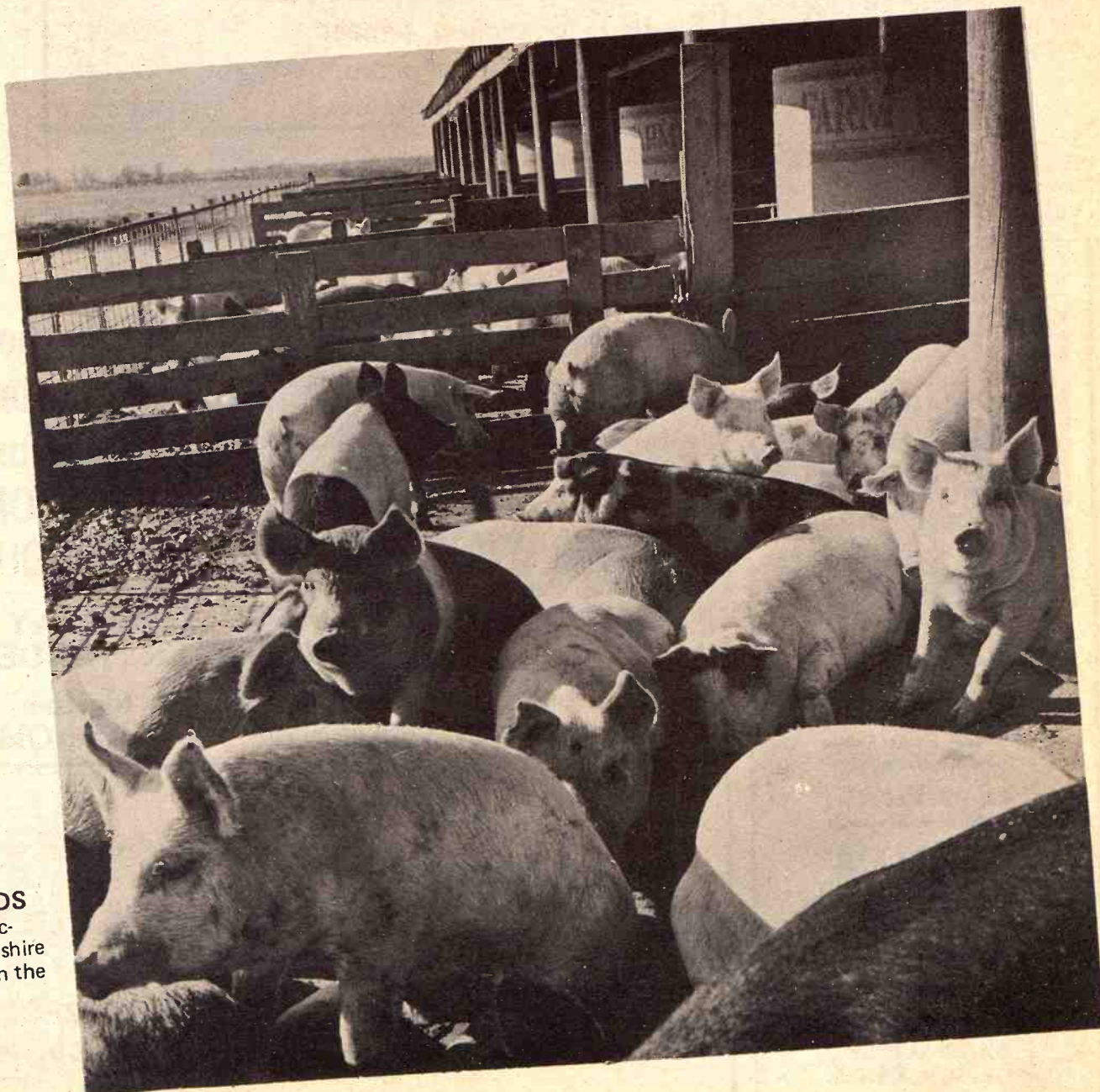

Assure Aid For Areas Affected By Corn Blight

The Agriculture Department has promised federal emergency loans will be extended to all farmers who suffered corn blight loss.

Senator Herman Talmadge of Georgia, member of the Senate Agriculture and Forestry Committee, said he had obtained assurance the federal aid will be available regardless of the designated emergency loan areas.

The loans are made through the department's Farmers Home Administration.

The department thus far has designated 183 counties in the nation's corn producing belts as emergency loan areas as a result of blight damage to the 1970 crop.

Although it is not widely known, farmers do not have to farm in the designated counties to receive the loans so long as they are otherwise qualified, it was pointed out.

Assistant Secretary T. K. Cowden said in an exchange of correspondence with Talmadge that the loan program for nondesignated areas has been in effect for some time but was not widely implemented prior to fiscal 1970.

An Agriculture Department source said farmers in both designated and nondesignated areas are now on about the same footing and the designation of emergency loan areas serves mainly to publicize the loan program where the need is deemed to be greatest.

The counties designated as emergency loan areas as a result of corn blight thus far include Alabama 2, Florida 32, Georgia 17, Illinois 44, Indiana 64 and Missouri 24.

Under recent legislation a farmer no longer need prove he was unable to obtain a loan through private sources in order to qualify for an emergency government loan, it was pointed out.

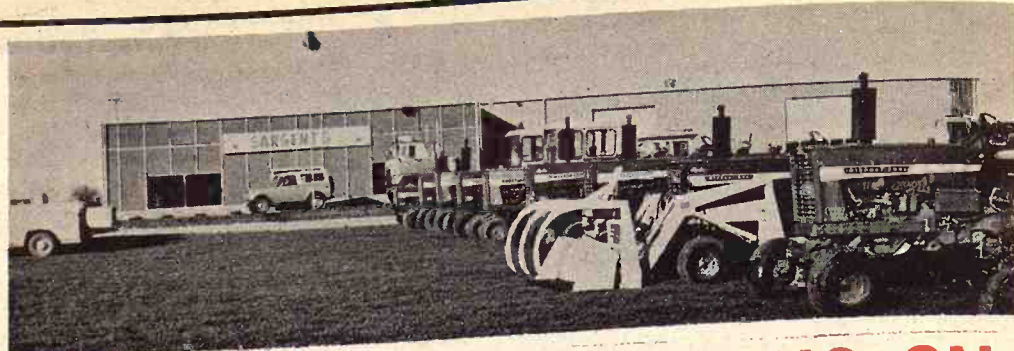

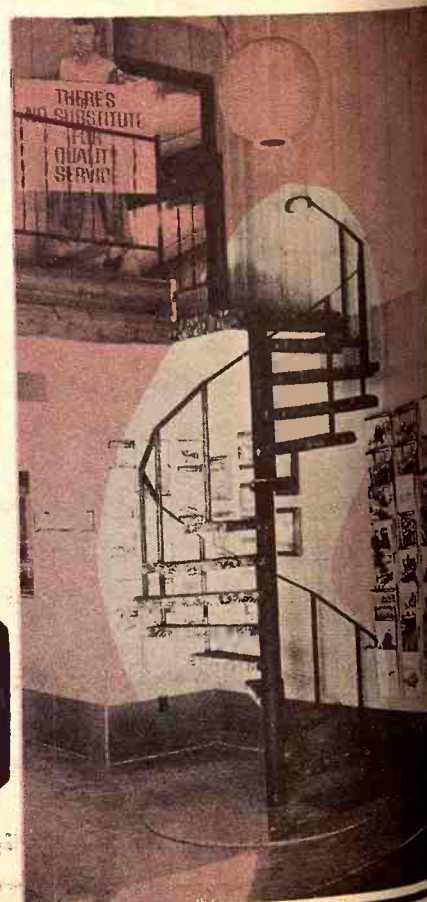

Wheat Growers Membership Drive

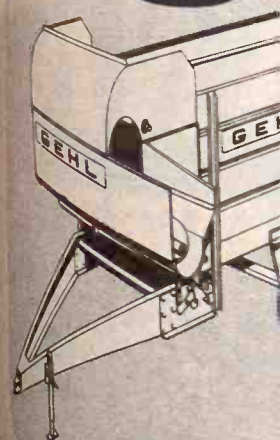
Wright, president of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, said the drive for new members in KAWG is well under way.

Wheatgrowers Thumping Drive for Membership

Don Crane, Wright, president of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, said that the drive for new members in KAWG is well underway. In Hutchinson for a wheat grading school, Crane said organizational plans for this year's membership campaign were based on each of the men on the association's board of directors being responsible for membership meetings in designated counties, working with county AWG officers to set up meetings and acquire memberships. The membership campaign started with officers of KAWG still enthusiastic over the national meeting they attended at Portland, Ore.

"Since Kansas is the premier hard winter wheat state, it was a challenge to us attending the

national meeting to see how the membership has grown in other states with much less production than we have," the Ford County wheat grower said.

"It appears that wheat growers over the entire country have become united in arms and methods, and it is up to the Kansas wheat man, who has the most to gain or lose, to join in the fight for more markets and better prices."

Crane also said that, because of the vast discretionary powers granted the Secretary of Agriculture under the 1970 Farm Act, it is imperative that wheat growers band together to exert maximum pressure for proper administration of the act to aid agri-business income.

Add A Tax On World Air Travel

Travelers flying international routes will pay a new charge ranging from a few cents to a maximum of \$10, it has been announced.

The extra charge will take the form of a surtax representing one per cent of the normal economy fare for the flight, regardless of which class the passenger is traveling.

A passenger flying between New York and London will pay an extra \$2.26 — one per cent of the \$226 regular economy fare under the new fare schedule effective April 1.

The surcharge will be calculated the same way for round-trip fares. In no case is the surtax to exceed \$10.

Only the international part of flights originating or landing in the United States at other than "gateway" cities will be taken into account when calculating the international tax, to avoid the duplication of a similar charge

already levied by Washington for domestic air travel.

The surtax is aimed at paying for navigational support facilities, the costs of which governments are passing onto the airlines. The surtax is to be noted separately from the regular airline fare on the passenger ticket.

For the same reason a similar surcharge is to be levied on cargo at the rate of 2 per cent of the total applicable air transportation charge.

Marion School Board Sticks To Florence Decision

MARION — Members of the school board of US 408 have refused to reverse their decision to consolidate schools at Florence and Marion with the senior high school to be situated at Marion and the junior high school to be held at Florence.

