MINI-TOUR MAPS TO DOT AREA

ELLSWORTH — Tourists crossing Kansas on Interstate 70 are being invited to see points of natural and historic interest by a series of large, colorful maps recently installed in rest areas along the route. Describing "mini-tours" of the adjacent areas, the maps are placed in attractive shelters constructed by the Kansas Highway Commission. First of the "Mini-Tour Maps" has proved highly successful at the Ellsworth rest stop. The tours, planned by the tourist division of the Kansas Department of Economic Development, guide travelers to points of interest on circle tours north and south of the high-speed highway.

The pilot project lists circle tours of less than 100 miles and has proved so successful that additional maps will be installed in other I-70 rest areas prior to the 1970 travel season, according to State officials.

Both John Montgomery, director of the Highway Commission, and Jack Lacy, director of the Department of Economic Development, have concurred that the Kansas plan of "mini-tours" will serve to slow down the cross-state traveler, allowing the tourist to see first hand the heritage of Kansas and the west.

The Kansas rest areas have been declared the finest to be found along the nationwide system of Interstate highways. With thousands of visitors pausing at the rest stops, surveys have indicated that a significant percentage will take extra time for a circle tour, if they have maps and information pertaining to the immediate vicinity. Printed maps of each of the proposed "mini-tours" are to be included in the program for the 1970 season.

Ford Narrows Warranty

In a sharp departure from usual industry practice, Ford Motor Co. simplified and rolled back the warranty coverage it will offer its auto customers beginning with the 1970 models.

The move was immediately interpreted by auto-industry analysts as the first clear-cut bid by any auto maker to increase the price of its 1970 models. The cost of servicing warranties is considered a major factor in any U.S.-built car. Thus, a cutback on warranties is seen as a direct cost savings to the manufacturer.

According to its announcement, Ford will no longer offer a five-year or 50,000-mile warranty on the power train in its cars. Instead, it will give a flat 12-month warranty on all factory caused defects in the car regardless of mileage. Also, during the first 90 days after purchase, Ford and its dealers will make adjustments and provide services, other than scheduled-period maintenance, without charge.

The move apparently caught the other auto makers by surprise. Typically, any changes in warranty are announced shortly before new models go on sale and at the same time that prices are announced. "I don't understand why they decided to announce so early," remarked an official of another auto maker.

But the sentiment within the auto industry is strongly in favor of such a move. In efforts to gain a competitive advantage in the market, auto companies steadily expanded their warranties since 1963 when Chrysler first offered a five-year or 50,000-mile warranty on its cars' power trains.

Last year the industry re-

trenched somewhat, moving back from a two-year or 24,000-mile warranty on the whole car, plus the power-train warranty, to a one-year or 12,000-mile warranty on the whole car plus the power-train warranty. The power train consists of the engine, transmission and some other major parts. But this still left costs high and many dealers and customers at odds over precisely what repairs the warranties do cover.

Whether the Ford move will be followed by others is essentially up to General Motors Corp. As the large company sells better than half of all U. S.-made cars, it is the acknowledged price leader and, whatever pattern it sets is frequently followed by the others.

But at least some people feel GM may be tempted to follow this one for the cost advantages it offers. No one can be certain just how much the deletions are worth, but estimates indicate that they may save Ford as much as \$50 per car in the long run.

Auto companies consider warranty costs a competitive secret and, thus decline to disclose them. But there is little doubt that they are huge. According to a Federal Trade Commission report released late last year, GM spent \$43 a car on warranty expenses on its 1965 models from the time they were sold until December 1966. In the same period Ford spent an average of \$41 a car, Chrysler \$40 a car, and AMC \$44 a car.

Warranty costs continue to grow the longer the car is on the road and while it is still covered by the warranty. Last year a total of 9.6 million cars,

including imports, were sold in the U. S.

Some analysts, noting that size of the cutback, suggested that Ford's move might come under fire from Washington. But initial indications are that the FTC, which keeps a close eye on warranties, may be favorably inclined. For one matter, Ford has been in continuous contact with the FTC this year.

Moreover, some of the changes Ford made are in line with FTC suggestions. The FTC has been asking that warranties be simplified, which this move accomplishes. Furthermore, the new warranty is jointly backed by both Ford and the dealer who sells the car, instead of by Ford alone — as is the case with warranties that now are in effect.

Rice County Hires Outside Appraisers

LYONS — The J. M. Cleminshaw Company, has been hired by Rice County Commissioners to finish reappraisal of commercial properties in the county.

Charge for appraising the 400 commercial properties will be \$12,000.

The commission explained that it had been hoped to complete all reappraisal work using local appraisers.

However, illness among the appraisers has caused the work to fall behind schedule and the state property valuation department has been pressing the county to get the reappraisal finished in time to go on the 1970 tax rolls.

The Cleminshaw firm has agreed to have the commercial appraisal finished by April 15, 1970.

Export Certificate Too?

Representatives of the nation's wheat growers say they will support the present certificate-type wheat program, but will call for

an export certificate to bring the declining overseas prices of wheat to full parity.

Their stand will be presented in testimony before the U. S. House agriculture committee September 9.

The executive committee of the National Association of Wheat Growers, representing producers in 11 states, has concluded a 2-day meeting on their proposed testimony.

R. L. Hatcher, Lamar, Colo., president of the association, said the import of the testimony will be "support of the present certificate-type wheat program. The major departure is that we're calling for an export certificate."

The certificate program provides payments to producers to bring the price of their wheat to full parity.

"The domestic certificate has been the only bulwark holding the wheat grower's head above water, but even this is not sufficient to keep up with the cost-price squeeze we're facing," Hatcher said.

The producers also will ask that what they term discriminatory licensing requirements be removed.

Hatcher said of all commercial shipments going into the Soviet Union and other East European countries, only commercial wheat and grain shipments are required, under licensing regulations, to ship at least 50 per cent in American ships.

The President has the authority to lift the restriction and the association is asking him to take that action, he said.

Soil Mosaic Hit Hardest East Of Flint Hills

Soil-borne mosaic packed a \$1½ million wallop in Kansas this year.

This virus disease seemed to concentrate on farms in the south central and central part of Kansas, according to Claude L. King, Kansas State University Extension plant pathologist.

"The loss would be much greater if it were not for controls," King explained.

"The large loss occurring east of the Flint Hills in the past has been corrected in recent years by planting the highly resistant varieties Shawnee, Ottawa and Gage and by not planting wheat in infested soil."

The KSU specialist added that Gage and Shawnee are among the higher yield varieties in central and eastern Kansas, even when the mosaic virus is not in the soil.

The disease survives in the soil in spite of crop rotation. How it reaches a field for the first time is not known.

King explained that when soil is wet during most of the spring growing season and prolonged temperatures are favorable (from 40 to 60 degrees F.), wheat is injured considerably.

Mixed Results To India's Farm Plan

India's quiet green revolution may be turning into a red revolution — quiet or otherwise — as it becomes increasingly entangled in a ruthless struggle for political power.

The green revolution is the name given to a dramatic step-up in food grains output, through modern agricultural methods, to feed 530 million Indians. To many it represents India's last best hope of breaking through centuries of economic and social backwardness.

But it was proving a dangerous myth in some respects even before it got caught up in the current political fight revolving around Mrs. Indira Ghandi, prime minister. This has been admitted more by Indians, including Mrs. Ghandi, than by leaders of Western aid-giving nations.

For one thing, as the prime minister put it as early as last February, "the green revolution

has still to reach the small farmer . . . the new agricultural strategy has aggravated rural disparities."

For another, it is not producing as much food as was expected. Food grains output in the 1968-69 crop year was no higher, and probably lower, than the 97 million tons or so produced in 1967-68, which saw a 30 per cent leap during two previous drought years.

But it is already clear to agricultural authorities that future harvests will fall far short of the fourth 5-year plan target of 129 million tons in 1974.

More important, it appears doubtful that even minimal food self-sufficiency — 16 ounces of rice or other grain per adult per day but not a properly balanced diet — will be achieved by India in 1971.

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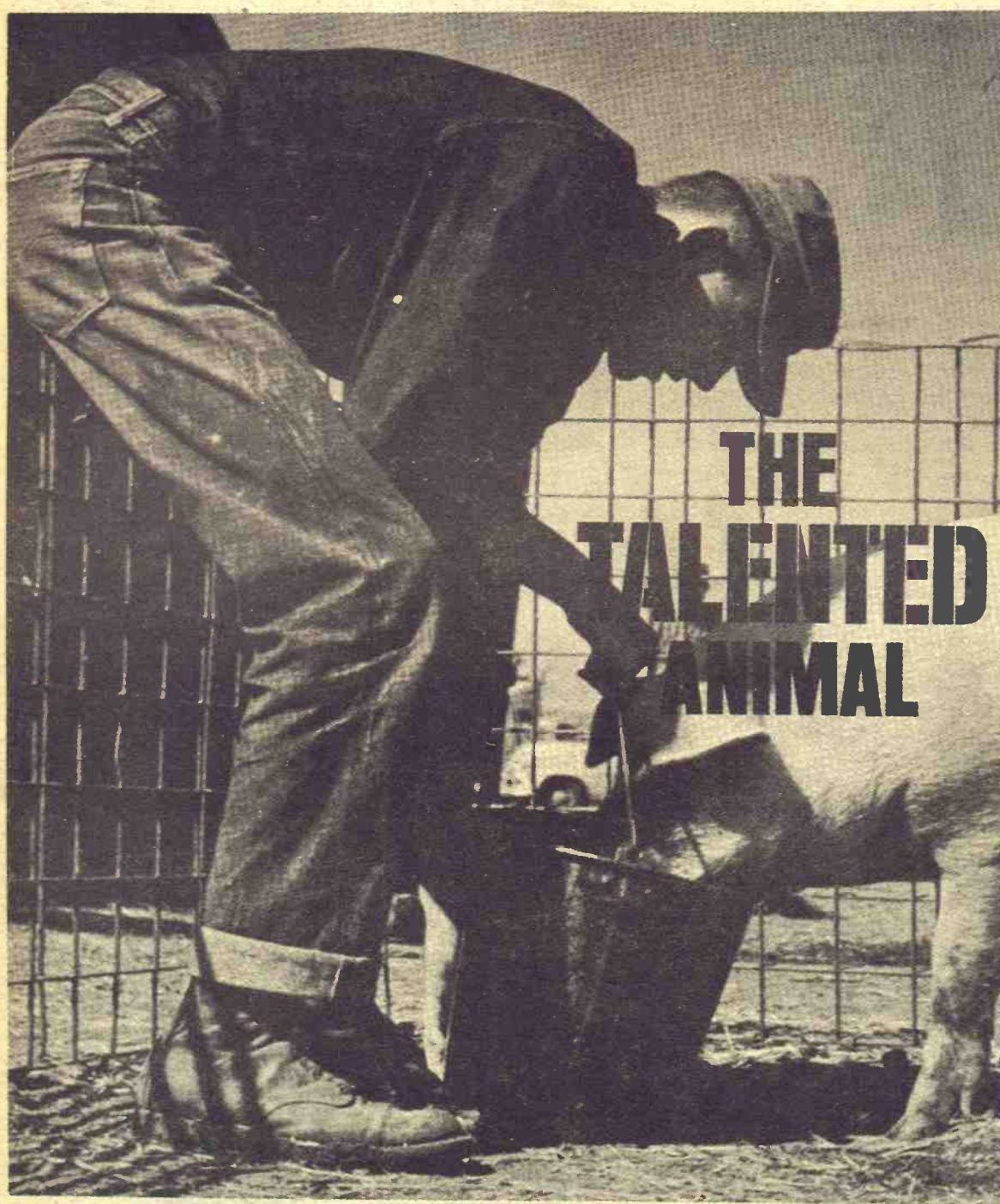
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This has long been the promised goal of both the new agricultural strategy at home and food-aid efforts by friendly foreign countries, particularly the United States and Canada.

