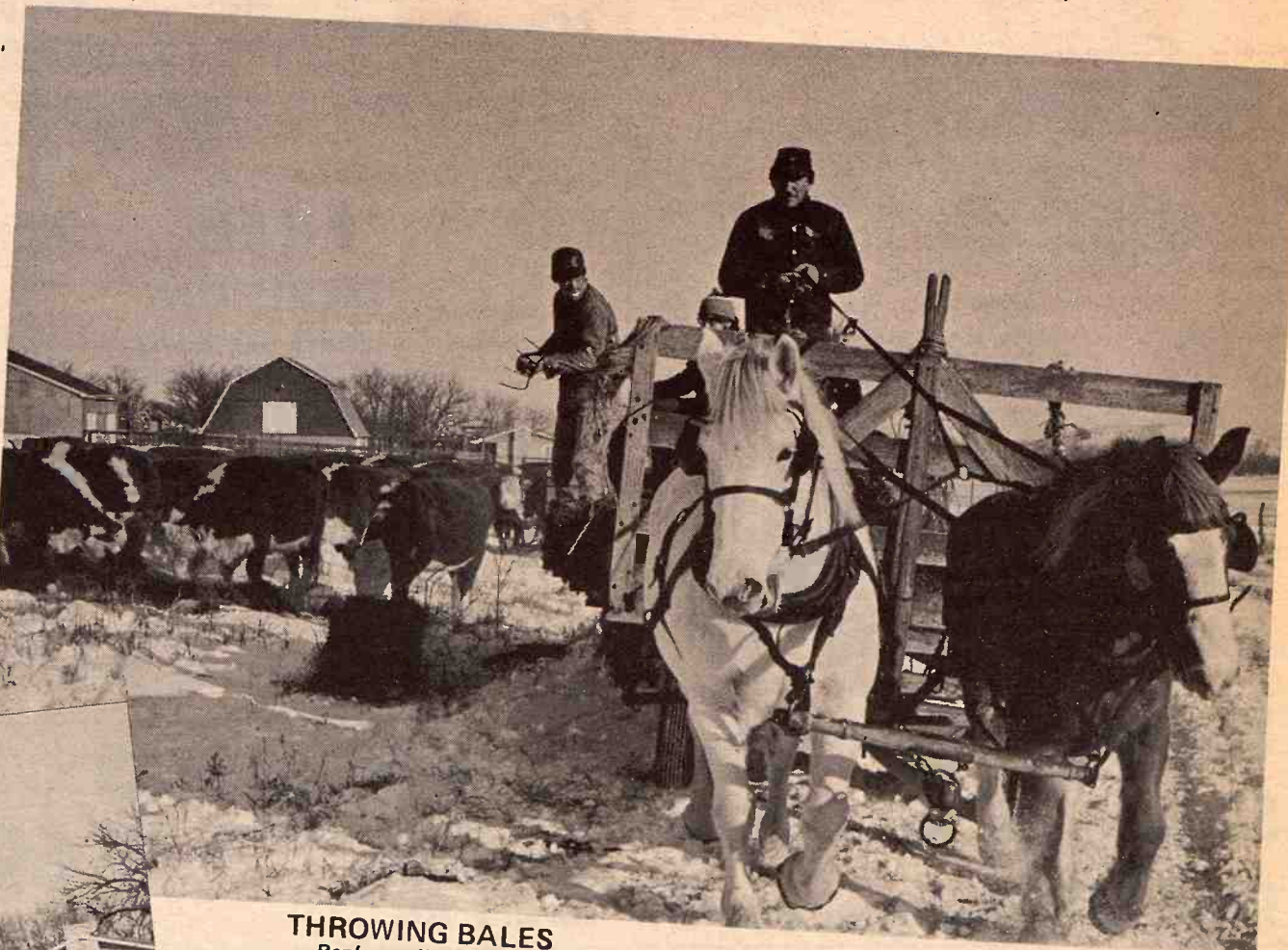
UNHITCHING AFTER FEEDING

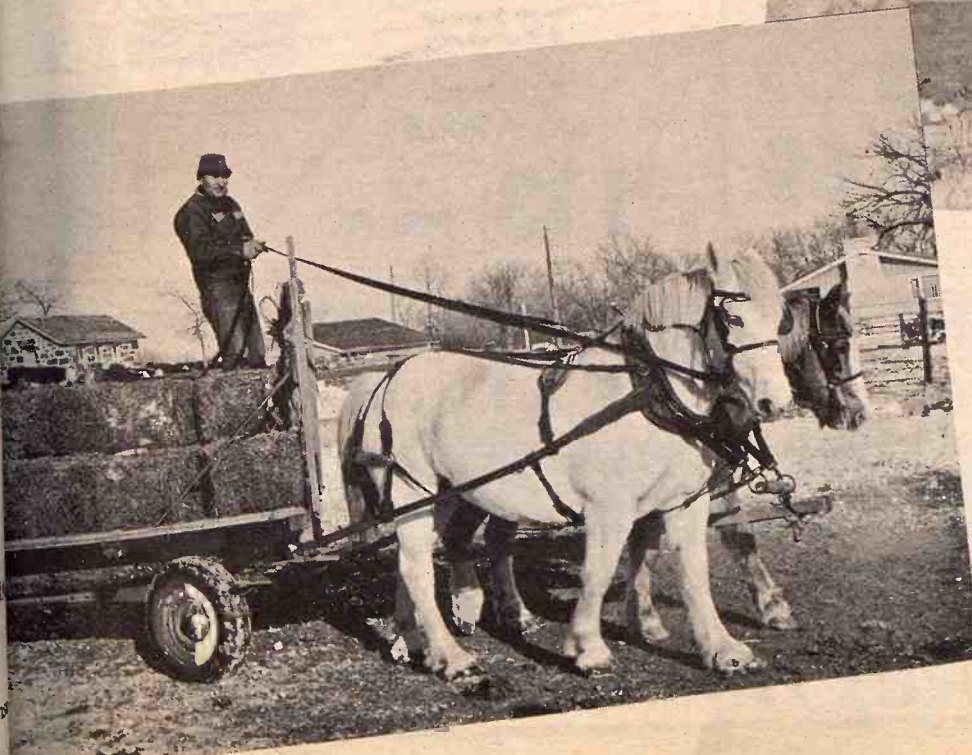


THROWING BALES

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Back Off From Enforcing Rule On Fat Hot Dogs

The Agriculture Department has quietly dropped a year-old plan for testing the fat content of supermarket hot dogs to see if manufacturers are meeting standards favored by the White House. But department officials say the fat limit of 30 percent — in force since October 1969 — is being observed scrupulously by most manufacturers without the threat of enforcement.

The sole basis for this conclusion is the department's old system of sampling cooked sausages in plants to see if makers are abiding by the federal fat limit.

Last year the Consumer and Marketing Service said a plan was under consideration for purchasing hot dogs at retail stores to see how these samples stacked up against

routine inspections made in meat plants.

Asked by a reporter whether the plan is still under consideration, officials said it has been shelved and there are no plans to revive it.

Dr. Edward A. Murphy, in charge of standards for the marketing service, said the market sampling plan was canceled mainly because it was too cumbersome and because laboratory facilities were not adequate.

Murphy said the present system of checking hot-dog fat in the plants is working well and few complaints have been made by the industry, which originally opposed the limit.

The latest fat information based on plant samplings of cooked sausages, including bologna, knock-wurst and frankfurters was released last week.

Officials said 98.2 percent of 4446 samples examined during the last quarter of 1970 conformed with the 30 percent limit.

Under the 1969 rule, manufacturers could put as much fat into sausages as consumers would accept. In some cases this amounted to almost 50 percent of the product.

Department officials say the shelved plan for store samplings would not have added much to the information on hot dog fat content. Consumer spokesmen have said, however, that supermarket samplings would give housewives a better idea which brands are leanest.

More Patent Protection For Seed Developers

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that it is accepting applications for patent-type certificates under the new Plant Variety Protection act, signed into law by President Nixon on Dec. 26.

"This law will encourage the development of new varieties of plants developed from seeds, and should make them more readily available to the public," said Clayton Yeutter, Administrator of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. "The new law will provide protection to those who breed, develop or discover these new varieties. The end result will benefit both agriculture and homeowners."

The new law provides protection, much like a patent, to developers of new varieties of plants which are reproduced from seeds. These include such plants as soybeans, cotton, cabbage, and garden beans.

Developers of new varieties of other types of plants, reproduced by budding or grafting, such as roses and fruit trees, are already provided protection through the U.S. Patent Office.

The new law will be administered by a Plant Variety Protection Office now being set up in the Grain Division of the Consumer and Marketing Service.

