

Carlgen has 80 stock cows and Wilber tries to keep 60 cows milking year round so they need a lot of feed during the year. The hard work of stacking hasn't been solved because most of the hay goes into barns and they can't use tractor because of limited space. "This has been a real good year for alfalfa because we have had plenty of rain so far," Wilber said. With a 150 acres of alfalfa and several cuttings to go there should be bales galore for Wilber and Carlgen to put up.

## Aldrin - Dieldrin Use Limited To Termite Control

The Environmental Protection Agency has ordered the retention of the persistent pesticides aldrin and dieldrin for termite control, but has continued in effect cancellation of all other major uses of these chemicals.

In his decision, EPA Administrator William D. Ruckelshaus emphasized the need for a public hearing to fully explore the benefits relating to the use of these two insecticides, particularly for protecting corn crops from soil insects and for seed treatment.

The present Order affirms the EPA action of March 18, 1971, cancelling nearly all federal registrations of aldrin-dieldrin products including those for direct soil application to corn land and turf, agricultural seed treatments, aerial and ground spraying or dusting of foliage, and application in homes and barns.

The only uses retained by the Agency at this time were deep-ground insertions for termite control, nursery dipping of roots and tops of non-food plants, and moth proofing of woolen textiles and carpets when there is no effluent discharge. Applications on or near the surface to control termites were not approved because of the runoff problem and consequent accidental poisoning of fish and other organisms.

In announcing the cancellation action, Ruckelshaus said he would rule on the question of suspending certain aldrin-dieldrin uses within the next several weeks. He asked for submission of additional information which might bear on suspension based on the existence of an "imminent hazard" to the public.

Twenty days have been given for comment. Comments should consider the particular hazard of these uses and benefits during the completion of the anticipated hearings. Comments should be addressed to Betty Billings, EPA Agency Hearing Clerk.

The latest order follows a report made to the Agency on March 28, 1972, by an advisory committee which concentrated on the scientific aspects of aldrin-dieldrin use. The committee review had been requested by 84 companies whose products had been affected by the original cancellation order, including the Shell Chemical Com-

pany, sole manufacturer of the basic chemical.

These firms now have 60 days in which to ask for a further review of cancellation action in the form of a public hearing. They may continue to ship their products during this period and during the duration of any subsequent public hearing on the issue. If no hearing is requested for a particular use, the cancellation for that use becomes final at the end of the 60 days period, or on August 25, 1972.

"Although this process can be lengthy, it would afford all parties the opportunity to present more comprehensive data on the benefits versus the risks of continued aldrin-dieldrin use," Ruckelshaus said.

The information available on aldrin-dieldrin indicates that they are persistent chemicals which volatilize readily and travel far from the area where applied, that they build up in the food chain and are stored in fatty tissue. These pesticides have been found to cause damage to fish and bird populations. However, the extent of such damage was not examined by the advisory committee.

Aldrin usage in the United States peaked at 19 million pounds in 1966, but dropped to about 10.5 million pounds in 1970 where it had appeared to be leveling off. During that same period dieldrin use went from 1 million pounds down to about 670,000 pounds. The decreases appear to be due to an increased resistance to the two chemicals by some target pests, particularly soil

insects, development and availability of substitute materials, and the desire to restrict the use of persistent organochlorine insecticides to essential needs.

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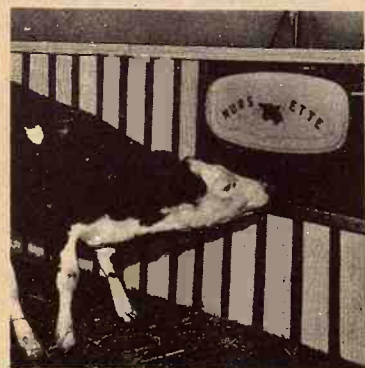

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## Grass Roots Farmer Handles Wheat Variety Plots 30 Years

After handling the operation of wheat variety demonstration plots for 30 years E. W. "Skeet" Underwood has retired from that phase of farming. Underwood is one of the grass roots men who helped make extension an effective aid for

Kansas farmers today.

Well-known as a wheat farmer and insurance man at Bird City in Cheyenne County, he has turned his insurance agency over to his wife. But he is far from being retired. On the contrary, Underwood has been

and will continue to be one of the largest certified seed growers in the northwest corner of Kansas.

Underwood started planting the demonstration plots in Cheyenne County in 1942 at the request of now-

retired county agent Harvey Stewart.

With planting assistance from his brother Bill, Underwood established up to three and one-half acres each year in wheat and barley varieties so that county and area farmers could make comparisons on the quality, quantity, and disease resistance of various recommended selections. The seeds were provided by the KSU Agricultural Experiment Station through Extension.

Frank Bieberly, Extension agronomist at K-State who has attended field days in Cheyenne County for 26 of the 30 years Underwood has put out the plots, had additional praise for the Bird City farmer.

"The wheat industry has become an important part of the economy of northwest Kansas, and Skeet has been a big influence on the industry," Bieberly said.

The county field day has become an annual spring highlight for residents of Bird City and Cheyenne County. Underwood and his wife Marge provide traditional, family-style chicken dinner at noon for nearly 25 special guests. Then, later in the day, some 100 people converge on the plots a few miles southeast of Bird City.

Here Underwood turns the program over to KSU specialists who have a run-down on each of the 12 varieties of wheat on the three and one-half acre display. This year, Dale Edelblute, area Extension agronomist from Garden City, tells those in attendance the results of performance testing at KSU Experiment Stations.

Underwood has been a member of the Kansas Crop Improvement Association since 1939, and has sold certified seed every year since then. He served as vice-president of KCIA in 1958 and '59, and as president in 1960 and '61.

A highlight of his years of selling seed came in the early 1950's when he was called upon to provide 1,300 bushels of certified wheat seed (Tenmarq and Comanche) for sale to the Spanish government.

Underwood's seed has also been sold in South American countries and in every state in the winter wheat belt.

Though he has worked in a bank, managed an insurance firm, and handled income tax work, Underwood says he is a farmer at heart. He's farmed all of his adult life. "I've always loved plants and seed production," he says. "I guess I inherited that from my mother."

His love of seed production paid off in 1948 when he was named by KCIA as a "Premier Seed Grower."

### KLA PRESIDENT WRITES NIXON

The president of the Kansas Livestock Association, Kalo Hineman, Dighton, sent a personal letter to President Nixon to further clarify the feelings of Kansas cattlemen on the meat import quota decision. Hopefully, he said, it will serve to erase any doubts the White House may have had about the feelings of Kansas cattlemen.

Dear Mr. President:

The decision of your administration to remove beef import quotas was extremely unfortunate. This decision leaves beef producers and other agricultural interests with one overriding question. "Are we to be subjected to politically-motivated decisions (presumably consumer-oriented) whenever we begin to make a profit?"

Such decisions by government, apparently intended to give price relief to beef consumers, are of a temporary nature and cause the risk of shortages and higher prices two or three

years from now. This is because of the resulting decline of enthusiasm among domestic beef producers about future profits and increased production. We must keep extra heifers in the breeding herd to increase production, and it takes two or three years for a calf to show up in the supermarket. Your decision was most unfortunate because it comes at a time when we should be continuing our efforts to increase domestic production of beef.

Cattle producers aren't convinced that the price of beef is really a political issue with consumers. We believe that consumers, by their willingness to pay more for beef, are saying that U. S. beef, as a quality product, is not too high at today's prices. That's true, in spite of what a few vocal self-styled consumer spokesmen are saying. It is my strong belief that a reevaluation of the whole area of government intervention in the law of supply and demand for U. S. beef production should be undertaken immediately.

My sentiments are typical of those voiced by cattle producers all over

Kansas. Beef production is the single most important industry in the Kansas economy. Decisions affecting the economic well being of beef production have a tremendous impact on our state.

Perhaps my thoughts can be of help to you in the coming months. United States agriculture needs reassurance now that they are not to be forgotten. Secretary Butz has been effectively doing this up until now, and it would be catastrophic if decisions such as this one on beef imports were to undermine all the good and positive work that he has done.

Please accept my sincere wishes to you in a difficult job.

## Hays To Ark City Turnpike Study Due In 6 Months

Feasibility studies on the proposed turnpike from near Hays, Kan., to the Oklahoma border near Arkansas City are expected to be completed within six months.

Jerry Brindle, secretary-manager of the Kansas Turnpike Authority, said the studies, now beginning, should be completed by the end of the year or sooner.

The legislature authorized \$80,000 for studies to determine if the revenue potential justifies the turnpike, which is to tie in with one proposed in Oklahoma. The system would carry traffic from Kansas agricultural area to the port of Cantossa near Tulsa.

The legislature has authorized issuance of up to \$80 million in bonds to construct the Kansas part of the turnpike, if the feasibility studies are encouraging.

## Processors Given Extra Time To Use Poultry Labels

The Agriculture Department has given poultry processors six months more to use up old labels before they must start telling consumers more about what is in packages of chicken.

