other countries, currently denied this kind of help, would be allowed to participate on the same basis that India does.

A Japanese spokesman told the U.S. House Agriculture Committee that America this year will furnish 44 per cent of all wheat used in Japan through

cash export sales.

For the fifth consecutive year, the United States will be the No. 1 supplier of wheat to Japan. All children in primary school in Japan receive a regular lunch program which in-

cludes wheat products, he said.

The Japanese have westernized their eating habits to the point that they import about \$2 billion worth of agricultural commodities annually. About

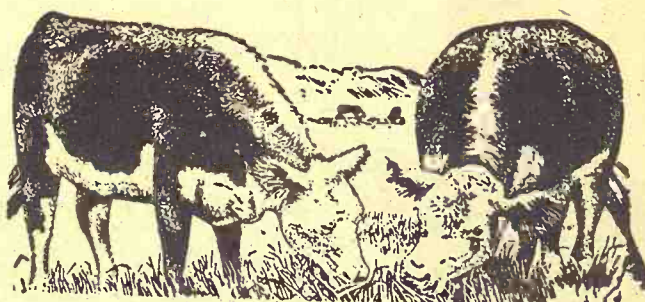

Progress On Farms In India

Is India finally making some progress toward feeding itself? An Indian official speaking at Wichita last week was optimistic that it is. "We plan to be self-sufficient by 1971," said Col Buta Singh of Punjab, a state in northern India. "India now is 90% self-

sufficient."

Singh was one of a group of Indian farm experts on a trip sponsored by the Farm Leader Exchange program of farmers and world affairs.

"The food situation is improving," he said. "We have had no deaths by starvation. People are able to get food, but not enough of it."

"There is a misconception that the people of India do not

eat meat because of their religious beliefs," said Mrs. Kunti Sawhny, who operates fruit farms in the Jammu-Kashmir state. About 60% of the population eats mutton, she added.

Members of the delegation expressed appreciation for the technical help given by Kansas State University and other land grant colleges.

Optimism for the agricultural outlook also was sounded by others of the delegation. They

grain sorghum in the 1968 crop year, the Agriculture Department has said. The counties added:

Reading Schools Mix Support, Scorn

Gone With The Wind In 12 Minutes?

Tomorrow morning while your wife is waiting for the breakfast eggs to boil, she might read *Gone With The Wind*.

And if she's got two hours and 20 minutes before she starts peeling potatoes for lunch, she can polish off all 924 pages of *The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*.

Who reads that fast?

Lots of people, if you believe Evelyn Wood, a reading teacher whose name is associated with a series of "reading dynamics institutes" which have been presented in several GG area towns in the past year.

Gone With The Wind can be covered in 12 minutes if you can match the 40,000-word a minute rate that Mrs. Wood claims is a possible speed for some people.

Reading Gibbons' history classic on Rome in less than 2½ hours is for the slowpokes who plod along at a mere 3300 words per minute pace — a reasonable speed for any reader if you believe the ads for the Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics course.

The reading courses drew 45,000 paying customers to 200 schools in 67 cities in the U.S. last year and reportedly enrollment is running about double this year.

The ads have been toned down a bit in the last couple of years, and employees of the chain say they wish Mrs. Wood hadn't ever talked about speeds like 40,000 words a minute. But they promise they can triple the reading pace of an enrollee or refund the \$175 tuition for the 8-week course.

Speeds of 2000 to 4000 words



per minute are mentioned frequently in the ads. The average person reads 250 words a minute. How do the Wood schools back up their guarantee?

The Wood technique is designed to replace the average person's word-by-word, line-by-line reading pattern. The method, Evelyn Wood officials say, it to expand the student's reading vision so his eye sees large areas of print and to require him to read a printed page at such high speed that he breaks the habit of "subvocalizing," or hearing every word mentally.

A student is taught to move a finger down a page in rapid, zig-zag patterns and force his eyes to keep pace by taking in large groups of words at a glance.

Imagine it like taking in a movie. The viewer not only hears the dialogue but also records mentally the background, intonation, mood and movement of the actors and scenery. In a minute he is recording what in print would require several hundred — or several thousand — words to describe.

Instructors tell students that the Evelyn Wood method makes reading a "cinematic" experi-

ence in which the image of the printed pages unreels in the brain just like a motion picture. This technique enables graduates to read at least 1000 to 2000 words a minute without skipping or skimming.

The Wood method has plenty of believers. The ads are full of testimonials, including some from Senator Herman Talmadge of Georgia and Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin. Proxmire says in his unpaid testimonial that he read Jack London's *Call of the Wild* in three minutes with "as much comprehension as I would have gotten slowly."

