Frustrating Harvest

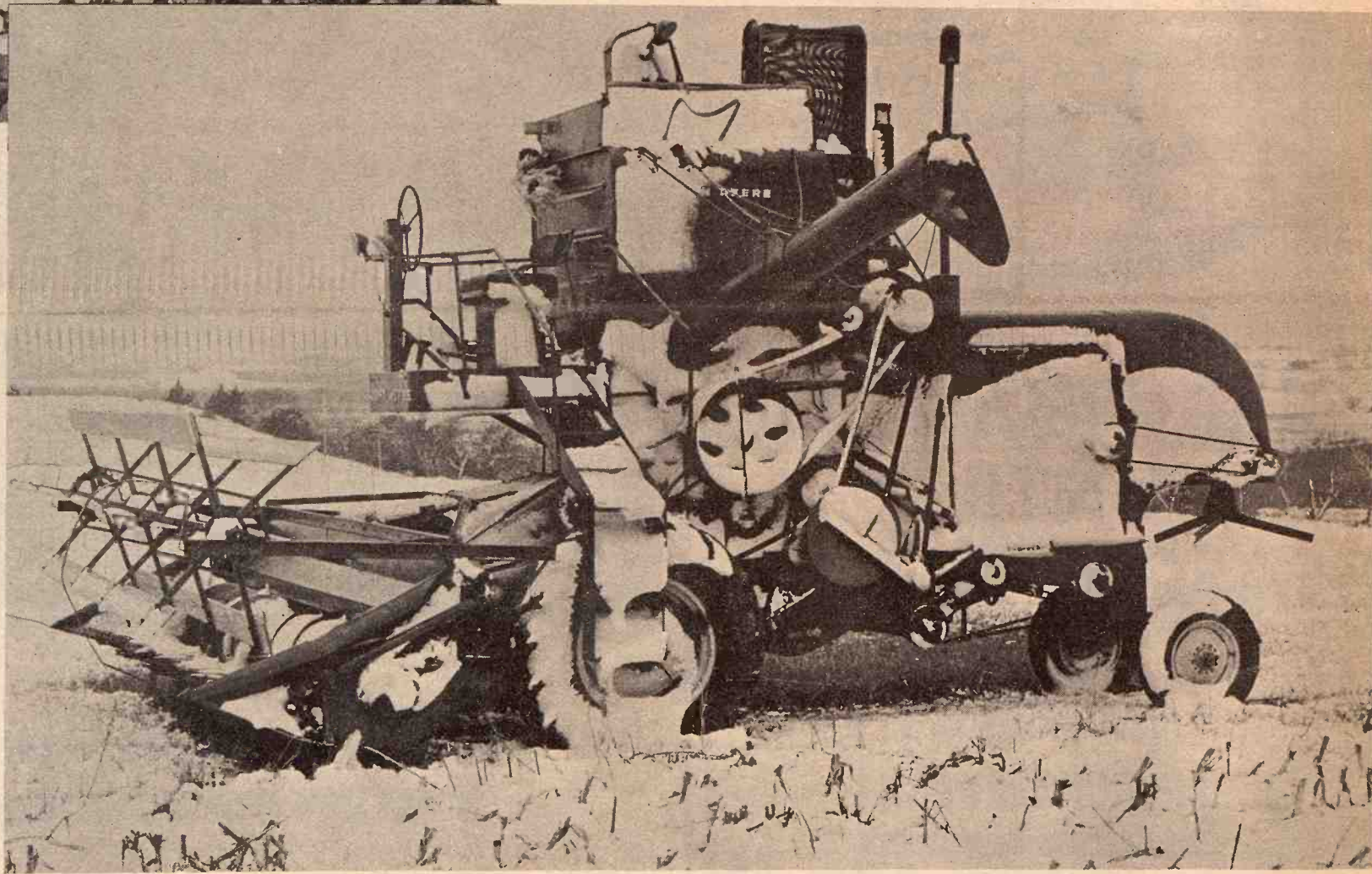
With about half the state's \$200-million grain sorghum crop in the bin, with thick mud or newfallen snow hampering harvesting efforts, and with grain-laden heads bending under the weight of last week's rain and snow, the 1972 milo crop in Eastern Kansas faces potentially heavy damage.

In past years, nearly 80 percent of the state's grain sorghum crop has been harvested by the second week of November. But, due to continued rains, neither the milo nor the fields have dried enough to permit wide-spread harvesting.

"This snow could be very damaging," said a source at the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. "We certainly didn't need the moisture we got last week and we don't need the moisture we're getting now."

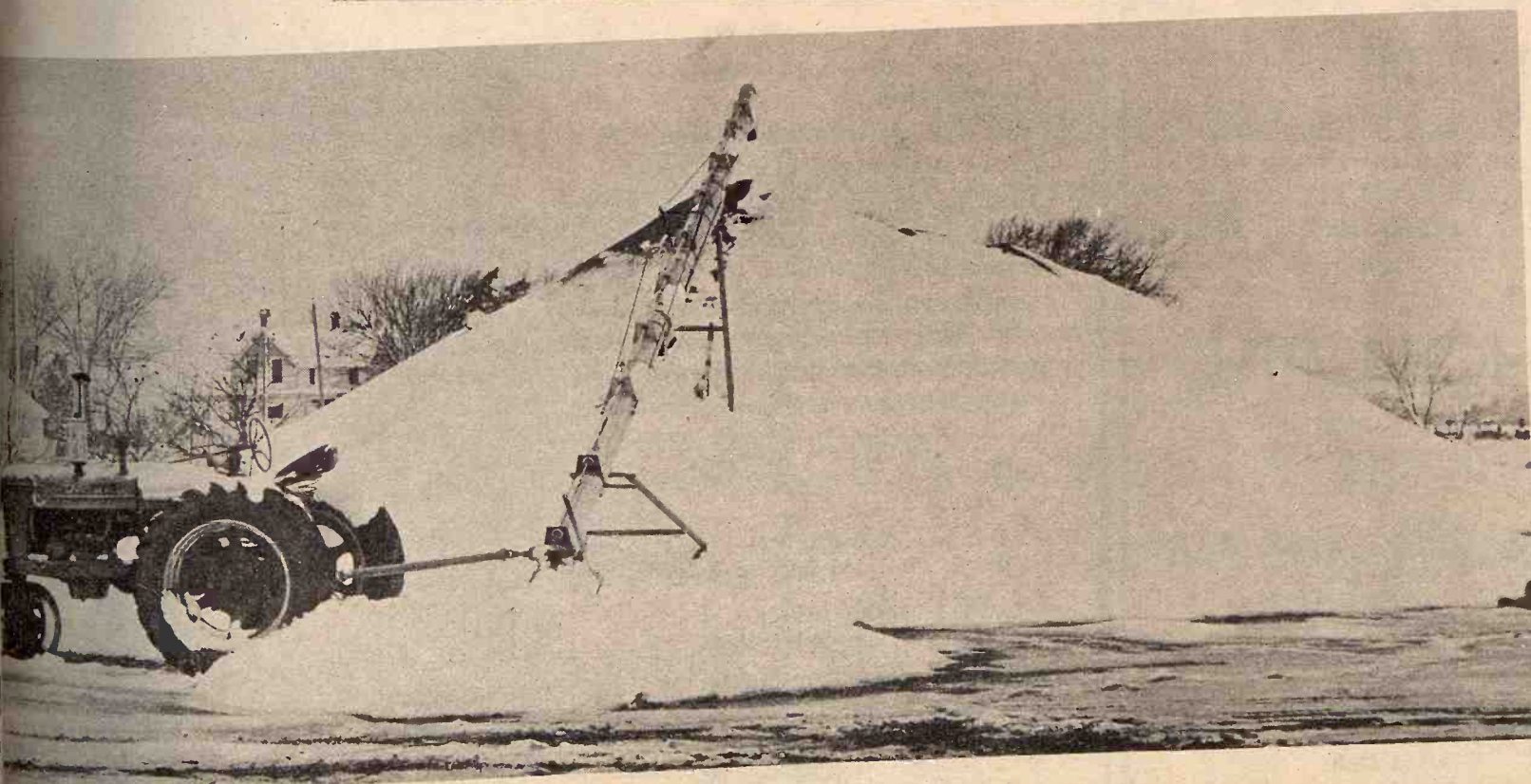
"We would have preferred 10 days to 2 weeks of drying weather that would have permitted farmers to harvest their fall crops, and would have stimulated additional wheat growth."

"We're still hoping for some warmer weather later this month or during December so the wheat can get rooted down."

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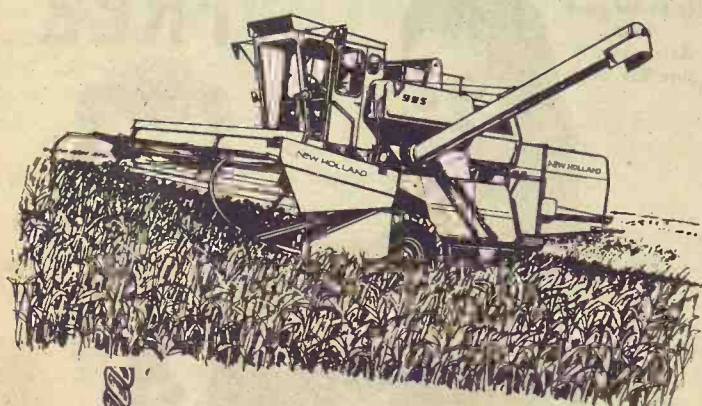

Vocational Oriented Education For Northwest Kansas Grade Schoolers

Northwest Kansas grade school students are finding a new twist in their educational process. Formerly those in the lower grades were learning arithmetic and

other studies so they could advance to the next grade, Gary Jarmer, director of the Unified Schools Association for Vocational education at Hill City, said.

