Kansas Now 3rd Rank In Beef

With a spectacular 10 percent growth in the number of cows and calves on farms and in feedlots, Kansas became the third-ranked cattle state in the U.S. in 1971.

Reports from the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that Kansas passed Nebraska during 1970. The January 1 reports this year show Kansas had 6.6 million cattle and calves while Nebraska had 6.45 million.

Ranked ahead of Kansas are Texas with 12.6 million head and Iowa with 7.4 million. Oklahoma gained 100,000 head during the year, but remained in fifth place, behind Nebraska. Missouri is sixth and Colorado is 11th.

Alaska is 50th with only 9000 head of cattle.

The increase in Kansas was mostly due to an increase in the number of cattle being finish fed for slaughter in the state.

Trend in the nation, according to the USDA a week ago, is toward fewer and bigger feedlots. Figures show that the number of feedlots in the 22 major feeding states of the nation declined by 4 percent last year. Total at year end was 182,550 lots.

But while the nation's small lots — those with capacities of fewer than 1000 head — declined by 4 percent from 187,725 to 180,329, the bigger lots increased in number by 7 percent from 2069 to 2221.

Sharpest increase was in the number of feedlots with a capacity of more than 32,000 head. This

number increased 33 percent — from 31 to 41 lots last year.

Feedlots in the 16,000 to 31,999 range totaled 105 by the end of 1970. There were 101 at the end of 1969. One of every nine head of fat cattle marketed in the 22 feeder states was marketed from lots of 32,000 or more capacity. In the next size — 16,000 to 31,999 — 13 percent of the cattle marketed were fed in that size lot.

Total number of cattle in the U.S. as the year began was up 2 percent. This is about 1/2 of one percent above the increase recommended by the American National Cattlemen's Association. The increase was from

112.3 million to a total of 114.6 million by Jan. 1, 1971.

Of the total number of cattle, beef cows were up 3 percent, while dairy cows declined 1 percent. Values were higher, scoring a new mark for inflation. The total value of cattle was pegged at \$21.1 billion, up 5 percent from a year ago.

Kansas slaughterhouses increased their processing of red meat by 23 percent from the end of 1969.

Total red meat for the 12-month period was 1.596 billion pounds. Beef total for December was 130 million pounds, up 9 percent from November and 28 percent higher

than for December 1969. Total beef slaughter for the year was 1.278 billion pounds, up 27 percent from the preceding year's production.

Pork production in Kansas during December was at 34 million pounds, up 12 percent from November, and 37 percent above the same month a year earlier. During the year pork slaughter was 317 million pounds, up 9 percent from 1969.

Sheep and lamb slaughter for December was 21,000 pounds, double for the same period a year ago. Total production of 148,000 pounds during the year was 40 percent more than total reports for a year earlier.

New Helicopters Around Ft. Riley

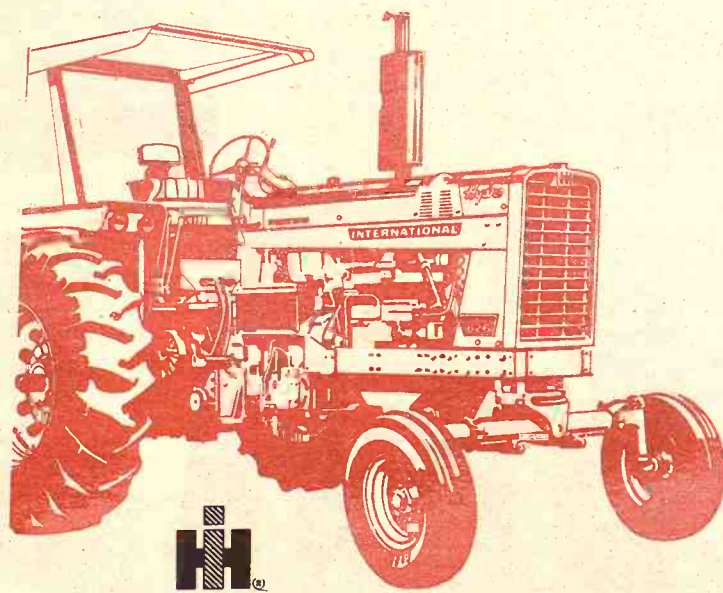

Helicopter New Process Purifies Water Without Overtaste

A new disinfecting process that purifies water without affecting its taste has been developed by two Kansas State University scientists. The collaborators, Dr. Jack L. Lambert, a chemist, and Dr. Louis Fina, a microbiologist, say the process is inexpensive, reliable, and can be used by a layman with no special equipment.

Patents already have been applied for, not only in the United States but also in 20 foreign countries as well, and several commercial firms have expressed an interest in the invention. The first published work on the research has just appeared in the Journal, Applied Microbiology.

What the K-State scientists have done is combine ion exchange resin beads with a disinfectant — triiodide — to form an insoluble combination that apparently kills germ-killing iodine on demand.

"Our system probably will be most practical for use with water that is to be consumed immediately," say Lambert and Fina. They suggest some obvious applications: a rural farm home, campers, military service in the field, and possibly hospitals.

"This method of purification could be used to give what appears to be drinkable water a final treatment which would kill the bacteria," they say.

There also may be some industrial applications. One that suggests itself is to purify water used by factories and refineries for cooling purposes.

Explains Lambert: "When water is re-cycled, bacterial growth is a problem. The company doesn't want corrosive residual disinfectants in the water, but they do want it free of microorganisms."

"Because chlorine is so cheap, most people unconsciously think of it as our best disinfectant," says Lambert, "but literature is accumulating that iodine and bromine are better and kill bacteria more effectively. Up to now, however, it has been more expensive to use these disinfectants."