The comprehension angle is what attracts most of the detractors of the method. Many experts say no reader can go much past 900 words a minute without skimming, picking out key phrases and ideas.

The head of a reading clinic at the University of Florida says Wood graduates tested there had only a 50% reading comprehension compared to 80% for average readers.

The Evelyn Wood schools, of course, have a testing method for comprehension, and the mathematics of tabulating the results often draw the scorn of its critics. Suppose a student at the chart reads 300 words a minute and gets 80% of the questions right on a test of the material read. The figures are multiplied together, giving him a "reading index" of 240. At the end of the course the student takes a test over 200 pages of material he has read at top speed. A speed of 2000 words a minute and 50% of the ques-

tions answered correctly give him a reading index of 1000 — thereby meeting the course's guarantee by giving the student an index four times what he started with.

Other critics say the tests designed to measure comprehension are so easy that many students needn't have read the material at all.

Despite the critics, the Wood schools do not lack for supporters. They say that only 2% of the students ask to have their money back and that many of these requests come from persons who are unable to attend the classes.

And many detractors agree that old reading habits are difficult to break, and that with much practice at the Wood technique greatly increased speeds can be developed and acceptable comprehension retained.

Evelyn Wood herself, fiftyish, a former college speech teacher, is only an employee of the firm. Flushed with success after the first school opened, she expanded too quickly and was on the verge of bankruptcy when she sold the firm to Diversified Education & Research, a closely-held corporation organized by George Webster of Washington, D. C.

Webster is not saying what his revenues or profits are. But his corporation is scheduled to be acquired by a New York firm, called Famous Artists Schools Inc., for Famous Artists stock valued at \$4 million.

Reading that at any speed, it's not difficult to comprehend \$4 million.

Outlook Changes On Corn

The corn situation has made a sharp turnabout since a year ago. At that time, it appeared that most of the surplus was gone and that a shortage might develop — especially if the 1967 crop were short. The expected shortage did not develop, and the corn crop now ripening in the fields is a very tall one.

A year ago, it seemed that the carryover of old corn on hand October 1, 1967, might be only 500 million bushels — one fourth as much as 6 years ago. Now, it appears that the carryover may be almost 900 million bushels. (Official figures won't

be out until October 24.)

On the basis of conditions on September 1, the USDA estimated the corn crop at 4,694 million bushels. Added to the carryover, this amount would make a total supply of about 5,600 million bushels.

Domestic use and exports may total around 4.3 billion bushels, leaving 1,300 million bushels for carryover next fall (1968).

FEED is still the big item in corn use. The amount used for feed in the year ending October 1 apparently was almost 3.4 billion bushels. For the year ahead, feed use may take 3.5 billion bushels. The number of livestock and poultry to be fed may not change much; but with lower prices for corn this year, farmers may give more second helpings.

In 1965-66, exports of corn surged to a spectacular high of 670 million bushels. But that was because of poor grain crops

in several foreign countries in 1965. In 1966, the foreign countries had bumper crops, and our exports of corn shrunk to about 450 million bushels. Crops in other lands do not seem to be quite so good this year, so exports may increase — perhaps to around 550 million bushels.

Industrial used and seed requirements do not change much and will be near 250 million bushels. This amount, plus 550 million for export and 3,500 million for feed, would make the total disappearance of 4,300 million bushels that we mentioned before.

If the carryover a year hence is around 1,300 million bushels (as now seems likely), most of it will probably be under price support. But farmers will not put large amounts under price support unless market prices are below the net loan level for at least a few months. If farmers put enough corn under loan, prices will rise several cents above the loan rate next spring or summer.

About half of the present 900 million bushel (more or less) carryover of old corn is under price support. Of the corn under price support, about one-fourth was corn from 1964 and 1965 un-

der resale loans; three-fourths was corn from 1966 and previous crops that had been delivered to the CCC.

Corn yields will be especially high this year. Furthermore, perhaps two-thirds of our corn will not be eligible for price support. These conditions may tend to hold down prices.

