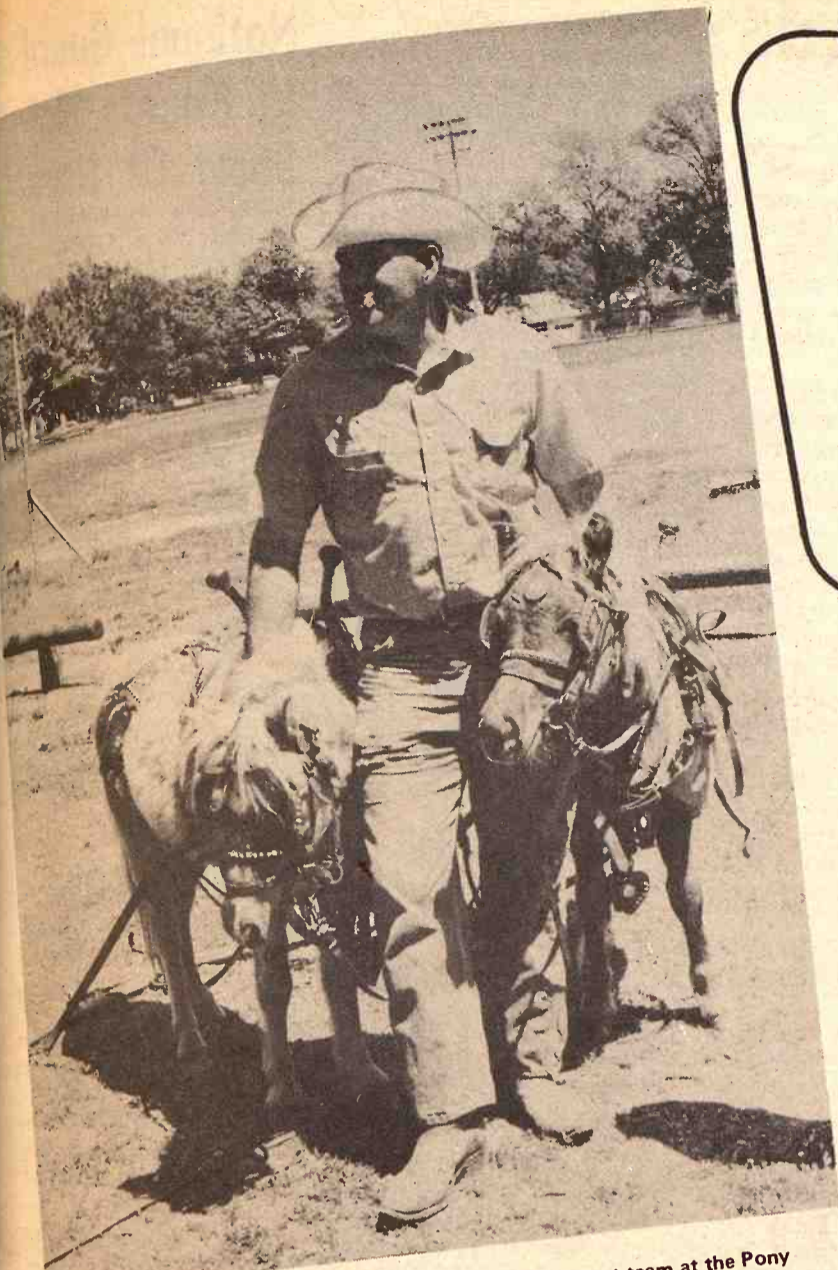

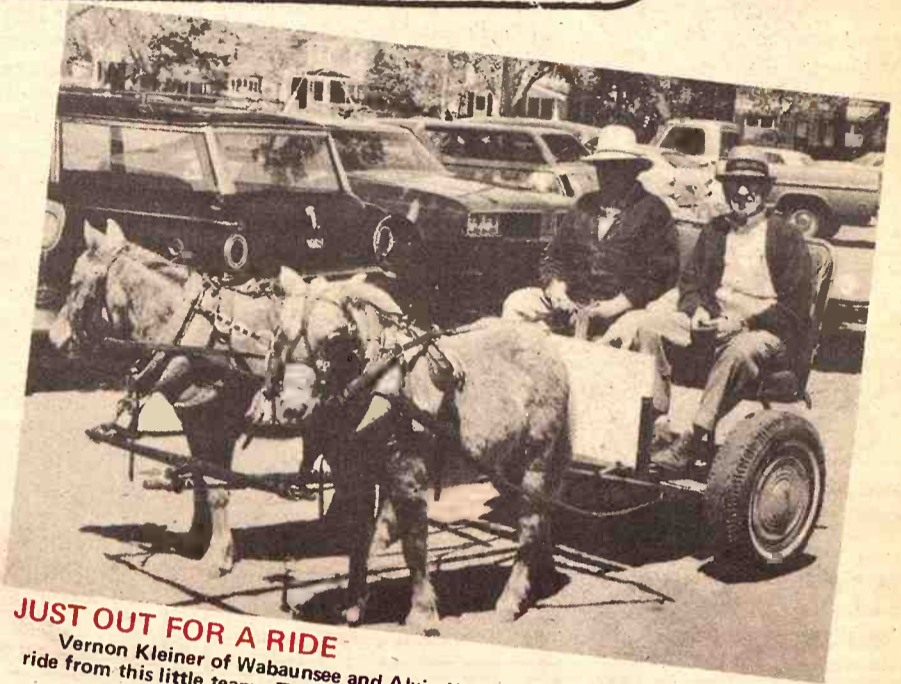

Egg Producers & Wholesalers Struggle Over Government Price Reports

The continuing power struggle between egg producers and wholesalers is heating up.

The latest skirmish mainly concerns whether the government should drop its daily wholesale egg price reports, a move currently under consideration by the Agriculture Department. The outcome is still uncertain; the department recently held hearings

here and in New York and expects to announce its decision shortly.

Leading the fight for abolition of the price reports is United Egg Producers, a huge Atlanta-based cooperative that claims to account for more than half of the nation's egg output. UEP and other producers complain that prices in the government's report often range below those quoted by two widely used private price reporting services, Urner Barry Publications and Poultry and Egg News.

To be sure, neither the government's report nor the private quotations represent prices that producers and buyers are forced to observe. Egg prices are negotiated,

with the price reports being used as rough indicators. But because buyers prefer to base their bids on the lower government prices instead of on the higher private quotes, producers grumble that the prices they receive are "artificially depressed."

For consumers, the skirmish is more than an academic argument over how egg prices are determined. If UEP wins, some opponents claim, the wholesale price of eggs on any given day could be two cents to three cents a dozen higher than it might have been if the government report had remained. Retail prices also would be higher, they contend.

But market observers don't believe elimination of the government's report will automatically cause price increases especially in the long run. "It's a popular argument, but the end result would be controlled by supply and demand," one veteran observer says, "The chain stores probably wouldn't stand for having higher prices dictated to them. They know they can get along without handling eggs for a while."

Wholesalers and other egg buyers who defend the government's reports contend that the main issue is whether UEP is getting too powerful. "It wouldn't be in the consumer's interest to discontinue the reports," asserts a spokesman for one big retail chain, "because United Egg would then be almost in

a position to set prices."

A wholesaler adds; "If these ridiculous proposals are accepted, we will have sky-high prices that will bilk the consumer out of millions of dollars."

UEP's influence in the nation's egg industry has grown dramatically since it was organized in 1968 by the merger of several smaller cooperatives. Last year, UEP and others persuaded the New York and Chicago mercantile exchanges to discontinue cash trading in eggs, a move that reflected the growth of direct contracting and shipments of eggs.

Some egg dealers suspect that producers touched off this latest skirmish because of recent overproduction and a corresponding decline in prices. In the first three months of 1971, the nation's egg production was 17.9 billion, up from 17.3 billion a year earlier, and the government-reported price of large white eggs in Chicago Friday was as low as four cents a dozen below a year earlier.

These dealers suspect that, without the government's reports, producers might be prompted to hold some of their eggs off the market temporarily in hopes of minimizing price declines when eggs are abundant. Egg prices are highly sensitive to sudden changes in supply, and some buyers are afraid that even scattered holdbacks could affect prices.

UEP's Mr. Faulkner scoffs at such arguments. "There's not such thing as artificially high prices," he contends. "Even a Rockefeller hasn't got the money to keep egg prices above the level dictated by supply and demand."

In place of the government's daily wholesale report, UEP proposes that among other things, the Agriculture Department initiate a report of retail prices. "The influence of price on consumption cannot be known until retail prices are known," Mr. Faulkner contends.

National Guard In Kansas Not Short Of Men

Draft law changes have had no appreciable effect on National Guard enlistments in Kansas, Col. Edgar De Graw, assistant Kansas adjutant general, has observed. He said that if the draft should be eliminated the Guard "will have to go into the recruiting business heavily," but that Congress is thinking about inducements not only for active duty units but for Guard and reserve units.