While official forms are being prepared, interim application forms can be obtained on request from that office, Federal Center Building, Hyattsville, Md., 20742. Complete regulations covering administration of the new law are now being prepared.

The Plant Variety Protection Office will include a staff of experts to verify that a variety submitted is actually new and different and fulfills other requirements for protection under the law. Protection for a variety runs for 17 years.

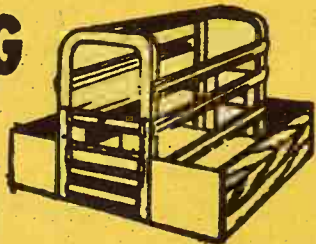


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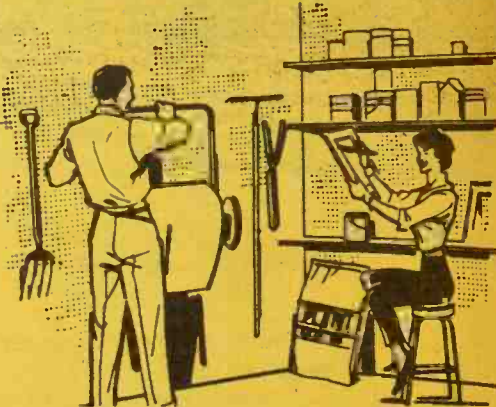
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State Slims Annual Report

The biennial report of Kansas governmental agencies was

distributed last week by Mrs. Elwill M. Shanahan, secretary of state.

The volume is a slim 1¼ inches in thickness this year as against 2¼ inches two years ago.

In a forward, Mrs. Shanahan said that with the advent of a new

decade, major changes in the format seemed appropriate.

"These changes reduced the size of the publication by 50 percent."

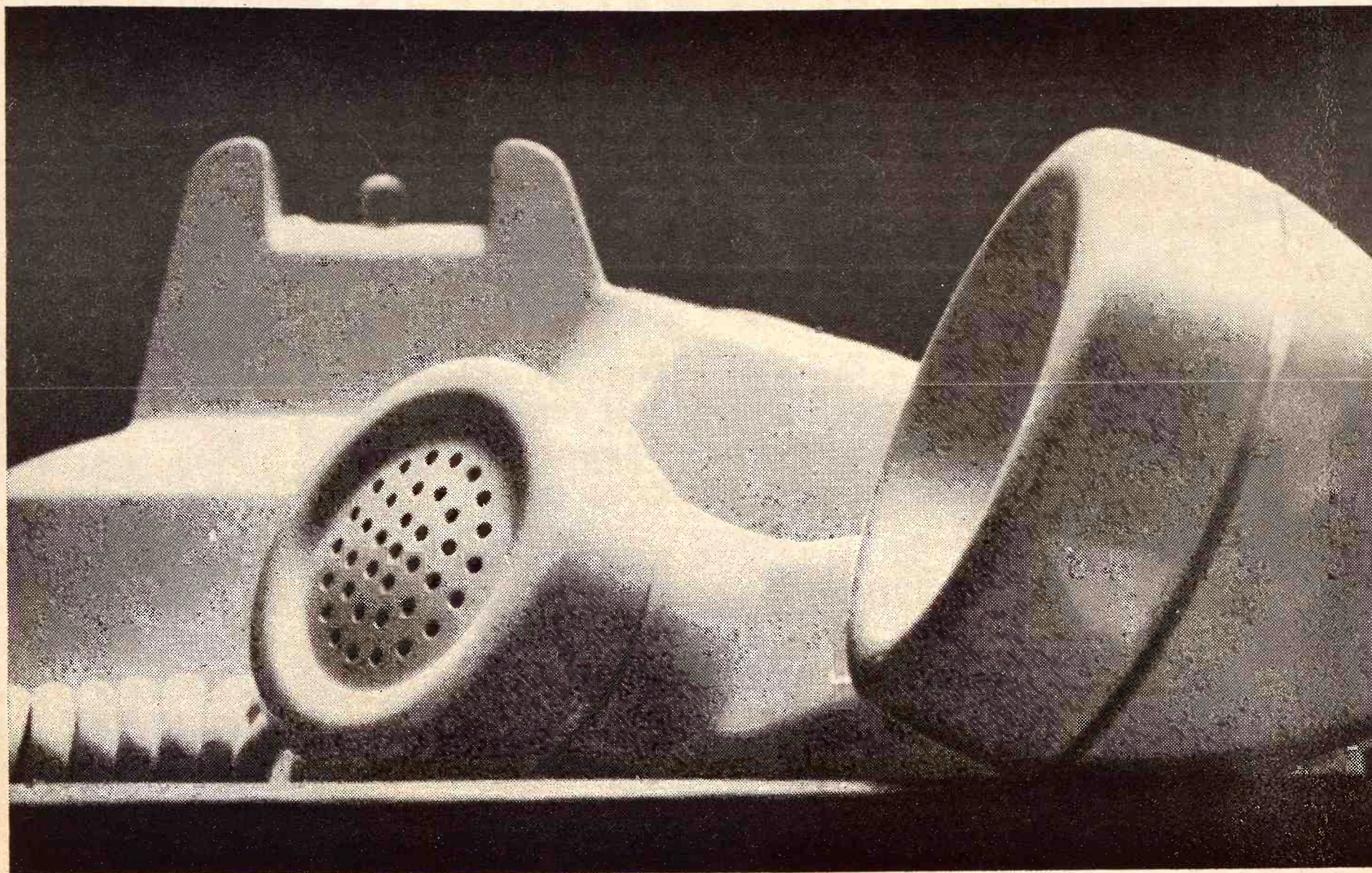
This year's report has 728 pages, including an index, as against 1316 pages two years ago.

The volume includes reports from nine elective offices and 38 executive agencies.

**AHA Registrations
On The Rise**

A hefty increase in registrations has marked the first four months of the American Hereford Association's 1970-71 fiscal year. AHA announced that a 20.9 per cent increase in registrations has been chalked up for September through December of 1970 when compared to the same period a year ago.

The Association's computers added 102,571 calves for the four

months, as AHA's total registrations since 1881 are nearing the 16 million mark.

AHA Executive Secretary, W. T. Berry, Jr., in commenting on the big increase, said, "there are a number of factors influencing the increased registrations. First, Hereford breeders have been reducing numbers during a severe culling program over the past few years and we are now seeing a new kind of expansion based on better quality animals and rapidly increasing reliance on performance records.

Our breeders are producing more of these top-quality animals to meet the demands of a growing market reflected by the best prices for Herefords in 18 years."

Berry also cited the continuing dominance of white-faced cattle in feedlots and the success of crossbreeding programs based on Hereford blood as factors creating additional demand for top-quality Hereford bulls and commercial

straight-bred females.

"Also, commercial producers are realizing that the ideal size and skeletal structure of beef cattle as described in two recent conferences at the University of Wisconsin, are produced consistently within the Hereford breed," he added.

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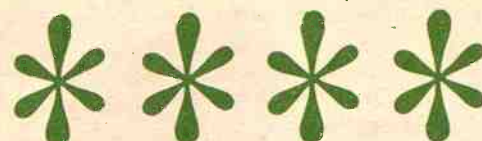
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OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

Mrs. Eugene Mullen of Ada will receive a prize for her recipe. She writes, "the flavor of this dish is just superb!"

CHICKEN ALA KING

- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms or 4 1/2 ounce can
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 teaspoon minced onion
- 1/4 cup flour (sometimes I use cornstarch proportionately)
- 2 cups milk (use broth for part of this)
- Dash pepper
- 2 cups diced cooked chicken
- 1/4 cup small pimiento strips
- Toasted Parmesan bread boxes

Cook mushroom slices in butter till tender. Add onion and blend. Add flour and blend. Add milk, stirring constantly. Cook till thickened. Add chicken and pepper and heat to serving temperature. Fold in pimiento and serve on bread boxes or buttered toast points. Makes four or five servings.

TOASTED PARMESAN BREAD BOXES

- 4 slices of bread cut 1 1/2 inches thick from unsliced bread
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese

Trim crusts from bread slices. Hollow out center of bread slices to form a box, leaving side edges and bottom 1/2 inch thick. Brush inside and out with butter; sprinkle outside with cheese. Bake in 400-degree oven until lightly browned, about seven minutes. Fill hot bread boxes with Chicken Ala King.

