


The State Farmer Awarding Committee finds that all the candidates accepted have met the required standards of student labor, management, financial participation and earnings in project work.

Albert S. Coates, Jr., Shawnee Mission Chapter of FFA, is a junior in high school and is now enrolled in an advanced course in agriculture. He is a member of the National Honor Society and has won five scholarship letters. His name has appeared on the school honor roll 16 times. He has been chairman of the chapter program committee for three years and is now president of his chapter. When he was a sophomore he was president of the Hi-Y and this year he is vice president. He was president of the sophomore class. He won second place in All-Fair exhibit contests in 1935-1936. He exhibited livestock in the vocational departments in the county fair, Mid-West Fat Stock Show and American Royal Livestock Show. Albert was a member of the 1935-36 judging team representing his chapter in the State Vocational Agriculture Contest held at Kansas State College. This year he is representing his chapter in the State F.F.A. Public Speaking Contest held at Kansas State College.

Albert's present project earnings and savings total \$835.06. His project plans are complete, his accounts are accurate and his books are well illustrated with pictures. Albert has complete financial, labor and managerial control over his projects. As supplementary farm practice he has painted and repaired the farm buildings, culled the home flock, tested dairy herd regularly, built feeders, A-type hog house, truck bed, inoculated alfalfa seed, treated seed potatoes and cleared waste stump land.

Albert has been active in the following FFA cooperative activities: selling advertising space in the "Owl's Nest" (FFA chapter paper), cooperative battery brooding project, food grinding, corn testing, spraying of fruit trees, truck growing, and two earning projects - paper selling and rummage sale.

George Wreath, Manhattan Chapter of FFA, is a junior in high school and has completed two years of vocational agriculture. He is an outstanding student. When he was in the eighth grade he won the county championship in spelling. In 1936 he won a scholarship letter. He is captain of an intramural basketball team and was a member of the champion Sunday School basketball team in 1934, 1936 and 1937. He was a member of the Future Farmer team that in 1936 won third place in the State Vocational Agriculture Judging Contest held at Kansas State College. The fat barrow he exhibited at the American Royal Livestock Show in 1935 won 5th place.

George's project earnings and savings total \$700.50. He has had complete financial, managerial and labor responsibility for his projects. He owns good quality stock, has followed good production practices and has submitted well illustrated books.

As supplementary farm practice work he has built the following equipment: a hog self feeder, a hog crate, a hog trough, and a work bench for the home farm shop. He also constructed a brush dam, wired a poultry house for electricity, built poultry fence, planted the home garden, pruned fruit trees, pruned grape vines, repaired a cultivator, laid oak floor at home and repaired harness.

Leonard Austin Doets, South Haven Chapter of FFA, is a senior in high school and is enrolled in an advanced course in agriculture for those students who have completed two years of vocational agriculture. He has received A grades in all subjects taken during his four years in high school. He was president of his chapter in 1934-'35 and 1935-'36, and is now program chairman. In 1933-'34, Leonard was president of the freshman class, in 1934-'35 he was vice-president of the sophomore class, and in 1935-'36 he was treasurer of the junior class and vice president of the Hi-Y. He is now president of the Community League and president of the M.E. Church high school class. He has been a member of the school orchestra, band, glee club, and F.F.A. German band. Leonard has been a member of the freshman, sophomore, junior and senior play casts during his four years in school. He has won two

letters in basketball and is a member of the FFA basketball team. In 1935-'36 and 1936-'37, Leonard won the FFA chapter leadership cup. He was a member of the chapter Farm Mechanics team in 1934-'35, and has been a member of the chapter judging team competing in district FFA contests. Last year he was the chapter ping pong champion. This year he won the distinction of being "Fitting and Showing Champion."

His present project earnings and savings total \$425.76. Leonard submitted a carefully prepared application for the State Farmer Degree. His project plans and accounts were very good. Leonard fed silage to his ewes from a pit silo constructed as supplementary farm practice work.