The Army National Guard in Kansas is short about 400 men of meeting its authorized strength of 7,500 and the Air National Guard with an authorized strength of 1,500 is short 124, Col. De Graw said. He termed this about normal.

De Graw said the impact of the draft helped build up the Guard units in Kansas after they had been on active duty.

NFO 'Vacation' On Hogs, Corn

The National Farmers Organization has called for a "marketing vacation" effective this week on the selling of hogs and corn.

NFO president Oren Lee Staley said the organization's members were advised to stop selling hogs and corn at 8 a.m. Monday May 31. "Farmers are being robbed with hogs selling at 15 to 16 cents a pound and the consumer still paying about the same price for pork as when hogs were much higher," said Staley in announcing the action.

Staley said meat packers and grain buyers with NFO signed contracts for hogs and corn will not be affected by the action.

He did not say how long the vacation — or holding action — would stay in effect.

Fred Hall Last Governor To Get Budget Cut

The recently adjourned 1971 Legislature was the first in 14 years to cut a governor's recommended budget for the ensuing fiscal year, the Legislative Research Dept. said in a summary of the session.
The 1971 Legislature cut about \$32 million from the total recommended budget of Gov. Robert Docking, trimming it back from the approximately \$946 million that it totaled with changes requested by Docking during the session to about \$914 million when the session adjourned.
The Research Dept. summary also said, "Not as much substantive legislation was enacted in 1971 compared with most preceding regular sessions."
Docking has branded the 1971 Legislature a do-nothing session and some legislators have criticized the 90-day affair for its alleged lack of accomplishment.
Not since 1956, when controversial Fred Hall, who died last year, was governor of Kansas, has the Legislature cut a gubernatorial

budget for the coming fiscal year below its recommended total.

The lack of substantive major legislation occurred despite a floodtide of proposed new laws.

The Research Dept. said there was a total of 1,064 bills introduced during the last session, 643 in the House of Representatives and 421 in the State Senate.

Of that total, 31 per cent were passed and enacted into law while 40 per cent went unacted upon and will be carried over to the 1972 Legislature for final disposition.

Of the approximately \$32 million cut from the total budget, \$13.5 million was in general revenue fund money.

Despite the cuts, the final budget approved by the Legislature contemplates that the state will spend \$117 million more next fiscal year than it expects to collect in revenues.

The Research Dept. said the state should have a balance of \$12.8 million in its general fund account at the end of next fiscal year, June 30, 1972. That would leave the state to face the expected low point in its general fund balance during the coming fiscal year with less than \$1 million in the general fund account.

Douglass County Draws A Line For Welfare

The Douglas County Commission has decided to deny welfare assistance to able-bodied persons 18 to 40 years of age where children are not involved.

The commission unanimously approved a motion that "no further general assistance shall be granted to persons 18 to 40, married or unmarried, where children are not involved and applicant cannot prove sickness or disability as reasons for unemployment."

In a statement, the commission said:

"This board has felt for some time that there has been widespread abuse in our county of the general assistance program of social welfare. It is the feeling of this board that it is in the best interests of all concerned, including, in many cases, the recipients of such assistance, that steps be taken to curtail this abuse.

"This board realizes that reductions in the cost of welfare will very shortly be mandatory and we feel this is a step in the direction of

reducing total welfare costs."

This referred to action of the 1971 Legislature in cutting budget requests for the welfare department.

John Derrick, Douglas County welfare director, said he would have no idea how many people the commission's action will affect until a check is made of the files.

The county has about 200 general assistance recipients, and the average general assistance grant is about \$100 a month. The county commissioners said they expected less than half to be affected.

Arthur Heck, commission chairman, said, "This is not a move to create hardship for any person and we don't think it's an unduly harsh step. We've got to establish some priorities somewhere, and I think we feel that this is an area, when reductions are made, where the least hardships will be created."

DeWerff Honors At Western Holstein Show

HUTCHINSON — An outsider won the grand champion cow title, but otherwise honors were dominated at

the Western District Holstein show here by Chester DeWerff & Sons of Ellinwood.

The grand champion cow title was won by a 4-year old Holstein shown by Keith Olson of Alta Vista, an out-of-district breeder given permission to show in the western competition.

DeWerff's farm won nine of the 14 classes. Other winners were High View Dairy of Hays, Fred Diehl of Dodge City, and Arnold Reimer of Meade.

DeWerff had the grand champion bull. There were about 70 animals at the show, which included 45 counties west of US81.

Revenue Sharing Would Hurt State Road Programs

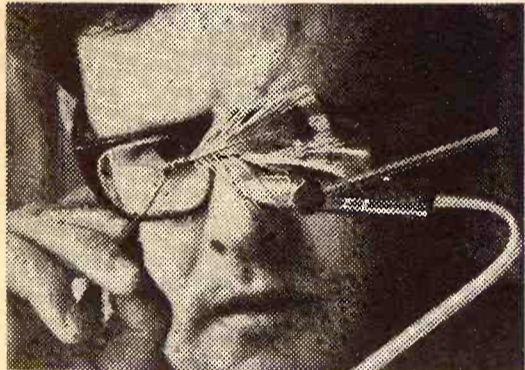
The revenue sharing program proposed by President Richard Nixon would terminate what has been known for 40 years as the federal aid highway program, R.L. Peyton, assistant Kansas highway director, said today, adding this would have the effect of leaving a rural state, such as Kansas, to rely on its own funds for highway construction, except for the interstate system.

"This is why the Kansas commission has taken a position that revenue sharing, as proposed to Congress, would not be good for this state, one that relies heavily on highway transportation," Peyton said.

The commission's position does not apply to revenue sharing programs other than those affecting highways, Peyton added.

Renew State Pressure On Feedlot Rules

Antipollution officials in the State Board of Health have launched their most intensive effort yet to bring all cattle feedlots across Kansas into compliance with state and federal water quality requirements.

Mel Gray, chief of the environmental health services section of the Board of Health, said, "It's not a crackdown, but it's a concerted effort to bring all feedlots into compliance."

He wants to have the more than 1,300 cattle feedlots in Kansas inspected for a determination of their antipollution needs by the end of this year, and wants the pollution control facilities deemed necessary at each feedlot in operation by the end of 1972.

"I have two men spending 40,000 to

50,000 miles a year on the road working feedlots," Gray said. He said an additional inspector was added about five months ago to quicken the pace of inspections.

He said 99 per cent of the feedlot operators will be able to make the financial outlays required for retention facilities, pumping equipment and irrigation systems that most will need in order to meet state and federal standards for preventing feedlot runoff from fouling Kansas rivers and streams.

Gray said figures developed by his department indicate that most of the feedlot operators can expect to spend around \$2 per capacity head to meet antipollution requirements. This estimate is based on a 3,000-head capacity feedlot, Gray said.

He added that this price tag does not include the cost of land many feedlot operators will need to buy in order to have a place for disposing of the runoff.

It is recommended that water

from feedlots be pumped from holding ponds and other runoff retention structures and used to irrigate cropland.

"I've been very pleased with the cooperation we've received from operators," Gray said in response to questions.

The financial burden of building pollution control structures caused the closing of four cattle feedlots in the Emporia-Strong City area along the Cottonwood River last fall.

Gray said a feedlot operated by Russ Anderson of Emporia closed, and that feedlots owned by Jay and Girdner Crofoot along the Cottonwood are in the process of phasing out.

Of the three "big" feedlots remaining in that area, Gray said all are in the process of having Kansas State University engineers draft runoff control and irrigation plans that will bring them into compliance with water quality control standards.

The State Board of Health im-

posed a temporary moratorium on requiring compliance in February, but lifted the order in March and Gray said he hopes that pollution control facilities will be operational by the end of this year at the Cattleman's Feedlot in Emporia; the Crofoot-Robinson lot near Cedar Point, and the Glenn Crofoot feedlots between Emporia and Strong City.

Despite the closing of four feedlots around Emporia, and the possible closing of another for inability to meet pollution control criteria, Gray said compliance has not ruined the industry and will not severely damage it, if it is harmed at all.

"We were one of the few states to gain in feedlots last year," Gray said. He said the number of cattle in feedlots in Kansas last year increased by 3 per cent, and said the state's climate and the availability of feed continue to make Kansas an attractive state for feedlot operations.