Now, what grade schoolers learn will be designed to be useful to them in a job in later life, he said.

U-SAVE, as Jarmer calls the organization, is designed to prepare students for a career. Hopefully, he added, a career in Northwest Kansas.

"We're trying to help about 600 teachers to understand this philosophy and use it in their classrooms," he said. "We're trying to relate that people will become employed someday."

"In this process," he added, "we need to help youngsters understand about job possibilities."

U-SAVE, Jarmer said, began about a year ago with 5 area school districts who were exploring ways to increase their vocational education departments.

Now, he added, U-SAVE represents 18 school districts throughout Northwest Kansas. "We have a pretty good hunk of Northwest Kansas, actually, with all the schools involved."

Unified school districts participating in the U-SAVE program are Alma, Atwood, Hill City, Hoxie, Jennings, Kensington, Kirwin, Lenora, Logan, Morland, Norton, Oberlin, Palco, Phillipsburg, Plainville, Smith Center, Stockton and WaKeeney.

An operating budget of \$109,000 for U-SAVE was granted last February from the U.S. Office of Education. The U-SAVE office is located at Hill City.

Jarmer said his office has surveyed 4,000 students out of area high schools and found that although 52 percent of them begin college only 32 percent of these finish 4 years later.

In addition, Jarmer said, 20 percent take jobs right out of high school.

Jarmer said most high schools are oriented toward college preparation but only 16 percent of Kansas high school graduates receive a college degree.

"I think we need to take a look at our educational system and ask ourselves if we're really doing the job that needs to be done," he said.

Too many students, according to Jarmer, are in college with no plans and without reason.

Jarmer says career education is a "womb-to-tomb" concept but, currently, U-SAVE is concentrating on students in kindergarten through grade 8.

In grade school, he said, it is important that youngsters realize they are learning so they will be better able to fit into society.

In junior high school, he said, students should be thinking of careers at a greater depth and in senior high school, students should be considering careers strongly with some-on-the-job experience.

"When they get out of high school they should have enough skills so they can get a job or get additional

training at a vo-tech school, community junior college or at a 4-year college or university," he explained.

Jarmer said his office is currently working on a proposal to provide additional vocational training through a cooperative effort of school districts.

Most small schools in Northwest Kansas, he said, can offer only limited practical training such as typing and vocational agriculture. A cooperative effort, he explained, could offer the student a wider range of training such as mechanical or electrical.

In addition, he said, the schools could have on-the-job training available where students would actually work with someone already in the field.

Jarmer says the program can be one answer to the declining population of Northwest Kansas. "We're trying to point out that there are some careers which do not exist in Northwest Kansas."

With the population declining, Jarmer said it is important that students return to the area. "In all the counties that we serve there isn't one of them that has had less than a 10 percent population decline," he said.

"If this career education thing can help students see that careers exist then perhaps they would consider coming back."



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Wheat Program Options No Easy Choice For Farmers

Several options of the wheat program look quite attractive. At first, it appeared many wheat growers would participate by taking the additional set-aside option. While this may still be true, shortly after the program was announced, the market price of wheat increased substantially. This was due apparently to the announced increase in export sales.

Thus, wheat growers are left in somewhat of a pleasant dilemma. Should they plant larger acreage of wheat and gamble on next year's export trade to keep wheat prices at the present level?

Or should they choose the more sure and perhaps as profitable route by taking the additional set-asides option with its payment?

The decision will not be easy because many factors are involved, says Dr. Bill Brant, extension economist at Oklahoma State University. One wheat grower would profit by one decision and his neighbor by still another. Wheat growers should consider the following points in arriving at their decisions. Barley will be in the feed grain program with a minimum required set-aside of at least 25 percent.

1. When the 1973 Feed Grain Program is announced, it will probably follow the pattern of the 1973 Wheat and the 1972 Feed Grain Program.

2. It was probably a wise move to plant enough wheat so the grower can take part in any options that look favorable. Growers should remember they can cut back later.

Any excess plantings can be brought into compliance by grazing or destroying. Planting time is now. Sign-up time is probably February-March of 1973. Then later in the spring, the excess plantings must be eliminated.

3. The additional wheat set-aside provision appears profitable when the acres can be grazed out by livestock (either owned or rented out) and when the farm has a large 1973 wheat additional set-aside.

The additional set-aside option means wheat acres harvested or

placed in additional set-aside will be limited in 1973.

4. The export picture looks good for the next few years. But it depends on action by other governments, not ours. The jump in wheat price may have resulted from a reaction to the export news instead of an adjustment resulting from export sales.

Regardless, not many situations will exist where wheat producers can profitably lose history. Maintaining history protection will be a problem for some choosing the additional set-aside option.

This year, wheat growers will need to spend considerable time pencil pushing to reach the most profitable decision.

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NFU Making Push To Reorganize State For Support On Farm Legislation

Kansas farmers are being given considerable attention this month from National Farmers Union as county units of NFU have their annual meetings preceding the Kansas NFU convention at Salina Nov. 26-28.

The plan this year is for national representatives of NFU to attend about 90 per cent of the county meetings in Kansas.

Kansas NFU lost its charter several years ago when membership and finances to operate the state charter organization lagged. It is believed membership is high enough and incentive strong enough that that state group may vote for and be accepted for a new charter this year following the state convention in Salina.

Tony Dechant, former Kansan and national president of NFU, has been active in attempting to rejuvenate the Kansas group.

Questions on a national level this year are pushing NFU members to increase membership. Fears are agricultural programs will go begging in the new Congress and that corporate farming inroads into agriculture will ruin the family farm.

Rueben Johnson, NFU legislative director, in speeches before county NFU's at Piqua, Abilene, Russell, Hutchinson, and Cottonwood Falls, discussed problems and challenges

of the new year in Congress.

He pointed out that while this year there were 280 seats in Congress that were responsible to rural areas, the 93rd Congress will have only 80 seats responsible to rural areas.

This will change the way legislation is met and passed, he said. He pointed out that the 1970 Food and Agriculture Act ends June 30 and must be renewed, extended, or lost in early days of the new Congress.

The challenge will be to find enough urban senators and representatives to help pass new legislation or extend the old.

A phase-out of the current farm programs — or some form of supply-management-cost protecting legislation — will mean an end to the family farm, Johnson warned.

If Congress decides Russian grain sales were such a boost to farmers that they no longer need farm legislation to control supplies and protect prices, then the family farm will be phased out of business the NFU man believes.

NFU plans additional visits to Congress from the grass roots areas like Kansas. Many "fly-ins" — farmers going to Washington to alert congressmen to the farmers' wishes — will be made.

Additional political activities of all kinds will be fostered by NFU in an effort to keep farming and rural

areas growing economically, they said.

Hog Cholera Quarantine Lifted On Osborne Herds

Kansas Animal Health Department announced the hog cholera quarantine has been lifted for two hog herds in the northeast corner of Osborne County.

Dr. G. D. Gurss, livestock commissioner, said U.S. Department of Agriculture lifted the quarantine. The quarantine was clamped on the two herds Sept. 20 after two animals

died of the infectious blood virus. Humans are immune to the virus, Dr. Gurss said.

"The two producers involved were neighbors," Gurss said, "but we never found the source of the cholera. We just don't know where it came from."

Gurss said it was the first cholera quarantine enforced in Kansas in two years. No other cholera cases developed in the herds, he said.

Feedlots Meeting State Regulations

Feedlot owners in Kansas and three nearby states are doing an

adequate job of handling solid wastes.

Dr. Myron D. Paine, Extension specialist, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, reported a survey covering 85 Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and Mexico. The feedlots had more than one million head of cattle on feed in 1970.

Paine said that survey showed 94 per cent of the feedlots had control facilities meeting regulations.

The specialist gave a report to a group of state Extension Service how to handle wastes.

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Farm-Grown Catfish Catching On In Kansas

Far-Mar-Co Foods research center in Hutchinson has gone fishing. What's more, they are assured of a big catch. Wayne Henry, director of research, says that raising catfish is one of the fastest growing concerns to Kansas farmers that he knows.

Two years ago Henry initiated a catfish-raising project at the company's farm center at Sylvia. Today, the relatively young project is contained in 50 acres of ponds at the site.

Not only has the project been beneficial in providing management

data for farm production for fish, but it also benefits anyone with a taste for fish.

After the fish are grown and experimental data on them has been taken, the fish are cleaned, dressed, wrapped and frozen and are then for sale.

Henry said the fish, which usually come eight per package, averaging 1/2 to one pound per fish, are sold at \$1.15 per pound.

Smoked fish are also available upon advance request, according to Henry. The smoked cats are marinated in a sugar-salt solution 24 hours and then smoked five hours. They sell for \$2.30 per pound and are ready to eat.