A motion to reverse the decision to consolidate the two schools was defeated by a six to one vote after listening to arguments against the consolidation by a group of school patrons, most of them from the Florence area.

The vote was taken after an explanation of voting procedures for school board members from re-apportioned districts was explained.

The consolidation of the school system has been in the mill for many months after a feasibility survey indicated that attendance at the Florence high school would not be sufficient for courses educators

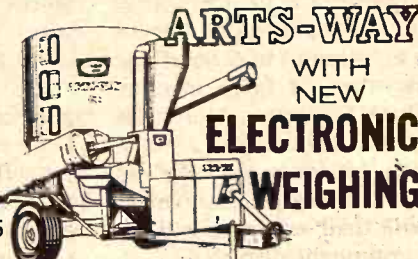
thought to be adequate.

Under the present plan high school students will apparently be bused to Marion from Florence and junior high school students will be bused from Marion to Florence.

Lost in the move, evidently, will be Florence High School's membership in the Flint Hill League, an athletic organization. Florence athletes will now join the Marion team in the Cottonwood Valley League.

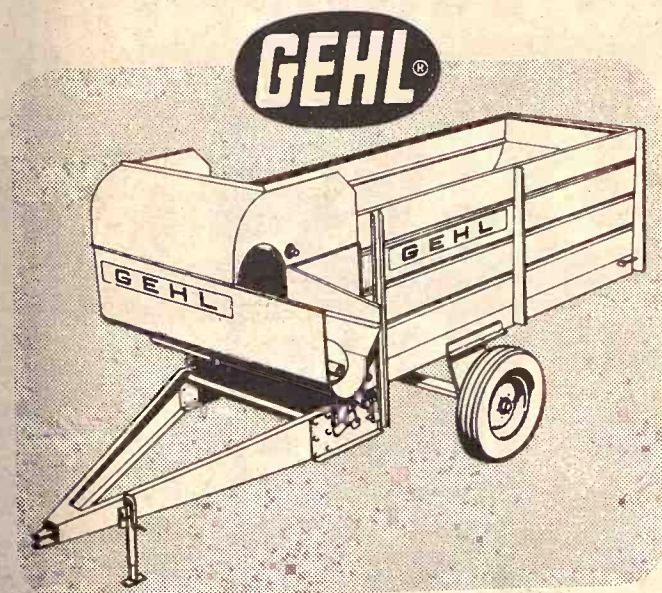

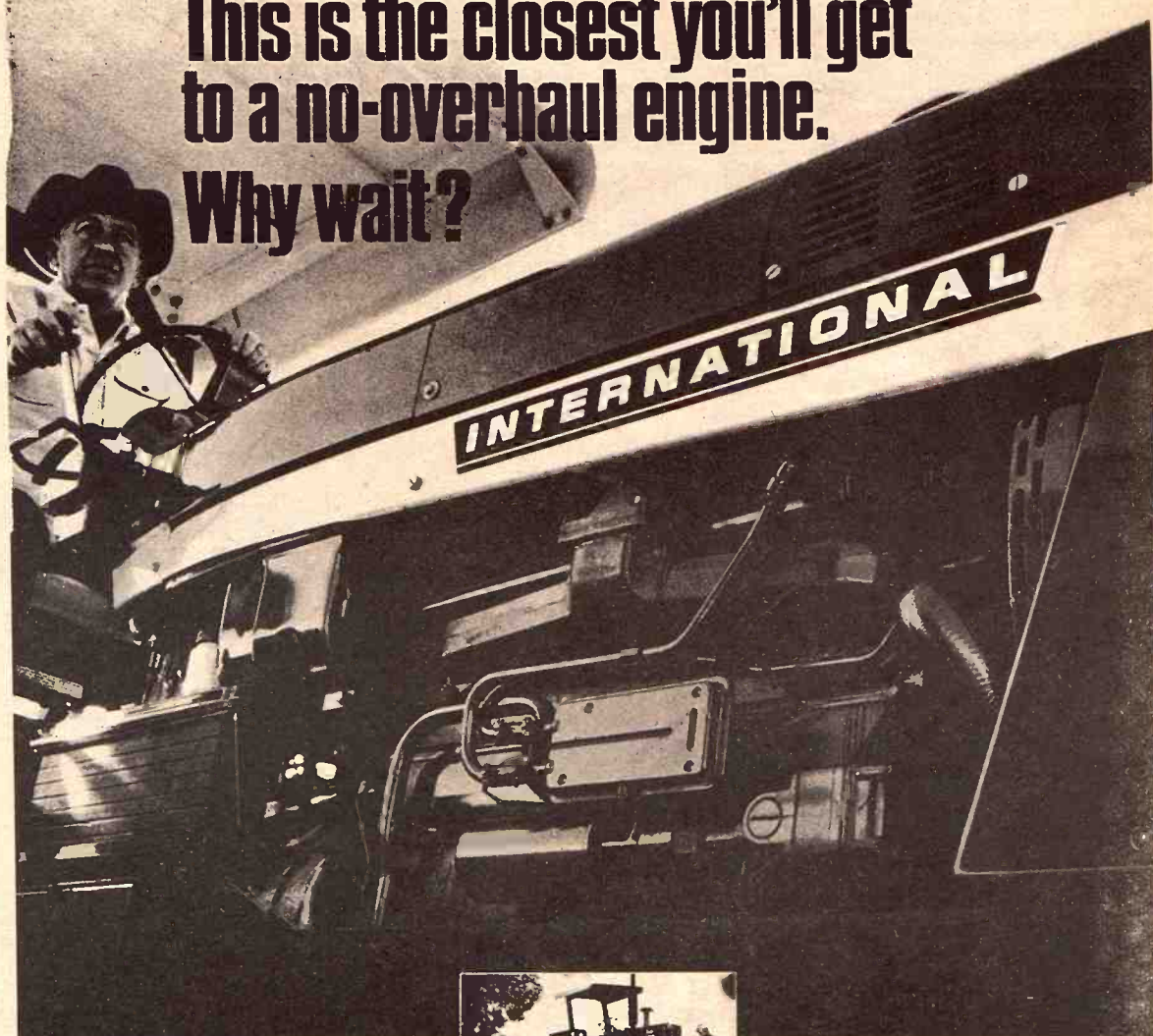

USDA To Water Down Meaning Of Parity Ratio

The National Farmers Union says a Nixon administration decision to play down the traditional "parity ratio" formula in monthly Agriculture Department price reports is an attempt to camouflage the deterioration of farm income.

Agriculture Department officials announced that beginning on Jan. 29, when a new report is due, the old parity ratio relating prices farmers receive with their expenses will not be given prominent display.

Instead, the USDA said, a new statistic — simply called a "ration" between expenses and prices — will be included in the summary on the report's cover page. This will relate to cost price averages in 1967.

Historically, the parity ratio has

been based on 1910-14 averages when farm economic factors were considered in harmony. The old parity figures will still be included in the report but listed in inside pages where exposure is less.

NFU President Tony T. Dechant said that the lower profile given the parity ratio is "an obvious effort to camouflage the deterioration of price and income levels" of the nation's farmers.

Administration leaders have been embarrassed since last Oct. 30 — on the eve of the November elections — when USDA announced that the parity ratio dipped to 70 per cent, the lowest for a month in 37 years.

The ratio has continued to drop, last month to 67 per cent, another low mark that equaled the 67 per cent reported for December 1933. Dechant noted this in his statement that administration officials have been embarrassed by the reports.

"They should be," Dechant said. "But no amount of Madison Avenue public relation gimmickry will gloss it over. The new formula is designed to confuse farmers and the consuming public over measures that are needed to give farmers a fair

share of the nation's income."

By using 1967 prices and expense statistics as a new base, the new ratio number will be expressed at a higher level.

For example, in December the "prices received" index was 265 per cent, based on a 1910-14 average equaling 100 per cent. By making 1967 prices equal to 100, the December index would have been converted to 104 per cent.

Similarly, the expense index in December was 396 per cent. Using 1967 as the base it would have been 116 per cent. The relationship between these two factors — the parity ratio — thus would have been about 90 per cent based on 1967 prices instead of the 67 per cent reported.

Administration officials have tried to water down the importance of the parity ratio, explaining — as in the December report — that parity ratios are not significant indicators of the farm economy.

"They are only price comparisons and do not take into account changes in efficiency, technology, volume of production or other factors," the USDA said. "No such ratio realistically reflects the current

status of the income or welfare of farmers."

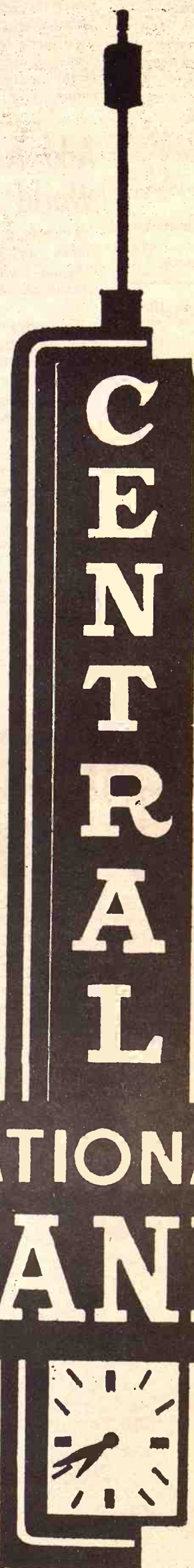
Dechant disagreed.

"It is hocus-pocus to suggest that the parity formula has not been

modernized," he said.

Dechant said the NFU will ask Congress to issue its own report each month to show parity ratio comparisons on the old formula.

CRAN-APPLE-BERRY BREAD

two-thirds cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
one-third cup shortening
2 eggs
¼ cup milk
1 cup canned applesauce
2 cups whole fresh cranberries
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
¾ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
½ teaspoon baking soda

Cream together sugar and shortening. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each. Add milk and applesauce. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, baking soda and cinnamon. Add to the first mixture. Mix well. Carefully stir in cranberries. Pour into greased loaf pan, 9x5x3-inch. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees, 60 to 65 minutes. Cool five minutes then turn out onto cake rack to cool. Keeps well frozen, also.

