## Computers In Farming Sure To Come

There's little doubt that computers will play a major role in the development of new farm management tools. The question is how fast, and in what manner they will be put into use, a USDA economist said at Kansas State University last

Dr. Buel F. Lampher told a workshop in computer technology at Kansas State University that farmers must consider a growing mountain of data and information in their decision making. Computers can and will assist the farmer in his decision-making process.

We are moving into the age of management in commercial agriculture, Lampher said. This is in contrast to the age of production technology which agriculture has gone through in past decades.

"Continued progress in the productivity of American agriculture will hinge increasingly more on bringing improved

management tools and skills to bear on individual farm operations," he said.

Dr. Ludwig M. Eisgruber, Purdue University economist, suggested that farmers may one day "call up" a computing center for information on current and future prices of hogs and cattle. They may then instruct the computer to solve problems such as: Should I sell these pigs as feeders or feed them out to market weight? Should I hold a lot of feeder cattle for another month or should I sell now?

Eisgruber said that computers which predict the effects of the weather may permit conclusions regarding the time for spring soil preparation, planting, and fertilization.

"Acreage allotments may in the future be measured with remote sensing devices in an aircraft and transmitted to a computer for processing," he said.

"Automated sensing may someday help determine water

needs of plants to set irrigation needs, and meter feed in relation to milk production of individual dairy cows."

"Eisgruber noted that these developments will take time. Adaptation of the computer to farm use has been slow and will continue at a slow pace, he said.

"Computers will not make decisions for the farm manager, but properly used will supply more specific information to help in decision making," he explained.

Trayer predicted that the successful manager will survive in farming with or without computerized record systems. But he can probably do the same job easier and more quickly with computers - he will make fewer mistakes and have more specific information for planning, he added.

Rodger Funk, Garden City farmer, suggested that the computer "might tell us how to squeeze the last bit of profit out of an operation. And it takes the last bit of profit to even stay in business.

"I am hoping that computers may help us tell which parts of the farming operation are carrying the load and which parts can be weeded out or changed."

their entire needs - and about 2 million tons of the purchases come from Manitoba, Canada.

But the British delegation agreed it was open-minded about wheat purchases. There are no legal restrictions or political influences affecting the British habits of buying wheat.

John Fairclough, who represents one of the largest milling firms in England, said the reason more U.S. wheat was not used is because the quality is not constant and it cannot always be obtained.

Tightening of the United States grading system has helped sell U.S. wheat of both the hard red winter and the northern springs, but, Fairclough said, "it is not good enough yet."

He pointed out that the dockage from wheat exported from the United States makes a considerable cost differential. Problems arising from dockage include the necessity for extra cleaning because when there is a maximum-minimum grade

system exporters try to get to the bottom of the grade by blending down.

"Naturally they will blend down. It's a matter of money," said Fairclough.

What wheat the U.S. has been selling to Britain has mostly gone as chicken feed. This is because of an apparent English housewife preference for chickens which are white-fleshed rather than yellow-tinged. Thus, most poultry raisers use wheat rather than yellow corn for feeding.

The visiting millers added English poultry raisers would like to feed milo, but that England has a duty on milo which makes it noncompetitive with wheat.

In their discussions with Kansas grainmen, the visitors said they were in agreement with the minimum world price on wheat set earlier at the Kennedy round of tariff negotiations at Geneva. They said British millers already were paying prices for wheat above the minimums established at Geneva.

Shuman, president of the Farm Bureau, said the farmer-committeemen are authorized by Congress to help administer farm programs and not "to be used for political purposes, nor to create a smoke-screen to divert attention from the disastrous drop in farm income caused by the administration's repeated action to force farm market prices to low levels."

## Slice In Feed Grain Supply Slows Down

It looks as if the stocks of feed grains - corn, sorghum, and the like - are not going to be down as much as experts had earlier predicted.

So, USDA economists are now saying that if crop prospects are good this summer, prices are likely to weaken.

Off to a late start, planting of feed grains got into high gear in late May, and farmers are planting a larger acreage than last year.

Stocks of stored feed grains were reduced less than expected in the past three months, primarily due to a 20 per cent decline in exports. Economists now figure the carryover on October 1 will be around 31-34 million tons. That's 20 to 25 per cent less than a year ago but still more than had been expect-

Corn disappearance in the January-March quarter took a sharp drop, so that total utilization for the first half of the year now is estimated at 2,240 million bushels, 5 per cent below the same period in 1965-66. Domestic disappearance the sec-CIRCULATION ...... 11,108 ond quarter, January-March,

was 833 million bushels, down sharply from the first quarter October-December, when if we 1,141 million bushels.

The figures indicate some ta pering off in the feeding rate the second quarter of this year as compared to a year ago.

Corn Is Down Corn exports the first half of this feeding year, October March, totaled 266 million bush els, about 102 million below the record movement the first half of the 1965-66 year.