Lambert and Fina do not expect their process to replace chlorine for most uses. They do not believe their invention particularly useful for such things as treating municipal water supplies or public swimming pools. Here the standard procedure is to over-chlorinate the water so that there is chlorine present to disinfect the water for some time after treatment. With the Lambert-Fina process, the water would be subject to re-contamination at any time.

It was Lambert who had the bright idea of combining resin beads with a disinfectant to form an insoluble column or bed which would kill bacteria in water as the water flowed through. He was familiar with use of similar materials for water softening and de-ionizing, but had never heard of anyone trying to kill bacteria.

He pondered this for some time before he got up nerve enough to approach Dr. Fina on the problem.

Today Fina just says: "I thought he was crazy." But Fina went ahead and assigned some graduate students to work on the problem. And by the time initial efforts had been frustrated and the compounds Dr. Lambert originally suggested had failed to work out, Fina was sufficiently intrigued to ask Lambert if there were any other compounds they might try before giving up.

The result was a triiodide and resin combination that worked unbelievably well. It passed large quantities of water and the bacteria

were killed instantly.

"It's like magic," Fina and Lambert agree.

Fina lets a drop of water pass through the column and tastes it.

"See," he says. "It's tasteless. Go ahead, try it for yourself."

The reporter does — there is no taste — but Lambert, knowing there are a million dead *Escherichia coli* cells per milliliter in the solution which has passed through the column, can't be persuaded to taste it again.

"Apparently nothing happens except that the bacteria are killed," Fina says. "We had Dr. N. D. Eckhoff and Prof. Robert Clack (nuclear engineering department) help us tag bacteria with radioactive tracers and we traced the bacteria right through — all that happened was that the bacteria were killed."

The two K-Staters aren't sure how the germicide works, but Lambert theorizes that a tiny amount of iodine — an amount so small it can't be detected by conventional analytical methods — is released to disinfect the water as it passes through.

"I like to think of it as a million dollar bank account against which \$10 checks may be drawn almost endlessly. When the bank account finally is empty, one can start all over again if he deposits another million dollars (that is, recharges the column.)"

Because the Lambert-Fina system can be recharged, it may have special applications for long space flights where water would have to be

re-used many times.

Of course, no matter how well a thing may work in the laboratory, it may not prove practical in actual use. So two K-State chemical engineers, Dr. L. T. Fan and Dr. Larry Ericson, have been involved to see if there are any unforeseen problems with commercial applications.

And in the laboratory K-State graduate students continue their tests of the effectiveness of the disinfectant columns against additional bacteria — five of the most important organisms have been checked out to date. They're also testing other resins and disinfecting materials to see what happens.

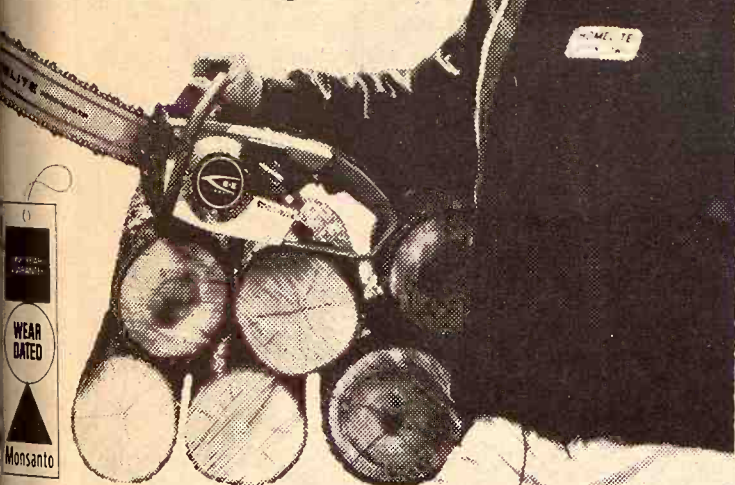
For only the second time in 53 years, the Wm. Wrigley Jr. Co. is raising the price for its chewing gum.

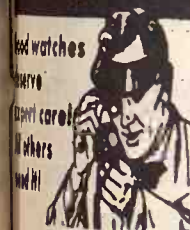

Might Allow Methadone Treatment For Youth Addicts Without Parental OK

Five methadone treatment centers in Kansas are now treating heroin addicts and conceivably, if the Kansas Legislature passes a Senate bill on drug addicts now under consideration, many additional minors could enter one of the programs with or without the consent of their parents or guardian. Dr. G. William Nice, Topeka Physician, says.

Sen. Bob W. Storey of Topeka, who last week introduced Senate Bill 91 which would authorize a physician to treat a minor for drug abuse or addiction without prior consent from the youth's parents, said:

"Many physicians are reluctant to provide even emergency aid to minors in drug cases because of the liability involved without parental consent. Immediate treatment is often needed in such cases and doctors should be able to provide that treatment to youths without worrying about the possibility of a lawsuit as long as negligence is not involved."

"Many youths are reluctant to seek treatment for narcotic addiction because they must have parental consent first," Dr. Nice, chairman of the college health committee of the Kansas Medical Society, said.

"Although methadone has been around for at least 35 years, it has been used experimentally in treating heroin addicts only in the past five years," he continued.

"With methadone treatment we substitute one addiction for another, methadone for heroin," Dr. Nice, who is associated with the treatment center at Stormont-Vail Hospital, Topeka, added.

"But with methadone we are able to gradually cut dosage of the drug without heroin's frightening withdrawal symptoms. Also, methadone, unlike heroin, does not cause a high. It actually neutralizes the effects of heroin."

Twenty-seven people have been treated at the Topeka center, which

one which has been addicted to hard drugs and heroin for more than 25 years.

Other methadone treatment centers in Kansas are at the University of Kansas Medical Center in Kansas City, Watkins

Hospital in Lawrence, St. John Hospital in Leavenworth, and at the Sedgwick County Hospital in Wichita which is co-sponsored by the Sedgwick County Mental Health Clinic and the Family Practice Program at Wesley Medical Center.