Experts do not discount the successes; sharply increased yields, especially of wheat, through use of new varieties of seed on selected land; proof that Indian farmers are willing to respond to modern techniques and want to make profits; an end to rationing in most places and building up of buffer grain stocks.

But it has become a political challenge. And the stakes are high. Mrs. Ghandi, urged on by Communists and other leftist supporters, appears determined to keep raising them.

This process started with the first glimmer of prosperity in the barren Indian countryside in two decades of independence. Predictably, the gap between the haves and have-nots widened. A few rich farmers got richer and the mass of poor peasants and landless laborers stayed poor.

How poor is indicated by recent statistics showing that four-fifths of India's rural population — about 360 million people — spend less than one rupee or about 14 cents a day, and that half of India's children are undernourished.

The causes lie in lack of social reforms to underpin economic advances. A fair land-reform or credit system has never been established in India, and Hindu caste continues to determine largely what role a person plays in farm and village.

Richer, progressive farmers

are unhappy over new taxes on fertilizers and pumps, low government grain-procurement prices and general official interference. The Akali Dal, a Sikh party, came to power in the Punjab in state elections last February.

Poor peasants and landless laborers find themselves pushed to the wall by the green revolution. Output by the kulaks or rich peasants keeps down the prices the small land holders can get for their produce.

Wages generally remain low, but cost of the new seeds and fertilizers, as well as of the necessities of life, is constantly rising. In West Bengal, peasants for the first time joined city workers in voting Communist or for other leftist parties.

Revise Corn Guess Downward

How big is the corn crop? Many producers — and users — of corn would like to have an accurate answer to that question.

There are big differences of opinion concerning the size of the crop. Much of the difference depends upon where the farmer or other observer lives, or has traveled.

One day recently a grain marketing man told us that the USDA forecast of the corn crop was 100 million bushels too low. A few days later another observer assured us that the official estimate was 100 million bushels too high. Our first informant travels Illinois, while the second was from Iowa. In total, the crop prospect seems to be below normal.

Excessive rains. Large parts of Iowa, Missouri, and Wisconsin and smaller areas elsewhere suffered from too much rain. On the other hand, no large part of

the Corn Belt had severe drouth.

In early August a survey and report by the USDA forecast corn production at 4,310 million bushels, 1 per cent less than last year. The national average was forecast at 78.7 bushels per acre.

While the expected yield per acre is practically the same as in each of the two previous years, it is not a really good yield. In fact, it is well below the long-time trend for corn yields per acre.

Corn yields showed a strong upward trend from 1955 to 1967. The average increase was nearly 3 bushels per year. But at 78.7 bushels, the estimated yield for this year is no better than those of 1968 and 1967. In fact, it falls about 4 bushels below the 1955-1967 trend line.

While the national average yield was forecast the same as last year, individual states show large changes.

Illinois had too much rain in the northernmost counties and in some southern areas. And too little in a relatively small spot in the east-central part of the state. But the crop looks better than it did a year ago.

The USDA report, which was based on conditions as of August 1, forecast the average yield of corn in Illinois at 95 bushels per acre, up 6 bushels a year ago from the low yield of the previous year.

Indiana was credited with 94 bushels per acre, 9 bushels more than the poor yield in that state last year. Nebraska has a fine prospect for corn. The average yield was forecast at 86 bushels per acre, 13 bushels more than the good yield in 1968.

In Iowa poor corn in the central and northeastern counties more than offset good corn elsewhere. The average yield was projected at 84 bushels, 9 bushels less than the record yield of 1968.

Wisconsin and Missouri both have poor crops. The average yield for Wisconsin was forecast at only 78 bushels per acre, down 15 bushels from the bumper yield last year. The expected yield, for Missouri was only 69 bushels, down 14 bushels.

Minnesota reports fair corn, with a yield forecast at 75 bushels per acre, 6 bushels less than a year ago. Ohio showed 82 bushels, 2 bushels less than in 1968.

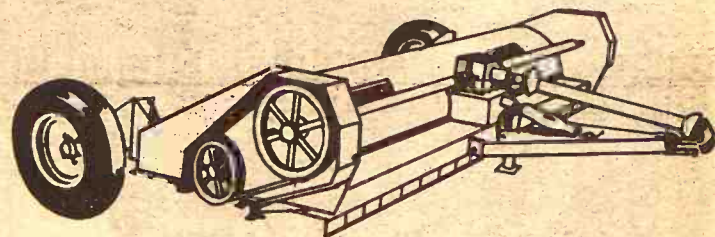
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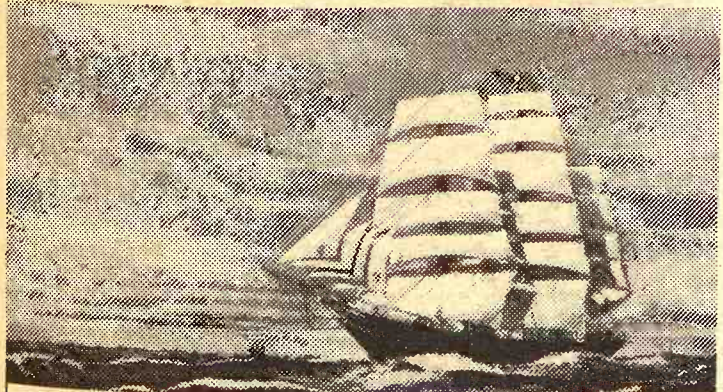
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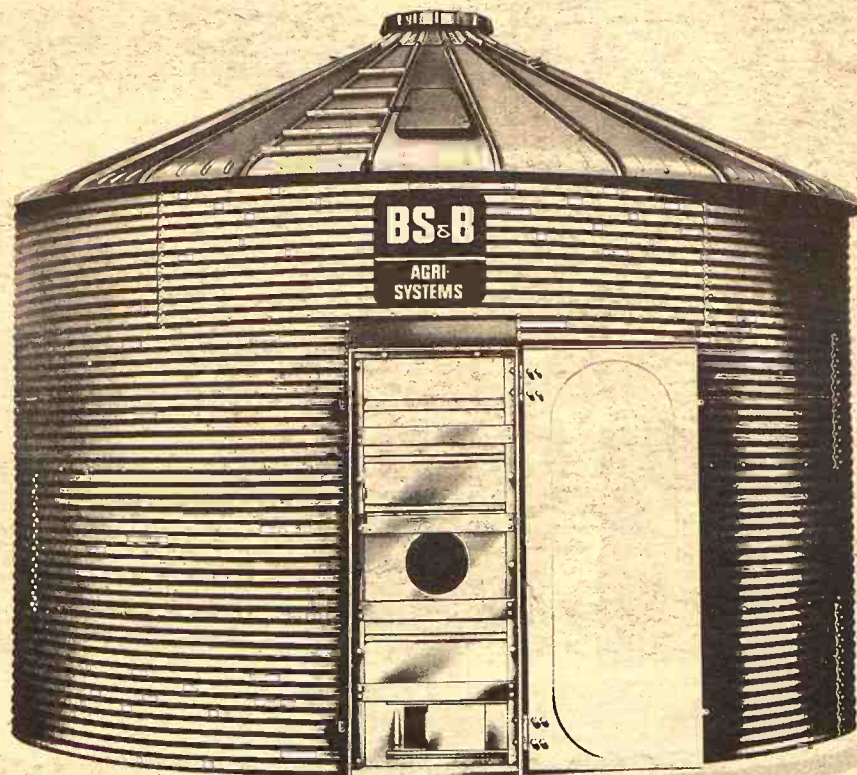

Winner, Mrs. Rufus D. Unrau, Lehigh: "You have so many good recipes in your paper each week. I noticed Concord grapes are in season again which means jam time for our family. I must share my delicious recipe. This is one my family insists they cannot be without."

GRAPE JAM

Wash Concord grapes and cook in a kettle on low heat with no water. Mash. When well cooked, drain through a jelly bag or strainer. Measure 4 cups juice and 6 cups sugar. Bring juice to boil. Stir in the sugar. Remove from fire. Stir slowly for 15-20 minutes or until sugar is dissolved. Pour into sterilized glasses. Cover with paraffin if desired or freeze. ("I also use fresh apricots and peaches and prepare the same way. This gives the jam a very true fruit flavor.")

We had a good response to our request for a Lazy Wife pickle recipe. A recipe sent by Kathryn King of Miltonvale seemed to be the nearest to the one the woman was seeking. We shall print the one recipe this week and in the next issue, print a few more and the names of all who sent pickle recipes.