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CLAY CENTER, KANSAS

This recipe was sent by Mrs. Ernest Priddy, R 9, Topeka:
HAM & BEAN SOUP

- 1 pound dry navy beans
- 2 quarts water
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1 ham bone, about 1 1/2 pounds
- 2 cups celery, sliced
- 1 teaspoon parsley flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 large carrots, sliced
- Salt & pepper

Wash beans thoroughly. Add water and lemon juice and simmer for a few minutes. Allow to stand for one hour. Add ham bone, celery, parsley & thyme. Simmer for two hours. Add onions and carrots and simmer one hour longer. Remove ham bone, cut off meat, and add to soup. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes six to eight servings.

Mrs. Albert Parry, R 2, Clay Center:

"I am sending a recipe for a quick meat loaf which is party good."

QUICK MEAT LOAF

- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 package dried onion soup mix
- 1 cup corn flakes crumbs
- 2 eggs
- 1 can cream of chicken soup, undiluted

Combine all ingredients except chicken soup. Form into loaf. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Pour soup over loaf and bake 20 minutes longer. Six to eight servings. "I pour it in a loaf pan and if the beef was too fat I pour it off before adding the chicken soup."

SWEDISH APPLE DESSERT

Cream together:

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- Pinch of salt
- 1 tablespoon vanilla

Sift together:

- 1 1/2 cups flour

- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon soda
- Mix with creamed mixture and add 3 cups chopped apples. Bake 35 minutes in 350 degree oven. Remove and top with this mixture:
- 1 1/2 cups brown sugar
 - 2 tablespoons soft butter
 - 3 tablespoons milk
- Spread on top of cake and bake for 20 minutes more. Nutmeats may be added, if desired.

STRAWBERRY DELIGHT

- 1 stick oleo
- 1 cup flour
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Mix and spread in a 9x13-inch pan and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool and crumble. Use half of this for bottom and half for topping. Beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Add 2 10-ounce packages of thawed frozen strawberries, 1 scant cup sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat for 20 minutes with electric mixer. Fold in 1 small carton of Cool Whip. Freeze overnight.

MOLASSES CRINKLES

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1 egg

- 1/4 cup molasses
 - 2 1/4 cups flour
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon cloves
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon ginger (if desired)
 - Granulated sugar

Kansas Crop Income Down

Farm crops income in Kansas for 1970 was down about \$15 million from 1969, according to preliminary reports from Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Topeka.

In an overall crops income look at the United States, farm income rose to \$26,543,181,000, about \$750 million above last year.

The preliminary figures show Kansas farm income for cash crops was \$1,065,068,000 this year compared with \$1,080,575,000 last year.

The total includes a wheat crop valued at \$526,696,000; sorghum grain at \$188,949,000; corn at \$117,278,000; barley at \$927,000 and all other crops at \$5,984,000.

The lowering income figure was posted despite Kansas farmers having tallied the third largest crop production of record since 1916.

Oklahoma Super Road Finished

Soon one can get all the way from Kansas City to Dallas on an interstate highway route. Kansas has had its length of 4-lane, limited access roadway done for some time and now Oklahoma nearly has its length done.

A 29-mile stretch on I35 was opened in Oklahoma last week and the last 10-mile section between Wynnewood and Davis in the Arbuckle mountains is expected to be open this month.

I35 is planned to stretch from Mexico at Lareda, Tex., to Duluth, Minn.

Africa Gaining Oil Markets

When European crude-oil imports soared past the 10-million barrel per day mark for the first time last year, it became apparent that a near-balance is approaching between the continent's two chief crude sources — Africa and the Middle East.

The Middle East share of the European crude supply has been steadily eroding since the 6-day war of 1967, when it stood at 55.5 percent, says the Jan. 11 issue of the Oil and Gas Journal. In 1968, its percentage fell to 54.3 percent and in 1969 to 53.3 percent.

On the other hand, the Journal says Africa's share has moved steadily upward from 31.3 percent in 1967 to 35.7 percent in 1968, 38.1 percent in 1969, and 42.6 percent the first half of 1970.

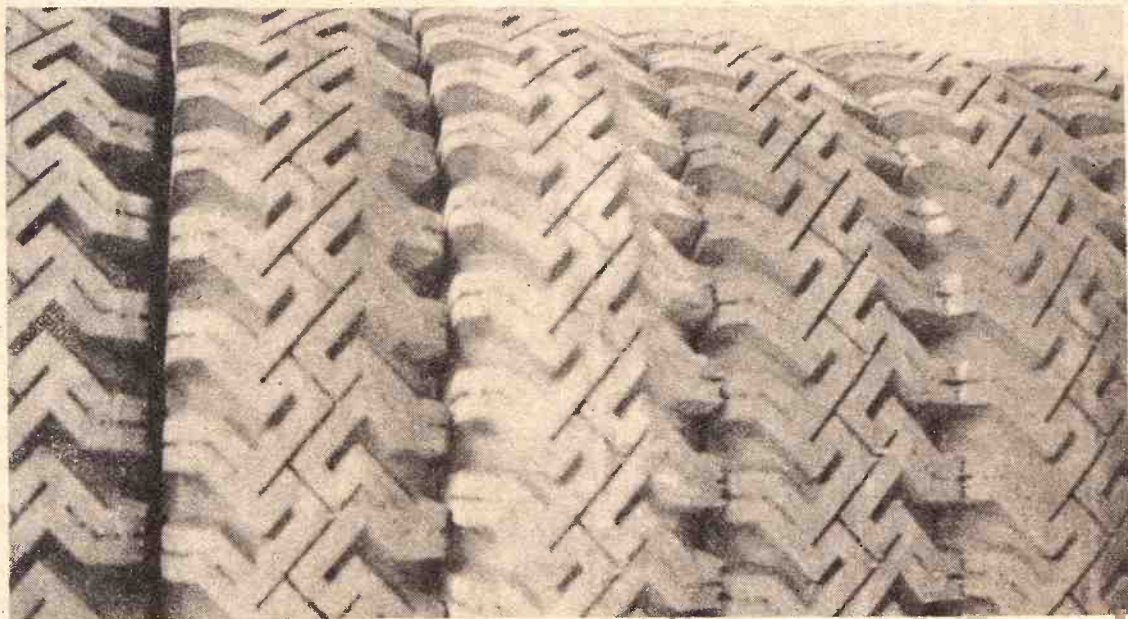

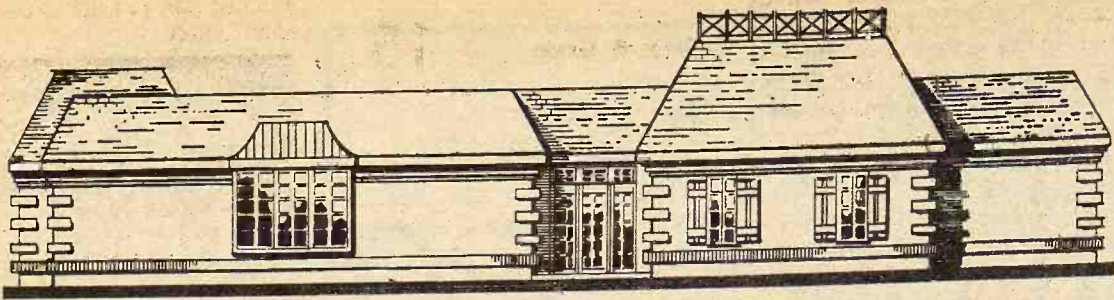

This structure is envisioned as the Frank Carlson Library in Concordia. A public drive for funds has been started in Concordia to build a library to house the memorabilia of former Senator Carlson, accumulated during his 40 years of public service.

The total cost of the library is estimated at \$380,000. The city of Concordia has already produced \$100,000 thru mill levy and an additional \$25,000 has been pledged by individuals. Federal matching funds may be available. A committee headed by J. Milton Sorem has set \$130,000 as a goal for the public drive.

New Wheat Variety, Eagle Available Next Fall

Kansas' newest wheat variety, Eagle, which was released to Kansas farmers last fall, is expected to become generally available to wheat producers after the 1971 harvest.

Howard Wilkins, secretary of the Kansas Crop Improvement Association, told nearly 100 members attending the one-day annual meeting at Hutchinson that 2500 bushels were planted on about 3000 acres this year.

With an expected 30 bushel per acre yield, adequate supplies to meet farmers' demands are expected to be available this fall.

Although the new variety, which is far better than Triumph or Scout in milling and baking qualities, will not offer farmers an immediate improvement economically, Wilkins said Eagle wheat offers a long range improvement by raising wheat export quality being offered on the world market.

Dr. Ron Livers of the Ft. Hays Experiment Station developed Eagle from a strain of Scout Wheat. Livers, working with 80 different types, selected the type he wanted to give better milling qualities for bread baking.

Presently, millers pay the same price for all wheat raised in Kansas, regardless of its milling qualities. Wilkins said prices could be im-

proved if payment was made on a protein basis.