The director explained that with wheat prices as low as they've been the past few years, many Kansas farmers are now looking for a supplemental income.

"This is it," he said. "All they have to do is construct a three to four

foot bank for the pond and stock it and from then on it is a matter of maintenance," he said.

Henry added that Kansas is blessed with an excellent quality of water, vital to proper catfish production.

"While aeration is a problem to fish growers in other states, the strong winds of Kansas readily take care of that need," he said.

At the Sylvia ponds, at least two major methods of fish raising are currently under investigation:

The first involves normal release of the fingerling-sized fish — 6 to 8 inches — into a pond so they can grow in a normal environment.

In this case, the catfish can follow its natural instinct as a bottom-feeder or scavenger.

The second, more revolutionary method has about 1,000 of the fingerlings contained within a 4x4x8 foot submerged cage.

There, the fish are fed a tested, high quality food and are raised away from the bottom of the pond.

Thus, the "fishy, dirty" taste that so often accompanies catfish is no longer present.

"This is truly the non-fisheater's fish," Henry said.

Henry emphasized the importance of excellent management on the part of the growers.

"It's just like raising beef or any other cash crop," he said. "Unless a man is careful and understands the best management practices he probably won't make a go of it."

As an example of how catfish raising has caught on nationally, Henry cited statistics which show that the number of acres of catfish production has increased five times — from 10,000 acres to 50,000 acres — from 1968 to 1971.

Henry said in some states farmers "rotate" their crops with their fish production.

"They simply drain their ponds after harvest, knock down the banks and locate them elsewhere," he said. "And then they grow a crop on the fertile, silt soil that was the pond bottom."

Henry said FAR-MAR-CO is interested in this sort of research because it feels fish raising is going to be a good business for Kansas farmers in the near future.

"We are owned by farmers and thus, their interest and needs are ours," he added.

As far as the market for such production is concerned, Henry said he has no doubt but what there would be abundant market sources if a constant, year-round supply were available.

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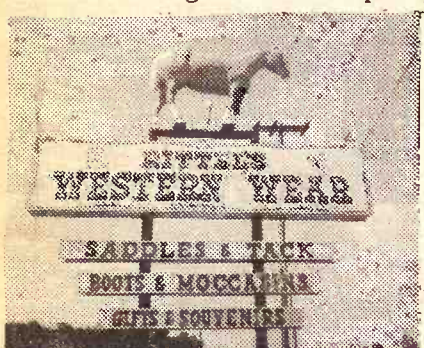
Corn Prices Strong Even With Big Supply

In contrast to almost all past experience, this country is witnessing a strong corn market during the harvest in a year when total supplies are the greatest in history. In fact, this is an almost unheard of situation.

This country has seen corn prices much higher than now, during major war periods, when crops were short because of droughts or catastrophes



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such as the corn blight. But it is a rare occurrence when prices are strong, relatively speaking, when farmers have a big crop to sell on top of a big supply carried over from the previous year.

Here's the situation this fall as we head into the winter months:

The corn crop this year has been estimated at 5266 million bushels. The carry-over on Oct. 1 from previous crops was 1119 million bushels. Thus total corn stocks amount to 6385 million bushels, the most corn this country ever had at one time.

Last year the crop was bigger — 5540 million bushels — but the carry-over was only 663 million bushels. The starting supply then at the beginning of winter was 6203 million bushels, which was a record at that time.

Never, before last year, had the total corn supply — the new harvest plus the carry-over on Oct. 1 — reached 6 million bushels. This country had bigger carry-overs or surpluses in the early 1960's, but when these surpluses were added to the harvests each year, the totals did not quite reach the 6 billion mark. We had our first corn crop in excess of 5 billion bushels in 1971.

This year and last, the corn carry-overs have been referred to as just that — not surpluses. The reason is simple — tremendous utilization.

Domestic use has been extremely heavy, but due credit also must be given exports. Were it not for this country's exports, not only of corn but of other feed grains and wheat, grain men at the Kansas City Board of Trade agree that corn prices now most likely would be at the government loan level or below.

To put it plainly, they say as they look at the prices quoted on the big blackboard on the trading floor that "this is an export market."

Corn exports in the marketing year which ended Sept. 30 totaled approximately 770 million bushels, by far the greatest in history. The USDA is predicting exports in this marketing year may reach 875 million bushels but some in the trade are suggesting, because of recent and potential business with China, that the total may approach 1 billion bushels. It also is significant that wheat exports now are being forecast to reach 1.2 billion bushels.

Domestic use of corn this year also will hit a new high because of heavy feeding of cattle, hogs and poultry. Total disappearance, which includes both domestic usage and exports, currently is being estimated at 5.3 billion bushels.

If exports go beyond present USDA expectations, the total utilization figure also likely would rise.

At any rate, even if this country does see a disappearance of corn this marketing year of 5.3 billion bushels, we'll still have a billion bushels in store next Oct. 1, to add to the 1973 harvest. These figures suggest the United States is not about to run out of corn.

On the other hand, when corn prices continue relatively strong in the face of a billion bushel carry-over this year and the prospects of another billion bushel carry-over in 1973, the situation suggests a continuing demand surpassing anything we have known in the past.

As mentioned, many in the grain trade are convinced that in view of the large corn supplies, prices would be at the government loan level or below, without the substantial exports.

Recently, at Northern Missouri points as an example, cash corn prices at the farm have been 10 to 12 cents above the net loan. This means

the farmer could sell his corn at 10 to 12 cents a bushel more than he could get under the government price support loan if he stored the grain in bins on his own farm. If the farmer had to store his grain under loan in an elevator, the government would deduct 11 cents a bushel to pay for the storage until next summer.

With a 6 billion bushel supply of corn, every time 10 cents is added to the value of a bushel, it increases the value of the total supply 600 million dollars.

The situation as it applies to corn also is similar for other feed grain crops.

The total U.S. feed grain supply this year, which includes corn, milo, barley and oats, is being estimated at 219 million tons, slightly above last year's record volume. Production, estimated at 176 million tons is down 12 million tons largely because of a smaller harvested acreage. However, the total supply is up because of the large carry-over.

Just as with corn, prices on all other feed grains now are higher than a year ago, and higher than

they would be without exports of all grains.

In the last marketing year, the country used domestic million tons of feed grain now is assumed that the increased 2 to 3 percent.

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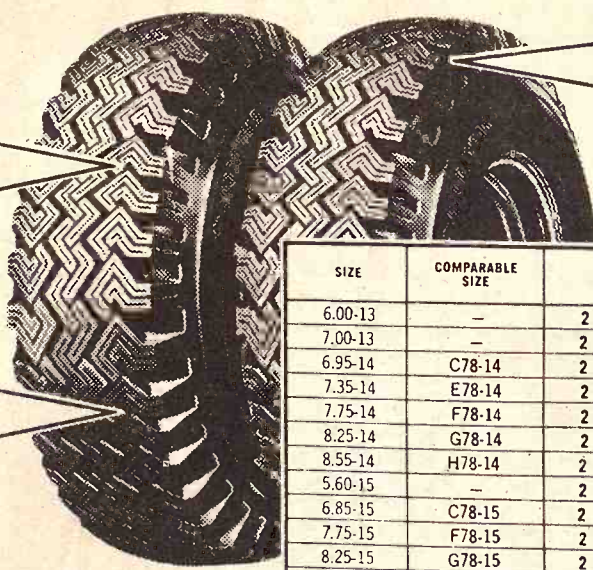

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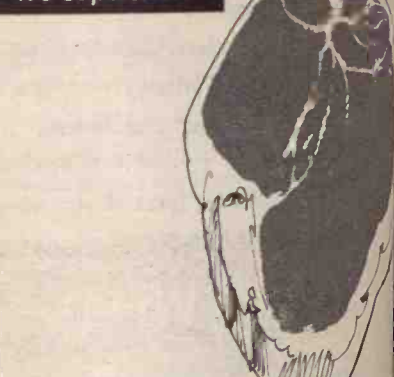
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Simmental-Angus Steer Judged Champion In Ring and Carcass Show

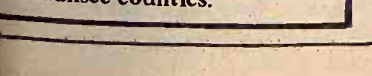

To be accepted for this training a

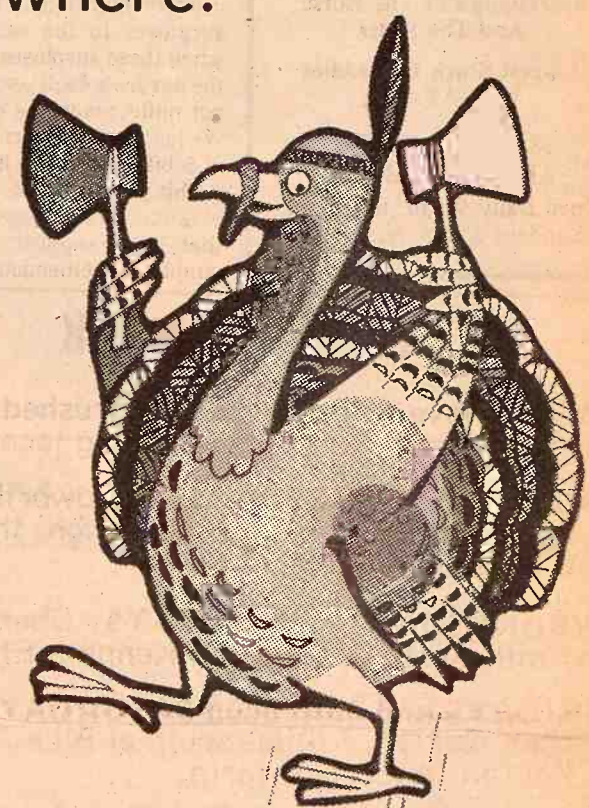
person must serve as a regular or substitute KABSU technician, or breed his own cows with either KABSU semen or KABSU custom collected semen.