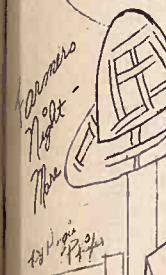

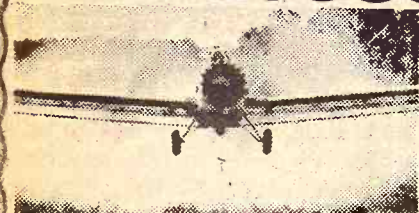

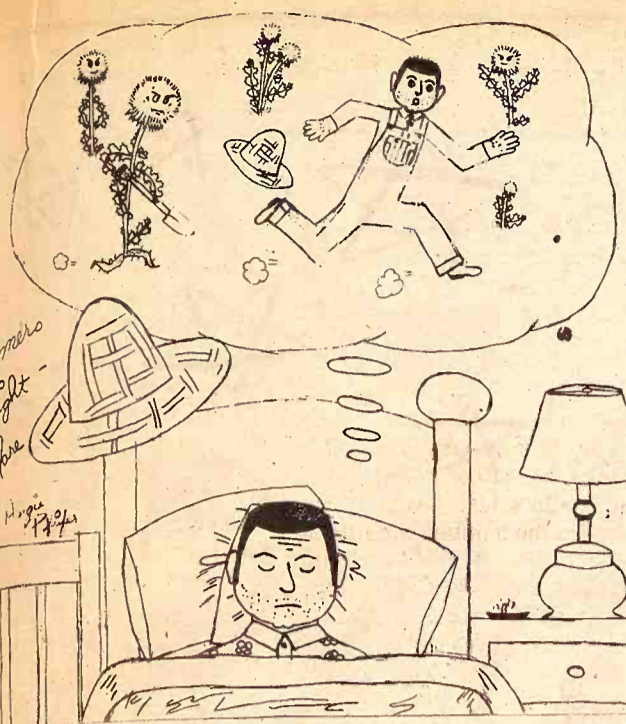

Farmland Sues For Gas Service To Fertilizer Plant

LEARNED — In a suit filed in the Pawnee County District Court, at Larned, Farmland Industries charges that the Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Company is trying to charge more than "reasonable rates" and unlawfully withheld natural gas from Farmland's anhydrous ammonia fertilizer plant near Hastings, Nebraska.

Farmland is asking the court to rule that it must pay no more than "reasonable rates," that Kansas-Nebraska must continue to serve the plant, and that Kansas-Nebraska pay Farmland damages for service interruption in January, 1971.

at and near Hastings." Farmland uses natural gas in two ways in the plant. Some of it is a manufacturing raw material and is purchased on a firm, non-interruptible basis. The balance is used as a boiler fuel, bought on an interruptible basis.

Farmland is asking that the court order Kansas-Nebraska, a public utility, to charge "reasonable rates" for all gas purchased, both on an interruptible and a non-interruptible basis.

Farmland filed an affidavit of a rate expert, Stanley Whiteaker of Kansas City, Mo., in support of its action. The affidavit indicates that the rates demanded by Kansas-Nebraska from Farmland are much higher than rates which are being charged other customers, if computed on the same basis as to cost of service, under the recent settlement by Kansas-Nebraska before the Federal Power Commission.

Farmland's suit alleges that in January, 1971, a peak seasonal heating period, Kansas-Nebraska terminated service of natural gas for boiler fuel. Contract negotiations were under way at the time, and according to Farmland, Kansas-Nebraska refused to resume service until Farmland executed a new contract for interruptible gas at rates which Farmland contends are excessive and unreasonable.

FT. RILEY — An open house will be held at Irwin Army Hospital here Sunday through Saturday, May 15, in observance of National Hospital Week.

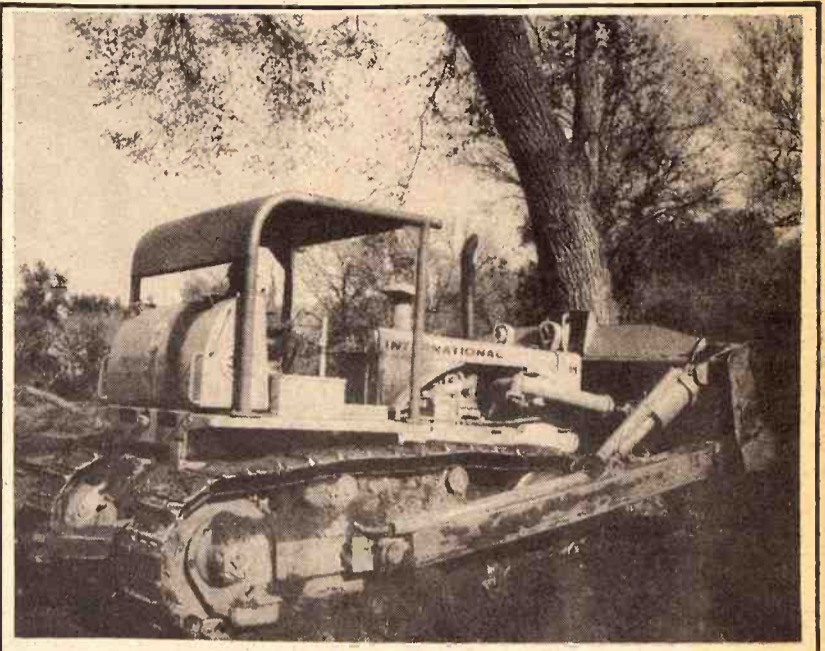

Choose Right Flowers For A Mother-Daughter Garden

When Mother and Daughter cooperate in making a flower garden, the kinds of seeds they grow have to be chosen with care. They must be easy-to-grow, fairly quick to bloom and pickable in quantity for Daughter's sake; pretty both outdoors and in for Mother's use and delight.

Zinnias stand high on that list of annual flowers that fulfill these requirements. Range of flower sizes and colors is wide, height of plants at blooming time is, within the ultimate of about three feet, almost infinite. A glance in a catalog or seed display will show many varieties from which gardeners can choose.

Almost as wide a choice of plant height and flower size is available in marigolds. Color range is restricted to yellows, oranges and browns, alone or in combination, but these are all bright and gay and there will be great quantities of blossoms. How Daughter will enjoy picking them!

If there is room in the garden for other kinds of flowers for the garden should not be so large that it becomes a burden to Mother or that Daughter feels lost in it) one or more of the following will live up to the specifications:

Bachelor buttons, sown by scattering seeds on top of the soil where flowers are to bloom, produce white, blue, pink or rose flowers on bushy one or two foot plants, depending on the variety grown.

Sweet alyssum, sown as above will result in masses of tiny, wonderfully fragrant white flowers all summer. Candytuft, best sown in rows, will produce several crops of flowers a season as it pops up, looms quickly and is finished — so plants can be discarded and more seeds planted.

Another possibility would be pinks, usually sold under the name

of Dianthus.

The garden described can be made in any area that receives sun all day, in any soil but pure sand or heavy clay. Once planted, it needs a minimum of care and will create a bond between Mother and Daughter that has few equals.

Matching Decals

When you want decals for the cupboard doors to match the kitchen wallpaper pattern, cut parts of the pattern from the leftover wallpaper and paste them to the doors. Cover each with a coat of clear nail polish. They are easy to clean and remain bright and attractive.

To Mend Tear In Upholstery

To mend a small tear in upholstery, cut a piece of adhesive tape a little longer and wider than the tear itself. Insert the tape behind the tear and gently press the torn pieces into place. Press with a warm iron to cause the fabric and tape to adhere.

Restores Flattened Nap Of Rug

To restore the nap on a rug that has been flattened by a heavy piece of furniture, place a moistened piece of chamois cloth folded over several times over the spot. Leave overnight for best results.

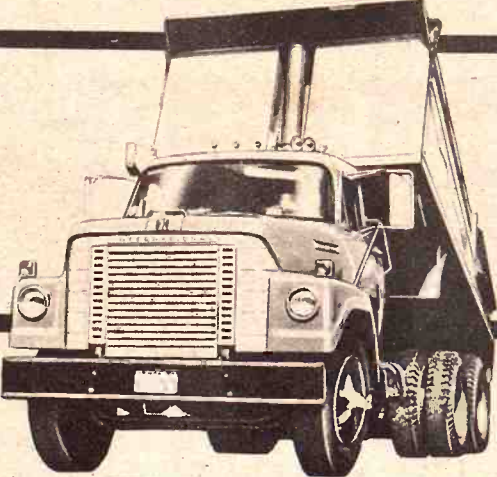

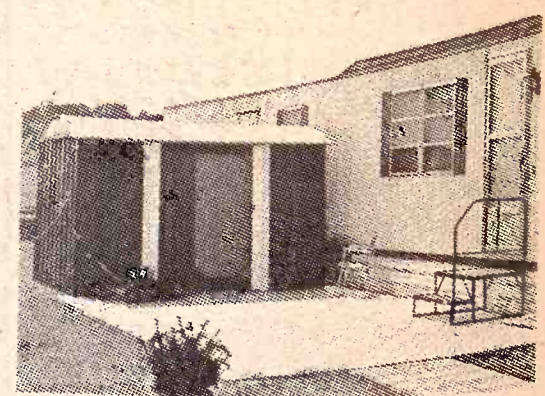

Loss In Delayed Calving Intervals

Kansas State University Extension dairy specialist believes that calving intervals in Kansas dairy herds average more than 30 days too long.

This is a costly situation for Kansas dairymen," maintains Bonewitz. He believes the following checklist will help any dairyman improve reproductive efficiency:

1. Keep records of heat periods, calving and calving dates, difficult births, retained afterbirths, abortions and other health data.