However, since most Kansas wheat is delivered to country elevators at harvest time and dumped together, farmers are paid on a station protein average which rarely qualifies for a price premium.

Wilkins said the new variety was distributed across the state based upon selections from seed grower applications. A listing of Eagle seed dealers will be made in the association's annual directory expected to become available during the latter part of August.

Eagle's yields are equal to Scout and superior to Triumph, he said. Eagle has about the same agronomy characteristics as Scout, but it does have a stiffer wheat straw.

Other speakers during the session were Prof. A. L. Clapp, KSU; Dr. Leroy Brooks, KSU Extension specialist; and Ted Walter, KSU agronomy department.

Walter, outlining new varieties, said the association was suggesting replacing Scout wheat acreages in Kansas with Eagle because of its superior baking qualities and shorter straw which makes it stand better.

Other varieties mentioned by Walter included Scoutland, a new variety from Nebraska which is

similar to Kansas' Eagle, and Danne, released in Oklahoma last fall, which compares to Triumph but has better over all baking properties. Danne has a one day later maturity date and carries lower test weights than Triumph.

A promising selection in the spring oats picture is Trio, released by Kansas, Nebraska and the USDA.

"What we like about it is it has a better straw than Pettis and Missouri 0-205," Walter said, "and it has a better tolerance to virus disease. It yields about the same as Pettis."

For the first time, farmers will be able to get Barton Western Wheatgrass this year, giving them a named, pedigreed variety adapted to Kansas growing conditions.

Garden Farmers Hold Convention This Week

TOPEKA — The Kansas Fruit Growers Association will hold its annual meeting in Topeka January 20-21.

Meeting at the same time and same place as the fruit growers will be the Kansas Vegetable Growers

Association. The annual greenhouse tomato clinic will be at 1:30 on Wednesday with the vegetable growers' annual meeting slated for 8:30 the next morning.

Appearing on the fruit growers program will be Dr. R. W. Campbell, Dr. John Boling, Dr. Neil Miles and Elwyn Holmes, all of Kansas State University; Dr. Dave Dilley of Michigan State, Dr. Bill Tweedy of the University of Missouri, and Allen Jones, a Colorado fruit grower and shipper and president of the National Peach Council.

Among the subjects up for discussion are "Working Together to Build the Fruit Industry," "Predicting Apple Harvest Maturity," "1971 Fruit Growth Regulator Outlook for Kansas," "Looking Ahead in Fruit Production," "Fungicides — Old and New," and "Considerations in Building Fruit Storage Facilities."

A ladies program scheduled Thursday afternoon will include a tour of the Kansas Historical Society Museum.

Officers of the association are Jack Rees of Topeka, president; Bill Stoughton of Hutchinson, vice-president; Dr. Frank Morrison of Kansas State University, secretary-treasurer; and Jack Rhea of Paola, director.

Discussed at the tomato clinic will be such subjects as "Varieties and Spacing for Optimum Protection," "Disease Control," "Hydroponic vs. Groundbed Production," and "Greenhouse Management Technique for Climatic Control."

HONORED BY FERTILIZER INSTITUTE

Premier Seedgrower Sidney Johnson Of Lindsborg Started With Tenmarq

A Lindsborg wheat grower, Sidney Johnson, was named the 1970 Kansas premier seed grower at the Kansas Crop Improvement Association's (KCIA) annual meeting in Hutchinson.

A former chairman of the Farmers Union Co-op there and

currently a Union township trustee, Johnson has 440 acres in crop production on his 1,080-acre ranch three miles south of US81 and 3 1/4 miles west of Lindsborg.

He averages 250 acres in certified seed production in addition to

raising corn, milo, and alfalfa and running a Polled Hereford herd in which over half the herd are registered animals.

Johnson began farming about 50 years ago when as the eldest son he took over for the family when his father died.

"In the years that have passed, there has been a great improvement in wheat varieties as to yield, disease resistance, better straw and better milling wheat," he said.

He recalled that yields 50 years ago were very small compared to today's.

"If I remember right, our county average was around 12 or 13 bushels. In the 1930s or may be it was the late 1920s, my cousin purchased some certified wheat (Tenmarq) from KCIA, and I purchased a wagon load of it and raised it for several years," he said.

After the introduction of Tenmarq, farmers were able to push some fields up to 30 bushels or more in production. With continued improvement in wheat varieties, McPherson county farmers now consistently average 30 to 35 bushels per acre.

"I always like to watch im-

provement in different wheat varieties," he said, explaining his reasoning for going into certified wheat seed production back in the 1940s. "They've improved seed resistance to disease....gotten increase in yields....better milling quality....and gotten better straw."

He started certified wheat production when Comanche, Pawnee and Triumph were released. He raised Comanche wheat for about four years until the Hessian fly problem became too troublesome and he switched to Pawnee and Triumph.

"Pawnee wheat was a very good yielder. I remember one year I had 160-acre field planted north of our house and we had a dry winter and a dry spring. In the first week of May I rode through that field on horseback and you couldn't have hidden a jackrabbit on that 160 acres. On May 15th, we got a good rain, and when I combined that wheat, it was

only about one foot tall, but it made 16 bushels to the acre. I think, that is the year they called it the miracle wheat," he said.

Other varieties he has raised have been Ponca, Kiowa, Kaw, Ottawa, Scout, Shawnee, Parker and Satanta. This year he sowed Eagle, the newest Kansas release.

In the last decade Johnson has sold over 10,000 bushels of certified wheat seed and 13,000 bushels of uncertified seed.

Although he has passed his golden anniversary in his farming career, Johnson isn't ready for retirement. This year he was able to obtain a limited amount of Eagle seed which

enabled him to drill 15 acres of the new variety.

Nudist Camp, Gravel Pits Get Payments

GAO Frown On Odd Land Diversions

Government auditors say about \$618,000 in "questionable diversion payments" were made in the 1969 crop year under the feed grain program, some going to owners of land used for housing, garbage dumps, gravel pits, and a nudist club.

In a report to Congress, the General Accounting Office recommended that revised regulations be drawn up by the Agriculture Department to exclude from the program all land devoted to, or designated for, non-agricultural uses.

Department officials agreed with their conclusions, the auditors said,

and instructed state offices last August to review any similar cases "and to take action to recover any overpayments or unearned payments, where appropriate."

The report also said the department, under a new bill enacted by Congress last year, plans to review regulations with a view to more clearly defining farms ineligible for all diversion programs and to strengthen administrative controls.

In their report, the auditors said their review was made in 14 counties in six states but noted that most were undergoing urbanization where the changing status of land could likely result in nonfarm land being enrolled in the program. Therefore, the auditors said, their findings should not be considered typical of the entire program. The areas were not identified.

Under the voluntary program, a producer who decides to take part must divert a portion of his land from production to an approved conserving use.

In return, the producer becomes eligible for price support payments and loans on the balance of his feed grain crop.

During the 1969 crop year, the report said that "questionable

diversion payments" totaling about \$618,000 were made to 938 farm owners or operators in the 14 counties. The auditors selected payments of about \$189,000 from this total for detailed review.

State Pay Hikes Cost Million A Month

A comparison of monthly payroll figures before and after the salary hike state employees received late last year shows a \$1 million a month increase.

The salary hike which implemented recommendations of Public Administration Service and the State Finance Council, officially went into effect Nov. 1 last year and applied to around 19,000 employees in the classified civil service.

Classified employees constitute the largest block of state workers.

The office of State Controller James Cobler said October wages paid to classified employees in November totaled \$11.12 million.

Wages earned in November, the

first month of the increase, and paid to classified state employees in December totaled \$12.13 million, the state controller's office said. It represents an increase of \$1.01 million a month.

Cobler said part of the increase could have been due to a greater number of employees on the state payroll in November, but added most of the increase probably was caused by the increase in salaries.

The raises resulted from a job classification and salary study conducted by PAS during late 1969 and the early part of 1970. The study was commissioned by the Finance Council because the state's classification and pay plan had not been reviewed completely since its original installation in the 1940s.

Higher salaries for state employees is causing some of the money problems being faced by the 1970 Legislature.

The last session appropriated only about one-half of the amount needed to fully implement the PAS study and the raises were delayed until the fall of last year instead of going into effect on the first day of the new fiscal year, July 1, 1970.

This session of the Legislature must find the financial resources for funding the salary hikes for an entire fiscal year.

Preliminary estimates indicated the PAS-recommended salary plan would cost \$13 million a year and the first month of experience under the new wage plan indicates it will cost at least that much.

The State Finance Council still has not acted on a part of the PAS study which recommended salary hikes for between 450 and 500 unclassified employees — many of whom are state executives, doctors, lawyers or persons in other professions.