MUSTARD PICKLES

1 cup sugar
1 cup salt
1 cup ground mustard
1 gallon vinegar
Put salt, sugar and mustard in stone jar. Add 1 cup vinegar. Stir till smooth and add rest of

vinegar. Wash small cukes and drop into mixture until jar is full. Cover with plate to keep pickles under vinegar. Good to use in three days. "I have used dill size cucumbers."

Jeanette Vathauer, Barnes, sent the following recipe:
CHOCOLATE CUPCAKES
Combine all at once in a large mixing bowl the following:
3 cups flour
2 cups sugar
3 heaping tablespoons cocoa
2 teaspoons soda
1 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons vinegar
2 teaspoons vanilla
Bake at 350 degrees in ungreased muffin pans.

Wichita-Philadelphia Meat Packing Merger Means Another Feedlot

A \$10,000,000-plus expansion for the beef-packing industry of south central Kansas appears to be a probable result of the merger of four Kansas-based

corporations with two others in Philadelphia.

The newly formed firm is Kansas Beef Industries Inc.

Kansas firms in the merger

are Excel Packing Company Inc., Kansas Packing Co., Dunn Packing Co. and Circle E Ranch Inc.

Philadelphia firms are Fleekop's Midtown Meats Inc. and B. F. L. Realty Co.

Headquarters for the new operation are at 900 East 21st in Wichita. Samuel H. Marcus, well-known Wichita meat packer, is president, and Isadore Fleekop, Philadelphia, is chairman of the board. Marcus, in Wichita since 1946, was originator of Excel Packing Co.

The firm was incorporated in Delaware June 13. It announced July 31 that it had applied to the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) for permission to make an initial public-stock offering of 385,000 shares in the new corporation.

A period of 60 to 90 days usually is required by SEC for clearance of new stock. Glore Forgan-William R. Staats Inc., a major investment banking firm in Chicago, has been named to underwrite and manage the initial stock issues.

Company officials said they are prevented by law from commenting about future plans. But a prospectus issued with registration of the new stock gives a two-year, tentative expansion

plan for the operation.

Included in plans are a \$1,250,000 program for expansion of feedlot and milling facilities already owned by the Wichita group. This development is planned for years 1969 and 1970.

In the same period Kansas Beef plans to spend \$500,000 in expanding distribution facilities at Philadelphia and another \$500,000 developing more fabricating capacity at the currently operated Wichita plants.

A new slaughtering and fabricating plant at an undisclosed site in south central Kansas, to cost \$8 million, is planned for beginning in 1970, according to prospectus.

A related new feedlot and mill facility to cost \$1,250,000 also is planned to start in 1970, the report shows.

Part of proceeds of the stock issue will be used to finance the new facilities, the prospectus noted. Additional funds also may be raised by new stock issues, bank loans, long term debt financing or additional equity security.

Combined sales for the six merging companies in the first half of 1969 totaled \$57,293,000 with a net income of \$1,004,000, reports show.

Total employment of the

September 9, 1969

merged companies was 430, of which about 140 are in the Philadelphia area. Vice president-treasurer of the new firm is Jerome D. Marcus, son of the president, and vice president-secretary is Lawrence S. Dilling.

Farm Exports, Lowest Since '63, Were Overguessed

Farm exports dropped last year more than previously had been estimated, to the lowest level since 1963, a report by the Agriculture department showed yesterday.

Officials said the value of all U. S. exports during the year ended June 30 was 5.7 billion dollars instead of 5.8 billion estimated several months ago.

This compares with 6.3 billion dollars in farm exports a year earlier and 6.8 billion in 1966-67.

Much of the decline last year was blamed on fewer exports of major grain crops, including wheat which for many months has been involved in an international price war.

Wheat exports last year totaled only 542 million bushels compared with 761 million in 1967-68. At the same time U. S. surpluses of wheat rose to 811 million bushels on July 1, compared with 539 million last year.

The revised export estimate is expected to add further pressure to attempts by the Nixon administration to bolster the farm ex-

port market, particularly for wheat.

Large world supplies of wheat the last few years have cut deeply into sales and have caused extensive price cutting by the major exporting nations, primarily by the European Common Market, Canada, Australia and the United States.

The administration announced two price reductions for export wheat since mid-July in an attempt to meet rising competition.

The latest announcement, only a couple of weeks ago, resulted in some pickup of U. S. wheat sales but counter reductions by Canada, Australia and the Common Market have further complicated the picture.

Top administration officials met Friday in a closed session made on whether further U. S. price reductions would be made.

Sources said some Agriculture department officials wanted to at least double the 12-cent reduction announced in July for some overseas markets but that this

was overruled by the State department and the White House.

The sources said these same Agriculture officials want to drop prices again so the United States can at least match prices

being offered by Canada, Australia and the Common Market.

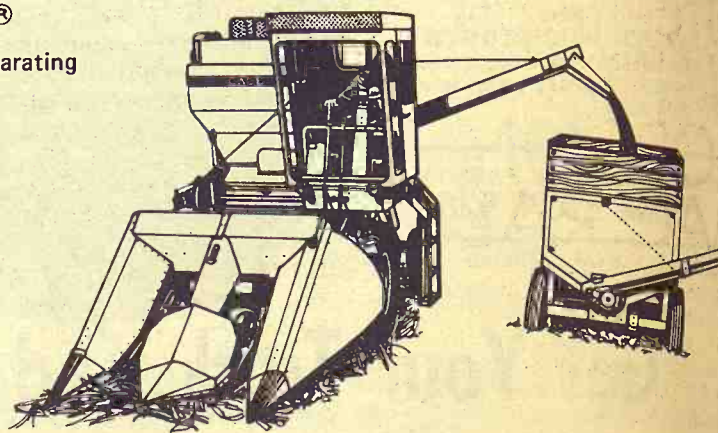

Kansas Drivers Among Fastest

Kansas drivers are among the fastest in 27 states where a study was conducted by the state highway departments and summarized by the Bureau of Public Roads, Federal Highway Administration, Department of Transportation.

All vehicles in the state in 1968 averaged 64 miles per hour with private cars at 66.6 miles, trucks at 57.1 miles and buses at 66.1 miles.

The survey was made on level, straight sections of main rural roads, including the interstate highway system.

Of the 27 state surveys used in the tabulation, only North and South Dakota with speed limits of 75 surpassed Kansas' limit of 70 for cars in daytime.

Kansas speed limits for buses are the same as for cars, 70 in daytime, 60 at night; 75 and 70 on interstate highways and 80 day and night on the Kansas Turnpike. Trucks more than 8000 pounds are limited to 60 day and night on all roads except the turnpike where the limit is 80.

Bus drivers in Kansas also were among the fastest in the 27-state survey, the report showed.

In Kansas 100 percent of the buses exceeded 60 miles an hour, 57 percent exceeded 65 miles an hour and 14 percent exceeded 70 miles an hour.

At the same time, 26 percent of all vehicles on the highway

exceeded 70 miles an hour with 36 percent of them private cars but only 5 percent of trucks.

The survey showed that motor vehicle speed on the nation's open roads, which has been climbing steadily since 1943, continued to rise in 1968 with an average speed of 59 miles an hour, up a mile an hour from 1967.

The average increase in speed was not broken down by states surveyed but was given only as an average for the nation as a whole based on states surveyed.



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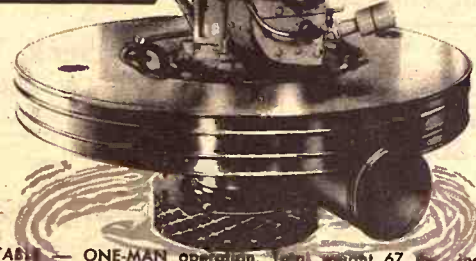
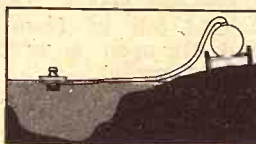
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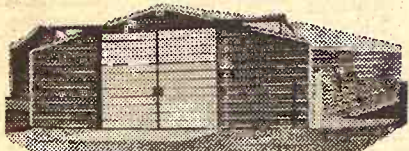


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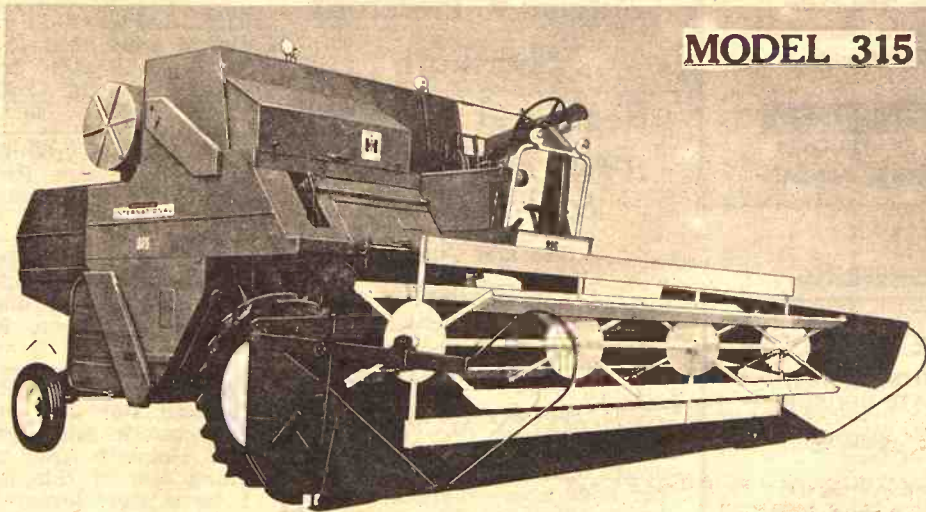

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Housing Hope In Factory-Made Home

To many experts in the housing field, the "only hope that this country will be able to meet its shelter needs lies in development of some form of standard factory-built housing," the Morgan Guaranty Trust Company says in its latest monthly business survey.

In spite of a predicted need in the next 10 years for 26 million new and rehabilitated dwelling units, current trends indicate the goal may not be met, the survey says.

