Here's Annual Flint Hills Leasing Report

Lease prices for Bluestem pastures in the Flint Hills of Kansas were at a record high level and the bulk of the available grass had been leased by April 1 this year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The condition of pastures was at 90 percent of normal, up sharply from the 65 percent last April and up moderately from the 1962-66 average for the date of 84 percent. Native grass prospects were good over most of the 14-county Bluestem area. Moisture had been in short supply in some localized areas but with late March and early April rains generally was sufficient to start new growth. Most ranchers in the Bluestem area indicated that pond water supplies were sufficient for current needs.

Some 93 percent of available grassland was leased by April 1 compared with 92 percent for last April and an average of 92 percent. Bluestem pasture leasing prices for the 1968 grazing season were somewhat higher than a year ago. The lease price for steers and heifers under 700 pounds averaged \$24.70 in 1968 compared with \$23.10 for "young cattle"

last year. The bulk of these reports were in the \$20 to \$30 range. Lease prices for steers and heifers over 700 pounds averaged \$28.60 compared with \$28.30 for "aged steers" last year. The bulk of the reports ranged from \$25 to \$35. The lease price for cows averaged \$39.00 compared with \$37.00 a year ago. For cows with fall calves lease prices averaged \$41.80, while for cows with spring calves they averaged \$37.40. The variation in rates for cows was mostly between \$30 and \$45.

The guaranteed acreage available per head was closely in line with the past several years. The average number of acres of grass guaranteed per head was 4.0 acres for steers and heifers under 700 pounds and 5.0 acres for steers and heifers over 700 pounds compared with 4.0 and 5.2 acres, respectively, last April. The average acreage for cows was 6.6 acres, the same as last year. The leasing price for pasture by the acre for the season averaged \$5.90 compared with \$5.60 a year ago. The range in per-acre leasing rates was mostly between \$5 and \$7.

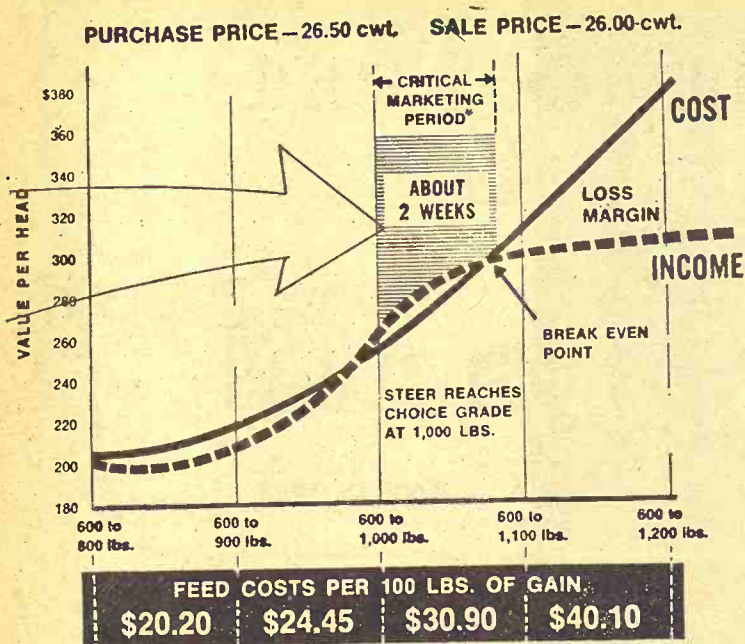

Profit Point

Every steer or heifer has a period of potential profit or minimum losses in the feedlot under normal conditions. Research by universities and feedlots across the nation, brought together in the above graph by the Market Development Committee of the American National Cattlemen's Association, points to it being quite brief (see arrow) but reasonably easy to spot. The figures, of course, vary with each input change. Feed costs in the graph are based on corn laid in at \$1.30 per bushel and variations in sales price. During only 15 days of the 80 days in the feeding period after the animal reaches Choice grade will it show a profit to the feeder.

Beef Output Up, But Prices Too

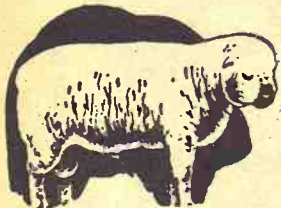
Prices of beef cattle have been trending upward during the past year. Prices of Choice slaughter cattle in February and March were \$2 to \$3 a hundred pounds higher than those of a year earlier.

The price improvement came from increased demand rather

than from a reduced supply. So far this year, beef output has been 2 or 3 percent greater than in 1967. It may run slightly above last year's level most of the time during the remainder of this year.

Prices of cattle during the first quarter (January-March)

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of this year could be described as "high and rising." In most such years, prices reach their peak in March or April. The second quarter (April-June) usually brings declining prices, especially after Choice cattle have been up around \$28. Considering price records and supply prospects, we expect prices of top cattle to decline moderately during this second quarter.

If prices follow precedent this year, they will be fairly good and steady during the late summer and early fall. In 14 of the past 16 years, prices of Choice steers were between \$24 and \$27.50 from late July through October, with little change from month to month.

We think that prices will be in the higher part of that range this year — say around \$26 or \$27. This optimism is based on prospects for the supply of beef and competitive products and on the outlook for consumer buying power.

Prospective market supplies of cattle are moderate. There seems to be some increase in the number of cattle on feed, but the increase this year is less than usual. The 39-state total of cattle in feedlots at the first of the year was estimated at 11,451,000 — only 2 percent more than a year before.

The six states reporting March 1 showed 6,000,000 cattle on feed — only 3 percent

more than in 1967. These states (Iowa, Nebraska, Texas, California, Colorado, and Arizona) provide about 53 percent of the nation's fed cattle.

Shipments of replacement cattle into eight North Central states during February-March were reported at 923,514 — 6 percent more than that reported a year earlier. The total number of cattle available for feeding, however, is not much larger than last year.

Prospective supplies of competitive meats are no longer than last year. Pork output could be up 1 percent or so. Broiler production is expected to be smaller than last year during the next few months. The output of veal and lamb will be less than in 1967. Imports of meats may be up slightly.

Consumer buying power is running about 7 percent more than a year ago. Many families have been cautious about getting too far into debt, so they do not have to skimp on the grocery bills.

In summary, the outlook for cattle prices shows no spectacular changes ahead. Consumers

will get a record or near-record supply of beef this year, and the prices received by cattlemen are expected to average higher than in 1967.

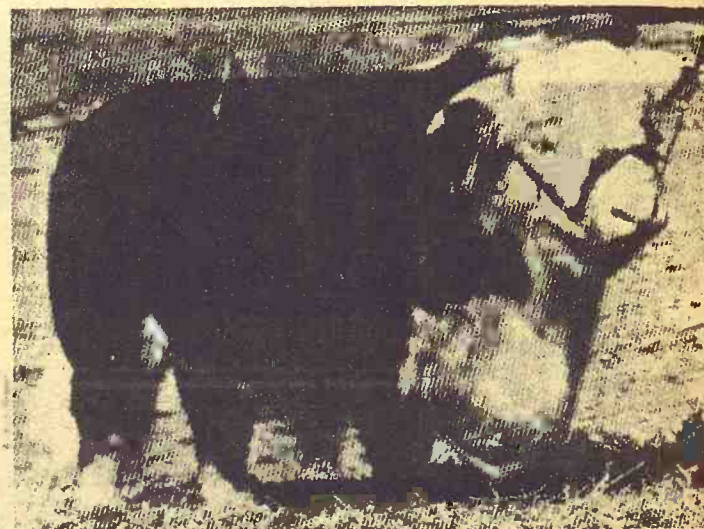

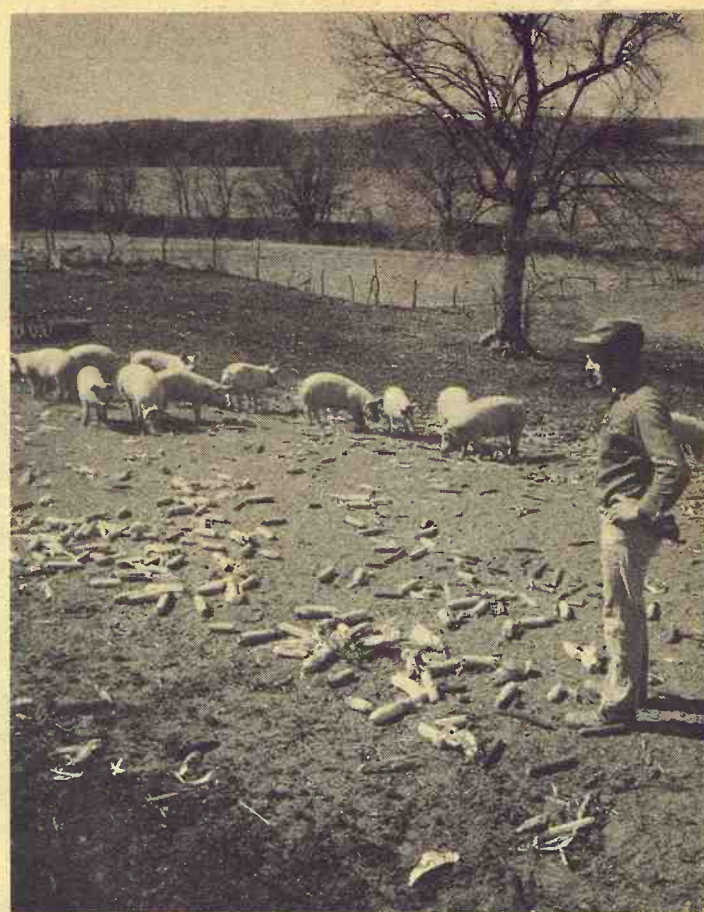

Cattle Count



Where The Cattle Are

All but five Kansas counties have at least 20,000 beef cattle, indicating the major beef status of the state. This map shows the general distribution of the inventory as of January 1. Black counties have 70,000 or more cattle and calves. Counties that have over 60,000 cattle are marked with horizontal rules. About average in cattle numbers are the shaded counties. The white counties have less than 40,000 cattle each.

