Long Way To Go On Weather Control

The Bureau of Reclamation has reported steady progress, but still a long way to go, toward the day when man gains some control over the weather.

The bureau issued its second annual report on Project Skywater, its effort to develop ways of increasing the water supply of needy areas by controlling precipitation.

The program actually began in 1962 when Congress appropriated \$100,000 for "research on increasing rainfall by cloud

seeding," but it didn't really get rolling until 1965 when the appropriation jumped to 1.1 million dollars.

In fiscal 1968, the period covered by this report, the program cost 4 1/2 million dollars.

During that time, the report said, Skywater started important new research programs and, under a broader congressional mandate, extended its activities into the eastern states, for the first time, becoming a nationwide project.

But the major thrust was still toward the chronically thirsty Western and Midwestern states.

"The most noticeable change in Project Skywater," the report said, "is the movement toward pilot projects. One such project will involve winter storms in the Rocky Mountains; another will concentrate on summer storms in the Great Plains.

"Each pilot project will test a different system and, by the end of a 4 or 5 year period, each will have demonstrated the efficiency of that particular technology in providing additional useful water."

The winter pilot project is to take place in the Colorado Rockies; the summer one in McKenzie County, N.D.

Star FFA Farmer Picked From Seven

MANHATTAN — Designation of the 1969 "Star Farmer of Kansas," election of new state officers, and addresses by the National Future Farmer of America president Jeff Hanlon, will be among highlights for the 41st convention of the Kansas Association of FFA held this week, Monday and Tuesday, April 28-29, at Manhattan.

The FFA convention is held annually in conjunction with the state high school vocational agriculture judging and agricultural mechanics contests at Kansas State University, Manhattan, according to Harold Shoaf, executive secretary for the Kansas Association of FFA.

Pre-convention activities begin Sunday afternoon with a meeting of the Nominating Committee and interviews of state officer candidates.

There was a delegate breakfast Monday morning in the K-State Union, sponsored by Sears Roebuck Foundation, with the first of five business sessions following the breakfast. Gregg Hands, Garden City, state FFA president and a K-State freshman, presided at the sessions.

Featured speaker for the convention this year is Hanlon, an FFA youth from Cornelius, Ore. He reported on national FFA topics at the opening session and then gave the major address at the second convention session Monday afternoon.

Among the other speakers are Donna Guinn, Oberlin, state FFA Sweetheart this year; and the presidents of four state vocational education youth organizations: Kathy Waugh, Goodland, Future Homemakers of America; John Gibson, Ottawa,

Vocational Industrial Clubs of America; Nancy Mamrel, Leavenworth, Business Education Clubs of Kansas; and Sharon K. Powers, Wichita, Office Education Club.

Each of the retiring state officers also will address the convention.

The "1969 Star Farmer of Kansas" ceremony highlighted the Monday evening session. The seven district "Star Farmers" in the running for this year's title were Tom Epler, Columbus; Kendal Frazier, Winfield; Benson Keil, Concordia; James Lindquist, Valley Heights High (Blue Rapids-Waterville); Ted Odle, Stockton; Jim Rohleder, Garden City; and Ron Wilson, Council Grove.

Monday night's program also included a concert by the State FFA Chorus, conducted by Rod

Walker, K-State's director of choral activities; presentation of honorary State Farmer degrees to nine adult supporters of FFA activities; election of 123 State Farmers for the class of 1969; and presentation of Gold Emblem chapter awards.

Other highlights of the two-day convention included the state public speaking contest, scheduled Monday afternoon; and the election and installation of new state officers at the concluding business session Tuesday afternoon. Much of the business of the convention consisted of reports by retiring state officers and work of special committees to be appointed to conduct FFA business.

The retiring state officers and the new state officers will be guests of honor at a KSU Collegiate FFA banquet Tuesday evening.

In 'Stamping Out' Phase Of Hog Cholera Program

Kansas has moved into the stamping out phase of the nationwide hog cholera eradication program, the Agriculture department reports.

With the Kansas move to Phase III, all of the major hog-producing states now are in that phase or higher in the 4-phase eradication effort. Kansas ranks eighth in U.S. hog production. These stamping out phases involve prompt and complete disposal of all infected herds with state-federal indemnity payments to help reimburse farmers whose hogs must be destroyed because of the disease.

The target date for completion of a hog cholera free United States is 1972.

Wheat Growers Hire New Man As Exec-Secretary

Earl Loganbill, organization field man for Farmland Industries, Inc., of McPherson, has been appointed Executive Secretary of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, it has been announced today by Rey F. Uehling, Ness City, President of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers.

Loganbill, who has been employed by Farmland Industries for eleven years, was engaged in Co-op organizational activities in several states before moving from Kansas City to McPherson where he has lived for seven years. He will assume his new position May 1st and plans to move his family to Dodge City early in June.

Loganbill expressed confidence in the role that the KAWG can play in the present crises facing wheat farmers as they attempt to protect farm income.

He suggested that wheat farmers develop a renewed sense of determination to dramatize their economic dilemma and enlist the help of main street business interests who are affected by the low farm income. There is a need to develop a common front to attack the problems of marketing prices and surplus production, Loganbill said.

Soil Moisture Greatest In Seven Years

Mid-April available soil moisture for the 1969 Kansas wheat crop was nearly double last year's and the best in seven years, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

Results of a survey conducted over the western two-thirds of the state showed 4.36 inches of water available for plant use in the top 4 feet of soil.

This was sharply above last April's 2.22 inches and moderately above the 1963-67 average of 3.60 inches.

As a comparison the top 4 feet of medium textured soil will have about 8 inches of water available for plant use when the soil is at field capacity.

Depth of penetration of usable moisture this spring was 42.6 inches compared with 27.9 inches last year and an average of 39.5 inches.

The top foot of soil averaged 1.35 inches of available water compared with .55 inch for last April.

Available water in the second, third and fourth foot of soil averaged 1.13, 1.00 and 0.88 inches respectively, while in 1968 the

same soil depths averaged .61, .54 and .52 inch.

Soil moisture supplies were up in all areas of the state with the greatest increase coming in the southwest and south central where available moisture supplies were more than three times those of last April.

Moisture in the southwest was the seventh best in 30 years of records.

Seeding of the 1969 wheat crop started slowly last fall but following rains in September plantings moved rapidly to completion during October. There was enough moisture in most areas for satisfactory plant emergence, and stands were relatively good.

The wheat generally went into winter in good to excellent condition except in a couple of tiers of counties along the western border where lack of moisture limited growth and caused some abandonment.

Substantial rains and snow over most of the state during late February and March brightened prospects for the wheat crop.

By mid-April wheat plants in the western two-thirds of the state had an average height of 7.5 inches compared with 8.1 inches last year and a 5-year average of 8.1 inches. Across the state the plant height ranged from 5.8 inches in the northwest to 9.7 inches in the south central.

This spring 331 tests were made in wheat fields in the western two-thirds of Kansas. Soil moisture content was determined at various depths including the top 6 inches, second 6 inches, the second foot, third foot and fourth foot. Rains during March and April have provided moisture to the topsoil was at a fairly high moisture level.

This spring 13 per cent of sample taken in the top 6 inches were very wet while 13 per cent were wet, 63 per cent were moderately wet and 5 per cent slightly damp. This compares with 6 per cent wet, 29 per cent moderately wet and 65 per cent slightly damp or dry in April 1968.

In the second 6 inches 2 per cent were very wet, 16 per cent wet, 82 moderately wet and less than 1 per cent slightly damp while last year 1 per cent were wet, 56 per cent moderately wet and 43 per cent slightly damp.

For the second foot the percentages falling in each category were 1 very wet, 13 wet, 83 moderately wet and 3 slightly damp while in the spring of 1968 they were only 1 wet, 33 moderately wet and 40 slightly damp.