This week's winner is Mrs. Donna Wiley, Rt. 3, Lawrence, who writes, "This recipe could be called 'Pumpkin Cheese Pie.' It could also be divided into two 8-inch pie pans. Everyone delights over eating this at our house and it would be especially attractive to serve for a group meeting."

PUMPKIN TORTE

24 graham crackers, crushed
one-third cup sugar
½ cup margarine
2 eggs, beaten
¾ cup sugar
8 ounces cream cheese
2 cups pumpkin
3 egg yolks
½ cup sugar
½ cup milk
½ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 envelope plain gelatin
¼ cup cold water
3 egg whites
¼ cup sugar
Whipped cream

Mix crushed graham crackers, one-third cup sugar and margarine and then press into 9x13-inch pan. Mix beaten eggs, sugar, cream cheese and pour over crust. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Cook pumpkin, egg yolks, ½ cup sugar, milk, salt and cinnamon until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and add gelatin that has been dissolved in cold water. Cool. Beat egg whites, ¼ cup sugar and fold in pumpkin mixture. Pour over cooled baked crust. Chill several hours or overnight. Top with whipped cream.

¼ teaspoon each allspice and cloves

Marked Dental Progress During Last Decade

Dentistry may not yet be com-
pletely painless and there are still
many persons who are found to have
more than one cavity at checkup
time. However, the last ten years
have been a decade marking ad-
vancement in dental theory and
products.

It is no longer considered suf-
ficient by many dental researchers
to simply brush your teeth. Because
many of them now believe that it's
the plaque that adheres to tooth
surfaces rather than food particles
that produce cavities, they advise
learning how to use dental floss
correctly. For easier detecting and
removal there are also tablets and
solutions that stain plaque.

However, some dentists believe
that some individuals won't go along
with the prescribed dental hygiene
program. These dentists advocate
the continued use of a fluoride tooth-

paste, adding fluoride to drinking
water, and watching the diet, as the
only "sure" method of reducing
dental decay. If the patient com-
plains he can't brush his teeth in
certain areas because some of the
teeth are too sensitive, he can be
given a strontium chloride tooth-
paste that was introduced just about
the beginning of the 1960's and which
has been found to desensitize teeth
that are overly sensitive to tooth-
brushing (or hot or cold food or
drink.)

Among the newest advances are a
method of dissolving decay which
seems hopeful for lessening the
amount of drilling required, a new
glass filler material to treat ex-
cavated teeth with a longer-lasting
restoration to match the tooth's
appearance, and the addition of a
little gold to silver fillings to im-
prove their tensile strength and
durability.

What can we expect for the
future? At a dental meeting a year
ago, researchers discussed studies
involving the implantation of plastic
teeth in the jaw that may one day
replace dentures, laser beam
treatment of teeth to prevent
cavities, and the prediction that
instead of thumbing through
magazines in the dentist's waiting
room, patients will "converse" with
a minicomputer about their dental
histories. The patient would respond
to questions flashed on a television-
like screen. However, the use of
computers in every dental office is
likely to take some time to develop.

Until then, most of us will have to
be content with catching up on old
magazines and current gossip while
waiting for the cavities that we were
not careful enough to prevent, to be
drilled and filled.

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Aussies Want Wheat Quota Increased In 1973

The unprecedented demand for
wheat in world markets has
prompted Australian farmers to ask
their government for an increase in
1973 marketing quotas, according to
the Agriculture Department.

Wheat prices on the U.S. market
and abroad have strengthened since
the Soviet Union began buying huge
quantities, mostly from American
farmers, earlier this year.

Now, the Foreign Agricultural
Service in USDA said the Australian
Wheat Growers Federation has
decided to recommend a wheat
"delivery quota" for 1973 of 513
million bushels, up about one-fourth
from this year.

Kansas Built Silo Equipment Sold To Soviet Union

MOUNDRIDGE—A Moundridge manufacturing company is included in a sale of nearly 25 million worth of farm equipment to the Soviet Union.

Keith Koller, sales engineer for the Bradbury Co., said the sale also involves equipment from a sister plant in Canada and another company in Chicago.

Koller said the sale will include equipment used in the construction of silo domes and silo chutes. Five "cut-to-length-lines," used in making the dome tops, will be exported to Russia, and one "chute line," used for the silo chutes, will be sold.

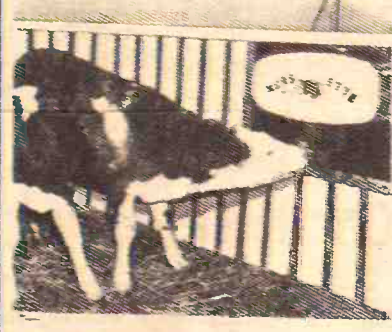
Koller said that the Moundridge plant's part of the sale will only involve the chute line. The sale from the Moundridge plant would involve about \$150,000, he said.

Koller said this is the first time the 12-year-old Moundridge plant has ever exported any of its products. It specializes in the manufacture of forming equipment for metal constructions.

Koller said the deal with the Russians was initiated last May. He said that it was negotiated via one of the officials of the Chicago firm.

Koller said the equipment is being bought by the Vo-Tec-Noprom-Import branch of the USSR. He said he doubts that the U.S. companies will enjoy any further such business dealings—at least in this particular line—since the USSR "probably will copy the design and do it on their own" from now on.

USDA Cranking Out Information On Grain Trade

The USDA is now cranking out a paper a minute, so to speak, on factors affecting the U. S. and world grain situations. One of the latest, a special supplement on the world situation, highlights the effect of the Soviet Union's short wheat crop, its massive grain purchases and the resulting sharp decline in world

wheat stocks, reports Jerry Rees, executive vice president, National Association of Wheat Growers.

Influential factors are an unusual concentration of wheat stocks in North America, unusually low rice supplies in Asia, and uncertainty about the adequacy of the grain crops in India and the People's Republic of China during the rest of the year.

The report summarizes the world grain situation for the 1972-73 crop year:

- A decline in 1972 grain production in both importing and ex-

porting countries by around 42 million tons, but at 1.06 billion tons the second largest on record.

- Relatively large total grain stocks of 132 million tons on July 1, 1972 in the four major exporting countries (U.S., Canada, Australia and Argentina).

- World trade for wheat and feedgrains to total 119 million metric tons, up 19 million from 1971-72.

- World exports of wheat likely to rise from 52 million tons in 1971-72 to 67 million. Feedgrains from 48 to 52 million.

- Wheat stocks in the U. S., Canada, Australia and Argentina to be reduced about 15 million tons during the market year.

- USSR world purchases estimated at 27 million tons so far, 19 million tons wheat and 8 million feedgrains. About 5 million tons of this probably destined to meet Soviet commitments to other countries.

- Delay in monsoons in India reduced fall grain crops. Supplies will be down as they are expected to depend on buffer stocks and careful management of supplies.

- Peoples Republic of China appears to be harvesting a crop as large as last year. Purchases so far which include the first U.S. sale in many years are about normal.

- Current stronger world prices are expected to induce higher production levels. Normal crop condition, larger plantings and a heavier application of fertilizers could result in a substantial rebuilding of stocks in 1973-74. If 1973 crop conditions are below normal, a relatively strong market could continue for another season.

Now Government Numbers Highways

Did you ever wonder why the interstate highway you're driving on numbered I-40 or I-85, instead of something like I-117K or I-7491? Or by there are three I-680's, but only one of them connect?

The government has a helpful system for determining route

numbers on the nationwide Interstate Highway System that can assist you in finding where a road is located and in which direction it runs, simply by its number.

Main Interstate routes are numbered with one of two digits, with the lowest numbers in the west and south. Odd-numbered routes run north and south; even-numbered routes run east and west.

For example, I-5 is the westernmost, main north-south Interstate

route in the contiguous United States, traversing California, Oregon and the state of Washington.

Garst & Thomas Sells Feed Grain Seed To Russia

Roswell Garst, the Iowa farmer who took Nikita S. Khrushchev on a tour of his Coon Rapids spread in 1959 persuaded the Russians to try out his hybrid feed grains.

Garst, whose Garst and Thomas Co., develops high-yielding hybrids, proposed the project to the Soviet minister of agriculture, Vladimir V. Matskevich, who "approved the American's proposal," the official news agency Tass said.

A Western specialist described Garst's proposal as a "hell of a big operation," involving the planting of several hundred tons of sorghum hybrid seed in Russia around May.

The specialist noted that sorghum hybrid, a feed grain for livestock comparable to corn, is "drought resistant," requiring much less rainfall than corn to grow and ripen. He said the sorghum hybrid should be particularly advantageous to the Soviet Union, plagued by uncertain weather and periodic droughts.

