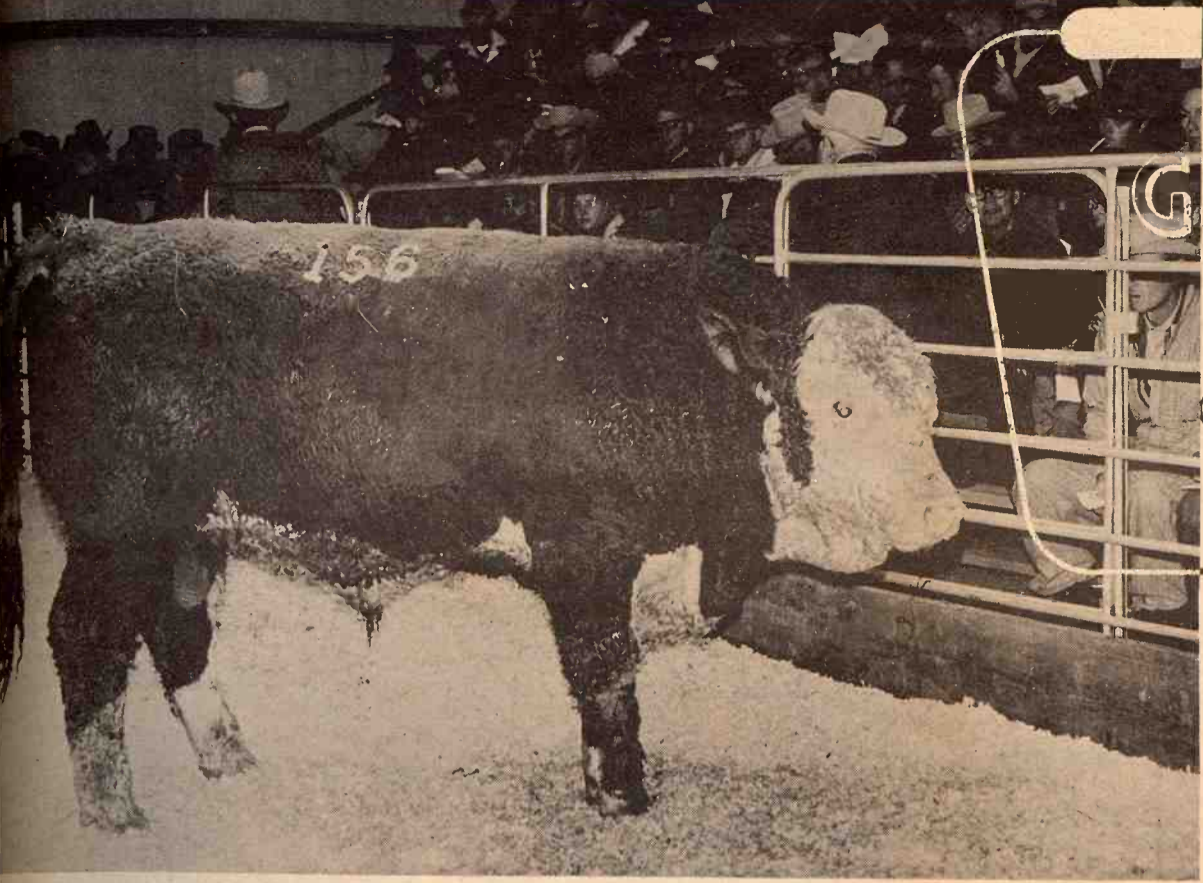

Kansas Bull Test Sale Averages \$761

Eighty-four performance tested bulls crossed the auction block in Beloit recently, as buyers from three states paid an average of \$761 for the prized animals.

The sale culminated a 140-day test period for 175 bulls entered in the Kansas Central Bull Test Station program.

Herman Westmeyer, Extension livestock specialist from Kansas State University, said most of the bulls went to buyers in Kansas, with only four going to Nebraska and Missouri.

"These bulls brought a good price, and I'm sure they will prove their worth in herds across the state," Westmeyer predicted.

The bull bringing top dollar was a Simmental owned by Hills Inc. of Mankato. It had a 365-day weight of 1,258 pounds, an average daily gain on test of 4.62 pounds, and a weight per day of age of 3.44 pounds. It was purchased for \$1,525 by Lloyd Baughman of Langton.

The second high seller was a Charolais owned by Blue River Hills Charolais of Manhattan, and it sold to Merle Johnson of Brookville. It had a 365-day weight of 1,117 pounds, daily gain on test of 3.83 pounds, and a weight per day of age of 3.06 pounds. It sold for \$1,375.

The third highest amount (\$1,300) was also paid by Johnson for a Charolais, again owned by Blue River Hills Charolais. It had a 365-day weight of 1,085 pounds, daily gain on test of 3.71 pounds, and a weight per day of age of 2.97 pounds.

This was the third sale in the brief history of the test station. The fall 1972 test got underway last month with a record 300 bulls entered. The next auction will be April 23, 1973.

The test station is jointly sponsored by the Kansas Livestock Association and the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service.

Ag Hall Of Fame Transfer To National Park Service Hits Snag

The Wyandotte County Park Board and the National Park Service have reached in negotiations for land near the Agricultural Hall of Fame near Bonner Springs and National Center in western Wyandotte County.

The agricultural hall, presently plagued with money problems, is seeking to become part of the National Park Service system so that it can boost attendance and complete now delayed expansion plans.

J. Allan Taylor, chairman of the Wyandotte County Board, said the board has decided to refuse to donate 35 acres of land requested by the National Park Service in connection with its proposed takeover of the hall.

Taylor said the park service made the request for land directly east of the present hall complex. He said the park service wanted to construct a parking lot on the land. The request was made in a letter received Oct. 19.

Taylor said the board denied the request and said it was unnecessary at this time. He said there was land already owned by the agricultural hall available for a larger parking lot. Taylor said the park property requested has on it a shelter house and tennis courts that would have to be torn down to construct the parking lot.

However the board would not object to releasing control of about 15 acres near K-7 highway, also requested by the park service, Taylor said.

Both Taylor and Mrs. Doris Enright, agricultural hall director, said they believed the action to deny the one request would have no effect on the park service's plans to take over operation of the park.

Earlier this year, Sen. James B.

Pearson, (R-Kan.) introduced a bill in the Senate to have the park placed under the control of the National Park Service. A similar bill was introduced into the House by Kansas representatives.

Mrs. Enright said she has received no official word on congressional action on the proposal but believed it would be coming soon. She feels sure the proposal will receive approval.

The park service's original plan included a parking lot on the 35 acres, which was included in the proposal now before Congress, Mrs. Enright said. She said now that the request for the land had been denied the park service would have to change its plans.

Before its present money problems the hall's original plans called for construction of 10 buildings honoring agricultural leaders. There are presently two buildings constructed. Mrs. Enright said she hopes the original plan will be completed if the park service takes over the operation.

One of the buildings now houses

State Law Lets Drunks Back On Highway

Little-publicized 1970 law is bringing three of every four drunks to return to Kansas highways with little more than a slap on the wrist. The law was rushed through with a debate in the closing hours of the 1970 Legislature. It gives judges the option of suspending a driver's license on conviction of driving while intoxicated. Previously, a conviction carried a mandatory license suspension. Figures compiled by the Kansas Motor Vehicle Department tell the story of what the law has done. In 1970, 3,069 Kansas drivers lost their licenses for convictions of DWI. But with the law changed in 1971, only 1,224 licenses were suspended for drunken driving, though DWI convictions soared to 11,000.

During the first six months of 1972, McCammett said, there were 84 fatal accidents involving persons who had been drinking. "Only eight years ago we wouldn't have that many in an entire year," he said. McCammett blames the law change and lenient judges for a situation he describes as "terrible." "These judges must realize that people have to be taught to respect traffic laws like any other laws. What they're doing with drivers convicted of DWI is a joke." Ironically, Kansas law was loosened at a time when other states were adding teeth to their DWI laws. Only a handful of states, perhaps six or seven, have no mandatory license suspension for DWI convictions, McCammett said. Oregon is an example, he said. That state has approximately the same number of drivers as Kansas. During the first nine months of 1972 Oregon suspended 8,041 driver's licenses for driving under the influence of alcohol. During the same period, McCammett said, Kansas suspended 1,649. Another critic of the law is Clarence McKay, a former highway

patrolman and director of driver control for the vehicle department. McKay pointed out that prior to 1970 his department was required to automatically suspend a driver's license the minute it received word a driver was convicted of DWI. Now, only a traffic judge can suspend a driver's license. The figures show that happens only one time in four. "I liked the old law," he said. The Motor Vehicle Department can suspend a driver's license under several conditions. Suspension comes if a driver is convicted of three moving violations in a year. And after several DWI convictions the department can suspend a license under habitual violator provisions of the law. The law gives judges wide latitude in handing out penalties for first-time DWI violators. Maximum fine is a year in jail, a \$500 fine and suspension of the driver's license. But often only a minimum fine is assessed, McCammett said. For a second DWI conviction the law provides a mandatory 90-day jail sentence, but the judge still can decide whether to suspend a license. Sen. Robert Story, R-Topeka, chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee, said the mandatory suspension provision was removed in 1970 in a compromise to ensure passage of a bill lowering legal drunk driving limits from .15 per cent alcohol in a driver's blood to .10. "We thought mandatory suspension with that lowered blood alcohol content would be too harsh," Story said. He added there are no plans in the 1973 session to reinstate the mandatory suspension provisions. Federal officials have sharply criticized Kansas for having no uniform traffic court procedure. District courts in Kansas operate under uniform guidelines, McCammett pointed out. Lower courts, the ones most often handling driving violations, do not. Thus it's possible for sentences to vary widely from one court to another. McCammett suspects the total number of DWI convictions tells only part of the story of how judges are handling drunk drivers. For example, he said, there are no figures showing how often a drunk driving charge is reduced to a lesser

charge, such as reckless driving. "I think that's happening all too often in Kansas," McCammett said. "Most judges are simply too lenient. Not all, but most." "When a person takes a gun and shoots someone people become outraged and the guy is branded as a murderer," he said. "But when he gets drunk and kills someone with a car we just shrug." "No reasoning person wants 4,000 pounds of steel aimed at him by a drunk driver."

