DELICIOUS FRUIT

DESSERTS SUGGESTED "Different" desserts, that are both healthful and delicious are suggested by Miss Susan Wilder, extension specialist in foods and nutrition at the State College, for use during the coming months. A few suggested recipes, all of which have fruit as their principal ingredient, follow. Others are given in State College Extension Circular No. 282. Pie Souffle—Three egg whites, 1-2 cup sugar, 3-4 cup raisins, prunes, 2 1/2 ground nut meats. Fruit is cooked and run through sieve. Beat the egg whites stiffly. Fold in the other ingredients separately. Bake in a greased dish in water in moderate oven. This souffle may be baked in large or individual pastry shells. Fruit Snowballs—One t. gelatin, 1-4 cup cold water, 1-2 cup hot water, 2 t. lemon juice, 1 cup fruit pulp, 2 egg whites. Soak the gelatin in cold water. Add hot water and lemon juice. When mixture begins to set beat until light and fold in the stiffly-beaten whites and fruit. Place in wet mould and chill. Serve with grated coconut. Iced Surprise—Place soft-cooked custard in individual serving dishes. Add a small serving of ice cream. Cover with crushed, sweetened fruit. Garnish with nuts. Peanut Cakes—1-2 cup whipping cream, 1-2 cup peanut brittle. Grind the candy and fold it into the cream. Chill. May be served over crushed fruit with waters. Fruited Angel Food—1-2 cup fruit, 1-2 cup whipping cream, 6 servings sponge cake. Drain fruit. Pipe whipped cream on cake. Add sliced fruit.

CHILDREN'S DAY DREAMS

Authorities on health matters and children's hygiene are not inclined to pass over lightly and dismiss the subject of children's day dreams. Most parents have marveled at the vivid imaginations of their children. A physician tells of an experience with a four-year-old youngster who insisted that her grandmother was dead, and then philosophized optimistically in order to lessen the sting of the family sorrow. There are thousands of such strange cases every day. This physician believes that fabrications of children in the shape of day dreams should be carefully checked up by parents. It is neither necessary nor desirable to make the child admit that it is a good plan to let the child know that the parents do not believe that the child is recounting actual conditions. It will be helpful to the child if it is impressed upon him that the day dreams are considered "an interesting story which amuses you," but which at the same time the child is made to know are not accepted as the truth. Healthy exercise for the child's mind is desirable and the physician calls attention to the helpfulness furnished by the great variety of new toys that are made in cellulose products, which are light, strong and entertaining to the child, and increase the spirit of play. The physician says that the danger of the day dreams of children is that they too often create self pity and drive the youngster further and further away from reality.

BETTER SEED WHEAT PROFITABLE

The Right Kind of Pure and Unmixed Seed, Free From Rye and Smut, a "Safety First" Factor on the Resulting Crop. By H. M. BAINER, Director The Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association

The losses from the use of ordinary seed wheat, such as is more or less impure, smutty or rye-mixed, are covered by low yields, poor quality and unsatisfactory prices. No farmer in the wheat belt can become a real success if he uses this kind of seed. The common practice of not making provision for the best seed obtainable, but waiting until sowing time, then sowing whatever kind of wheat happens to be on hand, invites crop failure. The farmer may use good judgment in preparing the seedbed for wheat and in rotating his crops; the soil may be rich in fertility and the weather conditions favorable, yet the resulting crop may be a great disappointment because the seed sown was not as good as it could have been. Improving the Seed on Hand The scoop shovel method of selecting seed wheat, without grading or fanning, is costing the farmers who do it, from one to several bushels per acre. The gradual disuse of the fanning mill is a mistake, as there is nothing to replace it. Its use removes sticks, straw, weed seed and other impurities, besides shriveled, cracked and immature kernels, greatly improving the quality of the seed. Seed that is clean and uniform does not clog or choke the grain drill, besides it distributes evenly and insures a better stand. Weed Seed in Wheat In buying seed wheat, look out for weed seed. Some of the worst weed seed known in the wheat belt is often hid away in seed wheat, such as bindweed, agriopsis, thistle and Johnson grass. A large part of the lockage in wheat, which is shipped to market, is nothing more than weed seed. Adapted Varieties Are Best The best varieties of wheat and the ones Kansas farmers are looking for are the ones that most nearly combine high yield, winter hardiness, stiff

straw and such qualities as the market demands. Kansas is fortunate in that the greater part of its wheat acreage is confined to three leading varieties, Turkey, Karred and Kharkof. These are the varieties that have made the state famous for wheat. During the last few years Blackhull has come in for its share of the acreage and for south central Kansas is proving satisfactory for the farmers because of its fine appearance, high yield and stiff straw. This variety is not sufficiently winter hardy, especially for the western and northern parts of the state. The bakery trade is not satisfied with the quality of Blackhull protein and for this reason there is considerable complaint against it. The quality of the protein of Super-Hard Blackhull, now being introduced in the state on an extensive scale, is somewhat more questionable than that of Blackhull. We, therefore, advise Kansas farmers not to sow this variety, except possibly in a limited way, until more is known in regard to it. Mixed Wheat Wheat from seed of mixed varieties, especially of hard and soft strains, does not ripen evenly and when sold, grades as "mixed" with considerable reduction in price. While mixed seed may contain one predominant variety that is suitable for local conditions, it is out of the question for a mixture of two or more varieties to be uniformly desirable. Letting Better Seed Wheat Those desiring to locate certified or approved seed wheat or those having seed of this kind to sell, should see their County Agent or write the State Agricultural College, The Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association, 945 New York Life Building, Kansas City, Missouri, can also help in locating or selling seed wheat.



Know what you sow. Do not select seed wheat blindly.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

A proposition to amend article 11 of the constitution of the state of Kansas by adding a new section 9 to read as follows: "Sec. 9 The state shall have power to levy special taxes for road and highway purposes, on motor vehicles and on motor fuels." Section 1. That there is hereby submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Kansas for their approval or rejection a proposal to amend article 11 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, by adding a new section 9 to read as follows: "Sec. 9 The state shall have power to levy special taxes for road and highway purposes, on motor vehicles and on motor fuels." Section 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official state paper. SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

(L. 1928, Special Session, Ch. 8.) A proposition to amend section 8 of article 11 of the constitution of the state of Kansas. Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Representatives concurring therein: Section 1. That there is hereby submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Kansas for their approval or rejection, a proposition to amend section 8 of article 11 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, so as to read as follows: "Sec. 8. The state shall never be a party in carrying on any work of internal improvement except that it may adopt, construct, reconstruct and maintain a state system of highways, but no general property tax shall ever be laid on lands issued by the state of such highways." Section 2. This proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Kansas at the general election in 1928. The amendment hereby proposed shall be known on the official ballot by the title, "The Highway Amendment to the State Constitution." And the vote for or against such proposition shall be taken as provided by law. Section 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official state paper.