On January 1, 1968, there were 5.324 million cattle in Kansas, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

The figure is exclusive of dairy cattle, and is down slightly less than one percent from the official figure of a year ago, which was reckoned at 5.37 mil.

The figures will provide some solace for cattlemen, who have hoped that numbers could be kept to no higher than a small gain over a year ago.

Cattlemen watch the cattle inventory carefully, using it as a gauge of future prices. Prices have fallen after too rapid buildups in both the 1950s and 1960s, and career stockmen fear that even modest price increases may attract buildups again.

The other figure that cattle-

men watch closely is the "adjusted" year ago figure. The current figure the Reporting Service gives is arrived at thru a mailbox survey. Later in the year, after abstracts of county assessors' reports are completed, the figures are changed to the "official" ones.

Over the years, the Reporting Service — a cooperative program of federal and state departments — has kept the error in its preliminary report to professional standards of sampling, especially within the limits of the survey method.

Several years in the past decade the discrepancy between the preliminary report and the final one was around one percent. In 1965 it was almost on the mark. But the 1966 pre-

liminary report was off by four percent. The original estimate was too low, and the four percent upward correction on top of an original nine percent increase on the preliminary report sent some cattlemen into near shock over the inaccuracies of livestock reporting.

The adjustment the Livestock Reporting Service made in the 1967 figure was about two percent, with the original 5.261 million estimate being revised to 5.37 million. Adjustments in county inventory figures were sizable, but pluses tended to balance out minuses.

For example, the Reporting Service added 19,000 — nearly a 30 percent error — to Gove county, but they subtracted the same number from Finney. There was a 15,000 deduction from Hodgeman but a 13,000 addition to Ford. There was a 12,000 deduction from Butler and a 12,000 addition to Dickinson. Estimates tended to be more accurate in the grasslands areas of the east than they were in the west.

The tide flows unevenly in western Kansas, always the first to react to drouth or to build up herds when grass and wheat pasture are available. The wheat pasture especially is important, for when fall moisture has started wheat off well and the winter is open, western Kansas may play host to tens of thousands of cattle from out-of-state.

Wheat pasture, of course, has not been plentiful this year, and was almost nonexistent a year ago, and the counts of cattle show it. About two-thirds of the counties in the far west showed declines this year, and over 80 percent of them dropped a year ago. Exceptions this year were in the northwest corner and in the Gyp Hills around Medicine Lodge.

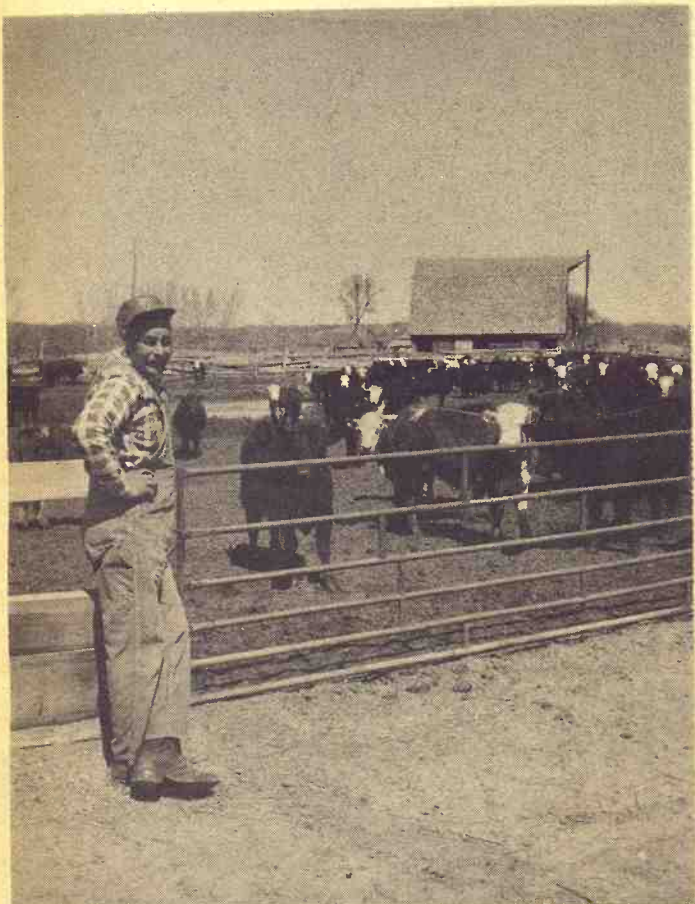
For the state as a whole, there were more counties up than down. Showing increases were 58 counties and 45 of them went down. Two held even.

Generally there was a decline in the Smoky Hills but most of the Flint Hills counties were up. Butler county (ElDorado) again led the state in cattle numbers, as it has done for the past four decades. Butler has nearly 600,000 acres of pasture, far more than any other county in the state.

Butler's total beef count was 146,600. Two other counties counted over 100,000 cattle — Lyon and Greenwood. Ford

While cattle numbers definitely move in cycles, records show that cattle are the most stable of livestock operations. A basic reason, of course, is the longer period from birth to market, making the cattle industry slower to respond to the market than, say, poultry or hog raisers.

Rattlesnakes His Kind Of Livestock

GREAT BEND — Rattlesnakes are terribly misunderstood, says Nelson Stone, a sportsman here whose hobbies include hunting rattlesnakes.

"Rattlesnakes have a bad reputation which is not at all correct. They mean no harm and people won't get bit unless they molest the snakes or step on them," said Stone.

Stone, the owner of a sand and gravel company here, became interested in the reptiles several years ago when he was working on a construction project in Oklahoma.

Now Stone is known locally as something of an expert on the fanged critters, and his interest is not just limited to hunting snakes in Oklahoma.

"Out here in Cheyenne Bottoms it used to be there just weren't many snakes, but in the past two or three years there have been a lot brought in with floodwaters after rains," he said. "There are places you can probably go and see 20 or 30 snakes in a half mile."

Nine-Footer?

"Then there was a fellow in here from North of Victoria who said they got a nine-foot rattler — a timber rattler — out of the hills up there and took it to the college at Hays," he said "I can't quite believe that, but sometime when I'm up at Hays I'm going to stop in and see if it's true."

Stone is planning to attend a rattlesnake hunt at Waynoka, Okla., April 21.

NCK Electric Co-op Meets This Friday

K-State Releases New Sorghum

A new hybrid sorghum that is short and lodges less than others like it is being released by Kansas State University to commercial seed companies, plant breeders, and other interested persons.

Called RS 628, it was originated by the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station at Manhattan in cooperation with the Agricultural Research Service of the USDA.

It was first tested at Manhattan five years ago, and has since been tested in several states through the Regional Uniform Sorghum Hybrid testing program.

Besides lodging less than RS-610 or RS626, the new hybrid resists milo disease and head smut and has cinch bug tolerance. It blooms two or three days later than RS610 or RS626 and yields about the same.

The Colby Branch of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station also is releasing germ plasm of five inbred lines of sorghum developed cooperatively by the Kansas Station and the Crops Research Division, ARS, USDA. Germ plasm is distributed to commercial companies and plant breeders in quantities of 200 or fewer seeds.

Cutback In Sheep On Feed

Sheep and lambs on feed for the slaughter in Kansas totaled 39,000 head on March 1, 1968, 15 per cent less than the number on feed a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Early "new crop" lambs destined for market by early summer are estimated at 272,000, 4 percent less than last year.

Kansas

There were an estimated 39,000 sheep and old crop lambs on feed for the slaughter market in Kansas March 1 this year compared with 46,000 head last year.

Most of the decrease occurred in the number on feed in large feedlots. On March 1, the number on feed was down 43 percent from the number on feed January 1, 1968.

A shortage of wheat pasture in western and southwestern

Kansas during the winter months caused a further cutback of sheep and lamb feeding operations in western areas.

The sheep and lambs on feed March 1 included 14,000 head under 80 pounds, 21,000 head 80-99 pounds and 4,000 head weighing 100 pounds or more.

Major Feeding States

Sheep and lambs on feed March 1, 1968 in the 7 major feeding states were estimated at 1,003,000 head. This was 3 percent less than the number in these states a year earlier.

The March 1 number shows a 40 percent seasonal decline from the 1,680,000 head on feed January 1, 1968. Small grain fields in Texas are providing an abundance of succulent grazing for sheep and lambs.

The number of sheep and lambs placed on feed during January and February in the 7 States was 402,000 head, an increase of 6 percent from the corresponding period a year earlier.

Marketings of fed sheep and lambs in these States during January and February totaled 1,079,000 head, 5 percent less than during this time in 1967.

Weight group classification of sheep and lambs on feed in

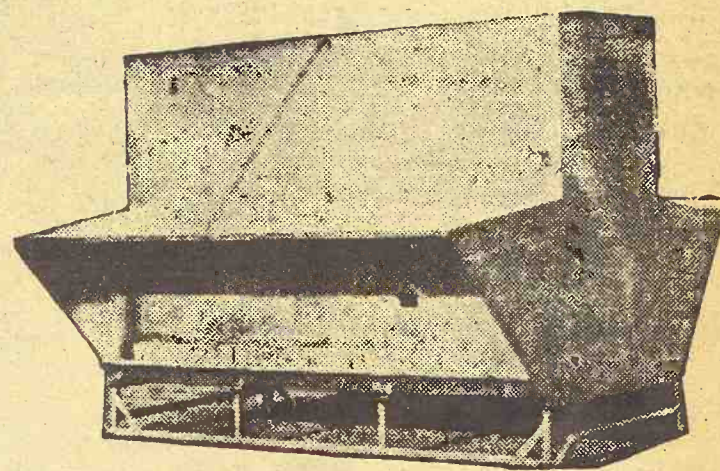
the 7 major feeding States were as follows: under 60 pounds, 18,000 head compared with 24,000 head a year earlier; 60-79 pounds, 125,000 head compared with 157,000 head last year; 80-99 pounds, 669,000 head compared with 632,000 a year earlier;

Spongy Fertilizer Market

Wet spring weather and heavy inventories left over from last fall's poor planting season are depressing midcontinent demand for fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides, a survey indicates.