2. Decide when each animal is in best condition and ready to be bred. The heat period nearest to 60 days after freshening is the proper time in most cases.

3. Watch regularly for cows in heat. Many dairymen fail to detect cows in heat.

4. Keep animals to be bred as comfortable as possible. Provide a comfortable pen for cows from the herd with feed and water for all cows in heat. Keep cows away from the herd during heat until they will no longer be ridden by other cows.

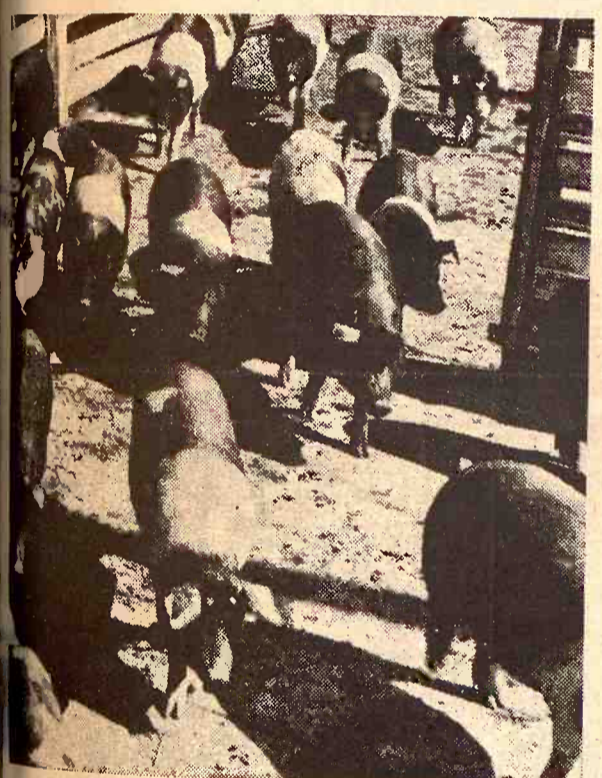
The KSU specialist also believes that dairymen can achieve better breeding efficiency by learning to recognize danger signals.

Some of these danger signals are:

1. An open cow that doesn't show heat periods, an abnormal discharge at any time (Bonewitz says discharges from the vagina should be clear, the only exception being bleeding that occurs just after heat in some cows), heat intervals shorter than 15 days or longer than 28 days, heat intervals of irregular length, prolonged and continuous heat symptoms, cows with more than three services, abortions at any time, and retained afterbirths.

"Any of these signs is an indication of real trouble, although a sign does not necessarily indicate a disease," explains Bonewitz.

"However, infectious diseases are the reason for about half of the cows showing one or more of these symptoms. Even if the symptoms are due to noninfectious causes, rapid action is important to help prevent permanent sterility and minimize financial loss."



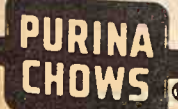

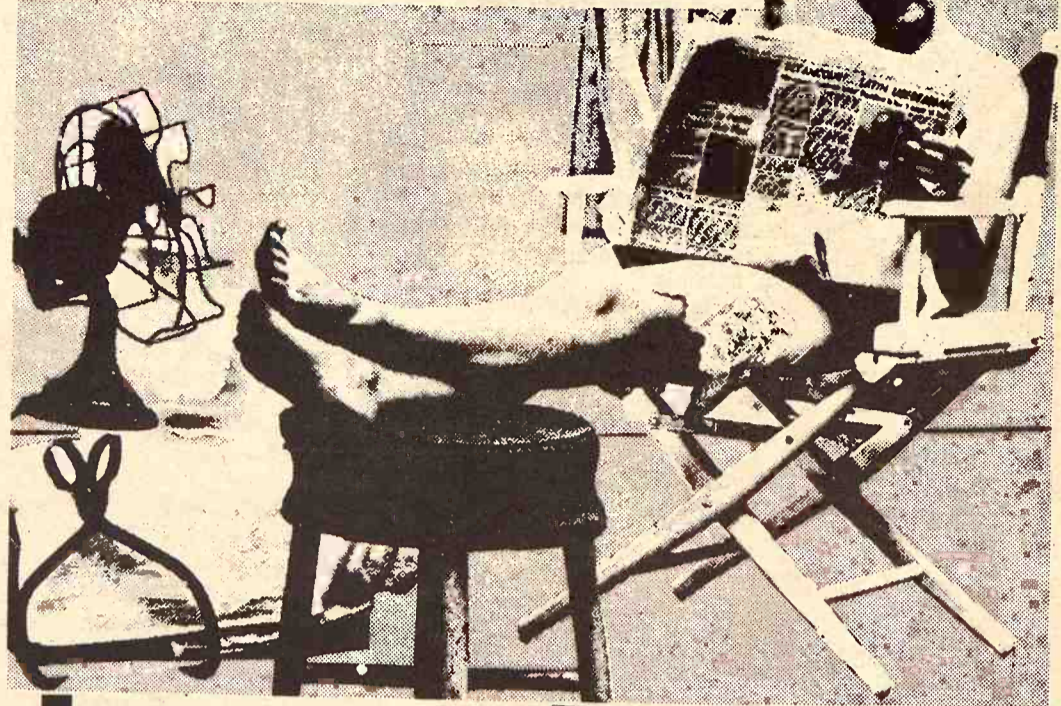

Good Materials From Old Tires, Trash?

Old tires, bottles and plastic ... making bigger dumps ... America can be used instead ... better roads, says a Texas ... University scientist.

The materials may be "solid wastes" to most people, but to Dr. Douglas Bynum they're "wasted solids." And Bynum has some proof of his

belief. He's built test roads out of the junk. In laboratory tests, Bynum has mixed up road topping material using ground-up tires, pulverized

plastics and crushed glass, its edges dulled. He says each of the materials can be valuable in creating superior and more economical roads.

Ground-up tires, he says, can be mixed with asphalt to form a "crack arresting" foundation under most roads or to put a new top on old ones. He says the rubber tire mixture is able to expand and absorb cracks developing from beneath the road. This, he says, prolongs the life of the riding surface by more than 400 per cent.

"Right now," says Bynum, "highway engineers just assume that an asphaltic concrete road will crack. An overlay to cover that crack is planned out even as the net highway is being laid down."

These toppings usually break up quickly, too, says the scientist, because the old cracks migrate upward, shattering the new surface. "Then, they have to go back and do it again, over and over," he says.

Cracks are caused by stress from beneath the road bed. The soil moves, contracts or expands. Since the road is more rigid, the surface cracks.

When L.L. James, the College Station city engineer, heard of Bynum's research, he asked the scientist to help lay the material on a particularly troublesome stretch of residential street.

James said College Station is plagued by unstable soil conditions and streets there were breaking up in less than five years.

"Before this new system came along," says Jones, "we only had one choice — tear up the road and start from scratch. This would have taken 30 to 50 working days, plus putting the street out of service."

Instead, James and Bynum worked together to cover the street with a thin layer of the ground-up tire mixture. This was topped by an ordinary layer of asphaltic concrete.

"We fixed up the streets in three working days," says James, and the results were excellent.

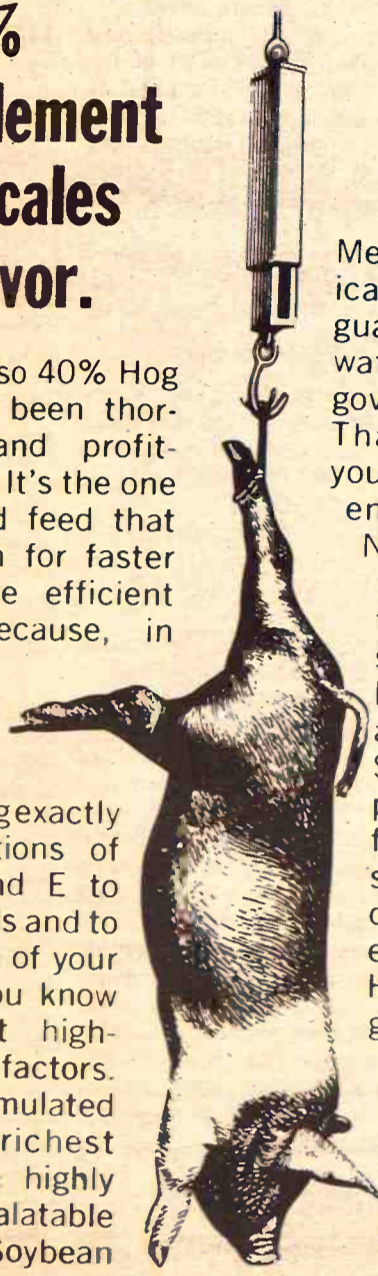
Tires can't be burned because of the noxious smoke, Bynum said, and they can't be buried because they don't decay quickly, and have a way of working back to the surface.

He says 180 million discarded tires — about two million tons of rubber — are being accumulated yearly in the United States. His solution: Grind them up and build roads.