A bad harvest this year forced the Soviets to buy a billion dollars worth of wheat and feed grains from the West, the bulk of it from the United States.

Garst, in his 70s, has been involved in hybrid development since the 1930s, and his work is admired by Soviet agriculturists.

Khrushchev, often troubled by bad crops, paid a visit to Garst's farm during a state visit to the United States in September 1959.

On the other side of the continent, I-95 — from Maine to Florida — is the eastern-most route, and has the highest number.

Cross-country routes running east and west start with I-10 in the south and continue to I-90 in the north.

In a few cases, an Interstate route splits into parallel or diverging branches. I-35 in Texas is a good example, dividing into two main highways, I-35E in Dallas and I-35W in nearby Fort Worth. Outside the metropolitan region, the separate routes join again as I-35.

Partial or full circumferential or "belt" roads that connect with main Interstates at the edge of metropolitan areas have three digits, using the main number with an EVEN number prefix. In

Washington, D. C., the "Beltway" circling the metropolitan area, connecting with main north-south route I-95, is numbered I-495.

Supplementary radial or "spur" highways leaving a main Interstate and dead-ending in an urban area also have a three digit number, using the same number as the main road with an ODD prefix. Thus, I-195 leaves I-95 in Providence, Rhode Island, and ends in New Bedford, Massachusetts.

In order to avoid duplication — and complete motorist confusion — different prefix numbers are used within a state when necessary. Three "belt-ways" within one state connecting with main route I-40, then, would probably be numbered I-240, I-440 and I-640.

U.S. Cattle Herd Reaches New Peak Inventory Shows

The nation's cattle herd, including all types, is expected to total a record of nearly 122 million head by Jan. 1 when a new inventory is taken, says the Agriculture Department.

The cattle expansion, prompted by growing consumer demand for more beef and record high market prices in 1972, would be the sharpest one-year advance in a decade, according to USDA records.

Officials said in a preliminary report on the livestock and meat situation that total red meat output is expected to be larger in 1973, including more beef and pork.

"The nation's cattle herd is expanding more in 1972 than in recent years," the report said. "Next year's Jan. 1 cattle inventory may be up four million head or more. Beef animals will account for all of the grain, providing the potential for larger marketings in the years ahead."

The U.S. cattle inventory on Jan. 1, 1972 was put at a new high then of 117.9 million head, a 3 percent gain in one year. If the 1973 figure holds, the increase would approach 3.5 percent in one year.

According to department records, the last time for such a large increase in the cattle population—which includes dairy animals and all age groups—was in 1963 when it totaled 104.4 million, up from 100.3 million on Jan. 1, 1962.

Average prices of all beef cattle were at a record \$34.60 per hundredweight last July. They since have eased but are still running above year-earlier marks.

"Fed cattle prices will be strong late this fall and winter, reflecting seasonal decline in fed beef supplies and strong consumer demand for beef," the report said.

"Choice steers at Omaha in early November were \$34 per 100 pounds, 75 cents above a year ago," the report said.

"Fed cattle marketings in the first

half of 1973 will run a little above January-June this year, with gains widening toward mid-year. Prices are expected to run above 1972's first half when choice steers at Omaha

averaged \$36."

The report noted earlier indications that hog producers plan to expand baby pig farrowings in December through February by 7 percent from last winter. Hog prices, too, reached record highs by late summer this year.

"Sizable gains in pig output seems likely during the late spring farrowing season and in the second half of 1973," the report said.

Looking ahead to prices, the report said:

"Price advances into summer will be much less than this year's \$6 per hundredweight April-July rise. The 1973 summer average likely will run below this year's July-September average of \$28.75, and prices late next year will be under considerable

pressure from expanding slaughter supplies."

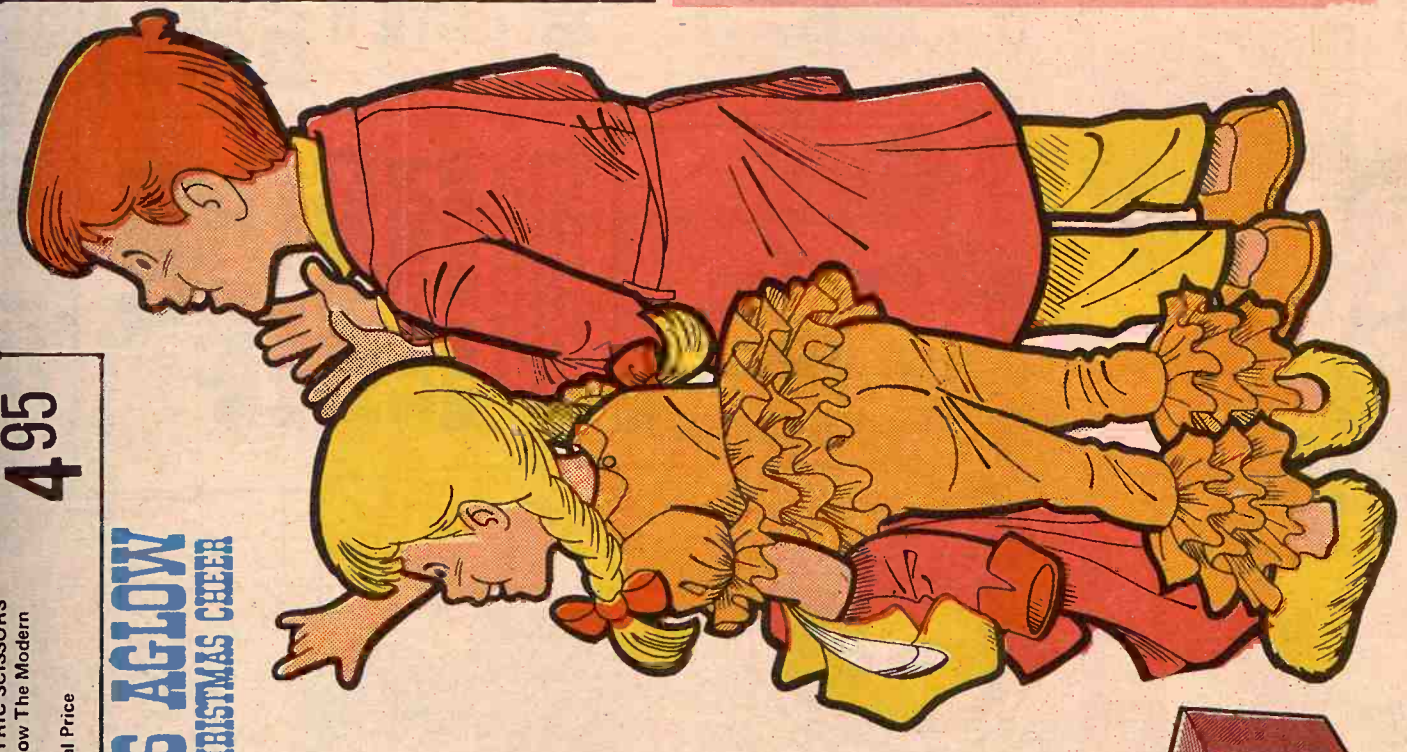
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Grain Aeration Important For Long Term Storage

Grain that's in storage for a considerable length of time should be aerated, says an Extension cultural engineer at Kansas State University.

This means moving one-tenth of a foot of air per minute per bushel through the grain when necessary during storage, explains S. Holmes.

While aeration is a different process than drying, it can take out two percent moisture under normal conditions.

Holmes feels all grain already in storage needs aeration. Milo that has been cut will possibly need to

be dried and aerated.

The engineer points out that moisture accumulates in bin-stored grain that is not aerated during fall and early winter. The moisture gathers at top center of the bin as the walls cool and the center grain remains warm. Vapor moves up through the warm grain.

This moisture movement is reversed in the spring, but in the meantime grain quality has dropped and mold may have developed.

Grain aeration equipment for small circular bins usually consists of a vertical duct in the center of the bin, with a suction fan at the top and a perforated lower section to draw air through the grain.

For larger bins, a perforated floor with a suction fan beneath is common. Air is moved downward through the grain to reverse the natural moisture vapor movement.

Holmes says that during storage power costs for aeration should be 1/2 cent per bushel stored.

He recommends use of a temperature probe for determining grain condition. A humidistat can also be used as a management tool.

The first step to maintaining quality grain is to store clean grain. Watch grain with fines and other foreign materials for hot spots, which may develop because of poor air distribution.

Newly stored grain should be aerated until its temperature equalizes with the outside air. However, the aeration fan should be stopped during rain or periods of high humidity, unless heating.

Wet grain should not be aerated at air temperatures below 30 degrees to avoid freezing. Frozen pockets will mold when thawing begins and also cause trouble during unloading operations.

Turkey Day TV Special To Tell Farm Story

MANHATTAN—Viewing the farmer as a person instead of mere statistics on his crop output is the objective of a Thanksgiving special, produced by the department of Extension Radio-TV-Film at Kansas State University, Manhattan, ac-

cording to Jack Burke, department head.

"The Versatile American" will be aired at 6:30 p.m. (CST), Thursday, November 23, on ten Kansas television stations. The film is being shown in connection with Farm-City Week, November 17-23.