The construction of new housing units since 1960 has averaged only 1,400,000 a year, "far below the average 2,600,000 needed to meet the housing target for the decade ahead," it says. The building "gap" is not quite so large as official housing figures indicate — they don't include mobile homes — but construction activity is not

keeping up with housing needs, the survey said.

George Romney, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, sees a danger that the nation will fall 10 million units short of its housing needs over the next decade, the report said. The reason for the lag in filling such a basic need is studded with problems, the survey said.

● Annual wage settlement increases among building trades across the nation often averaged 15 percent and more, the survey said.

● Also, the price of land has continued to skyrocket, adding heavily to costs of builders and developers. The price of a typical FHA-insured home in the first quarter of this year was \$20,300, up 11 percent in just two years, the survey said.

Levitt & Sons Inc., which "carved out its niche in the

postwar housing market with '\$7000 homes,' today claims it can't make a profit by producing a house for less than \$20,000, the bank said. Yet an official of the firm noted that the principal housing market in this country now is in the below \$20,000 category, the survey added.

"Industrialized housing," factory-produced entire rooms or unitized wall panels which are shipped to the job site where they are joined to form complete houses or apartments, are believed by many experts to be the answer to the dilemma, Morgan said. But a National Industrial Conference board study shows the nation lags far behind other countries in the construction of prefabricated homes and home parts.

"Manufacturers of prefabricated housing accounted for 11 percent of U.S. home building in the early 1960's. But roughly comparable data for European nations show that over 40 percent of British and 60 percent of French housing built in the last decade has been prefabricated, according to NICB.

It appears that union reluctance to accept the prefabricated units is at least slightly on the wane, the survey said, and the Department of Housing and Urban Development has initiated a breakthrough in the mass production approach to housing needs. In an effort to supply low income housing needs, HUD is attempting to persuade city and state officials to set up uniform building codes on a regional basis and unions are being asked to standardize work rules over similarly wide areas, the study said.

"If these two aims could be accomplished, HUD officials reason, the result would be the opening of a huge market for standardized low-cost prefabricated houses, the survey said.

'Overstating' Drug Effects

A prominent psychologist said many scientists may be unknowingly contributing to overstating the problem of drug abuse by students and others by the way they report sometimes limited evidence of possibly harmful effects.

Dr. Helen N. Nowlis of the University of Rochester, one of the nation's most experienced observers of student drug use, also said that:

Some scientists are inviting controversy and charges of hypocrisy in instances where she said they tend to overstate a given adverse physical effect in animals when a drug like LSD

is involved — compared with their assessment of the same effect when a non-illicit drug is employed.

At the same time Dr. Nowlis made clear her belief that illicit drugs like LSD can be harmful when abused — just like commonly accepted medical drugs can be. But she also said science does not yet know precisely what risks are involved in all drug use and how they can be minimized.

She said effects of a drug can vary with individuals and with the extent of use, and that it is dangerous to make generalizations about them.

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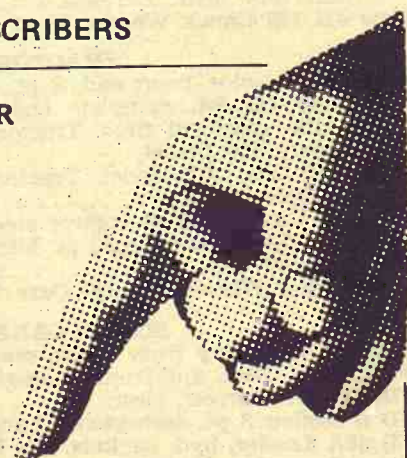
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Farmers Lean More To Land Rental

Government experts say farmers are leaning more toward renting land instead of buying it because of rising real estate costs and the amount of investment needed to operate additional acreage.

Most farm land is rented on a crop-share basis which in many areas, particularly in the Midwest, may mean an operator assigns one-third or one-half of his crop output to his landlord.

Cash rent is paid on about one third of the nation's rented farm land, says the Agriculture Department, and this varies widely according to region.

For example, a new real estate report showed, cash rents for who's farms last year ranged from an average of \$3.05 an acre in the mountain states to \$26.85 in the Corn Belt.

As with virtually all other farm expenses, cash rents have risen steadily. The national average cash rent for whole farms last year was \$10.50 per acre, compared with \$9.95 in 1967, the report said.

Much of the cattle pasture land

in the country is rented on a monthly rate per head. Last year in the Western states the monthly rate averaged \$3.82 per head, compared with \$3.51 in 1964.

In the Midwest and plains, cash rent paid for cropland only — not whole farms — has risen in most states, the report said.

Rates this year in Illinois, for example, average \$36.20 an acre, compared with \$36.05 in 1968 and \$33.05 in 1967.

South Dakota cropland rent this year averages about \$10.60 an acre, compared with \$9.70 in 1968 and \$8.95 in 1967.

Iowa cash cropland, according to the preliminary reports, averages \$35.90, compared with \$33.10 last year and \$30.90 in 1967.

Some areas declined. Michigan this year averaged \$17.70 an acre, compared with \$19.20 in 1968 and \$18.55 in 1967. Indiana dropped slightly to \$32.60 from \$33.10 last year.

Turn Anger From Young To Old?

Western society soon may become antagonistic toward ever-increasing and potentially more demanding old folks, just as it's now showing anger against young people, a social scientist said.

Dr. Bernice L. Neugarten said the further potential for antagonism against both young and old simultaneously — presumably by middle-agers predominantly — "may well be one of the 'sleepers' problems of our times, perhaps in the way that race relations was a sleeper problem no more than 15 years ago . . ."

Already, she said, young people are showing resentment toward the old for occupying a growing number of power positions.

Urging social scientists to explore possibilities for avoiding the situations she envisioned,

the University of Chicago researcher told the closing session of the Eighth International Congress of Gerontology:

"Certain antagonisms toward the old may now be forming that were not present at earlier historical periods. As the number of old people increases, the phenomenon that has been called 'age-ism' may be directed toward the old just as it is presently being directed toward the young.

"Anger toward the young is rising in universities, in legislatures, and in public opinion polls; and as generational equilibrium becomes an increasing problem in one direction, it may appear also in the other direction — toward the old."

Asserting age-ism against the old now exists only in covert, or hidden, forms — for example in "the small percent of the wel-

fare dollar that is spent for services to the aged" — she added:

"It is possible that age-ism toward the old may take more overt forms in the near future."

As for possible influences in that direction, she said, "Future generations of old will be different from the present old."

"As they become better educated, healthier, long-lived; as they become a more visible leisure class; as they become more accustomed to direct political action and to the politics of confrontation they see around them, they may also become a more vocal and a more demanding group," she said.

She said that up to now, political movements among older people have been relatively small, short-lived and "quickly absorbed into more general moves by the society to right an obvious wrong" — for example, the stoppage of the Townsend movement following adoption of Social Security programs.

OCTOBER 10 DATE FOR FEEDER SALE

CLAY CENTER—Friday, October 10 has been set as the date for the 16th annual North Central Kansas Feeder Cattle Association sale here. Hugo Kunze is sale manager and president of the association. The sale is primarily of yearling cattle, most of which are right off grass.

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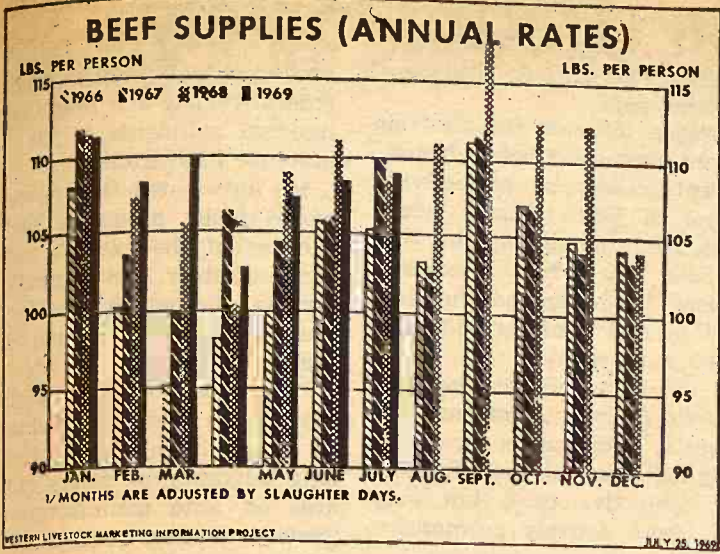
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BEEF CONSUMED

Consumption of beef per person during the first half of this year was about the same as the first six months of 1968 — up by about one-fourth pound, according to the Western Livestock Round-up. Consumption in both May and June was less than a year ago. Population is increasing 1 per cent a year. The chart shows monthly disappearance of beef for the last three years (at annual rates).

Foster Homes Instead Of Juvenile Jails?

JUNCTION CITY — Immediate establishment of "open" foster homes for the detention of juvenile delinquents rather than using county jails has been recommended by a five-county committee investigating the feasibility of establishing a juvenile detention home in this area.

"The need for a multi-county home for juvenile detention is imminent and the time to act is now," said the panel's report submitted to the Geary, Clay, Riley, Morris and Dickinson County Boards of County Commissioners.

An "open" foster home would be available for placing of a child at any hour of the day or night and would have to be sub-

sidized by the county. The state pays for such care only when a child is made a ward of the state by a juvenile court.

The committee did not try to determine the cost of the foster home or detention home programs or where the multi-county facility should be located, according to Robert McCool, Junction City, chairman.

"These are the next logical steps but the committee felt the county commissioners asked us to determine the need for the juvenile detention facility," said McCool. We plan to wait about a month and then go back to the commissioners and ask them if they would like to keep the committee alive so it can carry on

the study and answer these and other questions."

Other recommendations contained in the report are:

- Each county employ a probation officer in addition to a juvenile officer.

- One person in each county have charge of juvenile cases so that with continuity, the "wayward" youth or potential delinquent can be discerned and preventive steps can be attempted.

- All departments of county government must work together for social betterment.

- Planning for the area detention home should start immediately.

The study showed Geary County has the greatest problem with juvenile delinquency, followed by Riley, Clay and Dickinson counties, in that order.