New federal regulations which took effect recently would have required the labels now. But the department decided to let processors use old labels until Jan. 12, 1973 because they were notified of

the rule only two months ago.

"The two months allowed under the revised regulations did not give them enough time to use up these labels or design new ones," the department said.

The new labeling rule requires processors to spell out net weight, dietary food claims, artificial flavorings, coloring agents and other ingredients in poultry products.

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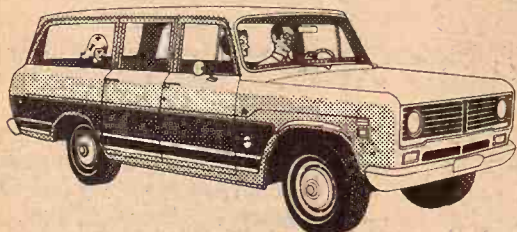


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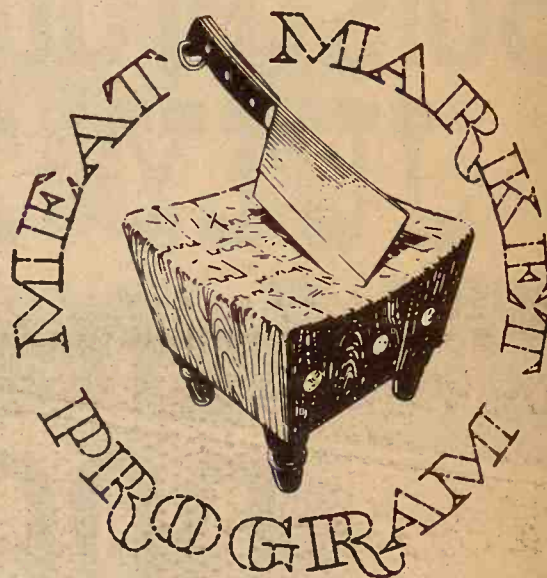
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# Hedging Part Of Business On K.C. Board Of Trade

One of the misconceptions about futures trading on commodity markets is that in each transaction, for every dollar that somebody makes, someone else loses. Or, that in every trade, either the buyer or seller is wrong.

A comment that is heard commonly when someone mentions that a trader made money investing in grain futures is that "you must remember that somebody else lost

the same amount." Even serious explanations of how futures markets operate will include statements to the effect that it is a difference of opinion that makes markets and one man's judgement later is proved right while another's is proved wrong.

These statements are not totally correct. The reason is that they do not take into account the full function of futures markets. In fact, they overlook a major function of commodity futures markets which is called hedging.

At the Kansas City Board of Trade commercial hedging comprises the major portion of futures trading. In hedging, both buyers and sellers are protecting themselves against price fluctuation. Of course, in order for a market to have liquidity, speculators must participate. And herein is where the misunderstanding arises that leads to the opinion that somebody always has to lose for someone else to win.

Many examples can be given of routine hedging. A country elevator, for instance, may take in a million

bushels of wheat within a few days at harvest time. It assumes it will merchandise all that wheat in the months ahead, but during the harvest rush, the elevator has only one immediate goal and that is to get the grain under cover. It has or will pay the farmer the current cash price.

To protect itself on price, this elevator will sell a million bushels of wheat for delivery at some future month. It now owns wheat on the one hand and has wheat sold on the other. Since futures and cash prices tend to move together, the elevator has eliminated the fear of a drastic drop in prices. As it sells its wheat it will liquidate its futures contracts.

The elevator gets its income from a standard handling charge, not from speculation on higher prices. Once the elevator has hedged its inventory, it doesn't really care what happens to prices in the future, even though it seldom is possible to make a perfect hedge. In any case, the elevator doesn't expect to win or lose from its futures transactions.

A miller makes a sale of a large

quantity of flour for delivery in months ahead. The price of the flour is based on current wheat values. The mill buys wheat for future delivery to protect itself on price. Thus it has flour sold and wheat bought and knows the price on each.

Exporters provide similar examples. An exporter may anticipate sales of millions of bushels in months ahead. He can price this wheat to the importer on the basis of the quotations in the futures market if he buys wheat for future delivery. Here, again, the exporter has protected himself on price.

Many farmers this year have "sold" the soybeans they expect to harvest this fall at \$3 a bushel at the local elevator. The elevators, in turn, have sold the beans on the futures market — that is, they have contracted to deliver the beans next fall at a fixed price.

Farmers who have done this have demonstrated that, taking everything into consideration, they are satisfied with the \$3. It's true, soybeans might be worth \$4 next fall, or \$2. In one case, the farmers might wish they had not sold on the futures market but in the event of lower prices, they would be glad they did.

But if it is to be assumed that they were satisfied with the \$3, then it could not be claimed they were wrong or right as prices fluctuated.

If such a thing were possible that every sale for future delivery by an owner of grain were matched by a purchaser of a similar amount by someone who wanted that grain, then it might be contended speculators would not be a necessity on a futures market. But it isn't practical to suggest such a condition could exist.

Speculators always will buy or sell at their prices. In essence, this means that at a price there always are buyers to sellers in the market. This is what makes a market liquid.

And, among classic speculators, those who invest their money on the hope of returns because of price fluctuations, it does become true, in effect, that in every transaction one man is wrong and another right. Thus, if one man buys wheat futures and the price goes up, he makes money while the fellow who sells futures (goes short) loses money. It always takes a buyer and a seller to complete a deal.

But it is not true in transactions among those who produce and sell grain and those who buy and process grain that one side always wins and the other loses. In fact, except in the case of pure speculation, it could be assumed that on any deal, both buyer and seller were satisfied else they would not have completed the transaction.

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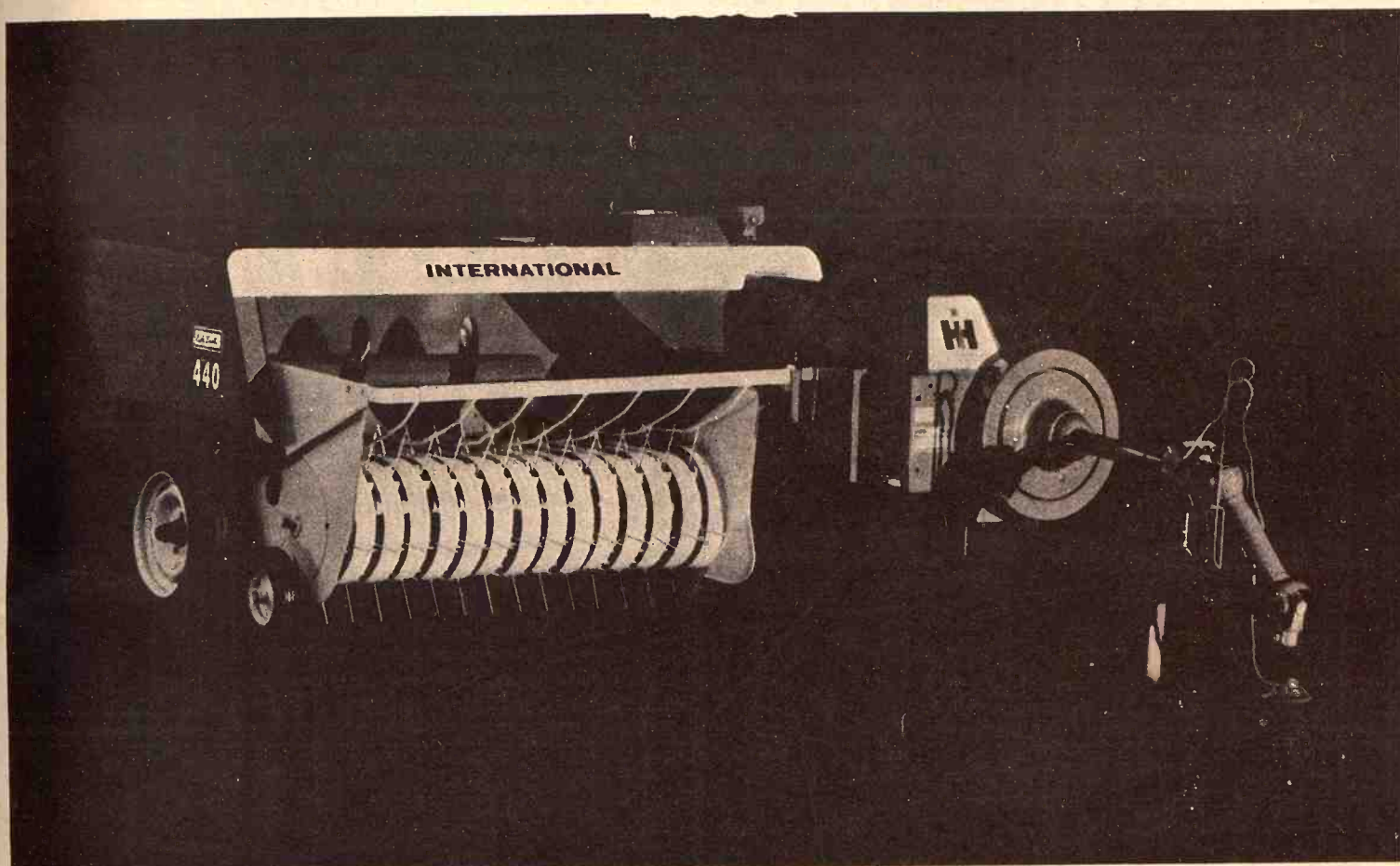
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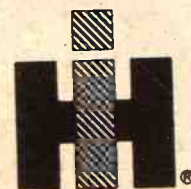
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## Special Satellite To Scan Kansas

A complex satellite launched last Friday may help keep track of cities' growth, prepare crop forecasts, make better maps and spot good fishing spots, the national space agency says.