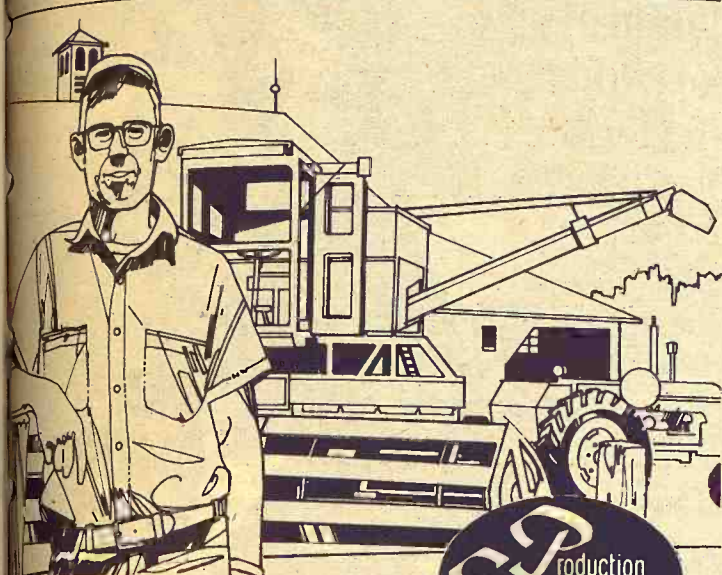
Armour Quits 3-Year Old Emporia Plant

"The declining profit margins on beef at these plants over the past several years have adversely affected corporate earnings," a company spokesman in Chicago said.



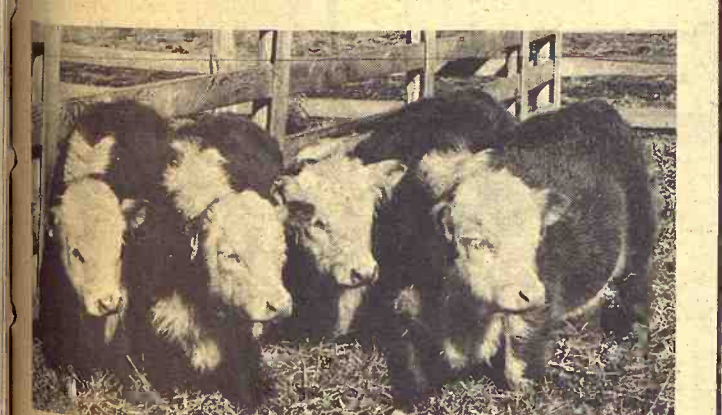

"It's simply that we can no longer get high quality beef from this area at reasonable prices," he said.