The same idea, he says, will work for bottles and plastics which also pose disposal problems.

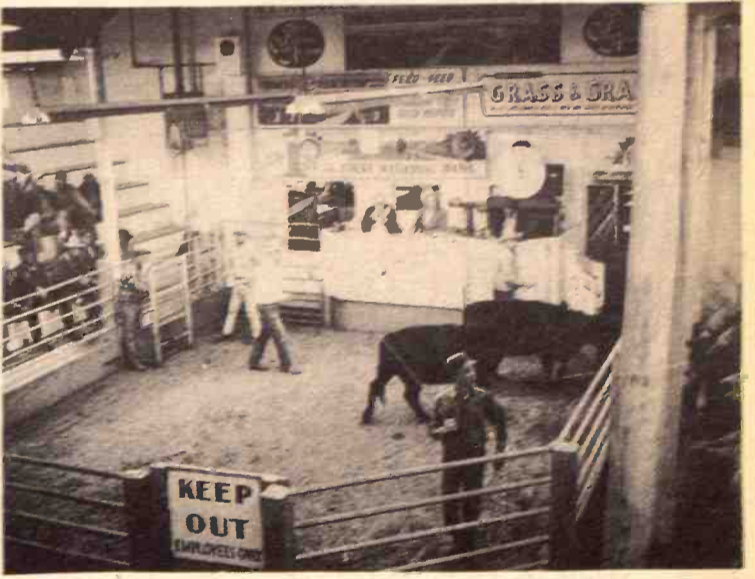

Predator Control Short Of Shotgun Shells

An expert in wildlife damage control believes Kansas farmers and ranchers can stop many livestock losses caused by predators without resorting to violent removal methods.

F. Robert Henderson, Extension wildlife damage control specialist at Kansas State University, is convinced that it's easier to use management practices to keep predators away from livestock than it is to use hunting skills to eliminate attacking predators.

Henderson doesn't attempt to minimize the damage caused by

coyotes. They can seize and kill a lamb in no time, but so can a dog. But few predators can get to a lamb if the landowner has used proper management techniques.

What are these techniques?? In Henderson's opinion they are 1) construction of good fences and 2) keeping lambs in a drylot and providing creep feed, thus reducing the chances of lambs being preyed upon during the daytime in open pastures and at the same time increasing the weight gains of the animals.

Henderson believes Chuck O'Neill,

a sheep producer who lives south of Williamsburg in Franklin county, has the ideal management layout.

O'Neill keeps his sheep in a pen formed by a four-foot high woven-wire fence topped by two strands of barbed wire.

"I've never lost a lamb," says O'Neill, who believes his investment in fences has paid dividends. Several farmers in the area have lost livestock to predators.

What if good management practices fail and livestock losses persist?

"In that case I think a farmer or

rancher should consider removing the predators, preferably with steel traps," says Henderson.

"They should purchase the kind of trap designed for taking coyotes and resulting in the least amount of injury to the trapped animal. If you trap a neighbor's pet dog, you would want to release him."

Another method of control is the use of a cyanide gun, which is lawful only if a permit has been obtained. Henderson emphasizes that a cyanide gun is usually effective only in the winter or during bad weather.

Another method of control — and one that is used often in Kansas — is sport hunting. Six of 10 people who hunt coyotes are farmers or ranchers.

"Coyote hunting is a big and popular winter sport," observes Henderson. "Expenditure of funds to engage in it is large. A recent survey showed the average hunter in Kansas spends \$14 for every coyote bagged. And this is a conservative figure."

Wild dogs may pose a problem to livestock owners. Take Lynn Braden

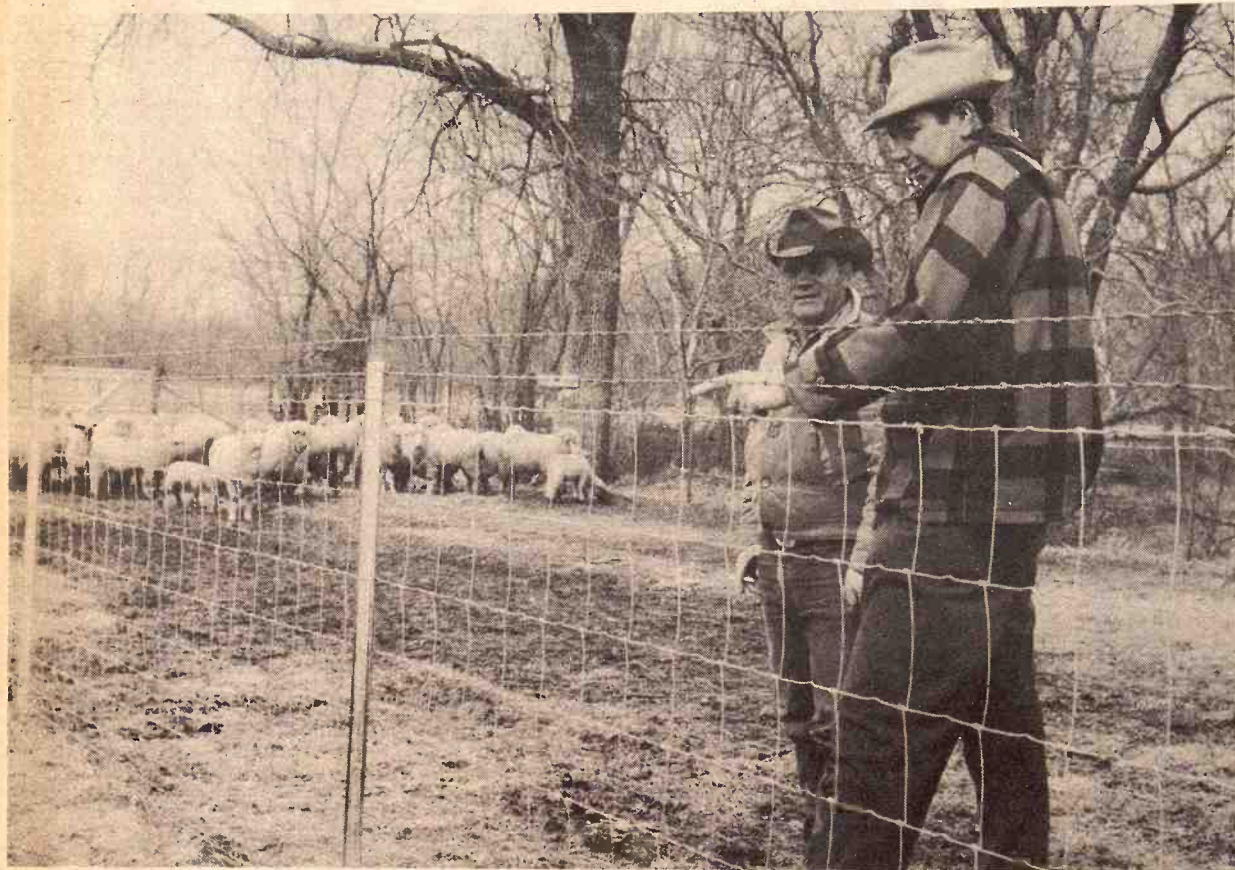
of Eureka, for example. One of his registered calves was badly mauled by dogs. Some of his cows died of exhaustion trying to escape the takers.

A neighbor, John Fox, lost calves to the same pack of wild dogs. "This is what happens when people dump dogs in the country," says Henderson, who has given livestock owners some pointers on trapping the dogs.

"Dogs hole up in an old barn or other dogs, maybe pets, join them. Then, by association, they learn to wild and learn to kill."

Wild dogs often cross with coyotes. "The only thing that keeps dogs from crossing with coyotes is that coyotes come into heat once a year while dogs come in twice annually," Henderson says.

The dogs attacking cattle in the Eureka area weigh about 60 pounds, an indication they may be dog-coyote crosses.

Hill said he became suspicious when Governor Docking recommended \$25,000 more for the KDED for the next fiscal year than the budget director had recommended.

The money did not appear as a line item in the KDED budget but was tucked into separate budgets of five divisions within KDED. Jack Lacy, director of KDED, said the budget procedure had been approved by the budget director.

Hill said if other agencies, such as universities or the Highway Dept. had decided to try the same thing, "We could come back to Topeka next session and discover half a dozen leased airplanes flying around the state."

Kansas leased an airplane for the governor's use in 1967 but later purchased its own executive aircraft. The KDED had \$19,000 in its budget for travel funds in fiscal 1969 and about \$18,000 in 1970. Lacy said the newest automobile the agency has to use is a 1968 model. "A plane reflects better on Kansas than a 1968 state car," he said.