Water Shortage A Hardship In Mitchell County

Water District Hope

Water shortage — it's costly, inconvenient, and sometimes downright discouraging. And Mitchell county farm families know as much about water shortage hardships as anyone.

Mitchell county lies on an upland plain with very little underground water. And what water there is usually has extremely poor quality — high alkalinity and sometimes high nitrate content. What's more, quality tests show the water getting worse as time goes on.

"Winter is unpleasant for almost any farm family, but for ours with little water it becomes agonizing and often financially crippling," reports Kenneth Fromm, Mitchell county Extension agricultural agent.

Riding around the county for a day with Fromm visiting farm folks who don't have enough water proved two things to me:

First, they absolutely need more and better water and, second, if they had water, their lives would be much more pleasant and the county would be much better off financially.

For instance, Mrs. Harold Eilert, who faced the task of farming 1,300 acres after her husband's death, thought her son John could step into the business with her.

John, recently married and an agricultural economics graduate of Kansas State University, agreed. However, after he moved his family to the farm, the ugly spectre of "no water" reared its head.

There just isn't enough water on the place for two households, let alone for expanding the farm's livestock enterprise enough to support two families.

Typical of folks in the county, the Eilerts, have made an earnest effort to ease their water problems. They have hauled water for 15 years. They hire 1,300 gallons a week hauled from Beloit at a cost of \$4 per load.

An effort to gutter the home and drain rain water into a cistern

proved ineffective.

They ration water in every manner possible and Mrs. Eilert says her fondest dream "is to bathe in a tub full of water whenever I feel like it."

Young Eilert wants to expand the livestock enterprise from 24 dairy cows — which is all the water well will support — into some type of beef production which will allow better land utilization.

With water he could put stocker calves or cows on his 500 acres of wheat pasture and 250 acres of milo stubble. Right now he gets no use from these resources because it is too expensive to haul water for livestock located there.

"Unless we get additional water soon, I'll probably be forced to leave the farm," young Eilert glumly predicts.

The case of the Dale Adell family near Glen Elder sheds even more light on how serious a water problem can be. Adell, who was displaced from his original farm site by the Glen Elder Dam, is a commercial swine producer, raising 3,000 market hogs per year.

Upon moving to his new farm site, he spent \$5,000 to develop two wells that only produce 2½ and 3½ gallons per minute. That was barely sufficient for his operation. Then his KSU Extension Farm Management Association records showed the rate of gain on his hogs began to fall and his feed cost per pound of gain rose from near nine cents to nearly 13 cents.

This continued for three years until Adell was able to determine the cause of his problem by moving some pigs to a different water supply. Their feed costs immediately went back down to nine cents per pound of gain.

Adell suspected his water, and subsequent tests showed a high nitrate content that fostered a high bacteria growth. This upset the pigs'

digestive tracts.

Adell installed a chlorinator, which partially solved his problems. However, it is difficult and expensive to operate.

"I spend \$75 a month hauling water and paying for the chlorinator," Adell relates.

But the real bite in Adell's pocketbook was in the inefficiency of his hogs. Figuring a conservative two cents per pound in extra feed costs for 3,000 hogs weighing only 200 pounds, the total comes to a staggering \$18,000 per year for three consecutive years.

"I can't expand and I'm barely keeping my head above water right now," says Adell. "I'm stuck, until I

get my water problems solved."

Max Greif, a Tipton dairyman, faces possible shutdown of his grade A dairy operation unless he gets good water.

He not only has a water shortage but the water he has is so alkaline the "lifelong" nylon fittings on his milking equipment have been replaced three times since 1967 at a cost of \$65 each time.

The working mechanisms in his water pumps have to be replaced every two or three years. The copper and galvanized pipe in his milking parlor is rapidly ruined by the alkaline water.

"Last year I spent \$1,000 on two water softeners," he says. "They

cost \$15 a month to run them — and they're not really doing the job either."

Greif's problems have multiplied lately because milk inspectors have warned him about the water spots on his glass milk lines and in his stainless steel cooling tank.

"It's impossible to keep water spots off equipment with water as hard as mine," he laments. "I may get forced out of operation when what I really want to do is double my milking herd to at least 80 cows."

Greif's neighbor, Charles Hollerich, is in much the same predicament. He wants to double the size on his dairy, too, but can't because his water supply won't

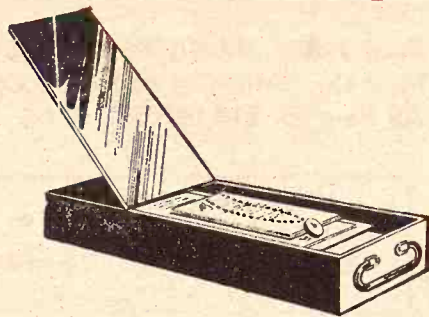

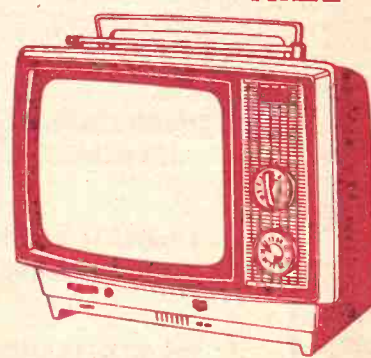

The Huffman farm has been
transformed into a competitive
economic unit by the addition of
water. They now have 300 head of
feeder pigs and 40 sows when they
previously had only six sows.

More than 200 head of cattle drink
contentedly from brimful water
tanks whereas before it was a
struggle to find water for 25 head.

"The water district permitted us
to expand our livestock program for
a more satisfactory standard of
living," Mrs. Huffman reasons.

Mitchell countians aren't standing

still and meekly accepting their
water situation.

Under direction of Extension
agent Fromm they have taken
strides to organize two rural water
districts which would serve 800
families in Mitchell and adjoining
counties.