Tips Aid In Prevention Of Kitchen Emergencies

A crisis in the kitchen upsets even the calmest cook. Two common emergencies are a smoky oven and a clogged sink.

Burning food spills and fat spatters will cause a smoky oven and clouds of acrid smoke to engulf your kitchen. A smoky oven is also a fire hazard but it can easily be avoided by thoroughly cleaning the oven. Some helpful tips are offered here to prevent such fires.

Remove the oven shelves as well as the broiler rack and put them to soak in a sink full of hot water with one cup of washing soda in it. The washing soda's great grease-cutting action will free burned on residues and rancid grease spatters.

Thoroughly wash the floor, top and sides of the oven with a sponge or cloth dipped in a strong solution of washing soda. Do the same on a see-through door.

Give the top of your range special attention, also. Grease spatters on the grates and surface may cause a fire.

An effortless way to clean the grates is to put them in a non-aluminum pan of boiling water and four tablespoons of washing soda. The enamel surfaces can quickly be washed with a sponge and a sprinkling of dry washing soda to act as an abrasive.

Washing soda will also prevent your sink from plugging up or slowing down drainage. Pour about three tablespoons of dry soda down the drain followed by very hot tap water. Do this several times a week

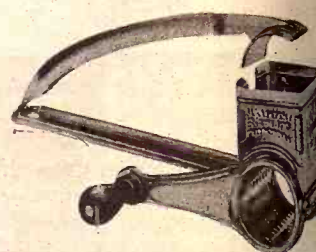

on chicken. There is more of it on the market now than there was a year ago, so you'll probably find some special prices. If you want to economize a little bit more, check the different ways you can buy chicken. It is generally more economical to buy a whole boiler-fryer and cut it up yourself. With know-how, time and a sharp knife you can cut your own chicken and save the five to ten cents a pound extra that's charged when the retailer does it for you. University Students Taking Food Stamps

Small groups of students at both the University of Kansas and Kansas State University are using food stamps to help stretch their funds.

John Derrick, director of the Douglas County welfare department, said 25 to 40 KU students are getting the stamps out of a total number of 175 recipients in the county. The number of cases, he added, varies according to employment conditions.

At Manhattan, Ivan Sand, director

of the Riley County social welfare board, said 11 K-State students are making use of the stamps. There are a total of 90 families in the program in the county.

"If they need the food and this is helpful to them, we really have no more feeling about students using the stamps than we have for other people in the community who use them. We think it is a beneficial program for people who need it and it also is a means for the Agriculture Department to move some of their excess products."

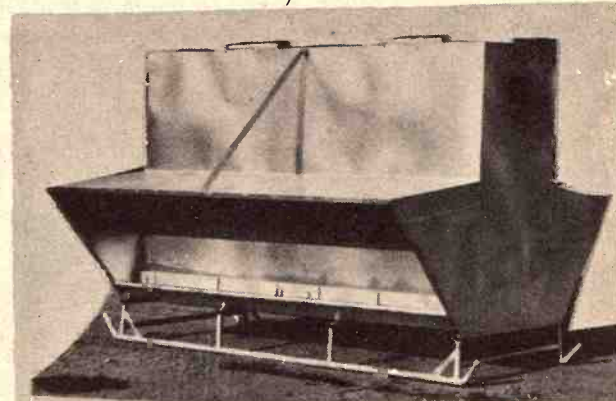
One university spokesman commented that if the students are

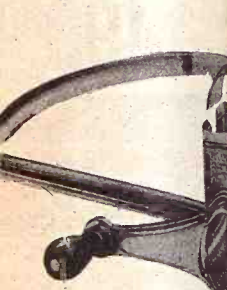

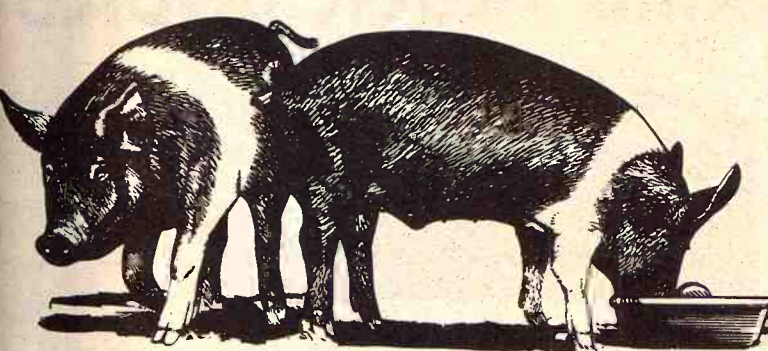

See A Bigger Milo Planting

Farmers' January 1, planting intentions for 1971 spring planted crops in Kansas indicated a sizeable increase in sorghum acreage, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Intended plantings of other major crops were fairly close to the 1970 acreage.

Intended sorghum plantings of 4.9 million acres were up 11 per cent from 1970.

Soybean acreage was expected to be 1.1 million acres, an increase of 2 per cent, while corn acreage of 1.7 million acres declined 1 per cent.

Expected oat and barley acreages were unchanged. The total prospective acreage for these 5

major spring planted crops exceeded a year earlier by 6 per cent and was the highest since 1963.

The expected larger spring plantings are partially off-set by the 2 per cent decline in wheat acreage planted last fall.

If these early season planting intentions of 1971 are realized, the acreage of feed grains — sorghums, corn, barley and oats — in Kansas will total 7,056,000 acres, 7 per cent above 1970 and the largest in 8 years.

Prospective sorghum plantings for all purposes at 4,874,000 acres would be the largest in eight years.

Sizeable increases were indicated in all parts of the State except the

northwest.

The expected plantings of 1,672,000 acres of corn, if realized, would be the first decrease from a year earlier since 1965.

Moderate declines in west central, north central and the eastern districts were nearly offset by a sharp projected increase in the irrigated corn acreage in southwestern Kansas.

Intended soybean plantings of 1,095,000 acres are 2 per cent above last year's record high. Sharp to moderate increases in the northeast, east central and north central areas over-shadowed a slight decline in the southeast and other districts.

The State's prospective seeded barley acreage, including that sown last fall, was 220,000 acres, the same as in 1970, but only one-fourth the acreage in the early 1960's.

Expected oat seedings of 290,000 acres equaled the 1970 plantings, but were only one-half those a decade earlier.

United States

The Nation's January 1 intentions for seeding major spring planted crops indicated sizeable acreage increases for sorghums, spring wheat, soybeans, corn and barley, but some decline in oats.

Expected acreage of 4 feed grains was 6 per cent larger than a year earlier, including a 17 per cent gain in sorghums, 6 per cent in corn and 5 per cent in barley.

Intended soybean plantings were up 7 per cent from a year earlier. Expected spring wheat plantings were 17 per cent higher than in 1970.

Bur oak wood is used for many purposes, including veneer, furniture, railroad ties and heavy construction.

A promising tree for urban planting because of its smoke and smog tolerance, the bur oak grows slowly at first and then rapidly until it reaches 100 years of age.

The largest bur oak in Kansas — located near Elk Falls — is more than 75 feet tall, 5½ feet in diameter and 300 years of age.

One year old bur oak seedlings are available again this year through the KSU tree distribution program. Order forms and more details are available at your county Extension office.

Nebraska Faces Loss Of Some Welfare Funds

Nebraska is threatened with losing a major part of federal welfare funds after April 1.

Nebraska and Indiana both have been told by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that they will lose federal funds aimed at

the major welfare program, aid for dependent children.

Nebraska has been getting \$15 million for this welfare item and Indiana \$39 million.

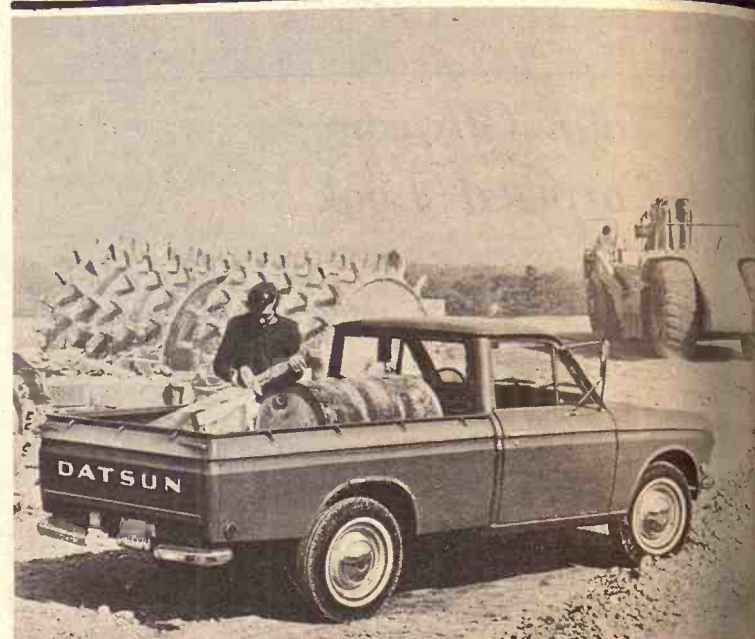
HEW says the two states violate federal public assistance regulations which since 1967 have required cost-of-living increases. Both states can postpone the cut-off action by appealing HEW's decision in court.

Welfare payments to the disabled, blind and aged are not affected by the loss of the funds for aid to dependent children.

The department recently cancelled similar plans to terminate \$684 million in welfare matching aid to California after Gov. Ronald Reagan promised to initiate court action to resolve the conflict.

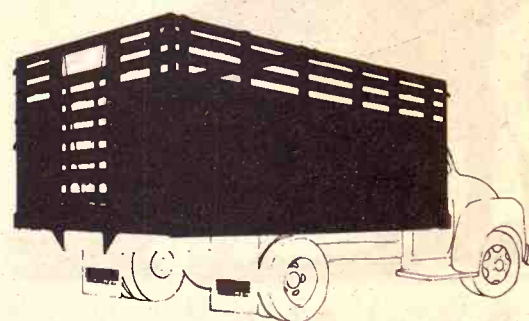

Wheat stored in Kansas on January 1 totaled 346,877,000 bushels, 2 per cent more than a year earlier and largest in 6 years. Off-farm stocks of 290 million bushels were 4 per cent above a year earlier while farm stocks of 57 million bushels were 7 per cent lower. Holdings of rye totaled 1,000 bushels, largest in 28 years record.