As a result, prices for these key farm chemicals are dropping below year-ago levels. In some cases the declines are sharp.

In fertilizer markets, a chronic oversupply condition stemming in part from ample quantities of certain raw materials is severely depressing prices.

One Midwestern source says prices of anhydrous ammonia fertilizers are down as much as 15% to 18% from a year ago, with farmers paying about \$80 a ton instead of \$110.

In northwestern Iowa, fertilizer dealers are waging a price war to unload their supplies. The distributors are quoting the old-list prices but dicker with individual farmers on sizable cash discounts.

Herbicide, weed killer and pesticide prices also are sagging. "Prices of some chemicals are down a lot more than 10%, though others are doing well," says a Monsanto Co. spokesman

Farm experts in central Illinois say one Monsanto herbicide is selling for 30% less than a year ago and a Shell Chemical Co. herbicide is down 10% in some areas, wiping out price increases of the past two years.

At least one chemical maker is feeling the sting. Monsanto President Charles H. Sommer noted at the recent annual meeting that falling farm chemical demand, especially for herbicides, cut sharply into the company's first quarter profit. Other chemical makers are keeping prices steady, at least officially.

Falling prices and lagging demand follow predictions that the rate of sales increases this year will be less than in previous years because the government reduced feed grain acreage eligible for federal subsidies. Most suppliers say they are optimistic that farm chemical demand will rise in coming weeks, however.

Joseph P. Sullivan, general manager of Swift & Co's agricultural chemical division says the unit's sales are ahead of a year earlier in the East but are "lagging in the Midwest."

He says Swift expects to boost sales to farmers by 4% to 6% this year, below the 8%

9% increases posted in recent years.

Fertilizer demand has been held back partly by large farm inventories left over from last fall when crop harvests came too late to allow fertilization before winter.

Also, says Wayne Ritchie, an official of Doane's Agricultural Service in St. Louis, the cutback in feed grain acreage, notably corn, plus wet weather and tight farm credit, have caused farmers to delay their planting

decisions — and therefore chemical purchase decisions — until this month.

If wet weather continues late into the spring, warns the executive of one chemical manufacturer, "it will affect demand for later in the year."

Ritchie thinks that demand for herbicides and pesticides should fare better than fertilizer de-

mand this year. He says that corn farmers, though planting less acreage than last year, probably will use more herbicides on each acre because they found it worked well last year.

Soybeans, which need little fertilizer, are a big user of herbicides, he added. In addition, cotton acreage is predicted to rise, increasing that market.

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Pollution Hazard May Curb Fertilizer Use

ST. LOUIS, MO. — The soaring use of artificial fertilizers could lead to a "biological cataclysm," an American professor believes.

Prof. Barry Commoner of Washington University in St. Louis has issued a warning of complex and threatening disturbances in the nitrogen economy of the soil, the air and water.

These could lead to sudden cross pollution of lakes and reservoirs, to dangerous levels of nitrogen compounds in food, and to a need for limitations on the use of nitrogen fertilizers which would lead to a "massive dislocation" of farming.

Commoner is a member of a new high-level committee set up by the American Association for the Advancement of Science to keep a close and continuing watch on man's impact on the environment.

Excess nitrates in food could be a special hazard for babies, Commoner says. Nitrate itself is relatively harmless, but can be changed within the intestines to nitrite, which is poisonous.

A recent study at the Missouri Agricultural Experiment Station found that a 2-ounce jar of spinach baby food contained 40 milligrams of nitrate — almost four times the recommended maximum daily intake for infants.

Before modern farming got

under way, and big cities began to pour out huge quantities of effluent, most of the Earth's nitrogen was either bound into minerals, held in living organisms (where it is an essential constituent of all protein) or free as an inert gas in the atmosphere.

But today, Commoner says, growing quantities of nitrates are around (nitrogen compounds with oxygen). In 1942, the U.S. consumed under 500,000 tons of nitrate fertilizer; last year it was six million tons — a 10-fold increase in 25 years.

This has given vast increases in yields — especially of corn. But at the same time, the soil structure has deteriorated, nitrate is less efficiently absorbed, and increasing quantities are washed into rivers and lakes.

Another source of nitrate is the sewage effluent of big cities, produced after bacteria have broken down the wastes in treatment plants. This nitrate can fertilize huge and sudden growths of algae in lakes, which then rot and pollute the water.

The first large-scale warning, Commoner says, has come from Lake Erie, 9,930 square miles in size, which may be on the brink of a biological catastrophe.

The bottom of the lake, he says, is becoming "a huge underwater cesspool," with an accumulating layer of plant debris and other organic waste. This is sealed off from the lake waters by a skin of an iron compound.

But if the lake becomes too polluted, the oxygen supply will fall, and the protective iron oxide layer could dissolve, releasing the wastes. The effect could be to kill all living things in the lake, and create a stinking and dangerous mass of water.

This threat is not confined to Lake Erie. It looms over several Swiss lakes, and it is being taken increasingly seriously in Britain.

Water shortages are going to mean impounding increasing quantities of river water for purification and refuse. Such water will contain considerable quantities of nitrate — from effluents and washed out from farmers' fields — which could fertilize explosive "blooms" of algae and pollute the water.

This could be a particular threat to water control schemes, which create new reservoirs by damming river estuaries.

Such blooms may be dominated by poisonous blue green algae. A bloom of these algae at Storm Lake, Ia., killed off 8,000 wild birds and other animals.

A \$96-million scheme to treat effluents is under way at Lake Washington in Washington

state to mitigate the problem — but it will not prevent nitrates being washed off agricultural land.

Increasing quantities of nitrates are also getting into the air from car exhausts, chimneys, and from a relatively new fertilizer technique which injects liquid ammonia into the soil, a proportion of which evaporates into the air.

Something like 5 million tons of inorganic nitrogen is "intruded" into the air, water and soil of the U.S. each year, Commoner estimates, deriving from ag-

riculture, urban wastes and combustion of fuels.

Although car exhausts and sewage effluent may be controllable, the nitrogen washed from farms could be checked only by limiting fertilizer use.

Commoner believes this will eventually become necessary.

"I need hardly emphasize," he says, "the explosive consequences of imposing such a restriction on the current farm economy."

OHIO NFO SAYS IT HAS MAJOR CONTRACT

The Ohio NFO says it has signed a short-term supply agreement with a major packing company, but declined to name the company last week. Kirk Moreland, president of the Ohio NFO, said the company had agreed to an increased price demand by the organization. He said this was the first major company to reach agreement with NFO.

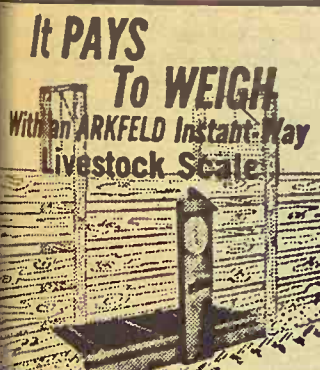

PEANUT BRITTLE PIE

2 egg yolks
3/4 cup brown sugar
1 cup scalded milk
2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1/2 egg teaspoon vanilla
2 egg whites
1 cup crushed peanut brittle
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped

Beat egg yolks with brown sugar. Slowly add hot milk. Add butter and cook in double boiler until thick. Add gelatin which has been softened in cold water. Cool until partially set. Add vanilla. Beat egg whites; gradually add sugar and beat until stiff. Fold in 1/4 cup crushed peanut brittle and the whipped cream. Pour into baked pie shell. Garnish with whipped cream or top with remaining 1/4 cup crushed peanut brittle.

Mrs. Joseph Wedel, Langdon, Mo., sent the following recipe:

BANANA DOUGHNUTS
5 cups sifted flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 cup oleo
1 cup sugar
3 eggs, beaten
3/4 cup mashed ripe bananas
1/2 cup buttermilk

1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Sift first five ingredients together, set aside. Cream oleo and sugar well. Add eggs, vanilla and bananas. Stir in buttermilk and dry ingredients alternately. Knead lightly, roll and cut for doughnuts. Cook in fat at 375 degrees. Coat with sugar while hot.

BAKED STEW
1 1/2 lbs. stew meat
6 carrots, cut round
1 1/2 cups celery, sliced
1 onion

3 teaspoons minute tapioca
1 teaspoon brown sugar
Place all ingredients in covered dish. Bake 5 1/2 hrs. at 300 degrees. Serves five or six.