ERTS—A, the first earth resources technology satellite, is scheduled to be launched down the Western Test Range over the Pacific from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. The 1,965-pound spacecraft will orbit the earth 14 times a day at an altitude of 570 miles.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the satellite may help the Bureau of the Census keep track of urban sprawl, the Agriculture Department prepare more accurate crop forecasts, the Geological Survey produce more

useful and up-to-the moment maps. It may also enable the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to assist the fisheries industry locate troubled waters and those areas where the catches will be good.

ERTS—A is a complex project, with some 300 investigators from 43 states and 31 foreign countries involved.

Dr. Bruce Kelly, director of standards and research for the Department of Agriculture, said: "ERTS coverage will be very broad and very rapid. We are most enthusiastic, and expect that in the area of crop surveys it will provide a most valuable supplement to the information we gather from other sources."

Kelly said the initial areas to be studied intensively by ERTS—A are one or two sectors of 100 square miles each in Missouri, South Dakota, Idaho and Kansas.

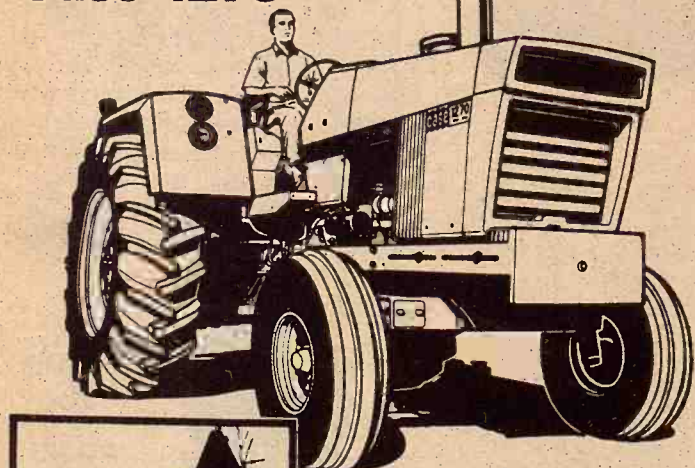

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## Nixon Plans Wheat Subsidy Program Boost

A sweetened billion-dollar wheat subsidy plan by the administration is expected to boost surplus stockpiles even if the Soviet Union to buy any U.S. bread.

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## Nixon Plans Wheat Subsidy Program Boost

A sweetened billion-dollar farm subsidy plan by the Nixon administration is expected to bite into huge surplus stockpiles next year even if the Soviet Union decides not to buy any U.S. bread grain.

The plan, announced by the Agriculture Department, could pay farmers about \$1.1 billion for trimming wheat acreage next year, a record high subsidy for the crop and about \$100 million more than payments for 1972.

It is basically the same as for this year, but includes additional incentives to entice more acres from wheat production. The basic government price support loan will remain unchanged at \$1.25 per bushel.

A department spokesman, noting the build up of wheat surpluses to the highest level in nearly a decade, said the 1973 acreage "set-aside" program benefits could run \$100 million more than the billion spent on payments this year.

"It was drawn up without taking into consideration the possibility of the Soviet sale," Glenn A. Weir, deputy administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said.

Weir referred to a recently announced \$750 million sale of U.S. grain to the Soviets over the next three years.

"But if exports, and sales to the Soviet Union materialize, then farmers stand to gain and cost to the government will be lower," he said.

The program is keyed partly to markets, meaning that if farmers

get higher prices for cash sales they will rely less on government payments.

The program is aimed at taking 25 million acres from wheat production next year compared with about 20 million idled this harvest.

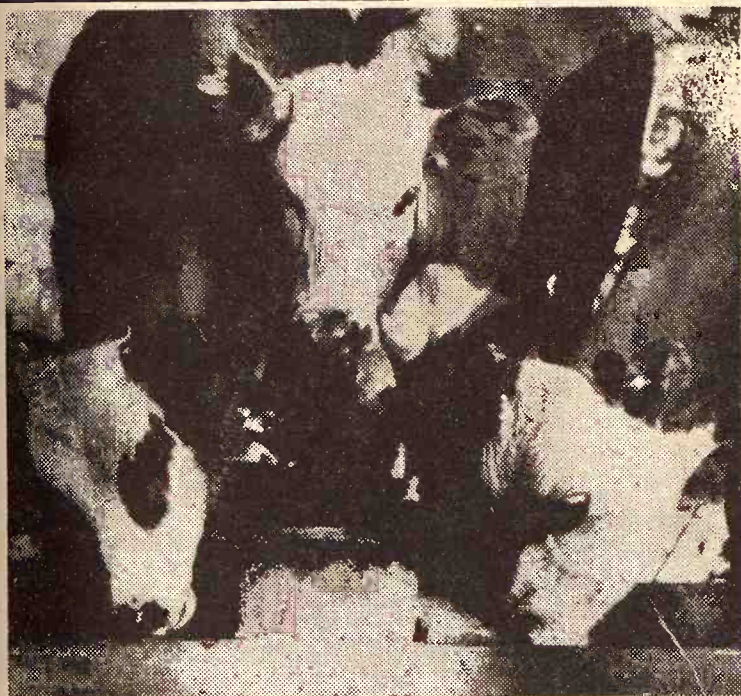
A major change for 1973 is in an "optional" provision intended to entice farmers to remove 10 million acres from wheat production in addition to their basic idled acres.

For that, the government plans to pay farmers an average of \$20 per acre or more to reduce acres for harvest next year.

The reason is apparent: On July 1 the wheat "carover" or surplus was more than 900 million bushels, the most since 1963-64.

Much of the current surplus is the result of a record harvest of 1.6 billion bushels last year, coupled with a sharp dip in exports which was blamed, partly, on dock strikes.

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### WHEAT ON DISPLAY

An interested observer at the Sherman County field day was KSU Extension Director Dr. Robert Bohannon. Like the other participants, Bohannon has an opportunity to get a close look at each of the 12 varieties of wheat on display.

Variety demonstration plots have been a part of the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service educational program for nearly half a century, and their popularity is still evident. The goal of these plots is three-fold: to help farmers improve yield, cut loss from disease, and improve quality. Since the soil composition, precipitation amounts, and growing season temperatures vary from area to area — and even county to county — in the state, demonstration plots are a necessity in each county. Some counties have demonstration plots in as many as six different locations. In each case, farmers have an opportunity to make personal observations while Extension specialists explain the differences in performance testing of each variety.