"The water is available in Glen
Elder Lake and if we can get it to our
farm people through rural water
districts, I believe our livestock
production in the county will at least
double," Fromm predicts.

The proposed W.C.H. & T. and
Lulu Water Districts are nearing
the stage where money for con-
struction is needed. Dale Adell's
need for water was the initiating
factor in establishing a steering
committee for the proposed W.C.H.
& T. Rural Water District in south-
west Mitchell county. In the fall of
1968 he and several of his neighbors
formed a steering committee for the
project which would serve 270 rural
families and the communities of
Hunter, Tipton, and Glen Elder.
Bucher and Willis Consulting
Engineers of Salina did the
feasibility study for the proposed
district.

Sam Motes of Scottsville and a 13-
member steering committee of the
Lulu district have worked diligently
to get water users in parts of five
counties covering 383 square miles
to agree to hook up to the water
district.

White and Hamele Associates,
consulting engineers from Salina,
have completed the feasibility
study. The district as designed
would include over 1,700,000 linear
feet of pipe, cost \$205 for a minimum
meter hookup, and have a minimum
monthly rate of \$8.91.

Also included in the study are the
towns of Beloit, Glasco, Simpson,
Asherville, Scottsville, Barnard,

Jewell, and Solomon Rapids — all of
which have water problems. Several
commercial businesses and large
agricultural enterprises such as
feedlots would also be served.

Under the proposed district, water
users will provide 10 per cent of
construction costs and the Farmers
Home Administration the other 90

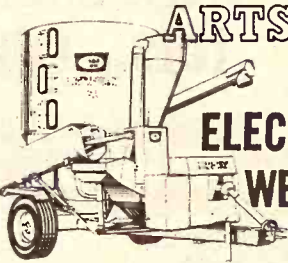
per cent — to be repaid by water
users over a 40-year period.

"Any way you look at it, the
proposed district is a bargain when
you consider that 65-75 per cent of
the folks it will service are hauling
water year round," Motes observed.
"We're ready to go. All we need is
final say from the FHA."

Plan Schedule Of Household Duties To Prevent Accidents

Shake hands with your clock and make a friend of time.

Studies by safety experts indicate that a lack of organization in the home often creates situations that lead to accidents.

It is suggested that homemakers write a plan for each day — even a rough outline will help — either the night before or the first thing in the morning.

Too often, the memory can play tricks. Two trips to the store — where one properly planned trip would have been enough — means less time for other chores or maybe a needed rest period.

When unfinished tasks pile up, the end of the day finds mother tired out and bewildered, her temper frazzled.

There are instances of mothers engrossed in household tasks forgetting to pick up little children at school, until a call from teacher.

Small children have a fear of being lost or deserted. If they experience neglect, they may take odd risks to gain and hold mother's attention. A youngster may climb to an unlocked medicine chest and reach for forbidden contents. Or he may injure himself playing with knives or other objects in the kitchen.

Mealtimes should be planned so that preparations are begun on time. Hungry youngsters are more likely to reach for non-food items to eat. The result can be accidental poisoning.

Major tasks such as the laundry, a thorough housecleaning, preparing for a party or caring for a sick member of the family, should be scheduled so that other members of the family are not neglected.

Pre-school children in the home need continuing supervision in a safe play area with safe toys to keep

them busy. Most accidents to small children happen when there is no supervision.

Plan your work so that it does not crowd into any one area of the day. Too much left to do and not enough time to do it can create tensions and friction. Studies indicate that friction in the home is frightening to small children. They feel neglected and may turn to risky exploring at the kitchen stove, the cabinet under the sink or a closet which seems inviting.

A planned schedule of household responsibilities will help prevent accidents in the home.

Keep Paper Plan Of Garden

How are you going to label the rows of flowers and vegetables in your garden so you'll know which variety is which? Plant labels keep getting lost or uprooted by youngsters, but a paper plan can be kept where only you know its whereabouts. A piece of cross-section paper, preferably with 4-inch squares, secured to a clipboard will serve you well. Be certain to use a soft pencil to the board so you have it when you want it. Notes should be made on the spot.

How To Launder Nylon Undies

If, after a few washings, your white nylon underthings look dirty, you're probably doing one or more of the following:

1. Washing them with white cottons and other materials. 2. Washing them with colored synthetics. 3. Using a chlorine bleach. These are taboo for all synthetics as they are dye scavengers and pick up foreign color from chemicals in other fabrics. To whiten your nylon garments, soak in warm water, detergent and an oxygen bleach.

Ways To Serve Spinach

Florentine style in high cuisine means anything cooked with spinach. Fish Florentine with Mornay sauce is gourmet eating indeed. 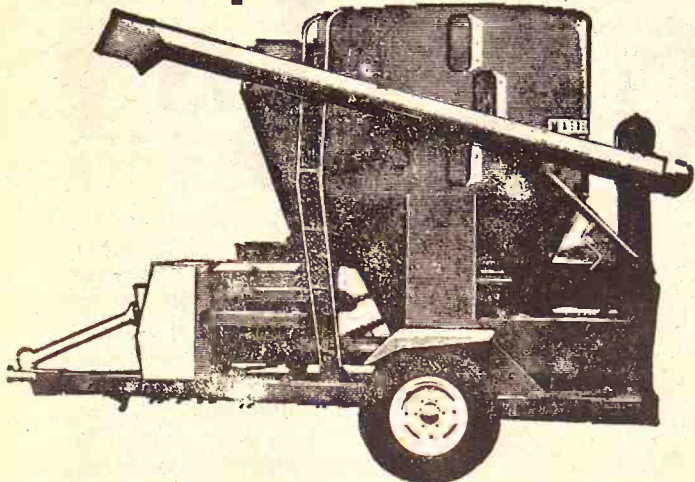

