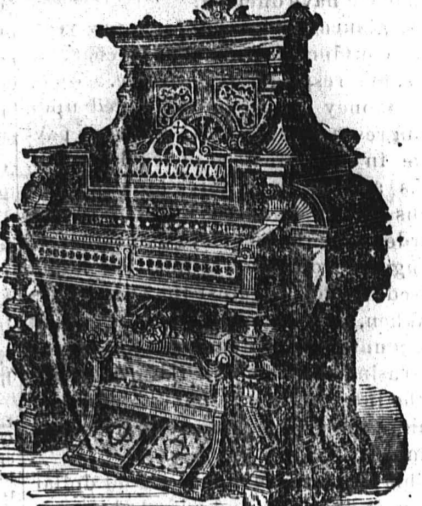

Winter Treatment of Apple Orchards.

Whether to prune apple orchards in winter or summer, is a matter of doubt to many. Numerous theories or reasons are advanced by the supporters of each season, and many of them are deserving of careful attention.

The impression is too general that apple trees need cutting down when some of the larger limbs are decayed, and that young trees should be put in their places.

The apple tree, in most sections is much longer lived than is generally believed. By intelligent pruning and treatment, it will live sixty or seventy years, and frequently much longer.

In pruning old trees, young shoots should be carefully guarded and saved, reserving, of course, only so many of them as will be required to keep the tree in good shape.

When the diameter of the limbs is more than an inch, then cut surfaces should be well covered with shellac varnish, or a coating of paint.

over the wound carefully with a chisel or sharp knife, and all cut surfaces, however small, are better for being treated in this way, whether paint is applied or not.

Any month in winter will answer for pruning—probably January or February are the best. In many places March will prove a good time, and where other work will not interfere it may be delayed until April, or until the buds commence to start.

Heeling in Trees.

Many persons who wish to plant trees are at a loss to know when it is best to buy and set. Both fall and spring setting are advocated by high authority.

Trees that would be killed outright or severely damaged by the winter if planted out in the fall, will pass through without any damage, and even in many cases be in a better condition than if left in the nursery till spring.

The Fodder Value of Apples.

In his investigation of the fodder value of apples, Prof. Storor confirms the observation of other chemists, to the effect that apples are very poor in nitrogen.

Hide-Bound Trees.

The Gardener's Monthly has the following in an article on the way to renovate old and neglected fruit trees: "Trees with long stems, exposed to hot suns or drying winds become what gardeners call hide-bound."

An agricultural society in Massachusetts, desiring to encourage tree planting and the rearing of peacocks in that State, have offered prizes for the best plantings of larch, pine, white oak, and other trees, and for different varieties of peacocks.

A PREPARATION of one part camel hair, five parts of wheat flour, one part of sugar, and one-tenth of a part of ultramarine, mixed together in fine powder and placed in a dish is said to be most efficient poison for mice.

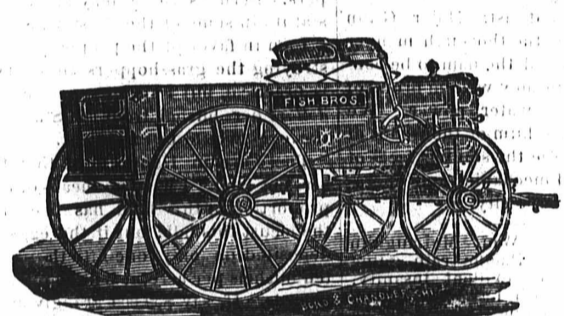

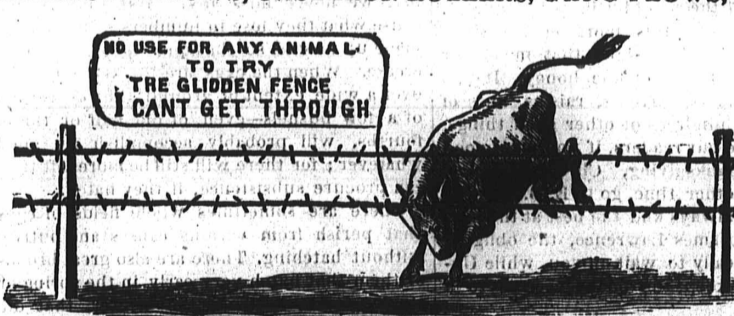

Management of Brood Mares. Mr. M. W. Donahof of Michigan last year made some large purchases of Percheron horses.

Directions for Packing and Shipping

Make butter into rolls as near the size and shape of a brick as possible. Next, wrap them in nice cloth and pack in ash, oak or paper vessels.

In shipping eggs use the carriers. Poultry should be sealed in water just on the boiling point, but not boiling. Pick clean, but do not rub or break the skin.

Potatoes of all kinds should be assorted well, keeping out small and imperfect, or cut, or bruised. Shake them down well, if in barrels, so that the barrels will show full when opened.

Let me urge, in conclusion, upon all Patrons shipping butter, to ship regularly every week, and on the same day of the week, so that their butter will be fresh and nice.

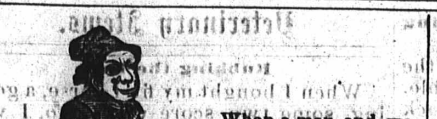

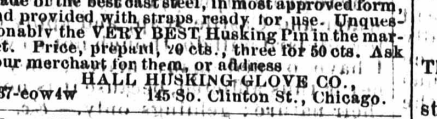