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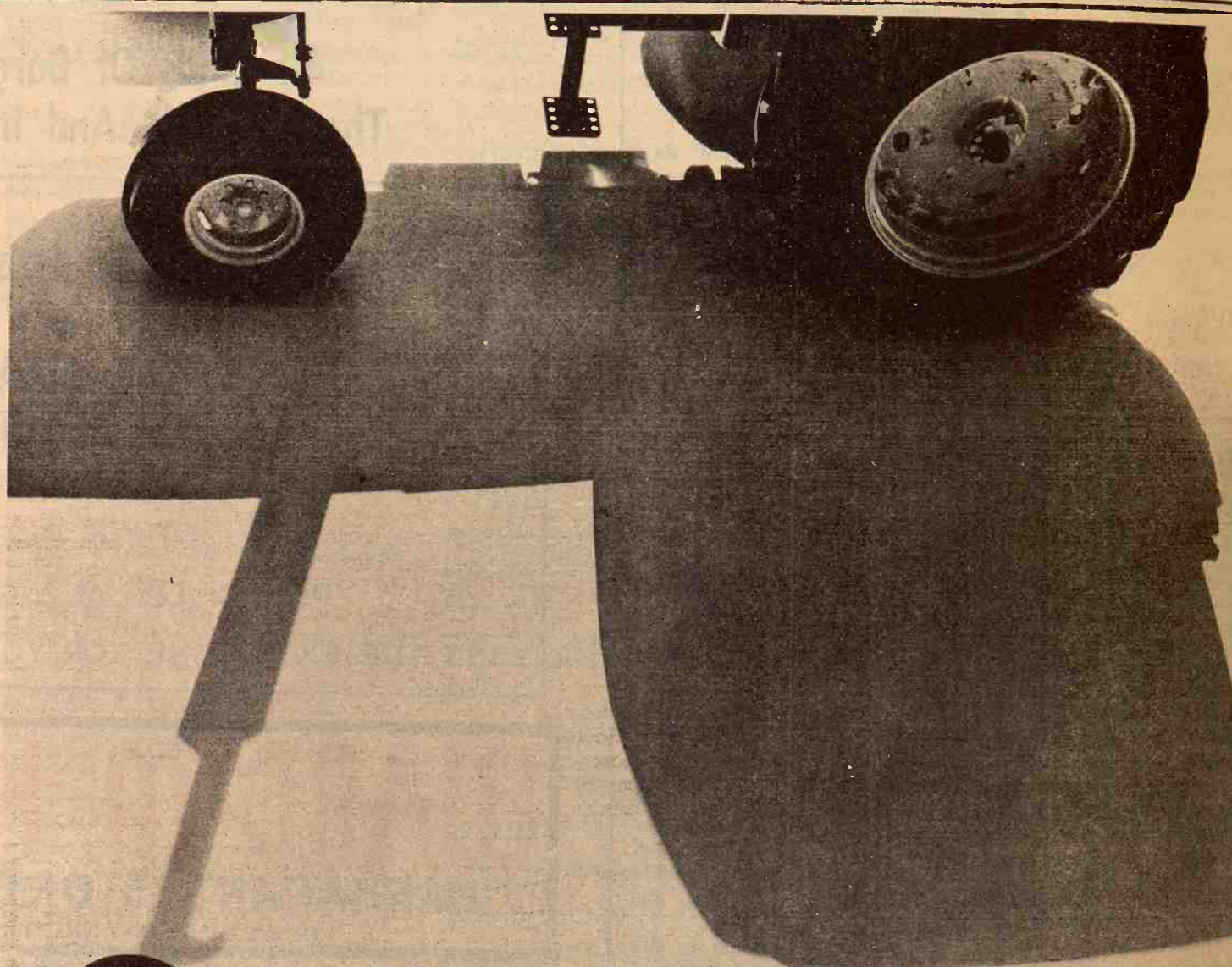

Mattress ticking which has been stained can be cleaned with a rich suds solution in warm water. Wipe lightly and take care not to permit the water to soak through. Always be careful to rinse the area with clear water and blot with several towels. Air dry thoroughly before covering and turning.

Pigskin gloves will keep their softness if you add a few drops of glycerin to the last rinse water during washing.

## Choose Right Light Bulb For The Job

Obviously, the light bulb that does the best job for your money is your best buy. And the best job is something that the consumer must decide for himself.

Homemakers have long been accustomed to buying their light bulbs according to their wattage but bulbs have become more sophisticated of late. In addition to light output, the consumer should also consider the life span, use and price of the bulbs. All of these factors are interdependent.

The hours now listed on many bulb packages tell the consumer the average number of hours that he may expect from a bulb before it burns out.

In buying bulbs, a good rule of thumb is to use longer life bulbs,

sacrificing some brightness in places where it is awkward to change bulbs or to use a bulb that contains krypton. For reading, close work of any kind, quantity of light is the key and bulbs should be chosen on this basis by consumers.

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# Smog Damage Creates Bitter Problem

Kansas farmers may be having trouble with greenbugs, drought, floods, and hail, but one thing they can boast is that they haven't seen any smog banks rolling in, only a few dusty days. The smog problem is recognized as a serious threat to agriculture in many parts of the United States.

The following incident shows the seriousness of smog in California.

Around midday, a massive bank of brownish smog moved in from Los Angeles and lodged against the San Bernardino Mountains, hovering directly over the thriving romaine lettuce patch of the Yamano brothers, the biggest truck farmers hereabouts. By the end of the day, the Yamano brothers no longer had a thriving romaine patch. They had a romaine patch that looked as if it had been burned with a torch.

Incidents like this have occurred with growing frequency in the past 20 years as air pollution has thrown a smothering blanket over rich agricultural areas from California to New Jersey. Dirty air has destroyed tobacco leaf in Virginia and potato plants in Michigan, stunted citrus yields in Florida and driven out truck farming in areas of Illinois, Pennsylvania and New York.

Here in the Los Angeles Basin, the agricultural and horticultural topography has been virtually

transformed by air pollution. Most of the cut-flower industry has fled north; farmers like the Yamanos have abandoned efforts to grow leafy vegetables, and all growers have learned to accept often-severe damage to their other crops, such as citrus, alfalfa, barley, radishes, green onions, celery and tomatoes.

Estimates of the damage caused U.S. agriculture by air pollution vary wildly, partly because some studies ignore losses others include, and partly because all of them are based on guesswork rather than hard data.

In its 1970 annual report, the federal Council on Environmental Quality estimated that air pollution was causing at least \$500 million yearly in damages to crops and livestock. A more conservative study by the Stanford Research Institute, matching pollution counts across the U.S. with the "known sensitivity" of crops to pollution, resulted in an estimate that dirty air costs growers about \$130 million in direct injury to crops and ornamental plants yearly, based on 1964 data. (The study was financed by the Automotive Manufacturers Association, the American Petroleum Institute and the federal Environmental Protection Agency.)

A Stanford Research Institute plant pathologist, Harris Benedict, sniffs at the way some governmental

agencies arrive at their higher loss estimates. "The latest estimate I've seen from the U.S. Department of Agriculture is \$350 million just to crops alone," he says. "That figure was arrived at by splitting the difference between one expert who said \$200 million and another who held out for \$500 million. I'm serious."

Other plant pathologists and government officials, in turn, question studies like the Stanford Research Institute's. Air pollutants—mainly ozone, PAN (peroxyacetyl nitrate) and sulfur dioxide—damage plants in two ways. They directly injure the exterior or the plant, thus ruining its market value, or they act to suppress its water intake and thus stunt growth.

The Stanford group's study ignores the growth-suppression factor, which causes substantial losses in almost all crops, especially fruit and root plants (often without accompanying exterior injury). The study also does not encompass important horticultural industries like home plantings and flowers, or the ripple effects of air pollution, such as erosion after plants die and cost of grower relocation.

Only one or two studies into growth suppression have been completed, but the findings thus far are startling. In one project, conducted by Ray Thompson, a plant pathologist at the Statewide Air Pollution Research Center at the University of California in Riverside, navel orange and lemon trees and zinfandel grapevines were placed in greenhouses in which pollutants were filtered from the incoming air. Mr. Thompson says the results indicate that dirty air is reducing the poundage yield of the grapes by as much as 60 per cent, navel oranges by 50 per cent and lemon by 30 per cent.

A similar study of tobacco leaf at the U.S. Agricultural Station at Beltsville, Md., showed growth suppression reduced leaf yields by roughly 20 per cent to 40 per cent. Both California and the Department of Agriculture are planning extensive growth-suppression studies this year of spring and fall vegetable

crops and soybeans, cotton and peanuts.

Jim Yamano, of the Corona truck-farming family, doesn't need scientific studies to tot up his losses. They are almost entirely from direct, visible injury that leaves crops unmarketable. He can see the brown tips of his green onions, the mottling of his celery and the wilting of his romaine lettuce.

It doesn't take much pollution to ruin the market value of one of his crops. Exposure for as little as four hours to concentrations of oxidants as low as .1 part per billion—far below the level of irritation to humans—produces injury, the Statewide Air Pollution Research Center says. In these modest amounts, the two oxidants, ozone and PAN, leave plants mottled or glazed; sulfur dioxide bleaches leaf

tissue. But when air-pollution counts high early on a hot, sunny day, irrigation moisture in the fields, losses can be total. "In the morning the romaine will be beautiful, and tender," says Mr. Yamano. "Then the smog comes, moisture and heat and no culation, and it's pitiful, like burned each leaf with a match. Every time that happens to the Yamanos' 100-acre patches costs them \$25,000 to \$30,000 unrecoverable expenses, counting profit loss."

Under a federal Environmental Protection Agency program, farm agents now are being trained

throughout the country to systematically tally visible, direct pollution damage as the Yamanos' crops. Sometime in the future, hope to plug loss estimates into a mathematical model that would accurately predict pollution damage to agriculture and horticulture. 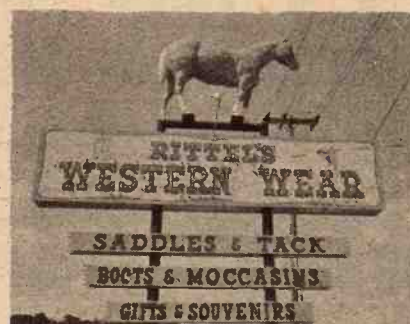

from burn. But the sprays have

proved largely ineffective, and  
developing resistant strains is, to  
some researchers, a painfully  
peaceful and even wrongheaded  
approach.

"Looking for resistant varieties is  
really a miserable way to try to  
solve the problem," says J. B.  
Mudd, a biochemist at the Riverside  
center. "We're looking at the wrong  
end of the stick and assuming a very  
defeatist attitude—that we're going  
to have pollution forever."