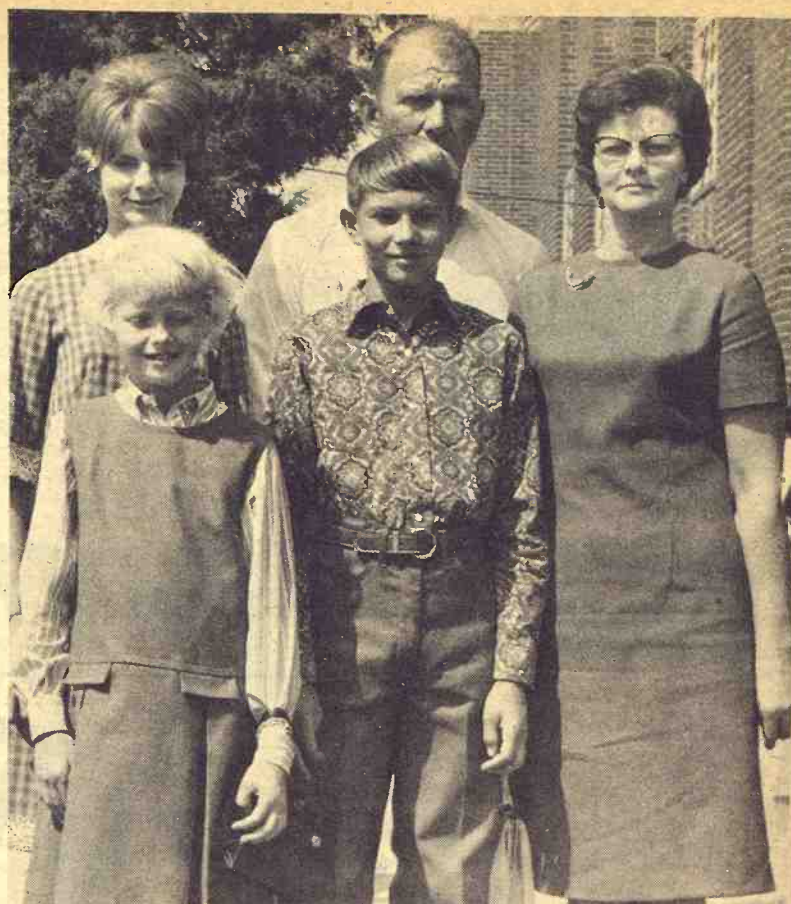

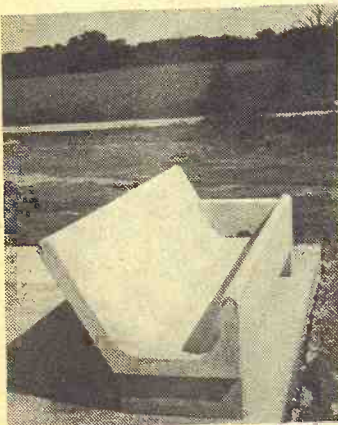

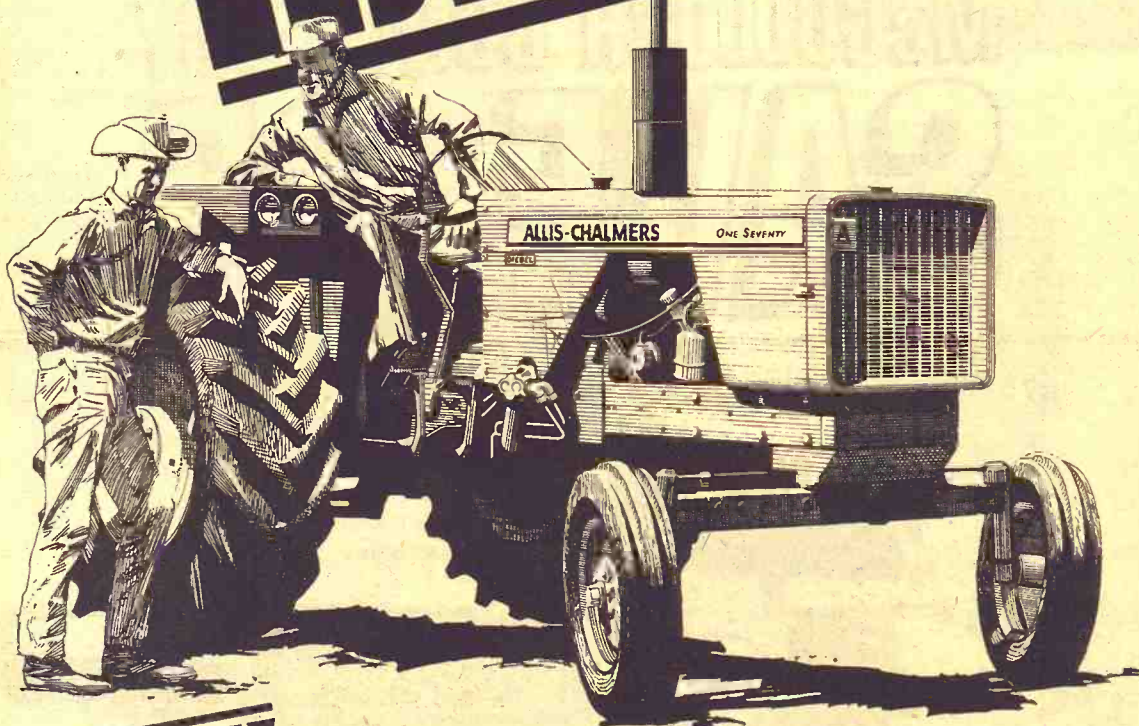

ed in four states: Minnesota, Michigan, Nebraska and West Virginia. Legislatures in 20 states meantime adopted increases in existing levies.

By far the largest projected annual revenue increase, nearly \$950 million, was enacted in Cal-

ifornia, which boosted the rate in its income, sales, cigarette and liquor taxes.

Next in line is Michigan, which expects to take in over \$280 million more a year, principally from its new income tax.

Among other states that enacted sizable tax increases are Illinois, Ohio, Iowa and Maryland. The Tax Foundation notes that the heavy tax enactments, paradoxically, have occurred in a year when the combined take of all states has continued to rise faster than expenditures, mainly due to past tax cuts. For reason, it added, is that the most "significant" tax increase effective this year took place in a half dozen or so larger states where there had been no major tax revision in some years.

A scattering of states cut taxes. Montana and Nevada, for example, repealed poll taxes, while Idaho discontinued special levies on forest lands and oleomargarine.

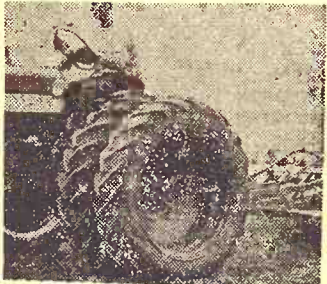
Kansas Won't Lose Seat In Next Change In Congress

Kansas, once the possessor of eight seats in Congress which have now dwindled to five, apparently won't lose another seat when the House of Representatives is reapportioned after the 1970 census. At least that's the conclusion from present population trends. The map shows the 10 states which are likely to lose 11 seats in total (Pennsylvania will likely lose two), and the five which will gain. Presently it appears that California will gain six seats, Florida two, and Texas, New Jersey, and Arizona one each.