Morris did not have a county jail in 1968 and didn't confine offenders, a factor used in the study.

The five-county area has a population of 93,113, not counting Fort Riley, whose juveniles contribute to Geary County's problems. A total of 273 juvenile offenders in the five counties were confined last year for 1082 days.

Geary County confined 135 (84 boys and 48 girls) for 625 days; Riley County confined 52 (45 boys and seven girls) for 238 days; Dickinson County confined 50 (36 boys and 14 girls) for 136 days; Clay County confined 35 (26 boys and nine girls) 77 days and Morris County confined one boy for six days.

Some Write Off Highway Beauty Plan As Failure

The once widely acclaimed federal campaign to beautify the nation's highways by eliminating obnoxious billboards and junkyards appears to stack up, after four years, as a failure.

In a few areas, there have been substantial improvements. In some others, reports show the esthetic assault on motorists' eyes has actually worsened since the campaign started. But in general, across the nation, reports indicate things have not

changed markedly.

And the campaign itself seems to be bogged down in a morass of federal and state legislative and administrative complexities so frustrating that, one official commented wryly, "It might be simpler to start all over again."

In Illinois travelers find the new interstate route with a clean, fresh look, free of billboards and junkyards. But the primary highways, also a target of the federal effort, are described as no better than five years ago.

In Chicago, even a municipal abandoned-car pound violates the city junkyard ordinances. In Detroit, Gunther Weidle, the head city planner, admits: "We haven't been very successful in getting signs down even around the civic center."

One of the less improved states is Texas, home of the beautification campaign's chief backers, the Lyndon B. Johnsons. Texas has spurned the standards laid down in the federal beautification act of 1965.

Some notable exceptions are Vermont, renowned for having enacted the toughest billboard laws in the country (now facing legal challenges); Oregon, which instituted rigorous protection of scenic areas long before the federal campaign; and California, where there has been nearly a 20 percent decrease in billboards on main highways since 1965.

The federal bureau of public roads provides this resume of progress since the 1965 act:

- Only 21 of the 50 states have passed laws or taken other necessary steps to comply with the federal program.

- Of 325 million dollars authorized for federal aid to highway beautification since 1965, only 167 million has been appropriated or allocated.

- Of the 167 million 90 percent has gone for landscaping and related embellishments and only about 10 percent toward elimination of billboards and junkyards.

- A 10 percent penalty deduction on federal highway subsidies to noncomplying states, prescribed in the 1965 law, has not been applied in a single case.

- Of some 1.2 million signs on interstate and primary high-

ways, 839,000 of which were invalidated by the act, the bureau knows of only 750 having been removed, with removal rights obtained on another 371.

- Of 21,000 junkyards throughout the country, 17,000 of them outside industrial areas, the bureau knows of only 121 having been removed and 1427 having been screened.

World Wheat Output In '68 Was A Record

World wheat production reached a record 320 million tons in 1968 despite acreage reductions in some countries, including the United States, the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) reports.

In its annual review of commodities FAO predicted another good wheat crop for 1969, although world trade was likely to decline slightly because of the improved food grains situation in developing countries.

More favorable weather raised production in both Canada and the United States, and recovered sharply to reach a new record in Australia, where crops had been hit by drought in the previous year, FAO said.

Carryover stocks have risen to unprecedented heights in Canada and Australia due to a succession of good crops without an equivalent rise in export outlets, it added.

Nader Lens On Tractor Safety

American farm tractors are far more dangerous than is commonly realized or is practically necessary, according to a new study by one of the young researchers associated with consumer advocate Ralph Nader.

The report, compiled by James Williams, a graduate in engineering from Princeton University, states that in each of the last eight years more than 1000 farmers have died in tractor accidents — 60 percent of them because their tractors overturned.

The report asks for a comprehensive government study of tractor hazards, federal safety standards for tractor design, and a sustained educational program among farmers about proper precautions in the use of tractors.

Rep. Neal Smith, D-Iowa, indicated that he would propose a study of the tractor problem as an amendment to the House authorization bill for the National Motor Vehicle Safety Act.

One of the fundamental causes for the typically uncertain balance of tractors, Williams noted in his report, is their high center of gravity and the necessity of keeping their vital machinery clear of bumpy terrain and standing crops. But "high clearing efficiency can be come a dangerous problem," he said, when a tractor travels the side of a hill, carries a large rear load, cuts a sharp turn, or slips on a hole or obstacle.

Many of the deaths and injuries caused by overturning tractors could be eliminated — and are now being significantly reduced on European tractors —

by protective cabs or "roll bars" Williams said.

Sweden initiated the first significant studies of protective frames in 1954, he said, and made them mandatory in 1959. He said that while Swedish farmers first resented the devices, they now consider such protection a necessity.

In the United States, he said, the John Deere and International Harvester Companies are now equipping some of their tractors with protective cabs, but only John Deere actively promotes their sale.

Williams acknowledged a series of studies of tractor hazards by agricultural societies, universities, and insurance companies. But he argued that the

problem demanded a general federal review and then uniform national standards in the manufacture of tractors.

He anticipated that farmers would resist protective devices because of the expense and because of their own "strongly individualistic nature," but he said that tractor cabs should nonetheless be required.

"The situation here parallels that of the automobile industry," he said, alluding to Mr. Nader's long advocacy of safety standards on auto manufacturers. "Safety devices, such as seat belts, were offered to motorists, but it was not until federal legislation was enacted that widespread use of these devices began."

Steady On Price Index

The index of prices received by farmers for all commodities was 246 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 245 last month and well above the 226 a year ago.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 136 percent at mid-August, unchanged from July but 6 points below last year.

Wheat at mid-August averaged \$1.08 per bushel, 1 cent below July and 9 cents below August 1968.

Corn was worth \$1.14 per bushel, down 1 cent from a month earlier but 7 cents above August a year ago.

Oats brought 68 cents per bushel, down 2 cents from July and 3 cents below August a year ago. Barley, at 81 cents per bushel, was 3 cents above July but 9 cents below August last year.

Sorghum grain was worth \$1.80 per cwt., up 4 cents from a month earlier and 16 cents above August last year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.45 per bushel, up 1 cent from July but unchanged from August last year.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index in August was 372 percent of the 1910-14 base period, up 2 points from July and 51 points above August 1968.

The meat animal price index at mid-August was 445 percent compared with 446 percent in July and 378 percent in August last year.

Hog prices averaged \$25.60 per cwt., up 70 cents from July and \$6.80 above August 1968.

Beef cattle, at \$27.70 per cwt., were 20 cents below July but \$3.40 above August 1968.

Steer and heifer prices averaged \$29.50 per cwt., 50 cents below July but \$3.70 above a year earlier. Calves brought \$30.50 per cwt., compared with \$32.20 the previous month and \$26.00 in August last year.

The dairy price index was 316 percent in August compared with 314 in July and 307 percent in August a year ago.

Egg prices averaged 29.0 cents per dozen, up 1 cent from July and well above the 22.9 cents in August a year ago.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for protein supplement and mixed feeds at mid-August were about the same as a month earlier.

More Welfare Families Move Out Than In

The state director of welfare says more families receiving public assistance have left Kansas than have entered the state since residency requirements for welfare were dropped July 1.

Dr. Robert Harder said county welfare departments across the state have reported closing a total of 257 cases involving families on welfare since July 1.

In contrast, local welfare departments have reported opening only 142 new cases.

"We know definitely that these people have moved from the state," Harder said, because the welfare agencies of other states had informed Kansas of the transfers.

The figures represent a confirmed reduction of 95 families from welfare rolls in the state.

The state social welfare director said an additional 206 cases of families on welfare have been closed since July 1, but added "We've lost contact with those people and don't know positively whether they have left the state."

Harder said the money being received by the 257 welfare families whose departure has been confirmed totaled \$28,800, while the money involved in the 142 new welfare families which have moved into Kansas totaled \$16,800.

The net reduction from the influx-outgo of families on welfare would be \$12,000.

Harder said the states to which most of the welfare families moved included Florida, Oklahoma, Missouri, Nebraska, Texas, Colorado and Arizona.

Most of the welfare families which came into Kansas moved here from Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, California and Iowa.

The only state which sent Kansas more welfare families than it received from this state was Arkansas, the state welfare director said.

The residency requirements for welfare in all states were dropped July 1 after the U. S. Supreme Court ruled states could not impose such restrictions on public assistance applicants.

But Harder said he does not think the emigration of welfare families from Kansas to other states with possibly greater welfare payments has any connection with the abolition of residency requirements.

"The state of New York has traditionally had the highest welfare benefits," Harder said. "And, none of the welfare fam-

ilies who left Kansas went there. "I think the evidence is conclusive."

"I think all it shows is that welfare families move when the mood strikes them," he said.

Here's Hay Price Report

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's latest report on hay prices includes the following data:

Baled alfalfa hay in storage piles on farms in the Platte Valley of Nebraska was bringing \$19 to \$20 a ton compared to \$21 to \$22 a year ago.

In South Central Kansas, including Larned, baled alfalfa on farms was bringing \$21 to \$23, compared to \$23 to \$25 last year at this time. There was very little movement of hay; demand was said to be dull.

In Southwest Kansas, Garden City area, baled alfalfa was quoted at \$25 a ton on farms, compared to \$20 to \$22 a year ago. Demand was strong.

Baled prairie hay in Southeast Kansas was bringing \$17 to \$18 in fields compared to \$17 a year ago. Storage facilities are well filled with hay in the area. Hay has been moving out steadily by truck.

Purina Starts A Warehouse At Abilene

ABILENE — Work is scheduled to start on a Ralston-Purina Co. distribution service facility.

Mayor Wendell Gugler said the St. Louis-based firm has purchased a 12-acre tract in the city's industrial park.

Vaden Couch, area director of company operations, and Larry Pedrick, director of production and administration, both of Kansas City, said products manufactured in Kansas City would be shipped by rail to Abilene for distribution by truck to a large part of western and northern

Kansas. "In the future our plans are to build a manufacturing unit adjacent to the Abilene facility," Couch said.

The distribution center will be Ralston-Purina's third Kansas facility. The company has mills at Wichita and Liberal.