When they and their salary in-

creases are added, it should boost the increase to more than \$1 million a month.

New Pricing On CCC Grain

The Commodity Credit Corporation in the Agriculture Department has announced a new formula system of pricing government-owned grain offered for sale this year.

The new schedule will take effect July 1 for wheat, oats, barley and rye; on September 1 for soybeans; and on October 1 for corn and sorghum grain.

Grain owned by the CCC is that "forfeited" by farmers who decide to take the government's price support loan instead of selling the commodities on the cash market.

A major change is in a so-called minimum formula price at which beginning next marketing year, the commodities will be priced by CCC at 4.5 cents a bushel higher than at the start of the season in 1970.

The effect is to protect farmers from the possibility of CCC grain being sold during harvest periods at rates which would undercut or depress cash markets.

Another major aim of the new price arrangements is to encourage grain users to buy wheat they need from farmers rather than from government holdings.

DELINQUENT TAXES INCREASE 83 PER CENT

Sedgwick County delinquent tax office has purchased an electronic calculator in an effort to control "paper explosion." Apparently delinquent property taxes have increased almost 83 per cent, due to prorated assessment of vehicles and unemployment in Wichita.

GET 1200 STRAYS BACK IN FEEDLOTS

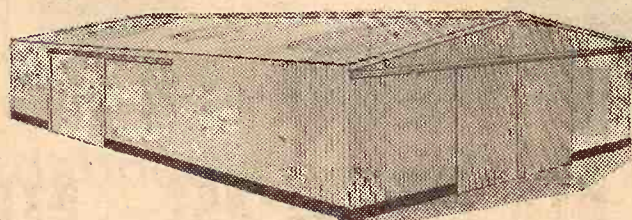

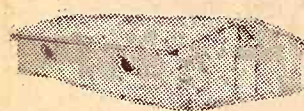

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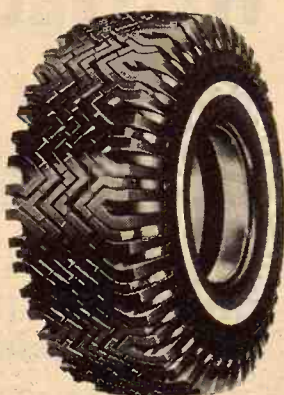

Reapportionment May Go One Job At A Time

Realignment of the state's five
congressional districts probably is
only reapportionment that can
be completed by the 1971 session of
the Kansas Legislature, House
Speaker Calvin Strowig says.

The Abilene Republican said it
appears that the detailed census
formation needed to reapportion
the Kansas House won't be available
until after the 1971 session is com-
pleted.

Strowig said he personally would
like to be able to complete both

congressional and legislative
reapportionment during the 1971
session.

He said if there then were any
successful legal challenges to the
reapportionments the 1972
Legislature could make any needed
changes or adjustments.

Strowig said Rep. William Bunten,
R-Topeka, chairman of the House
Reapportionment Committee, had
traveled to Oklahoma to visit federal
census officials concerning the
availability of detailed census in-
formation.

Strowig said it appears that the
Legislature will have figures that
could be used in congressional
redistricting, where county lines
would be followed for the most part.

But he said it appears that in-
formation on population by

precincts and wards, needed for
drawing the districts for the Kansas
House of Representatives, won't be
available in time for action by the
1971 session.

He said that as a result, the House
committee under Bunten, and the
senate Apportionment Committee,
headed by Sen. Jack Robinson,
Wichita, probably will conduct
studies to set the stage for
legislative reapportionment by the
1972 legislative session.

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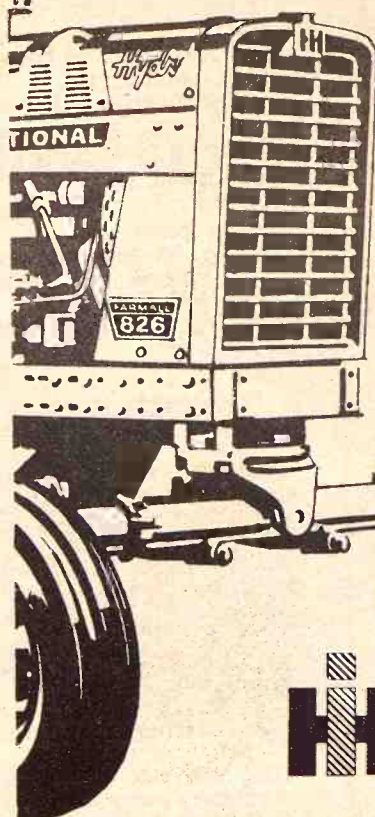
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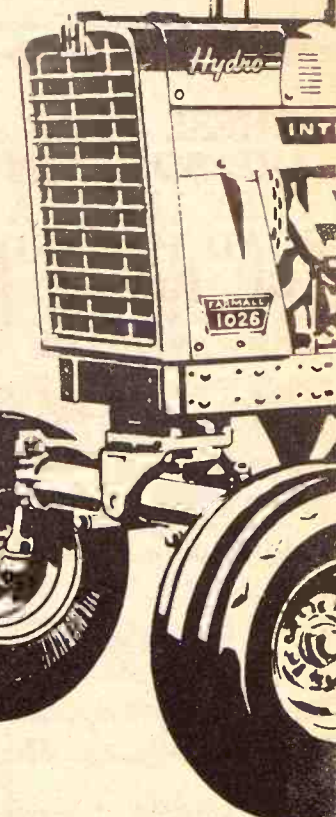

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Average Kansas Farm Now 580 Acres

The number of farms in Kansas decreased slightly to 86,000 for 1971, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Farm numbers are 1000 less than the revised estimate of 87,000 in 1970 and one-fifth fewer than 10 years ago.

Farm numbers have declined

steadily since 1935 when they were slightly more than double the present number.

The average size of farms in 1971 is 580 acres compared with 575 in 1970. The average farm size has more than doubled since 1935 when it averaged 274 acres.

United States

A total of 2,876,310 farms are expected to be operating in the United States in 1971. This is about 2 percent less than 1970.

The 1971 preliminary estimate of

land in farms is 1,117,835,000 acres, nearly 3 million acres less than 1970.

The past decade saw a 26 percent decline in number of farms while only a 5 percent drop was recorded in land in farms.

These changes are associated with a 29 percent increase in the average size of farms.

The constant disappearance of small farms along with larger unit mergers into more efficient operations has contributed most to

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Limit On Diverting Poor Land Meets Opposition

Strong protests by farmers in the Great Plains and the Southeast may force Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin to rescind a new regulation which would end diversion of marginal or "junk" land on which producers have been receiving government payments.

The little publicized provision in the 1970 Agriculture Act requires that farmers must have planted on their diverted acreage at least once in the past three years in order to participate and receive government subsidies.

Some feed grain farmers in the Great Plains are particularly upset by the regulation and have been complaining to USDA and national farm organizations. They maintain the provision will represent a hardship for them.

The amount of junk land which is economically not feasible to plant is largest in the plains, although a considerable amount of marginal acreage exists in the southeast where small cotton farmers would be most affected, a USDA spokesman said.

The objectives of the new regulation are twofold — to avoid criticism from congressmen and the public pointing to unprofitable farm subsidies and to equalize the diversion situation among all farmers.

"We want to be assured that land set aside is capable of producing crops and normally has been producing crops in past years," ASCS spokesman said. "The practice of diverting marginal land has existed for a long time and has long been recognized as a potential weakness in farm programs," he added.

Reuben Johnson of the National Farmers Union said protest against the regulation is only another indication that the administration is going to have difficulty operating a new farm program to get a supply and demand balance.

An American Farm Bureau spokesman noted some state Farm bureaus are strongly behind the provision, while others oppose it, their position depending on local geographic conditions and how individual farmers are affected.

Guardships will occur where land on small farms now in grass would be used for crops.

have to be plowed up and planted to count as diverted acreage, the AFB official said.

The new regulation and the protests against it leave several questions unanswered. The first is can Secretary Hardin withstand the pressures of the few and increase USDA's credibility in the public eye.

Perhaps the most important question is how the regulation will affect the already clouded crop picture for 1971. Some 2.5 million farmers signed up for government programs in 1970, but no one at USDA will estimate how many will have to change their planting practices as a result of the regulation.

Weldon Quenzer, Pra-Gress president, said Rodger Woolley will continue as general manager at Osborne. He said additional equipment should be operating by Feb. 1.

Better Corn Found In Mexico

Dr. Norman Borlaug, winner of the 1970 Nobel Peace Prize, says a new type of corn "that will revolutionize production systems" has been discovered.

Dr. Borlaug, a U.S. agricultural

scientist, has developed wheat strains in Mexico that have been shipped to various countries to stem famine. His wheat development has been labeled the "green revolution."