Kansas farmers because of the volume of grain produced in this state. For varieties released prior to 1970, a grower may recertify the certified class of seed as long as it complies with both field and seed standards.

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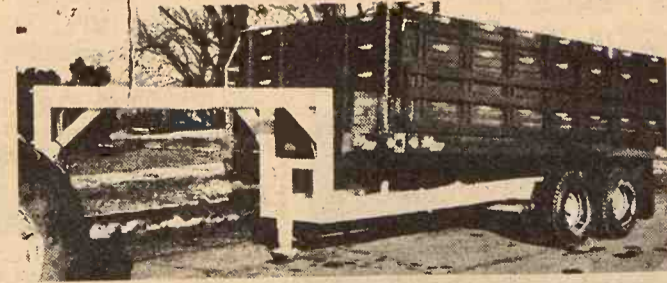
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Farm Expenses Inch To All-Time High In November

Farmers got record high prices for their products in November—but their expenses also inched up to an all-time high.

The farm price of wheat was up and beef was down but the over-all prices farmers received advanced one per cent. Expenses also in-

creased one per cent.

Prices had increased one per cent in October after holding steady in September.

The Agriculture Department reported that wheat prices, high because of large sales to the Soviet Union, averaged \$1.97 per bushel in November as compared with \$1.89 in October and \$1.31 a year ago. But the increase of eight cents a bushel over October was only half the increase made in each of the three previous months. The November price was the highest for any month since February 1964 when wheat brought

\$1.99.

Beef dropped \$1.40 to average \$32.80 per hundred pounds of live weight in November, compared with \$34.20 in October and a record high of \$34.60 in July. A year ago, the price was \$29.90.

Calf prices averaged \$46.80 per hundredweight in November after hitting a record high of \$47.10 in October.

Hogs declined 70 cents to average \$26.80 per hundredweight as against \$27.50 in October and \$18.80 a year ago.

Rice hit another record high of \$7.40 per hundredweight as compared with \$6.72 in October and \$5.24 a year ago.

Corn averaged \$1.20 per bushel against \$1.19 in October and .97 cents a year ago.

The department's Crop Reporting Board said higher prices for eggs, lettuce, tomatoes, cotton, milk, soybeans and wheat contributed most to the over-all increase in farm prices. Partially offsetting were lower prices for cattle, grapefruit, oranges and hogs.

Higher prices for feed, food, motor vehicles, motor supplies, and building materials contributed to the rise in farmers' expenses, the report

said.

It said that a comparison of farm product prices and costs expressed as a "parity ratio" based on a 1910-14 formula, was 75 per cent in November, the same as in September and October. Theoretically, under the parity guideline, farm expenses and prices are in balance when the indicator is at 100 per cent.

A more recent measure, using 1967 as a base, showed a ratio of 100 in October and September and 94 a year earlier.

Prices farmers received averaged 130 per cent of their 1967 bases and expenses 130 per cent, compared with 129 for each in October.

Butz Forecasts Cut In Federal Farm Subsidies

Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz said an increasingly urban Congress and improved market conditions may combine to reduce federal farm subsidies by more than \$500 million in the next farm bill.

"We'll get some farm legislation," Butz said. "Not to have it would be

unthinkable. But it will be a government cost that at present should allow the payments to be compared by "at least \$500 million" weakening of agriculture's position in Congress will be another weighing in favor of a cut in subsidies.

"We're going to have to have some kind of program that is not as costly than at present," said Butz. He said the last farm bill enacted by Congress set annual payments to farmers at \$4 billion.

Butz said the cotton market improved this year by \$100 million and foreign grain sales has increased wheat sales by \$200 million. He said that would be reflected in farm subsidies approved by Congress.

The official said that 41 House members who voted for the last farm bill will not be in Congress when it takes up the next agricultural legislation.

Rural states continued to make representations while urban areas gain, he said. "California probably has five members and they were in the farming areas," he said. "They were in San Diego, Los Angeles, and San Francisco."

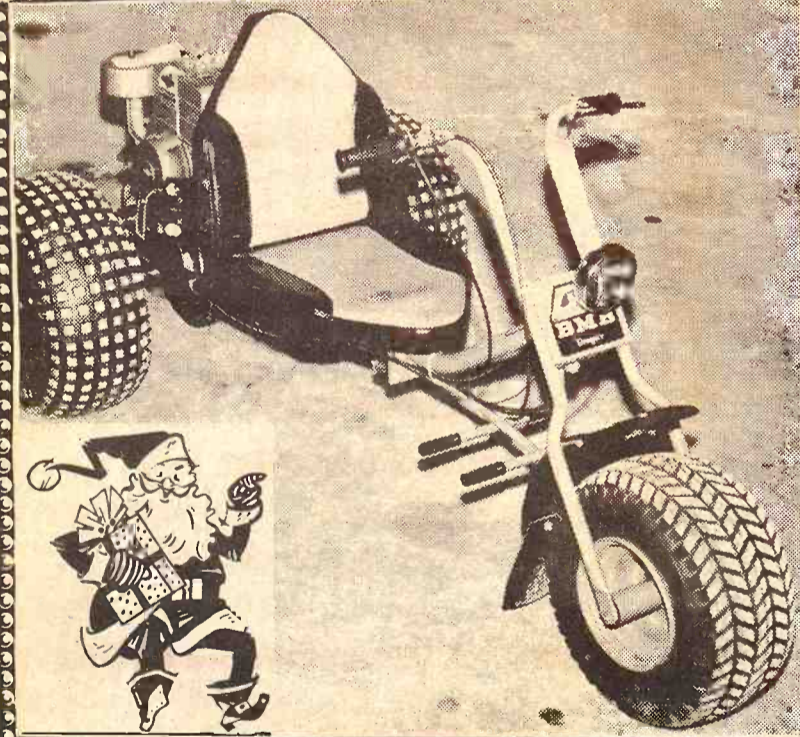

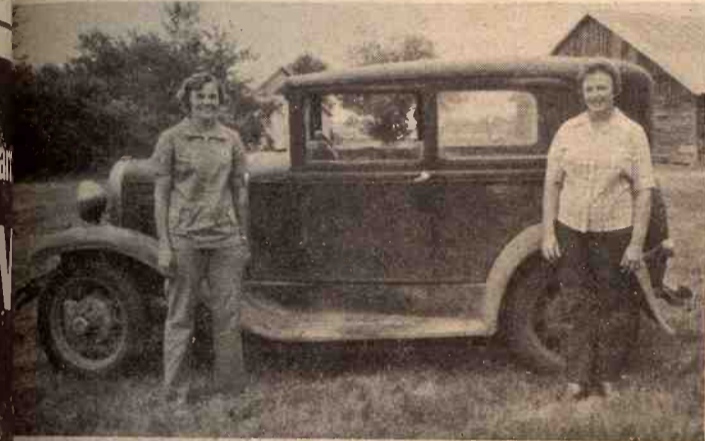

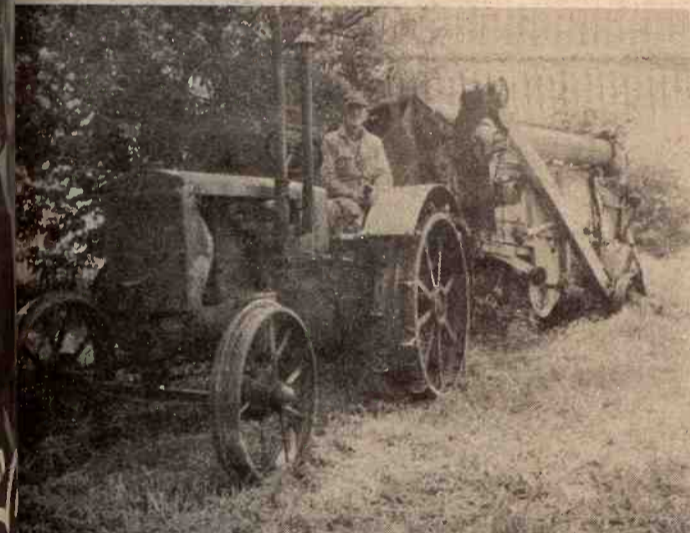

Weed Control Program Could Save Tillage Time

If a farmer can keep weeds—and specifically velvetleaf, venice mallow, and prickly sida—out of soybean fields for 20 days after planting, his yields should be almost as good as though the fields were weed free. And he won't have to worry about the weeds the rest of the summer.

Dr. Benny J. Eaton of Kansas State University's department of

agronomy explained that weeds grown after 20 days affect yields very little.

In tests conducted the summers of 1969 and 1970 at the KSU Ashland Agronomy Farm Eaton found weeds planted in soybean rows, between the rows, and in and between the rows did not affect the soybean yields significantly if the weeds were planted 20 days after the soybeans were planted.

Weeds planted with the soybeans or ten days after the soybeans were planted did decrease yields.

While the three weeds Eaton worked with are not yet common in Kansas he warned that they would

become common because herbicides now being used don't affect these weeds to any great extent.

Eaton said rotary hoeing and cultivating are the most economical ways of ridding fields of weeds, but these methods get rid only of the weeds between the rows—not those in the row itself.

The K-State agronomist found velvetleaf hurt soybean yields more than either venice mallow or prickly sida. Eaton said this probably was because velvetleaf is taller with larger leaves.

"This makes the soybeans compete with velvetleaf not only for food and water, but also for sunlight."

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ECONOMIC STUDY SHOWS

Educational Costs Vary Across Kansas

MANHATTAN— Per-pupil educational costs in 1970-1971 were more than three times higher in Mullinville School District 424, Kiowa County, than in Lyndon School District 421, Osage County.