In the third foot of soil 1 per cent of the tests classified as wet, 72 per cent moderately wet and the remaining 14 per cent as slightly damp. Last spring 54 per cent of the samples were moderately wet and 46 per cent were slightly damp.

In the fourth foot the percentages this year were 16 per cent wet, 59 per cent moderately wet and 25 per cent slightly damp compared with last year's 1 per cent wet and the remaining 98 per cent was split evenly between moderately wet and slightly damp.

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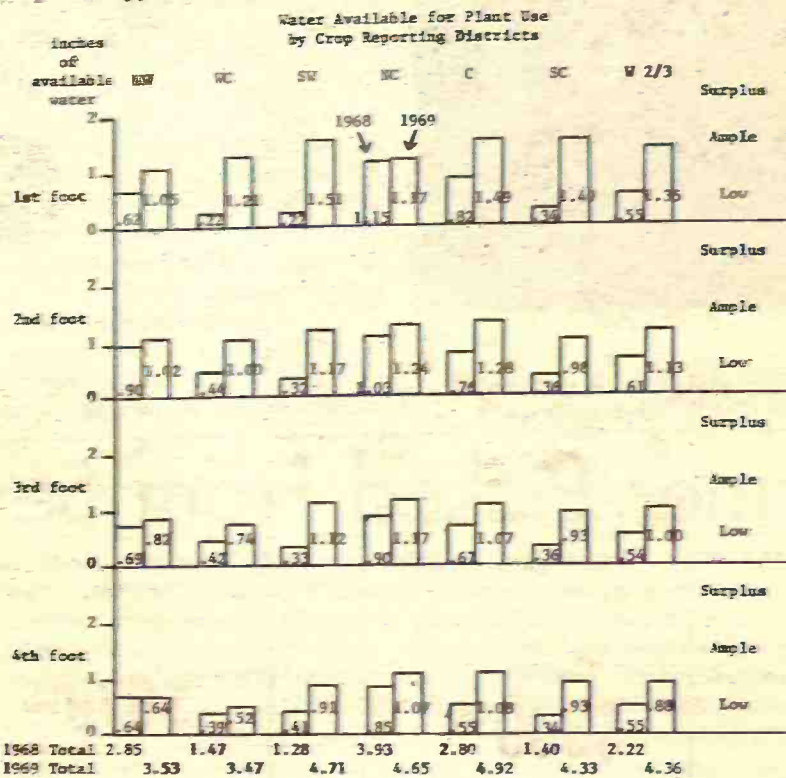


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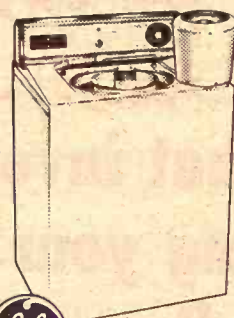
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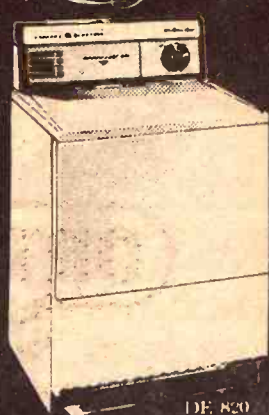
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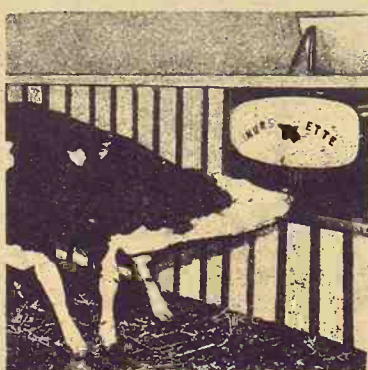


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Brokerage Sees Mild Recession Late In Year

The economist who advises the biggest stock broker in the world — Merrill, Lynch, Pierce Fenner and Smith — thinks a mild recession is likely to get under way late this year.

The viewpoint is that of Dr. A. Gary Shilling, the in-house economist in Merrill Lynch's securities research division.

Neither he nor his company will translate what this means to stock market prospects.

But it doesn't take much to read between the lines. And most security analysts or market-oriented economists would be quick to point out that the forces triggering even a mild recession would be the same as those that undercut securities markets.

Just what are the forces that, in Dr. Shilling's words, make a mild recession a "strong probability?" As he sees it: a heavier foot on the economic brakes than most business expect — because the dangerous psychology of inflation has been so unshakable.

The brakes — in this case a squeeze on the money supply — historically means less money for stock buying. Tightness at banks also usually has induced some corporations and institutions to raise cash whatever other way they can. Sometimes this is by selling securities.

There are, of course, a multitude of other factors to consider in making stock market forecasts. For instance, many on Wall Street feel that regardless of a mild recession, mutual funds have such a high cash ratio that significant buying — and thereby support for the market — is unavoidable.

And Shilling is quick to stress that his economic opinion is quite subject to change. Indeed, it has changed this year. In February he thought there would be no recession insofar as

the Federal Reserve Board vowed it would bring inflation under control before the boom led to a bust.

"But so far," Shilling says, "business acts as if there is no downside risk on the economy. All the while the Fed is saying its going to put the screws on until businessmen realize there

is downside risk."

He's betting the FRB will win and that the only difficult thing to forecast is the timing. The incentive for business to maintain plant expansion and inventory buildup thus far is the market developing for the early 1970s, the new families from the postwar baby boom, the economist says.

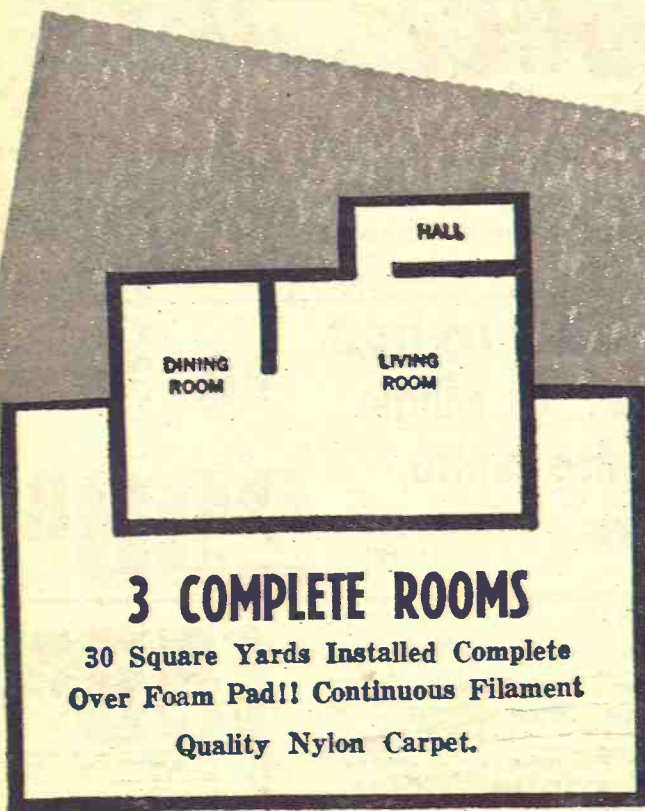

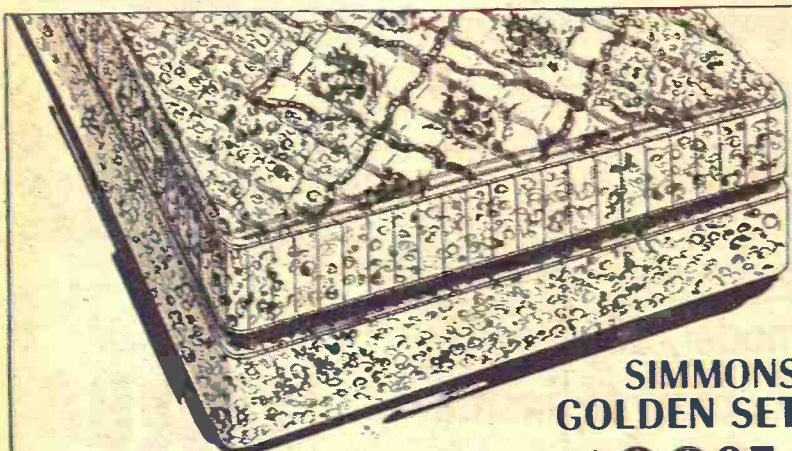

SALAD

1 No. 2 can size of crushed pineapple
1/2 cup of sugar
2 packages of orange jello
2 cups of cold water
1 cup of shredded longhorn cheese
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 1/4 cups of whipped topping or 1 cup of whipped cream
Combine pineapple and sugar and heat. Add the orange jello and dissolve. Add cold water and let set until fairly firm. Then fold in the nuts, cheese and whipped topping. This salad molds very nice.

