The Miniwanca Club was organized for students at Kansas State College who have attended the American Youth Foundation Camp at Camp Miniwanca, Shelby, Michigan.

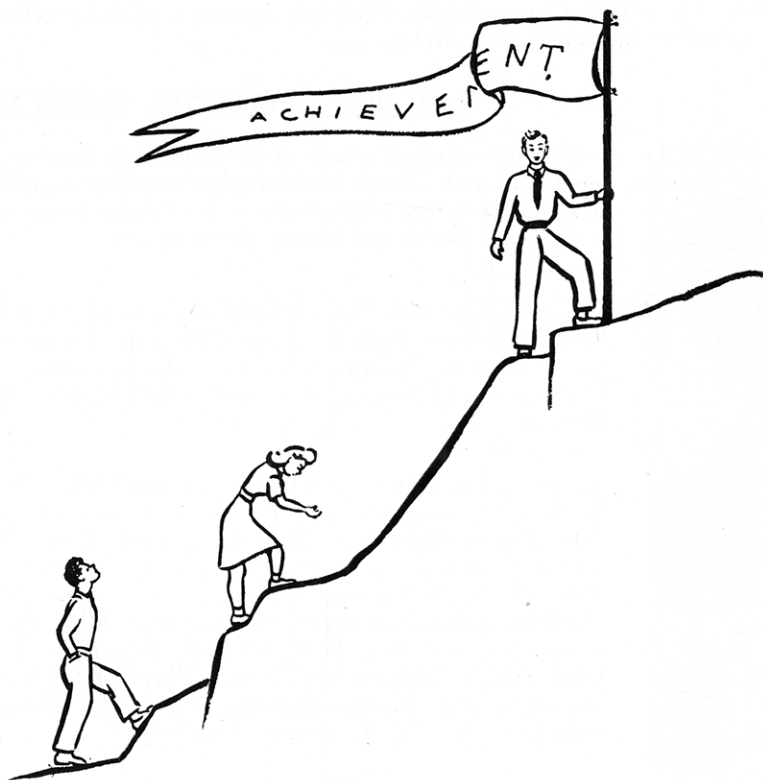
The purpose of the Club is to further the four-fold training program of the Camp-mental, physical, social, and religious development of the individual.

Six outstanding club members in Kansas are awarded scholarships to the American Youth Foundation Camp for two weeks each summer. Those attending in 1946 were:

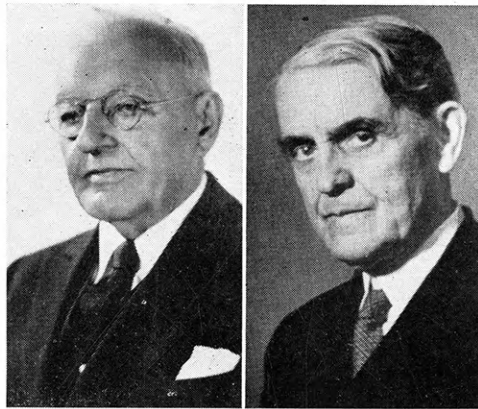

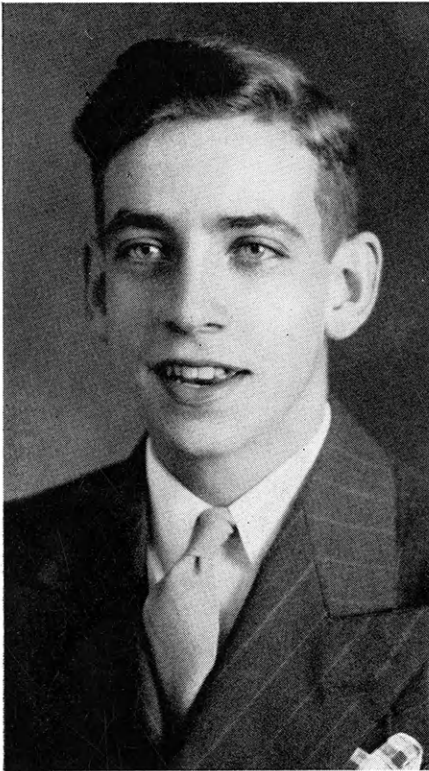


## ACHIEVEMENT WINNERS

These achievement winners were awarded \$250 scholarships by John Morrell and Company.