Couch said the Abilene operation will have four or five employees. It will be housed in an 80 by 100 foot metal building, expected to be completed in three months.

State Tax Receipts 10% Over Estimates

Receipts into the state general fund and the total personal income of Kansans have exceeded estimates for their respective fiscal periods.

General fund receipts were \$8.18 million greater in fiscal 1969 than had been estimated and personal income during calendar year, 1968 was \$7.64 billion

greater than anticipated.

It represented a 10.7 per cent increase in general funds receipts over earlier budget estimates and put the big fund that finances most operations of Kansas government into a healthy condition.

However, that good health could deteriorate unless the Legislature enacts new revenue-raising measures next session to adequately finance a \$27 million increase in state aid to education that was approved last session.

The personal income increase for Kansas showed the state

ahead of the national average in this important category of economic measurement.

Richard Ryan, fiscal analyst for the Legislative Council Research Dept., told the committee that total receipts into the general fund last fiscal year were \$282.12 million.

Increases in income and sales tax accounted for much of the gain, he said.

On personal income, Ryan said in a prepared memorandum, "data now available indicate that Kansas personal income in 1968 substantially exceeded the bud-

get estimate and that personal income in 1969 is running well above the budget estimates.

Ryan said preliminary figures on personal income during calendar year 1968 represented a 9.8 per cent increase over the previous year. The national average was 9.1 per cent, he said.

The rate of personal income growth in Kansas during the first part of this calendar year indicates that Kansans will nearly equal the budget estimates

that had been set for 1970.

A Shortage Of Apple-Pickers

The Atchison-Wathena area will produce an estimated 300,000 bushels of apples this year and growers say a drastic shortage of pickers is anticipated. The apple harvest began last week with some color picking reported.

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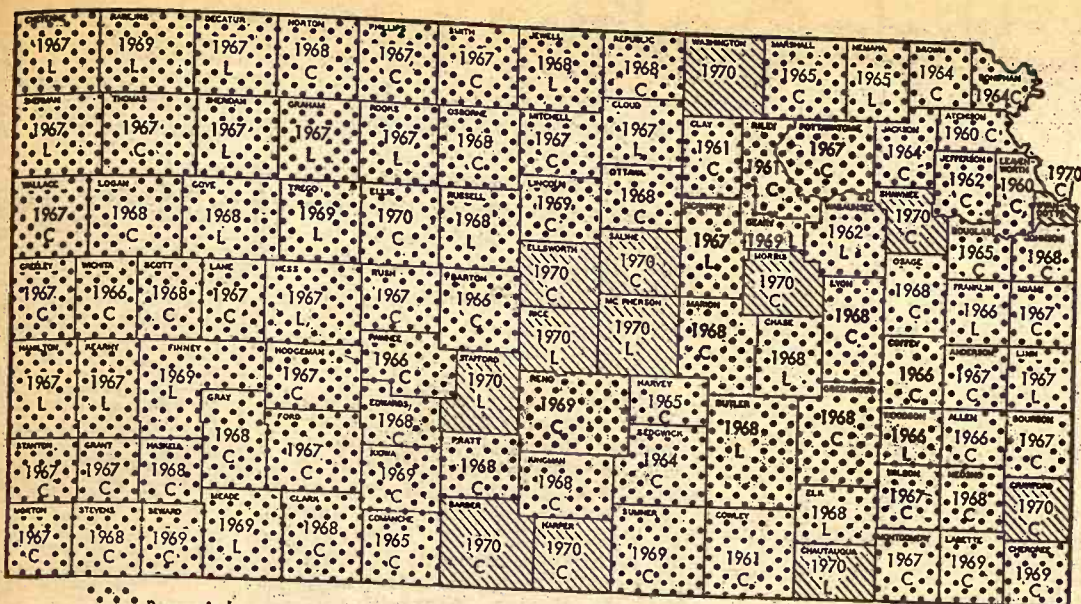
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ONLY 14 HAVE YET TO REAPPRAISE

Only 14 counties, most of them in central Kansas, have yet to complete a property reappraisal program demanded by law. All have made progress toward appraising all property at 30% of actual value, but the 14 do not expect to complete the programs until 1970. The map is by the League of Kansas Municipalities.

Fewest Turkeys Since 1931

Turkeys raised in Kansas during 1969 are expected to total 341,000, 14 percent below 1968 and the smallest for any year

since 1931. Heavy breed turkeys raised are estimated at 338,000, a decrease of 13 percent from last year.

Light breed turkeys raised are expected to total 3000, less than half the number raised in 1968. The turkey poult hatch in Kansas from September 1968 thru July 1969 was 21 percent below the same period a year earlier.

Turkey poult shipments to other states were about 4 1/2 times larger than in shipments.

United States

Turkeys raised in the United States during 1969 are expected to total 106.4 million birds, less than 1 percent below 1968. Fewer turkeys are expected in the East North Central and West North Central regions, down 6 and 5 percent respectively.

Increases by regions are as follows: South Atlantic, 10 percent; North Atlantic, 8 percent and the South Central and West combined up 1 percent.

Heavy breed turkeys raised in 1969 are expected to total 95.0 million compared with 93.2 million last year — an increase of 2 percent.

Light breed turkeys raised during 1969 are estimated at

11.5 million birds, 14 percent below the 13.3 million raised during 1968. All regions are below a year earlier.

Minnesota, the leading turkey producing state this year, will raise 16.7 million birds, followed by California with 15.0; North Carolina, 9.7; Missouri, 7.7; Texas, 7.0; Arkansas, 6.5; Iowa, 5.7; Virginia, 4.2; Ohio, 4.0 and Indiana 3.6 million.

Turkey poult hatchings during the period, September 1968 through July 1969, were less than 1 percent below the corresponding period a year earlier.

Compared with a year earlier, decreases occurred during the months September through December, increases January through March and decreases again from May through July. The largest increases from a year earlier were in January and February, 18 and 13 percent, respectively. The greatest percentage decreases were in the September-December 1968 period, ranging from 13 to 18 percent. Decreases May through July ranged from 2 to 4 percent.

Turkey eggs in incubators on August 1, 1969, were up 16 percent.

They'll Certify Fast Gains, High Quality

HOWARD — Thirteen Elk county cattlemen have to "certify" that their herds will provide beef calves that will give fast gains and top quality meat in the feedlots.

They consigned a representative sampling of this year's calf crop to a feedlot where the animals will be checked for health, rate of gain, carcass composition and rate of gain in the next 230 days.

The plan is called the Kansas Certified Feeder Calf Program, instituted under the auspices of the cooperative extension service of Kansas State University and the Beef Animal Improving Committee of the Kansas Livestock Association.

Keith O. Zoellner and Herman W. Westmeyer, KSU extension specialists guiding the program, said the certified calf program is designed for the Kansas cat-

tlemans to sample his calf crop and test the sample for feedlot performance and carcass desirability.

The sample must meet minimum standards for feedlot gain, carcass grade and cutability.

Primary purposes of the program are:

- To help build sound herd improvement in commercial beef cattle production.

- To prove superior performance in herds and provide valuable sales data for the feeder.

Francis Bliss, Elk County agricultural extension agent, and Russell Weldon, president of the Elk County Cattlemen's Association, made arrangements in that area for sampling the herds.

All the calves were weighed and identified by the 13 herd owners as they were moved into the George Myers lots at the north edge of Howard.

They averaged 558 pounds for the 119 head from 13 herds. They are expected to gain a minimum of 2.5 pounds daily average until next May 11 when they will be marketed.

After a 30-day conditioning period at Black Jack Feedlots at Yates Center, the calves will be weighed again, then placed on growing rations for 100 days before going on full feed Jan. 5.

Minimum standards require 2.5 pounds a day average gain, must grade low choice or better, must have a yield grade of 3.7 or better.

Calves that qualify will obtain certification for their relatives in their owner's pastures for the next two years.

The producers stand the costs of the certification but qualification means they will be listed on a special publication to potential calf buyers and may bring

some premium consideration in pricing.

The cattlemen said they hoped to learn more about their own herd's abilities, and maybe improve their ability to sell their cattle at better market consideration.

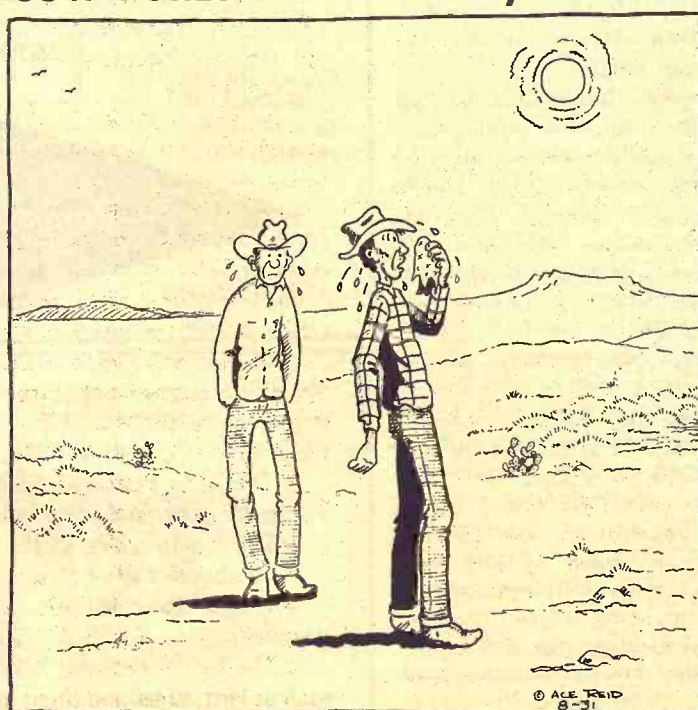

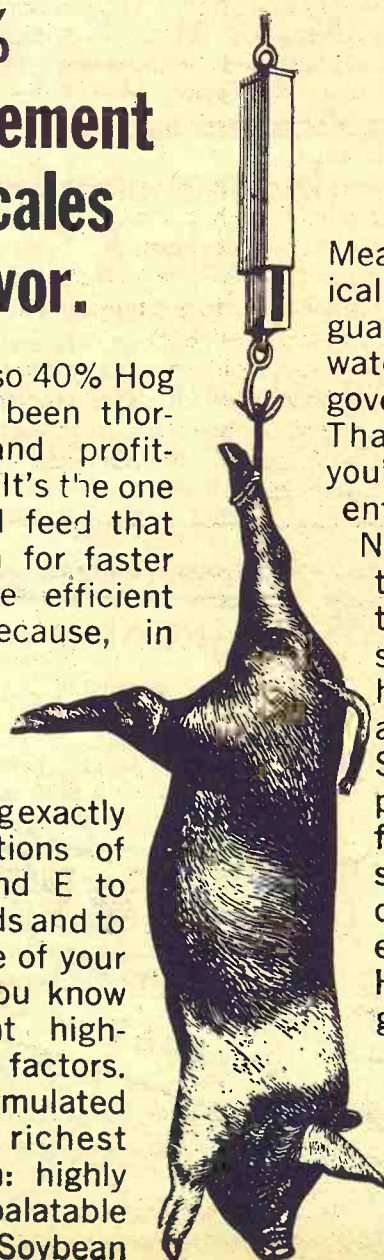

Some Double Honors At Salina Jr. Dairy Show

SALINA — More than 170 young 4H and FFA dairymen came to Salina for the 4th annual Kansas All-Breeds Junior Dairy Show. Ten left with grand and reserve championships.