CHOCOLATE CUPCAKES OR ONE-LAYER CAKE

1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/4 cup Crisco
5 tablespoons cocoa
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Measure all ingredients and place in small mixing bowl in order given. Beat with electric mixer, No. 3 or 4 on dial, for

three minutes. Scrape bowl once or twice as needed, or beat by hand three minutes. Fill cupcake pans one-third full. "I use the paper liners for cupcakes and you can also add at the last Nestles butterscotch or chocolate bits to each. Very good baked plain, also. Bake in moderate oven. Ice when cool. 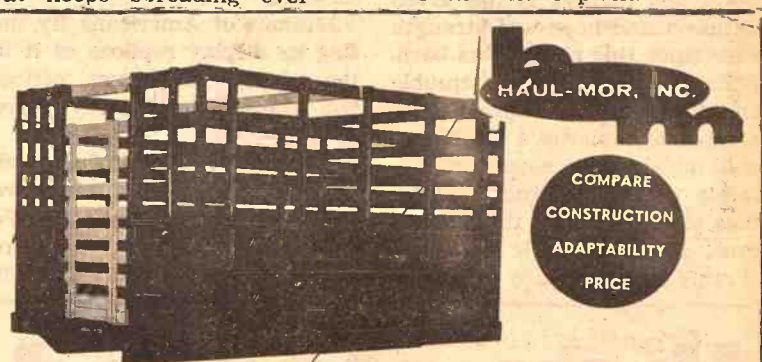
Proper pruning is the thing that keeps spreading ever-

greens attractive. Pfister Junipers and spreading types of Japanese Yew are the kinds of plants that should be kept broad at the base since they naturally develop in that fashion with the longest branches being the longest.

Such plants should not be pruned into a box or ball shape for then the lower branches receive no sunlight. They become weak, coarse and may die out, leaving the plant bare below and ugly.

The spreaders should be allowed sufficient space to grow naturally, then the natural shape should be preserved by shortening the longest branches over the entire plant.



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Grain Body with Combination Lift-Off Rack.

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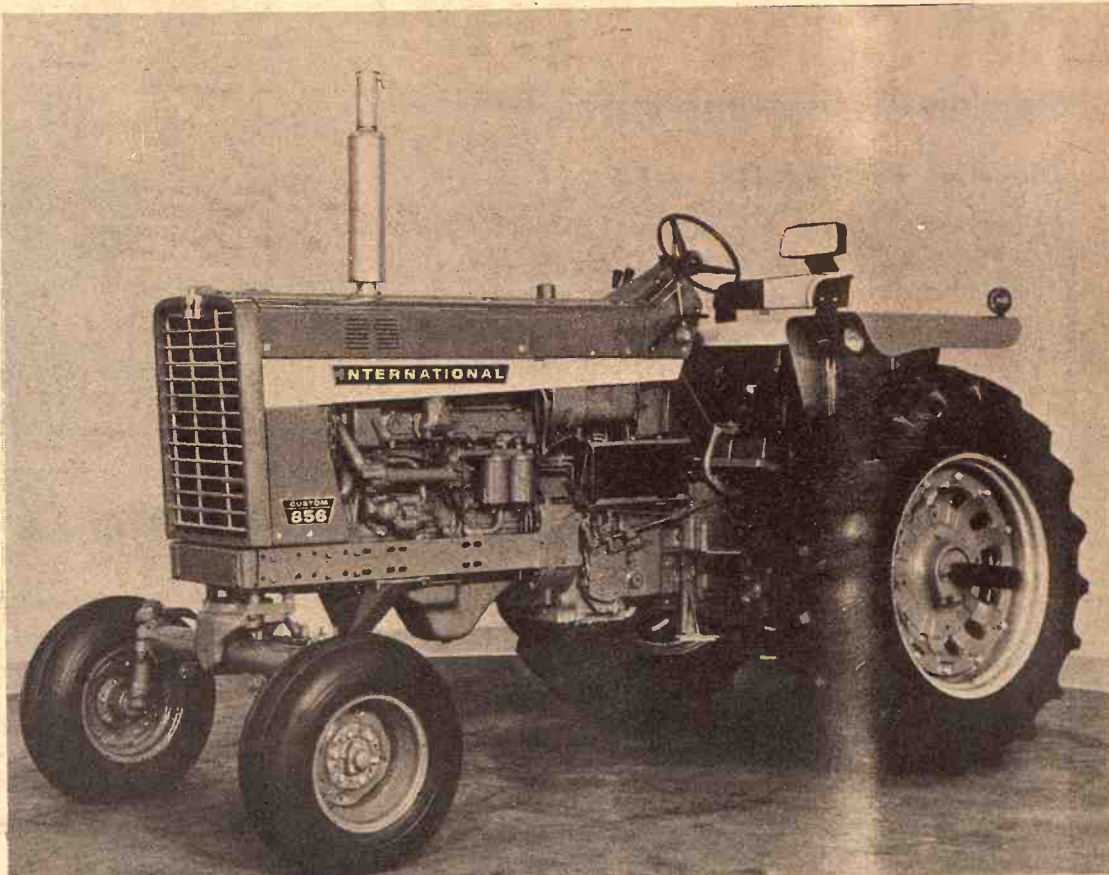

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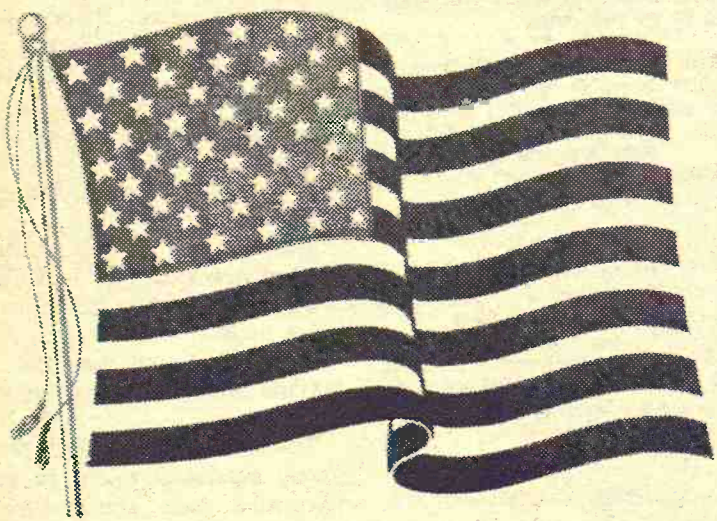

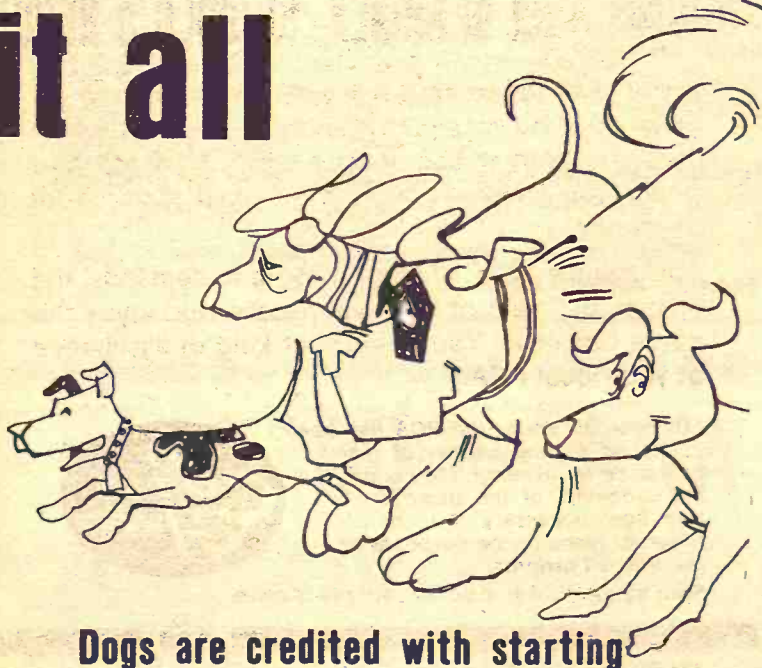

Why Not Grow Your Own "Pinch Of Sage"?