Stocks of 4 major feed grains (sorghum grain, corn, oats and rye) in Kansas totaled 236,783,000 bushels, 8 per cent less than a year earlier. Sorghum grain stocks in all positions totaled 132 million bushels, 19 per cent below a year earlier.

Both off-farm and on-farm stocks were down sharply.

Corn stocks were 92 million bushels, slightly above a year earlier and second largest in 31 years of record.

Corn stocks in all storage positions on January 1, 1971 totaled 3,742 million bushels, down 13 per cent from a year earlier. Off-farm stocks were 2 per cent more than a year earlier but farm holdings were down 18 per cent.

Oats stored in all positions on January 1, 1971 totaled 914 million bushels, 3 per cent more than a year earlier.

Off-farm stocks were up sharply from a year earlier but farm holdings were down 3 per cent from last year. Barley in storage on January 1, 1971 was 381 million bushels, 11 per cent below a year earlier.

Soybeans in storage on January 1, 1971 totaled 949 million bushels, 10 per cent less than a year earlier.

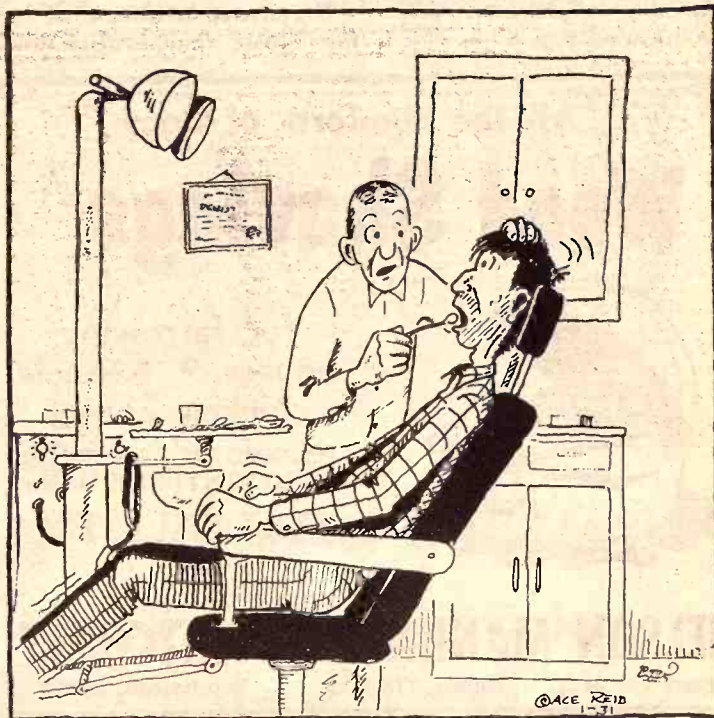

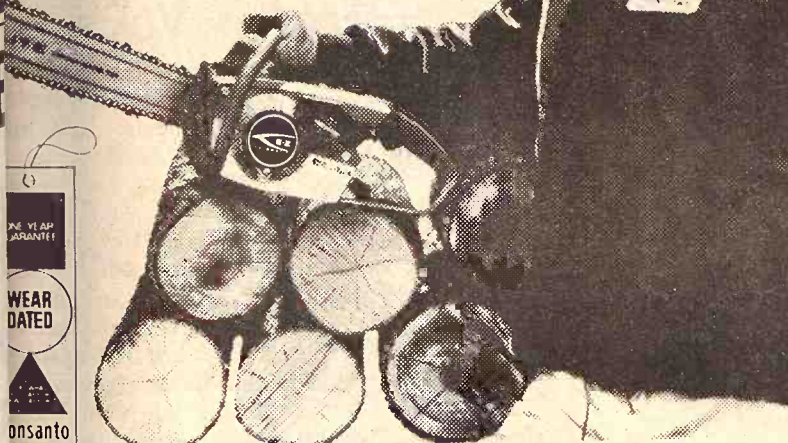

'It's Your Own Fault' USDA Tells Hog Raisers

So many little pigs grew up and went to market last year that some farmers now want the government to buy more pork, pay them for producing leaner hogs and determine whether middleman price margins are too large.

But Agriculture Department officials told worried hog raisers that the basic problem is overproduction, and producers themselves will have to seek solutions.

The answer, officials said, may be for closer cooperation among

producers to negotiate supply-and-price contracts with processors.

About 40 farmers and organization representatives attended the one-day meeting called by the department to discuss the depressed hog market.

Prices to farmers recently have been about \$15 per hundredweight, compared with more than \$27 a year earlier. Hog slaughter lately has been about 25 per cent above a year ago.

Tony T. Dechant, president of the National Farmers Union, called for direct government action, including intensive investigation into the price supermarkets charge for pork.

Administration farm officials have spoken recently against retail pricing practices which they say do not pass on to consumers the lower prices farmers get for livestock.

The NFU president joined other spokesmen in seeking stepped up government pork-buying.

Southwest Records Back '69 As Good Cattle Year

A year-long study of cow-calf operations in the Southwest shows that despite poor weather for range feed, 1969 was one of the most

profitable for ranchers.

A newly published report by the Agriculture Department's Economic Research Service said, in 1969 ranchers in the Southwest averaged a net return of \$10,468 each on their investment, the most since 1965 and 17 per cent more than in 1968.

Chiefly responsible were higher prices in 1969 for cattle, officials said. The average of \$32.86 per hundredweight that year for steer calves was 14 per cent more than in 1968 and 38 per cent more than the 1965-67 average.

The report said the study was made in a 30-county area in portions of west Texas, southern New Mexico and southeast Arizona. About 100 ranchers were included in the survey, an ERS spokesman said.

The ranches studied had 200 to 500 head of brood cows, averaging about 300, and produced about 240 head of calves a year. The average size of each ranch was 17,720 acres.

Gross sales in 1969 averaged a record high of about \$37,800 per ranch, compared with \$34,000 a year earlier. Average total capital per ranch — including land, buildings, livestock and equipment — was

\$519,620 in 1969, compared with \$481,280 in 1968.

Below-average rainfall in 1969 resulted in short supplies of range feed, the report said, and forced some ranchers to sell breeding stock. Calf sales constituted only 4 per cent of total gross receipts while mature animals accounted for 52 per cent, about twice the usual portion.

Nursing Home Assn's Turn Against Medicare

TOPEKA — Directors of the Kansas Nursing Home Association have voted to urge members to get out of the federal Medicare program.

Richard Brown, executive director of the association, said the directors were following the lead of the American Nursing Home Association (ANHA) which voted at its convention in New Orleans to withdraw its support for Medicare.

David R. Mosher, ANHA president, branded the Medicare program a "hoax on the elderly."

"Less than 5 per cent of the 340,000 certified Medicare extended care beds in the nation are being utilized," he said. "Such limited and restricted use has resulted in a national failure to achieve a less costly alternative to hospital inpatient services, as intended by Congress."

"They have added an economic burden on our profession in the form of administration requirements which are frivolous and unrealistic. Medicare is a cruel joke, a joke perpetrated by an army of bureaucratic government administrators whose sympathy for the elderly I seriously question."

Brown said he couldn't give examples of "frivolous" requirements, but said that administrative red tape has prompted several Kansas nursing homes to reject Medicare patients.

Brown said he doesn't know how many nursing home beds in Kansas are occupied by Medicare patients, but estimated there are at least 1,000 and more than half of them in the Wichita area.

Appointment Of Crofoot Gives Feedlot Voice

John Crofoot, a new member of the Kansas Senate representing Chase, Lyon, Marion and Morris Counties, owns a feedlot.

As a result of the publicity surrounding feedlots and the state anti-pollution laws, his appointment to fill an unexpired Senate term has caused more than casual notice.

Crofoot who lives at Cedar Point, said in an interview that he and most other feedlot owners are not "anti-environment," but want to know exactly what is expected of them.

Feedlots are where beef cattle are fed for fattening before they are marketed.

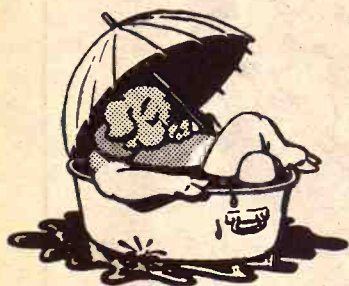
"All of us realize pollution is a problem," said Crofoot, who has interests in several feedlot operations. "I don't personally know anyone that owns a feedlot who wants to ignore the problem. But if a man is going to invest over \$100,000 in a feedlot, he wants to have some assurance that it won't be closed by the state in a few years."

The new senator said he is in favor of spending more money to find better ways of treating waste and praised the work done by Kansas State University on pollution problems.

Although Crofoot has not held elective office before, he has been active in politics on the local level as a precinct committeeman and as a county Republican chairman. As a Young Republican, he was active on the state level and worked in the organization with U.S. Sen. Bob Dole, U.S. Rep. Keith Sebelius and state Sen. Glee Smith.

Game Commission ears Income Loss f License Waiver

Two bills being considered by legislators, which would drop maximum age at which residents would have to buy hunting fishing licenses, have been cussed unfavorably at a Kansas restry, Fish and Game Com-

mission meeting at Pratt.

The bills were shown by state Sen. R. J. Williams, R-Pratt, who was asked to outline legislative proposals which concern game commissioners. Williams, chairman of the fish and game sub-committee of the Senate Conservation and Natural Resources committee, said he successfully worked to kill one senate bill which would lower the age in question only to receive two House bills with the same purpose. The law now requires any resident

over 16 and under 70 years of age to buy the field sports licenses. House Bill 1021 would drop the maximum age to 65 while House Bill 1017 would drop the top age to 62, Williams said. "I'm over 70 and I still pay for a license," the veteran senator commented.

The bills reportedly were introduced to aid persons on welfare, Williams continued. The state game commission is not a welfare agency, he added.

Game Commission director

George Moore, Pratt, said similar bills have popped up almost every year for the past 10 years. He remarked that the Budget Division generally asked his opinion each of those years about how such bills would affect income of the commission.

Fishing license income could be cut more than 15 per cent by such measures, Moore told game commissioners, because a large segment of anglers fall in this near-retirement category. Hunting

license sales would not be as adversely affected, he pointed out, but here too the income loss would be noticeable. Then another five per cent of agency income would be lost because of loss of matching federal aid monies, Moore contended, making the entire loss in the 15 to 20 per cent bracket.