Two of the youngsters, Lyle Hanschu, Ramona, and Donna Lisenby, Wichita, took both the grand and reserve championships in their classes.

Lyle, with Jersey cows, won the blue ribbons in the 2-3 and 4-year-old classes. His 4-year-old came back to be named grand champion and the 3-year-old was the reserve champion.

Donna, entered both in 2-year-

old and aged cow (more than 4 years old) classes, in the milking Shorthorn category won both, then the older cow took the grand championship while the younger heifer was the reserve champion.

The Holstein category was the largest of the show with more than 160 of the more than 300 animals entered. Teresa Enns, Hillsboro, showed the grand champion. She also won the blue in the 3-year-old class over about 16 other competitors. Reserve champion was the 4-year-old of Janel Burkhart, Kinsley.

Starlet Schmidt, Goessel, winner of the grand champion award in the Ayrshire category, also nearly cornered the market on the Ayrshire blues.

Her top winner was a 3-year-old heifer, but she also swept the senior heifer calf, junior yearling and senior yearling heifer awards — half the Ayrshire blue ribbons. She was denied the reserve champion award by Doug Unruh, who won with a 2-year-old cow.

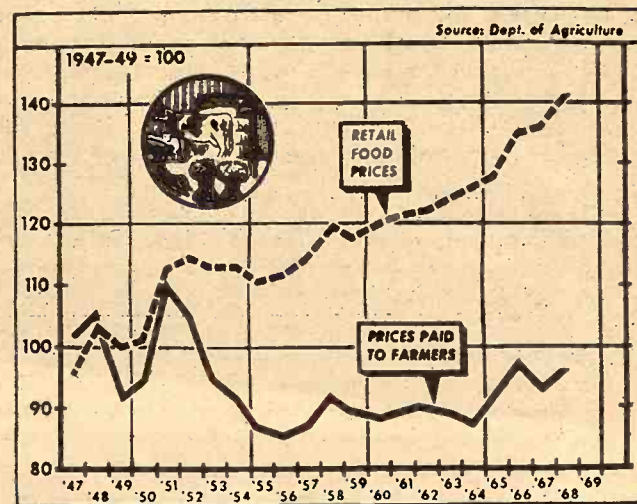
The only other 3-blue ribbon winner, besides Lyle Hanschu, was Nancy Boehle, Baldwin, in the Guernsey category. But her winners in senior calf, junior yearling and aged cow could not get her a championship. Grand championship went to Rebecca Bernat, Simpson, with a 3-year-old heifer, and reserve was won by Larry Enns, Hillsboro, and his 4-year-old.

Among Brown Swiss exhibitors, Dennis, David and Terry Lust, Iola, collared all but two of the blues. The remaining pair went to Jeffery Van Horn, Ottawa. Widening Gap In Cost Of Food From Farmer Share To Housewife's Payment



This chart shows the relation between prices farmers get for their goods compared with prices consumers must pay, and the widening gap between the two graph lines is a sore point with both producers and consumers.

The cost of getting food from the farmer to the housewife has soared 140% in two decades and now consumes two-thirds of America's grocery bill.

Twenty years ago, when Americans spent \$45 billion a year for food, the farmer got about \$20 billion and the processor and distributor \$25 billion.

Now the food bill is about \$90 billion and the farmer gets \$30 billion and the middlemen \$60 billion.

The widening farm-to-consumer gap is clear in a comparison of Agriculture department's statistics showing what happened to the money a housewife paid for a loaf of bread 20 years ago and what happens to it today. In 1949:

- The average price of a 1-pound loaf of white bread was 13.5¢. Today the same loaf costs nearly 23¢.
- The retailer's slice of the bread price was 2.2¢. Today it is 5¢.
- The baker and wholesaler got 6.3¢. Today they get 12.2¢.
- 1.7% of the retail price went for milling, grain handling and transportation. Today the figure is 2.4¢.
- The farmer received 3.3¢ for his wheat and other ingredients, such as lard, sugar and dried milk, that went into the loaf of bread. Today he still gets 3.3¢.

Processors and distributors defend the change in the relationship. They cite labor costs as up more than 100% in 20 years; containers and packaging materials up 40%; overhead such as rent up 96%.

Housewives, they add, also are demanding foods that require more and more processing — canned chocolate pudding, for example, or frozen 3-course dinners.

Economists for supermarkets also point out that profits have dwindled steadily, from 1.41 cents a dollar of sales in 1964 to .99 of a cent last year.

It may be added that the grocer's profits are based on increasingly larger sales. An average supermarket in the U. S. grosses \$1.7 million yearly. And profits on investment may be a better criteria than profits on sales.

Profits after taxes on net worth averaged over 9% says one Cornell University study, and a USDA study of 59 large chains averaged over 11% of net worth.

Profits of others in the food chain also generally average over 10% of net worth — for baking firms 13.7%; dairy product manufacturers, 11.4%; meat packers, 8.2%.

Meat prices, which have risen rapidly this year, catch the most attention of consumers. In its last quarterly report, the Agriculture department said the farmer's share of the price paid for a pound of choice beef was 65%. The wholesaler's share was 10% and the retailer's share 25%.

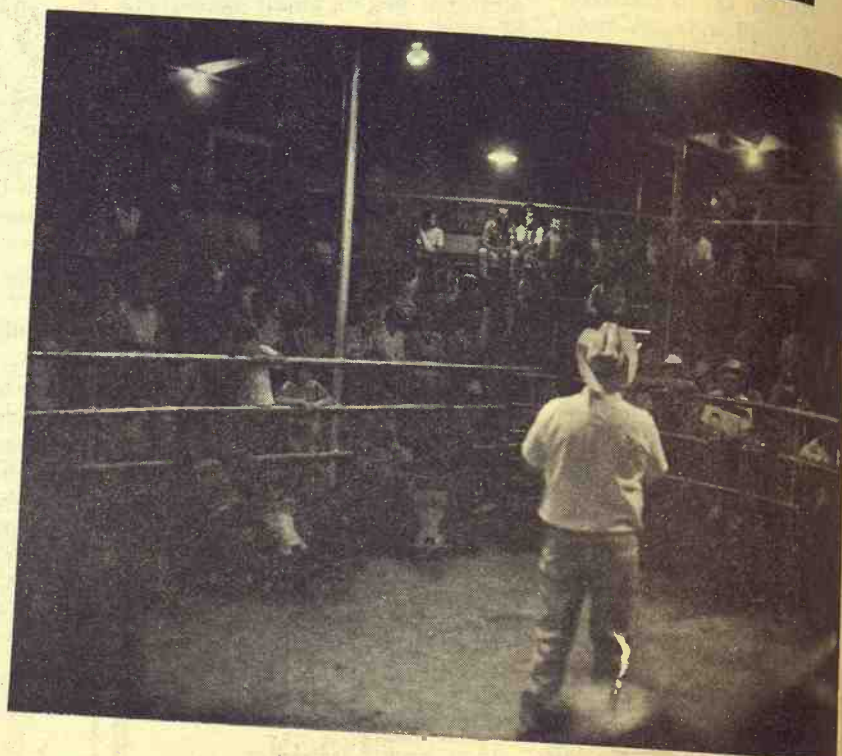
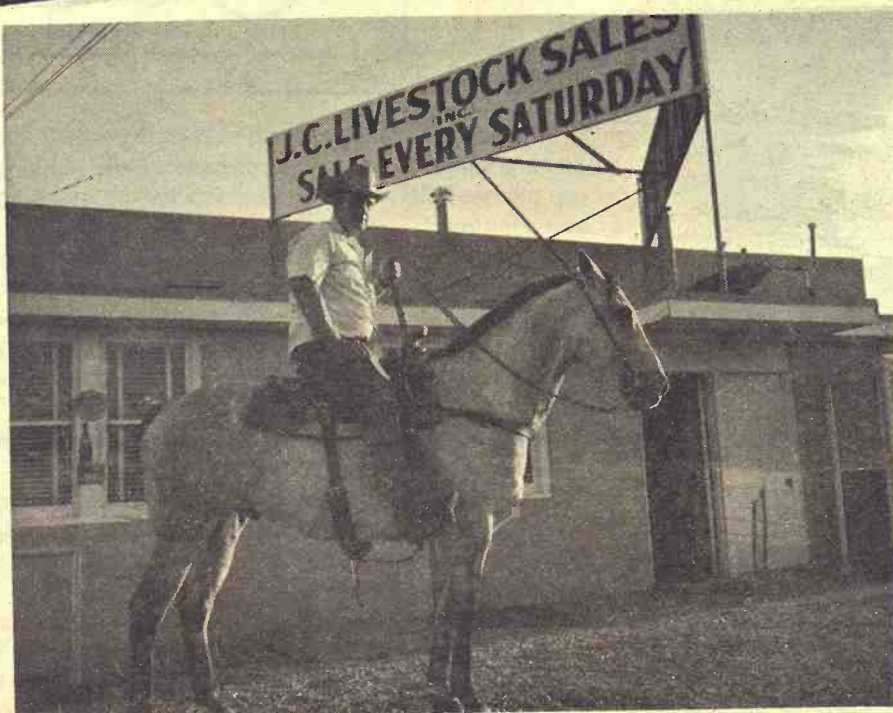
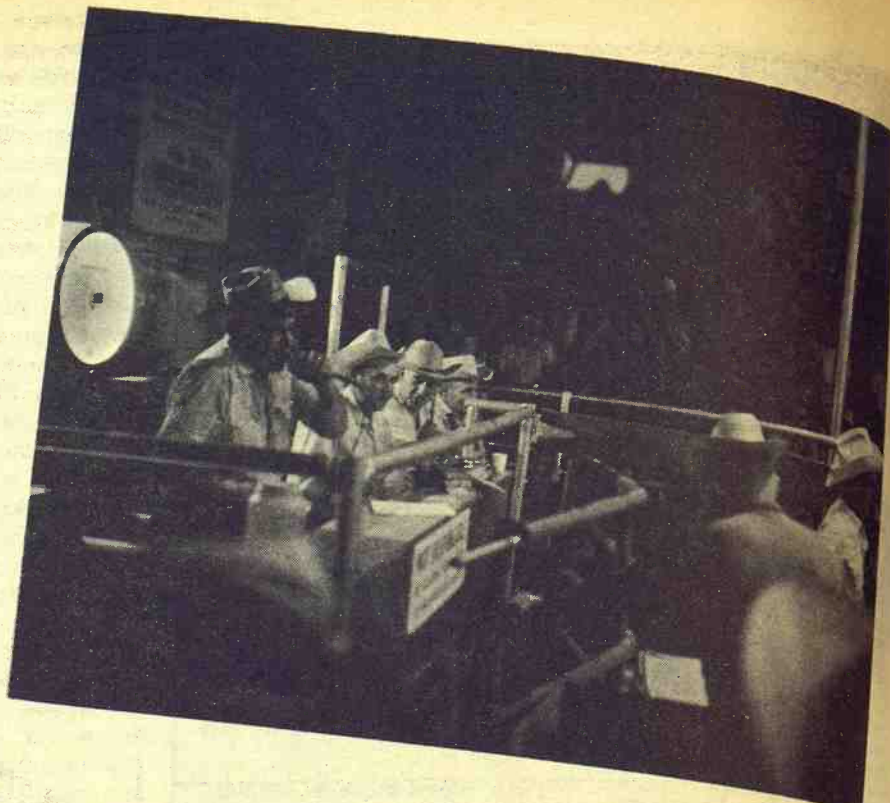