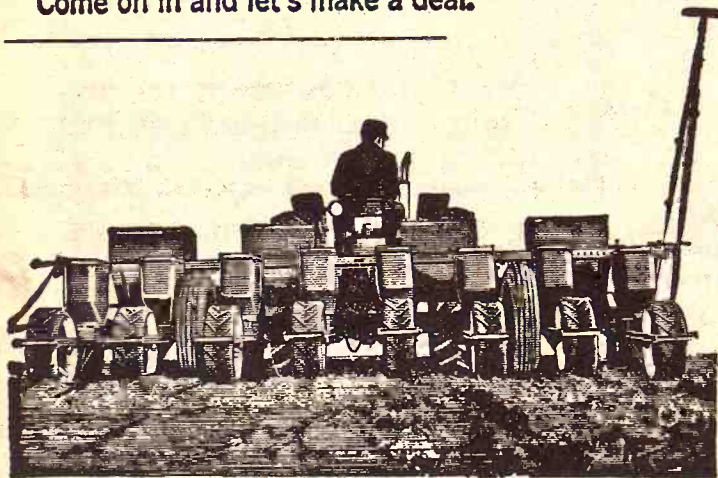

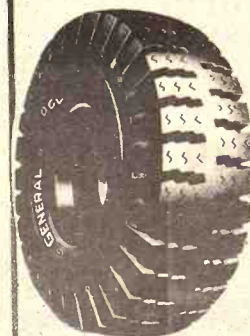

Paper Plan Proper Way To Sew Buttons, Fasteners On Clothes

Buttons always seem to come off the most inopportune time — when you are trying to catch a bus, when you are addressing your club group or when you are shopping. It seems there's scarcely a day goes by that a button or eye doesn't come off a skirt or a blouse. When your hubby's suit comes home without a button, here are a few tips on how to sew buttons and fasteners:

To sew on a button, use double thread of medium length and knot it.

Mark the spot where the button is to go with a pin or chalk. Begin with a few back stitches on the back of the garment, even though you have knotted the thread. This will prevent the knot from pulling out. Where you don't want the thread to show, begin on the right side and make sure the thread doesn't go through to the back.

Allow enough space between the button and the garment to leave a stem for easy buttoning. You can

make certain there is sufficient space if you will place a pin across the top of the button. Remove the pin, bring the thread to the right side of the fabric then wind it around the stem. Stitch through to the wrong side and secure with several small stitches.

When sewing a button on a coat, place a small button on the wrong side for added strength.

Hooks and eyes are sewed on by overcasting around each loop. Be sure both parts of a fastener are lined up properly. Use a tape measure and pins or chalk for marking where the fasteners are to go.

Be careful that stitches do not go through the right side of the material. Snaps are sewed on the same way and again must be properly and exactly positioned. Overcast enough stitches through each hole to make the fastener part

secure.

It is a good idea periodically to go over all the family's garments to make certain there are no loose buttons.

Dutch Elm Disease Spreads Further In State

Dutch elm disease has spread into 79 of Kansas' 105 counties in 13 years.

Five counties were added to the list in 1970, and undoubtedly more will be added this year.

Dr. William G. Willis, Extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University, reported the disease reached into Ford, Sherman, Stafford, Thomas and Trego

February 23, 1971

counties last year.

The disease first attacked America elm in eastern Kansas in 1957. It has moved across the state steadily since that time.

The fact the disease has not been detected officially in 26 counties doesn't mean it is not present in these counties.

The disease is carried by a beetle that burrows in under the tree bark. While there is no known control or cure now, Dr. Willis explained dutch elm research is continuing.

Soybean Yield Earns Trip To Japan

Eye-popping soybean yields earned northeastern Kansas farmers nearly all the top spots in the annual soybean production contest administered by the Extension Service at Kansas State University in cooperation with Kansas soybean processing companies.

Grand champion Kansas soybean producer in 1970 was Wayne Dicken of Desota in Johnson County. His unirrigated 5 1/2-acre bottomland plot yielded 61.09 bushels per acre of Calland variety.

By winning, Dicken and his wife earned an expense-paid trip to Japan from the Elanco Company plus a large engraved trophy and

\$200 prize money from Soya, Inc., of Emporia.

Runnerup in the contest was Robert Korthanke of Robinson in Brown county. His 9 acre dryland plot yielded 56.55 bushels per acre. His beans were also Calland variety.

Last year's champion, Robert Manson of Desota, placed third with a 52.8 bushels per acre yield of Clark 63 variety on a 5.6 acre plot.

In the irrigated division of the contest, Albert Kientz of Wamego in Pottawatomie County placed first with 56.8 bushels per acre in a five acre field of Cutler variety.

Second place in the irrigated division went to Jack Smith of Beloit

with a 55.79 bushels per acre yield on 5.12 acres of Calland variety. Milo Schroeder of Inman in McPherson County placed third in the irrigated division with a yield of 52.29 bushels per acre in a 5 acre plot of Wayne variety.

Top producer in the central Kansas district was W. J. Rohr of Belle Plaine with a 41 bushels per acre yield of Clark 63. Howard Birkbeck of LeRoy was the top southeastern Kansas producer with 43 bushels per acre of Cutler variety.

All district winners received \$100 prizes and all second place finishers \$75.

Howard Wilkins, KSU Extension crops specialist who administers the contest, notes that the contest encourages Kansas farmers to find

better management methods to increase soybean yields and to reward those who do the best job.

More Shakeout In U.S. TV Industry

The making of television picture tubes is getting less attractive to U.S. manufacturers.

Admiral Corp. will quit making color TV tubes, industry sources say, and sell its equipment to RCA.

The change in the industry does not mean that Admiral and others are dropping the television business. They're just quitting making tubes and buying components from others to assemble their own sets.

Motorola dropped out of the tube manufacturing business last spring, and now only RCA, Zenith, Sylvania, Philco, GE and Westinghouse are

left in the manufacturing end of the business.