Four counties—Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte—accounted for more than 40 per cent of the half million students enrolled in Kansas elementary and secondary schools in 1970-1971.

School enrollments in 1970-1971 varied from 83 students in Edson School District 485, Sherman County, to 63,492 students in Wichita School District 259, Sedgwick County.

These figures from a Kansas State University study point out the task facing the Kansas Legislature next session when it tackles the job of equalizing the financial burden for educating the state's youth.

The study shows that average cost per pupil declines as enrollment goes up, say Frank Orazem, K-State economist who directed the study, and his research assistants, Donald C. Hines and John R. Janssen, both of Manhattan.

lowest—\$517—in Lyndon School District 421, Osage County, and Wathena School District 406, Doniphan County.

Other districts with low per-pupil costs were Eudora School District 491, Douglas County, \$541; Galena School District 499, Cherokee County, \$543; and Mulvane School District 263, Sedgwick County, \$545.

At the other extreme, costs averaged \$1,754 per pupil in Mullinville School District 424, Kiowa County. Other high-cost districts were Edson School District 485, Sherman County, \$1,666; Moscow School District 209, Stevens County, \$1,664; Kendall School District 478, Hamilton County, \$1,567; and Utica School District 301, Ness County, \$1,494.

On a county basis, per-pupil costs were lowest in Cowley County, \$374; followed by Geary County, \$490; Crawford County, \$519; Wyandotte County, \$523; and Saline County, \$532.

Counties with the highest costs were Kiowa County, \$1,129; Comanche County, \$1,078; Chase County, \$1,077; Stevens County, \$1,070; and Ness County, \$1,069.

"Designing a formula that will equalize educational costs will not be an easy task," Orazem says. "Simply equalizing expenditures

per pupil will not do the job. Costs of providing an equal education for students in the city likely will vary from those in a rich suburb or a sparsely populated rural area.

"Any plan designed to provide financial equalization among school

districts must take into account variations in cost per pupil resulting from different size schools or school districts."

Instructional costs, which include teacher salaries and library and audio-visual expenses, make up

about 74 per cent of the cost of education, the economist says. Administration accounts for about 10 per cent, plant operation 3 per cent, transportation 4 per cent, general maintenance 3 per cent, food charges 2 per cent, food services 1 per cent, and other costs about 3 per cent.

Sparsely populated counties have higher per-pupil costs in nearly all these categories than the more

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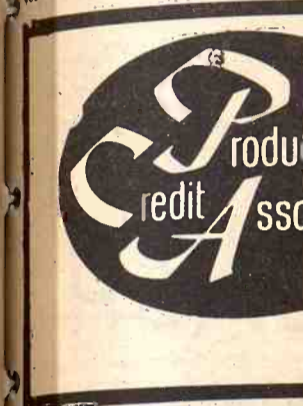

densely populated counties, Orazem says. For comparison, the study grouped counties by the extent they are rural or urban. Per-pupil costs varied from \$878 for the "most rural" counties (average enrollment 183) to \$573 for the "most urban" counties (average enrollment 1,823). Density of students affects per-pupil transportation costs. The "most rural" counties spent about \$120 on transportation, or about four times more than the "most urban" counties. Per pupil transportation costs were highest in Chase County—\$120—and lowest in Johnson County—\$9. Another expense that varies widely between rural and urban counties is building operation costs. Per-pupil costs are lower in a school building operating at capacity than one operating at less than capacity. Building costs varied from \$15 in the "most rural" counties to

\$51 in the "most urban" counties. Like most states, Kansas still relies heavily on local funds to finance education. Property taxes provided 65 per cent of the total school support in 1970. The remainder came from state (30 per cent) and federal aid (5 per cent). School costs are the major expenditure item in each county's budget, Orazem says. Nearly \$290 million, or 57 per cent of the property taxes collected in the state in 1970, were used to finance local schools. Proportion of total property taxes used to support local schools ranged from a low of 46 per cent in Chautauqua County to a high of 71 per cent in Johnson County. Orazem points out that expenditures per pupil measure financial support, not necessarily the quality of education. Although larger districts are generally more economical to operate than smaller districts, achievement tests scores

show no significant differences in "quality" of education between smaller and larger schools, he says. Results of the study have been summarized in two publications which are available from the Distribution Center, Umberger Hall, Kansas State University, Manhattan, 66506. Ask for "Financing Local Schools" and "Public School Costs by Counties."

Screwworms Still Plague Cattlemen In South Texas

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has amended federal regulations to prevent the accidental movement of screwworm-infested animals into the Southeast during the winter months. Veterinarians with USDA's

Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) said the amendment extends the effective date of current screwworm regulations from Dec. 1 through April 14 in 39 southern Texas counties, where screwworms can survive the winter. Screwworm regulations issued last summer restricted livestock shipments between April 15 and Nov. 30 from five southwestern states—Texas, Oklahoma, and parts of New Mexico, Arizona and California—and Puerto Rico. The new amendments are designed to protect the southeastern states from re-establishment of the deadly livestock pests, which caused heavy losses before they were eradicated in 1958-59. APHIS officials noted that animals moving from southern Texas into or through Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, or Florida must be sprayed or dipped with an approved pesticide before shipment. APHIS officials said the regulations also continue the requirement that all animals be inspected by a veterinarian, certified screwworm-free, and treated for any minor wounds before being shipped across state lines. If screwworms are found, the infested animal must be held and treated on the premises until free of the pest, and other animals in the lot to be shipped must be dipped or sprayed. Officials cited this year's massive invasion of screwworms from Mexico as a major reason for in-

stituting these regulations. To date nearly 100,000 confirmed cases have been reported, including isolated infestations in Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Louisiana, and Arkansas. The movement of infested animals is a principal means of spreading screwworms to new areas outside their normal range. APHIS veterinarians noted that cold weather has reduced screwworm incidence, but that many cases are still being reported in the overwintering areas in southern Texas. Dispersal of millions of sterile screwworm flies is continuing in these areas to suppress the natural reproduction of fertile screwworm flies in the wild, thus setting the stage for an aggressive eradication effort that eventually will extend deep into Mexico. Under an international agreement signed Aug. 28, the United States and Mexico are planning a joint program to eliminate screwworms southward to the 150-mile-wide Isthmus of Tehuantepec in southern Mexico, where a new screwworm barrier zone will be established. When this 5-year program is completed, the recurring danger of screwworms in the United States will have been eliminated.



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No Federal Lid On Sugar Beets

No federal acreage controls on sugar beet production will be imposed in 1973, the seventh consecutive year for unrestricted output, the Agriculture Department announced. The decision followed recommendations made at a hearing in Denver, on Aug. 17 at which growers and processors urged the department not to set acreage allotments or "proportionate share" for the beet crop. Under the Sugar Act, the department can set controls only when it appears sugar production from beets would exceed expected needs, including market demand and maintenance of reserve supplies. Sugar beet producers planted more than 1.4 million acres for 1972 production, indicating a sugar yield of about 3.3 million tons. That is about 100,000 tons less than this year's marketing quota, thus indicating supplies on Jan. 1 will be considerably below the desired level, officials said.

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FINDS LITTLE MONEY IN POULTRY BUSINESS

I am glad that somebody can make a success of the poultry business. I don't seem to be able to since that egg grading law took effect July 1. My egg man Brumel Produce, Garnett, ran into difficulty. They could not stand a \$500 fine so they quit buying eggs on a graded basis. Now they sell to a breaker and it looks like the best he will ever pay is 15 cents a dozen. I don't know of another place to sell eggs and there is no market for the old hens other than knocking them in the head and feeding them to the coyotes.

The coyotes sure are thick since the bounty was removed and the cyanide guns outlawed. Egg prices have been poor for 3 years but nothing like right now, all due to government interference. I would think that is taking money away without due process of law. In my book that is stealing. It costs between 25 and 30 cents for feed for a dozen eggs when hens are in good production. It would cost about \$60 to feed my chickens and about \$30 would come back and I'd have a \$30 loss besides no wages for taking care of them. I reckon you can't do anything about

this. But I'd like to know where can I sell old hens and where can I find another market for my eggs? I have kept about 400 chickens for 45 years now and farmed through the great depression, but this beats it all. Emil Kaufman GRIDLEY

Short Shots On Agriculture From K-State

Decomposition of residue following corn and sorghum harvest will not be carried out at soil temperatures much less than 50 degrees, even if adequate nitrogen is present.

Dr. Roscoe Ellis, Kansas State University agronomist, points out that decomposition of residue is carried out by microorganisms in the soil.

Applications of nitrogen will only aid the decomposition process if applied early enough in the fall before soil temperatures drop below 50 degrees or after the soil warms up to this temperature in the spring.

The amount of roughage in the finishing ration determines whether dry shelled corn should be fed whole or crimped to beef steers, say researchers at Ohio State University.

It was found that whole shelled corn gave better performance as long as the ration contained 17 pounds of corn silage per head per day. That equals 23 percent roughage in the total ration (dry matter basis), assuming the corn silage contains 50 percent roughage.

When roughage content passed this level, crimped shelled corn gave better performance.

Farmers planting the Dawson and Kanza alfalfa varieties will get about the same results

Bob Bratcher, secretary-treasurer of the Kansas Crop Improvement Association, points out that both are resistant to bacterial wilt, spotted alfalfa aphid, and pea aphid. Yields are essentially equal, while Dawson probably has more winterhardiness than is necessary in south-central Kansas.

USDA Recommends Additional Milk Promotion Plans

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recommended adding advertising, research and promotion plans to five federal milk marketing orders in the Midwest. They are the Southern Illinois, Central Illinois, St. Louis-Ozarks, Greater Kansas City and Nebraska-Western Iowa orders.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) said the recommendations are based on evidence from a public hearing in Bridgeton, Mo., Oct. 18.

AMS said advertising, research and promotion of milk under federal orders was authorized by law in 1971, and 18 of the present 62 federal milk orders have been amended to

add such programs. Provisions proposed for the five orders are similar to those recently adopted for the 18 orders.