Milburn Stone, television star of "Gunsmoke" and a native Kansan, narrates the half hour segment that was filmed in Kansas—much of it during the summer of 1971.

This report differs from the usual

statistics-packed informational format often followed in ag films, Burke said.

"The film lets the farmer tell of his freedom—how he has a chance to make a living doing what he enjoys in a place where there is space and room to live," he added.

The farmers were interviewed at community meetings and with their families at the dinner table, as well as in the field.

"The viewer becomes aware of the contributions of agriculture, and how this basic industry touches lives—by creating jobs, providing quality foods, protecting wildlife, conserving land, controlling pollution, and involving the community," Burke said.

The film was produced through a grant provided by the Kansas Association of Soil Conservation Districts, Kansas Bankers Association, Kansas Electric Cooperatives Inc., and Kansas Farm Bureau. These business organizations will use the film for promotional purposes and will make the film available through the Kansas State University Extension Film Library to interested agencies and organizations.

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Consumer Demand Ahead Of U.S. Milk Production

Dairy farmers are producing the most milk since 1965, but consumer demand is more than taking up the slack, says the Agriculture Department.

Ironically, dairy-farm families are drinking less milk than ever.

This year's milk output will be about 120.5 billion pounds, the third consecutive annual gain. Production began sliding sharply in 1965, when the output was 124.1 billion.

Official reports in the November edition of "Dairy Situation" say per capita milk consumption this year will average 562 pounds of milk equivalent for all dairy products.

That compares with 558 pounds in 1971 and represents the first year-to-year increase since 1955, when it was 608 pounds, the report said.

The per capita use of milk and butter equivalent on farms which produce it is expected to drop to 10 pounds this year, down one pound from 1971, the report said.

In 1950, according to USDA records, dairy-farm families consumed 95 pounds of milk per person. By 1960, the rate had dropped to 37 pounds on a per capita basis and has declined each year since.

Donations of milk products by USDA are expected to average 19 pounds per capita this year, down from 22 in 1971. Other child-feeding programs will remain the same as in recent years at 17 pounds per capita.

Record Number Bulls Entered Kansas Test

record 300 bulls have been entered in the fall 1972 session now underway at the Kansas Central Test Station near Beloit.

Keith Zoellner, Extension stock specialist at Kansas State University, says the enrollment represents an increase of 127 over the spring test.

The current six-month test is the

fourth since the station opened in early 1971. As the enrollment of bulls increases, so does the number of breeders entering bulls. Consignors for this test totaled 90, compared to the previous high 53 from the last session.

"There are a number of reasons for the increasing enrollment," Zoellner explains. "First, more producers have realized the economic benefits of being able to identify their best bulls. In this program, the owner can find out just what each animal's genetic potential for sire production is."

Bulls entered in the current test came from six states, including

Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Oklahoma, Missouri, and Texas.

The station is co-sponsored by the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service and the Kansas Livestock Association. Zoellner and Herman Westmeyer, another KSU Extension livestock specialist, are the administrators of the testing program.

Bulls on the current test will receive final weighing April 10 and 11, with an auction for the top two-thirds of the high gainers scheduled for April 18.

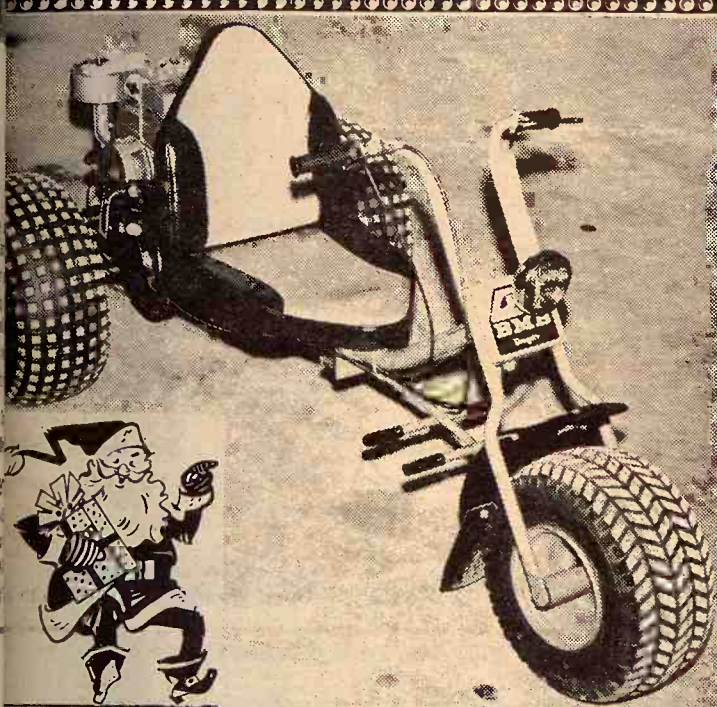

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Farmers need to be on the lookout for these tiny but powerful pests that can be found wherever grain or grain products are stored.

The principal offenders are weevils, beetles, borers, worms, and moths. Their size makes detection difficult. Fifty rice weevils, for example, can be placed on the surface of a penny.

Why is control necessary?

Simple. These insects contaminate wheat, a major source of human food. If wheat contains just one percent by weight of weevil damaged kernels, it must be utilized as livestock feed.

Insects can also cause a reduction in wheat grade because they decrease the weight of grain.

So anyway you look at it, farmers who don't try to prevent damage can be big losers.

To keep this from happening, an attractive, revised leaflet containing control recommendations and color photographs of the 11 most bothersome stored grain insects has been published by Kansas State University.

"Stored Grain Insects" was authored by Dell Gates, Extension entomologist, and Roy Frederick, Extension economist in grain marketing, with assistance from specialists in surrounding states.

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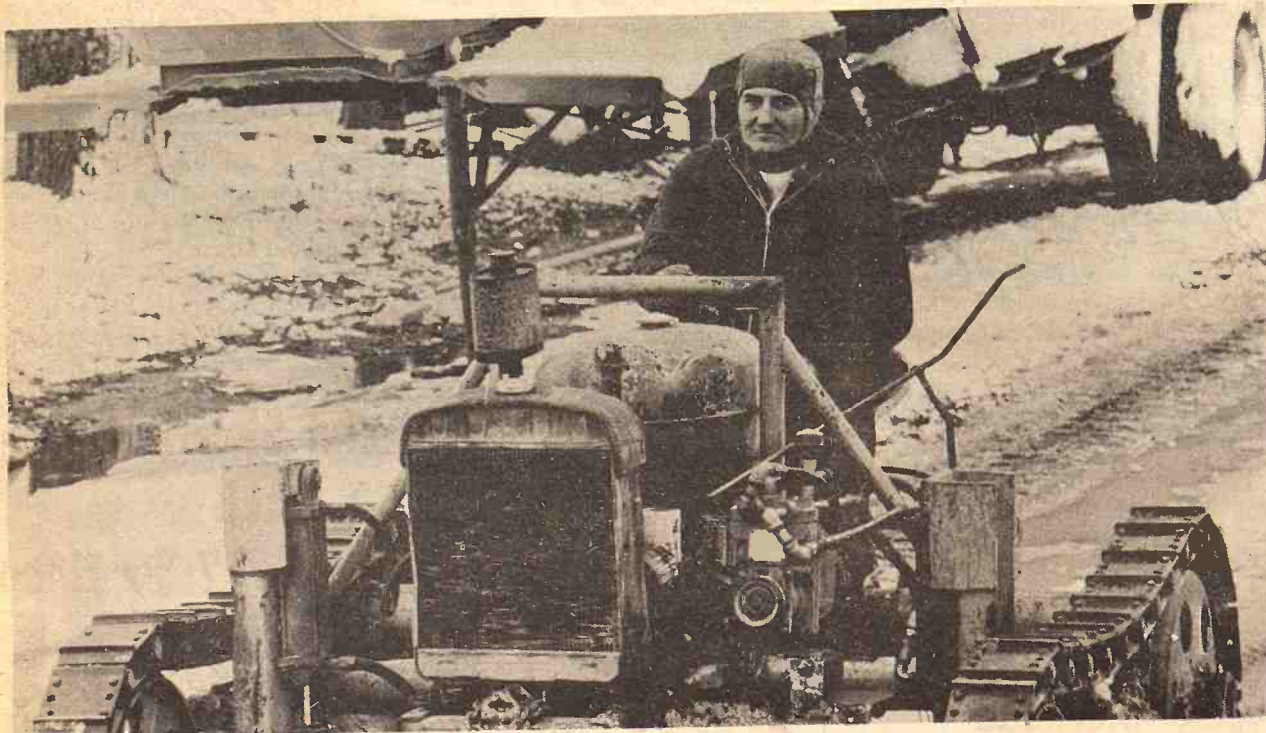

Condition Auto For Cold Months

Did the first cold snap this fall find you grinding away on your car's

starter button because the frigid weather lessened the power delivered by the battery?

Added to the weaker battery power is the stiffer oil viscosity which puts an additional strain on

the battery. Because of these and other reasons, the family auto and farm tractor should be conditioned to meet the harsh realities of cold weather.

"A fully charged battery will deliver all of its cranking power at 80 degrees Fahrenheit," says Elwyn S. Holmes, Extension agricultural engineer at Kansas State University.