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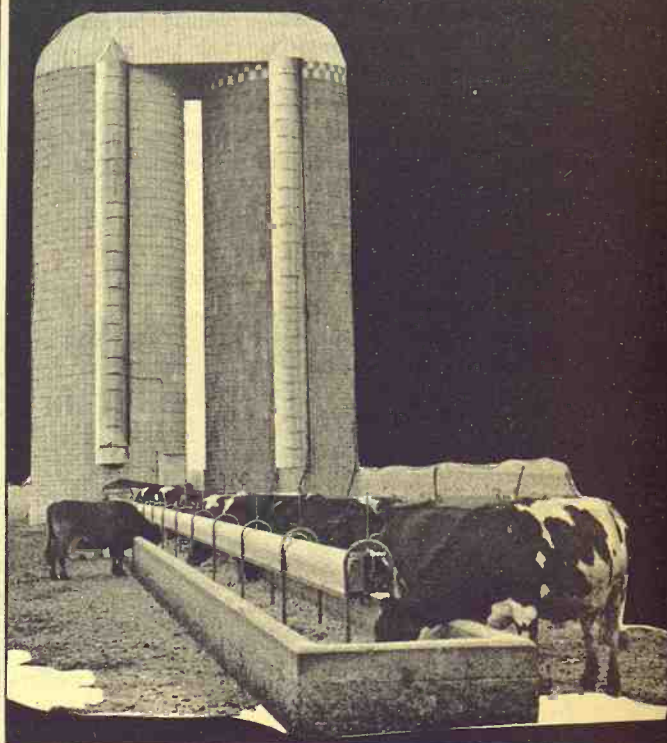
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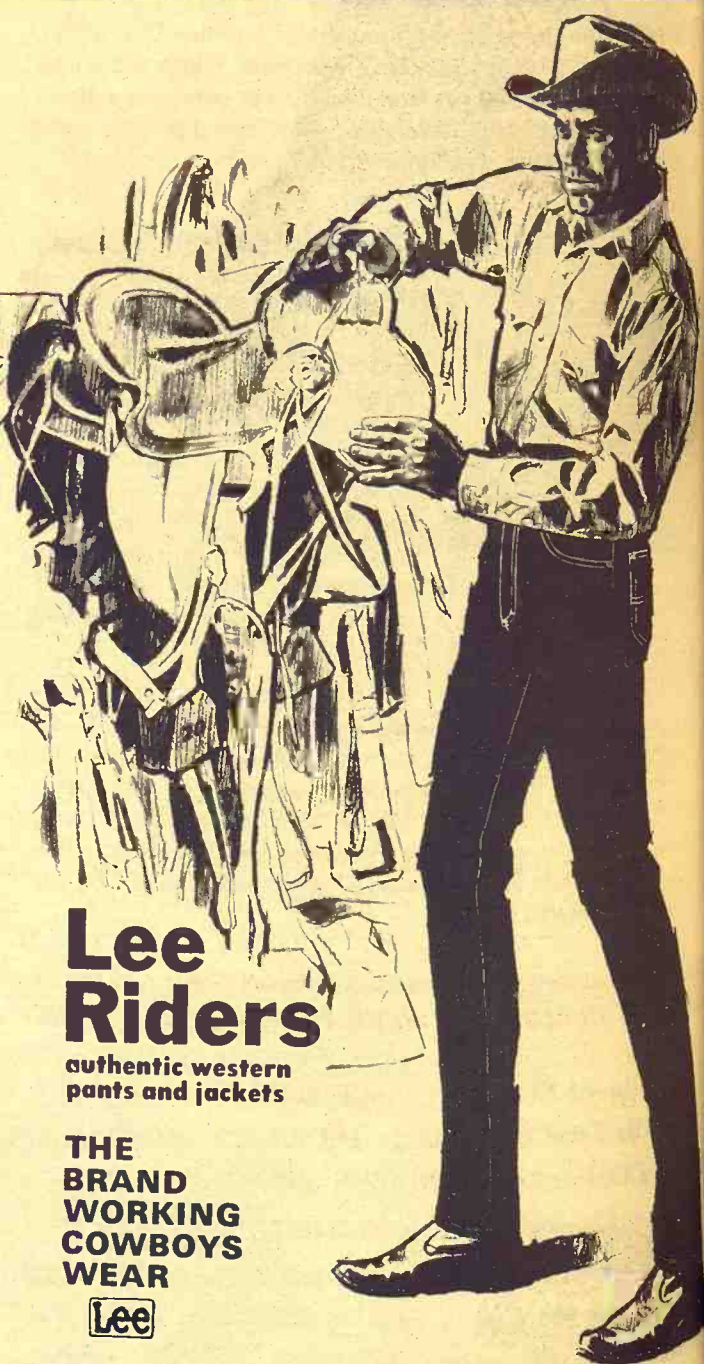


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Eleven Years To Cut Dairy Numbers In Half

It's taken 11 years for the dairy cattle count in Kansas to be cut in half. The Livestock Reporting Service estimates the number of milk cows and heifers two years

old or more on state farms on January 1 was 240,000. That's exactly half the total counted in 1957.

That statistic documents the relentless decline of the dairy cow in importance to Kansas farming.

The current figure is four percent less than a year ago and is the smallest decline in several years.

For a number of years the decline in the number of dairy cows on Kansas farms was primarily attributed to the small family milking operation. Old Bossy was losing her place in the barnyard. As a symbol of the family farm, the milk cow became less representative, but it was felt that large dairy operations were efficiently holding up total milk production.

The decline in the past few years, however, indicates that larger milking operations have succumbed also.

In the past year, however, there was some reason in the statistics to believe that some of the major producing areas had either stemmed losses or actually shown small gains.

The milk cow count, which includes heifers two years old or

more, has declined at the rate of nearly five percent a year for three decades, except for a moderate increase during World War II.

The wartime peak was 841,000 dairy cows. All-time high was the 967,000 enumerated in 1934. The current figure is less than one-fourth that peak.

When livestock inventories were first taken in Kansas in 1890, there were 648,000 milk cows.

While the number of milk cows drops, the production per cow goes up each year so that the decline in milk produced

goes down only slightly and in some years the productivity gain exceeds the loss in cows producing.

One small encouraging sign: while 57 counties showed a reduction in numbers of milk cows in the past year, 27 counties held even, and 21 went up. Last year only 15 counties had increases, and the year before that there were only four counties that gained in milk cows.

Twelve of the counties with increases were major dairy counties, those with 3000 or more cows.

None of the increases were

exceptionally large, but the state's leader, Nemaha, had a gain of 100, as did the number two dairy county, Marion. Bourbon, Franklin, Leavenworth, Allen, Miami and Labette also had gains.

Only Sedgwick and McPherson had reductions among the top 10 counties. The state's largest cutback was in Reno County, which reduced herds by 850 cows.

The gain in Nemaha County followed a major retrenchment the year before, which dropped the county out of first place for only the fourth time in 20 years.

Swift, Wilson Shy From NFO

Representatives of Wilson and company and Swift and company and the National Farmers organization failed to reach agreement last week on the NFO's demands for higher prices for livestock.

Spokesmen for Wilson and Swift, two of the nation's major meat packers, said they rejected the NFO's demands that packers increase prices to a minimum of 23 cents a pound for hogs, 32 cents a pound for steers and 29 cents a pound for lambs.

The prices sought by the NFO are 3 to 4 cents a pound above the current market prices for hogs and lambs and 5 cents a pound for cattle.

Wilson said in a statement that it had advised the NFO representatives that the industry-wide minimum price contracting program proposed by the farmers organization would very probably be held to be a price-fixing agreement in violation of the anti-trust laws.

A spokesman for Swift said NFO officials were told the company would have to consider what the implications of such a contract would be. He said no conclusions were reached.

Earlier, the NFO announced that more than 1,000 head of hogs, calves and sheep would be shot and buried on a farm near Geneva, Ill., unless the packers agreed to higher prices.

The killing of meat animals is part of the NFO campaign in 35 states to raise livestock and grain prices through collective bargaining between farmers and processors.



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'Adults Aren't Supposed To Drink Milk'

The bulk of the world's non-white adult population is probably intolerant to milk, studies by United States and Australian scientists indicate.

The scientists said that their findings raised serious questions about the advisability of shipping powdered milk to nutritionally deprived persons in

Africa and Asia.

They said that although non-white children seemed to be able to digest milk, intolerance often started to develop during adolescence and became well-established by adulthood.

In a report published in the current issue of the Journal Science, Drs. Shi-Shung Huang and Theodore M. Bayless of John Hopkins University Medical School said that milk intolerance was apparently due to the lack of an enzyme, lactase.

The enzyme is needed to digest the milk sugar, lactose.

Lactase is produced by the lining of the small intestine.

The consequences of milk intolerance vary somewhat from person to person, but they usually include abdominal bloating, cramps and diarrhea after drinking more than a glass of milk, the doctors reported.

According to the Australian scientists, Drs. A. E. Davis and T. Bolin of the University of New South Wales, "it could be" that sending milk and milk products to underdeveloped Asian countries "with the subsequent induction of diarrhea is not the

most efficient method of helping a malnourished community."

The Australian reported in a recent issue of the British Journal Nature that in their studies all of 20 students from Hong Kong, Singapore and Malaysia, and four of five from India were found to be intolerant to milk. None of 12 white Australian students showed this intolerance.

Adults Tested

In the studies at the Baltimore University, 19 of 20 healthy Oriental adults living in the United States were unable to digest sizable quantities of lactose. But only two of 20 white persons tested were intolerant to milk and lactose.

An earlier study by Johns Hopkins scientists indicated that about 70 percent of adult

American Negroes were unable to digest milk. A similar percentage of milk-intolerant persons was found among African Negroes in Uganda.

Bayless said that an adult deficiency of lactase resulting in milk intolerance was most likely a genetic phenomenon that evolved among peoples who never drank milk as adults.

He related a comment from one Nigerian health official:

"It's not we who have a deficiency of lactase, it's you who have an excess. Adults are not supposed to drink milk."