The proposed program under each respective order would be financed by deductions of 5 cents a hundredweight on all milk that producers deliver to the market each month, before returns are paid to producers. The funds would be withheld by the market administrator and turned over to an agency of local producers to be expended for research and development, advertising (except brand advertising), sales promotion, educational and other programs to improve marketing of milk and milk products. When requested, quarterly refunds would be made to egg producers not wishing to participate in the program.

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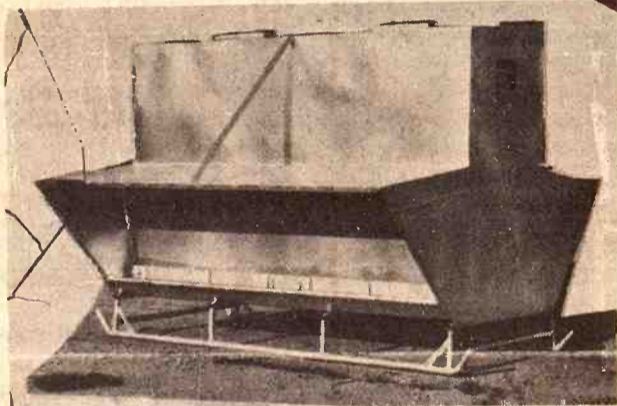
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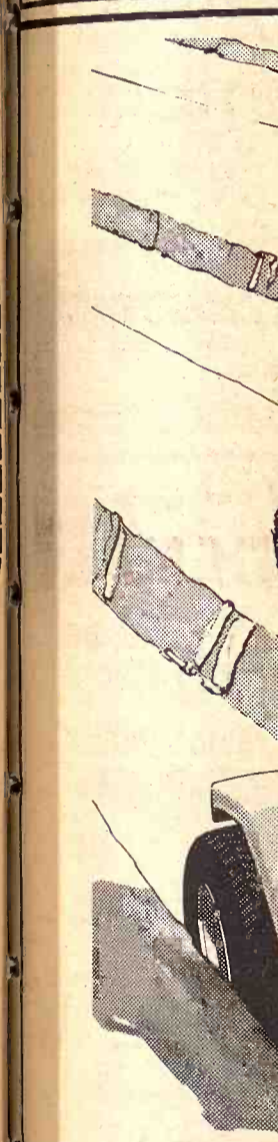

Tips On Christmas Tree Buying

When you go out looking for that special Christmas tree this year, consider one that was grown in Kansas.

Not only will you be helping the Christmas tree industry in Kansas, you'll probably be getting a much fresher tree.

"One of the most important considerations in buying and maintaining trees is freshness," says Gary Naughton, Kansas State University Extension forester. "When the tree is fresh there is less danger and less chance of needles falling off."

Naughton says the Kansas grown trees are of three varieties: Scotch pine, Austrian pine, and white pine. Each tree has distinct characteristics," Naughton explains, "and the buyer should obtain the one that best fits his needs."

Scotch pines have the shortest needles of the three (up to three inches), have dense foilage, and their stout limbs hold ornaments well. Needles are in bundles of twos on branches and are stiff.

Austrian pines have medium length needles (three to four inches), silver tipped buds, are less dense than Scotch pines (more open area), and also have good stoutness to hold ornaments. Needles are in bundles of twos on branches and are moderately stiff.

White pines also have medium length needles (three to four inches), are moderately dense, with lighter, more flexible limbs. Needles are slender and flexible, and are in bundles of fives on the branches. The tree has a soft, velvety appearance.

The most popular import in Kansas is the Balsam fir. This Great Lakes region tree has short, flat needles about 1½ inches long. Needles are on the stem in singles. Branches are moderately flexible and the appearance is more open than the pines.

The forester cites two principal ways of obtaining Christmas trees in Kansas. First, both the imports and Kansas grown trees can be purchased pre-cut at various outlets. To check for freshness, try bending a green needle—it should bend without snapping, and should not break loose

at the base easily. Also, if the pitch (or sap) on the tree is still sticky, the tree is fresh.

Naughton suggests asking the dealer if the tree is Kansas grown. "If it is a Kansas tree you can pretty well bet it is as much as five or six weeks fresher than the imports," he advises.

A second way of selecting a tree is to go to one of Kansas' Christmas tree plantations and pick a live one. A more hardy person may want to cut the tree himself, or the owner will do it at no cost.

Whether buying the tree at a lot, or on a plantation, it's best to cut an inch off the bottom before putting the tree in water. Naughton says that within 20 minutes, the exposed cells lose their ability to draw water for the tree. His advice is to "cut the bottom inch off the tree when you get home and immediately put it in water."

Once the tree is decorated, if the water base pan runs dry and stays that way for more than 20 minutes, cut the bottom off once again. Stripping bark off the bottom is not as effective as cutting off the bottom inch.

While there are a number of chemical fire retardants on the market used for fireproofing Christmas trees, Naughton feels the best preventive measure is to keep the tree well-watered.

The chemicals are often difficult

to use, and if the tree dries out the chemical can fall off the needles. Chemicals added to the base water usually cause moisture to flow out of the tree instead of into it.

As an extra precaution against fire, Naughton advises against the use of candles in the tree, and suggest limiting the burning of electric tree lights to a few hours in the evening so that heat from the lights does not dry out the needles.

For the ecology minded Christmas observer, Naughton suggests purchasing a live tree that has been balled and burlapped (soil ball around roots is preserved by wrapping the ball with a burlap bag). The secret, he says, is to use a small tree, keep it in a cool place in the house, and keep it there not more than 7 to 10 days. Also, do not let electric light bulbs touch the foliage.

When it's time for the tree to come down, dig a hole in the yard and plant it. It is a good idea to dig the hole for the tree before Christmas and fill it with water. This will avoid the problem of digging in frozen soil. Adding straw or leaves to the hole will help keep the soil from freezing.

Some Christmas tree plantation owners will allow you to do your own ball and burlapping, and some will do it for you at a nominal cost.

Naughton warns that using a balled and burlapped tree is a lot more trouble because a larger container is necessary to hold the tree. "It's quite a trick to make sure the tree gets sufficient water to stay alive, and not so much water that the soil ball is destroyed," he says. "And make sure not to put an ornament on top of the tree as you may damage the terminal bud and deform the tree in its future growth."

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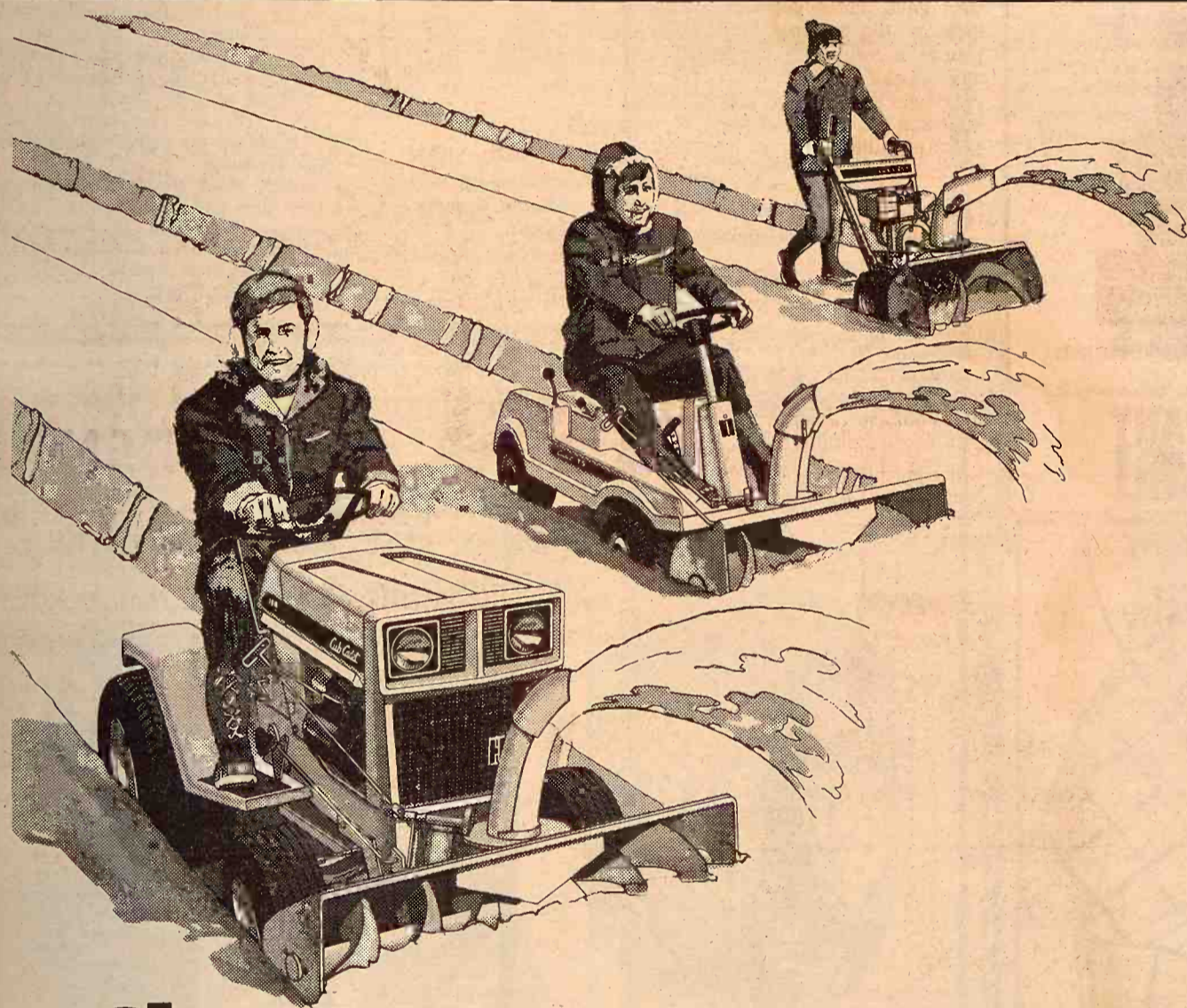
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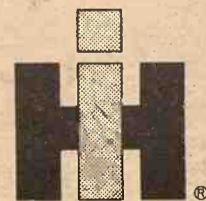

To mix paint completely, begin by pouring most of the liquid in the can into another receptacle. Stir what's left in the can until it's completely mixed with remaining liquid. Return extra liquid, a little at a time, stirring constantly. Liquids and solids will be evenly mixed and you'll be ready for a perfect paint job.

