It may continue simply to increase the number of purebreds, or it may turn sharply toward improving the breeds themselves. A survey by the Department of Agriculture shows animal breeding has not kept pace with plant breeding in developing cataloging and perpetuating superior germ plasm.

Extras and Standards opened at 30 1/4c and closed at 31 1/4c. 89 score closed at 31c up 1c; 88 score 30 1/4c higher for the week.

New York Butter Market The New York market has been somewhat irregular with gains during the week ranging up to 1c which were erased all or in part today by declines...

Last week's report of decline in production in several sections and indications of improved movement in consumptive channels brought about by the lower retail prices resulted in better demand and more active trading through the week until near the close when buyers support again subsided.

Land O'Lakes report, representing 245 creameries, shows an increase of 19.47 per cent as compared with the same week a year ago, and 5.27 per cent over the previous week.

Chicago Egg Market All egg markets have held rather steady during the week. Extra Firsts 19c, Firsts 18 1/2c, both unchanged as compared with the opening prices.

New York Egg Market Standards closed the week at 21 1/4c to 21 1/2c a fourth cent higher; Firsts 19 1/4c to 19 1/2c a half to three-fourths lower.

Receipts are showing marked increases as compared with the previous week but still considerable under a year ago. Storage packing has movement but storage is considerable less than a year ago.

INSECT PESTS SAP AWAY \$2,000,000,000 EACH YEAR Two billion dollars just about covers the damage done by insect pests in this country each year, according to Lee A. Strong, Chief of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, United States Department of Agriculture.

The world has more than 700,000 kinds of insects that have been named and described, and new ones turn up every now and then. In North America there are 50,000 kinds of insects—6,500 being consistently destructive year after year.

No one region is specially subject to insect infection, nor is one region likely to be the heaviest sufferer in successive years.

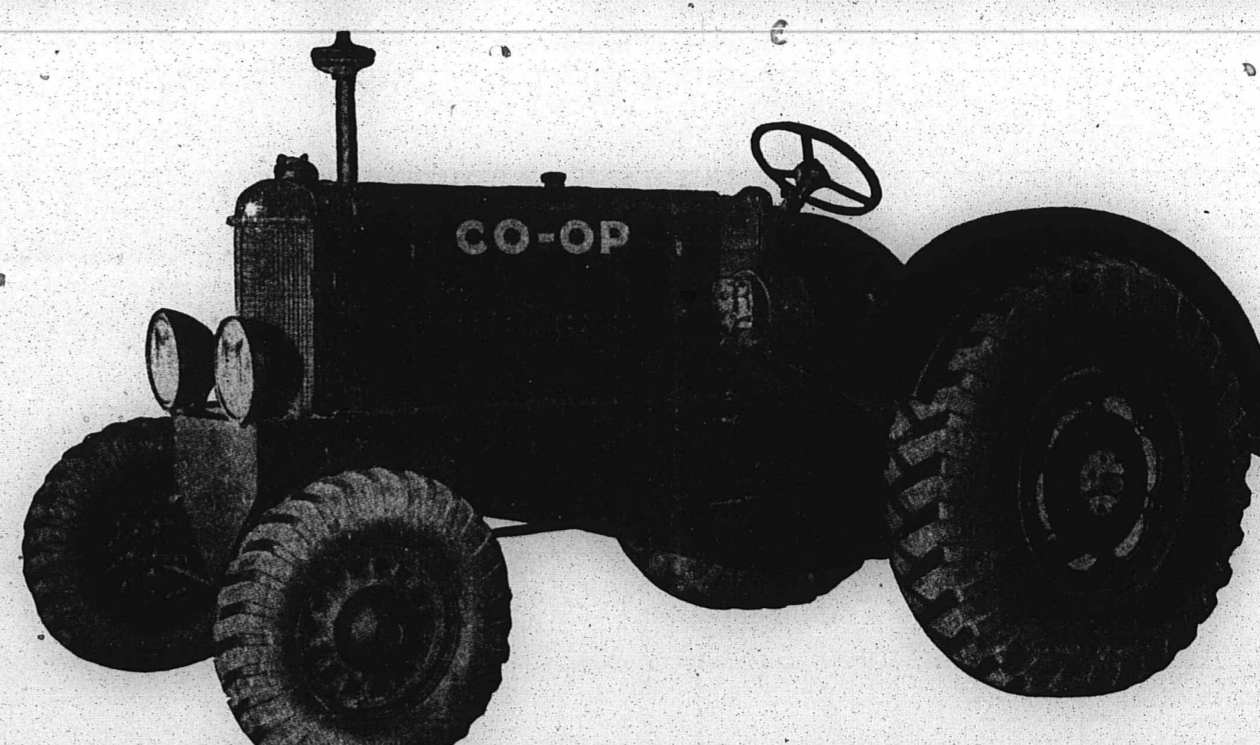