He said the new corn has a great resistance and can yield bigger crops. He will lecture on the discovery at local and foreign universities in the near future.

The Whirlpool Corp. says its whirl into home-sized central gas air-conditioners put a \$11.5 million loss on the company record in 1970. The company said it wasn't producing the units anymore until engineers could get performance standards up.

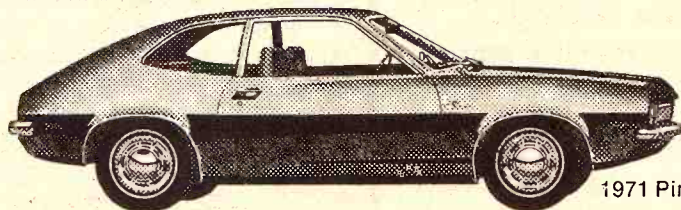

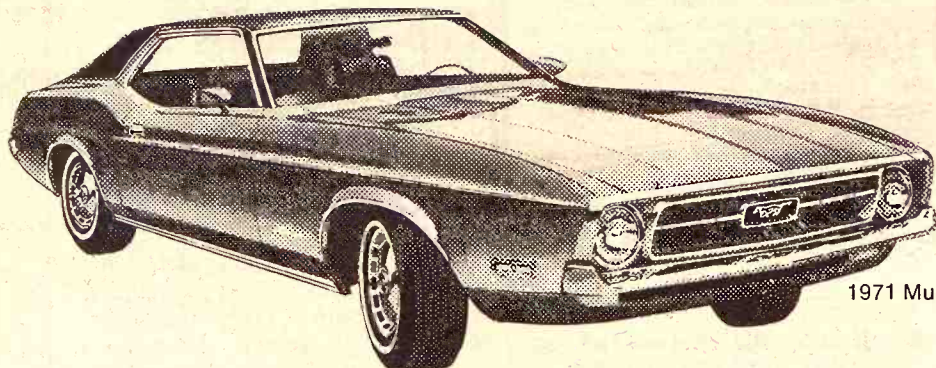

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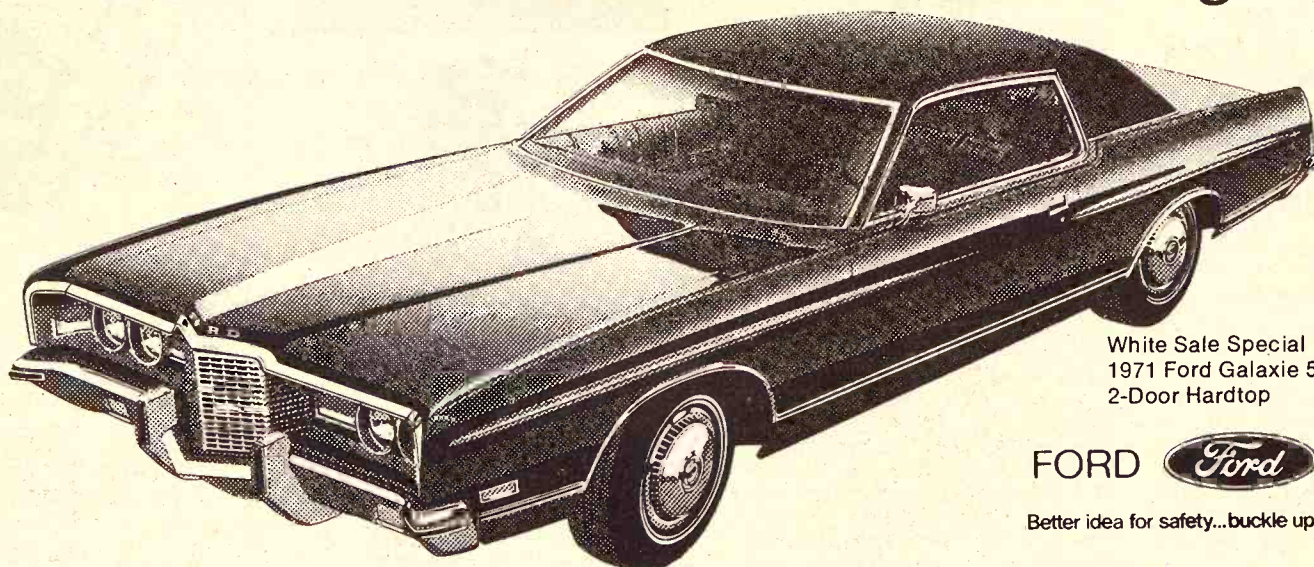

Teacher Surplus Now Over 1500

After years of political rhetoric and media reporting that education in the state of Kansas was suffering from a lack of teachers, the state is now finding itself glutted with college graduates in the teaching occupations.

During the last three years, teaching vacancies in the state have decreased from 723 in 1967 to only 161 in the fall of 1970, said Floyd Herr of the State Department of Education.

Herr said the supply-demand survey taken last year revealed a statewide teacher surplus of more than 1500 teachers.

Elementary and secondary teachers, social science teachers, English and life scientists are in overabundance now, and will probably continue to be in excess during the 1970's, Herr said.

Herr said that although the immediate future looks bleak for teachers desiring work in the more desirable or "plushy" areas of teaching, there will still be a shortage of special education, vocational or technical teachers, and teachers who desire to teach in low income or rural areas.

"We've had a surplus in men's physical education and social

science teachers for years," Herr said. "But students still drift toward these areas. I guess they think the surplus won't affect them or they will be one of the chosen few."

The nation's colleges and universities are turning out record numbers of graduates and are expected to continue to do so throughout the 70's, stated a report by the National Consumer Finance Assn.

The number of persons earning a bachelor's degree will climb by two-thirds, and those earning master's and doctor's degrees will double by 1980.

Herr said the economy has influenced the teacher surplus this year. In previous years, industry was a strong competitor for college graduates. But with the slowdown in industry, companies have laid off many employees who have returned to teach, and recruiting competition is greatly decreased.

"Before, industry was willing to offer graduates several thousand more a year than they could get teaching," Herr said. "They just weren't out there bidding that way this year."

Herr said the new improved teacher retirement plan has induced many older teachers to continue teaching this year in order to qualify for the new plan.

Dr. Melvin Neely, executive secretary of the Kansas National Education Assn., said he thinks the surplus of teachers in Kansas provides an opportunity to upgrade teacher performance in Kansas.

"I'd like to see colleges and universities do a better job of screening teacher applicants, so not everyone who wants to enter the profession can get an education degree," he said.

Dr. Neely said the surplus also can allow districts to be more selective when hiring teachers to get the best quality teacher for the education dollar.

Capital Gains Favor In Most Farm Sales

The sale of most farm property will still result in favorable capital gain tax treatment, but, under the Tax Reform Act of 1969, part of the profit from sale of farm land might be ordinary income, Harry F. Schrieber, IRS district director for Kansas said.

The law allows a current deduc-

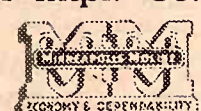

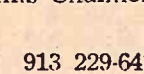
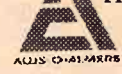

Aim For Calendar Speedup In Legislature

An innovation in consideration of noncontroversial bills is under consideration of the Kansas House of Representatives.

Speaker Calvin Strowig, R-Abilene, told a meeting of House committee chairmen and vice chairmen about a "consent calendar."

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Call It ACP or REAP — Kansas Gets \$4.8 Million

Kansas was allocated \$4,887,000 by the Department of Agriculture in its Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP), to help farmers launch this year a major attack on pollution and to carry out conservation practices.

The new REAP program, formerly known as the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) was announced Jan. 6.

The program will be administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) through its farmer-elected committee system.

The department said area workshops will be conducted this month by Washington-based ASCS officials to acquaint state officials of the agency with guidelines and provisions of the new programs.

In the new government cost-sharing program, emphasis will be placed on long-range preservation of the environment and on practices that will return more benefit to the public at less cost to the taxpayer, the department spokesman said.

A major priority will be to reduce water pollution, the department said, with water retaining and retarding measures on farms such as dams, ponds, permanent grass cover, waterways, buffer strips and tree plantings.

More Freedom In New Wheat Plan

Wheat producers who choose to take part in the 1971 voluntary wheat program will have considerably more freedom in planning their farm operations than they've had in the past.

Under the 1971 wheat program, which was authorized by the Agricultural Act of 1970, wheat growers will receive allotments based on a national domestic wheat allotment of 19.7 million acres.

However, 1971 farm wheat allotments will be used only to determine acres to be set aside on each farm and the amount of payment a producer may receive under the wheat program.