Common sage is a well-known, widely used herb that is sufficiently strong and distinctive in flavor so a little goes a long way. Thus, the directions in cookbooks read, "use just a pinch of sage."

Added to stews, sausage, stuffing for duck or goose (but too strong for chicken stuffing) or used in cooking salt fish or pork, sage adds a "certain something" to the dish.

It can even be used sparingly in vegetables, but most cooks consider sage too strong to be used in salads.

Not only is sage used in cooking, but is also used in gardens where its gray leaves and light purple blossoms are a beautiful sight.

Sage plants grow about two feet tall and, in four to five years, become woody and less attractive. Then it's time to discard them and grow new plants.

This is easy to do from seeds sown in fall or in early spring. Sow in rows or broadcast seeds, as you prefer. They'll sprout promptly. When the seedlings are two to three inches high, thin them to stand from twelve to eighteen inches apart. This spacing allows for the size of mature plants.

In cold climates, protect the plants by covering them with straw for the winter. Prune in early spring, just as the new leaves appear. Cut away all

dead twigs.

Harvest the leaves you wish to dry for cooking from tender young shoots near the top of the plant. Cut off the top three inches of stem before the plant blooms.

When plants are older, two or three pickings a season are possible. Fresh leaves can be taken from plants any time.

Tie shoot tips in a clean, white cloth bag and hang it over the stove. Dried quickly, leaves will retain color and flavor. Remove leaves from stems and pack in tightly corked bottles or pulverize leaves and store the same way for future use.

Still Plenty Of Debate On Daylight Time

There are those to whom the annual switchover to daylight saving time brings little light and no joy.

There are also those who — in the name of crime prevention and other claimed benefits — would have the government double the time ante and give the nation an extra hour of afternoon daylight all year round.

Files at the Department of Transportation, which sets the nation's time guidelines, are bulging with letters from people who, in the words of one aide, "all have their own magic potion for dealing with time, and a lot of other problems as well."

The department is charged with implementing the law, which now calls for uniform daylight saving six months of the year.

Several pending House and Senate bills would change that span at one or the other end of the period which now runs from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October.

At least one bill, by Rep. Craig Hosmer, R-Calif., would make daylight saving a year-round affair.

In a letter to the White House last year a Baltimore doctor endorsed the idea and gave this prescription for reducing crime:

"High intensity lighting has proven to be the best deterrent to crime. Even though the thief becomes more brazen every day, he still operates better in darkness and shadow. What we

need then is more light!"

Hosmer, declaring that permanent daylight saving time was first proposed by Benjamin Franklin in 1784, says an extra hour of afternoon light would provide more outdoor leisure for adults and more playtime for children in fall and winter.

He too has been promoting the step as an anticrime measure. He says also it would save on electric bills.

"It would also eliminate the nationwide confusion and expense which surrounds the twice-yearly readjustment of communications and transportation schedules," Hosmer said.

There are others who don't think much of that idea at all and want all daylight saving ended.

"Certainly when a place like Dayton, Ohio, stays light until almost 10 p.m. at night, young-

sters are going to be on the streets and get into trouble," a Dayton housewife wrote President Nixon recently.

From Monroe, S.C. came the comment: "It has never saved any time and it never will. Eighty percent of the people in this country don't like daylight savings time."

Some letters call it "Daylight Confusion Time." Others say time was set by God and human laws shouldn't be allowed to change it.

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Veterinarians Average \$15,000

If a veterinarian is to be successful, he must be as well grounded in business management concepts as in the professional skills of veterinary practice.

This is the conclusion of Prof. Joseph Barton-Dobenin, associate professor of business in the Kansas State University College of Commerce, based on a survey of practicing Kansas veterinarians conducted by the College of Commerce in 1967.

The survey revealed that

gross income of Kansas veterinarians in 1966 was approximately the same as for veterinarians across the nation. But though Kansas veterinarians had significantly less capital investment, their expenses ranked substantially higher than the national average.

"Analysis of the highest and lowest Kansas earners show income to be related more to business management than due to the magnitude of gross income or time devoted to work. It appears," Barton-Dobenin continues, "that many practicing veterinarians would be better off to periodically review their op-

erations and attempt to increase the quality, rather than quantity, of their income."

The K-State business professor suggests that practicing veterinarians review financial records at least yearly with a specialist in the field — both for tax information and for operational efficiency.

Net income for Kansas veterinarians ranged from a low of \$3,000 to a high of \$34,000 with the average net income, before taxes, of approximately \$15,000. Barton-Dobenin said the type of practice did not appear to be a significant factor with net income high earners equally numerous in large and small animal practice.

Although Kansas veterinarians work approximately 100 hours a year more than the average for other veterinarians in the United States, Barton-Dobenin said their efforts resulted in a net hourly income of only \$4.45 (where they worked alone) and \$5.47 (where they were a partner) as compared to national averages of \$5.22 and \$6.37 (17 per cent higher than in Kansas.)

"In the final analysis, better service can be provided the public by a successful veterinarian than by one who is distracted by financial difficulties," Barton-Dobenin concluded.

REA Loan To Kaw Valley

An REA loan of \$875,000 to the Kaw Valley Electric Cooperative of Topeka has been announced by the Agriculture Department.

It will be used to construct lines to serve 251 new customers and to make system improvements. The cooperative serves consumers in Shawnee, Douglas, Jackson, Osage, Pottawatomie and Wabaunsee counties.

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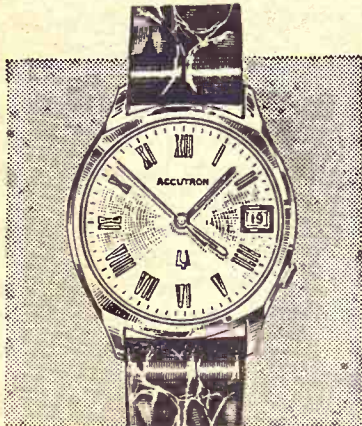

**Merck Sees Beef
 Move Eastward**

An interesting commentary on
 the cattle business came recent-
 ly from the Merck Chemical Di-
 vision, which after interviews
 with dozens of big scale cattle
 operators, agricultural econo-
 mists and animal scientists,
 says the cow-calf business is
 moving from the West into the
 East.
 Texas is still the dominant
 ranching state with almost five
 million beef cows in 150 herds,
 but the Merck report finds that
 Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississip-
 pi, Florida, Alabama and Louis-

iana are moving up fast as pro-
 ducers of feeder calves.
 Kentucky, for example, has a
 million beef cows. Beef cow
 herds have increased in that
 state 180 percent in the last 10
 years, partially because of
 marginal acreage good only
 for pasture and partially be-
 cause of the acreage control
 limit on production of tobacco.
 Several theories are advanced
 for the eastward shift. Lack of
 rainfall in the West, the high
 price of western land and high-
 er operating costs are blamed.
 It costs \$90.50 a year to keep a
 beef cow in Texas.
 The eastward trend could have
 profound implications for the
 feedlot industry.