"The battery's power delivery capacity decreases with a drop in temperature. When the temperature drops to freezing, this same fully-charged battery will deliver 65 percent of the power it had at 80 degrees. This power drops to 40 percent when the temperature falls to zero degrees."

This explains why battery sales rise the day of that first real cold snap. The freezing weather simply does in the weak and marginal batteries which are probably due for replacement anyway.

To winter condition the car and farm machine:

- Change the heavier summertime oil to a lighter oil.
- Check battery to determine if it will make it through the winter. Give it a full charge, if it will take it.

Fish & Game Department Working With Army Corps Of Engineers

PRATT—A brighter future for fish and wildlife resources in Kansas has been bolstered as a result of a cent high-level meeting here. Top officials of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission, Water Resources Board and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Kansas City District, participated. Development of fishing and hunting and around federal reservoirs of Kansas was their subject.

"The primary thrust was to explore ways and means to develop the fisheries potential held by existing and future reservoir projects," said Dick Wettersten, director of the Fish and Game Commission.

"As a result of the meeting fisheries biologists will begin immediately to work out detailed plans with the Corps and Water Resources Board on the Corps' newest project, Clinton Reservoir," said Wettersten. Land clearing and habitat improvement are cited as chief considerations. Clinton Reservoir, expected to be completed in 1977, will be located about four miles southwest of Lawrence. Within a 72-mile shoreline, Clinton will contain about 100 acres of water.

"This represents the first time in Kansas history that fisheries management plans will be completed and available prior to construction of a major reservoir," said Wettersten.

Col. W. R. Needham of the Corps

stated: "The Corps recognizes fish and wildlife are important benefits that can be derived from these lake projects. And the Corps is extremely pleased that the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission is anxious to help us develop these resources."

Col. Needham added Clinton Lake will be an outstanding example of what can be obtained when engineers and biologists put their heads together.

The Corps of Engineers Kansas City District has built and maintains seven of the 20 reservoirs in Kansas. The 13 other reservoirs come under the jurisdiction of the Corps' Tulsa District and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation.

Presently, the Fish and Game Commission holds license to more than 106,000 acres of federal land around these lakes of which some are intensively managed for wildlife and all are open to public hunting. The total 138,000 acres of reservoir waters also are open to the public.

The Kansas Water Resources Board coordinates all water interests in Kansas and serves as the state's voice to any agency concerned with any facet of all Kansas waters.

"The meeting between the Corps, Water Resources Board and the Commission fits well into Project SASNAK," said Commission Director Wettersten. SASNAK is a five-year plan of the Commission to vastly improve fishing, hunting and boating in Kansas.

"Because SASNAK will afford the Commission the personnel, time and money to work with these agencies on reservoir projects, and since the Corps and Water Resources Board now have indicated their wholehearted support, we have a chance to bring many more thousands of acres of fish and wildlife resources to Kansas sportsmen," Wettersten projected.

He cited 15 more federal reservoir projects have been approved by Congress for Kansas, but are still in the planning stage. Some may or may not eventually be built, but if they are, Wettersten said indications are that fish and wildlife will be high priorities in their planning.

Nation's Bakers Seek Increase In Bread Prices

The nation's bread bakers, citing a 43 percent rise in wheat prices because of huge sales to the Soviet Union, again have asked the Price Commission to allow an increase of at least one penny per loaf.

Joseph M. Creed, general counsel for the American Bakers Association, said that an industry wide price hike is necessary if small bakeries are to survive.

The commission, which earlier turned down a similar request, told bakers on Oct. 24 that relief must be sought by individual firms on a case-by-case basis.

Noting that the commission has approved some bread price increases for large firms, Creed said smaller bakers still are suffering financially and "are bearing the brunt of Nixon administration economic restraints."

Creed said in a letter to the Price Commission dated Nov. 9, two days after the election, that the massive wheat sales to the Soviets last summer—some 400 million bushels, or one fourth of the U.S. crop—were the root cause of spiraling flour costs.

was—and continues to be—necessary because most bakeries, particularly the smaller ones, were buying flour on a day-to-day basis and paying \$1 to \$1.25 per hundred-weight more than they had paid prior to the Russian purchases," Creed told the commission.

Figures provided by the bakers showed the amount of flour in a one-pound loaf of bread cost about four cents before the sale of wheat to Russia, but now costs bakers more than five cents.

Creed asked that the additional cost be "passed through" to consumers, meaning a bread price hike of at least one cent per loaf and perhaps more in retail stores.

The Agriculture Department, meanwhile, said that wheat prices, the highest in nearly a decade, are likely to remain up for the foreseeable future.

For the fiscal year ending next June 30, wheat exports are expected to total a record 1.15 billion bushels, compared with 632 million last year.

Cloud Seeding Set With Mixed Results In Kansas

Kansas' first organized state-sponsored attempt at cloud-seeding to produce more rainfall in western Kansas met with mixed results, S. Krause, executive director of the Kansas Water Resources Board, reported. It appears, upon preliminary examination, that some of the seeding events were successful and some were not," Krause said in a statement which accompanied

release of a 24-page publication summarizing objectives and preliminary results of the experiments carried out in August and September.

"The state of Kansas got its feet wet figuratively and, in some cases, literally, as the result of the weather modification," Krause said.

The state Water Resources Board set up the "Kansas Cumulus Project"—an experimental cloud-seeding program in western Kansas.

The state Finance Council designated the Water Resources Board to supervise the operation and allocated \$100,000 for the project.

Krause said the board "was able to utilize the many years of cloud-seeding experience of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation through a contract with the bureau."

The bureau secured for the state board the services of a professional weather modification company, Sierra Research Corp., which did the actual seeding.

Center of operations was at Colby

and during the two months of the project 104 seeding events took place on 16 separate days. The seedings were done by airplane, with ground monitoring to determine the results.

A detailed evaluation of the project is in preparation, Krause said.

In a summary of future cloud-seeding projects, the preliminary report said:

"The encouraging results from this cooperative effort must be kept in proper perspective to avoid any false hopes that existing cloud-seeding technology is the total answer for eliminating drought.

"In addition, not everyone benefits at the same time from seeding cumulus clouds. Natural rainfall from cumulus clouds is spotty and increased rains from seeding also affects only limited areas.

"Although the KANCUP activities in western Kansas should be regarded as only an experiment, they were that important first. A more sophisticated, long-range

experimental program is necessary to develop and apply cloud-seeding technology in this region on a socially-acceptable basis."

Tree Trapped Calf Released

CANTON— Cattle and hollow trees don't mix. That's the opinion of Dale Bair who recently had to free two bovines from an old cottonwood tree on his farm near here.

Several weeks ago, Bair and his wife discovered that a small charolais calf had imprisoned itself in the trunk of one of the large trees on his farm two miles north of the city.

Bair said the calf had poked its head into the trunk and apparently had been stuck at least two days before it was discovered. Removal was simple.

He lifted the calf up high enough so its head would slip out of the trunk. That was apparently just a practice round.

On another trip to the farm several days later, Bair discovered

that another charolais calf had its head pinned inside the tree but this time recovery didn't seem so simple.

This calf weighed about 400 pounds and was loaded with vitality. Bair had to use a steel rod to lift the calf up high enough so its head could slip out.

Mrs. Bair said she has no idea why the inside of the tree was so attractive. "There was no grass or feed inside the tree," she said.

According to Mrs. Bair, the tree trunk was apparently split open by a bolt of lightning.

Both calves and cows are now safe from the tree, according to Mrs. Bair. She said the hole in the tree had been blocked off.