"We're talking about 325,000 licenses or about \$80,000," Moore reported. Federal aid monies are based on license sales within the states, he reminded.

Investors Eye Big Western Open Spaces

A land rush is on in one of the last of the wide open spaces, the Rocky Mountain states.

In the vast tracts of largely empty territory that stretch from Montana and Idaho south to the Mexican border, speculators are grabbing up the scenic mountain areas, riverbank property, land outside the booming Western cities and even marginal desert land.

Some of them are fast-buck men seeking a quick profit. But others are major developers and holding companies making long-term investments.

Movement into the Western lands began with tax shelter agriculture a few years ago when many corporations bought up farmlands, investing heavily in improvements and operating at a loss and subtracting such investments and losses from their income taxes.

Since the passage of the tax reform act of 1969 the practice generally has faded. But the land speculation has lingered on. Several forces are behind it.

• Those seeking a secure, long-

term growth investment and faced with inflation and an uncertain stock market are turning to land.

• Most observers consider it only a short time before population from the troubled big cities spills Americans into the open West.

• Retirement living and recreation have continued to boom, with families and corporations seeking out the remote corners of the nation.

• The small farmer and small rancher are vanishing like the buffalo, making more and more land available.

The trends can be seen in Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico. In Montana the changes appear dramatically.

A single remote section of private land in a Montana national forest — 640 acres — was sold in December for \$448,000 to Coates Brothers company of New York. Good cattle grazing land in scenic areas has been selling for about \$40 per acre, up from \$12 to \$15 an acre a half-dozen years ago.

Prices now range up to \$2,500 an acre or more in some areas.

Most of the small ranches are gone. The largest single land holder in the area is the Flying D ranch, with 64,000 acres. It is a subsidiary of the large and powerful Irvine company, one of the biggest land development companies in California.

Another 20,000 acres have been put together by Butler Development company of Chicago.

At the 95-year-old Madison County courthouse in Virginia City, Mont., famous for its gold strikes and vigilantes, Clifford J. Ehlers, in charge of tax reclassification, went through the records on 250,000 acres of the Madison valley near Ennis, Mont.

Ten or 15 years ago, he said, there were 60 families in the Ennis valley who lived on ranches. Now, he said, 80 per cent of it is owned by half a dozen owners from Illinois, Indiana, California, New York and Wisconsin. Of the 16 members of his class of 1945 at Sheridan high school only three still live in the valley.

They have been on little ranches started since the end of World War II, he said, "and most of those who came in on a shoestring went broke."

Virginia City, which had over 10,000 residents in the Gold Rush days, is down to about 100.

The old city limits are filled with vacant lots. A company called Montana's Treasured Land corporation bought 1,281 lots in the city for \$15 each, Ehlers said, and has sold 94 of them at \$350 each, though waterlines and sewers do not exist.

"Almost every state is alert to this situation," Jack Campbell, former governor of New Mexico and head of the Federation of Rocky Mountain States, said.

"They are just beginning to grapple with how you manage it — how to make real growth and not just speculation."

"There's going to be growth, development, no matter how much those of us who live here might resent it. The problem is balancing quality and quantity."

The 5-millionth visitor will probably be selected in the administration area at the south end of the dam, Gerald Robinson, Junction City, association president, said.

Officials hope to find someone who has made a trip to visit the lake rather than a local resident. He or she will be presented a variety of gifts.

Official attendance at Milford for the 3½ year period since record keeping was started in July 1967 is 4,494,198, according to Leland Brown, lake manager.

Grocery Unit Prices Miss Eyes Of Poor Shoppers

Unit pricing of food and household products is not being used by the people for whom the new practice was designed, foot retailers told a Kansas Consumer Day gathering at Topeka.

Glenn Mealman of the Fleming Co. offices in Topeka, said his company's research has found higher use of unit pricing by people living in the higher income areas than in the lower income areas.

The idea of unit pricing — telling the buyer the exact price per ounce or pound in addition to the retail price of the food product — was intended to aid the low earner in getting the best bargain at the supermarket.

Richard Dillon, president of Dillon & Sons, Hutchinson, said their stores have 16 different sizes, measured in ounces, of breakfast cereal on their shelves.

A common cereal, such as corn flakes, is priced anywhere from 37 to 41 cents per pound while one of the

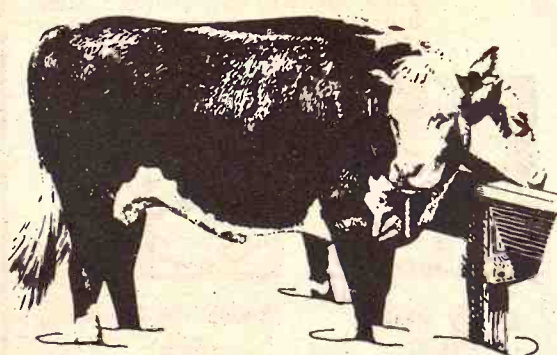

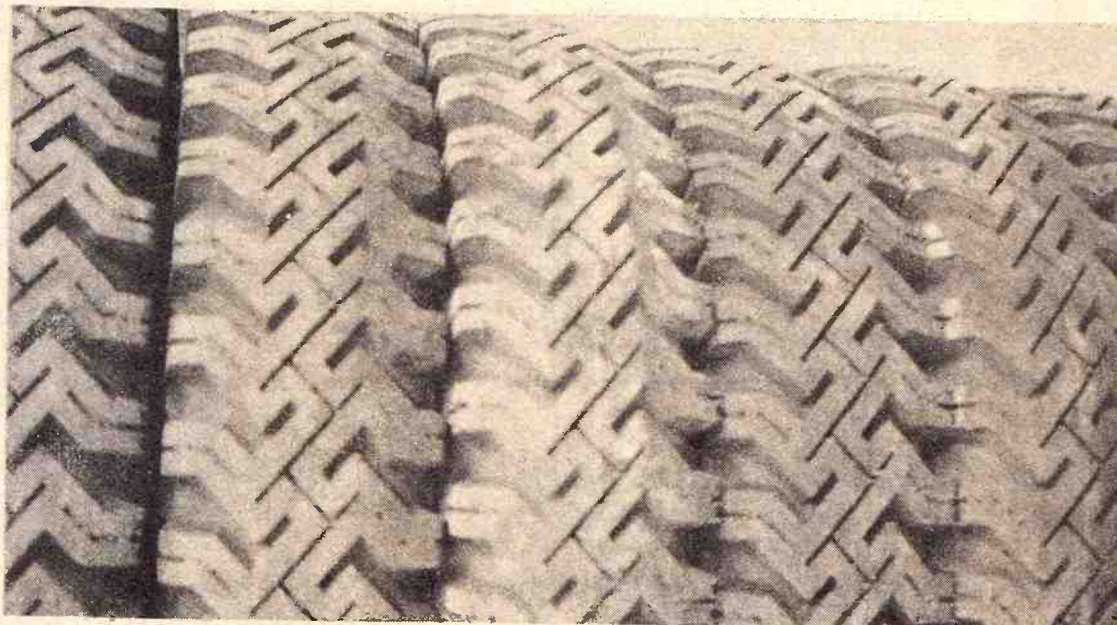

Chanute Hog Breeder Gets 'All-America' Honor

Kansas has an All-American already in 1971 and he doesn't have a thing to do with football. Gene Reinhardt, a swine producer from Chanute, has been selected as the Kansas Pork All-American for this year by the Kansas Swine Improvement Association at its annual meeting in Topeka.

Reinhardt, 30, is a partner with his father Earl and brother Bill in the 1750-acre Triple-R-Ranch — so named because three generations of

Reinhardts, beginning with Gene's grandfather William in 1902, have raised hogs at the farm site.

Reinhardt and his wife Sandy joined the partnership in April of 1968. He is a 1963 graduate of Kansas State University with a degree in business administration.

In 1970 the Triple-R-Ranch marketed 2,300 hogs. The partners have plans for expanding eventually to 8,000 hogs per year.

At present they have 300 sows and

use a three-way crossbreeding program using Durocs, Hampshires, and Yorkshires.

Vernon Lohmann, Neosho county Extension agricultural agent, notes that the Reinhardts have traditionally kept abreast with new equipment developments in the swine industry and have put them to practical use.

A check of their production facilities show this is true. Facilities include: a 50-sow farrowing house three years old; an 84 x 28 foot nursery for 500 weaning pigs; two 120 x 26 foot feeding floors (one with a lagoon waste disposal system and one with a slats and pit system) for 400 pigs each; 30,000 bushels of grain storage; a new grinder and feed mixing mill, and a new Roast-a-Tron soybean roaster to prepare protein supplement for their hogs rations.

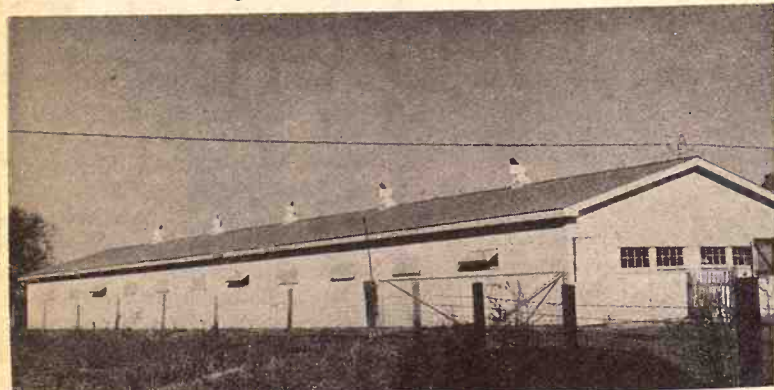
Their records show they've averaged slightly less than eight pigs weaned per litter, including gilt litters.

In addition, production costs are about 16-cents per pound, including all fixed costs. Feed costs range between 10 and 11-cents per pound.

Periodic slaughter house checks show 70 to 80 per cent of the Triple-R-Ranch pigs grade No. 1 or No. 2.

Reinhardt is active in local, district, and state activities of the Kansas Swine Improvement Association, serving this year as director of the southeastern Kansas district. He is also a close cooperater with the county Extension office.

