LAND GRANTS TO RAILROADS.

EDITOR SPIRIT:—Will you please tell us how long lands donated to railroad companies are held by such before the lands revert to the government if not sold by the railroads to actual settlers?

We will answer our correspondent as specifically as possible, for the subject suggested is one of deep interest to the great body of the American people. The various acts of Congress granting lands to railroad companies are not uniform in character, but they have generally fixed the period of ten years, within which to construct the roads and obtain title to the lands.

It will be remembered that this same policy was pursued by the Department in the case of the Osage ceded lands in Kansas, and that it was not till the Supreme Court of the United States rebuked the action of the Department that the actual settlers succeeded in securing a recognition of their rights.

It will thus be seen that 123,447,121 acres of public land are withheld from the people. Several bills have been introduced into Congress declaring these lands forfeited, but thus far no final action has been taken.

A correspondent of a New York paper well says: "The extent of this vast public domain withheld from settlement under the pre-emption and homestead laws is better understood when reduced to simple comparisons. This amount of land is equal to 192,386 square miles, which would make a belt nearly twenty-four miles wide, extending through the earth's diameter. It would gird the earth in a tract nearly eight miles wide and go round the earth nearly eight times in a belt one mile wide.

Notwithstanding so many companies have failed to comply with the law by neglecting to build their roads in the required time, only 607,741 acres of lapsed lands have been declared forfeited by Congress. It should also be stated that from the first land grants made in 1850 up to the close of the fiscal year of 1881 less than 50,000,000 acres of granted lands have been patented to the companies.

While we are speaking on this subject we would like to thank our friend, for the kindly correction of an error in a quotation in an article in our last. We recognized the error too late to correct; but our own preference would be toleration; we presume that is why we unwillingly made the mistake. We are greatly in favor of moral suasion, "Let your moderation be known to all men" is a grand motto if it is lived up to.

Speaking of books I would like to ask every Christian member of the Household which they would prefer. Having, or taking the so-called "Liberal" literature in their families, reading and discussing the same, side by side with the dear old Bible and other Christian books, comparing the influences of the same, or to keep your homes carefully guarded from the same, and have your sons and daughters in their unsophisticated ignorance

(not immense) meet them when out from under the paternal roof. We frankly admit we would prefer having our children familiarized with these new-"isms," lest they come upon them when we are not with them. "Like a thief in the night," and they being unarmed fall an easy prey. "Forewarned is forearmed!" Familiarity with them causes them to lose the grandeur claimed, and out of their blackened ruins Christianity's fair proportions only shines the brighter.

France has an agricultural school for girls. One of the chief is near Rouen, which is said to have begun with a capital of one franc, by a sister of charity, and two little discharged prisoner girls, and to be now worth \$100,000. This establishment has 300 girls from eight to eighteen years of age. The farm, entirely cultivated by them, is over 400 acres in extent. The staff of teachers consist of twenty-five sisters. More than one medal of the French agricultural society has been awarded to this establishment at Darnetel, and the pupils are in great demand all over Normandy on account of their skill. They go out as stewards, gardeners, farm managers, dairy women, and laundresses. Each girl has, on leaving, a small sum of money, earned in spare hours. If they want a home they can always return to Darnetel.

Kitchen Knowledge. "Never too old to learn," and here are a few of the things that have been learned by an old housekeeper:

That, if we wish to prolong our lives we should put one day between washing and ironing. That people who chew plenty of good beef and eschew pork are sensible. That tough beef may be made eatable by mincing it pretty fine with a chopping knife, and cooking quickly in a pot with a close cover, to prevent the steam from escaping.

That salt pork will be as nice nearly as fresh if soaked in sweet milk and water, equal parts. That clabbered milk is better than water for freshening salt fish.

That half a cupful of vinegar in the water will make an old fowl cook nearly as quick as a young one, and does not injure the flavor in the least. That liver should be thrown into boiling water after being sliced thin, and then fried in lard or dripping.

That pie crust will not be soggy if it is brushed over with the white of egg before the fruit is put in. That a piece of cork is better than cloth for applying brick to knives.

Household Receipts. BROOK TROUT.—Split nearly to the tail, wash and clean well, and fold together again. Let them lie wrapped singly in a clean dry towel for a few minutes. Dredge with flour and salt, and put in a pan with fresh sweet lard, which should be hot, but not burning. Do not turn until brown enough for the table. One of the most essential things in serving trout, or fish of any kind, is to have everything hot and quickly dished, so that all may go to the table at once.

CREAMED POTATOES.—Take some new potatoes cold-boiled, and cut them in very thin slices. This is important. Put in a sauce-pan with a little butter and cream, enough to moisten well; salt to taste. Stir lightly and constantly until they are very hot. Put in a covered dish and sprinkle a little black pepper on the top. Serve immediately. They should not stand on the fire a moment after they are done. This is a delicious dish.