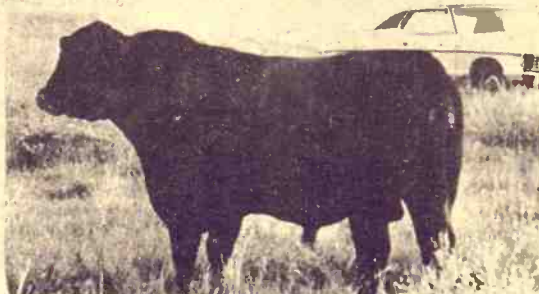

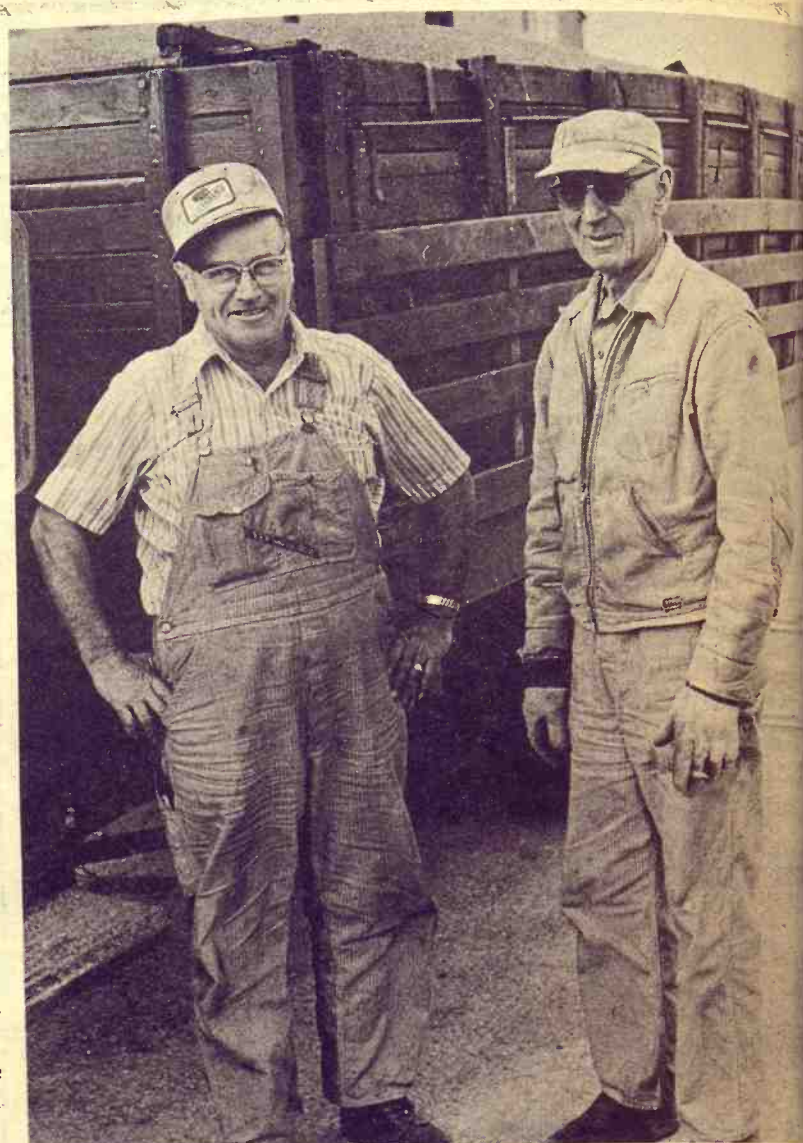

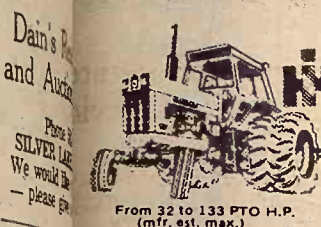

Winter Driving Test Shows Little Difference In Tires

Notwithstanding their many other benefits, radial tires offer no great advantage for driving on ice, according to Kansas Highway Safety Director, Claud R. McCommant. Citing a report by the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards, the safety official said that this group's tests indicated that there is little choice between conventional, bias-belted and radial tires as far as performance on ice is concerned, McCommant reported. "Insofar as cornering capacity or traction performance on ice is concerned, here again these tests

indicate no significant differences between the three types."

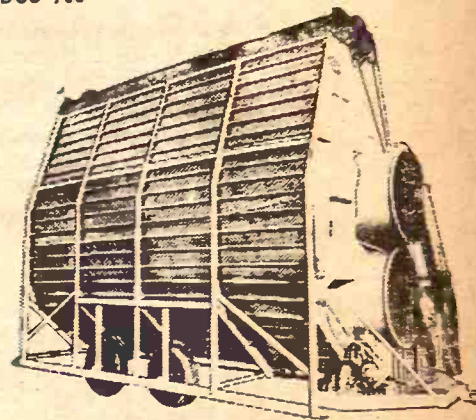
In other phases of the Council's annual winter driving test program, various types of snow tires, studded tires and tire chains have been compared for performance on both snow and ice. These findings show that conventional snow tires are of little or no help in stopping on glare ice, but they do offer a substantial improvement in pulling ability in loosely packed snow, and in driving on snow packed highways.

Studded snow tires, on the other hand, improve both stopping and pulling ability on glare ice. And when used on all four wheels they increase cornering speeds by about 25 percent.

For the ultimate in performance, reinforced tire chains perform other traction tests show that tire chains, from four to seven times the ability of regular tires on ice, and cut stopping distance in half," McCammett even though you use studs, take the chains off severe snow or ice conditions. 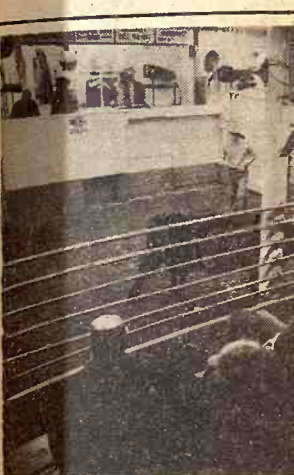

In other phases of the Council's annual winter driving test program, various types of snow tires, studded tires and tire chains have been compared for performance on both snow and ice. These findings show that conventional snow tires offer little or no help in stopping on glare ice, but they do offer a substantial improvement in pulling ability in loosely packed snow, and in driving on snow packed highways. Studded snow tires, on the other hand, improve both stopping and pulling ability on glare ice. And when used on all four wheels they increase cornering speeds by about 25 percent.

For the ultimate in performance other tests show that the ability of regular snow tires to grip ice, and not even through the severe snow and ice conditions, is far less than that of studded tires. The fact that these devices are dry pavement speeds is sharply reduced for the loss of the

Buyer's Protection From Door-To-Door Salesmen

For a growing number of buyers the low resistance to tenacious door-to-door salesmen, there's a new way out to be blunders. The escape hatch is a cooling-off period—usually from two to five days—during which buyers with second thoughts can cancel sales contracts or purchases made in haste or exasperation. It could have helped, for example,

the 17-year-old girl in New York State who signed an installment contract for a set of glasses. Total price: \$1,800.

Another who could have used a cooling-off period was the woman who signed a \$600 contract for a new roof. She checked with local contractors later and found they would have done the job for \$250.

Both instances turned up during Federal Trade Commission hearings.

Pennsylvania's Bureau of Consumer Protection discovered cases of illiterate persons who had been pressured into buying encyclopedias and others who bought carpet sweepers though they had no car-

pets.

Now millions of consumers may revoke contracts they've signed for no other reason than, "I've changed my mind."

Cooling-off periods for door-to-door sales were in effect at last count in 33 states, seven cities and the District of Columbia. By comparison, 14 states had such grace periods two years ago.

Now the FTC has offered a cooling-off period proposal as a model for state standards. The FTC

plans to invoke its proposal nationwide with the force of law if it can dispose of pending court challenges to its power to issue trade regulation rules.

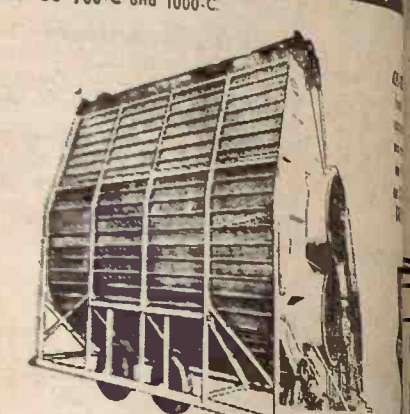
The FTC proposal gives buyers three business days to change their minds on purchases with a total price of \$25 or more.

Some door-to-door companies have voluntarily provided buyers with an escape clause. Encyclopedia Britannica, for example, says it uses a four-day cooling-off period.

Avon Products said it offers customers an unconditional moneyback guarantee.

Cooling-off laws vary from state to state, but the FTC model applies to every sale made outside the seller's place of business. The proposal excludes sales where the buyer has initiated a contact in order to get repairs on items such as television sets. But the exclusion cannot be used in some cases, such as repairs to a home or driveway.

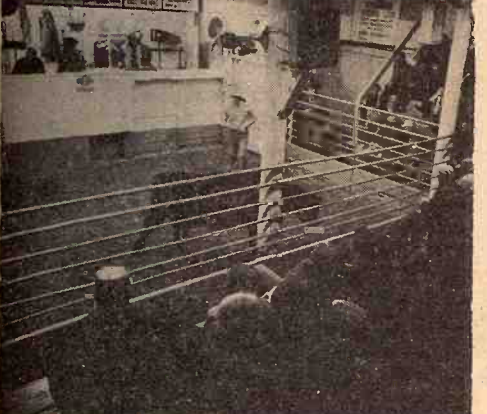

Farm Share Of Consumer Food Dollar Up

Farmers received a penny more of the consumers' food dollar during the third quarter of 1972 and three cents more than in July-September last year, according to the Agriculture Department.

That made the farmer's share of each dollar spent on food at retail stores 41 cents on the three-month period, USDA officials said Monday in a preliminary report on marketing and transportation costs.

The analysis was based on average prices paid for food, the middlemen's share and the "farm value" of items included in a market-basket list of supermarket food.

On an annual basis the entire market-basket theoretically enough to feed a typical family for one year—cost an average of \$1,321 during July, August and September, the report said.

That was up 2.4 percent from the preceding quarter and 4.9 percent more than in July-September last year. Compared with 1967, a year used as a base, the retail cost was 22 percent higher.

"Mainly responsible for the higher retail total were higher prices for beef and pork, although beef prices tended downward during the quarter," the report said. "Prices for frying chickens, eggs and fresh fruits and vegetables also increased."

The "farm value," or producers' equivalent of what consumers pay at stores, amounted to \$538 of the total market-basket price, up 4.8 percent from April-June and 11.7 percent more than a year earlier. It was 28 percent more than the third quarter of 1967.

Middlemen, including all who transport, process and sell food products, averaged \$783 during the

quarter, up 0.7 percent from April-June, the report said, and 0.6 percent more than a year earlier.

Compared with 1967, however, middleman spreads were more.