To Restring Beads

Before attempting to restring beads, line them up on a strip of transparent tape, grading them as to size.

Removes Lime From Glassware

To remove lime deposits from glassware, place some tea leaves in the bottom and fill the container with water to which some vinegar has been added. Allow to soak before washing.

Curtains Will Look Like New

After laundering drip-dry curtains, rinse them in starch water then hang them up to dry. They will look like new, even after many washings.

Longer Wear From Sheets

To get longer wear out of sheets, place the wide hems at one end of the bed one week, and reverse the hems the next time they are used.

KLA Hears Beefs Against Meat Import Law

Congressman John Melcher told the Kansas Livestock Association annual convention here last week that it is time for the Administration to halt tinkering with the meat import law and encourage more meat production in the United States, where clean slaughter and processing is assured.

Melcher charged that Central American countries are being pressed to ship more meat to us when their own people lack animal protein in their diets, having less than 25 pounds of meat per person per year to 182 pounds per person in the U.S.

He also charged that a big loophole already had been allowed to develop in the meat import quota law before it was suspended when the Customs Bureau ruled that red meat such as hamburger, boned steaks and rolled roasts, classified as "prepared," could be shipped raw and chilled into the United States outside of quotas if in con-

sumer-sized containers.

The prepared meat, worth 70 cents to \$1 per pound, was assessed a 10 per cent of value tariff duty. Bulk boned beef and veal under quota comes in at only 3 cent per pound.

"The transparency of the 'prepared' meat dodge was exposed when the President removed the quota restrictions last April," Melcher said. "The shipments of 'prepared' meat dropped 35 million pounds in both the second and third quarters this year. Of course, the bulk quota meat immediately increased that much and more.

"The 'prepared' meat quickly became unprepared meat when they could cut the tariff in two by changing back to the old classification," Melcher said.

Encouragement of imports from Central America also "smacks of favoritism to American investors who have chosen to get into ranching and packing houses in those countries, apparently with assurance they will get some of our domestic market," the Congressman said.

Melcher declared that meat price mark-ups as a result of criminal racketeering in Eastern cities—sometimes 25 to 40 percent of Chicago without justification—are of concern to cattle producers, and that grand jury action to break it up can be expected next year.

"Fair prices to consumers are the best assurance that producers will prosper," Melcher said. "Prices inflated by racketeers hurt us all."

They should also be concerned, he told the livestock men, with adequate inspection of imported meats, now coming into the U.S. with an allowable number of defects after inspection of less than one half of 1 percent of the product.

"Consumer confidence in the meat in the counter is of utmost im-

portance, and when the consumer runs into a defect, she doesn't know about whether it was foreign or domestic; she just boycotts," he said.

Clothing Factory To Be Built In Fairbury, Nebr.

Fairbury, Nebr., is getting into the clothing industry that will employ 100 sons with an annual payroll of \$1 million.

The announcement was made here by Mack Gale, president of the Kingswell division of Kellwood Co., which makes clothing for Sears.

Gale said construction of a \$800,000 plant would begin December 1, with full operation begin by next June 1.

Kellwood, a conglomerate of plants employing 18,000 people, this will be its first plant in Nebraska.

Disaster Area In Kansas Milo Fields?

Because of the disastrous damage to the milo crop in the fields, a movement is underway to have Marshall County declared a disaster area.

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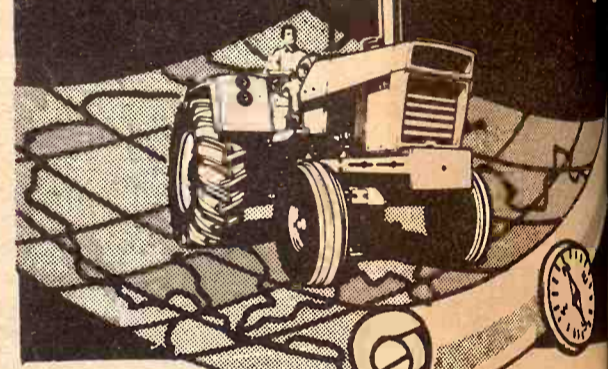
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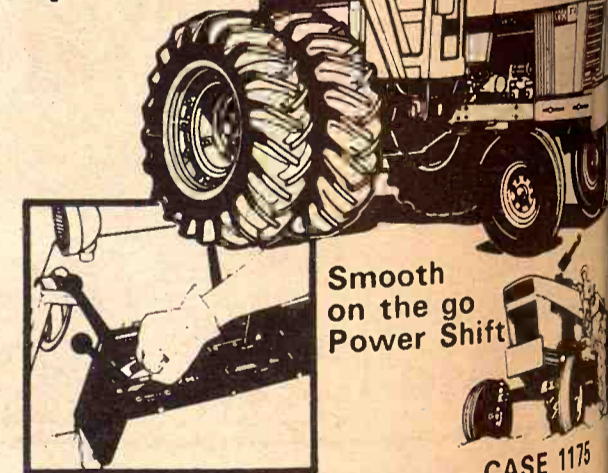

in personal, community and civic responsibilities, 267 winners nationwide shared \$186,700 in educational grants.

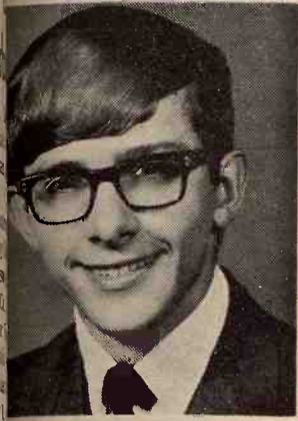

Wheat Deal Educates Public On Grain Trade

The dramatic sales of wheat and other grains to the Soviet Union this last summer got enormous publicity, boosted U.S. farm prices, cut our crop surpluses, created controversy and developed into a political issue.

They served also, because of all of these things, to induce the general public to become a little better acquainted with the farm export business. As the grain trade soon was to learn when the huge sales became publicized, at least some of the controversies developed because

of a lack of understanding of fundamentals of the grain business itself and the export business in particular.

The numerous questions plied members of the trade, such as those at the Kansas City Board of Trade, attested to the public's desire to learn more about what was happening. After all, the people of this country were not used to trading with Russia and it came as a shock when that country bought about one-fourth of the wheat produced in 1972.

Admittedly too, most people had

no reason to be familiar with all the ramifications and complications of the grain business. Much that they have read on the subject over the years has been to the effect that our farmers nearly always were faced with a surplus and low prices. That news was like a record that was being played over and over.

Even domestic grain traders were not familiar with conditions in the Soviet Union or China for the simple reason they were doing no business in either country.

Many veteran members of the trade will admit frankly now they never realized the Soviet Union, in recent years at least, has been growing far more wheat than the United States and Canada combined. Even this year, when the Soviet Union has harvested a short crop reportedly to be around 2.3 billion bushels, that is more than the combined total of the U.S. and Canadian harvest of approximately 2,067 million bushels.

The big difference, however, is that the Soviet Union does not grow nearly as much corn and other grains as the United States. In total, U.S. grain output far exceeds that of the Soviet Union.

From questions asked many times, it was obvious that many people in this country didn't understand the grain export subsidy. They thought the exporter was getting the subsidy as sort of a bonus. Actually, the subsidy goes to the producer.

The theory behind the subsidy is that when U.S. farm prices on wheat

rise above prices on world markets, exporters may pay the farmer the American price and sell the wheat at the lower world price, with the government making up the difference between the farm price and the world price.

If the farm price rises, the subsidy rises, but the exporter still gets only the world price for the wheat when he sells it. If it were not for such a subsidy, exporters could not sell a bushel of U.S. wheat overseas at times when U.S. farm prices are higher than those on the world market. The subsidy program is one of long standing in this country.

The subsidy was removed in September of this year only after world prices rose to the level of those in the United States. Actually, because the U.S. became the dominant supplier of wheat on the world market, the world price was set in our markets.

Incidentally, some other countries have export subsidies on wheat too, but they don't use that word. In the Common Market countries, for example, they refer to it as an "export restitution payment" and it could be that this phrase better defines the purpose of the program than the word "subsidy."

Other questions have indicated not all the public was aware of the functions of the government's loan or price support program on wheat. This led to statements in behalf of farmers who were "forced to sell their wheat at harvest to pay bills or taxes" and therefore missed out on the higher prices that followed the sales to the Soviet Union.

The fact was that any wheat farmer in the government program, and that would include nearly all of them, could get a government loan at harvest time at a national average of \$1.25 a bushel, which would have provided the cash to pay bills or taxes. Not only that, if the price of wheat rose — which it did — the farmer could redeem his loan, take title anew to his wheat and sell it on the market at the higher price.

Thousands of them have done very thing.

Also, if the price of wheat fell below the \$1.25 a bushel, the farmer could have let the government take title and he, the farmer, would have kept the \$1.25. "heads I win and tails I lose" practice, and that is exactly the law was written.

The public also apparently was aware that in most years it is the custom of farmers in Oklahoma, Texas, where the winter wheat harvest is first completed, to get their grain immediately. They do this because exporters get close to Gulf ports so that they save on freight. Therefore, exporters pay a premium of several cents a bushel over prices in the north. Thus in most or at least some years, the Oklahoma and Texas farmer makes money by selling early. At the same time, he gets the same government certificate payment as the farmer in the north.

This year the situation reversed. The northern farmer the later harvest benefited by higher prices that came after Soviet deals. He also will get the same certificate payment as Texas and Oklahoma farmers sold at lower prices.