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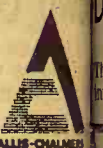
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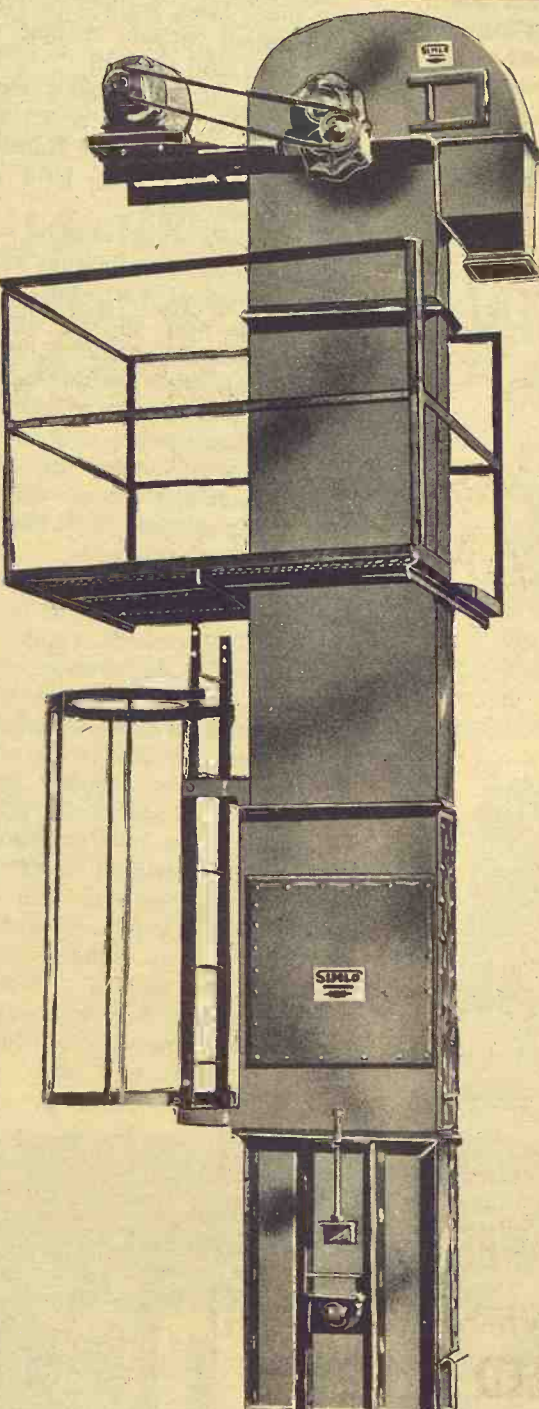

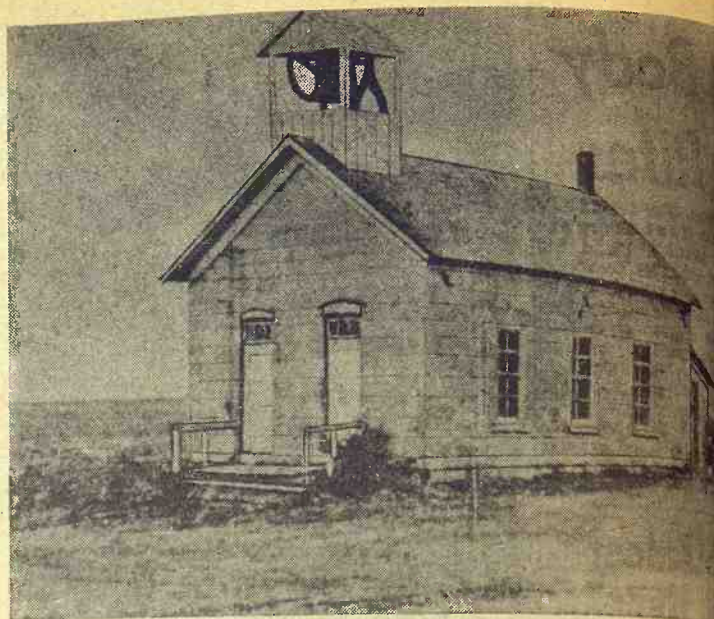
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One-Room School Not Forgotten

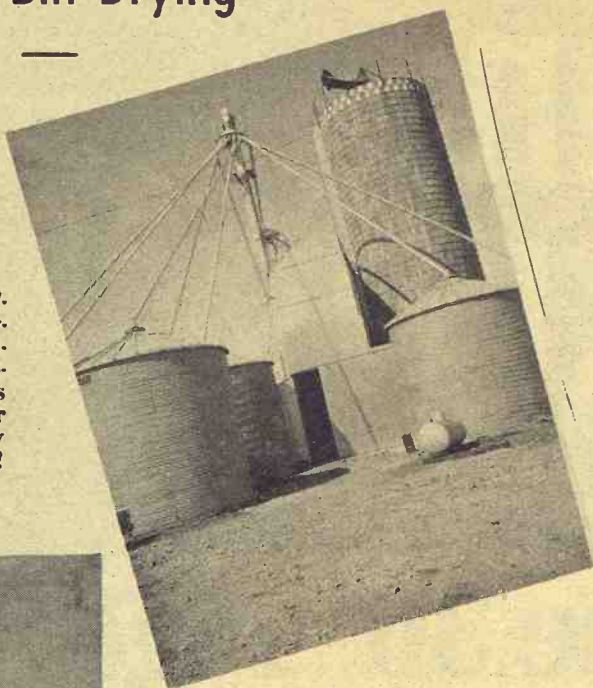

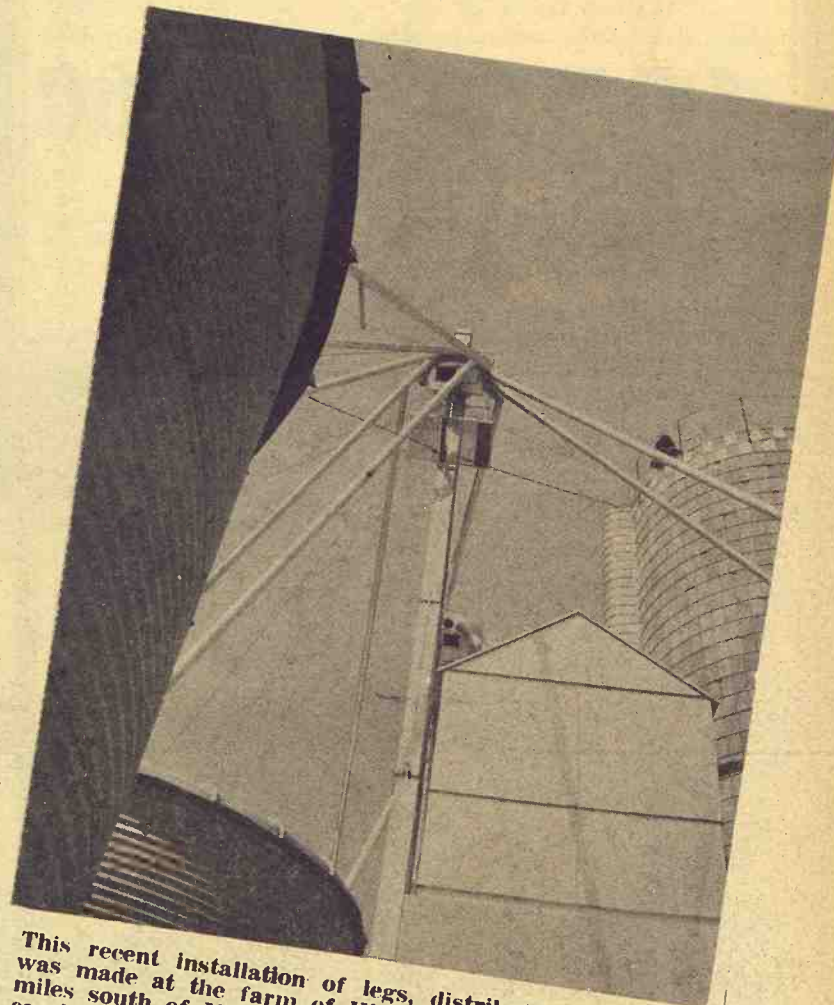

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Sheep Numbers Hold Steady—And Low

The thing about the sheep business in Kansas is that it can't get any lower. So sheepmen must have concluded after last year's record low census of sheep and lambs and the current figure from the Livestock Reporting Service is exactly the same as the revised figure of a year ago: 468,000. Actually there is some indication of another upward cycle in sheep numbers for the final 1967 figure was revised upward from the preliminary figure of 452,000.

The identical census figures from 1967 to 1968 is a rarity in the sheep census, which normally has extreme year-to-year variations. A year ago the preliminary figure showed a 22% decline in one year, altho the official revision later in the year took some of the sting off that report. But in 1966 there was reported a 19% gain, and the year before that a 19% loss. As always there were some good sized variations from county to county. Sheep numbers do jump about considerably from county to county, reflecting the vagaries of the market, the quickness of the breeding season, and the ease of

about 26,300 and McPherson's 21,000. Finney, Edwards, and Sumner followed, with Marion, Dickinson and Mitchell counties completing the top 10. For the third straight year, sheep numbers were low in western Kansas. In some years when winter wheat pasture is available, sheep numbers in the west climb rapidly. Across the state 38 counties had increases, 7 held about even, and 60 were down. While the total number of sheep is near the record low, that doesn't mean the count won't climb again. The total

But the state's sheep census totals are still a long way from the state's peak. Back in the

1880s Kansas had over a million and a half sheep for six years running.

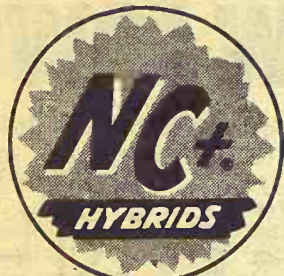
great movements of sheep from one area to another. The latter factor explains how one county may double or triple its sheep numbers from one year to another, and another county may see its sheep census slip to one-half in the same period. Big sheep owners move their flocks quickly from one grazing area to another. The middle plains continued to dominate the sheep field, with four contiguous counties — Reno, Sedgwick, Harvey and McPherson — ranking 1-2-3-4 in the state. Reno continued at the top with 50,000 sheep to Sedgwick's 39,700. Harvey's census figured

dropped below 600,000 in 1956 and was nearly 50% greater inside of three years.

The high count since World War II was the 883,000 counted in 1959 but the 1962 census showed 848,000.