Statistics published by the Los  
Angeles County Air Pollution  
Control District indicate that dirty  
air may continue for a long time, but  
it isn't getting much worse in the Los  
Angeles Basin. Since 1965, little  
change has occurred in the tonnage  
of daily emissions of oxidants,  
particulates and nitrogen oxides,  
although sulfur dioxide emissions  
have been cut in half.

However, you can't convince  
farmers with fields outside  
metropolitan areas that the situation  
is static. "When we came here 20

years ago, there was maybe a week  
of damaging smog yearly," says  
Jim Yamano, whose family was  
driven out of the suburban San  
Fernando Valley, some 60 miles to  
the northwest, by stifling air  
pollution there. "Now we have 300-  
odd days of bad smog, and it's  
getting stronger and stronger.  
Growing produce in this area  
any more is now just one big gam-  
ble."

## Nebr. Entomologist Keeping Corn Borer Under Observation

The first brood corn borer is much  
below the 1971 infestation level, but  
according to a University of  
Nebraska-Lincoln Extension entomologist, producers should watch  
for the second brood which will more  
than likely be present in late July  
through August.

Robert E. Roselle noted that  
weather conditions during the  
second brood moth flight may affect  
the number of eggs deposited,  
hatching and establishment. Usually  
the peak moth flight is expected by  
mid-August.

If hot, dry winds are prevalent  
during the peak flight, Roselle said  
many eggs will dry and fall from the  
leaves, or small borers will fail to  
become established. He also added  
that cold, wet conditions may reduce  
the egg laying activity of moths.

Roselle predicts that if weather in  
early August is calm and warm, but  
not hot, late developing corn may  
suffer high infestations.

The NU entomologist said it is  
difficult to determine when controls  
will be profitable for second brood  
since there is no accurate measuring  
method. He did offer the following  
criteria to help determine when and  
if controls might be profitable by  
reducing harvest losses:

- Late corn, that with some green  
silk present in early August, will be  
the most susceptible. Watch late  
fields closely the first 15 days of  
August.

- Examine under leaves for egg  
masses. This is not an indication of  
the numbers that may be present,  
but it will help determine if egg  
laying is in progress in individual  
fields.

- Examine leaf axils for small  
borers. Often they will feed for some  
time on pollen in axils or on the  
surface of leaves and stalks.

- Watch for small borers entering  
the mid-veins of leaves.

- Observe adult numbers for the  
next six weeks and become  
acquainted with the adult stage  
(many small moths resemble corn  
borers).

Roselle suggests collecting a few  
pupae of the first brood from early  
corn and placing them in a jar to  
watch the adults emerge.

Insecticidal control may be ap-  
plied, Roselle said, when there is  
evidence of a heavy moth flight  
coupled with ease of observing eggs,  
small borers in axils or boring into  
mid-ribs, and the corn is late in  
development.

Materials registered for corn  
borer control are: diazinon, EPN,  
Sevin and toxaphene. Roselle  
suggests contacting the local county  
Extension agent for information on  
application instructions and  
limitations of the materials.

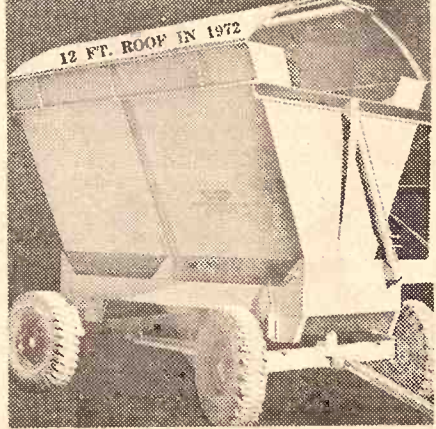
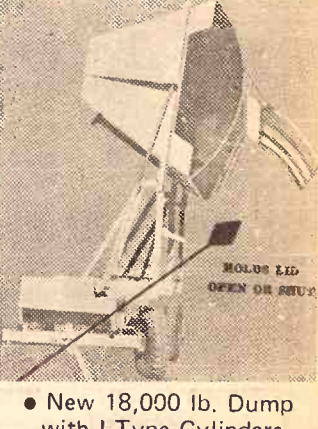
## Farm Land Value Up 8 Percent During 1971

biggest gain since 1968, says the  
Agriculture Department.

The average value of farm land  
nationally was \$217 per acre, up \$16  
from a year earlier, the department  
said. Total value of the nation's far n  
land and buildings was \$228.6 billion,  
a gain of \$15.6 billion.

The increase reported for the year  
ended last March 1, also was nearly  
triple the three per cent growth  
reported for 1970-71 and ended,  
temporarily at least, a sharp  
slowdown of the previous three  
years.

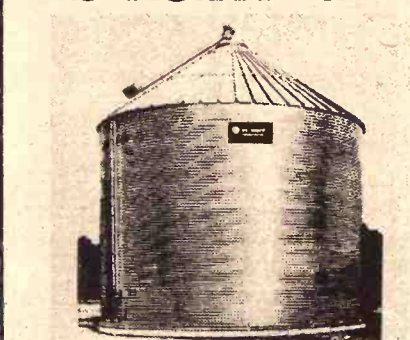

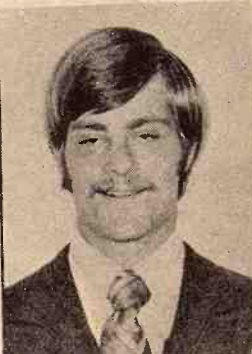

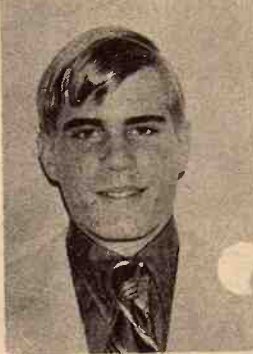

# Cattle On Feed Down 20,000 Head From June

Cattle and calves on grain feed for the slaughter market in Kansas feedlots totaled 1,130,000 head on July 1, 1972, 32 percent more than a

year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The number on feed as of July 1 was 20,000 head below the

June 1 number.

Of the 1,130,000 cattle on feed, 868,000 were in large feedlots with 1,000 head or more capacity, and 262,000 were in farm feedlots of smaller size.

Cattle placed on feed during June 1972 numbered 170,000 head, 90,000 head less than in May. Marketings of grain fed cattle for slaughter during June totaled 190,000 head, unchanged from the previous month.

Cattle feeders' intentions to market indicated 610,000 head were expected to be marketed during the July-September quarter of 1972, compared with 485,000 head last year.

Cattle and calves on grain feed for the slaughter market in the 23 major feeding States are estimated at

12,455,000 head, up 14 percent from a year earlier.

Cattle and calves placed on feed in the 23 major feeding States during April-June 1972 totaled 6,377,000 head, 17 percent above placements in the same quarter last year.

Marketings of fed cattle for slaughter during the second quarter of 1972 totaled 6,742,000 head, 7 percent above the same quarter in 1971.

During July-September, cattle feedlots in the 23 States intend to market 7,184,000 head, 9 percent above a year earlier.

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## Set Aside Acreage Could Cut 1973 Wheat Production

The 1973 wheat acreage control program announced recently is expected to stand, according to a top Agriculture Department policy maker.

As announced, wheat farmers next year will be asked to set aside about 25 million acres from production, compared with 20 million for the 1972 crop.

Ten million acres of the 1973 goal will be sought through "voluntary"

agreements with farmers. Under the voluntary plan, a farmer can set aside up to 150 per cent of his domestic acreage allotment and collect payments at the rate of 88 cents a bushel for what he would have grown normally.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carroll G. Brunthaver said there is no plan to modify the 1973 program later on. Asked specifically if the goal of 10 million acres set aside under the voluntary plan might be increased, Brunthaver said, "I think we've done enough for now."

Wheat industry people here said the program has not been known long enough to cause much reaction from farmers. One spokesman, however, said some producers

might think the 88-cent payment rate—down from 94 cents for 1972—is not enough to attract sufficient acreage from production next year.

Another question involves the wheat market outlook itself. A bumper crop of 1.55 billion bushels is being harvested now, according to the latest USDA estimate, and wheat exports still have not revived entirely from last season's slump.

However, if the Soviet Union buys substantial quantities of U.S. wheat, the market could improve to the point that many growers might elect to take less land from output in 1973.

But the big winter wheat crop, which accounts for most of the grain, must be planted soon and farmers will be forced to decide on 1973 participation with or without further action by the government on new sales to Moscow.

Another factor farmers must consider is a requirement for 1973 that growers who want to participate in the voluntary set-aside plan for extra benefits must agree to limit their harvested acreage next year.

Farmers who decide to participate only in the basic or minimum part of the 1973 plan can set aside an acreage equal to 86 per cent of their domestic allotments and then produce as much wheat as they choose on their remaining land.

But if they want to participate in the supplemental or voluntary diversion plan, the total acreage must be restricted.