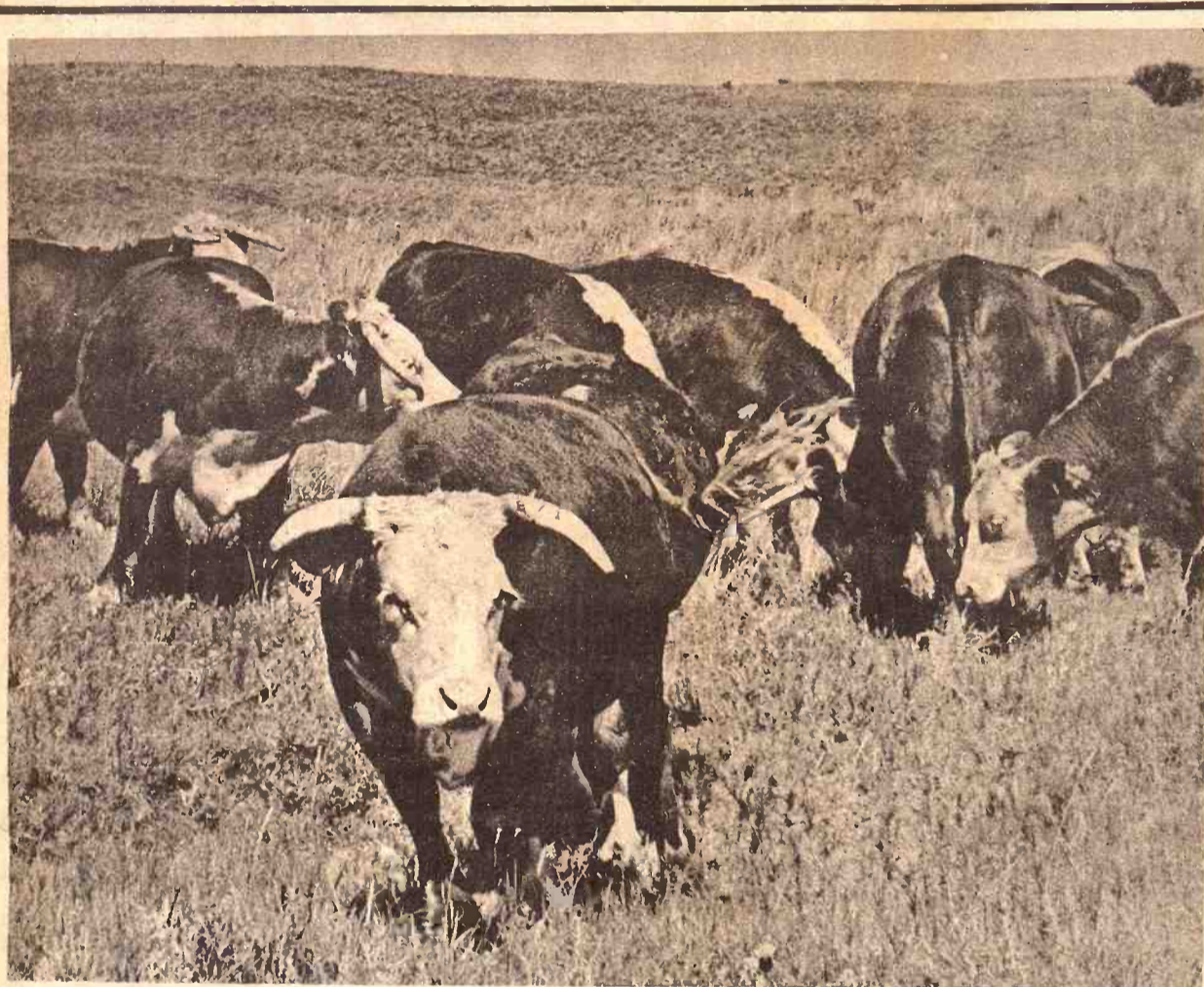

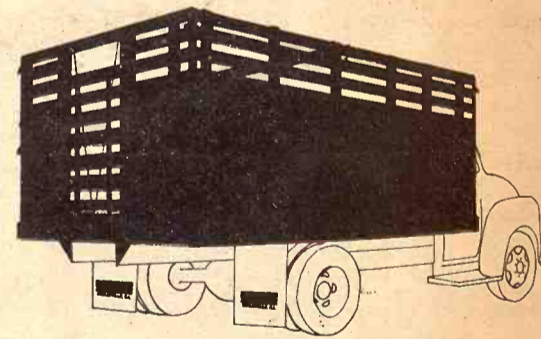

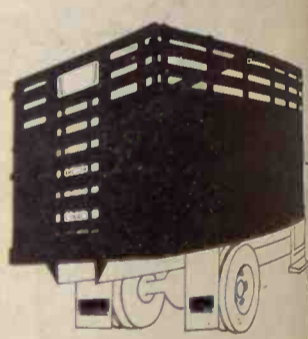

Ottawa will become the soybean capital of Kansas for a day when producers meet to organize.

Ottawa University will be the site of the organizational meeting, scheduled to begin at 10:15 a.m. today (Dec. 14).

At the end of the afternoon, the growers will have formed the Kansas Soybean Association, which will be affiliated with the American Soybean Association.

It has been instrumental in opening overseas markets for beans, one reason soybean prices have increased substantially in the past few years. Recent prices reached as high as \$3.75 per bushel.

The association cannot become affiliated with ASA unless it has 200

members. Wayne Dicken of De Soto, chairman of a steering committee appointed to make preliminary plans for a statewide organization, said approximately 230 Kansas producers have joined the new association.

"I hope soybean producers take advantage of the opportunity to join the association," said Dicken. "More farmers are becoming aware of the fact that they can do things collectively that they can't do alone."

Dicken said speakers will include Dr. Robert A. Bohannon, director of Extension at Kansas State University; Harold Kuehn, president of ASA; C. Wesley Randall, program manager for market development of ASA; and Ralph A. Moore, manager of Cargill, Inc., of Wichita (soybean processors).

A business meeting will conclude the day's activities.

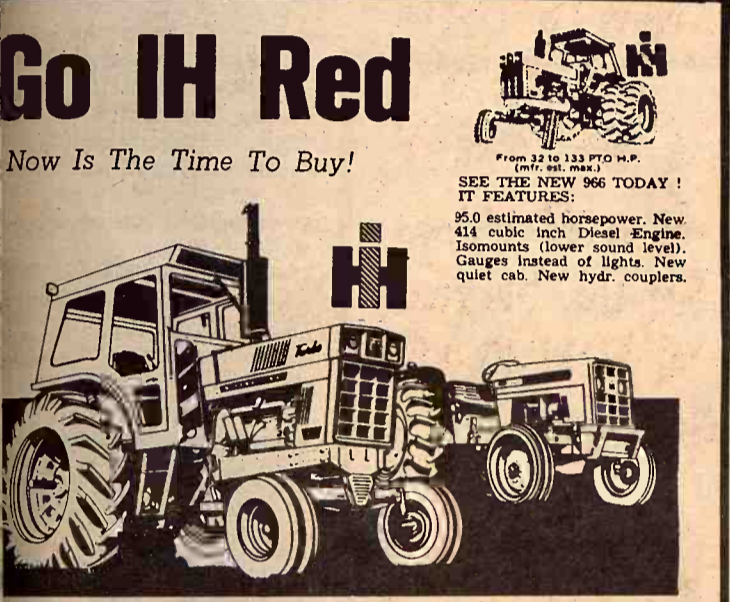

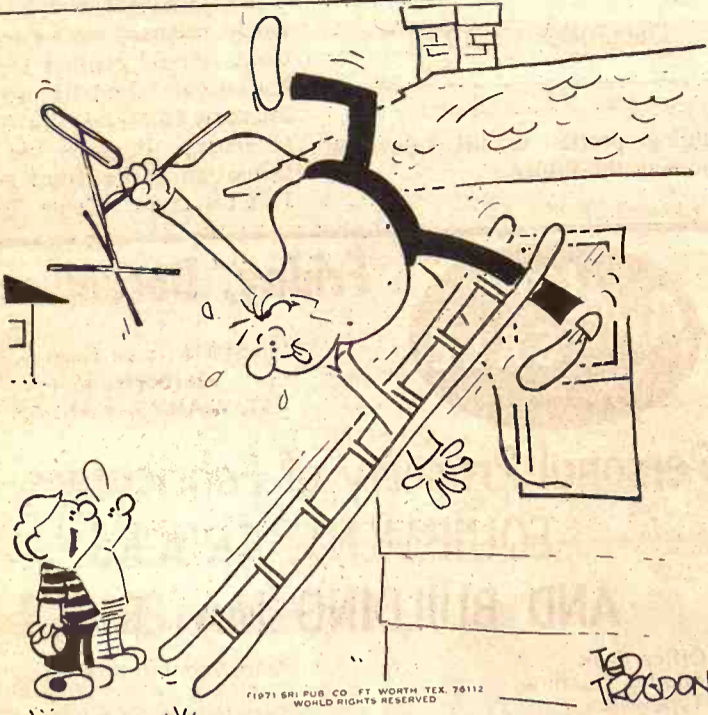

Record Exports Of Wheat, Soybeans, Feedgrains Predicted

The U.S. grain transportation system has recently reached a level of performance which, if sustained for the rest of fiscal 1973, should allow exports of wheat, feedgrains, and soybeans to reach a record 74.5 million metric tons. This would mean an increase of 49 per cent over the performance achieved the year before, the USDA Foreign Agricultural Service reports.