Unlike previous years, the allotments will not determine the amount of wheat to be grown on a farm. Wheat producers are no longer required to plant wheat in order to qualify for program benefits. The wheat allotment does not restrict a producer to a set number of acres of wheat, nor does it indicate to him what crop or crops he must or should plant.

The general outline of the new wheat program has already been announced, and full information on

all provisions is expected before March 1, when program signup begins.

Every effort will be made to see that all farmers are fully informed about the new farm program. Farmer meetings are planned; newsletters and other material will be mailed to producers, and additional press releases will be issued.

Here is a summary of the 1971 voluntary wheat program:

- Signup period will be March 1 through April 9 at county ASCS offices, with the program open to all producers with farms having wheat allotments. A producer may sign up one or more farms in which he has an interest and not sign up others, as he chooses.
- When a producer signs up, he agrees to set aside an acreage to be put in conserving uses. He also agrees to maintain his farm's conserving base. The set-aside percentage will be between 60 and 75 percent of the domestic wheat allotment.
- The actual set-aside percentage, to be announced before signup begins, will not exceed 75 percent.

• By participating in the program, a producer becomes eligible for price-support loans on his entire wheat production and domestic marketing certificates on the projected production of the farm domestic allotment acreage.

• While it is not necessary for a grower to plant wheat in order to earn a payment, if he fails to plant at least 90 percent of his domestic allotment to wheat or an authorized substitute, he may have his 1972 allotment reduced as much as 20 percent. If no wheat is planted for three consecutive years, the entire allotment can be lost.

• Producers participating in the 1971 wheat program will receive 100 percent of parity on the production of their full domestic allotment.

• Face value of the certificates will be the difference between 100 percent of parity on July 1, 1971, and the national average wheat price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year.

• Preliminary payments to farmers will be made as soon as practicable after July 1, 1971. These will be equal to 75 percent of the estimate of the total payments to be

made.

• The balance of the payment, if any, will be made after December 1, 1971. If the estimated preliminary payment is found to be too high, no refund by producers will be required.

• Price-support loans will be available to program participants at \$1.25 a bushel, national average.

• Substitution will be allowed for wheat and feed grains. A producer with a wheat allotment and a feed grain base can plant his eligible cropland acreage to wheat or feed grains without loss of history, and will receive both wheat certificates and feed grain payments.

• He must meet the set-aside requirements for both programs and must maintain his farm's conserving base, as well as sign up for both programs.

Other provisions of the 1971 voluntary wheat program relate to set-aside on summer fallow farms, use of set-aside acres, land eligible for set-aside, types of conserving uses, payment limitation of \$55,000 a person, and various regulations on program participation.

Seedgrowers Smart Under Mercury Contamination Reports

The ban on use of mercury treated seed and federal regulations designed to protect seed varieties are causing consternation among seed growers.

"Those reports have been terribly exaggerated," Claude L. King, plant pathology Extension Specialist from KSU told the approximately 40 Kansas Crop Improvement Association members who remained for Friday afternoon's session of the annual meeting.

King said television reports of mercury poisoning and contamination of the environment were fluff out of proportion, claiming there had been only five deaths to mercury seed used in 60 years.

"Mercury treated seed used for years would only put into the

ground one ounce per acre," he said. "Rain water has mercury in it. Mercury is a natural volatile in the soil."

He said lead poisoning from paint chips caused more deaths yearly than mercury. Until a few years ago paint on houses contaminated the atmosphere more than mercury, but no one raised a howl about it.

"The farmers haven't contaminated the earth yet," he said. His farm listeners broke into laughter.

Federal regulations signed into law by President Nixon also are causing seed growers problems. The law requires certified seed, if covered by the variety act, to be identified only as "wheat variety unknown" unless specific requirements are met.

On another subject, King warned there was a possibility that the corn blight which hit the Middle West last year may strike Kansas' 1971 corn crop.

He said that in July and August of 1970, there had been no reports of corn blight in Kansas, but after the September rains, blight appeared in fields along the Missouri River from St. Joe to Kansas City. Three fields affected with blight were reported around Beloit. A possible blight invasion — laboratory tests were unable to confirm it — was found in the Garden City area.

"The dry air in Kansas may keep the problem reduced," he added.

Pearson Sees Hope For Rural Development

Sen. James B. Pearson says he expects President Nixon's administration to take the lead in legislation for rural development, and predicted Congress will enact several major rural community development programs within the next two years.

In remarks prepared for a luncheon meeting with businessmen at Wellington, Kansas' senior senator said, "This leadership from the

White House will be an enormous help in focusing the national attention on the need for rural development and for speeding up the enactment of legislation."

Pearson said awareness is growing among those in Congress over problems facing rural areas of the United States. He cited a new provision written into the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1970 establishing a program to demonstrate the "role that highways can play revitalizing rural areas, dispersing economic growth, and slowing migration to the cities."

Pearson said he will re-introduce his rural job development and rural community development bank skills when the 92nd Congress convenes later this month.

"We simply must reverse this trend of depopulating the rural areas and overpopulating the metropolitan centers," Pearson said. "Too many of our cities are overcrowded, while too many of our rural areas are underdeveloped. This imbalance in the distribution of our population has contributed to many of our social and economic ills."

That's U.S. Food In Japan's Diet

The Agriculture department said startling diet changes in Japan the past 20 years are most responsible for that country emerging as the biggest foreign customer of American farmers.

Economic take-off beginning in the early 1950's meant dramatic rises in Japanese living standards and shifts away from rice as the traditional food staple.

The analysis of Japan's dietary patterns and what the changes mean to U.S. farm experts is in a report by Leon G. Mears, assistant U.S. agricultural attache, who is stationed in Tokyo. Last fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, U.S. farm exports to Japan totaled 1.1 billion dollars, the most on record to a single country. The outlook continues bright, officials say.

In turning from rice, modern Japanese families now are large consumers of meat, poultry and dairy products. Rice still is important but dropped last year to a per capita consumption of 213 pounds, nearly 100 fewer than the Japanese ate half a century ago. Mears says that wheat products, including bread, noodles, spaghetti and similar items have replaced much of the rice market.

Part of the reason for wheat and other new products now being favored, Mears said, can be attributed to school lunch programs being set up after World War II. Promotion by U.S. farm-sponsored wheat groups also was effective.

Over-all, Mears said, the average Japanese is now consuming about

2½ times as many calories from animal products as he did 10 years ago. For example in 1960, the average Japanese ate 102 eggs. Last year, Mears said, per capita egg consumption was 269 and is still rising.

Poultry meat, particularly broilers, has a large growth potential, Mears said. About two-thirds of the 322 million dollars worth of U.S. feed grains bought by Japan last year went into egg and broiler production.

Soybeans are historical and popular sources of food in Japan, the largest single overseas market for the U.S. crop. Exports totaled 251 million dollars last fiscal year.

The impact of the dietary changes has been significant in other ways, Mears said. Japanese children today are taller and somewhat heavier than their parents at the same age.

Consumption of animal products and fats and oils is expanding at a rapid rate, Mears said. All of which means that American farmers have a growing stake in Japan as a cash market for their wares.