Big Chore To Organizing Meat Inspection

The Kansas Meat and Poultry Inspection Act — passed in the latter days of the 1969 Legislature — will double the staff size of the State Board of Agriculture and completely shift responsibility for Kansas meat standards.

The next six months are expected to be extremely busy ones for the Agriculture Department as it adds a completely new division to its activities and employs from 100 to 150 persons to implement the United States Wholesome Meat Act adopted this month into the body of Kansas law.

Roy Freeland, secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, said that while his department did not seek the job, "we intend to administer it to the best of our ability to assure confidence in the quality of meat and poultry sold in Kansas."

To members of the Agriculture Department staff, the next six months look like a very large headache.

They have two major assignments, Freeland said:

- To draw up rules and regulations for enforcement required by the act.

- Assemble and train a staff, of which the major portion will be contractual employees.

Deadline for rules and regulations is Oct. 1. The staff needs to be ready to function by Dec. 1, when the Kansas law takes effect. This is two weeks ahead of the deadline set by Congress when it passed the Wholesome Meat Act more than two years ago.

The legislators have appropriated \$170,000 in state funds with the understanding the federal government will match the amount.

When the bill was introduced by the Kansas State Department of Health in the Agriculture Committee of the Kansas House, it was assumed the Health Department would continue to enforce meat inspection as it has under Kansas law for many years.

But legislators saw fit to

change the responsibility to the Department of Agriculture.

And, although there was some argument about where the responsibility should be placed, both Freeland and Evan Wright, who heads the Pure Food and Drug Division of the Health Department, said they will work together to support the law as it is written.

In answer to some critics of his stand that the law should be administered in the Health Department, Wright said: "Well, if pure meat isn't a health problem, then surely there was no problem to begin with."

The new law will, in effect, add a ninth section to the already eight working divisions of the Agriculture Department, Freeland said.

The other divisions are Water Resources, Weights and Measures, Dairy Division, Marketing Division, Noxious Weeds Division, Control Division, Statistical Division and Entomological Division.

Current employment in the department is about 150 persons, with the Water Resources Division the largest, Freeland said.

It is hoped, he said, that with addition of some fulltime veterinarians and supervisors, much of the meat and poultry inspection throughout the state may be done on a contract basis.

He pointed out the U.S. Department of Agriculture — through its Consumer and Marketing Service, Meat Inspection Division — has planned schools for educating meat inspectors and supervisors.

The new law provides for both ante and post mortem inspection of meat animals and poultry. Freeland said he hopes four to six full-time supervisors will be enough to handle the task of making sure inspections are being completed.

In most of the state, it is hoped part-time inspectors may be hired to conduct the on-the-spot inspections for a contract fee.

He reported that in some of the surrounding states, all of which have meat inspection laws already in force, regular times for slaughtering are set up with the smaller slaughter houses so that one inspector may handle several different plants on differing days.

The new law puts sanitation inside the packing plants, as well as inspection of carcasses both before and after slaughter, under supervision of the Agriculture Department.

A continuing responsibility for purity of the food, and lack of pollution from waste products of packing plants remains with the State Department of Health, however.

Wright and Freeland said they expect to work together in maintaining a complete line of communications and division of work so that public health will be protected despite the division

of the laws provided by the Legislature.

Freeland said that he has no one in mind yet for the position of chief inspector — or chief enforcing officer for the new division in his department.

But interviews with both departments showed an eager willingness to work together to implement the law as rapidly as possible.

Clay Center Gets A New Doctor

The shortage of general practitioners in towns in the G&G area makes news out of any announcement that a small town is getting a new doctor. But sometimes one town's gain is another's loss.

Clay Center will get a new physician sometime in May. He is Dr. Dennis Richards, a native of Marion and a KU med school graduate. But Dr. Richards will move to Clay Center from Herington, where he has practiced for the past five years, so the southern Dickinson County town will be looking for a doctor.

Richards practiced in Bush-ton before he went to Herington.

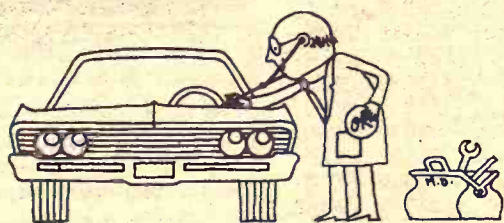

Two Grants To
KSU Vet School

Soy, Fish Meal In \$ Struggle

Our soybean producers are in a big battle with the fishermen of Peru. They are competing for the privilege of feeding billions of birds — chickens in the United States, West Germany, the Netherlands, and many other countries.

This strange struggle has come about this way: The principal product of soybeans is soybean meal, that which remains after the oil (or fat) has been removed. Soybean meal is a protein-rich product, one

highly prized for feeding chickens (and other farm animals.)

Fish meal is another high-protein material used extensively in poultry rations. A big new fish-meal industry has been developed on the coast of Peru within the past 15 years. Most of this fish meal has been exported — to the U.S., West Germany, the Netherlands, and other countries. Poultry producers buy one or the other, depending on the prices.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has made a recent study

and report about Peru's fish-meal industry. All soybean producers will be interested in the principal facts revealed by this report.

In 1968, fish meal exports from Peru totaled about 1.3 million tons — an amount equivalent to the soybean meal that can be produced from 260 million bushels of soybeans, or one-fourth of the crop that was produced in the U.S. last year. Although Peru's exports of fish meal doubled between 1962 and 1968, there may be little or no further increase. Fish specialists say that the catch may already exceed the level that can be sustained without destroying the productivity of the fishing grounds.

Peruvian fish meal is made mostly from small fish called anchovies. They average about six inches long, and are related to herrings. There are about 1700 fishing boats working

from Peruvian ports. Some of them can hold up to 200 tons of fish. This would be some 37 tons of fish meal.

There is a "production control" program in the form of closed seasons, or holidays. The Spanish word is "vedas." The purpose of the vedas is to help maintain prices, as well as to protect the "basic stock" and to prevent its destruction. Fishermen worked only 170 days in 1967.

The fish-meal industry is vital to the Peruvian economy. Fish meal has become the leading export, producing more than \$200 million in foreign exchange in 1967 — more than a fourth of all their foreign exchange earnings. This little country of only 13 million people must have dollars and other foreign exchange

in order to buy essential equipment and supplies that it cannot produce for itself. Peru now produces about two-fifths of the world's output of fish meal and provides about three-fifths of the supply moving in international trade.

We cannot price our soybean meal low enough to stop the sale of fish meal. On the other hand, our pricing of soybean meal will have some influence on the future production of fish meal and other competitive products.

Among the other products that are — or may become — competitive with soybean meal are urea, high-lysine corn, and synthetic amino acids.

Broad Favor For New Alfalfa

Kanza is the name of a new high-yielding alfalfa whose developers claim could significantly reduce the 150-million-dollar annual loss caused by aphids and bacterial wilt.

The variety, developed by the Agriculture Department and the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station yielded 17 per cent more than the average of Cody and Buffalo alfalfas at five test stations in Kansas. That would work out to an average annual increase of 1.08 tons per acre.

Whereas the older varieties are bred for Kansas conditions, Kanza is considered to be suitable for growing in Texas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Arkansas, Missouri and Illinois as well.

Kanza has about the same winter hardiness as Buffalo and Cody and reacts similarly to downy mildew, blackstem, and leafspot. A limited quantity of foundation seed is available at the Kansas Experiment Station and some certified seed is expected from commercial seed sources in the spring of 1970.

Chemical Shearing Has Its Problems

MCGREGOR, Tex. — Jose and Felipe needn't worry too much about the pill putting them out of the sheep shearing business. The chemical shearing method which has received heavy publicity in recent months is a long way from being ripe.