"The limit will be their 1972 spring and winter wheat program acreages plus the 1972 voluntary set-aside minus the 1973 voluntary set-aside," the department said.

## New Soviet Grain Analysis Points To Improvement

A new analysis of the Soviet Union's crop situation points to some improvement in harvest prospects since mid-June, but Agriculture Department specialists say Russian grain production still will be less than planners had hoped.

Thus, said the men who made the study, the recent sale of at least \$750 million worth of U.S. grain to the Soviets over the next three years appears in no jeopardy whatsoever because of the increased Russian harvest outlook.

The report, made public Thursday, said Soviet production of all grain this year will be somewhat less than the 181 million tons harvested in 1971.

Major losses were reported in the Soviet winter wheat acreage because of freeze damage and other factors. Consequently, the report said, the crop may drop about 20 million tons from the 113 million harvested in 1971.

Fletcher Pope Jr. of the USDA Economic Research Service, one of the report's authors, said the analysis was based on several sources including U.S. field studies, Soviet press reports and announcements by Moscow officials themselves.

Much of the winter wheat acreage that was abandoned, was planted to spring crops. As a result, the 1972 harvest of feed grains—including corn, oats and barley—is expected to be up one-fifth from last year to about 80 million tons.

Soviet planners had counted on 1972 production of all grain to reach about 190 million tons. Now, because of the setbacks, the total harvest may be around 180 million.

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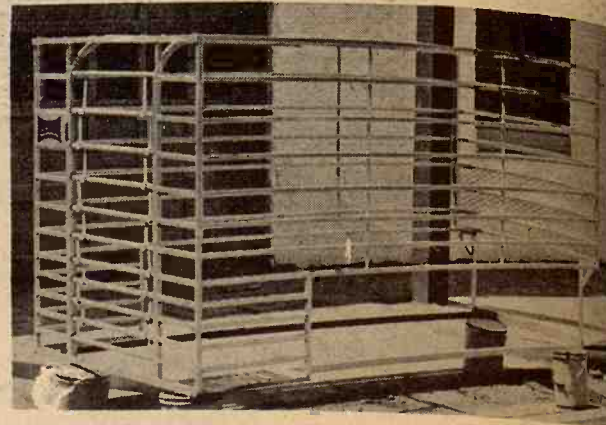

## Farm Land Values Make Biggest Gain Since 1968

Lower interest rates and pent-up demand helped boost farm land values eight per cent last year, the biggest gain since 1968, says the Agriculture Department.

The average value of farm land nationally was \$217 per acre, up \$16 from a year earlier, the department said. Total value of the nation's farm land and building was \$228.6 billion, a gain of \$15.6 billion.

The increase, reported for the year ended last March 1, also was nearly triple the three per cent growth reported for 1970-71 and ended, temporarily at least, a sharp slowdown of the previous three years.

According to the USDA records, farm real estate values nationally rose five per cent for the year ended March 1, 1969; four in 1970; and three in 1971.

The Economic Research service, which reported the latest readings, said inquiries for farm land nearly doubled last year.

"Much of this reported increase in demand was stimulated by more funds available for real estate purchases and low interest rates," the ERS said in a preliminary report.

There were no figures for state farm land values. A full report will be issued later this month, ERS officials said.

Field reporters, who funnel information to USDA statisticians, indicated the actual number of farm and ranches offered for sale changed little from the previous year.

But the number actually bought and sold "increased substantially," the report said.

"Apparently many properties remaining on the market during the earlier period 1970-71 of tight money sold during the last reporting year," it said.

The rate of "voluntary sales"

July 25, 1972

involving decisions by a land-owner on his own rose from 28.7 per 1,000 farms nationally in 1970-71 to 32.0 last year.

Family estate settlements were up slightly from 6.6 to 6.80 per thousand farms, and the foreclosure rate held steady at 1.4 per thousand units, the report said.

"Thus for the first time in several years the total number of land transfers increased — up 15,000 to nearly 127,000 in 1972," the report said.

Buyers borrowed \$3.6 billion to finance 70,000 purchases, \$1.1 billion more than they borrowed the previous year for 57,000 farms.

Most of the land was bought last year for enlarging operations of buyers, the report said.

## Kans. Rainmaking Contract Gets Final Approval

The attorney general's office cleared the way for Kansas to sign a \$100,000 rainmaking contract with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to conduct weather modification experiments over western Kansas.

Approval by the attorney general's office of a proposed pact between the State Water Resources Board and the Bureau of Reclamation was the last formal step necessary before the project can get under way.

The Water Resources Board and representatives of the Bureau of Reclamation already had agreed on terms in the proposed contract, but a legal OK from the attorney general's office was necessary before it could go into effect.

W. E. Steps, assistant chief engineer for planning in the Water Resources Board, said final details must be coordinated with Bureau of Reclamation officials in the bureau's regional office at Denver before the project can be launched. It will be the first such experiment in Kansas which the state government has initiated.

The contract provides that the bureau will subcontract with weather modifications firms to supply the aircraft and pilots to conduct cloud-seeding operations.

Steps had said earlier that no specific starting date for the project had been set, and that initial attempts to induce rain from clouds over western Kansas would depend entirely on weather conditions existing at the time.

The project was approved last spring by the State Finance Council upon recommendations by the Water Resources Board. It urged the rainmaking experiment as a method for rebuilding ground water supplies in parched western reaches of the state.

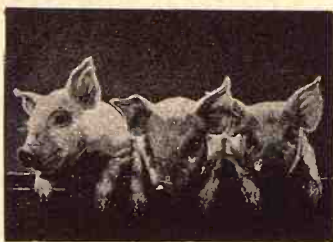
Moisture in the western part of Kansas, however, has been more favorable than usual so far and the project now will place as much emphasis on finding out whether such experimentation works as on producing moisture.

Money for the project was taken from the state's emergency fund.

## U.S. Cattle Hide Trade Under Export Ceiling

The Nixon administration put a ceiling on exports of U.S. cattle hides in a move to curb mounting price pressures on shoes and other leather goods.

Secretary of Commerce Peter G. Peterson, citing foreign and domestic demand which has pushed hide prices to a record high, announced at a news conference that:

- Effective now shipments abroad of U.S. cattle hides will be limited to last year's already-high export level of 16 million hides.

- To carry out the program, export tickets will be issued to U.S. cattle hide producers according to their percentages of total hide production. Under this system, he said, any financial benefits from selling hides at higher foreign prices will be retained by U.S. cattle producers and consumers.

In Omaha, Neb., the president of the National Livestock Feeders Association, Oscar Bredthauer, said

he had sent a telegram to President Nixon saying the NLFA is "shocked, disturbed and enraged" over the action.

He claimed the action was "unjustified, unfair to cattle feeders and producers" and will not succeed in holding down shoe prices.

A similar action in 1966, Bredthauer said, caused an immediate drop in hide prices while shoe prices continued to escalate. "I submit the action will cause the same results," he said.

Peterson declined to predict flatly that the new effort will reduce shoe or meat prices in the United States, though he portrayed costs to the consumer as lower on these items than they would be without the program being imposed.

Aides said shoes already have climbed 1 per cent since January and were projected for another 3 to 10 per cent increase by this fall if there were no hold on hide price rises.

"We believe it will result in a reduction of the price of American-made shoes," Peterson said without giving a precise figure.

"Higher prices and shorter supplies (of hides) result in higher leather prices and higher prices for

leather products, principally leather shoes," Peterson said in explaining his action.

## Certified Soybean Inspection Entries Due August 15

Applications for inspection of certified soybeans are due August 15, announced Bob Bratcher, secretary of the Kansas Crop Improvement Association.

Bratcher said the applications, including the fees and seed source verification, should be sent to his office, 205 Call Hall, Kansas State University, Manhattan 66502.

He pointed out that a \$10 penalty will be charged applicants who fail to meet the deadline. Applications are available at Call Hall or from any county Extension office.

"It will be particularly important for growers of Cutler 71 soybeans who intend to sell the crop for seed to have their fields inspected for certification," said Bratcher.

"Purdue University, developer of Cutler 71, has applied for plant variety protection (similar to a patent) on the variety and has specified that seed intended for planting purposes is to be certified.

"Sale of non-certified Cutler 71 soybean seed by variety name will constitute a violation of the Federal Seed Act."

## Cow-calf Operation Study Approved

Kansas State University's Department of Animal Science and Industry has been granted approval by the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station to study various methods of calf production in the state.

Dr. Don Good, head of the Animal Science and Industry Department, said the project, which will take several years to complete, is designed to study the economic and ecological feasibility of several management techniques of cow-calf operations.

The study herd originally will be made up of Hereford cows and their half Simmental heifer calves. As the herd increases in size it will be divided into five groups. One group will be pastured on native grass range and will receive supplement as needed.

Two of the five groups will be confined in dry lot. One of these confined groups will be fed at National Research Council (NRC) standards while the other confined group will be fed at 70 to 80 percent of NRC standards.