In addition to their swine operation, the Reinhardts, also winter 300 head of steers in most years.

Reinhardt's dry sows are handled in six outdoor pens with 20 sows and two boars per pen.

Their pigs are started on a corn, soybean, and pre-mix ration and gradually shifted to a full ration of milo, soybeans, and pre-mix.

"We use so much pre-mix that we plan to start making our own and marketing in this area for the Heat Processed Feed Company, the company we now buy pre-mix from," Reinhardt explains.

Reinhardt raises 300 acres of milo and 200 acres of soybeans yearly which in a normal year provides 60 per cent of the milo and 50 per cent of the soybeans needed for the present operation.

As with any large business, records play an important role in the operation of the Triple-R-Ranch. Reinhardts have been members of Kansas State University Extension Farm Management Association No. 6 for many years.

As members of the association, they receive periodic checks on all phases of the business that allow them to make wise management and investment decisions.

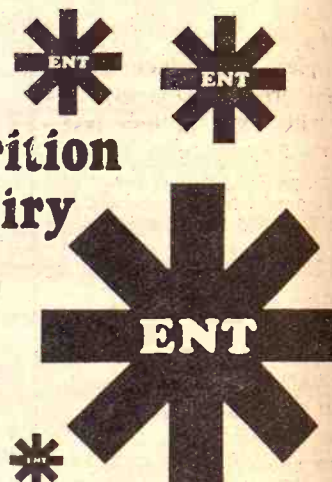

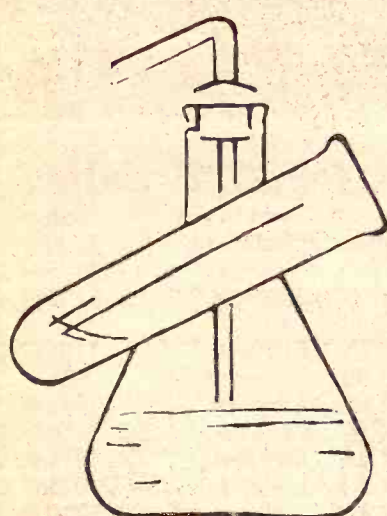

Kansas turkey growers plan to raise 100,000 turkeys in 1971, 9 per cent more than in 1970, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Experiment Station.

These early season intentions are based on the January 1 survey of turkey raisers in the state. This would be the largest number of turkeys raised in Kansas since 1931.

Turkey Growers Cut Back Some More

Kansas turkey growers plan to raise 297,000 turkeys in 1971, 9 per cent less than in 1970, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

If these early season intentions are realized, this would be the smallest number of turkeys raised in Kansas since 1931.

Final estimates for 1970 show 325,000 heavy breed turkeys raised in Kansas, down 9 per cent from a year earlier. Light breed turkeys raised in 1970 totaled 1,000, compared to 3,000 in 1969. Intentions for 1971 indicate 296,000 heavy breed and 1,000 light breed turkeys are expected to be raised.

Estimates of turkeys to be raised in 1971 are based on the January 1 grower's intentions and the extent to which these intentions have been carried out in previous years.

The final figures on numbers raised in 1970 were determined from data on poults hatched, shipments of poults in and out of Kansas, reported death losses and other check data. Realization of early season intentions for raising turkeys will depend on supplies of hatching eggs, supply and price of poults, prospective turkey prices and current season death losses.

United States

The Nation's turkey growers intend to raise 1 per cent fewer turkeys in 1971 than in 1970. The intended decline is in the heavy breeds, as growers intend to raise about the same number of light breeds as last year.

If producers carry out present intentions, the 1971 turkey crop could total about 115 million, compared with 116 million turkeys raised in 1970 and would be 9 per cent less than the record crop produced in 1967.

Growers plan to produce 102.4 million heavy breed turkeys in 1971 compared with 103.2 million last year. Heavy breed turkeys will account for about 89 per cent of the total turkeys to be raised in 1971, the same as in 1970.

Wildlife Bundle' n Seedling Plan

A new "wildlife bundle" has been added to the tree seedling program. Kansas State University Extension Forestry Division this year, in cooperation with the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Department.

The "wildlife bundle" supplements 26 species of bare root and potted tree seedlings offered to rural

Kansas landowners.

The new wildlife bundles, at \$15 each, contain 50 each of American plum, fragrant sumac and common lilac, six evergreen and deciduous trees and five pounds of native grass seed. The bundles are especially suited for field corners, odd areas, pond sites and areas near feed grain plantings such as milo and wheat.

Five varieties of evergreens potted by the Kansas State University Extension Forestry staff are being offered for the first time this year. The potted species, white pine, eastern red cedar, Scotch pine, Austrian pine and Ponderosa pine, are available for \$7.50 per 30. The Extension Forestry Service previously has imported limited numbers of potted trees from Colorado because it lacked potting equipment.

Bareroot trees and shrubs available, at \$8 per 100 are: shrubs — Nanking cherry, multiflora rose, cotoneaster, lilac, honeysuckle, American plum, tamarix and fragrant sumac.

Evergreen trees — Scotch pine, Austrian pine, white pine, Ponderosa pine, eastern red cedar.

Deciduous trees — Black walnut, pecan, Chinese elm, redbud, cottonwood, green ash, honeylocust,

Russian mulberry, osage orange, silver maple, bur oak, hackberry and Russian olive.

Stratified walnuts and pecans and marking flags are available for \$2 per 100.

The trees are available only for conservation plantings, including farm windbreaks, shelterbelts, woodlots, erosion control plantings, wildlife or farm pond plantings or Christmas tree plantations. They may not be used for ornamental or

ASK FOR \$4500 AERIAL SPRAY DAMAGE

BLUE RAPIDS — A lawsuit alleging aerial spray damage has been filed in Marshall County District Court by Harold Stump and Francis Stump against a Fairbury, Nebr., aerial sprayer, Joseph Engles. The Stumps say drift from spraying on adjacent land killed alfalfa, trees and shrubbery and ask for \$4500 damages.

Respite On Pasture Burning

New air pollution control regulations go into effect in Kansas Feb. 1 — but smoke will continue to roll each spring from Flint Hills pastures.

This came to light as Melville Gray, director of environmental services of the Kansas State Board of Health, testified before the Senate Agriculture Committee. He presented regulations for state control of open burning and air pollution control becoming effective Feb. 1.

New Federal regulations requiring Kansas to control all

smoke emissions began Jan. 1. The guidelines for the state were adopted by the State Board of Health with the Feb. 1. effective date.

Gray said new instances of open burning are prohibited except on permit from the health department.

Of greatest interest to ranchers who ordinarily burn thousands of acres of pastureland in the Flint Hills annually, however, is the information that they probably are going to be allowed to continue the practices without getting a permit.

This practice is called "on-site burning." It allows burning of brush and trash in land-cleaning operations or on construction projects — only if the burning is conducted on the same site no more than five days yearly.

The guidelines prohibit use of old

tires, tarpaper, heavy oil or other oily materials to provide heat for brush burning. They ask that brush be allowed to dry thoroughly before it is burned, and that burning be done when meteorological conditions are at an optimum and during the time of day when burning should be done.

Burning is prohibited within 1,000 feet of any occupied dwelling or public roadway and one mile from any airport.

Sen. Vincent Moore, R-Wichita, complained that regulations for farmers need not be enforced as rapidly as those for industry. He declared that the mass hysteria of pollution control the past few years "is a deliberate effort to keep people stirred up" and has no particular foundations in fact.

Hybrid Corn Help Back From Slavs

A 10-year-old good-will gesture to Yugoslavia will be repaid this year with the sale of corn seed to American farmers fighting Southern corn leaf blight.

Edward J. Funk & Sons, Inc., of Kentland, a major U.S. seed corn producer, revealed they are importing Yugoslavian blight resistant seed to meet a serious shortage in this nation.

Don Funk, the firm's sales manager, returned from Yugoslavia on Tuesday with agreements from two companies to supply seed.

Plant breeders at Purdue University, the University of Illinois and other Midwest schools a decade ago showed Yugoslavian geneticists how hybrid corn was producing substantially larger yields.

The Yugoslavs carried hybrid seed and the know-how for producing it home with them in the early 1960s.

It became necessary early last fall for American corn growers to acquire large quantities of seed that did not include a strain, Texas male sterile, especially vulnerable to the blight.

Producers said there wouldn't be enough seed to go around, even with hurry-up production in Argentina and elsewhere in the Southern hemisphere, because of the blight which reduced the 1970 corn yield in the United States by about 10 per cent. Funk said the price for Yugoslavian seed will fluctuate and the markup also will be affected by the necessity to grade and treat them with fungicides and insecticides.

Funk said all of the hybrids his firm buys will be descendants of strains from the United States. He said the Yugoslavian hybrids had passed inspection at the University of Illinois.

Hardin Says USDA To Help Feedlot Waste Problems

An all-out government effort to help
farmers and feedlot operators in
tackling waste disposal was
promised at Tulsa by Clifford
Hardin, secretary of agriculture.

He spoke at a luncheon closing the
Southwest Agricultural Forum at
Tulsa Assembly Center.

Hardin said many federal
programs have great potential for
reversing pollution and en-
vironmental degradation.

"We realize that among the dif-
ficult environmental problems in
this region is the management of
feedlot wastes. Through the new
cost-sharing program with lan-
downers and operators, we hope to
encourage more construction of
holding lagoons and pits.

"Plans are currently being made
by the Department of Agriculture
Environmental Protection Agency
and Council of State Governments to
hold a national agricultural waste
conference in Washington, possibly
next spring in an all-out effort to
help farmers and feedlot operators
in tackling waste disposal."

Lawsuit Delays Possible Link Of Allis, White

The federal government has
blocked, temporarily at least, a
merger of White Motor Co. and
White Consolidated Industries.

One of the factors in the legal
action involves impact in the farm
machinery field. White Motor is the
manufacturer of Oliver equipment
and White Consolidated is the owner
of 30 per cent of the common stock of
Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Co.

Allis-Chalmers had 5.1 per cent of
the total farm machinery market in
1969 and White-Oliver 2.6 per cent. In
self-propelled combines Allis had
nearly 19 per cent of the market and
close to 6 per cent of the large farm
tractor field. White Oliver had about
5 per cent in combines and nearly 7

per cent of the large tractor market.