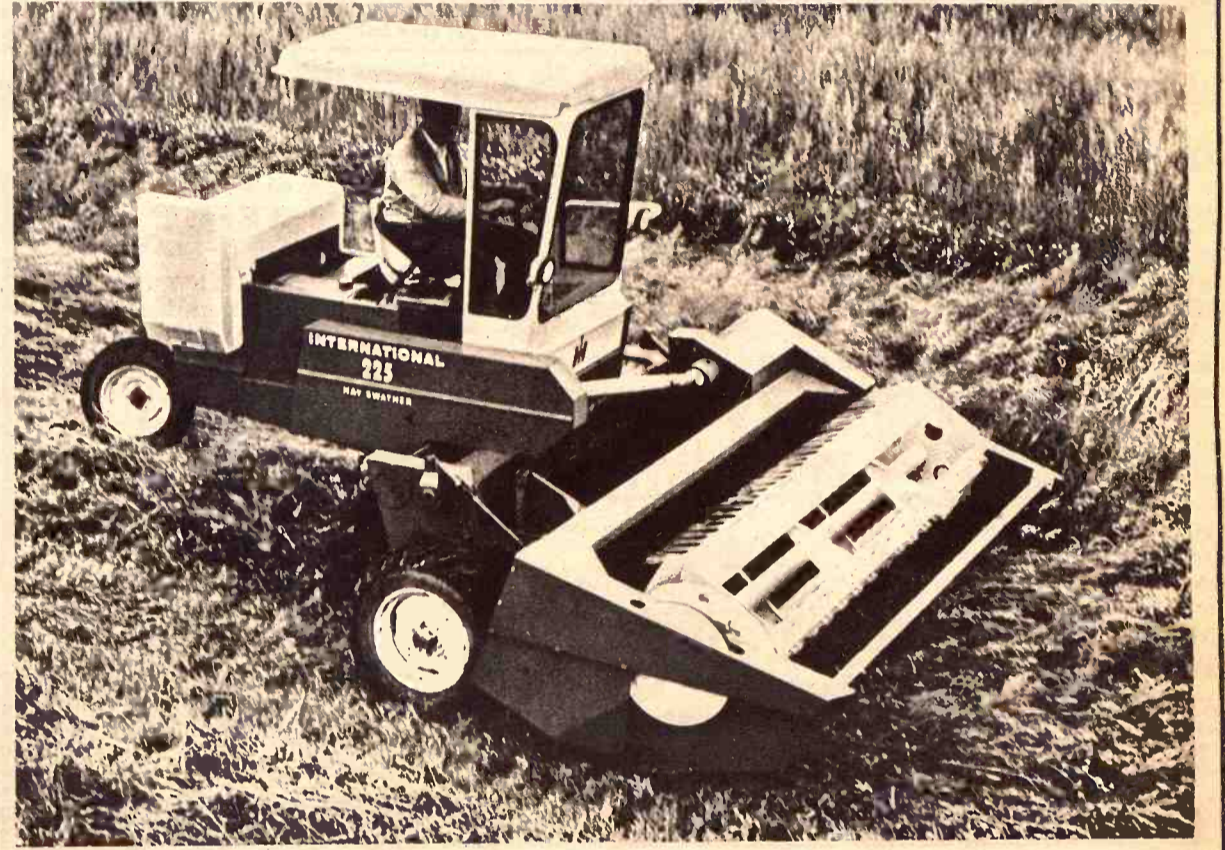

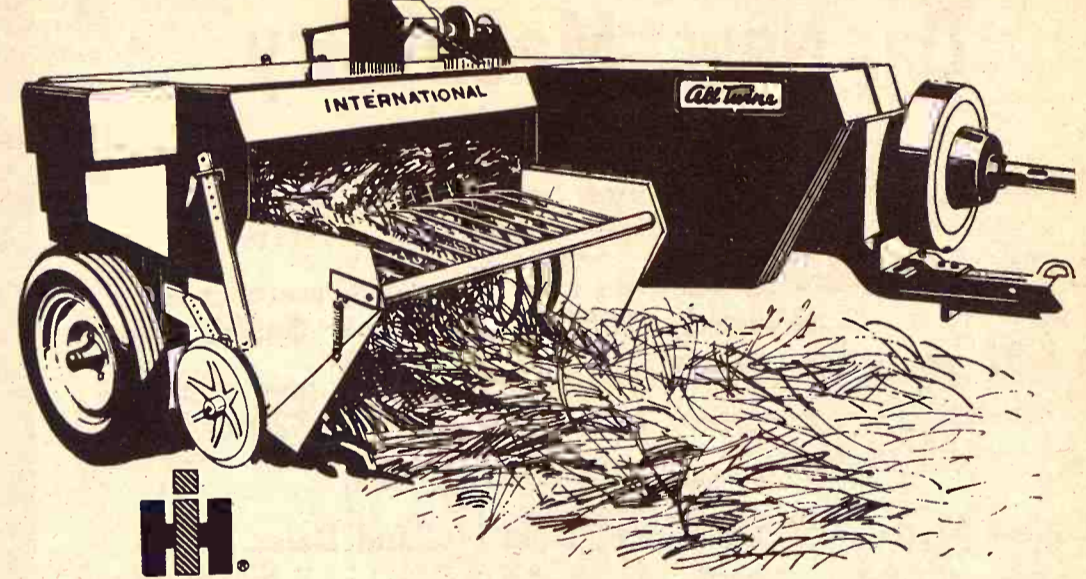

G & G Area In N.Y. Times Story On Farmer Mood

The political fence-mending that President Nixon had in mind with his "salute to agriculture" last week didn't impress many farmers if the nation's press has interpreted things correctly.

And the G&G are used as a listening post for one major newspaper story, by the New York Times writer Drummond Ayres. Ayres, in a story in the Times last week, painted a black mood on the nation's farmers, unhappy with

rising costs and taxes and falling income and land values.

One G&G area farmer interviewed by Ayres was Edwin Dent of Salina. "You borrow more and more but you make less and less and so you go deeper and deeper in debt," said Dent.

The invitations sent out by President Nixon to his miniature fair on the White House grounds apparently didn't impress Dent either. "I hear him but I don't

believe him," the Times quotes Dent.

"I want action, not talk, a decent price for what I raise, not a hand-out. If Nixon can't get it for me, then I say let's get somebody else in the White House. What have we got to lose?"

Ayres wrote that the "decent price" Dent talks about is the basis of nine-tenths of farmer complaints around Salina.

Ayres pointed out that in the 1968 presidential campaign Nixon said even 74 per cent of parity was unacceptable. He promised better.

Currently farm prices are running less than 70 per cent of parity — what the federal government figures is "fair."

One of Dent's neighbors, Cyril Habiger of Bavaria, was included in the Times story. Habiger is quoted: "It's a broken promise. What we need is bigger subsidies to raise parity so we really do get fair value. If we don't get it, Richard Nixon won't get my vote."

"I just don't know how much longer we can keep going. Why only

the other day I read in the paper that prices received by farmers in April were down one per cent but prices paid went up one per cent.

"It's the story of my life. Guess I'll have to go to the bank again."

The Salina Production Credit Association and its president, Donald Myers, are also quoted in the New York story. Wrote Ayres:

"Because of the price-income squeeze, Habiger and most of the three million other farmers in America are constantly in deep debt. More 'perpetual debt' as they say around the Salina Production Credit Association, a farm loan office.

"When you hear a young farmer — and there aren't many — use that phrase, it really hurts," says Don Myers, president of the association.

"Twenty years ago, the average farmer coming in to see Myers during the spring wanted only about \$10,000 for the planting season. More often than not, the loan would be paid off by Christmas.

"Today the average loan is closer to \$25,000. Hardly one in 10 farmers pays it off before planting time rolls around again.

"Everybody is borrowing against their worth in either equipment or land," Myers explained.

Ayres noted recent land value declines — about 5 per cent in Kansas, over 6 per cent in Iowa, and taxes too.

For example, the Times story said Habiger paid about \$350 in taxes on a 180-acre wheat field in 1967. Last year, he paid just under \$700.

The display of farm machinery on the White House grounds didn't impress Democratic national chairman Lawrence O'Brien much either, as might be expected. The president's farm-aid program, said O'Brien, is no more than "pre-1972

political hocus pocus that even fool city slickers — let alone farmers."

Cigaret Ad Ban Hurt TV But Not Tobacco Sales

The ban on radio and television cigarette advertising caused broadcasting companies' earnings to plummet in the 1971 first quarter but left tobacco companies unscathed. All three of the broadcasting companies attributed their lower earnings for the quarter to the ban on cigarette advertising.

American Broadcasting Company said its net income fell to 2.8 million dollars, or 39 cents a share, from 3.2 million dollars, or 63 cents a share, a year earlier. RCA reported net profits declined to 1.5 million dollars, or 30 cents a share, as sales advanced to 908.1 million dollars. In the 1970 first quarter profits were 25.5 million dollars, or 33 cents a share, on sales of 76 million dollars.

Although the company did break down earnings for National Broadcasting Company operations, RCA said the profit of cigarette advertising affected NBC's earnings.