The remaining two groups will be kept in semi-confinement. One of these semi-confinement groups will be fed low quality roughages and

crop residues at NRC standards while the other group of semi-confinement cattle will be fed the low quality feed at 70 to 80 percent of NRC standards.

Complete health and cost records will be maintained on the herd so that economic evaluations can be made. Yearly evaluation and periodic reviews will be conducted allowing modification of the study if necessary.

## Ad Goes To Bat For U.S. Farmer

A hybrid seed corn company is going to bat for the American farmer in the place where it counts — Time magazine advertising.

Assuming the role of advocate for the American farmer in the face of recent consumer criticism of rising food prices, Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., will tell Time readers "the best inflation fighters in the country work on America's farms" in a full-page advertisement in the July 31 issue.

Copy in the advertisement compares average prices paid for farm products in 1971 with those of 1950. Figures show a surprising contrast

to continuing inflation in the general economy.

Spokesmen at Pioneer, a leading supplier of hybrid seed corn, say they hope to reach eight and one-half million Time readers with their message headlined "These Americans have held the line on prices since 1950."

Prices paid farmers for their grain crops have actually shown a significant decline since 1950, despite the fact that farm operators must pay substantially higher prices for the equipment, supplies and land they need to produce the crops. Corn prices have dropped from \$1.52 per bushel in 1950 to an average of \$1.08 last year, and wheat brought only \$1.31 in 1971, compared with \$2 per bushel a generation ago.

Live beef cattle showed a

moderate price increase during the 21-year period — from \$29.35 per hundred pounds in 1950 to \$33.12 last year — but Pioneer points out this amounts to less than one percent a year. Prices for live hogs have actually declined by 50 cents, from \$18 to \$17.50 per hundred weight, during the last generation.

Pioneer suggests this simple experiment for consumers concerned about food costs: compare supermarket prices for a five-pound bag of flour, a five-pound bag of corn meal and a five-pound bag of gardener's potting soil.

"You'll find it's no exaggeration to say our farmers sell their products cheaper than dirt," the Time advertisement states. It continues, asking: "How can they survive buying high and selling low? The sad fact is that many don't. In the last two decades, nearly half our farmers have left the land for already crowded cities because ends couldn't be met."

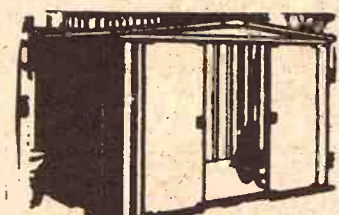

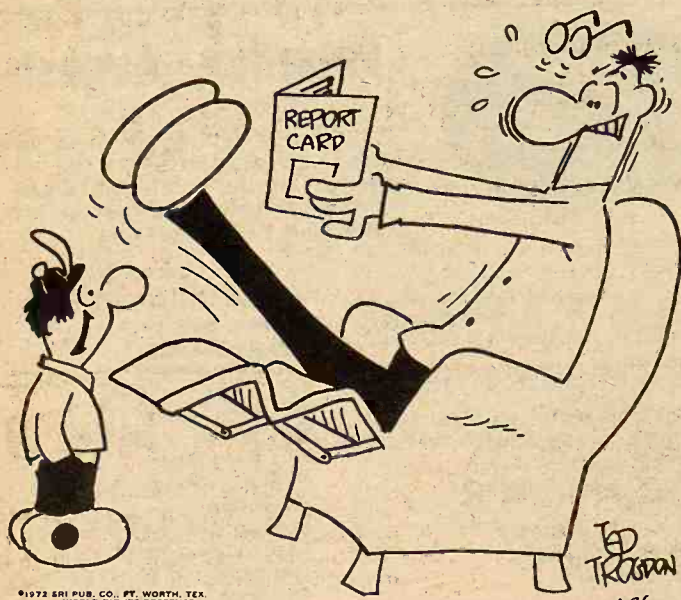

## Archery Cutoff Date For Deer Season Aug. 5

Don't wait too long.

Such was the advice given this week by the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission to archers who wish to participate in the 1972 archery deer season which opens Oct. 1 and runs through November 30.

"Apparently many archers are unaware of this year's regulation which establishes Aug. 5 as the last date of the application period," said Bob Ward, Pratt, administrative officer of the Commission. Last year archery applicants had until Aug. 25 to apply.

Ward said only about 600 archery permit applications have been received to date. "When compared to the 4,662 permits which were issued for the 1971 season, it appears many archers are unaware of this year's shorter application period," Ward said.

Another regulation change will prohibit unsuccessful firearms permit applicants from applying for archery permits since the firearms permit drawings will be held on Aug. 18. For both archery and firearms permits, Aug. 5 is the cutoff date and any applications received after that date will be rejected.

Application forms are now available from county clerks, other license vendors, and game protectors throughout the state.

## U.S. Tax Hike Likely In 1972

America's tax bill averages about \$4,500 per household, or \$2,000 more than 10 years ago, causing rumblings and mutterings about a tax revolt by those hardest hit.

But that's only half the story. As many, or more, are demanding greater government expenditures, for health and welfare especially, and Congress seems willing to go along with them.

The situation is developing into a mass confrontation of opposing philosophical and practical views on what course the country is to take. One group calls it a tax problem, the other a spending problem. Both demand reform.

Few politicians care to discuss it before November, but regardless of which course is taken over the long term, the outcome of the immediate battle seems likely to be— you guessed it— a tax increase in 1973.

The reason for this conclusion, now shared by a large number of economists and researchers, is that government spending commitments already exceed revenues.

With the fiscal 1973 budget deficit likely to be near \$30 billion, the three-year total 1971-1973 may exceed \$80 billion, a stupendous figure when measured against any other "peace-time" period.

Whether or not spending can be better controlled after 1973 depends to some extent on the outcome of this year's election, but it is worth noting that recent deficits were run up by a President who considers himself a spending conservative.

The past also offers a suggestion: Figures supplied by the Tax Foundation demonstrate that in recent years the country has been demanding more services from its government but has been more reluctant to pay the bills.

In 1962, the foundation reports, expenditures per household by local, state and federal governments were \$3,225. By 1968 the comparable figure was \$4,676, and for 1972 it was more than \$6,200.

By contrast, taxes per household in 1962 were about \$2,500, rising to more than \$3,600 in 1968 and to more than \$4,500 in 1972, a percentage rise of only 77.5 per cent, compared with a spending advance of 93 per cent.

While inflation has many causes, this gap between revenues and expenditures is cited by economists

as one of the underlying causes. Inflation, they point out, is really an unlegislated tax.

If a tax increase does come, what will be its form? Again, a lot depends on which party is most successful.

Present speculation puts a value added tax at the top of the list, especially if President Nixon is re-

## 26 College Loan Bill Requires Family Income Disclosure

Tens of thousands of college students across the nation will be required to undergo an un-

precedentedly detailed disclosure of family income in order to receive interest-free federal loans to finance their education this fall.

The requirement, incorporated by Congress in the omnibus education bill signed into law by President Nixon on June 23, is likely to result in a substantial reduction in the number of students qualifying for

such government aid, according to officials of the United States Office of Education.

Students from middle-income families attending the lower-priced public colleges, universities and 2-year institutions will be hardest hit by the changes now going into effect.

In the past, about 96 percent of students applying for the federally subsidized loans received them by showing that their adjusted family income was less than \$15,000. This family financial disclosure amounted to a simple computation of gross income, minus the 10 percent standard income-tax deduction and allowable exemp-

Under the new regulations, families must complete a detailed confidential financial statement for loan officers at the institutions their children attend.

The statement requires disclosure of all family income, debts and liabilities, and assets such as automobiles, mortgage equity, savings and other investments. Businessmen will have to fill out a separate form detailing their income.

College loan officers, who will be faced with an unprecedented amount of paperwork, will decide whether a student has demonstrated the financial need required for an interest-free loan. The college official will certify the student for a loan to a bank, which then makes the government-guaranteed loan.

For a student borrowing \$1,000 a year for 4 years of college, the "free interest" picked up by the government during a college career and for up to a year afterward could equal nearly \$1,000 at 7 percent interest.

In the last fiscal year more than a million students borrowed over \$1 billion under the now-revised program which some congressional critics labeled a government hand-out for middle and higher-income families.

Students who do not qualify for the interest-free loans still may apply—regardless of income—for a regular interest-bearing commercial loan insured by the government.

Most students from families with \$10,000 or more income probably will not qualify for the interest-free loans or may receive substantially reduced amounts, he said.

### THE MYTH OF "REVENUE SHARING"

As your representative, I felt compelled recently to vote against the so-called "Revenue Sharing" bill. It appeared to be the only responsible thing to do.

My primary reason for voting against revenue sharing is that we have no revenue to share. Instead we have a federal budget deficit averaging \$30 billion each year. To place an additional \$30 billion burden over a five-year period on this already irresponsibly unbalanced budget is, in my opinion, sheer madness. At best, a vote for revenue sharing is a vote for a tax increase in 1973.