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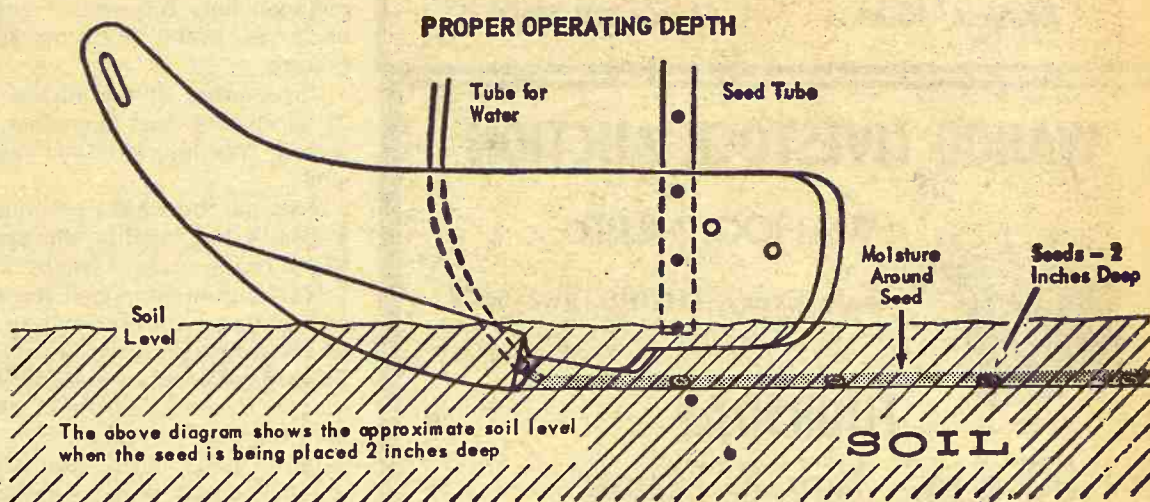
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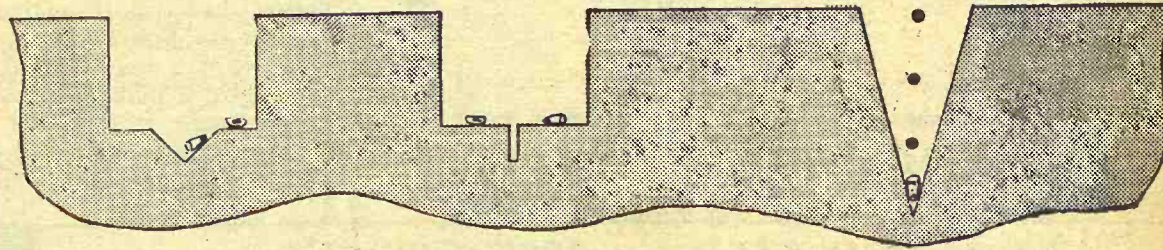
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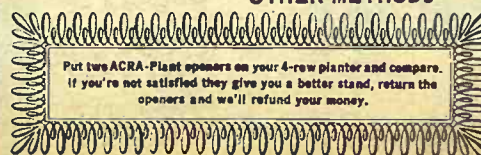

County-by-County Poultry Count

This map shows the number of chickens estimated in each county on January 1, 1968. The figures are in thousands. The second figure (+ or -) indicates the change from 1967. For example, the state's leading poultry county, Marion, had 257,000 chickens, an increase of 17,000 over 1967.

Why the comparatively steady census after the drastic pruning of the previous 20 years? The decline of the family-sized flock from the farm, lost first as a nuisance to the more prosperous post-war farmer and then as unprofitable as both chicken and egg prices got more and more marginal, made a steady cut in Kansas' chicken numbers after 1945.

The obvious thing that is happening in the poultry field now is the advent of major poultry operations, involving several thousand chickens each, at various parts of the state.

Perhaps even small flocks have been put back into operation more than has been suspected, for the current enumeration shows 50 of the state's 105 counties had more chickens this year than last. Thirteen of the counties were reckoned to be about the same in this count, while 42 showed decreases.

Marion's increase — one of the three largest in the state — shot it back into first place, a position it relinquished a year ago to Sedgwick for the first time in 10 years.

Sedgwick ranked second despite a substantial cutback of 85,000, and Washington, often a poultry leader, moved back into third on a 16,000 increase. Washington led the state in poultry count until 1956, challenged Marion for the leadership for a decade, but dropped back in the middle 1960's.

Adjoining McPherson and Reno Counties ranked 4-5, altho both showed losses. Republic was 6th on a substantial 113,000 increase, and Harvey and Dickinson counties followed.

Marshall and Wabaunsee rounded out the top 10.

The fact that some of the leading poultry counties are increasing their flocks indicates something about the change in the poultry business. Some of the big poultry farms are getting bigger. That apparently is the only possibility of a profit, and chicken farmers in some of the established poultry areas are building flocks in the tens of thousands.

While the Board of Agriculture does not list number of chickens in the state back to 1867 as it does for some farm animals, it does show egg production since 1930. The production for 1966 — latest year for which statistics are available — was 949 million eggs, up slightly from 1965.

This egg production never fell below one billion until 1963 and had been as high as 1½ billion as recently as 1959. In the middle 1940s Kansas egg production was over 2 billion eggs per year.

While some state poultrymen are in the broiler business rather than the egg business, the production does indicate the extent of the decline in recent years.

In numbers, state chickens

declined from 7 million in 1961 to 6.8 million, 5.9 million in 1963, 5.4 million in 1965 to 5.2 million in 1966.

The figure is higher than that now. The industry is uncertain if the change is only a temporary thing or indicative of an important change in Kansas livestock business.

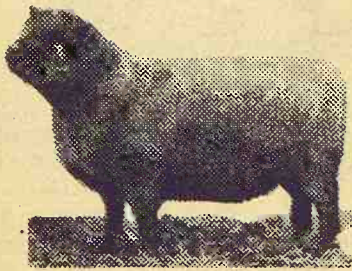

CATHOLICS CLOSE TWO AREA SCHOOLS

Catholics will close parochial schools at Valley Falls and Emmett next year, the Kansas City diocese has announced. The Valley Falls school in Shawnee County has operated for 62 years, and the Emmett school in eastern Pottawatomie County has operated since 1907. Both

are 2-room schools operated by the Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth. There is a parochial school 11 miles from Valley Falls at Nortonville and 8 miles from Emmett at St. Marys. Diocese spokesmen said there likely would be other consolidations or closings in the 1969-70 school year.

'Too Many Pounds For Choice Grade'

If cattle didn't have to weigh as much to qualify for the federal government's 'choice' grade of meat, the dilemma of low prices to producers would be eased, says Rep. Carl Albert,

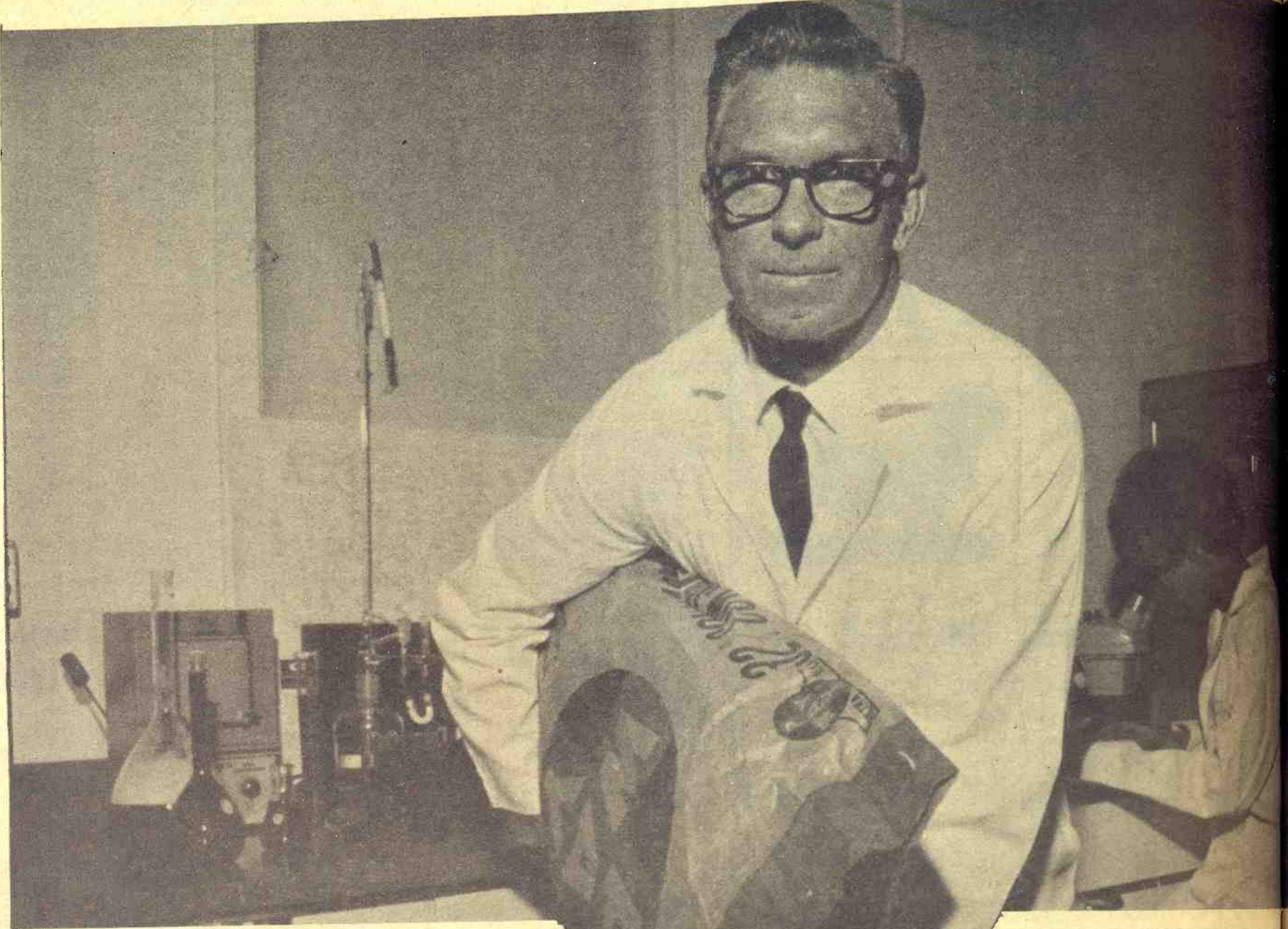

Oklahoma cattlemen endorse this approach, Albert said.