The rise in industrials included price hikes for metals, machinery, clothing and rubber, but lumber and wood products continued to decline from the peak levels of last spring, the report said. Gasoline prices were also reduced, it said.

A spokesman for the bureau said it was too early to determine whether the preliminary report indicated that sharply rising prices of the last year were beginning to taper off. The drop in wholesale prices was the first since August of 1968, when they dropped four-tenths of one per cent.

The trend of wholesale prices of many commodities is generally reflected later in the bureau's report on consumer prices reflecting average living costs.

Higher food prices at grocery stores were a major factor in July, continuing an inflationary climb at a rate of about 6 per cent in 1969, highest in 18 years.

Good Inflation Sign? Wholesale Prices Decline

Wholesale prices declined slightly this month for the first drop in a year of sharp inflationary spiral, the Labor department reported.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the Wholesale Price Index declined one-tenth of one per cent, due entirely to a drop in food prices, to 113.2.

The index means that it cost wholesalers \$113.20 in August for every \$100 worth of a broad range of food and industrial raw materials that was worth \$100 in the 1957-59 period on which the index is based. The in-

dex was still 4.1 per cent above a year ago.

The report said farm products at wholesale prices declined 1.5 per cent and processed foods and feeds were down five-tenths of one per cent, more than offsetting a rise of three-tenths of one per cent for industrial commodities.

The report was based on preliminary figures subject to change when fuller information is available, the bureau said.

The report said the decline in wholesale food prices reflected a further weakening in cattle prices and substantial declines for grains and eggs.

There were lower prices for meats, fish and vegetables oils, but most other foods were higher, notably canned vegetables and fruits, frozen vegetables and

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Meat Prices Up—But Not So Much As Rest Of Economy

Cattle prices average 22% higher than they were 10 to 12 years ago, but almost all other factors of the economy have increased by a greater percentage.

And that makes meat a pretty good buy, despite complaints against high meat prices at the supermarket.

That's the point made by Don Magdanz, executive secretary of the National Livestock Feeders Assn., who points out that comparisons of meat prices with all food prices, with average earnings, with disposable income, and with demand for beef, show that beef prices are not so much higher than they were in 1957-59 as are other economic criteria.

Here are the comparisons, from data supplied by the U. S. Department of Commerce and Labor:

Magdanz made some pains to point out that not only do consum-

ers have greater incomes to pay current beef prices, but that they are getting bargains in the face of greater demand for choice cuts, yet a steer has only so many porterhouse steaks, sirloins, etc.

That's fundamentally wrong to compare prices of the more popular cuts when more people want them; the added demand should be reflected in the price, says Magdanz.

Meanwhile, according to Magdanz, a larger amount of meat can be purchased by an even smaller share of the consumer's income, since disposable income has increased considerably more than meat prices.

Magdanz says people in the livestock business also realize the fast pace at which increased disposable income goes, "but let the complaints be aimed in a proper direction -- at increased cost of goods and services (labor, taxes, government, medical care, clothing, educa-

tion, interest, etc.) and not toward the product line which has increased the least."

Both the Feeders Association and the American National Cattle-men's Association have been citing these comparisons recently, defending current prices for beef. Both left themselves some further ammunition, for the comparisons with 1957-59 could be made even more drastic if one wanted to compare with peak prices of 1948 and 1951.

Prices generally have been slightly over \$30 for choice grade steers recently, down from the \$36 peak in the spring.

Cattle producers have seen higher prices, but they also have seen them lower, which is one reason they smart a little when people complain of high prices, particularly if they blame the cattlemen.

After World War II, in 1948, cattle prices hit \$38.50 a hundred pounds. They stayed above \$30 un-

til October 1951, when the all-time peak of \$41 was reached.

Prices continued above \$30 thru 1952 and 1953, then began to drop during some months of the year, being down as low as \$23 part of the time.

They hit \$30 again in 1956 but dropped as low as \$21.50 in 1957. The \$30 market was again reached in 1958 and 1959 but the top in 1960 was \$28.75.

Prices didn't reach \$30 again until 1962 and after that the big break came, dropping prices to \$21 in 1964. Prices stayed below \$30 from 1963 thru 1968. This was a period when many cattlemen went broke. Then came the quick rise to \$36 this spring.

Stockyards prices and retail prices are not the same, but there is a relationship. Retail prices usually are slower to change than those at the market, either up or down.

Linn Creamery Merges—Changes Plant Role

LINN — Stockholders of Washington County Co-op Creamery Co. voted to merge the company with the Milk Products Co., Inc., of San Antonio, Texas, at a meeting here Saturday.

Howard Murray, general manager of the creamery, also an-

nounced Saturday the plant at Linn will discontinue receiving cream and making butter within the next 90 days.

The Linn plant, which handles bulk milk, eggs and produces cheese and cheese products, has been in operation 49 years and

is one of the oldest co-op creameries in Kansas.

The merger will make the plant at Linn a part of the Kansas Division of Milk Producers Inc., effective Sept. 16.

Murray said the Kansas Milk Producers plant at Clyde will be closed and the two million pounds of milk a month that has been received there will be diverted to the Linn plant, which already handles about three million pounds of bulk milk per month.

ASCS Election Deadline Is Next Week

Election of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation community committeemen is under way over Kansas. It is a mail election with ballots for all eligible farmers being put in the post offices on August 29.

Farmers are urged to vote promptly and return their ballots to their ASCS offices before Sept. 17. Ballots will be counted at meetings open to the public.

Farmers elect community committeemen to aid in the administration of national farm programs at the local level.

Rains at the end of August not

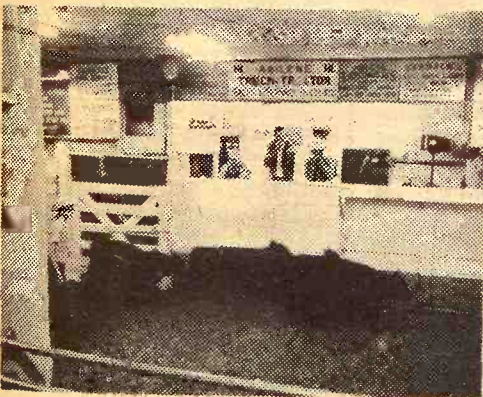
only helped grain crops over wide areas of Kansas but boosted the prospects for the grazing of wheat this fall. Almost the whole central section of the state was soaked with western counties receiving lesser amounts.

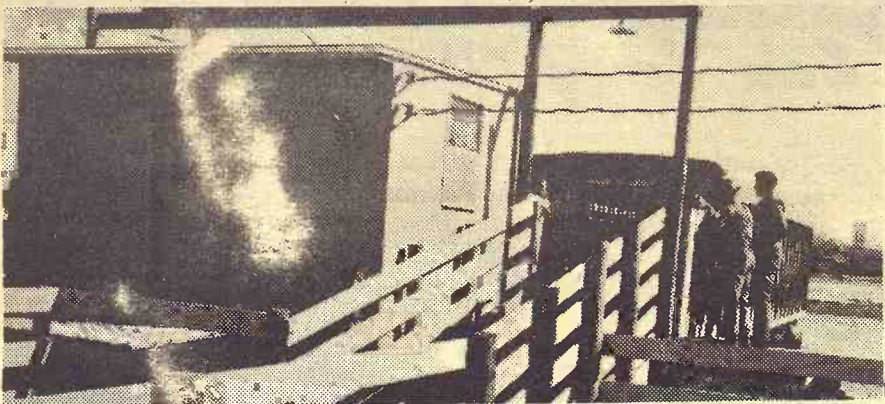