CORN-MEAL BREAD.—No house-keeper who has thoroughly tested meal grown in a Southern climate and in New England, can doubt that the two varieties are essentially different. The yellow meal which is the best at the North, is coarse at the South, while the white meal, which is the best Southern meal and is sweeter than any meal grown North, is dry and tasteless when made of Northern corn. The following is an excellent recipe for yellow corn bread: Mix together four cups of buttermilk or sour milk and three cups of yellow sifted meal. Set this batter over night to let the meal swell; in the morning add one teaspoonful of butter, one tablespoonful of molasses, a little salt, one beaten egg and a large teaspoonful of the best soda dissolved in a spoonful of boiling water. Beat thoroughly and quickly and pour into well-greased pans and bake three quarters of an hour. The fresher-ground the meal is the better it is. No meal is so sweet as that obtained in the country directly from the mill where the corn is taken to be ground.

WAFFLES.—Take one quart of flour, add a pint of warm milk and a half a cup of softened butter; beat thoroughly and add another pint of milk, a little salt, a teaspoonful of sugar and three tablespoonful of distillery yeast, or twice as much home-made. Beat till the mass blisters, and set in a warm

place at night to rise. In the morning add two well-beaten eggs and let the batter rise half an hour. Bake in hot waffle irons and butter the cakes as soon as they are baked. Serve at once.

AMBUSHED ASPARAGUS.—Cut off the tender tops of fifty heads of asparagus; boil and drain them. Have ready as many stale biscuits or rolls as there are persons to be served. Cut from each a neat top slice and scoop out the inside. Set them in the oven to crisp, laying the tops beside them, that all may dry together. Meanwhile put into a saucepan a sauce made as follows: A pint or less of milk, and four well-whipped eggs; boil the milk first, then beat in the eggs; set over the fire and stir till it thickens, when add a tablespoonful of butter and season with salt and pepper. Into this sauce put the asparagus, minced fine. Do not let it boil, but remove from the fire as soon as the asparagus is fairly in. Fill the rolls with the mixture, put on the tops, fitting them carefully; set in the oven three minutes, after which arrange on a dish. To be eaten hot.

BRASE OF DUCKS WITH PEAS.—Prepare a domestic duck as for roasting. Line a small pan, just large enough for the duck, with slices of bacon; strew over the bottom a little parsley, powdered herbs and lemon peel; lay in the duck and add a few whole peppers; cover with stock and add a tablespoonful of strong vinegar; taste frequently and simmer until done. It is a matter of choice whether the green peas be put in the pan with the duck or cooked separately. Fry two onions in butter till they are of a pale brown; boil them to a thick sauce with some of the duck gravy; season with salt and serve with the peas around the duck and the gravy thrown over.

CHARLOTTE RUSSE.—Two tablespoonfuls of gelatine soaked in a little cold milk for two hours; two coffee-cups of rich cream; one teacup of milk. Whip the cream stiff in a large dish; set on ice. Boil the milk and pour gradually over the gelatine until dissolved, then strain; when nearly cold add the whipped cream, a spoonful at a time. Sweeten with pulverized sugar and flavor with vanilla. Line a dish with lady-fingers, or sponge cake; pour in the cream and set in a cool place to harden.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING.—Six rounded tablespoonfuls of grated chocolate, one and a half cups of powdered sugar, the whites of three eggs; beat the whites but very little (they must not become white), add the chocolate, stir in; then pour in the sugar gradually, beating enough to mix it well.

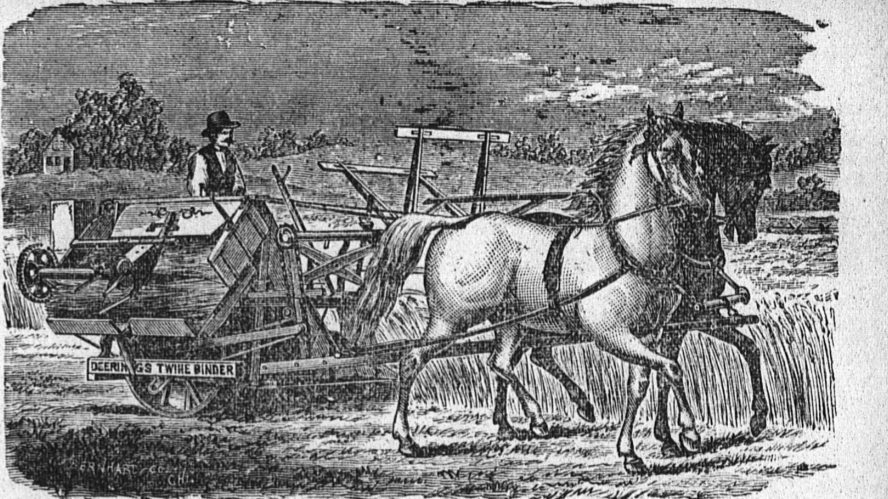

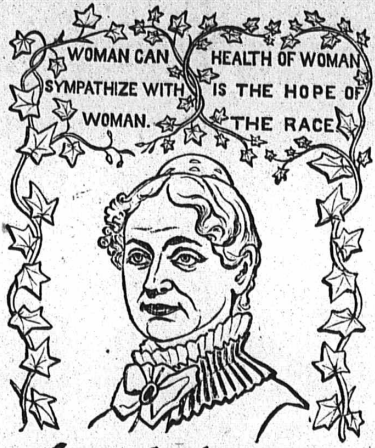