Columbia Broadcasting System Inc. estimated its first-quarter earnings came fell to 6.5 million dollars, or 47 cents a share, on sales of 13.2 million dollars. Its 1970 first-quarter earnings were 13.2 million dollars, or 87 cents a share, on sales of 15.36 million dollars, compared with 15.36 million dollars, or 87 cents a share, a year ago. Sales were 309.73 million dollars last year.

R.J. Reynolds Industries Inc. reported its net income climbed 32.6 per cent to 52.8 million dollars, or 87 cents a share, compared with 39.8 million dollars, or 87 cents a share, a year ago. Sales rose to 610.7 million dollars from 559.6 million dollars. American Brands, Inc., reported a large percentage of its business in tobacco products reported net income advanced 100 per cent to 28.4 million dollars, or 83 cents a share, compared with 22.2 million dollars, or 83 cents a share, a year earlier. Sales increased to 668 million dollars from 668 million dollars.

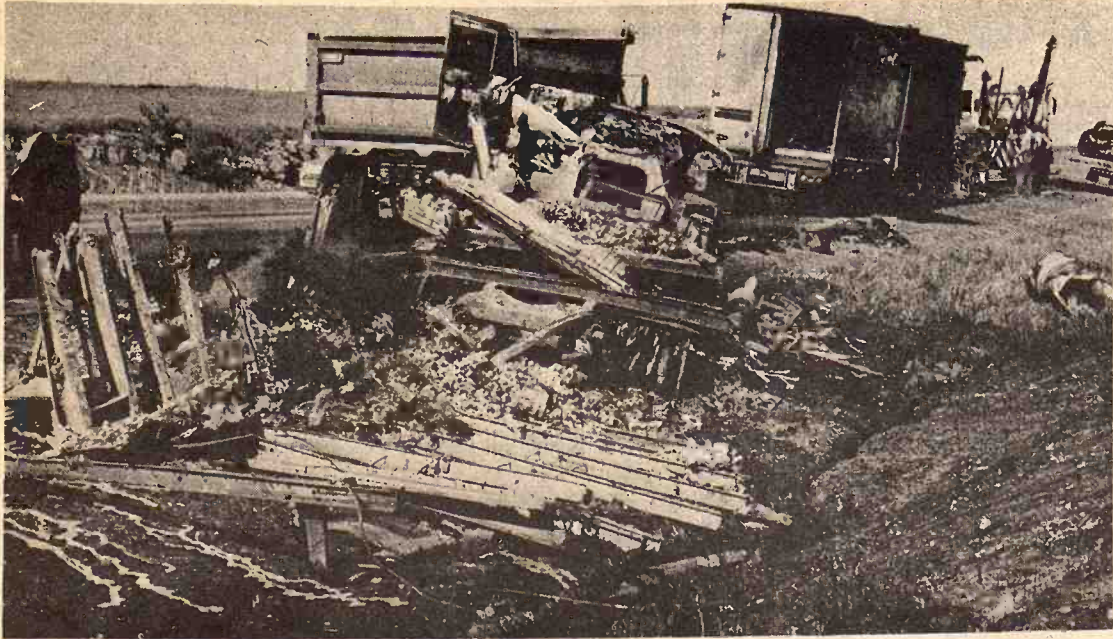

\$47,000 IN PROPERTY DAMAGE ON HIGHWAY

LAWRENCE — A 3-truck accident on the Kansas Turnpike near here resulted in \$47,000 damages but only one minor injury. A passing truck hit another truck from the rear, ripping the fuel tank off one. Another truck hit the fuel tank on the roadway. Result: two of the trucks caught fire. Damages: \$22,000 to one, \$17,000 to another, \$3000 to the third, \$6000 to \$7000 to the turnpike itself. One driver had a cut on his head; there were no other injuries.

It could have been worse. The truck that escaped fire damage reportedly was carrying dynamite.

Aussies Eye World Feed Grain Market

Australia has boosted production of livestock feed grains, particularly sorghums, and is expected to give U.S. farmers much stiffer competition in the lucrative Japanese market, the Agriculture department said.

This analysis, in a weekly report issued by the Foreign Agricultural service, said feed grain plantings jumped following severe drought in Australia in 1967-68. That included barley and oats as well as sorghum grain.

Australian farmers have increased sorghum plantings by 71 per cent for the current crop, to a total of 1.4 million acres, the report said. "Helped by good rains, the 1970-71 crop is likely to reach 1.2 million

tons, more than double last year's half million tons and over five times the yearly average of 1960-64," the F.A.S. said. Feed grains in Australia are not eligible for government price

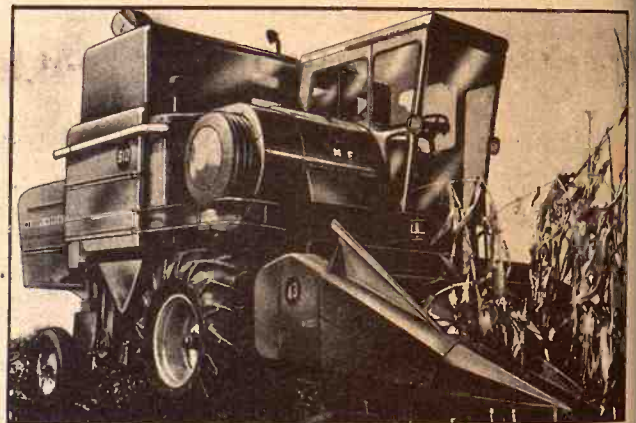

Should Soybean Seed Be Treated?

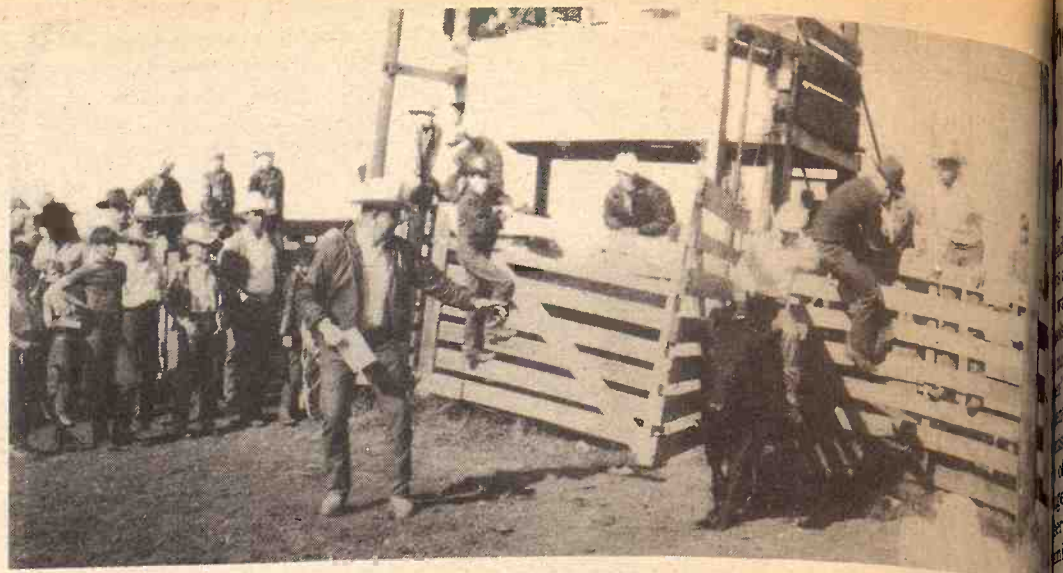
The use of fungicides for treating soybean seed does not give as clear-cut an increase in stand and yield as it does for wheat, corn and sorghum, says a Kansas State University Extension plant pathologist.

Dr. William G. Willis points out that most research shows treatment with captan and thiram will increase stands on seed with poor germination but final yield increases

have not been consistent. "An additional complication in treating soybeans arises when the seed is inoculated with nitrogen-fixing bacteria since fungicides may kill the inoculum," adds Willis.

Soybean seed available for planting generally is germinating poorly. Therefore it may pay Kansas soybean growers this spring to treat with a fungicide.

Willis recommends inoculation of

soybean seed with nitrogen-fixing bacteria each year. If both fungicide and inoculum are used, the fungicide may be applied any time before planting but inoculum should be put on within two hours of planting at double the usual rate to offset the inoculum that may be killed by the seed treatment fungicide.

Mercury containing fungicides should not be used with inoculum.

Captan or thiram have been the most widely-used seed treatment materials. Other fungicides approved for soybeans are chloronil, chloroneb, Maneb, PCNB and zineb.

15-Cent Start On Cities With New Sales Taxes

The State Department of Revenue has tentatively settled on a sales tax bracket structure that retains 15 cents as the first point at which consumers in local sales tax cities such as Topeka must pay the extra amount.

The department also has decided it will return the proceeds from local add-on sales taxes to Topeka, Manhattan and Lawrence on a monthly, rather than a quarterly, basis.

James T. McDonald, state director of revenue, said Topeka could expect to receive its first return from the one-half per cent local sales tax approved by voters April 6 sometime in September.