As additional supplementary farm practice work, Leonard tested seed for germination, treated oat and potato seed, pruned fruit trees and grape vines, built stake dams to control erosion, docked and castrated lambs, butchered, tested milk, conditioned tools, and kept farm accounts. He has made progress in landscaping the farmstead, planned crop rotation for home farm, fitted lamb for FFA fitting and showing contest, laid concrete floor in granary and mowed pasture to control weeds.

Marion Miller, Washburn Chapter of FFA, is a junior in high school and has completed two years of vocational agriculture work. He has an outstanding scholastic record, being a straight A student. He has two letters in football, two letters in basketball and one letter in track. He has been in the school chorus during his three years in high school. He was president of his chapter in 1935-36. He was a member of the 1936 chapter judging team.

Since the death of his father, Marion has taken over the responsibility for the entire farm in a partnership arrangement with his mother. His project earnings and savings total \$372.25. He has followed good farming practices and has his records in good shape.

As supplementary farm practice work he has built poultry house equipment, established the practice of growing chicks and also of farrowing sows on clean ground, butchered, castrated and docked lambs, poisoned gophers, culled hens and dehorned calves for neighbors. He has run terraces, field selected seed, treated seed, and pruned fruit trees. He is keeping farm accounts.

Merle Cox, Mound City Chapter of FFA, is a senior in high school and is now enrolled in both second and third year vocational agriculture. He has made the honor roll four times this year. He is secretary of his FFA chapter, is on the FFA basketball team and made letters in track in 1936 and 1937. He was on the judging team representing his chapter in regional contests in 1936-37 and is a member of this year's team competing in the State Vocational Agriculture Contest held at Kansas State College. He was a leader in the F.F.A. project of purchasing Western ewes cooperatively.

His present project earnings and savings total \$352.00. He is carrying a \$1000 life insurance policy. He has carried financial, labor and managerial responsibility in connection with all his projects. His records show that he has been carrying a consistently good program.

As supplementary farm practice work, Merle placed a straw loft, roost and dropping boards in the hen house, culled home flock, constructed fence for poultry yard, mixed feed for laying flock, docked and castrated lambs, castrated hogs and calves, showed fat lambs, inoculated alfalfa seed, constructed and operated a hot bed, planted fifteen shade and fruit trees and assisted his father in erecting a windmill.

Norvan Harris, Bird City Chapter of FFA, is a junior in high school and has made the honor roll consistently. He is now taking his third year of vocational agriculture. He was president of his chapter last year and was re-elected this year. Norvan is a soloist and is also a member of the high school boys quartet and mixed octette. He had the lead in the Drama Club play and was also in the junior play.

He has won honors for his chapter in regional judging contests. He was second high individual in the entire contest at Curtis, Nebraska in 1936. In 1937, he was second high individual at the Northwest Kansas Livestock Contest at the Foster Farms and at the same time won second honors in the reasons' contest.

As supplementary farm practice work, Norvan has ground and mixed grain, fed tankage, ground and mixed mash for laying flock, culled poultry flock, built creep for pigs, built turkey roosts for sixty birds.

Clair Parcel, Coldwater Chapter of FFA, is a junior in high school, and is now enrolled in third year vocational agriculture. He has a good scholarship record and has held the office of chapter treasurer for the last two years. He is a member of the school band and the baseball team. He is a member of this year's chapter judging team competing in the State Vocational Agriculture Judging contest held at Kansas State College. He was a member of the committees preparing the FFA booths which won first place at the Kansas State Fair at Hutchinson the last two years. In 1936, he was one of twelve boys who financed and fed twelve shoats cooperatively. This year he and another FFA member bought 75 trees cooperatively to plant on their home farms.

His project earnings and savings total \$590. As supplementary farm practice Clair has repaired the poultry house, mixed poultry mash, made a farm inventory, drawn a plan for landscaping the home farmstead and made a calf shed. This year he is keeping farm accounts.