Three trends have developed:
 • In the last week of October, grain and soybean exports pushed above the level required to reach the fiscal-year goal. This level was maintained or exceeded during the first 2 weeks of November.
 • Average weekly railcar loadings for the month—at 31,600 cars—were the highest since 1970 and showed a 14 per cent gain over

September.
 • Barge shipments—at 100 million bushels—were about 54 per cent over the September level, reflecting heavy movements of soybeans to ports.
 October exports of wheat, feedgrains, and soybeans totaled 238 million bushels, up 13 per cent over September's already high level. Feedgrain (95 million bushels) was down 21 per cent; but wheat (87 million) was up by 21 per cent and soybeans (56 million) up 2½ times. In the last week, total exports did especially well, moving at a 60-million-bushel clip.
 Every U.S. coast port reported higher shipments in October. The gulf (which handles about two-thirds of the total) hit a 3-year high as soybeans began to reach port

elevators at the mouth of Mississippi.
 Soybeans also pushed up the activity at Great Lakes ports as wheat (especially white) kept coast ports busy. East coast ports which usually handle relatively small amounts of grain and soybeans until winter, continued to expand shipments for the straight month.
 By these indications, the grain work stoppages, bad weather, poor coordination, or long-contract shipping problems could prevent exports from reaching the goal.

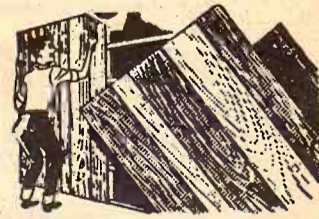

September. Barge shipments—at 100 million bushels—were about 54 per cent over the September level, reflecting heavy movements of soybeans to ports. October exports of wheat, feedgrains, and soybeans totaled 238 million bushels, up 13 per cent over September's already high level. Color TV's Revamped By Easter?

NEW YORK—There are only a shopping days left till Christmas here's a shopping tip: don't buy that color television set until Easter. Then, sets will be a bit lighter, a less bulky, a bit more reliable, a cheaper to service and perhaps probably not a bit cheaper. By Easter, many new television sets will contain a new of picture tube, a tube that does with a number of the companies that are tucked inside tube. Our companies make variations in the new tube. With just about no agreeing on which is the most revolutionary, an intense battle is being up among television manufacturers for the largest share of color picture tube market, which \$473.7 million last year. The tubes are known as in-line systems. With them, the three electron beams in the tube's neck transmit the picture are lined up in a line and are generally out of a single electron gun. In the in-line, or delta, tubes the beams are flung out of three electron guns arranged in

triangular fashion. General Electric Co. pioneered the new type when it came out with a 10-inch model in 1965. It followed that with similar 14-inch and 16-inch versions and plans to market an improved 19-inch tube within a few months. Two Japanese companies have also entered the race. Sony Corp. has a more complex and more expensive system in nine-inch, 12-inch, 15-inch and 17-inch sizes. And Tokyo Shibaura Electric Co. Ltd. is marketing a nine-inch tube through Sharp Corp., another Japanese company, and it plans to unveil a more advanced 13-inch tube under its own brand next year. RCA Corp., the latest entry, is coming out with 15-inch, 17-inch and 19-inch in-line tubes in a few months. Spurring interest in the tubes has been the growing tendency of consumers to favor compact sets, especially since more people are putting televisions into dens and bedrooms instead of into the living room. Portables now account for more than 60 percent of the television market, and the figure is trending upward. With the in-line tubes shortening sets by about two

inches and making them two to four pounds lighter, the new sets are expected to be even more attractive than present portables. "I think that in three years all sets on the market will be in-line," says Fred Wellner, GE's general manager for its TV component products department. Beyond this, the new tubes should prove more reliable, chiefly because there is less than can go wrong. With them, GE and RCA claim, consumers shouldn't have to spend much more on service than they would on far simpler black-and-white sets. Frequent servicing has always been a major headache with color sets. RCA also points out that the simpler new tubes make it easier for the man who likes to tinker with his own set to have his fun. By reducing the number of parts and by simplifying the settings that have to be made by technicians in the factory, RCA and GE expect their tubes to be \$3 to \$5 cheaper to produce even in times of rising costs. (The wholesale price of a conventional 19-inch tube is \$60 to \$70.) But that probably will save consumers nothing. Price wars have steadily driven down the price of television sets, forcing manufacturers to realize smaller profits than they would prefer. As a result, they probably won't pass along the production savings to consumers but will instead use them to beef up their profits. Even so, the new tubes should guard against the need for manufacturers suffering from

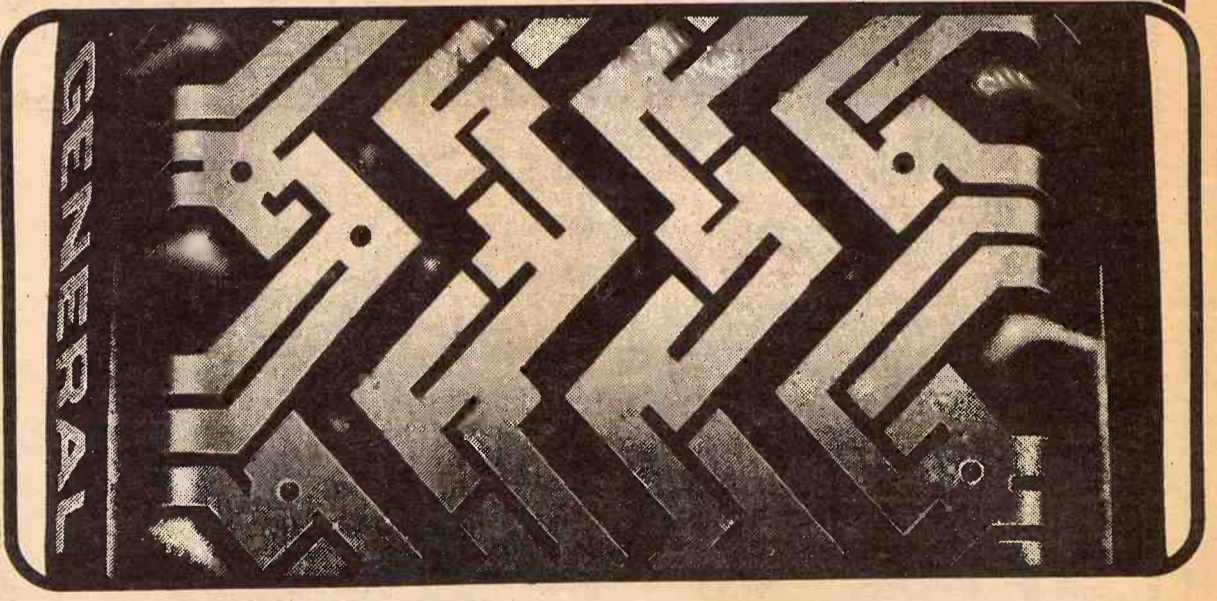

Butz Retained On Nixon Staff, For How Long?

President Nixon had just re-enlisted Earl L. Butz as secretary of agriculture and the quick-tongued farm boss was asked about it.

"He didn't say for how long, did he?" Butz remarked to newsmen. "It may be only 'til he can get a successor, I don't know."

It was taken as a jest, typical of the man, and there were chuckles. But was it only another Butzism?

Some people, including a few of his associates, think Butz may be tempted to quit of his own accord in the near future while he is still 'way ahead in terms of farm popularity.

But a few minutes later, warming to his subject, Butz said he was very flattered and proud to continue on the Nixon team.

"After 12 months, I'm just getting comfortable in this job," he said.

Over the long haul, his job in the

second Nixon term is fairly well-defined: new farm legislation, implementation of new rural-development programs, and the nuts-and-bolts of spending an \$11 billion annual budget.

But the immediate future is cloudy. What does Nixon mean when he says the Agriculture Department will undergo a major shakeup as the White House announced. Butz refused to comment about specific plans for overhauling the century-old department. There will be changes, he said, including personnel reductions and switches as well as organizational face-lifts.

Details of those, Butz said, will be announced by the White House in due course.

Butz was chosen to succeed Clifford M. Hardin a year ago, as his work on the campaign trail later proved, to help re-elect Nixon. A year ago, farmers were grumbling about low prices and Republicans feared repercussions at the polls.

Butz fell heir to a remarkably beneficial series of events.

Livestock prices began climbing, eventually to record highs, bumper crops came along for harvest, and inflation began easing a bit.

Cancer Carrying Holstein Cow Aids Research

An old Holstein cow that was owned by B. M. Graves, a farmer near Hardtner, has undoubtedly helped in the start toward finding a cure for multiple myeloma, a rare form of cancer occurring predominately in humans.

The cow—located by veterinarian A. T. Kimmell of Kiowa—was the first animal in the United States, other than humans and one strain of laboratory mice, to show the disease. Once diagnosed the disease is usually fatal.

Since humans with the disease cannot be studied to any great extent, and since laboratory mice are small to work with, scientists throughout the world are searching for multiple myeloma in larger animals, said Dr. Scott Rodkey, KSU assistant professor of biology.

After the cancer was confirmed in the Holstein cow, the animal was transported to KSU and studied for

about three weeks before she died. "The disease won't be cured until studies from just this one animal," Rodkey added.

Rodkey cited two symptoms of the disease. One is an over production of a type of serum protein. The other is finding a protein in the urine that usually is not there.

Milk Production Per Cow Highest Ever For October

Kansas milk production during October totaled 140 million pounds, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service. Cumulative production during the ten months of 1972 totaled 1.3 billion pounds, slightly above the same period a year earlier. The number of milk cows on farms in Kansas during October totaled 108,000, compared with 193,000 in 1971.

Milk production per cow in October averaged 750 pounds, the highest average production record for the month of October in the United States milk production history. Total milk production during the first ten months of 1972 was 12.5 billion pounds, 1 percent more than the same period last year.

Milk cows on U.S. farms totaled 115,000, down 1 percent from October.

National milk production per cow averaged 784 pounds during October, 2 percent more than last year. The October rate per cow reached a record high in 28 of the 33 States, monthly estimates.

Butter production in Kansas during October totaled 1,077,000 pounds compared with 957,000 pounds in October 1971, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cumulative production during the first ten months of this year was 11,017,000 pounds, compared with 10,227,000 pounds a year ago.