The USDA's estimate for com exports for the current year i around 500 milion bushels, which would compare with the record 687 million bushels 1966-67. Domestic consumption is now expected to be at around 3.7 billion bushels, which would be about the same as the pre vious feeding year.

If these estimates turn out be correct, then the corn carry over as of October 1 will around 700 million bushels which would be less than la year, yet considerably above the 440 million bushels predicted late as February.

In contrast to corn, mile will zation was up the second qua ter of this year as compared the first quarter. Total dis pearance the first half of this year was 582 million bushels 68 million bushels more than the same period a year ago. Do mestic use was up 13 per ce in the half year and exports were up 14 per cent, but the largest part of this increase came in the first quarter,

For the whole year, domesti consumption is expected to a ceed last year's total of 582 ml lion bushels by 8 to 10 per cent while exports will be just a little over the 1966-67 figure. In the case, the carryover on October will be about 200 million bush els, just about half the quantity on hand October 1, 1966.

Sum It Up The USDA economists sun marize their analysis on fe grains by saying that during the remainder of this marketing year, prices will be influence to a considerable extent by prospects on the 1967 crops They expect prices to be mon stable because of stocks on hand that are larger than

pected. While actually total stocks of hand as of April 1 this year were less than a year ago, the were larger than had been e pected and also nearly all the reduction, as compared to a year ago, has been in govern ment-owned supplies.

"Free stocks" as of April were about 13 per cent large than a year ago and appear large enough, the USDA SATI to take care of expected domes tic and export requirements. Therefore the conclusion:

"With an average growing season this year, these lat 'free' supplies would tend to like it any seasonal rise in pri this spring and summer.

## Here's June Price Forecast

Egg prices, which have been in a downward spiral for several weeks, have apparently hit the bottom of the barrel, say Kansas State University economists in their monthly Market Forecast report.

They see eggs holding steady in June as producers reduce laying flocks. Hot weather will also help hold produc-

The situation for other commodities is as follows:

**SLAUGHTER STEERS & HEIFERS** - Steady to Slightly Higher. The wholesale meat market will improve, but continued heavy receipts figure to prevent a major price advance.

HOGS - Steady to Slightly Higher, Increased receipts and decrease in demand for pork will dampen prices.

CORN, SORGHUMS & SOYBEAN

MEAL — Steady. Prices will remain stable as the feeding season ends.

FEEDER CATTLE - Steady. The upsurge in demand for grass cattle has passed. Feeding losses on fat cattle during the past few months will have buyers pessimistic.

WHEAT & SOYBEANS — Steady to Lower. New crop period is approach-

LAMBS - Steady to Lower. Decrease in seasonal demand and quantity will hurt prices.

GRADE A & MANUFACTURING MILK - Slightly lower. Sharp seasonal increase in production and lower Class I utilization will weaken prices.

HAY - Lower. New crop is com-

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#### Lowest Surplus Cost Since '53

The government's investment in farm surpluses has dipped to the lowest level since September, 1953.

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The amount, as reported by year. the Agriculture department, was \$3.95 billion on March 31. This compared with \$6.36 billion a year earlier. At times in the past the investment exceeded 9 billion dollars.

But the outlay of the department's price supporting agency — the Commodity Credit corporation — is running at a record high level. Its losses for the first nine months of the fiscal year ending June 30 was \$3.28 billion compared with \$2.31 bilion in the like period last

This increase in losses reflects a larger volume of payments made to farmers for complying with programs designed to prevent overproduc-

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



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

DATE COFFEE CAKE

1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla

1 egg

11/2 cups sifted flour

/2 teaspoon salt 11/2 teaspoons baking powder

½ cup milk

Thoroughly cream shortening, sugar and vanilla. Add egg, beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Spread half of batter in a greased 8 or 9-inch baking pan. Cover with Date Filling, add remaining batter. Bake in 350-degree oven for 45 minutes. DATE FILLING

many producers struggling to show a profit.

High egg prices and profit margins brought an increase in the number of laying hens a year ago. This resulted in an expansion in egg production which was greater than the increase in consumption. So prices dropped to a low level.

As low egg prices continue, producers will sell off the older hens from their flocks. A 20 percent reduction in laying hens will help increase egg prices toward more profitable levels.

More pullets are available for replacing laying hens than in years past. This will help hold egg prices at a low level during the next several months. Any increase in the number of new layers will help prolong the recovery period for egg prices.

There is a market for more eggs in Kansas. But development of the industry must be done gradually over a long period of time. The time has passed when an egg producer can build a unit, put in pullets, and then find a market. In fact, this type of management has contributed to some of the current price problems. The poultry industry could not stand the prosperity of 1966, so egg production was overexpanded, the products undersold, and the industry is struggling to maintain itself.

#### Feed Grain Land **Diversion Cut To** 21 Million Acres

Farmers have signed up to divert about 21.5 million acres of corn and grain sorghums to soil-conserving uses this year.