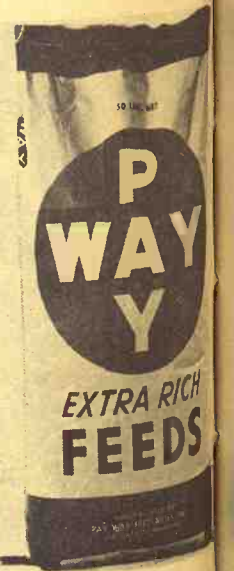

Spring Crop Report Predicts 215-Million Bushel Wheat Crop

The 1968 wheat crop in Kansas is expected to total 215,334,000 bushels on the basis of April

1 conditions, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

If this production is realized, the 1968 crop would be 3 percent below the 221,620,000 bushels produced in 1967 but 3 percent above the average for the 1962-66 period.

The condition of the wheat crop varied considerably over the state. Severe drouth in some western counties, together with insect damage, has caused considerable deterioration and some loss of acreage.

Moisture was short over most of the western half of the state and rain is urgently needed there. Early April rains in the eastern half of Kansas brightened wheat prospects in this portion of the state.

Planting of spring-sown small grains was considerably ahead of normal. By the end of March four-fifths of the state's oat acreage and three-fifths of the expected barley plantings were in the ground.

Pasture feed condition on April 1 was 71 percent of normal, 14 points above a year earlier but 10 points below the 1962-66 average. In western areas the severe shortage of moisture was delaying the start of new grass while pastures in the eastern portion of the state were starting well, with cool season grasses providing some green feed.

On April 1, farm-stored stocks of wheat were 6 percent smaller than a year earlier while combined stocks of major feed grains were 18 percent above a year earlier. Corn and sorghum grain stocks were above last year while soybeans, barley, oat and rye stocks were below a year ago.

Winter Wheat

The prospective wheat crop in Kansas, at 215 million bushels, represents an expected yield of 18 bushels per acre on the 11,963,000 acres seeded last fall.

The early season prospective yield is about 1 bushel above the seeded yield for last year but 1½ bushels below average. Dry weather since seeding time has held back growth of wheat in the western half of the state and damage from wind erosion, greenbugs, cutworms and brown mites has been serious in some areas.

Wheat in the eastern half of the state came through the winter in good shape and was responding to early April moisture. Precipitation in the western areas has been light and scattered and did not provide the wheat crop appreciable relief from the dry conditions.

Rye

The April 1 rye condition was 75 percent of normal, 13 points above a year ago but 10 points below average. Rye over most of the state was greening but moisture was needed in the western half of the state to insure proper development.

Farm Stocks Of Grain

Wheat stored on Kansas farms totaled 24,378,000 bushels on April 1, some 6 percent less than on hand on the same date a year earlier but 4 percent larger than the 5-year average.

Corn stocks of 20,903,000 bushels were stored in farm facilities on April 1, some 13 percent above a year ago but 5 percent below the average for the 1962-66 period.

Farm stored stocks of sorghum grain, at 29,882,000 bush-

els, were 26 percent larger than those on hand a year ago and 12 percent above average.

All other grains stored on farms were less than a year ago, with soybeans at 2,599,000 bushels, oats at 2,029,000 bushels, barley at 454,000 bushels and rye at 53,000 bushels.

Farm Labor & Wage Rates

Wage rates for farm workers on April 1 were at an all-time record high level in all categories.

The monthly average wage with room and board furnished was \$219.00, up \$21.00 from a year earlier. An average monthly salary of \$283.00 was being paid to farm workers who were being furnished a house, up \$19.00 from April 1, 1967.

Daily wages being paid to farm workers not being furnished with board and room averaged \$12.30, while \$10.10 was being paid to those who were receiving board and room, both up 90 cents from a year ago.

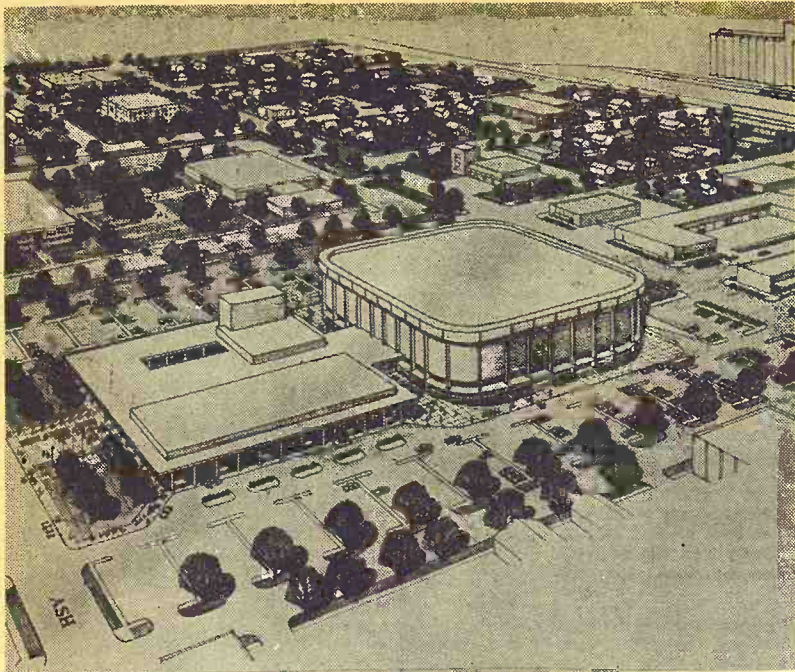

The facilities will serve many purposes, including ice shows, circuses, and conventions.

Turkey Growers Need Big Effort To Cut Supply

Turkey growers have cut supplies by 14 percent in response

to the oversupply of 1967, but their hopes for higher prices by Thanksgiving time depend rather much on their ability to sell a huge cold storage supply of birds left over from last year's record output.

That accounts for the industry-wide promotion to get peo-

ple to try Easter Turkey and such come-ons as Turkey red devils, turkey pizza, turkey beehives and turkey joes.

There is some evidence the promotion is working. The industry has designated April as Turkey Month, and even before the month started turkey consumption had nearly doubled the record rate for the first three months last year.

It's no accident that April has been chosen as Turkey Month, since the Easter season now accounts for about 5% of annual turkey consumption. This year, it's hoped the promotion efforts will double that rate.

Changing fashions in turkey eating have made turkey a year-round food. A decade ago, about 80% of turkey meat was eaten during the big year-end holidays, but now only about half is consumed then and the rest during the remainder of the year.

Last year's overproduction was in response to favorable returns to growers in 1966, but the production binge cost the producers dearly.

Despite a marked decline in expected production this year, per capita consumption may equal last year's record 8.6 pounds because of the large carryover.

That's little comfort for growers, however, who last year had to settle for an average U.S. farm price of 19.8 cents a pound, 3.2 cents below 1966 and the lowest since 1961.

The decline extended into 1968, too, with prices to farmers falling in February to 17.5 cents a pound from 18.2 cents in January and 21.4 cents in February 1967. Prices in March rose slightly from February to an average 17.9 cents.

Agriculture Departments statisticians say that if production is reduced in line with these intentions, prices in the main marketing season (September through December) likely will be moderately above the 19.8 cents average for all of 1967.

The analysts expect prices to remain at low levels through the first half of this year.

Turkey experts agree there's some chance by Thanksgiving that prices to farmers and consumers may be a couple of cents above a year earlier, but only if merchandisers do a good job of moving storage stocks.

Some wholesale and retail prices have risen a few cents a pound in recent weeks, reflecting strong demand for turkeys. Prices may soften again, as they traditionally do after Easter, but trade sources note that the turkey promotion and higher prices for other meats may help turkey prices keep their recent advances.

Use of turkey for further processing into convenience foods or sale as parts, which had been

increasing for a number of years, decreased in 1967.

A buildup of processed turkey stocks and an unfavorable price relationship between whole turkey and processed products contributed to the interruption of growth in this market.

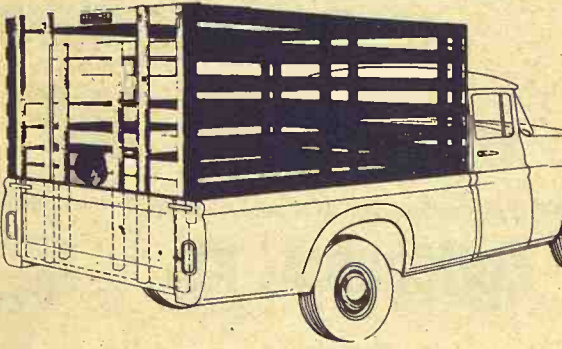

Fire Doesn't Hinder Key Milling Output

The Key Milling Co. hardly missed a lick in getting back into production last Friday after a fire totally destroyed a wooden elevator and storage bins at Clay Center.

The 70-year-old structure contained "the equivalent" of about 15,000 to 18,000 bushels of grain, said John McKee, president of Key Milling. The fire still smoldered the second day after it started.

"It was the good work of the Clay Center fire department and a strong south wind which kept the fire from spreading to the main building," said McKee.

Only 14 feet separated the destroyed wooden elevator from the main elevator and office area.

Despite the major loss and some damage to other buildings plus the water and turmoil left from the fire-fighting, Key got into milling production the same morning the fire started, trucking grain from a 170,000-bushel elevator across the street.

McKee said the old wooden structure was insured, but not sufficiently to cover its replacement. "We'll rebuild," he said, "but I'm not sure what."

Under "Wt./da. of age-c." is listed the individual's weight per day of age on the indicated date.

