


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Editorial

48th Held Honors For Kansans

Star Farmer of America, Central Regional Vice President, and National Winners in Poultry judging were three of the major accomplishments for Kansas FFA at the 48th National FFA Convention in Kansas City.

Dan Worcester, Hill City, became the third Kansan to capture the coveted Star Farmer of America Award since Jim Jarnigan, Jetmore, in 1957. Dan's livestock and crop operation won him a total of \$1,000.00 cash awards from the National FFA Foundation, Incorporated.

Ron Wilson, Manhattan, was named to the National Office of Central Region Vice President. Ron is the seventh Kansas FFA member to be named to a national officer position.

The Hillsboro Chapter captured top honors in the National Poultry Judging Contest, with Lynn Bartel placing second high and Joel Suderman placing fourth high in individual honors.

Jay Mayfield, State President from Caney, and Mark Scanlon, State Secretary from Abilene, served as official delegates to the convention. The 48th National Convention set a record of over 20,000 FFA members and guests

Other awards won by Kansans included twelve American Farmer Degree recipients, two Honorary American Farmers, seven chapters won National Chapter Award Programs, two chapters in National FFA Safety, and three in the National BOAC program.

Kansas had three members in the National FFA Band and four in the National FFA Chorus.

Jeff Stroup from the Prairie View chapter represented the Central Region in the National Livestock Proficiency Award. The National award was won by the Southern Region.

Highlight speakers at the National Convention included Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller, Cincinnati Reds Catcher, Johnny Bench, Colonel Sanders, former Texas Governor John Connelly, and Presidential Candidate, Jimmy Carter from Georgia.

Kansans In National Band And Chorus

Seven FFA members from across Kansas participated in the mail order chorus or band at the 48th National FFA convention in Kansas City.

Three members participated in the 114 piece National Band, directed by Roger Heath of VPI in Blacksburg, Virginia. Cindy Bailey, Sabetha, played the alto sax; Brenda Hundley, Seaman, clarinet and Joleen Raab, Seaman, the flute.

Roger Barragar, Labette County; John Greathouse, Paola; Rebecca Taylor, Paola; and Johnny Zeltwanger, Troy participated in the 99 voice National FFA chorus. The chorus was directed by Marvin Myers, a retired member of the Purdue University Musical Organization.

National Chapter Awards

Norton, Arkansas City and Atchison County each were awarded Gold Emblem ratings for their activities in the National Chapter Award program.

Sabetha and Mission Valley both received Silver Emblem ratings while Smith Center and Paola each received Bronze Emblems. These chapters were the top seven in Kansas for 1975.

The National Chapter Award program recognizes chapters which carry out activities in an organized fashion and which help the chapter members to accomplish the goal of preparation for an occupation in agriculture.

All chapters in Kansas may receive the Superior Chapter Award, but only 10% of those superior chapters may compete on the National Level.

Preparing For 50th National Convention


The National FFA Alumni are preparing to participate in the 50th Annual National FFA Convention through a unique and interesting manner. They title their project "Down Memory Lane".

Ron Wilson from the Manhattan Chapter, 1973-74 Kansas FFA President, became the seventh Kansan to be elected to the coveted title of National Officer in the FFA. Ron's office is that of Vice President from the Central Region and he will serve through the 49th National Convention, along with his five fellow officers.

Ron's farming program included beef, pork, and crops; the program being operated on the farm of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. John Wilson. Ron's vocational agriculture instructor in high school was Stan Bartel.

Before becoming President of the Kansas FFA, Ron served as the Manhattan Chapter Reporter and President and was North Central District Vice President. He won the State Agricultural Newswriting Contest and placed second in state Public Speaking competition. Ron was also active in judging contests on the district, state and national level.

Now a junior in Agricultural Education at Kansas State University, Ron is active in campus activities. He is an Ag. Ambassador and a member of the Student Senate and Ag. Student Council. Ron is also an active member of Farmhouse Fraternity and Alpha Tau Alpha.

Worcester Star Farmer of America

Star Farmer of America was a goal in Dan Worcester's mind for many years and his goal was achieved at the 48th National Convention. Dan became the third Kansan to receive this award, being preceded by Paul Leck from Washington Chapter in 1935 and Jim Jarnigan from the Jetmore Chapter in 1957.

Dan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Worcester, graduated from Hill City High School in 1972. He operates his own farm having recently purchased 320 acres on which he raises dryland and irrigated wheat and corn. His beef herd includes 70 brood cows and he feeds out several hundred hogs each year.