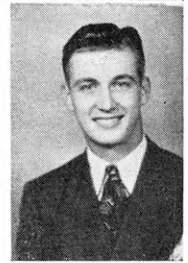




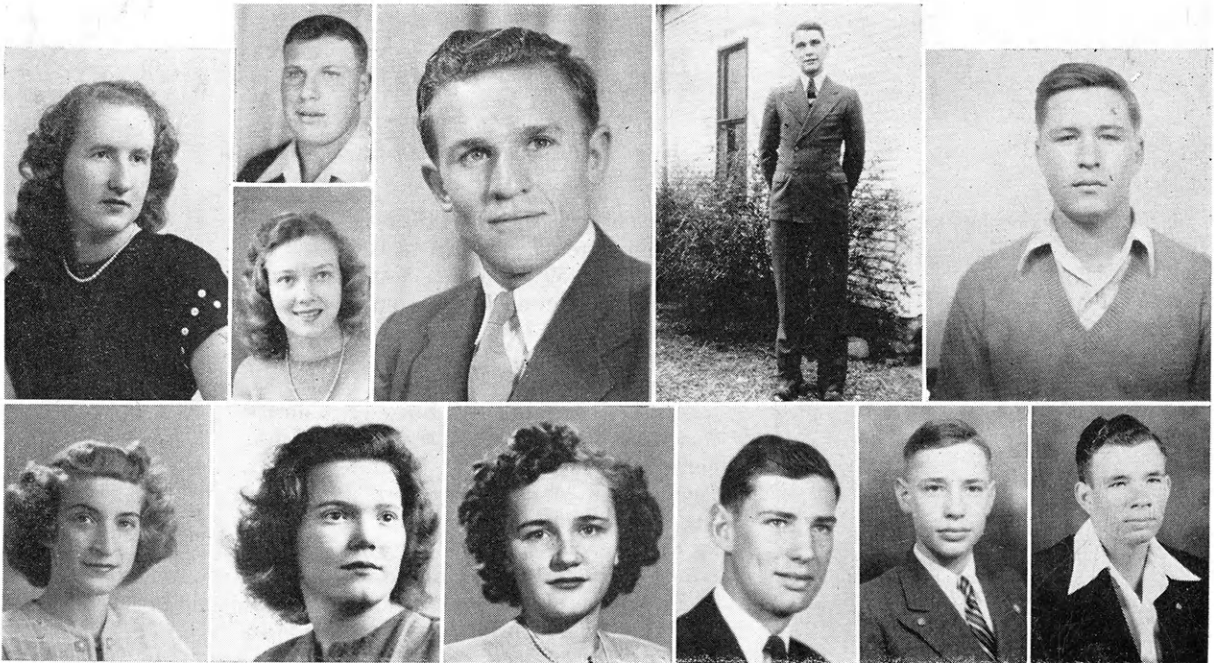

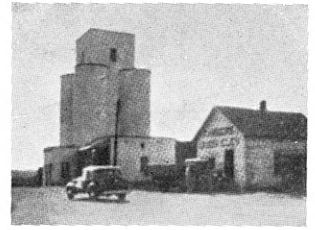

# IS ANYBODY HERE TO REPRESENT THE PEOPLE?

During the 1947 session of the Kansas legislature, a Senate committee scheduled an evening hearing on a controversial bill involving insurance. Rival companies went to great length to point out the good and bad points of the bill—how it might affect them adversely, or why they needed the bill to continue their operations in Kansas.

Expensive legal talent was hired by both sides. In addition to prominent Kansas lawyers, the rival companies brought at least three Chicago attorneys to add weight to their arguments.

The technical and involved statements on how the bill would affect the rival companies went on for hours. Finally, the chairman of the Senate committee which was holding the hearing asked:

*“Isn’t there anyone here to represent the interests of the people?”*

His thought was expressed recently by a prominent educator, who said, “What we need at Topeka when the legislature is in session is a ‘People’s Lobby.’ Everyone else has a lobby, but there seems to be no one whose primary interest is representation of the best interests of the people of Kansas.”

*In a great agricultural state such as Kansas, what better organization can sponsor a “People’s Lobby” than the Kansas Farm Bureau.*

Through its county organizations, its township meetings and a proposed plan of community discussion groups on legislative matters and other problems of public interest, Farm Bureau can truly become “The People’s Lobby.”
