PRESIDENT WAYNE BRANT

Private Wayne E. Brant, Gov. Island Training Station, Barracks 6, Battalion 4, U.S. Coast Guards, Alameda, California, writes stating that he is now in Coast Guard training and likes it very much. The letter was postmarked August 1, 1942, and Wayne states that he did not know how long he would be stationed at Alameda. He was receiving basic training, both sea warfare and land warfare.

Wayne writes: "I am sorry that I will not be able to attend the meeting of the State F.F.A. officers. I surely would like to be there. The Kansas Association really accomplished something in 1942, but we must beat that record in 1943. We must keep up our program of purchasing war bonds and stamps, collecting scrap, repairing farm machinery, and producing food for victory. Tell all the state officers hello for me, and extend my best wishes to the members of the state association."

A THOUGHT

It is well, and it is natural, that people lay hold of any bits of encouragement, that seem real and substantial. This heartening thought has been coming to me all summer,—"How much better is any standard of living to which we may be reduced in <u>free America</u>, than the horrors of modern warfare attacking our shores, cracking over our heads, and rolling up over our land." Any sacrifice of money, material, pleasures, future plans, and even the lives of our young men, is being counted necessary in order to keep the cruel enemies from our shores, and the freedom we live a permanent possession. What matters the amount of salary? Of what value is profit? Why "fuss" about parity prices on grain? Why even an automobile? We should gladly give up all these things, if it were necessary to keep our land free from the armed bandits that seek to rob, destroy, kill, and conquer. The 15th National Convention has been streamlined in order to economize on gasoline and tires, and to prevent over-taxing transportation and housing facilities. Attendance will be limited, as far as possible, to the national officers, two official delegates from each state, American Farmer candidates, and the State Adviser.

Official delegates from the Kansas Association will be George Stelter, Abilene chapter, and Erwin Thalmann, Haven chapter. Alternates will be Garnet Price, Lebanon chapter, and Harold Minter, Clay Center chapter.

American Farmer candidates from Kansas will be Maurice Black Jr., Tonganoxie chapter; Leonard D. Sharp, Great Bend chapter; George Schlickau, Haven chapter, and George W. Stelter, Abilene chapter.

Fifteenth National Convention - Future Farmers of America (Concluded)

Events which have been eliminated from the usual convention activities include State product exhibit, parades, band concerts, tours and trips, and entertainment programs.

The dates of the 15th National Convention are such that persons attending may stay over for the National Livestock Show and Sale for Students of Vocational Agriculture, to be held in Kansas City, October 28,29 and 30.

HONORS

Kansas F.F.A. members made an enviable record in the 12th annual Hoards Dairyman cow judging contest. More than 50,000 entries were received in this contest. Adviser S.S. Bergsma of the Ottawa chapter was declared national champion in the vocational agricultural instructors division, and was declared second high in the entire contest. The Great Bend chapter was among the three chapters listed as being designated as Honorable Mention. Donald Cook of the Great Bend chapter was declared junior champion. The two highest scores over made in a Hoard's Dairyman cow judging contest were turned in by Donald Cook, Great Bend, Kansas, and Albert Klein of Eakly, Oklahoma. Reasons on their placings decided the winner. Third place in the junior division went to Kenneth Kruckenberg, Great Bend chapter, and Joe Esfeld of the Great Bend chapter placed eighth.

\$400,000

The Future Farmers of America have purchased almost \$400,000 worth of war bonds and stamps. The national association started this movement by purchasing \$10,000 worth. Twenty-three State F.F.A. associations have purchased bonds in amounts ranging from \$500 to \$8,000 worth. F.F.A. members in Texas have purchased \$178,000 worth of war stamps and bonds. Tennessee members purchased \$46,835 worth, the North Carolina association and local chapters purchased \$62,145, and the Oklahoma association and local chapters purchased \$56,000. The Kansas association purchased a \$1,000 bond, and members and local chapters purchased \$17,312.89 in stamps and bonds. An enviable record, but one that must be surpassed in 1942-43 if we are to "keep 'em flying."

F.F.A. AND THE NATIONAL SCRAP HARVEST

The following telegram as of September 1, 1942, was received by Mr. W.A. Ross, national executive secretary of Future Farmers of America, from Mr. Lessing J. Rosenwald, Director Conservation Division:

"The Conservation Division of the War Production Board is deeply appreciative of your past efforts which have already brought in large amounts of scrap metal and rubber from the farms. The shortage of scrap is so critical that we must renew and redouble these efforts in the national scrap harvest to make up deficiencies. Our nation-wide goal of seventeen million (17,000,000) tons of scrap metal, before the snow flies, is certainly possible of achievement and we are counting on your continued vigorous support, not only to reach your share of the goal, but to surpass it in building a reserve scrap pile that will insure capacity operation of our war production industries."