It was demonstrated last

Thursday at the annual sheep and goat field day at Texas A&M's Agricultural Research Center here. Dr. Maurice Shelton of the station said the publicity was premature and perhaps led readers to expect too much.

"We don't have a procedure

yet that we think you ought to take home and use," he told the largest crowd the station's field day has ever attracted. He said he believes some form of this method probably will become practical for farm flock use, but he doubts it has much potential for large ranches in the foreseeable future.

The station drenched test ewes with cyclophosphamide, a chemical used in human cancer research because it stops the division of cells. It does not fever the sheep. It simply stops wool cell development for about one day, causing a break. About nine days after the chemical is administered, the wool can be pulled off by hand.

Many sheepmen have looked hopefully toward the chemical method because of the worsening shortage of shearers.

There are shortcomings. For one, the ewe peels slick as an onion. This leaves her subject to chilling down if it rains or blistering if the sun shines. For another, the sheep would almost certainly have to be kept in confinement for a few days or they would leave wool on every bush they passed.

Individual sheep react differently to the chemicals, so an entire flock given the pill or the drench might not necessarily be ready for peeling the same day. Long-staple sheep take longer to shed. Coarse wool sheep require more chemical than fine-wools.

The process can be used on Angora goats as well as sheep.

Shelton believes researchers may develop a way to avoid the bare skin problem. If they can delay shedding a couple or three weeks until after the break has had a chance to grow out a little, they could simulate the short stubble left by today's shearing combs.

One question which has arisen is that of residue, which in a period of stress might cause a wool break in the middle of a growing season when it is not wanted. Shelton says this does not appear to be a problem. Human cancer research indicates the chemical disappears from the body within a short time.

Present chemicals cannot be used on pregnant animals, since they kill the fetus.

On-And-Off Best Watering System For Lawn

The average homeowner may not be able to make more water available for his lawn and garden this season, but he can

use what he has more effectively.

Most people fail to realize that soils can take up only a

limited amount of water and at a limited rate, says Larry D. Leuthold, Extension ornamental horticulturalist at Kansas State University.

Water moves down through the topsoil and subsoil slowly in horizontal sheets rather than rapidly in vertical columns. When you apply water at the surface, the top layer of soil becomes saturated; that is, it takes up all the water that this particular soil can hold.

Some of the water then moves down into the drier layer below. The speed of this downward movement is influenced by the soil structure. In tight or heavy, compact soil, the movement will be slow. In light, sandy soil, it will be much faster. In any case, when you apply more water than the soil can hold, you simply waste water.

Take a tip from the professional greens keeper, Leuthold suggests. He gets the most good from every gallon of water by carefully timing the water application — 5 to 10 minutes on and 20 to 30 minutes off. This system allows time for the water to saturate the topsoil and then redistribute itself uniformly in the soil below. Keep repeating the on-off process until the lawn is wet to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. Then do not water the lawn for 1 to 2 weeks.

One way to check on how deep you have watered is to use a 2-foot piece of steel rod about 3/8 to 1/2 inch in diameter. Bend over one end to form a short handle. In a freshly watered lawn, you can push the rod down easily to the depth of the wet soil but only with difficulty

beyond this point.

It will help to get better root development deep in the soil if you use the deep watering at infrequent intervals system, Leuthold believes. Roots do not "grow down" to get water. They simply grow better where the necessary moisture is available.

It takes only one warm day after watering for the surface soil to be much drier than the soil below it, if you use the deep watering method. The roots grow better in the cool, damp lower soil, and soon a big, deep root system develops. The big, deep root system is then capable of using the water stored in the deep layer.

Don't be fooled by the neighbors comments that light or shallow watering will cause roots to go down "looking for more water," Leuthold warns. Shallow watering means shallow roots, and the water used by the plant must be replaced every day because there are no roots to take water from the deeper soil.

Time your water applications and let the water used give you the maximum return.

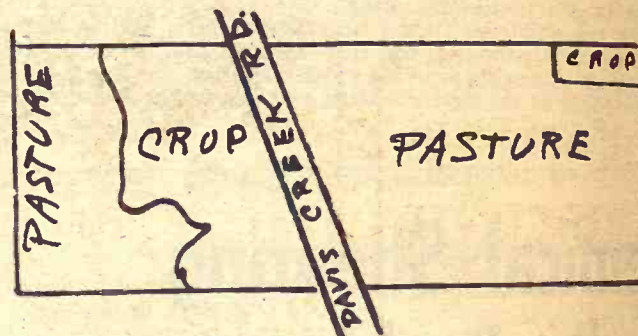

IBP Plant at Emporia Nearly Ready

EMPORIA — Crews in the next two weeks will be putting finishing touches to a beef processing plant here, the newest of its kind in the United States, with an ultimate employment capability of 700 to 800 persons. Iowa Beef Packers (IBP) is building the multi-million dol-

lar facility at the west edge of Emporia. With a beginning labor force of about 200, the firm has a current capacity of processing some 1500 head of beef daily.

A "breaking plant" capable of handling 2500 head of beef daily also is being completed. The "breaking plant" would be used to process beef into packaged, portioned cuts.

At the outset, Howard said, the beef will be processed into major cuts — quarters and halves — for sale to the wholesale distributors.

IBP bought the site from Armour Packing Co., which operates a slaughter plant there.

The processing plant will give Kansas and Oklahoma beef producers a new outlet. Buyers for IBP will purchase directly from feedlots and will be in direct communication by radio with the Emporia facility and the headquarters plant at Dakota City, Nebr.

IBP started eight years ago with an idea for automated specialized food processing approach to the packing house business and now is considered the No. 1 operation of its kind in the world.

In connection with the processing plant, the IBP firm is installing its own sewage disposal units capable of handling waste disposal of a city more than twice the size of Emporia itself.

The sewerage area covers about 160 acres across the railroad right of way south of the processing plant. A six-lagoon system will deliver the water back to the Cottonwood River at the rate of 95 to 98 percent pure, according to Mel Gray, associate director of environmental health, Kansas Department of Health.

Gray said the discharge into

the river—about 1½ miles above the Emporia water supply intakes — will be about 8 percent more pure than the discharge of the city of Emporia into the river below the city.

The six lagoons consist of two anaerobic lagoons 19 feet deep in which the original sewerage will be treated with microscopic organisms. Four other larger lagoons of an aerobic type, much shallower to allow oxidation, will further purify the water.

Gray said the anaerobic lagoons will account for about 70 percent purification of the water. The other six lagoons will increase purification to 95-98 percent effectiveness.

Design of the lagoon system is such that little if any odor will be present "within a reasonable distance" from the lagoon, Gray said.

McLean explained that the facility is a "new concept in the packing industry and is termed a food processing plant."

Interior of the plant is almost entirely tile and gleaming stainless steel so that cleanliness is more efficient and effective in all respects.

The "kill floor" where actual slaughtering is done, is a maze of conveyors, machines and

work spaces all brightly lighted and arranged to make the butchering job fast, clean and efficient.

Special stations for both quality control and inspection by federal inspectors will guarantee a wholesome product at the other end of the automated processing plant.

A considerable number of efficiencies and end product developments also are incorporated into the new plant's installation.

All the blood which comes from the slaughtered animals is saved for drying and later used in manufacturing pet food.

Offal items such as the pancreas, lungs, kidneys, lips and parts of the head are separated from carcasses for use in pet food and animal food called "meat scraps."

Contents of the digestive tracts of slaughtered beef is saved and sold to a nearby cattle feedlot as a protein supplement, McLean said.

McLean, who comes from Dennison, Iowa, said most of the shipping will be done by over the road trucks or by piggy backs on the railroads. Only full truckload lots will be shipped, he said.

'It Just Smells Like Money'

Add Potwin — a Butler County town between El Dorado and Newton — to the list of towns which is less than unanimous about the prospect of having a major feedlot in its area.