The two companies also are
substantial competitors in the sale of
backhoes and other industrial
equipment as well as large in-
dustrial gasoline engines.

The lawsuit restraining the
merger merely postpones the
merger. It is possible a court could
decide that there was no legal
conflict in the merger. Financial
information sources say, however,
that White Consolidated would
consider selling its Allis-Chalmers
stock.

Nebraska Working Off Brand Conflict With Wyoming

Wyoming state Sen. Wayne
Vanderpool and Wyoming Brand
Inspection officials are working with
the state of Nebraska Brand In-
spection Commission to eliminate
the double brand inspection fee
presently being imposed on
Wyoming cattle feeders who sell to
Nebraska slaughter houses. An
agreement is expected by the end of
January.

Stetson Name To Continue At St. Joseph

The John B. Stetson Co., which
made its famous western hat for 105
years, may have closed its
Philadelphia plant, but the name on
the hat will continue.

And it will be made right next to
the G&G area.

The Stevens Hat Manufacturing
Co. of St. Joseph, Mo., has bought
the equipment and remaining in-
ventory from Stetson and will
continue the label.

No Funds Close Beatrice College

Beatrice, Nebraska's promotion of
its own private college, John J.
Pershing College, has folded after
4½ years of existence.

The college closed after the first

February 2, 1971

semester. The trustees of the school
said there simply wasn't enough
money to operate.

Named after the World War I
general from Lincoln, Nebr., the
college was founded by a group of
Beatrice citizens in 1966.

It was one of several schools in
Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa which
were founded or expended on the
belief that costs could be met by
tuition from students who could not
be placed in larger eastern
universities or who had flunked out
in their first chance at campus life.

Peak enrollment at Beatrice was
570. There were 385 students when
the school closed.

The college had been plagued with
financial woes, and a major com-
munity fund-raising effort last year
bailed out the institution.

But this time, the trustees were
faced with a \$85,000 deficit and they
couldn't raise the money from either
the community or students.

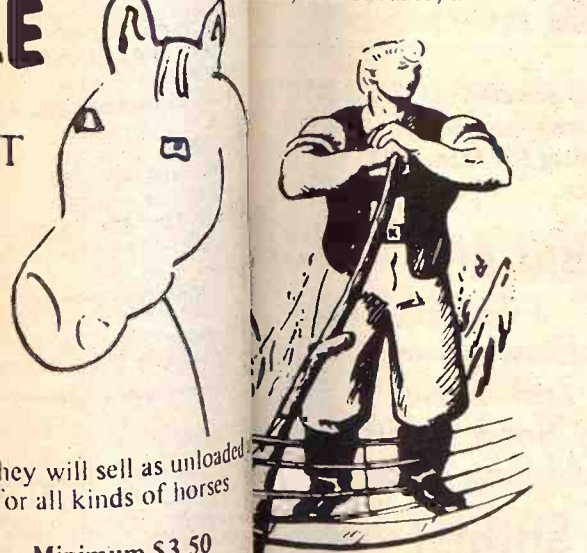

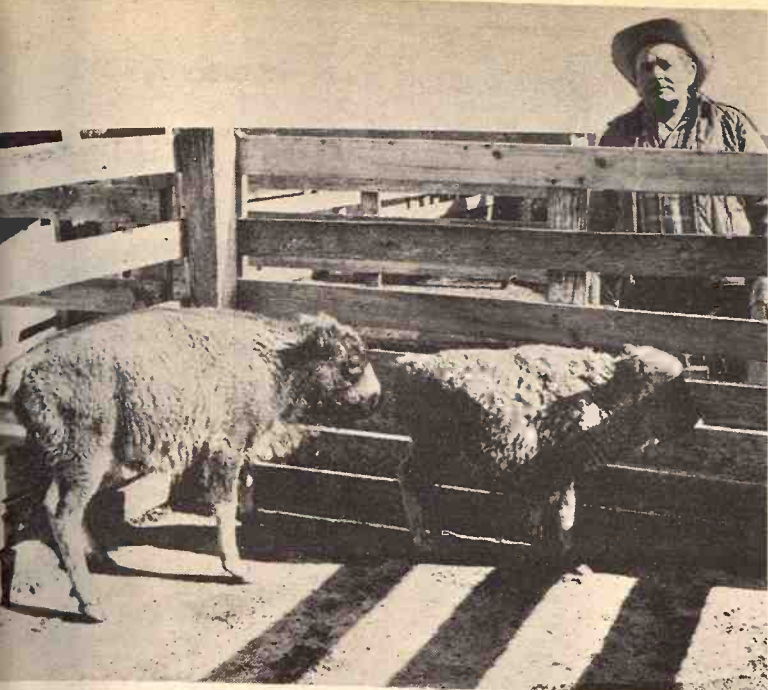

Health Report On Tobacco Ties In Cigars, Pipes Also

The U.S. Surgeon General's latest
report on tobacco and health bears
more ill-tidings for cigarette
smokers plus a new word of caution
about cancer for pipe and cigar
users.

Recent research shows convincingly that cigarette smoking
causes lung disease — cancer,
bronchitis and emphysema — and
provides new evidence of harm to
the heart and during pregnancy,
according to the Public Health
Service's 500-page report to
Congress.

As he has before, Horace R.
Kornegay, president of the Tobacco
Institute, argued against the
report's conclusions saying much
research was ignored that cast
doubt in the link between smoking
and disease.

The report, signed by Surgeon
General Jesse L. Steinfeld, found
pipe and cigar smokers were much
less likely to develop heart and lung
disease. But compared to non-
smokers they, like cigarette
smokers, face an increased risk
from cancer of the throat the report
said.

Cigarette smokers are from six to
10 times more likely to die of cancer
involving the larynx than non

smokers, the surgeon general said,
while the figure for pipe and cigar
users is a three-to-seven-fold in-
crease in risk.

Pipe — but not cigar — smokers
also have a greater chance than
nonsmokers of developing cancer of
the lip and mouth, the 500-page
report said.

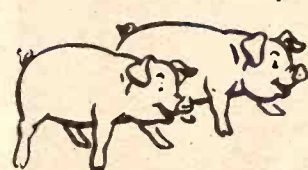

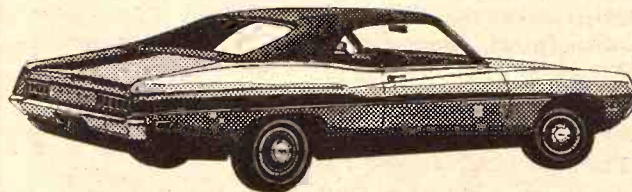
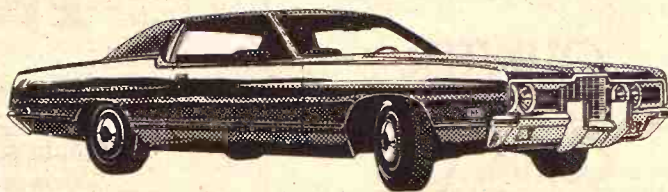

Many Drugs Test Out As Ineffective

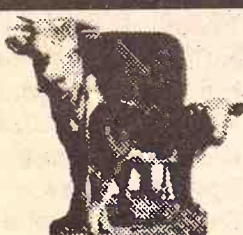
More than 14 per cent of some 16,000 drugs tested for the Food and Drug Administration were found to be ineffective, the FDA commissioner says.

Dr. Charles C. Edwards told the Senate Monopoly subcommittee that a test of 16,573 drugs conducted by the National Academy of Science produced these findings: ineffective 14.7 per cent; possibly effective 34.9 per cent; probably effective 7.3 per cent; effective 19.1 per cent and effective but with some qualification 24 per cent.

"Many of the presentations submitted by manufacturers in support of the claims being made for the use of their drugs consisted of reports of uncontrolled observa-

tions and testimonial-type endorsements," Edwards said. "The lack of substantial evidence based on well-controlled investigations by experienced investigators was conspicuous."

Even an ineffective drug, Edwards stressed, can frequently cause adverse reactions.

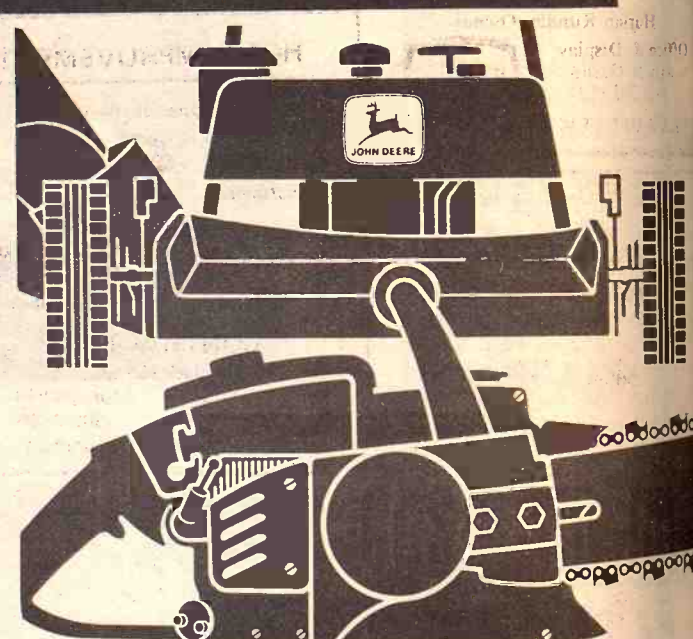

Varied Pay To Teachers

An experienced school teacher in one of Kansas' lower-paying districts draws a lower salary than a beginning teacher in one of the state's high paying district, the Kansas-NEA said.

In a report released by the NEA research department, the organization compared the salaries of teachers in the state's 15 lowest paying school district with those in

the 24 highest paying districts.

The report was issued to provide a more complete picture of district salary schedules for legislative use and use in professional negotiations, said Dr. Larry Wolgast, assistant director of research.

The report shows the master degree maximum salary in six districts is the same or less than the bachelor degree minimum salary in the two districts with the highest beginning salaries — Shawnee Mission and Olathe.

The Shawnee Heights district ranked eighth out of 311 districts for

Swift Climb In School Taxes In Five Years

Property tax levies for Kansas school operation increased from \$138.2 million in the 1965 tax year to \$215.4 million for 1969. At the same time, state aid to schools was climbing from \$89.9 million to \$129.2 million.

