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State FFA Office Moves

With the reorganization in the Kansas State Department of Education, some changes have occurred in the Kansas Association of FFA. The most obvious is that the State FFA office is no longer in Topeka, but rather is housed in the College of Education at Kansas State University.

Assuming the duties as State FFA Executive Secretary will be Robert Broeckelman, who just completed a very successful five years of teaching vo-

cational agriculture at Norton High School. Bob is a former State FFA Vice-President who later conducted the Washington D.C. FFA Leadership Conferences. His knowledge of vocational agriculture and the FFA makes him highly qualified for his new position. Les Olsen, Education Specialist in Agricultural Education in Topeka, is the new State Advisor, succeeding Dean Prochaska who was named State Director of Vocational Education.

State FFA Constitution Amended

Minor changes in the State FFA Constitution were made at the 49th Annual Convention to help various areas of the organization run more smoothly.

According to the former constitution, all State officers must receive a majority vote from the delegates in order to be elected. This made the State Vice-President an unofficial officer as he is the runner-up for the presidential race. Article VI, Section A was amended, in part, to read "the runner up for president shall become State Vice-President without necessitating a majority vote."

The second amendment was to include the State FFA Executive Secretary as an official member of the State officer selection committee.

Membership Shows Gain

Kansas FFA membership was up over 3% for 1976-77 as compared to 1975-76. The final count for 1976-77 showed 7,104 members, up 218 from the 6,886 members in 1975-76. Nationally, membership was also up, totalling 509,735.

Brownback Visits Russia

Ten days in Russia highlighted a twoweek trip abroad for National FFA Vice-President Sam Brownback of Parker, Kansas. Brownback left Dulles International Airport in Washington, D.C., on a tour of foreign agriculture with stops in Denmark and England prior to the 10-day visit in Russia. Brownback is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Robert Brownback of Parker, Kansas.

Brownback is one of four FFA National Officers representing the organization's half million members on the 15day trip. He is one of the first FFA members to even travel to the Soviet Union on an official visit. Three of Brownback's fellow officers will accompany him on the excursion which begins in London and ends in Moscow.

The Soviet Union hosted the four officers as part of an exchange agreement between the two countries. Lennie Gamage, FFA International Program Specialist, said talks with Russian officials began a year ago to arrange the tour. He added that the delegation discussed with the Soviets possible ways of establishing a form of exchange allowing living and working on farms within the two countries. Officials of the U.S. State Department said such an arrangement was rare between the two countries but both see the exchange as "a good thing".

The officers' tour marks the first time the Russian Committee of Youth Organizations have cooperated in programming a rural reciprocative exchange.


Prior to their arrival in Russia, the delegates met with the British National Farmers' Union in London and Danish Farmers' Organization in Copenhagen and Axelborg, Denmark. These foreign organizations work in cooperation with the FFA's international activities and exchanges.

The four officers, returning May 30, met with officials of the Soviet Embassy and the U.S. State Department prior to their departure. Russian agriculture, customs, and rural life study were discussed with an emphasis on improving agricultural relations between the two nations via the mutual exchange. A spokesman for the Soviets said the group would see "some of the best agriculture" while in Russia. The officers recorded the event for reports and presentations upon their return.

A group of four delegates from Russia is scheduled to tour U.S. farming operations and sample American agriculture in late June as the final step in the agreement.


In his closing comments, Brownback said, "There truly is a key to success. You have to set your goals: then you have to work toward those goals."

Elementary Children Learn About Agriculture

Children at the Troy elementary school learned about agriculture the week of February 21-25 from Troy High School vocational agriculture students (Mark Stock, Mike Masters, Steve Franken, and Bill Callahan) who know from firsthand experience and study what agriculture is all about. The instructors for the elementary students are all members of the Troy FFA Chapter, who conducted the class in agriculture for elementary school children as part of the FFA's "Food For America" program.

"Food For America" is an effort by FFA chapters across the nation to tell the story of modern agriculture to elementary school children. Chapter members are being aided in their effort by a set of instructional resource materials that include a *Farm Art Book* and a film provided through the National FFA Organization. The Farm Art Book contains interesting illustrations of agricultural facts that students can color or illustrate themselves while the film, *Food From Farm to You*, explains in elementary terms how food is produced and ends up on supermarket shelves.

The entire "Food For America" project is co-sponsored through the National FFA Foundation, Inc., by four agricultural businesses: American Breeders Service, Division of W.R. Grace & Company; J.I. Case, A Tenneco Company; Chemagro Agricultural Division of Mobay Chemical Corporation, and DEKALB Ag. Research Inc. Funds from the sponsoring companies and from the FFA Foundation General Fund have been used to develop and distribute resource materials and to offset the costs of distributing the film.

"We are concerned that so few young people understand where their food comes from," says Troy Chapter President Mack Jarrett. "Our members are well qualified to help elementary school children learn about agriculture because of the knowledge and experience we've gained in the vocational agriculture course and by actual experience on the farm and in local agricultural businesses."