CONGRATULATIONS F.F.A. REPORTERS

What The Future Farmers Of America Are Doing To Help Win The War is the title of Release No. 2, July 1942, of the Office of Education, Washington, D. C. This 44-page publication lists typical activities performed by F.F.A. members in their all-out war effort. The activities were listed under the following headings:

- 1. Purchasing War Bonds and Stamps
- 2. Producing Food for Victory
- 3. Salvaging Needed War Materials
- 4. Repairing and Reconditioning Farm Machinery
- 5. Miscellaneous

The items were for the most part taken from state association FFA news-letters, although radio and press were included. Kansas with approximately $29\frac{1}{2}$ column inches led the states in space allotted. Alabama, Oregon, California, Georgia, and Texas ranked in order on the basis of column inches devoted to war activities. The Kansas Association wishes to congratulate the local chapters for carrying on programs of war work that meet with the approval of the National Organization, and offers congratulations to the local reporters for getting the story told.

ENGLE WINS REGIONAL FFA PUBLIC SPEAKING CONTEST

We are happy to announce Kenneth Engle, Abilene chapter, as the winner of the North Central Regional F.F.A. Public Speaking Contest, held in Chicago, August 10, 1942. Twelve states competed. The contest was conducted in such a way that there was an elimination contest with six boys competing in each group. The two high ranking contestants from each group competed in the finals. "Food Our Weapon" was the title of Engle's winning speech. North Dakota, Kentucky, and Indiana contestants placed in the order named.

The Kansas Association extends congratulations and best wishes to Kenneth Engle who will represent the North Central Region in the National F.F.A. Public Speaking Contest, Monday, October 28, 8:00 p. m., Music Hall, Municipal Auditorium, Kansas City, Missouri. This will be the third time in the thirteen year history of the national F.F.A. Public Speaking Contest that Kansas has represented the region. Earl Parsons, Winfield chapter, competed in the national contest in 1931, placing second, and J. W. England III, Shawnee Mission chapter, competed in 1934, placing fourth.

HIGHLAND PARK ENTERS CHAPTER CONTEST

The Highland Park chapter was designated as the chapter to represent Kansas in the National Better Chapter Contest. A well balanced program of work was reported upon. Careful planning, a high degree of neatness throughout, and an accurate cross section of chapter activities—without braggadocio—made this report one of the best ever presented by a Kansas chapter. ATTENTION REPORTERS

One of the most important officers in the FFA is that of reporter. It is necessary to choose some one for this office who is alive and awake to the value of a good news story, and one who will keep his chapter before the public through interesting chapter news. Four of his most important duties are:

- 1. Furnish news to the school and local community press
- 2. Furnish newsworthy items to the state press
- 3. Report promptly and regularly to the Kansas Future Farmer
- 4. Organize and bring to the attention of your chapter a complete review of each issue of the Kansas Future Farmer

The following is the plan of gathering news for the Kansas Future Farmer. The state has been divided into three sections and the chapters of each section numbered 1, 2, and 3. The chapters were then grouped into three divisions—No. 1 in one group, No. 2 in another group, and No. 3 in another group. Each group will be mailed a request for news every third month. Requests for news will be mailed from the state reporter by the 18th of each month. The news of your chapter must reach the state reporter by the first of the month following. This means PROMPT ACTION on the part of the local reporters.

If your chapter is not represented in the issues of the Future Farmer it will be because your chapter is not functioning properly, or that the chapter has been unwise in their choice of a reporter.

Due to the fact we have 146 chapters in the state association and that we publish only nine issues of the Kansas Future Farmer each year, it will be impossible for us to print regular chapter notes from each chapter more than three times during the year. However, if your chapter has engaged in some outstanding and interesting work we will be glad to give the story space in the Kansas Future Farmer, regardless of whether or not it is your chapter's turn to furnish news.

The local reporter will be sent a blank requesting chapter news, and his reply will be due in the office of Robert Barnes, State Reporter, in care of the High School, Goodland, Kansas, on the date specified on the request sheet sent him. If possible have news typewritten. Please write on one side of paper only and give strict attention to correct spelling of all proper names.

BRANT WILL CONTINUE IN OFFICE

The State Executive Committee has recommended that Wayne Brant be permitted to finish the year as president of the State Association. Vice President Erwin Thalmann will handle the duties of the office of the president in Wayne's absence. I am sure Wayne would appreciate a note from members of the Kansas Association. CHAPTER ACTIVITY PROGRAM

November 1 is the deadline date for filing local chapter activity programs with the state department. Address same to Executive Adviser A. P. Davidson, Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Official Activity Program Blanks in sufficient quantities to supply a copy of the local chapter activity program for the state office will be mailed all chapters at an early date. In 1942 the state office furnished sufficient copies of the official activity program blanks to provide one copy for the local chapter. This year, due to scarcity of paper, the local chapter will be expected to furnish its own paper for its program of work going in the chapter files.