Richard Ryan of the legislative research department gave the

figures in discussing the working of the present state school foundation finance plan before the House Education Committee Tuesday.

In the same period, Ryan said, levies for school capital improvement increased from \$36.4 million to \$47.6 million.

Ryan also provided these details for the committee:

Enrollments in the 311 districts range from 83 to 63,492 and the area from 10 square miles to 928 square miles. Sixty two districts had fewer than 400 pupils each. The largest five districts each had more than 10,000 pupils.

Two-thirds of the district cover more than one county; 32 have jurisdiction in four counties and four in five counties.

Taxable valuation per pupil ranges from \$3,586 to \$125,000; taxable income from \$1,029 to \$8,303; operating costs per pupil from \$489 to \$1,573; and adjusted general tax rates from 5.25 mills to 68.62 mills.

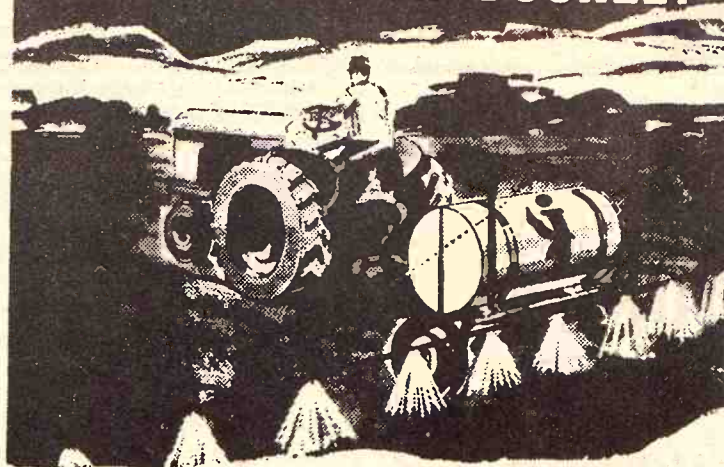

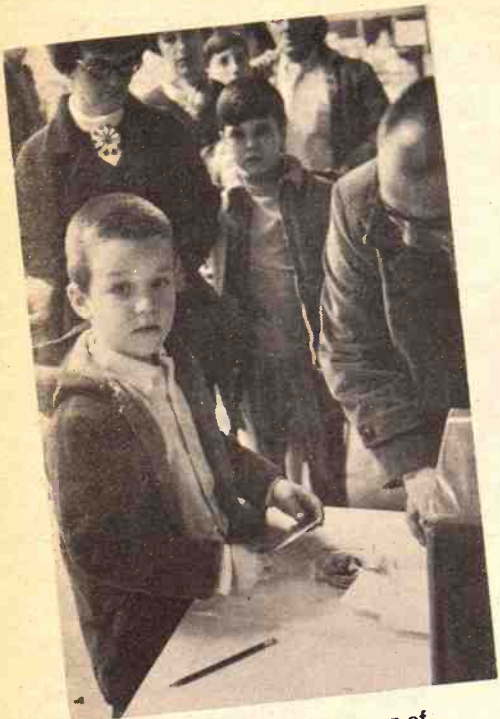

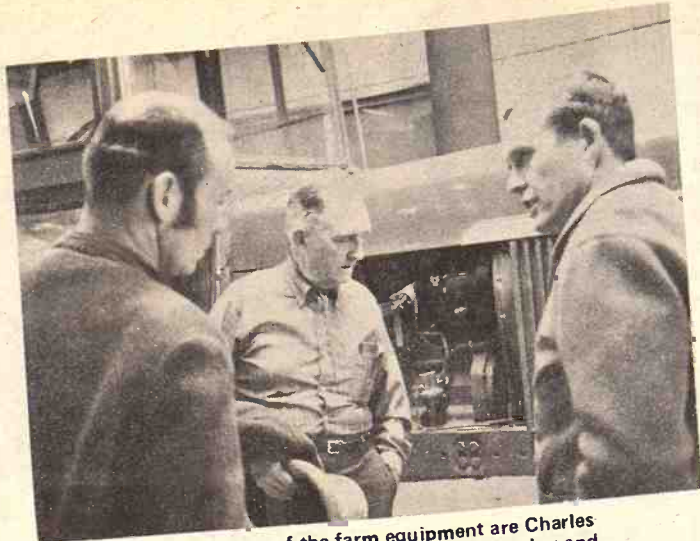

NFO Air-Lift To Prop Sagging Hog Prices

The National Farmers Organization (NFO) has begun a "hog lift" in an effort to raise farm produce prices.

Oren Staley, NFO president, said the program started last week when truck-loads of hogs were shipped out of Iowa into higher market price areas.

NFO members in Illinois, Nebraska, Minnesota, Missouri, Indiana, Ohio and Kansas are expected to join the hog-exporting movement.

Staley said the action is the second phase of a three-pronged attack to raise prices of farm products. He said moving hogs to light hog producing areas will create a "vacuum" in heavy market areas, forcing hog prices higher.

The NFO instituted the first phase of its attack earlier this month by shipping grain to high market points outside Iowa. Staley said the plan met with "success."

Once the hog price increase is achieved, the NFO will turn its attention to milk prices, Staley said.

Anyone entering the bin during unloading operations should have one end of a rope secured around his body just below the arms with the other end secured outside the bin entrance.

"This has become most important as bins have become deeper and larger," explains Holmes.

He recommends a ladder be attached to the bin floor or wall to permit inspection of the bin interior and to observe or assist grain flow without stepping into the material.

Bulk feed is particularly dangerous since it may bridge and cause a void to form near the outlet. A good safety measure to follow, in any event, is to remain out of the bin to break up the bridging. Mechanical vibrators may also be used to keep the material flowing properly.

are Needed When Grain Flows from Bins

A lot of grain will be flowing out of Kansas bins in the next few months. It can be just as dangerous as a landslide.

Grain pouring from a bin can use a person to be sucked into the charge or bin outlet. This is especially true of bottom unloading of grain or feed storage bins. Without something to hang on to, it is almost impossible for a person to

keep from being drawn down by the moving material, says Elwyn S. Holmes, Extension agricultural engineer at Kansas State University.

"Therefore, before opening the grain gate, make a safety check to determine no one is in the bin and that everyone is aware the unloading operation is under way," suggests Holmes.

"It is always best to stay out of a bin during the unloading operation. However, if someone must enter, another person should be present at the entrance with immediate means for providing assistance or shutting down the equipment."

Thousands Of Items For The Farm And Home

Slight Gain In Price Index

February 2, 1971

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-January 1971 were up moderately from December but still cent below a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The index of prices received for all products was 247 per cent of 1910-14 base period compared 241 in December and 256 in January 1970. Prices received for most meat products and grain crops were up from the previous month while for eggs were down a little. Compared with January 1970, for grain crops were up moderately but hogs, lambs and eggs were down substantially.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 165 per cent at mid-January, 2 points above December and 16 points above a year earlier.

Wheat at mid-January averaged \$1.33 per bushel, 1 cent above December and 11 cents above a year ago.

Corn was worth \$1.33, up 3 cents from the previous month and 21 cents above a year earlier.

Barley at 95 cents per bushel was 2 cents above December 1970 and 9 cents above January 1970.

Sorghum grain was worth \$1.99 per cwt., 3 cents above a month ago and 21 cents above a year ago.

Soybeans averaged \$2.73 per bushel compared with \$2.71 in December and \$2.24 a year ago.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-January was 340 per cent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 330 a month earlier and 378 a year earlier.

The meat animal price index was 397 per cent in January compared with 381 in December and 433 a year ago.

Hog prices averaged \$15.30 per cwt., 40 cents above the previous month but \$11.00 below January last year.

All beef cattle brought \$26.60 per cwt., \$1.20 above a month earlier and 20 cents above a year earlier.

The dairy price index was 347 in January compared with 354 in December 1970 and 348 in January 1970. The preliminary wholesale milk price was \$5.85 per cwt., 15 cents below December and 5 cents below January last year.

Eggs averaged 25 cents per dozen, 1 cent above the previous month but 18 cents below the previous year.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by farmers for supplemental and mixed feeds were all moderately higher than in January 1970.

United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-January was 271 per cent of the 1910-14 base period, up 6 points from mid-December but down 16 points from mid-December but down 16 points from January 1970.

Price increases from December were noted for beef cattle, feed

grains and soybeans. Prices were slightly lower for wheat, lambs, milk and eggs.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage rates) was 399, up 3 points from mid-December and 16 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in January was 68, up 1 point from December but down 7 points from January 1970.

Break In Set-Aside Plan For One Year Only

The Agriculture department has dropped for 1971 a controversial provision in the "set aside" program for cotton, wheat and feed grains that would have required farmers to take from production land actually used for crops within the last three years.

Officials notified state agricultural stabilization and conservation service offices that the rule would not apply this year.

As first announced, a farmer who wanted to qualify for price support loans and payments under the new Agriculture Act of 1970 would have had to "set aside" or take from production part of his land this year.

The regulation said also the land taken from production must have been used to grow some crop in at least one of the last three years. This virtually ruled out land a farmer had diverted from production from year-to-year under previous programs.

The regulation was intended to force farmers to take some of their better land from production in order to qualify for government benefits. A criticism of previous programs was that farmers normally took

from production their poorest land, leaving it idle year after year.

Now, says the Agriculture department, the original rule for 1971 set-aside requirements is dropped. It had been opposed by several farm-belt members of Congress and farm groups.

George V. Hansen, in charge of state and county operations for ASCS, said some of the pressure came from wildlife groups and others interested in preserving balances in the ecology.

Land that had been idled over a period of years under the old programs in many cases provided cover for wildlife. By requiring farmers to take different land from production they would be tempted to plow up their old idled areas. Hansen said.

Also, he added, Congress passed the new law so late in the year that farmers are going to have a difficult enough time arranging operations without the added hardship of the new regulation on set-aside acres.

The suspension of the rule applies only to 1971, Hansen said. No decisions have been made for 1972 and 1973 operations.

For the 16th consecutive year the Omaha Livestock Market was the nation's largest livestock market in 1970. The salable receipts of 3,121,899 head of cattle, calves, hogs and sheep were 1.7 per cent less than in the prior year.