There is already one major feedlot near Potwin, the Circle E Ranch lot owned by Excel Packing Co., which handles some 20,000 head.

The prospect of another lot has already raised a petition signed by 218 people opposing it.

The new lot is being built by Flint Hills Inc., a corporation of 31 stockholders who live in the Potwin-Whitewater area of Butler County. It will handle some 10,000 head.

The existing feedlot is located three miles west of Potwin. The proposed commercial feedlot owns a quarter-section of land a mile and a half east.

The town of Potwin lies right between.

Once a booming oil town, Potwin went into a severe decline in 1963, when the Vickers Oil Refinery closed.

Ken Whittington, Potwin resident who has been spearheading the drive against the new feedlot, scheduled to be opened this summer, said, "When the refinery closed, 125 people lost their jobs. In a town of 600, that was like Boeing, Cessna, and Lear all quitting Wichita at the same time."

Despite that opinion, Whittington is not inclined to study the economic advantage of a new feedlot. He says, "As far as I'm concerned, the product of a feedlot is not beef. The products are air pollution, water pollution, manure, flies and rodents."

At a recent meeting in Potwin, Melville Gray, sanitary engineer from the state Department of Public Health, tried to convince the gathering that the new lot could keep its wastes and odors under control. But it was obvious that he did not convince everyone, for a group plans to go ahead with legal action to see if the feedlot can be stopped.

Richard Chase, president of the board of directors of Flint Hills Beef, said the idea of establishing a new feedlot in the Butler County area came about as the result of an extension tour taken last fall into western Kansas to visit existing feedlots in that area.

"We held several public meetings to discuss what we thought could be done," Chase said.

"Several of our cattle-feeders in this area are already sending their stock to western Kansas feedlots to be finished, and it looked as if this was going to

become the trend, we would lose a tremendous industry in our area."

The existing lot owned by Circle E came to Potwin in 1963, the same year the Vickers refinery closed. Originally, it housed 7000 head, but has grown to 20,000.

That lot has never met the control standards now required by the State Board of Health, and does not yet have a health department permit.

Because the lot was in existence before the 1967 water pollution control act was passed, Circle E is licensed to operate by the State Livestock Sanitary Commissioner.

Under the new law, however, lots with more than 1000 head are now required to register with the State Board of Health, which issues a water pollution control permit.

Existing lots which have been inspected and found to have inadequate pollution control are being given time to make improvements to meet permit standards.

New lots must have the Health Department permit before the Livestock Sanitary Commission permit is issued.

The lagoon on the Circle E feedlot was a small farm pond before the feedlot was built, and Gray, the Department of Health engineer, said it has been found inadequate for retention of wastes.

The feedlot has been inspected for a permit, Gray said, but the

retention system and irrigation systems were both found deficient.

Work has started to double the capacity of control, Gray said.

A spokesman for Excel Packing confirmed this work was now underway to enlarge the retention ponds.

The Flint Hills Beef board of directors claims their lot will never be like Circle E.

"It is hard to explain to people we are going to abide by state control regulations when existing yards around here are not doing it," said director Frank Duvanel.

"I have confidence we can abide by the government system and not pollute any streams from our lagoon system," Duvanel said.

The board members point out that the feedlot site has been inspected by the State Geological Survey for groundwater pollution potential, and the site and their control plans have been approved by health department engineers.

The new feedlot site, Chase explained, is on an eastern slope, with all runoff from the proposed pen area leading away from Potwin into a lagoon system.

The State Board of Health, he said, has required that there be at least five acres of sedimentation pond and lagoon; that there be irrigation pumps large enough to empty the ponds in five days, and that the ponds

be kept low enough to handle three inches of rainfall at all times.

"It is my opinion," Gray has stated, "that the site will be satisfactory under the control provisions presented."

Even if the lot can control water pollution, Whittington and his side say there is nothing that can be done about flies and odor.

Not all Potwin people are against the feedlot by any means. Some are impressed with its economic benefits. With an initial \$400,000 investment, the feedlot will feed \$6 million worth of cattle during a year, use \$2 million worth of feed and have an \$80,000 payroll.

All the cattle on the feedlot, of course, will be assessed as personal property and that of course adds considerable to the tax valuation in the area.

One neighbor, Harris Houston, doesn't find the prospect of a nearby feedlot so disastrous. He figures he will sell feed to the lot, and he can stand some odor for a ready market for his crops.

"To a lot of farmers, this just smells like money," he says.

"When that refinery was going full blast, it near knocked me down at times, but nobody in town smelled anything."

ANCA Sees Bullish Trend

The cattle market continues strong and the American National Cattlemen's Assn. views at least the short range prospects as "moderately bullish." The ANCA sees the current supply and demand situation coupled with the slaughter rate of cattle as indicating a condition in May or June where packers will have to accept lighter weight short-feds in order to meet requirements.

This conclusion was arrived at after analysis of the cattle-feed report issued by the Dept. of Agriculture April 17. The report showed cattle and calves on feed at the first of the month up seven percent from a year earlier.

The sharpest increases in cattle numbers were shown in Texas and Kansas. The Texas increase was 34 percent, that of Kansas 28 percent. Nebraska was unchanged, Iowa up 1 percent and the Dakotas down.

Hardin Still Talks Of Land Retirement

A hard look is being taken by the Department of Agriculture at a long-time land retirement program, Secretary Clifford Hardin told members of the Newspaper Farm Editors of America.

But the secretary quickly added that it should be recognized that long-term land retirement is not going to be the backbone of the farm program for some years, even if adopted. "For a long time, we'll continue to need year-to-year adjustments," Hardin explained. This would mean continuation of the acreage controls in the present pattern.

Hardin spoke to the farm editors who had been in session here two days in a spring meeting devoted mostly to visits with officials of the Agriculture Department.

The secretary spoke briefly, and then answered questions for more than an hour.

Many of the questions had to do with whether the secretary or his department would be coming up with new farm program proposals or whether such legislation would originate in Congress. Hardin has given

no indication to date that he has a specific program in mind.

Hardin said that he and his associates are working with congressional committees very closely.

"We may not come up with a department program per se," he said. "In fact, the program may be presented in pieces."

"But the department will be getting into action at some point in the near future on a

farm program. Possibly it will be this year."

The present farm program does not expire until the end of 1970, thus it has been said there is no great rush to get new legislation into operation.

The greatest immediate aid this administration could give to the farmers, Hardin asserted, would be to bring a halt to inflation. The high costs of production, he added, are hurting

farmers. Halting inflation would be important to net farm income this year, he said.

Carryover Wheat May Top Earlier Guess

Agriculture Department analysts have bad news for surplus-plagued U.S. wheat producers, but the word for similarly-troubled corn growers is better.

After studying the newly re-

leased report on April 1 grain stocks, a department wheat expert said it will be necessary to lower the previous forecast of wheat consumption in the current crop year that ends June 30. As a result, the wheat "carryover" at the start of the new crop year could range as high as 825 million bushels instead of the high of 780 million previously projected.

At the same time, however, the report led department feed

grain experts to calculate that corn consumption in the first quarter of calendar 1969 was significantly higher than originally anticipated, a fact that could be reflected in stronger corn prices during the coming months.

Total wheat in storage on April 1 equaled a bit more than 1.1 billion bushels, 32% above a year earlier and 59% higher than two years before. Consumption from October 1968 through March 1969 appears to have totaled 566 million bushels, down from 720 million in the like year-earlier period, the department reported.

These figures indicate that use of wheat as animal feed in the nine months ended March 31 totaled about 165 million bushels, right in line with previous expectations, the department wheat analyst said. But the stocks report confirmed weekly export sales figures that indicate foreign purchases of U.S. wheat of only 500 million to 550 million bushels this crop year, instead of the 600 million to 625 million estimate used by the department earlier. If the falloff in exports proves as bad as anticipated, sales for the year might be the worst in a decade.