All-Out War Effort should be given increased emphasis this year. The purchasing of war bonds and stamps, the repair of farm machinery, collecting scrap and waste materials, and increased food production should be MUST features of 1943 FFA activity programs.

Helpful Suggestions for building the chapter activity program will be found in the special issue of the Kansas Future Farmers, October 1, 1938, and in the official FFA Manual, pp. 31-35.

Committee Appointments for building the chapter activity program should include all members of the chapter. Every effort should be made to have a program built and endorsed by the chapter, and not merely a program set up by the officers and advisor.

Calendaring Activities for the year, by months, is important. Too many activities at a given time will likely result in a scattering of effort and a lowering of standards. Too few activities will cause loss of interest. Fit your program of activities in with the school and community programs. This will avoid conflicts and the possibility of demanding too much time and energy on the part of certain members of your chapter.

1942-43 STATE FFA PROGRAM OF WORK

- 1. Increase chapter and individual member participation in war effort with continued emphasis on:
 - a. Purchase of war bonds and stamps.
 - b. Collection of scrap and other salvage materials.
 - c. Conditioning and repairing farm machinery.
 - d. Increased food production.
- 2. One hundred per cent of the Kansas Vocational Agriculture departments establish chapters of FFA and strive for 100 per cent enrollment of eligible members.
- 3. Each chapter to have a definite program of activities for the year and this program to be submitted to the state office not later than November 1, 1942. Each chapter to present an achievement report at the annual meeting of the State Association. Only chapters submitting activity programs by November 1 will be eligible for State Farmer or American Farmer candidates for that year, and will not be permitted to participate in the state FFA public speaking contest.
- 4. Nine issues of the FFA newsletter to be published, beginning with September and monthly thereafter for nine months. Copies of each issue will be sent to the officers of the National Organization of Future Farmers of America, to all state advisers, and to a select list of agricultural teacher trainers and agricultural leaders.
- 5. As a means of inculcating sound thrift principles, the State Association encourages careful selection, management, and financing of supervised long-time programs.
- 6. Encourage parliamentary proficiency among local chapters, and encourage ritualistic proficiency throughout the State Association. It is recommended that each chapter own sufficient copies of both the FFA manual and Stewart's Parliamentary Procedure to furnish a copy of both for each officer. It is further recommended that sufficient copies of both publications be owned by the chapter to make both readily available to all local members.
- 7. Encourage 100 per cent of chapters to use official FFA secretary's and official FFA treasurer's books.
 - 8. Support FFA contests of state and national scope.
- 9. Publicity--Encourage local chapters to keep the public informed as to worthwhile activities, and the State Association to give publicity to activities of state and national interest.
- 10. Continue to cooperate with the KVAA in a study of FFA problems of state-wide interest.
- 11. Encourage home improvement by members of local chapters to include landscaping, beautification, repair, electrification, providing comfort and conveniences.

- 12. Prevent (a) Farm Fires, (b) Farm Accidents. 100 per cent chapter participation through the securing of materials for distribution and study, and through discussions and demonstrations.
- 13. Conserving Natural Resources. 100 per cent chapter and member participation, through cooperation with various conservation organizations and agencies.
- 14. Preventing Livestock Losses. 100 per cent chapter and member participation, through study of livestock losses with especial attention to the preventable losses.

STATE FFA OFFICERS MEET

The first official meeting of the officers of the Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America was held September 12, 1942, Education Hall. Those present were: Erwin Thalmann, vice president; Robert Barnes, reporter, Garnet Price, secretary; Harold Minter, treasurer; L. B. Pollom, adviser; A. P. Davidson, executive adviser and L. F. Hall, executive secretary.

Setting up a Program of work was the first item of business. Other problems given consideration and recommendations made, follow:

- 1. Continue announcing five high individuals in the annual State FFA Public Speaking contest. Certificates and medals shall be given the first, second and third place individuals.
- 2. Recommended that the KVAA committee on FFA study the possibility of making wider use of parliamentary procedure and FFA ritualistic contest.
- 3. Went on record as favoring the continuance of the present plan of purchasing official uniform jackets for the state officers.
- 4. In order to cooperate with the national government in the conservation of rubber, it was decided to discontinue the 10 sectional FFA Leadership Training Schools for 1942-43.
- 5. It was recommended that the Kansas Association pay all expenses incurred by the Kansas FFA public speaker who will represent the North Central Region in the 1942 National Public Speaking contest at Kansas City.
- 6. Due to the scarcity of the kind of paper used for official activity program blanks, it was recommended that the state association discontinue the practice of furnishing sufficient quantities of the blanks to the chapters for the filing of their program in their local files. The local chapter will be expected to furnish its own paper for this purpose. Sufficient official chapter program blanks will be furnished each chapter to enable the chapter to file a copy of its activity program with the state office.