The tax takes effect July 1, and merchants have until the end of the following month, or August 31, to remit the sales tax they collect to the revenue dept.

Revenue officials said they have made no attempt to estimate the amount of that first return of local sales taxes to Topeka, but commented "it probably will be light" due to the newness of the system.

The department had taken under advisement a request from representatives of merchants that the first bracket be lowered to 14 cents.

"We see no reason to change it," McDonald said. "We'll stick with 15 cents."

Topeka, Manhattan and Lawrence are the three cities affected by the new sales tax brackets. Voters in those cities approved local add-on sales taxes of one-half per cent at their April 6 municipal elections.

McDonald also disclosed his department has made adjustments in the first seven brackets of sales tax that should have the effect of

giving consumers a break.

But even with the adjustments, consumers in Topeka, Manhattan and Lawrence still will have to pay four cents of tax on purchases of \$1. The adjustments make purchases ranging between 94 cents and \$1.20 subject to four cents in sales tax.

McDonald said the adjusted brackets will be sent to representatives of retail merchants who attended a meeting at his office on April 27 for their review and comment.

"We'll try it out on the retailers who attended the meeting," McDonald said. "We've asked them to call, or write in, if they have serious objections."

But the revenue director indicated the new sales tax brackets designed to accommodate local sales taxes have been decided.

"After some further study," he said, "these brackets seemed to represent the ones that are most fair to the consumers and the retailers."

Only Two Buyers For USDA Subsidy List

The Agriculture department says it has sold only two lists showing government payments to large farmers in 1970 but refuses to identify the buyers.

The list, a single copy, was made available to newsmen on April 8. At that time a spokesman said additional copies could be purchased for \$100 each. But the price tag was not exact. The department said in response to a reporter's query that the complete list, a computer print-out, costs \$150 instead of the \$100 price originally quoted. However, if a purchaser has his own computer a coded tape of the list is available for \$75, the spokesman said.

Asked to identify the two buyers, the spokesman refused, adding that they were "agribusiness firms." "I don't think we should identify them without their permission," he said.

The list was made public by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. It shows the names and address of producers who received \$5,000 or more in government payments last year under a variety of programs, including cotton, feed grains and wheat.

The official said one "agribusiness firm" — an appellation used to describe virtually any business associated with farming — paid \$150 for the full print-out and that another, which had its own computer services, spent \$75 for the tape.

Since the mid-1960s the payment list had been published annually by a Senate subcommittee handling Agriculture department appropriations. This year the standing request had not been renewed by the subcommittee and USDA balked on making public the names. This was reversed later, however, after Agriculture Secretary Clifford M.

Hardin came under fire for allegedly trying to cover up the list. The names some 137,000 of them, then were made public.

Agree To Delay Statewide Land Reevaluations

The Kansas Property Valuation Department has agreed to stay implementation of a directive forcing counties to change valuations on agricultural lands.

Ronald F. Dwyer, state property valuation director, in March order

96 counties to raise or lower their valuations on farmland based on a median of land values within nine equalization districts.

Protest against the directives prompted Gov. Robert Docking to ask Atty Gen. Vern Miller to test

validity of the orders.

Miller's office sued on grounds they violated constitutional protection of due process of law for the property owners involved, but lost the case in Shawnee County District Court.

The attorney general's office last week filed notice to appeal that district court ruling by Judge Prager to the Kansas Supreme Court, and Prager signed a stay order delaying his instructions to the Property Valuation Department to proceed with enforcing Dwyer's March order until the high court rules in the case.

Attorneys for both the Property Valuation Department and the attorney general's office appeared before Prager to present the agreement.

The state Supreme Court is not expected to hear the case until September. In the meantime, the directives will not be implemented and counties will not have to make the valuation changes until the high court rules.

Livestock Price Decline Outweighs Grain Hike

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-April 1971 were down slightly from March this year April 15 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products was 255 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 257 in March and in April a year ago.

Prices received for hogs, calves and soybeans decreased moderately from March while prices for beef cattle, milk and oats were down slightly.

Compared with a year ago, prices for hogs and eggs were down considerably, calves were down moderately, but most grain and hay prices were up moderately.

The crop price index was 164 percent at mid-April, 1 point above March this year and 15 points above April 1970.

Wheat at mid-April averaged \$1.31 per bushel, 1 cent above the previous month and 9 cents above the previous year.

Corn was worth \$1.35 per bushel, up 1 cent from a month earlier and 19 cents above a year ago.

Barley price, at 96 cents per bushel, was 1 cent below March this year but 10 cents above April last year.

Sorghum grain was \$2.08 per cwt., 2 cents above a month ago and 34 cents above a year ago.

Soybeans averaged \$2.77 per bushel, compared with \$2.84 in March and \$2.40 the previous year.

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-April was 360 per cent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 365 a month earlier and 381 a year ago. The meat animal price index was 431 per cent in April compared with 438 in March and 458 a year earlier.

Hog prices averaged \$16.00 per cwt., 90 cents below the previous month and \$7.80 below the April last year.

All beef cattle brought \$29.00 per cwt. 40 cents below a month earlier and 10 cents below a year earlier.

The dairy price index was 342 in April compared with 344 in March and 335 a year ago. The preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.75 per cwt. was 5 cents below March 1971 but 20 cents above April 1970.

Eggs averaged 23 cents per dozen, unchanged from the previous month but 4 cents below the previous year.

Prices paid by farmers for supplement and mixed feeds were higher than in April 1970.

United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products

at mid-April was 282 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 2 points from mid-March but up 1 point from April 1970.

Price increases from March were noted for beef cattle, lambs, eggs, wheat, barley and sorghum grain. Prices were lower for hogs, calves, milk, corn and soybeans.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage rates) was 407, up 4 points from mid-March and 18 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in April was 69, down 1 point from March and down 3 points from April 1970.

Rich Kansans Avoid Taxes?

High-income Kansas taxpayers who invest their money wisely may have to pay little or no state income taxes, but a spokesman for the State Revenue Department says he doubts that the situation arises often.

"Undoubtedly there are big taxpayers who do not pay taxes in any given year, but basically, year after year, that can't be true," said Ray Barkley, administrative assistant with the revenue department.

"We start with the federal tax as a base. . . I would doubt very much if they (high-income Kansans) were consistently not paying any income tax," Barkley said.

Revenue Director James McDonald said his department has not studied the matter of possible high-income loopholes because there has "been no big demand" for such a study.

McDonald said Kansas probably has some people "not paying any federal tax because of where they have their money" and that would mean they probably aren't paying any state income taxes, but that the department has not specifically been asked to look into such matters.

He said such a study would cost time and money.

"Unless the loophole is in the federal law — and I should say 'if' there is a loophole because that's a matter of opinion on whether it's a loophole or justifiable — you won't

find it in the Kansas law," Barkley said.

State income taxes are based on federal returns. In addition, state taxpayers can deduct federal income taxes from their returns.

All federal bonds are exempt from state income taxes. So are the Kansas Turnpike Authority bonds, armory bonds and federal civil service and state civil service retirement pay, Barkley said.

If a taxpayer could afford to put all of his money into these bonds, he could escape state taxes.

But Barkley said few "am-nipulations, if you want to call them that" are based on trying to escape state taxes — those seeking a tax shelter look at the big bite, which comes from the federal government.

A state law stipulates that a federal deduction on a state return cannot exceed 80 per cent of the state taxes owned (it used to be 100 per cent, but was changed recently by the Legislature).

Other state studies, including one recently completed in Iowa, show that income taxpayers making from \$10,000 up to \$150,000 pay no state taxes. Studies of the federal income tax structure have shown that taxpayers making more than \$1 million a year have paid no federal taxes.

"Again you've got specific circumstances, and it is hard to judge without them. A guy may operate a pretty good size business and not have any profits to show for it. . . That's overplaying it when you say he didn't have to pay income taxes, Barkley said.

He said a high-income Kansan may pay "no income taxes" one year, and "plenty the next."

Barkley said a corporate tax plan

proposed by Gov. Robert Docking to fund education, welfare and pollution control programs by increasing revenue by \$26 million this year would have, in effect, taken tax money away from the federal government.

Docking proposed that corporations not be allowed to deduct their federal taxes from their state income tax returns at the 1971 session.

Republican leaders refused to consider the plan, saying it would hurt business in Kansas.

Under the Docking plan, which has been adopted in varying forms in 38 other states, the state tax lug would have increased, but the federal tax lug would have decreased.

Corporations with adjusted gross incomes of under \$25,000 a year

would have gotten back from federal returns 22 cents on every new tax dollar sent to the state. Corporations making more than \$25,000 would have gotten back 48 cents on every new tax dollar.

Opponents of the plan said the overall effect still would mean a tax increase for all businesses of about \$16 million to get the \$26 million (roughly \$10 million from the federal government). Proponents said the overall tax bite would be smaller than that.

State income tax rates for

corporations are 4 1/2 per cent on first \$25,000 and 6 3/4 per cent on everything above \$25,000, he said.