Zenith and GE both make tubes largely for their own use, while other manufacturers sell to other companies.

The shakeout in the industry largely concerns color tube manufacture. Nearly all black-and-white tubes are bought from Japanese suppliers.

LOW-CHOLESTEROL EGGS

Dr. Rudolf Clarenburg, a Kansas State University physiologist in the College of Veterinary Medicine, has done research with laying hens that may help prevent heart attacks and strokes, cardiovascular diseases thought to be associated with high cholesterol levels in the body. By incorporating sitosterol (a fatty substance found in soybeans and other plants) into the research hens' feed, Dr. Clarenburg found that the chickens laid eggs containing up to 35 per cent less cholesterol than eggs they laid on standard feeding rations.

The physiologist believes it is possible that low-cholesterol eggs can be mass produced but says cholesterol cannot be eliminated completely from eggs because it is a necessary component of the egg.

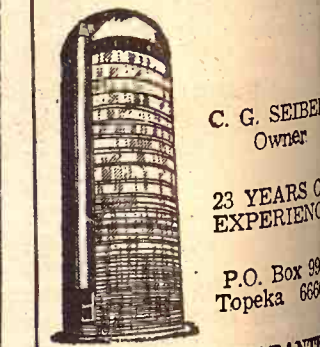

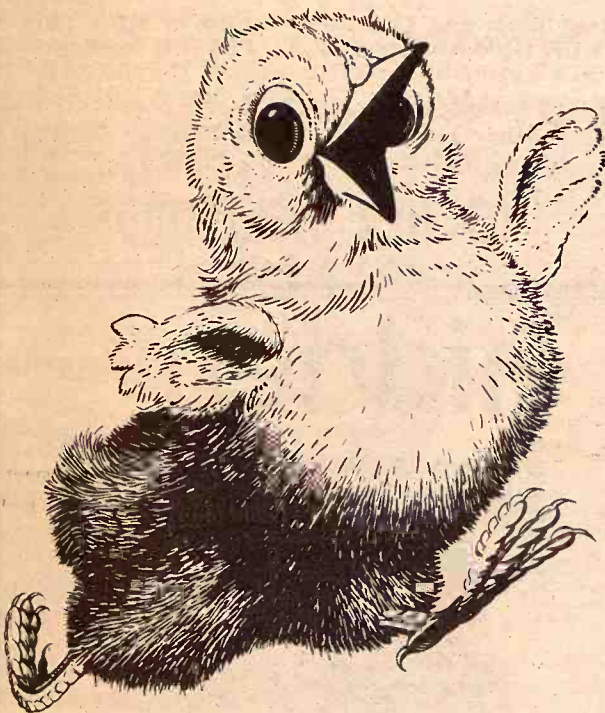

Juggling Of Parity Pinches Wheatgrowers

The Kansas Association of Wheat Growers has announced opposition

to two moves on the farm front, one nationally and one in Kansas.

Don Crane, Wright, KAWG president, said the association opposes an effort by the Nixon administration's Office of Budget and Management to "squeeze out of the agricultural picture" the base period of 1910-14 in establishing base

parity for American agriculture. "The OBM, with modern math juggling, is establishing the year 1967 as a base for its new parity calculation," Crane said, "and this is certainly unjust since the year 1967 does not reflect a balanced year for agriculture as does the period 1910-14."

Crane said the 1910-14 base period was chosen because "all factors in our economy were in fair balance and this ratio is used in calculating our wheat certificates. If you figure the ratio for wheat now you will find that we stand at about 67 per cent of parity. However, by OBM choosing a single year, it can come up with a grand showing of some 90 per cent of parity."

"For anyone to juggle figures this way is an insult to the intelligence of all those involved in agriculture."

Crane said both senators and representatives have joined in criticism of the OBM move.

"The rigging of the parity formula is misleading to the American public. It gives a false impression that the farmer is enjoying a period of economic prosperity when actually he is paying more and more for what he purchases and takes the same price for his products that he was getting 20 years ago."

"I don't know of any other segment of our economy in this undesirable position today."

Crane also assailed Kansas House Bill 1181 which proposes change in the Kansas farm corporation law.

He said it would permit unlimited corporation farming in Kansas by repealing the present law which limits farm corporations to 10 stockholders and 5000 acres of land.

"The proposal in House Bill 1181 that the corporation be owned by farm residents is meaningless," he said. "In fact, any person under the new proposal could comply by moving to a farm and incorporating for unlimited farming operations."

"We have opposed wide-open corporation farming in the past and we still stand opposed to its introduction into the Kansas agriculture picture."

"I think consumers should be aware of the fact that food costs can double in short order if our food and fiber supplies are controlled by large corporate structure."