"I have expanded my cattle operation each year," says Dan, explaining that the cows run on 160 acres of rented pasture and 155 acres of his own pasture land. In addition they get stover from his 260 acres of irrigated corn. He is particularly pleased with his breeding program which last year combined heat sychronization with artificial insemination for a 98 percent live calf crop in a 30-day period.

Dan started his crop program by renting five acres of land from his father. That first five acre crop was milo but since then he has expanded his crops to include 65 acres of dryland wheat, 130 acres of irrigated corn and 150 acres of irrigated wheat. Dan owns 320 acres and rents 480 acres. He and his wife, Sue, plan to build a home on the 320 acres owned.

All innovative farmer, Dan is always the first in the

community to try new ideas. "He was the first in the community to use low pressure sprinkler nozzles on his irrigation system to cut power needed for pumping," says Joe Farrell, Dan's vocational agriculture instructor. "He was also the first to seed wheat by plane in irrigated corn in order to eliminate the shatter cane problem in corn without the loss of a crop.

One of a family of farmers, Dan often finds himself involved in the family farming operation. On his own farm, Dan will have four center pivot sprinkler systems in operation, while his father and brother are operating eight center pivot systems this year. Dan's father is also a dealer for a center pivot irrigation company and since Dan has a pilot's license, he is often called on to fly to the factory 300 miles away for emergency parts or to show prospective customers the systems being manufactured.

"I've always enjoyed farming and I particularly enjoyed my experiences in vocational agriculture and the FFA," says Dan. During the four years he was in high school, Dan served as president of the junior FFA Chapter and was vice president and reporter of the senior chapter. He was State Parliamentarian and his team placed first and second in the two years of competition at the State Parliamentary Procedure Contest. He earned FFA Foundation Proficiency Awards at the state level in Livestock Production and in Crop Production.

Dan is also involved in many other activities outside the FFA including the church, farm organizations, and the 4-H club. He was also captain of the school basketball team.

The Norton Chapter was awarded the National Silver Emblem for their com-


munity safety activities.

All chapters in Kansas are eligible for the Superior Safety Chapter Award, but only 10% of the Superior Safety Chapters can compete on the National level.



French Firm to Sponsor Travel In France for FFA Award Winners

ALEXANDRIA, VA.—The Future Farmers of America signed an agreement today with the French livestock import/export Corporation CoFRAN-IMEX, which will provide an expense paid month long tour of French beef and sheep farms for two National FFA award winners. The memorandum of understanding signed by CoFRANI-MEX General Manager René Breton and National FFA Executive Secretary Wm. Paul Gray provides for an expense paid tour of French farms and research stations for the National FFA Beef Production Award winner Terry Bullis, 20, of Mariposa, California, and for the National FFA Sheep Production Award winner Brad D. Myers, 19, of Renville, Minnesota.

This is the first time the FFA has cooperated with CoFRANIMEX to provide international travel for FFA award winners. The four week tour beginning March 1 will include full round trip airfare from Washington, D.C. to Paris and expense paid travel throughout France. During the first week of the program Bullis and Myers will be guests of the Blonde d'Aquitaine Breed Association and will travel to the INRA Zootechnic research stations in Jouy en Josas and Ramboullet. They will also visit several top Blond d'Aquitaine breeders in the vicinity of Paris. During the second week Bullis and Myers will have guest tickets to all exhibits at the Paris International Agricultural Show, one of the largest livestock and agricultural equipment shows in Europe. The final two weeks will be spent touring France and visiting many top French sheep and beef breeders.

FFA members Myers and Bullis were named national winners of the Sheep and Beef Production Proficiency Awards at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, last November. The Beef Production Proficiency Award is co-sponsored through the National FFA Foundation by NASCO of Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin, and Sperry New Holland of New Holland, Pennsylvania. The Sheep

Production Proficiency Award is sponsored by the National FFA Foundation General Fund.

Myers is the son of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy Myers and his vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor at Danube Public High School is Glen S. Christiansen. Bullis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Angus Bullis. His vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor at Mariposa County High School is Alton L. McRae.

As part of the agreement with Co-FRANIMEX, Myers and Bullis will be accompanied on their travels by National FFA Director of Information, Dan Reuwee, whose expenses are also being paid by CoFRANIMEX. Reuwee will be reporting on their activities during the month tour of French agriculture.

HONORARY AMERICAN FARMERS