This is well below the 36.2 million acres signed for diversion in 1966, which included nearly four million acres diverted from barley.

While the number of farms signed up for participation in the program was about the same as in 1966, the diversion per farm was much lower.

The lower diversion this year resulted from the change in the program which eliminated voluntary acreage diversion for payment, except on small farms. Barley also was eliminated from the 1967 program.



The auction, gripped by a fantasy atmosphere, drew an estimated 19,000 persons, some of them hard-headed businessmen looking for investments and others hunting a conversation piece for the living room.

The businessmen paid sound prices for land, cattle, cars and the like. The souvenir hunters went wild, paying fabulous pri-

Half Claims Paid The 18-hour sale brought an

estimated \$500,000 to the creditors of the family noted for its quick financial rise and wild spending habits.

This is about half the official claims by banks, retail stores and service firms.

Outside the bankruptcy action is about \$1.94 million loaned by the Poor Sisters of St. Francis of Mishawaka, Ind.

Francis Jones, a South Bend, Ind., lawyer for the religious order, said it "would take no steps whatsoever" to recover the money, saying "The sisters said they feel the Medders acted in good faith."



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
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

The first group will go on feed July 1 and another will be started August 1. Breeders should have at least three head by one bull.



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




# More Help Than Hinder To Tariff

The recent international agreement to reduce tariffs has brought on much discussion and many questions. We have been asked for information about the agreements. Farmers, for example, have asked how they will gain or lose from the tariff cuts.

Tariffs are similar to sales taxes, but tariffs apply only to products being shipped into a country. Tariffs are sometimes called duties. The government of the country that receives the product sets the tariff rates and collects the money. The importing dealer pays the tariffs, then adds corresponding amounts to his selling prices. The tariff charges are included in the prices that the users of imported products must pay.

Sales taxes usually are the some rate, say 4 percent, for every product. But tariffs vary widely. Many items are admitted free. Some rates are so much a pound, others are prescribed percentages of value.

For example, agricultural implements and breeding cattle are free. The rate on frozen beef is 3 cents a pound, while the rate for canned beef is 15 percent. More than 100 different rates apply to steel of various grades, sizes, and shapes. In all, we have more than 15,000 different classes of products for which tariff rates are specified. Most other nations have equally complex systems of import duties.

Before about 1933, Congress set each of the thousands of different rates. Now, most rates are established by an international trade agreement known as the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT).

Five years ago, the late President Kennedy signed the Trade Expansion Act of 1962. This Act provided authority for the United States to negotiate with other nations to reduce or increase tariffs. With this authority, the United States has been conducting "Kennedy Round" negotiations with the other members of GATT. On May 15, representatives of the various nations reached an agreement.

The agreement is expected to affect about one-third of the \$50-billion annual U.S. exportimport trade. The tariff reductions by the United States and the other nations will be made gradually over the next five years; so there will be no sud-

#### Less Land Lending In Early 1967

The volume of farm mortgage lending declined sharply in the first quarter of 1967, according to data furnished by life insurance companies, federal land banks, and the Farmers Home Administration.

New farm mortgage loans made by the three lending groups amounted to \$447 million in the first quarter of this year. This was 30 percent below the volume during the like period of 1966.

Lending by the reporting life insurance companies was at the lowest first quarter level since 1963 and by land banks the lowest since 1965. Interest rates on new farm mortgage loans have been higher than in 1966.

from current annual levels of \$7 billion. Mr. Newsom called the final package "the greatest collection of trade expansion agreements ever assembled."

The National Farmers Union said the tariff cuts would prove "helpful" to American agriculture and praised the separate agreement on world grain prices as "providing substantial guarantees against low prices." The grain agreement would raise the minimum price of hard red winter wheat on the

world market to \$1.73 a bushel from the current floor price of \$1.50 a bushel. Tony T. Dechant, president of the Farmers Union, said the union would have preferred a 40-cent increase in the floor price for wheat, but added that the union "supports the compromise in the belief that it is a step forward promoting international trade and strengthening the domestic wheat mar-

The American Farm Bureau Federation complained that the U. S. "wasn't successful in obtaining meaningful concessions" on major agricultural products now hampered in export by variable duties levied on them by Common Market nations. These products include wheat, feed grains, rice, red meats, dairy products, and some fruits, the Farm Bureau said. The bureau added that "significant increases in industrial imports" would benefit farmers and ranchers by reducing their equipment

Although few details of what agricultural products will be affected by the new agreements have been announced, the Farm Bureau said reductions averaging 25% have been agreed on for such U. S. exports at tallow, tobacco, soybeans, turkeys and certain fruits and vegetables.

The Farm Journal, an independent trade magazine published in Washington, denounced the trade agreement in its June issue and warned that tariffs levied on U. S. exports by Common Market nations would go up, not down, as a result of the Geneva accord. In an editorial, the magazine said the na-

tion's farmers "were abandoned by their government in GeneMay 30, 1967