Lowell Wallace, Linn Chapter of FFA, is a senior in high school and a good student. He has completed three years work in vocational agriculture. He was secretary of his chapter last year and now holds the office of vice president. He was president of his class when a sophomore. He had the lead in the senior play and was in the high school operetta in 1935 and again in 1936. Lowell has won high individual honors in regional judging contests since 1933. This year he is a member of the team representing his chapter in the State Vocational Agriculture Judging contest held at Kansas State College.

His Holstein cow and heifer were consistent winners of 1st place and Grand Championship honors in the Washington County and Banner Fairs in 1933, 1935, and 1936. Lowell won showmanship honors at the same time.

As supplementary farm practice work, Lowell has tested milk from eight cows, culled 150 hens, kept records on dairy cows, castrated and docked sheep, butchered and castrated calves, wormed chickens, sheared sheep, bloodtested chickens, mixed poultry mash, selected seed corn, planned crop rotation, kept farm accounts, built sheep bunk, put guard rail on farrowing house, constructed an A-type hog house, overhauled a tractor, conditioned tools, overhauled an automobile and a gas engine.

Glenn Ewing, Olathe Chapter of FFA, is a senior in high school and is now enrolled in second year vocational agriculture. He was president of his chapter last year and was re-elected president this year. He was chosen as one of six from his high school to take the elimination tests for the Summerfield Scholarship at Kansas University. He won a letter in football and has been on the FFA basketball team for two seasons. He is a member of the school chorus and was in the senior class play. He was on the chapter judging team competing in regional contests in 1936-37 and will also compete in the State Vocational Agriculture contest at Kansas State College this year.

As supplementary farm practice work he creep-fed pigs, built straw insulation for a hog house, castrated pigs, treated 120 bushels of seed oats, pruned grape vines, caponized twenty cockerels, balanced ration for milk cows and introduced a program of bindweed control. His project books are in good order.

Maurice Cox, Mound City Chapter of FFA, is a senior in high school and is now enrolled in both second and third year vocational agriculture. He has made the honor roll consistently. He is treasurer of his class and is a member of the track team and the FFA basketball team. Maurice had the leading part in an FFA play. He was a member of the stockjudging team representing his chapter in regional contests in 1936-37 and is a member of this year's team competing in the State Vocational Agriculture contest held at Kansas State College. He is chairman of the chapter program committee and chairman of the committee on leadership activities for his chapter. He was a leader in the FFA project of purchasing Western ewes cooperatively.

His present project earnings and savings total \$606.00. He has been paying on a \$1000 life insurance policy from project earnings. Maurice has followed approved production practices and has taken full financial and labor responsibility for his projects.

As supplementary farm practice work, he has mixed feed for laying flock, made six lambing pens, a creep for lambs, and a hay feeder; and constructed a large feed bunk for feeding calves. He has castrated and docked lambs, castrated hogs and calves, sheared sheep and culled 150 hens. He also treated oat seed and tested milk.

Allon Honeyman, Fredonia Chapter of FFA, is a senior in high school and has an excellent scholarship record. He is now enrolled in third year vocational agriculture. He has held the office of chapter secretary for the last two years. He is a member of the high school track team, orchestra, band and glee club. He is a member of the judging team representing his chapter in both the district and the state Vocational Agriculture Judging contests this year. Allon's family moved to Madison, Kansas a year ago but Allon was so interested in his course in vocational agricul-

As supplementary farm practice work Allen has culled poultry, butchered hogs, castrated hogs, caponized birds, laid out terrace, built straw and brush dams, pruned orchard, and helped to set out fruit trees. He is keeping farm accounts. He has overhauled a gas engine and a mowing machine and built a farm shop.

Albert's present project earnings and savings total \$1299.00. He has complete managerial, labor and financial responsibility for his projects and he submitted good record books.

As supplementary farm practice work, Albert planted shrubbery in the yard, pruned shade trees, helped set out trees in rural school yard, introduced growing of certified Pride of Saline corn and Tenmarq wheat on home farm, selected a registered Angus bull, helped his father build a cement stave silo, put dropping boards and cement floor in chicken house, remodeled and arranged equipment of home farm shop.