Feeding Profits In Good Silage

feeding livestock. But turning these nutrients into profits depends on proper harvesting and storage.

Corn and sorghum crops must be relatively mature to produce quality silage. A realistic goal for corn silage is to get moisture content down to 65 percent when the crop is ensiled. Sorghums may contain 70 percent moisture when ensiled.

Six years feeding experiments at the Hays Experiment Station bear this out. Steers were wintered on sorghum silage plus 1 1/4 pounds cottonseed meal per day. Where moisture content of the silage was higher than 75 percent, the steers gained less than 1 pound per day. With moisture between 70 and 75 percent, they gained about 1 1/2 pounds a day. And where moisture was below 70 percent, daily gains were 1 1/4 to more than 2 pounds a day.

Looking at storage, many opportunities for profit are reduced or lost entirely when silage is stored under unsatisfactory conditions. This problem becomes more important as larger acreages are planted to silage crops.



The most common sources of nutrient loss in stored silage are spoilages, seepage and fermentation.

Spoilage is common on the surface, but may also occur where unfavorable conditions such as poor packing permit air or excess water to enter. Spoilage losses can be reduced to near zero by careful management.

Seepage occurs when the weight of the packed material forces excess juices to seep from the storage structure. These losses may be excessive when moisture is high. They may be reduced or eliminated when the silage is mature.

Fermentation, although unseen, accounts for loss of 5 percent of total nutrients under favorable storage conditions. These losses are unavoidable.

Here are several things you can do to reduce storage losses: — Wait until the crop is mature before harvesting. Well-matured corn silage with moisture content of 65 percent or less will have little or no seepage loss. Losses will be high when storing sorghum silage with moisture content as high as 72 to 78 percent.

— Use oxygen-free storage if possible. Spoilage losses are high with shallow trenches or bunkers.

— Take care when cutting, filling, packing and sealing the silo.

— When possible, cover the silo to keep out rain and snow.

Sign Of Improved Farm Safety

Farm work accident fatalities in Kansas have decreased considerably from the year 1932 to the 1966 reporting year.

In 1932 there were 105 farm work accident fatalities as compared to 42 in 1966. The 1966 total was the same as the 1965 total, according to figures released by the Kansas State Department of Health, Division of Vital Statistics.

Accidents by injury from animals has declined while the injury from tractor accidents has risen sharply.

Of the 98 industrial accident fatalities registered in 1966, 42 were in the agricultural category. Thus with 42.9 per cent, agriculture continued as a major contributor to occupational accident mortality in Kansas.

The largest per cent of farm accidents occurred between the hours of 10 and noon. The rate then dropped until the hours between 4 and 5 p.m. when the second peak accident rate was reached. This indicates that apparently man becomes less alert just before lunch and just before quitting in the evening.

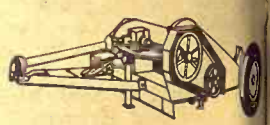

Amish Case To High Court?

The U.S. Supreme Court opens its fall term this month, but it is still unknown whether the court will accept jurisdiction in a Reno County, Kansas, case involving the compulsory school attendance law in the state.

Does the law violate the religious liberties of the Amish, who fear that public schools' worldly influences will attract their children away from their fundamental beliefs? Reno County farmer LeRoy Garber thought so, and kept his 15-year old daughter from schools. He was prosecuted, fined \$5. The Kansas Supreme Court upheld the decision, citing a legal opinion that "religious liberty includes the absolute right to believe but only a limited right to act."

Here, Amish children leave public school at Yoder. Amish families in Kansas — and in Iowa, where similar cases have been studied — will await the Supreme Court's decision, probably this month, whether or not it will consider the case.