Based on the April 1 report, overall holdings of feed grains — corn, oats, barley and sorghum grain — amounted to 115 million tons, down 1% from a year earlier, but 12% above the April 1, 1967 level.

Corn stocks alone equaled a bit more than 3 billion bushels on April 1, down 6% from the 1968 level but 11% more than two years earlier. Farm holdings of corn, which totaled nearly 2.2 billion bushels, fell 8% in the year, the department said.

Corn stocks remaining on April 1 indicated that consumption in the six months ended March 31 amounted to a bit more than 2.5 billion bushels, up 147 million bushels from a year earlier.

In February the department projected that corn use for the entire crop year ending Sept. 30 would be about 4.47 billion bushels, slightly more than the previous year. The year-to-year gain now is expected at least to

equal the six-month jump and perhaps total 200 million bushels more than the 1967-68 figure.

The April 1 stocks figure also showed record soybean holdings for the date of nearly 707 million bushels, reflecting higher production and the falloff in foreign sales. On April 1, 1968, soybean stocks were a shade under 537 million bushels.

May 15 Deadline For Certified Seed Applications

Kansas farmers who plan to grow certified wheat, oats, barley, rye, sweet clover, and smooth brome must submit applications for field inspections at the Kansas Crop Improvement Association office by May 15.

Howard D. Wilkins, secretary of the KCIA, reminds the growers that application forms are

available in all county Extension offices, or can be secured directly from the Association Office, 148 Waters Hall, Kansas State University, Manhattan, Kansas 66502.

The three-page application form should be submitted to the KCIA office along with the tag and seal from the seed planted or bulk sale card for proof of the seed source. Wilkins points out. Field inspections will start in late May or early June, usually a week to 10 days before harvest.

Crops that qualify for certification must be isolated from

other crops to insure purity of seed, must be free of noxious and objectionable weeds, and must not be mixed with other varieties or other crops.

Since certified seed insures high germination, purity of variety, and clean seed, growers can usually sell their certified seed for enough premium to more than cover the cost and management effort required to produce it, Wilkins notes.

The KCIA does not handle the sale of this seed, he adds, but merely provides a blue tag which attests that this is certified seed, and an analysis tag which gives the laboratory report on the seeds germination, purity and weed content percentages.

Is there a demand for certified seed? Emphatically yes, replies Wilkins. For example, if all the certified wheat seed grown in Kansas last year — approximately 15,000 acres — were planted this year, less than 4 percent of the available acreage would have been planted with certified seed.

Nixon Considers A National Sales Tax

The Nixon administration is considering asking Congress for a form of national sales tax as a substitute for part of the corporate income tax.

The proposal would be a radical departure from the conventional income tax. It would be similar to European taxes on products as they go through the manufacturing process.

The tax, called a value-added tax, is under study by the Treasury for possible recommendation.

tion to Congress as President Nixon's second-stage proposal for overhauling the federal income taxes.

That second stage is not expected until next year at the earliest, after Congress finishes its present tax reform proposals to tighten or close loopholes in the laws.

A value-added tax is a sales tax on products as they go from one stage of manufacturing to another, but with the consumer

finally paying the bill.

For example, there is a tax on steel. When the steel manufacturer sells the product to the car maker, he ups his price on the finished steel to include the tax. The auto company passes the tax on to the car buyer.

Treasury Undersecretary Charles E. Walker hinted Wednesday during hearings of the House Ways and Means Committee a value-added tax study was in the works.

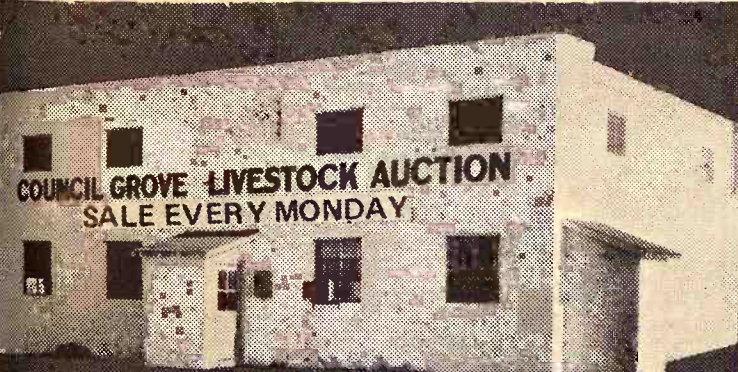

Farmers Using Less DDT

The Agriculture Department says farmers are using less of the controversial pesticide DDT but that it continues to be a highly valued insect control chemical for many crops.

The use of DDT by farmers, the main market in the United States, dropped nearly 50 percent from the peak of 79 million pounds applied to fields in 1958-59 to a little more than 30 million pounds in 1966-67.

Officials attributed most of the decline to farmers using other insecticides and to a reduced acreage of cotton in 1966-67.

Cotton growers use most of the DDT applied in this country, accounting for 19.2 million pounds of the 27 million used

by farmers in 1966, the report said.

Other uses by farmers that year included: Tobacco 800,000 pounds; soybeans 700,000; vegetables including potatoes 1.1 million; fruits 1.5 million; other crops 2.7 million, and livestock and buildings 500,000.

The department has not taken a decisive stand on the DDT issue, which last week included an announcement by Robert A. Finch, secretary of health, education and welfare, of a commission to study the effects of the powerful pesticide on food and the environment.

FARMERS OUTLOOK

See A Soybean Price Advance

The soybean market has developed about as expected. Recent prices have been slightly above the price-support loan rate. An additional, moderate advance probably will be necessary before farmers will redeem and sell enough beans to meet the needs of processors and foreign buyers.

The soybean marketing year reached the half-way point on March 1. At that time, we estimate the total supply in the United States at about 740 million bushels... some 30 percent more than one year before. These figures were obtained by adding the carry-over to the crop, then subtracting known crushings, exports, and expected needs for seed. (The USDA is making a survey of soybean stocks on hand April 1, and will release those figures about April 24.)

While the total supply of soybeans on hand is larger than a year ago, the "free" stocks are smaller - since many more are locked-up under price support. We calculate the "free" stock on hand March 1 at about 310 million bushels, give or take 20 million. Apparently, the "free" stock is 15 to 20 percent smaller than a year ago at the same point (March 1). These stocks totaled about 470 million bushels on March 1.

Stocks under price support included CCC holdings (52 million bushels), beans under resale programs (74 million bushels), and 1968 crop beans that have been placed under loan since harvest (308 million bushels). Some of these 1968 beans, perhaps as much as 150 million bushels, will be needed for crushings, exports, and pipeline supplies before the 1969 crop becomes available. Thus, prices will have to go high enough to cause farmers to redeem about half of the 1968 beans placed under loan.

Farmers have already redeemed about 5 percent of the amount

under loan, and they will be redeeming more beans each week, for various reasons, even if prices do not advance. But we expect that a small price increase will be needed, in order to get enough beans for processors and exporters.

Soybean prices are closely related to the value of the meal and oil that can be obtained from a bushel of beans. In March of this year, the spread between soybean prices and the value of oil and meal was about 2 cents less than it was 12 months earlier.

Soybean prices at Illinois points averaged \$2.56 in March - 8 cents less than a year ago. The value of soybean meal and oil averaged \$2.65 - 10 cents less than at the same time in 1968. Prices for soybean oil averaged about 8.7 cents a pound - down 0.3 of a cent. Meal prices averaged about \$72.60 a ton - down \$2.40 from the year before.

Farmers have reported that

they intend to plant nearly 43 million acres of soybeans - about 1.5 million acres more than last year. Although that survey of intentions was taken before the reduction in the price-support level was made, it may still be accurate, because most farmers were probably expecting the reduction in the loan rate.

Any acreage increase may be largely offset by lower yields per acre, since 1968 yields were unusually high. In any case, prices for the 1969 crop of soybeans will be closely tied to the price-support loan rate, which will be about 30 cents lower than for the 1968 crop.
