



State of Kansas Reported Cases of Chlamydia by County January - June 2019





State of Kansas Reported Cases of Gonorrhea by County January - June 2019





State of Kansas Reported Cases of Primary and Secondary Syphilis by County January - June 2019



- Review current sexual health and education plan in Riley County
- Evaluate Legislation in Kansas regarding sexual education
- Learn what national recommendations there are for sexual education in the schools
- Use interviews and outreach to learn about sexual education
- Goal: Make a recommendation to the county commissioners on how to help Riley County improve sexual health education



Step 1: Sexual Health and Education in Riley County

- Riley County: Focuses on an abstinence only curriculum
- 4th-6th grade use a program called P&G
- Sex education and health is not a required part of teaching in high school besides half a semester at the 9th grade level

Step 4: What do other states do?

 - 10 only mandate HIV education
 - 17 require information to be medically accurate
 - 9 require information to be unbiased against race, sex, and ethnicity

 - "Advocates have faced an uphill battle to advance sex education in Kansas"¹⁰
- When searching for a new curriculum it needed to be comprehensive and inclusive
- Important that adolescents have to think deeper about the content