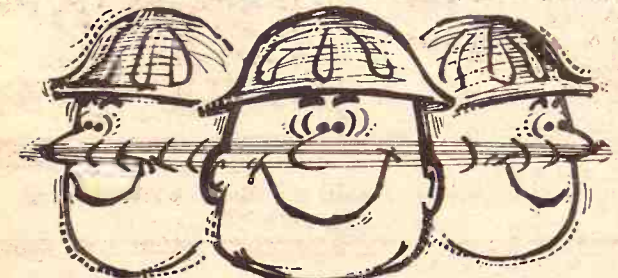

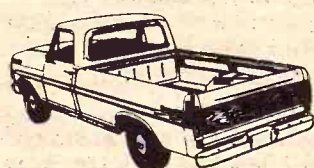

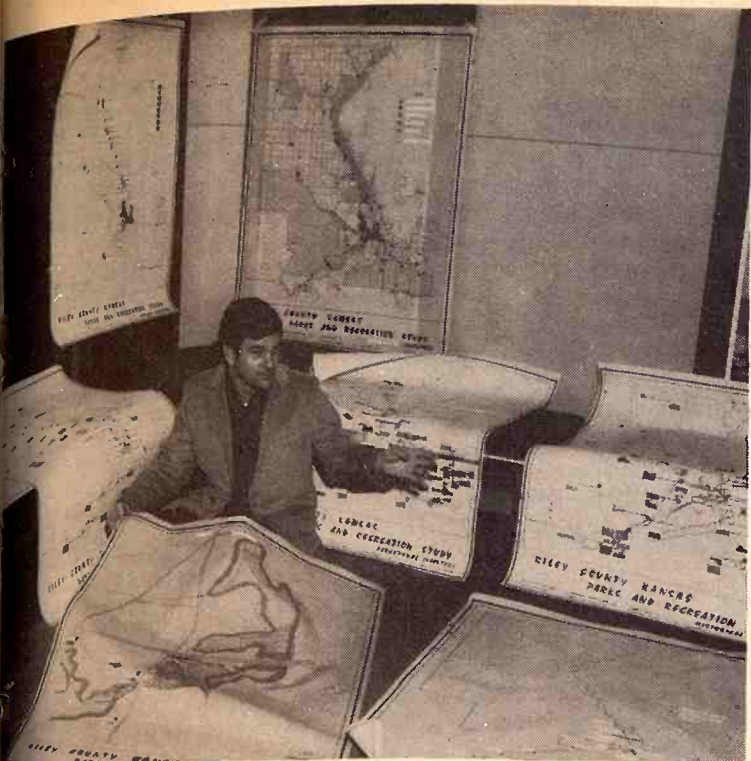

New Safety Effort Along Area Lakes

The Corps of Engineers says it is going to have an all-out safety

campaign on its eight lakes in the Kansas City region this summer, in an effort to reduce swimming and boating deaths, which numbered 23 last summer.

Milford Lake, on the Republican River near Junction City, was the

hardest hit with 9 deaths.

Colonel R. L. Anderson, Jr., district engineer, said that a new safety program will be initiated at each Corps lake with a full-time safety patrol ranger to supervise the program.

Anderson said that 64 percent of all those who died at Corps lakes lived within a 50-mile radius and were within the ages of 21 to 30 years. The Corps program will be oriented primarily to the 14-30 age group.

Fifty-four million people have visited the eight lakes by Corps estimate since Kanopolis lake was completed 20 years ago and 105 persons have lost their lives in the lakes during that time.

Woodbine Dam Still Under Watershed Gun

COUNCIL GROVE — Lauren Brunner, president of Lyons Creek watershed, Joint District 41; is calling for opposition to addition of Woodbine reservoir to the state water plan in Kansas.

He said the reservoir proposed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on Lyons creek southwest of Junction City near Woodbine would "effectively kill" the district's program.

The project would take 7500 to 10,000 acres of productive farmland out of the heart of the watershed district, he said.

"We must add, out of fairness, that the Corps of Engineers apparently believe its structure would not kill our local plans," Brunner said.

He asked district residents to write legislators and attend the 4 pm. hearing Wednesday, Feb. 17, before the water resources committee on a bill introduced in the Kansas House of Representatives. Backers on the reservoir may appear at the same time Feb. 15.

Why The Climb In Grass Tetany?

Each year more Kansas ranchers are reporting a high incidence of grass tetany. It is associated with lush pasture and may involve wheat, barley, rye and native grasses.

Dr. Homer K. Caley, Extension veterinarian at Kansas State University, explains that symptoms or signs will usually appear in the spring or fall, depending on the pasture growth for the season. All ages and both sexes are susceptible, although the highest reported incidence is usually in cows just before or just after calving.

"It has been fairly well established that a drop in the serum magnesium level is present when the condition strikes," says Dr. Caley. "Wet cold weather or other stresses may be predisposing factors. Grass tetany is usually present in herds fed little grain."

Farms or ranches where some type land improvement plan is in force are affected frequently. The use of limestone almost devoid of magnesium may also contribute to the problem.

Dr. Caley notes herds that have a history of a high incidence of grass tetany should be fed a supplemental source of magnesium until the grass hardens. Because stored magnesium is not readily available, a supplementation program must be on a day to day basis.

When it is necessary supplemental magnesium oxide (MgO) should be

fed at the rate of one ounce per head per day, explains the KSU veterinarian.

The magnesium supplement can be fed in a silage mixture or with grain. In addition it can also be given through the salt (10 to 15 per cent of the total salt mixture). Attempts to go above this recommendation may be self defeating because animals reduce their intake when concentration gets too high.

When the supplement is given through the salt it should be the only source of salt. This supply should not run out.

"Agronomists, veterinarians and

other scientists are working on grass tetany," says Dr. Caley. "Agricultural Research Service scientists are making some progress but it is slow. Additional research is needed badly."

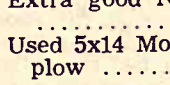

Area Counties Hold Out Against Food Stamp Plans

Harvey and Rice counties in the G&G area are among 10 counties in the U.S. which have not yet gone along with government food aid programs.

A USDA spokesman has said that there would be no direct action to get the 10 counties to cooperate with

programs principally involving food stamps, which allow poor people to get food at reduced costs.

Besides Harvey and Rice, two other Kansas counties were included in the list: Scott and Seward. There are two counties each in Oklahoma and Colorado, one in Nebraska and one in Pennsylvania.

USDA has the authority to put in its own food distribution centers in holdout counties, but officials indicated that they would not do so in Newton, Lyons, Scott City, Liberal or any of the out-of-state towns because of local opposition.

SALE STILL ON FOR INJURED K. WILLIAMS

MARYSVILLE — Keith Williams, farmer north of Marysville, was reported in fair condition after the car he was driving struck a Union Pacific freight train at the crossing 7 miles north of here last Wednesday night. He was alone in the car.

Williams suffered broken ribs and a possible skull fracture, friends reported.