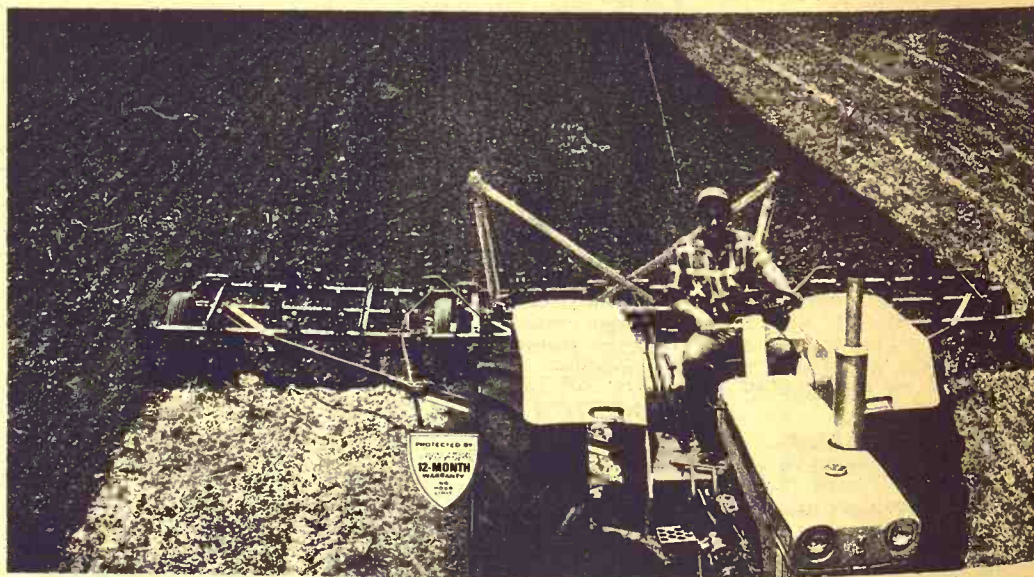

8-pt. Buck

One of the first to kill a deer with a bow and arrow as that season opened in Kansas Sunday was Rex Musick of Kansas City. The buck deer had 8-point antlers and weighed 170 pounds and was killed south of Topeka. The bow-and-arrow deer season runs thru November 26.

FCIC was in 1940 when \$4.7 million was paid out. State Director Russell Bowling said payments averaged \$787 to nearly 7000 farmers. In June FCIC had estimated that losses would run close to \$3 million but heavy rains prevented much harvesting, thereby increasing the late season loss.

Over the 29 years of wheat coverage provided by the federal corporation, \$44.3 million has been paid for wheat losses. Drouth has caused 40% of the losses, and freeze and winter-kill nearly 20%. Wind, at 12%, has been next, leaving hail as a comparatively small loss.

For 1967, FCIC had insurance coverage on more than 1.5 million acres and provided more than \$34 million in investment dollar protection.

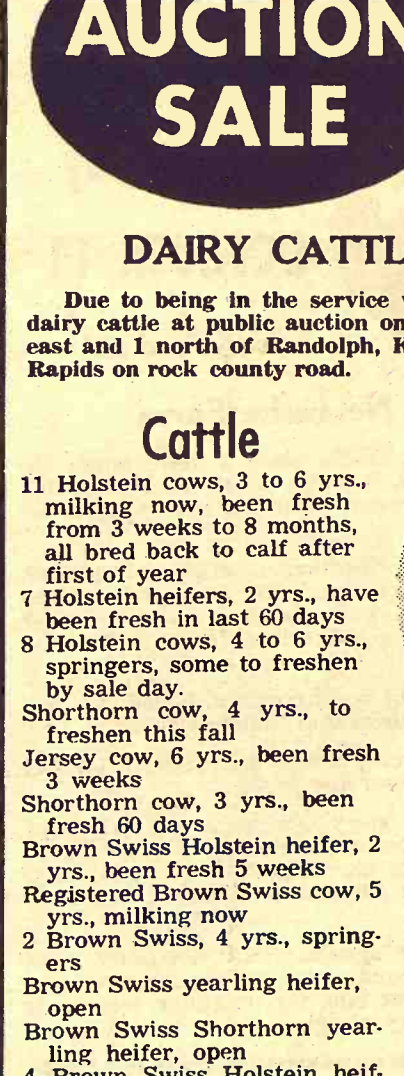

Here's October Price Forecast

October should be a good month, pricewise, for Kansas dairymen, report Kansas State University agricultural economists in their monthly market forecast.

A fall increase in Class I sales and premiums should strengthen Grade A milk prices. Manufacturing milk prices are expected to hold steady near the support level.

The situation for other commodities is as follows:

WHEAT — Steady to Slightly Higher. No shortages are expected in the U.S. or world supply. But seasonal price trends will force a slight post-harvest recovery.

FEEDER CATTLE — Steady to Slightly Higher. Optimism is based on prospects for a good slaughter market and low feed costs.

FED CATTLE — Steady to Slightly Higher. No burdensome increase in receipts is expected.

EGGS — Steady. A seasonal rise in consumption will absorb the slight increase in production during the next few weeks.

HOGS — Steady to Slightly Lower. A seasonal increase in receipts will put a little pressure on prices.

LAMBS — Steady to Slightly Lower. Normal seasonal price decrease is expected.