These bulls were raised without creep feed on native pasture with their mothers, wintered on silage and 3 lbs. of Milo, grazed till Oct. 9, 67, when they were put on hay, sorghum silage, and 4 lbs. of Milo. 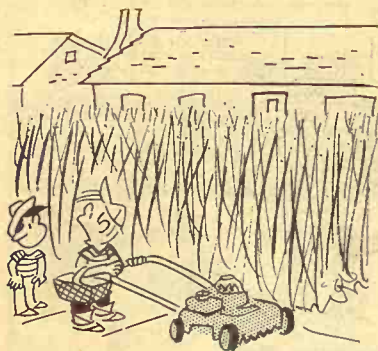

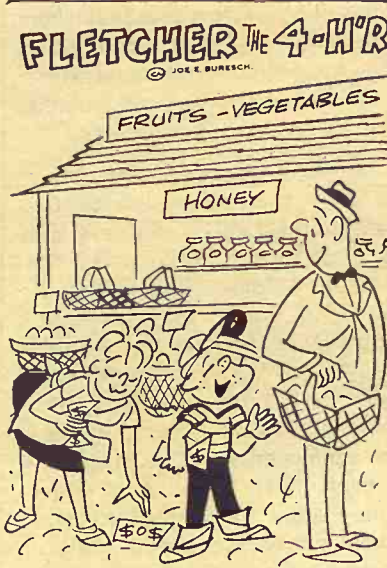

Larger Wheat Export Figures Not All Real

44.7% of it. In 1965-66, the last year for which full figures are available, the U.S. share of the total market was exactly the same: 44.7%.

Of course the percentage has varied some over the years and there are several years in which the U.S. has had over 50% of the market. But for the full period, it appears that the U.S. has not expanded its share of the market despite PL480 gifts and the promotion teams from Great Plains Wheat, Wheat Associates, USDA and others.

The first column in the chart shows the amount of wheat and flour sold for dollars, and does not include the PL480 sales which are for the currency of the country which gets the wheat.

Turnbull concludes that the large part of the gain the U.S. has made in exports of wheat have been by concessional sales, while on the other hand, Canada, Argentina, and Australia were concentrating on increasing their sales for dollars.

Turnbull concedes that the statistics themselves are confusing, but overall do suggest that the U.S. hasn't been overly successful in increasing dollar in the total dollar market.

Moreover, he said that Kansas City Board of Trade opinions were that if the proposed International Grains Arrangements are approved the U.S. may find it even more difficult to boost dollar sales. They say that when world prices are raised, which is part of the agreement, the U.S. will be more inclined to be the "gentleman" than some others and will stick by its promises.

The wheat dollar sales experience, however, should not detract from the good the PL480 program has done in feeding hungry people.

Nor should it detract from the cash markets that have developed in some nations, notably Japan, nor from the great expansion that has been achieved in exports of soybeans and feed grains. But here, too, Turnbull notes, some credit must be given to expanding world demand for our successes in this field.

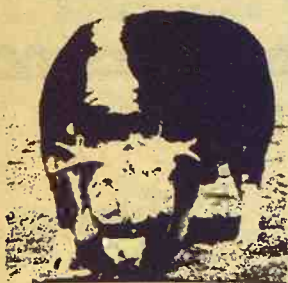

Hays Roundup Is Next Week

Cattlemen from all parts of Kansas will again be gathering at Hays for the annual spring roundup at Kansas State University's Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station on Friday, April 26.

This will be the 55th showing of an event which features rapid fire summaries of current beef cattle research and "eyeballing" dozens of the test animals in the station's outdoor show ring, reports W. W. "Bill" Duitsman, superintendent of this K-State testing facility. Everything starts promptly at 10 a.m.

The wintering trials now under study include addition of grain, CSM, or urea at the time of ensiling; combinations of grains and proteins added at ensiling; deferred feeding of grain; and wintering on native grass.

There will also be reports on full feeding with urea, ammonium chloride, and all concentrate rations, Duitsman says. Cowherd tests include fall and spring calving and urea in wintering ration.

Of special interest will be a discussion of freeze branding. Over 400 head at the station have been number branded during the past year.

An afternoon session in the auditorium will also feature discussions of test results on the station with sorghums, wheat, legumes, grasses, and soils. Questions about these crops from the audience will be fielded by the Hays Station research-

More Profit In Feeding Bulls?

LIBERAL — Three speakers at an agricultural economic conference here each had a specialized topic, but the same message came through loud and clear from each — farming in any form today is a major business enterprise with a heavy capital investment that requires good management.

About 300 farmers, ranchers, cattle feeders and businessmen gathered for a beef barbecue and two hours of talks. Speakers were Dr. Raymond J. Doll, vice-president and senior economist of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City; Jack Pandol, Delano, Calif. grower, packer and distributor of specialty crops, and Dr. Dean Hodge of the Ralston-Purina company.

Dr. Doll described today's "pace setter" farmer, the role of capital, and why interest rates are climbing.

Pandol outlined the many hazards of specialty crop raising and marketing, and then concluded that farmers will meet these problems because "they are gamblers."

Dr. Hodge affirmed the faith of his company in this area as evidenced by their investment in a new feed mill, and described the role of genetics in a successful beef program.

Dr. Doll said the pace setters, who have the knack of using the most efficient methods, represent about 5 to 10 percent of today's farmers, and are from five to seven years head of the average farmer.

"The pace setter is not doing too badly. The other 90 to 95 percent are running into more and more difficulties," Dr. Doll said. "If we make more money and credit available, we will be encouraging inflation, and we will find interest rates higher next year."

Dr. Hodge used slides to illustrate research into genetics, ar-

tificial insemination, and the idea that the genetic potential must be bred into beef cattle to get the most in profit out of a feeding program.

He described marketing tests comparing the profits and public acceptance of young bulls as compared to steers, which proved that the bulls returned \$35.29 more profit per head than steers bred, fed and marketed the same way and at the same identical price a pound.

Dr. Hodge admitted that neither federal grading nor consumer acceptance have caught up with this concept of bull carcass marketing and that "you

would be cut to ribbons by buyers and packers if you tried but he speculated as to where the "catching up" will take place.

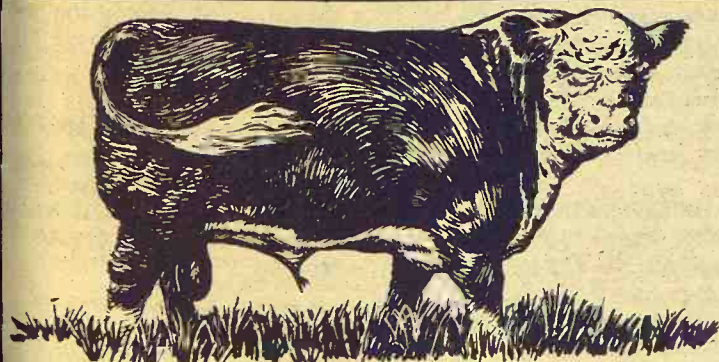

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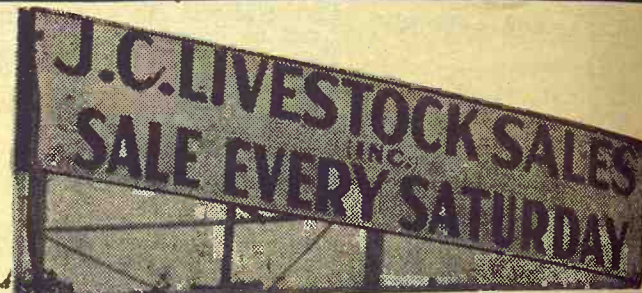

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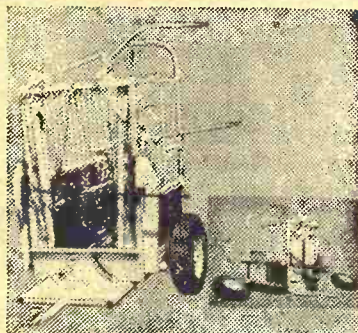

NFO Lets Up On Holding

CORNING, Iowa — After two months of effort and little effect on prices, the National Farmers Organization is relaxing its 35-state boycott of livestock markets.

NFO President Oren Lee Staley insisted at the militant farm organization's headquarters here that the holding action, keeping products off the market to force prices up, will continue.

But in a recorded message heard by NFO members in Belgium, Wis., Staley said the NFO will begin a bloc selling

plan as a new strategy and to relieve pressure on farmers.

This could involve members pooling their meat animals and selling them collectively, much as the NFO has conducted group sales since April 1965 when it started a "Marketing arrangements" program.

"We don't want any production sold that doesn't have to be sold," Staley said in the recording, "but for what has to be sold we will give you specific steps. If you start selling as individuals, you will kill all the gains that have been made."

Prices have varied little since the livestock holding action started February 12.

Dallas McGinnis, a market

specialist at Iowa State University, compared current weekly averages of market prices with those of two months ago.

McGinnis found 200-220 pound butcher hogs in the week just ended at \$19.20 a hundred-weight, or 25 cents less than the week ending Feb. 17, on the interior Iowa and southern Minnesota market.

He said the price for 900-1100 pound steers in the Iowa-Minnesota market averaged \$26.38, exactly the same as two months ago.

The NFO seeks a price increase of \$4 to \$5 a hundred-weight.

RUSSELL — The Leonard Homeier farm, 15 miles south-east of here, was destroyed by fire last week as a grassland fire was fanned by 40-mile winds.

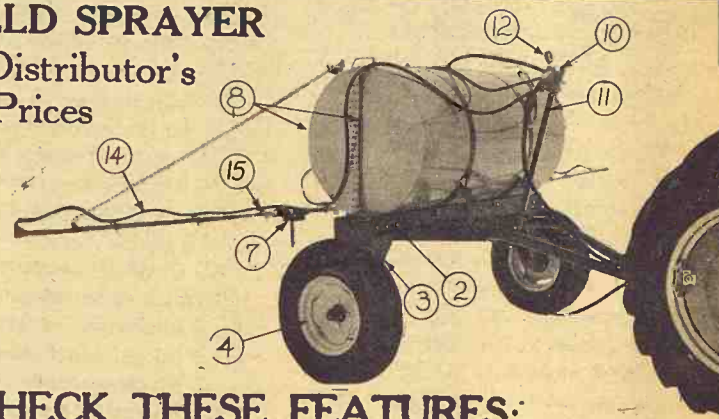