The Blue Valley Ranch, which Williams owns, will have its farm machinery sale Tues., March 2, as advertised in Grass & Grain.

More Liberal Rules For FHA Lending

Under new legislation now in effect, Farmers Home administration credit is available to farmers whose real estate debt may total as much as \$100,000.

For the last 10 years, the maximum had been \$60,000, a figure which James V. Smith, FHA administrator, said has been outmoded by increases in land values and farm sizes.

While the average FHA loan of \$24,000 is notably below the new limit, Smith said, the new legislation enacted by Congress has the effect of fixing \$100,000 as:

The maximum amount FHA may lend to a farmer on real estate to buy, enlarge or improve a farm, or the maximum amount of real estate financing for one farmer that FHA may share with other lenders.

He said the legislation should have a wide effect in drawing more private capital into credit-scarce rural areas. The new act makes Vietnam veterans eligible for priority consideration of loan applications.

Slaughter Lack
Holds Back Area
Sheep Expansion

A survey of Kansas sheep producers indicates a lack of slaughter and marketing facilities in the state may be holding back expansion of the sheep industry here. Conducted by V.E. McAdams and Donald Erickson, Extension specialists at Kansas State University, the survey was necessitated by a decline in lamb production and a need to find ways of revitalizing this segment of Kansas agriculture.

The state produces enough lambs each year to support a market and slaughter installation. (Slaughter houses at Kansas City, St. Joseph and Wichita are no longer in operation).

McAdams said the 1,000 producers responding to a questionnaire have a feeding capacity of 198,000 head, own 94,500 head of ewes and sold 167,000 lambs last year.

The problem is that the feeding and production cycle of Kansas producers is not geared to the year-round operation of a slaughter facility.

For example, respondents marketed 27,000 lambs during both March and April and 25,000 in May of last year.

The total were 11,000 and 13,000 for February and June, respectively. Marketings reached a low range of 3,200 to 4,900 in October, November and December.

"Obviously our production in Kansas would have to be changed to a more uniform schedule," McAdams remarked.

"This could be done by adoption of a multiple lambing program. Hog producers marketed hogs only twice a year for a long time. Now they sell hogs every month of the year. We can do the same thing in the sheep business."

Producers who returned questionnaires indicated a willingness to expand their flocks and to increase their feeding capacity by more than 100,000 head of marketing facilities were located within the area.

In addition, 150 producers said they would consider participating financially in such a project. "And certainly there is potential support among the sheep producers who did not reply," McAdams emphasized.

He added that a slaughter and market installation in Kansas would require substantial numbers of high quality, uniform lambs for marketing.

Most of the lambs would be sold in the high consumption areas of the east and west costs.

"If more quality lambs were available possibly we could increase opportunities for marketings in the plains states, too," McAdams concluded.

Income Gains Couldn't Keep Up With Bigger Farm Expenses

Nearly all his acreage is in corn for silage and feed last year. His income is based on the sale of beef animals and slaughter cattle. City market after the year he handled beef animals and estimated 611,551 pounds of

income gains which the farmers made in 1970 quite match the big increase in expenses so they ended the year slightly worse off financially than at the end of 1969, the Department says. Department economists say it looks like a replay of 1970. In a department report on the income situation showed, U.S. farmers had a gross income gain of more than 1.5 billion dollars over last year but their production expenses increased about 2 billion dollars at the same time. The report showed also farmers had a gross income of 56.2 billion dollars from all sources in 1970, compared with 54.6 billion dollars in 1969. But production expenses rose

from 38.4 billion dollars to 40.4 billion dollars so that, with adjustments for inventories, farmers wound up with a net of 16.3 billion dollars for the year, compared with 16.5 billion dollars in 1969. The realized net income per farm was figured at \$5,392, slightly below the 1959 record of \$5,437. Farm income in 1970 included 48.7 billion dollars from sale of farm products — crops and livestock — somewhat above the 1969 figure of 47.2 billion dollars. Government payments were stable at 3.7 billion dollars. Of the cash receipts from farm marketings, some 29 billion dollars came from sales of livestock and livestock products and 19.6 billion dollars from crops sales, compared with 28.4 billion dollars and 18.8

"Farmers in 1971 will realize a sizeable increase in cash receipts from farm marketings, mainly from crops," the report said. "Although direct government payments are expected to run well below 1970,

realized gross farm income probably will be record high." But, it added, in 1971 as in 1970, the persistent rise in farm production expenses likely will more than offset these gains.

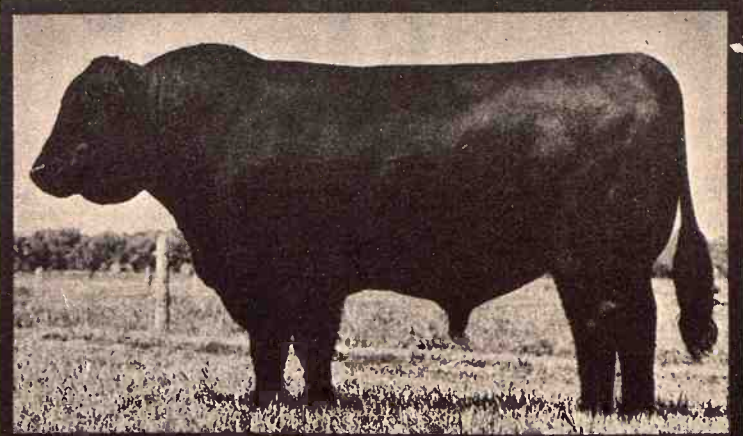

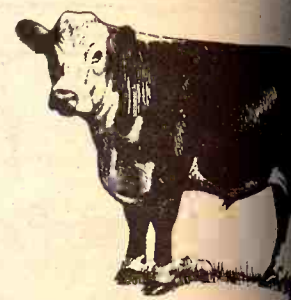