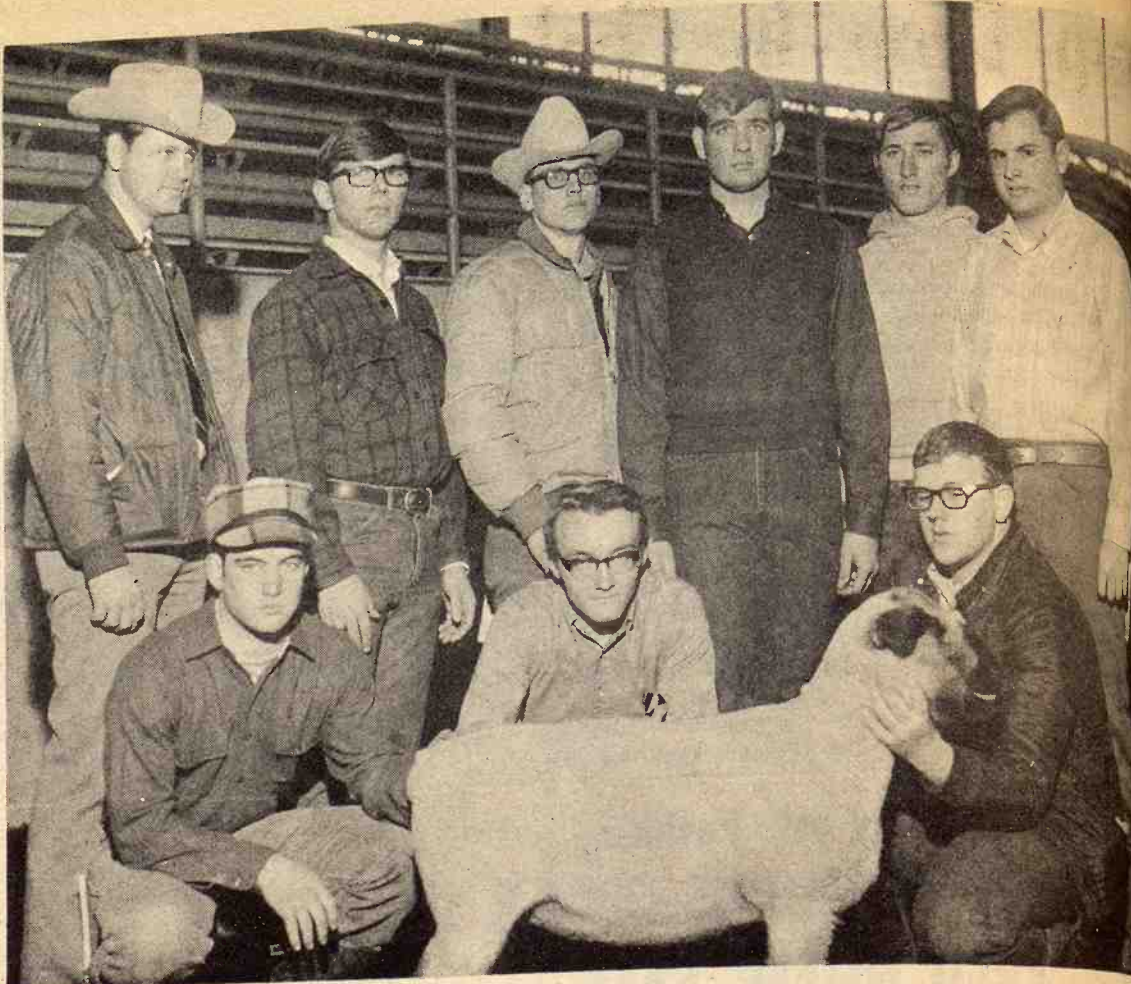
No Name On Phillips Stations

Sharp Drop In Cholera

The Agriculture Department says marketing controls for swine among the reasons last year sharp reduction in hog cholera.

There were only 679 confirmed cases of hog cholera in calendar 1970, Dr. R. S. Sharman, director of animal health, reported, Monday compared with 1481 in 1969.

Dr. Sharman said in a year-end report, there has been "significant progress" in eliminating the disease from the United States.

There was no estimate on the number of head involved in the control program last year. For the eradication program a "herd means a herd of swine," a spokesman for the Agricultural Research Service said.

Most important, the official said, is that the incidence of hog cholera sharply reduced during the final months of 1970 and that infections point to a further reduction next year.

During the last six months of 1970,

the ARS said, some 318 herds were infected. This compares with the July-December total of 870 cases in 1969.

Hog cholera eradication efforts on a federal-state cooperative basis started nationally in 1962. The 1970 report said only 25 cases were reported in December, the least on record for the month.

Before the national eradication program was started, between 5000 and 6000 herds a year were infected with hog cholera.

As of Jan. 1, the report said, 48 states and Puerto Rico were in the final phases of the eradication program, including 17 which have been declared "hog cholera free" and 16 now in the fourth or "stamping out" phase.

Sharman said that besides tighter marketing controls for interstate shipments of swine, a growing number of states have required on-farm inspection and identification of feeder pigs and breeding stock as a condition of moving them out of an

area.

Sharman warned, however, that farmers and health authorities should not relax their vigilance if they expect to eliminate the disease entirely.

Ag Experiment Stations Face Fund Shortage

For the first time in a quarter of a century the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, along with all state colleges and universities and other state agencies, is faced with a serious shortage of funds, Dr. Floyd W. Smith, station director, said at the opening session of the three-day annual experiment station conference which began Monday at Kansas State University.

"We must close out all research projects that cannot be related to the economic development of Kansas or to the improved well-being of Kansas people," Smith told some 300 scientists and administrators attending the conference.

Although funds requested for new research projects have been recommended for deletion from the state budget, Smith said he is optimistic that some of the funds will be restored prior to or during the 1971 session of the legislature.

"We have had hard times previously, and have demonstrated our value to Kansas," he told the researchers who represent all areas of the state. Smith then cited results of research of 1970 as examples of work that merit continued support of research. Among the examples were the discovery of a method of enriching bread "that should help Kansas and people in all developing countries"; the development of a system to evaluate quality in wheat; studies on consumer preferences for frozen meats which will benefit both consumers and producers of meat; a new variety of wheat that will make Kansas more competitive with its No. 1 crop; the release of two new watermelons (Petite and Super-sweet) that meet consumers' preferences; the release of Barton, a superior western wheatgrass; a new variety of oats; an inbred, high-lysine corn; the development of a potential new alfalfa variety; work with the rural disadvantaged; national leadership in research on waste disposal from feedlots; new methods of processing grain at the Garden City branch station; new feeding programs that reduce salt content of livestock and feed thereby avoiding soil sterilization by livestock wastes; a method to reduce the cholesterol content of eggs; and discovery of a method to diagnose pancreatic disease.

Smith said such good work had assured support for research by the Kansas legislature in the past.

He pointed out that the new federal census shows that Kansas did not lose another U.S. representative "as so many predicted." Not all of western Kansas continued its projected loss in population, he added. And, in most instances, Smith observed, counties where populations increased either contained a branch of the experiment station or one of its outlying fields.

34 Cotton Farmers Find Ways to Avoid Subsidy Limits

Under the allotment system, instituted after cotton production exceeded market demands, the Government limits the acreage a producer can plant to cotton in return for price support payments. In past years, there wasn't any limit on the amount of Federal price support money an individual grower could receive for cotton grown on allotted acreage.

Under the new ceiling, an individual producer can't receive more than \$55,000, regardless of the amount of allotted acreage of cotton he has under cultivation.

The small grower renting an allotment will have to grow the cotton on his own land or lease land to grow it on.

Frank C. Zabaldano, manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Fresno, in the heart of the San Joaquin Valley — where cotton is a \$160 million annual crop — said he believes a number of large growers will rent their allotments.

"We've received a couple of tentative rental agreements, but most won't come in until after the cotton allotments are given individual farmers later this week," he said. James Camp, president of S. A. Camp Co. of Bakersfield, spoke enthusiastically of the leasing.

"This is working out a helluva lot better than we thought it would," said Mr. Camp, whose farm drew \$902,000 in federal subsidy payments last year. He said his company is renting about 9000 acres of cotton for cash, adding that demand for the leases exceeded the supply.

The two largest 1970 subsidy recipients were J. G. Boswell Co. of Kings County, which got \$4.4 million, the nation's largest payment, and Corcoran, Giffin, Inc. of Fresno County, which received \$3.3 million.

Under the old price support program, farmers were paid 16 cents a pound of cotton on 65 percent of their allotted acreage. There wasn't any ceiling.

This year the subsidy is 15 cents a pound on 67.5 percent of allotted acreage. The Agriculture Department is authorized to set the acreage allotment and price per pound annually at a level that it determines is needed to assure domestic producers a profit for their crop on the world market.

Congress enacted the \$55,000 lid on payments to any one producer after complaints that unlimited payments benefited the rich farmer at the expense of the poor or marginal operator. There were predictions the ceiling would mean a drastic drop in the San Joaquin Valley's cotton crop this year.

But Dick Markarian, chairman of the Fresno County Farm Bureau's cotton department, and others now believe 1971 plantings will be higher than usual.

The overall effect of the allotment rentals would be to increase the amount of subsidies paid farmers who were well below the \$55,000 figure last year. Each producer renting an allotment could qualify for the maximum \$55,000, depending on the amount of acreage he cultivates.

Initially it was estimated the ceiling would save \$58 million to \$171 million nationally in federal subsidy payments. But projected savings definitely will be less than anticipated, said Lee Sidell, state executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and conservation service, "but we don't know by how much."

Without the subsidy ceiling there have been some rentals of cotton acreage allotments in the past by growers who decided not to plant on some acreage for which subsidies had been approved.



BUFFALO RANCHER

Jefferson county cattle breeder D. L. Wallace has turned part of his farm over to raising buffalo for butchering. Wallace said buffalo meat costs about twice as much as beef because of its scarcity and the trouble of raising the animals, but that the taste is worth the price.

Wallace's farm is between Winchester and Leavenworth. He keeps 35 head of buffalo. He lets them graze like cattle, then puts them in the feedlot for five months before slaughter.

A major outlet for the buffalo meat is at the Savory Grill in Kansas City.