SOYBEANS, SOYBEAN MEAL — Steady to Lower. Bumper crop will hold prices down. The September 1 USDA estimate points to a crop of 1,002,618,000 bushels.

CORN — Lower. Record crop harvest is approaching.

Meat Imports Start Rise Again

The United States imported \$730,230,000 pounds of meat and meat products in the first seven months of this year. This is 42 million pounds more than was brought from foreign countries in the same period last year.

About 63 per cent of the foreign supplies came in under the meat import law, which covers fresh, frozen and chilled beef, veal, mutton and goat meat. Canned, preserved and other prepared meat products are excluded from import controls.

Beef and veal accounted for most of the imports, more than 508 million pounds. Pork imports totaled 183½ million pounds, lamb 5,580,000 pounds, mutton and goat 29,200,000. Sausage type and other mixtures made up the remainder.

Australia was by far the leading foreign supplier of meat with 30 per cent of imports, mostly beef and veal. New Zealand, Argentina, Ireland and Mexico were other major beef shippers. Most of the pork came from Denmark, the Netherlands, Poland and Canada.

Australia accounted for nearly all of the 29 million pounds of mutton and goat imports.

July imports of red meat under controls was 45 per cent higher than in the same month last year. For the first seven months of 1967, imports rose 6 per cent.

Additionally, the United States imported more than 355 million head of cattle from Mexico and Canada, 2,450,000 sheep and lambs and more than 24 million hogs.

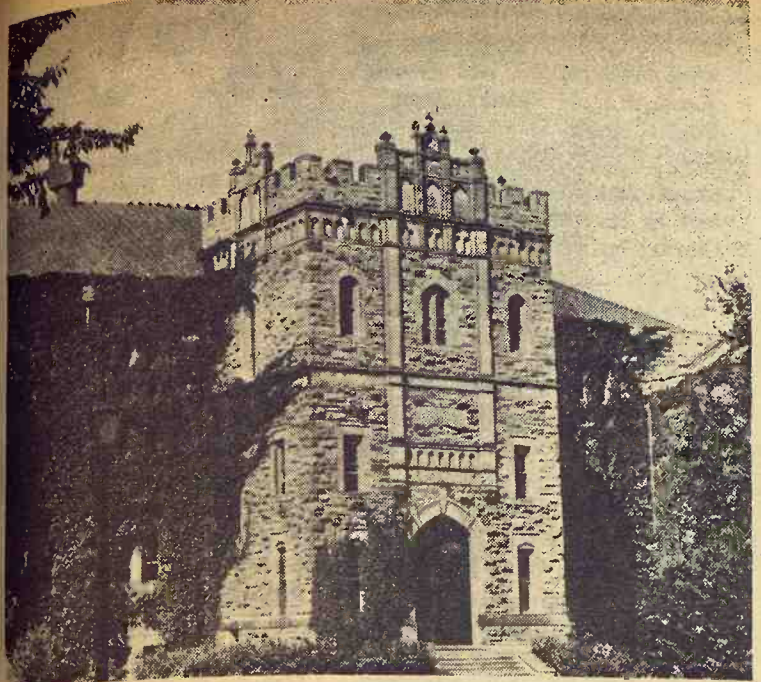

End of Robinson Gym at KU

Being demolished at the University of Kansas is Robinson Gymnasium, once the site of KU basketball games and the headquarters of James Naismith, inventor of the game. Finished in 1905, Robinson gym later gave way to Hoch auditorium for KU games, which in turn was replaced by Allen Fieldhouse. To be built on the Robinson is a 26-story Humanities Center at a cost of \$5.8 million.

Emporia Stunned By Armour Move

EMPORIA — The news that Armour & Co. would close its Emporia plant was a heavy jolt to this city of 16,000. In operation only three years, the plant bought cattle from the Anderson feed yard nearby and shipped frozen carcasses in Santa Fe freight cars to other markets.

The plant had a weekly payroll of \$15,000, with 120 employees — 95 of them paid by the hour and 25 on salary. Harry Briscoe, president of the Chamber of Commerce and superintendent of the eastern division of Santa Fe, expressed great disappointment. He said the Santa Fe was heavily involved in the beef operation, and he had not had time to assess the effect on the city. Carl J. Del Vitto, local plant manager for Armour, said the

plant was closing primarily because it could no longer get high quality grain-fed cattle from this area at a profitable price. There are plenty of grass-fed cattle since the plant is in the heart of the famed Flint Hills bluestem grasslands. The city voted a \$350,000 general obligation bond issue to finance expansion of the sewer system to take care of the packing plant. City officials said Armour had agreed to pay 60 per cent of the expansion cost over a 20-year period and they felt sure the company would honor that agreement. Del Vitto said he knew of no future plans for the 2-million dollar plant and equipment.