Nor does this so-called revenue sharing put more power in the hands of local and state governments. It accomplishes a great dependency on big federal government. Once begun, we will see tremendous pressure to increase the amount of money "shared" with state and local governments.

We desperately need to relieve the burden of local property taxes. This bill does not do this.

We must take a hard look at local and state programs subsidized with federal money - now amounting to \$37 billion each year. This bill does not do this. Federal money sent to state and local governments has increased from \$7 billion in 1960 to \$37 billion in 1972.

Those who spend tax monies should be responsible for raising tax monies. This bill removes the onus and responsibility for raising money from state and local legislators who will spend the money and places the burden

and onus for raising the money on the more remote federal legislators.

This bill distributes monies to states and local governments regardless of need. Such money is not needed by some governments and will not come close to meeting the problems of others. The chances are that more money would flow from the Second district of Kansas to Washington than would flow back to the Second District.

State and local governments will increase their revenues (by taxes already approved) from \$130 billion in 1970 to \$323 billion in 1980. These revenues will provide few or no increased services unless we control inflation. Continuing and increased federal budget deficits assure and accelerate inflation and further destruction of the dollar's buying power.

In sum, a vote for so-called revenue sharing is a vote for the sharing of an over-drawn bank account, a vote for a federal tax raise, a vote for decreasing local and state responsibility, a vote for more power in Washington, a vote for separation of taxing responsibility and spending responsibility, and finally, a vote that does not address itself to the basic problems in some selected localities, and a needed review of our local, state, and federal tax structure.

For these reasons, I voted against the so-called revenue sharing bill. I was on the losing side of 274-122 vote, but I would vote that way again — for what I believe, to be the best interest of the nation.

Dairy Heifers  
Need Training

Dairy heifers need some training before entering the milking string. A springing dairy heifer should get used to going through the milking parlor. She should be fed some grain in the barn if that is where she is to be fed. Her udder should be washed as it will be after freshening.

The first calf heifer adopts her milker as her offspring. A good dairy-man can spend a few minutes extra with a fresh heifer and make her a friend for life.

The heifer should be trained to milk fast and her udder should be washed and massaged for at least 30 seconds. When milk has been let down — which should happen within one minute — the milking machine should be put on the heifer.

As soon as the heifer is milked out, the machine should be removed. Teats should be dipped in an approved solution to cut down on new cases of mastitis. Milking properly trained cows is a pleasure. They love to come into barn and be milked.

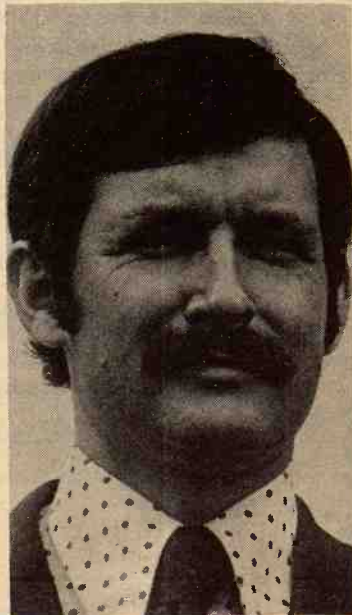
First calf heifers need extra grain. These heifers need to grow as well as give milk, which means they need added energy and protein. Many times it is impossible to get enough grain into them in the barn and grain must be fed outside. Parlor starvation keeps many cows from being profitable.

The first calf heifer should be well-bred. She should have better genes for milk production than the older cows if the dairyman has been using the best bulls available.

Heifers should be bred to dairy bulls. First calf heifers should be well-grown and freshened at 24 months.

It takes time, money, and thoughtful planning to put a good, heavy-milking two-year-old in the milking string.

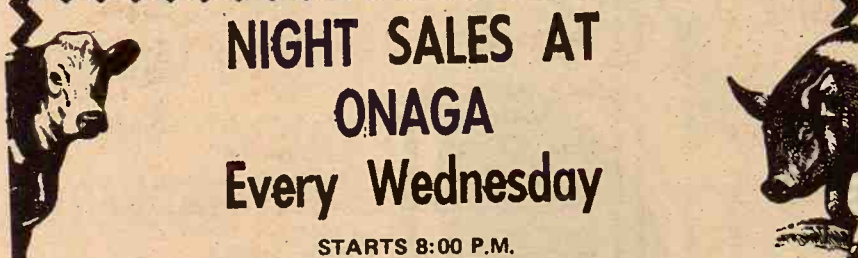

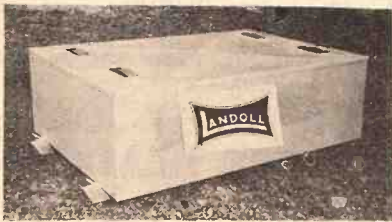

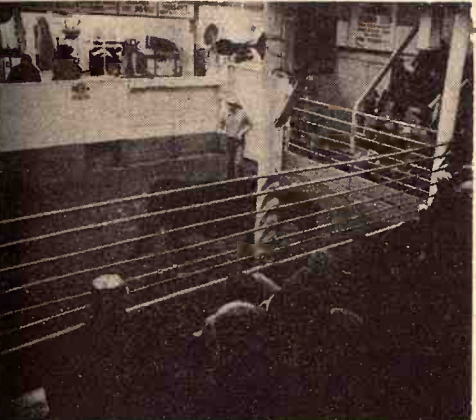

## U.S. Income Midpoint Over \$10,000 Mark

The midpoint of national family income went over \$10,000 last year for the first time in U.S. history, but inflation eliminated all the gain in purchasing power, the Census Bureau said.

According to the bureau, of the 53.3 million families in the United States, 27.6 million or 51.7 per cent received income of \$10,000 or more in 1971.

The bureau figured that median family income, or the middle point of family income, was \$10,285 last year. The figure is not an average.

A year earlier median family income was \$9,870. Purchasing power was unchanged because of rising prices, the bureau said.

The bureau said there were 9.9 million families or 18.5 percent with incomes between \$7,000 and \$10,000, 6 million families or 11.2 percent between \$5,000 and \$7,000, and 9.8 million families or 18.5 percent with incomes below \$5,000.

The midpoint of annual income for black families was \$6,440. This was about 60 per cent of the middle income for white families, or \$10,670.

In a report, the bureau said the number of Americans living below the poverty level was essentially unchanged in 1971 over 1970.

That report showed that the official poverty level rose from \$3,968 in 1970 to \$4,137 because of inflation.

The number of people living below the poverty level last year was 25.6 million compared with 25.4 million a year earlier. Because of sampling errors, the bureau said, there is no statistical difference between the two numbers.

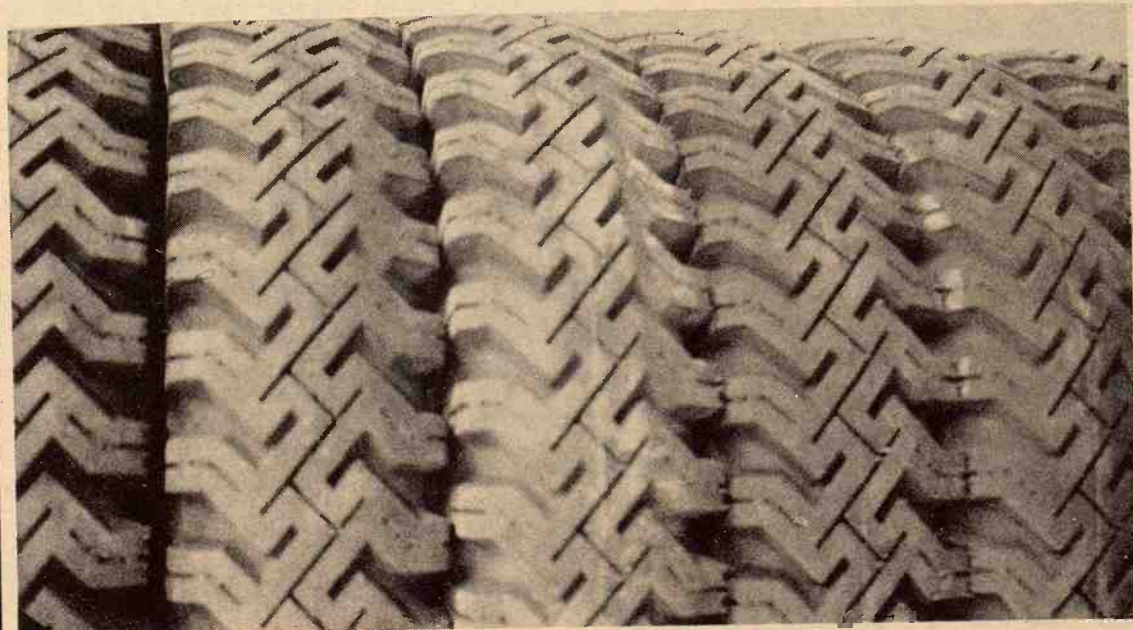