Hormones Instead Of Insecticide?

An insect hormone may be a possible substitute for dangerous pesticides and poisons now widely used to control common pests that damage and reduce agricultural crops. Agricultural scientists told of identifying and producing synthetically a juvenile insect hormone. When applied to some adult insect pests the hormone renders eggs sterile. The scientists were cautious in looking upon the hormone, which affects such pests as alfalfa weevil and cereal leaf beetles, as a means of supplanting pesticides now in wide use. But they were hopeful that the hormone can be used safely and effectively. The Department of Agriculture announced the scientific findings during the beginning of a three-day open house at the Federal Agricultural Research Center and the dedication of a new \$7-million building to house the National Agriculture library at Beltsville, Md.

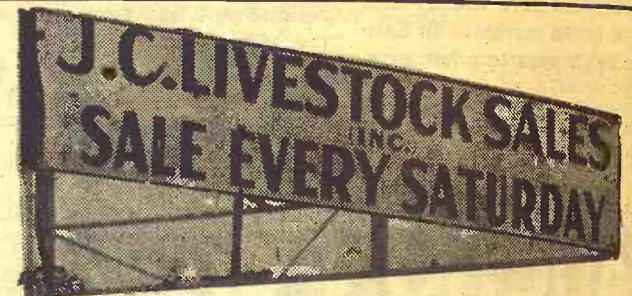

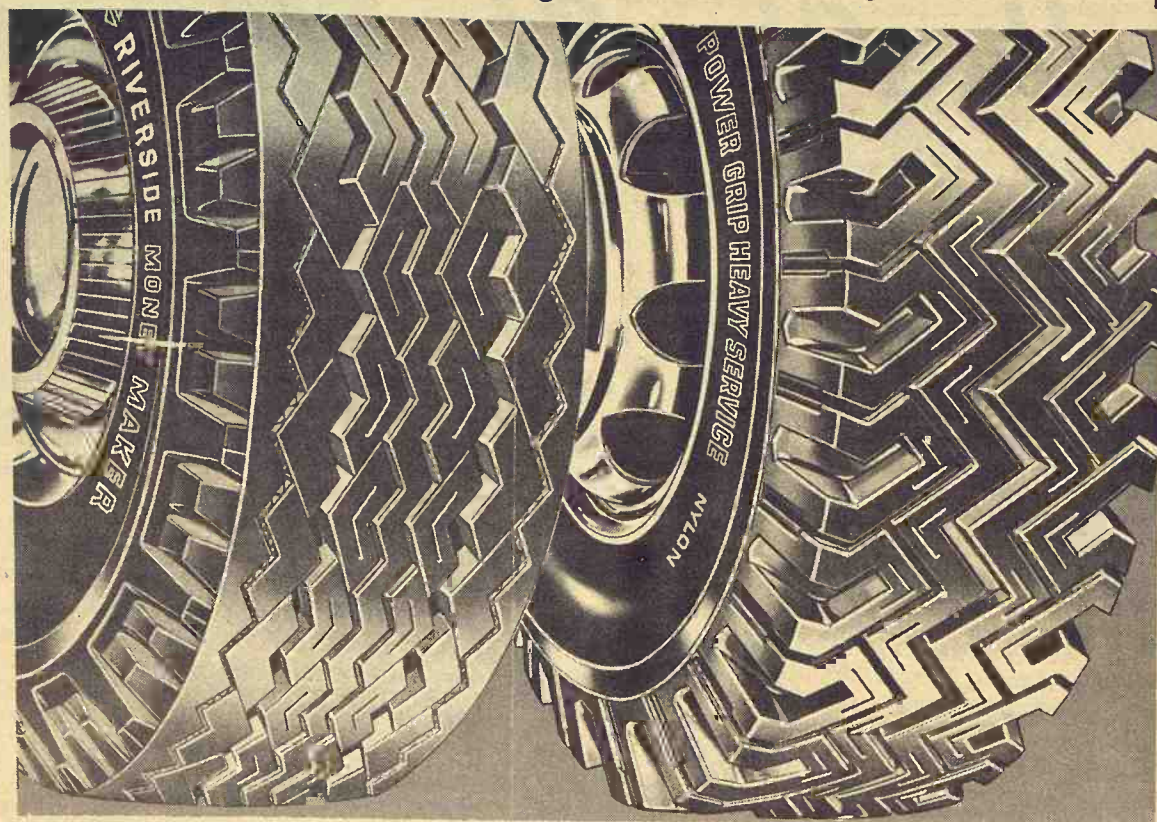