Kansas American cheese production in October was 2,457,000 pounds, up slightly from 2,310,000 pounds produced during the same month last year. In the ten months of 1972, production totaled 35,650,000 pounds, compared with 24,973,000 pounds during the same period in 1971.

Ice cream production in Kansas during October totaled 633,000 gallons, compared with 557,000 gallons in 1971.

gallons in October 1971. From January through October this year, production totaled 6,145,000 gallons, down slightly from the 6,664,000 gallons produced during the same period a year ago.

Production of butter in the U.S. during October 1972 is estimated at 75,921,000 pounds, 5 percent below October 1971. In comparison with a year earlier in the four leading butter-producing States, October production was down 8 percent in Minnesota, 2 percent in Wisconsin, and 14 percent in Iowa, while California showed a 20 percent increase.

Production of American cheese in the United States for October 1972 totaled 118,073,000 pounds, a new record high for the month. This was 8 percent above the previous record for the month set a year earlier.

Production of ice cream during October is estimated at 61,669,000 gallons, up 4 percent from a year

earlier and 2 percent above October 1970. In the three leading ice cream-producing States, output was up 1 percent from a year earlier in Pennsylvania and New York, but down 2 percent in California.

Heat Lamps Handy Helpers On Winter Jobs

Portable heat lamps are handy items for winter use around the farm and rural home.

They are useful in warming 1) crankcases of tractors or cars, 2) water, and 3) baby pigs or lambs.

They'll also dry wet areas, and provide some comfort while working at odd jobs around the house.

Light is a by-product of heat lamps, but adds to their usefulness, points out Elwyn S. Holmes, Extension agricultural engineer at

Kansas State University. Infrared rays—long, radiant heat waves—are produced in the lamps. A 250-watt heat lamp gives off about the same light as a 100-watt light bulb.

Infrared lamps are available in 125, 250, and 375-watt sizes in soft glass (white) and 250 and 375-watt sizes in hard glass (red). Their normal life is about 5,000 hours, says Holmes. The red bulbs (hard glass) are more expensive but safer because they'll withstand water splashes when hot.

Use porcelain sockets if the lamps are on for continuous or long burning periods. Brass and most plastic sockets can't stand the heat. Never support the heat lamp by the cord in a brooding area—use a wire or chain.

Holmes cautions against

operating more than six 250-watt lamps on a 15 ampere (14 gauge wire) circuit or more than eight 250-watt lamps on a 20 amp (12 gauge wire) circuit. He knows of no farm fire that has ever been traced to a properly-used and installed heat lamp.

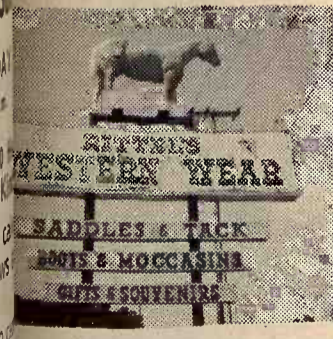

World Wheat Production Drops

Based on conditions reported through early October, the 1972 world wheat crop is estimated at 303 million tons, down from 323 million in 1971. Most of the decline is due to a 20 million ton drop in the USSR wheat crop.

Soviet wheat production in 1972 is estimated at 75 million tons (gross terms), three-fourths the size of the bumper crops in 1970 and 1971. Most of the decrease reflects the poor winter wheat harvest, which totaled little more than half the 1971 crop of 48 million tons.

Winterkill reduced the winter wheat harvested area to 16 million hectares, 5 million less than in 1971. Dry, hot weather in the growing season and rain at harvest contributed to reduced winter wheat yields. The spring wheat harvest is expected to be somewhat smaller than the 51 million tons produced in 1971.

There was a relatively small increase in the area seeded to spring wheat but abnormally cool weather delayed development of the crop. This lateness probably resulted in some grain not being harvested

before fall rain and snow made such work impossible. As of early October, about 15 million hectares or 13 percent of the total small grain area remained to be harvested.

Production for Canada, Argentina, and Australia is estimated at 27.7 million tons, down slightly from last year's 28.3. Canada's indicated wheat crop of 14.3 million tons is about the same as last year, even though acreage is up 10 percent. Drought is expected to reduce Australia's forthcoming wheat harvest to 5.8 million tons well below last year's 8.6 million tons. However, Argentina's crop is expected to be over a fifth higher than the 5.4 million tons last year.

Wheat stocks in 4 major exporting countries on July 1, 1972, totaled 50 million tons, down 3 million from a year earlier. The United States and Canada had the bulk, 23.5 million and 18.1 million tons, respectively. Argentine and Australian July 1 wheat stocks were largely committed to domestic or export use.

Wheat supplies in other exporting countries are about normal. The European Community (EC) total of

about 41 million tons is about 2.7 million above last year. Supplies in other Western Europe are about the same as last year.

Import estimates for 1972 to 1973 are in line with recent trends except for the USSR. Soviet purchases, estimated at 19.6 million tons of wheat, are expected to push world trade to a record 67 million tons. In addition, import needs by the Peoples Republic of China are proving to be larger than earlier estimates.

Wheat stocks of the four major exporters next summer could total about 33 million tons, well below last summer's 50 million and about equal to the recent low in 1966. U.S. wheat stocks may decrease from last summer's 23.5 million tons to 13.1 million.

Elk County Ranchers Develop Grazing Land

25 cattle once grazed, 100 on the same farm.

Ranches once useless for purposes are the site of high-quality fish ponds.

The site is Elk County, where new developments are going forward as a pilot program initiated by the county in this rich bluestem Flint southeastern Kansas.

The Huntington family has cleared much of the land and planted a variety of grasses including fescue and Bermuda introduced from an Oklahoma experiment station. The Bermuda has been a bonanza which gives high productive summer grazing combined with early spring-winter grazing of fescue, a cool season grass.

Ordinarily it takes from six to 10 acres of bluestem to graze a cow, he explains.

"If by more productive grasses, four or five cows can be grazed where formerly one cow and calf was raised, the result is greater utilization of the land and resulting prosperity."

That is the Huntington story. A farm that once supported 25 cows, through better grass management and planting back to Bermuda and fescue grasses, now supports 100 cattle without adding additional acreage.

Fish farming, believed by Huntington to be a means of greater utilization of his steep ravines, has become a profitable enterprise for the family.

The Huntingtons have a dozen fish ponds utilizing draws and drainage areas and another 15-acre reservoir used as a water supply.

Mr. Huntington, Virginia, operates the fish hatchery where 50,000 fingerlings annually are hatched and grown to 12-inch length in the ponds. These are sold as stock for other Kansas Fish ponds.

The Huntington children—Jane, 12, Mark, 10, and John David, 9—carry feed by horseback to the various

ponds scattered over the ranch.

Like other small ranchers, Huntington has an off-the-ranch job traveling a 30-county area with J & J Metal Products selling corrugated pipe used in dam construction.

His ambition through the years has been to prove that smaller ranches if developed to their greatest capacity can become a livelihood for a family.

Pravda said editorial boards of all

newspapers, magazines, local radio and television stations were told "to prepare wide coverage of this all-union competition for propagandizing this significant event."

Soviets Announce Harvest Contest To Motivate Farmers

The Soviet government, hoping to avoid another disastrous crop year, announced Tuesday a national farmers' competition with prizes of rubles and autos for workers who harvest the most grain in 1973.

Bad weather and shoddy work were responsible for 1972's low grain yields, an estimated 30 million tons below the planned 190 million.

The Kremlin has had little luck this year in firing up farmers through slogans, and despite efforts to produce rain and snow, it still can't control the weather.

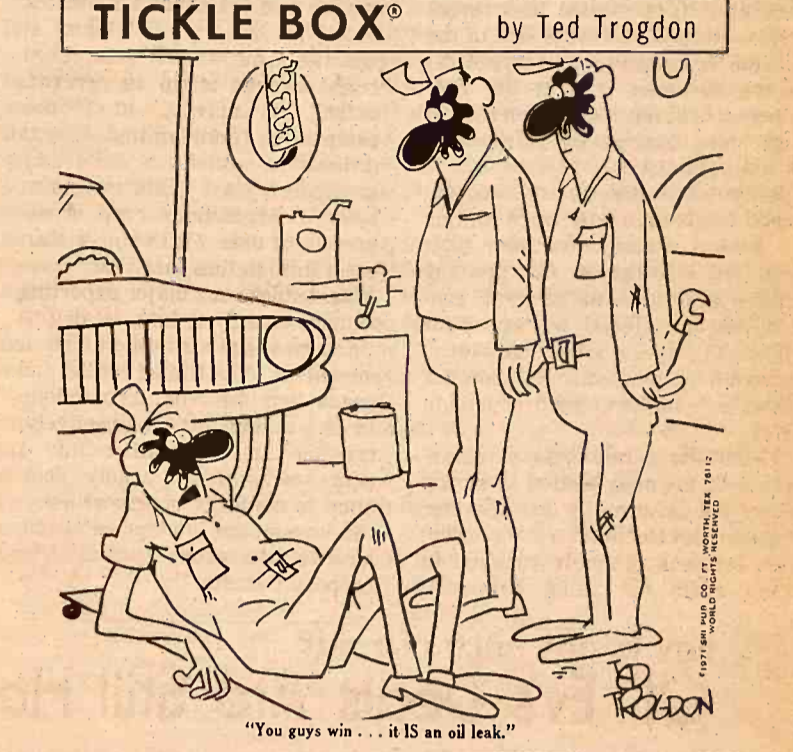
The appeal now is to the farmers' material instincts.

Pravda, the country's top party paper, said prizes would include: 3,753 red banners, 6,000 youth pennants, buses, ambulances, "other automobiles" and cash awards ranging from \$6,000-\$180,000 dollars.

A car costs a farm worker about 60 years' wages.

Pravda was hard pressed to explain why the Soviet Union is resorting to measures once called "capitalist tricks."

Prizes will go to the seven top producers of each of the country's 15 republics, 43 autonomous republics and oblasts, or regions, national

heading the drive is the Elk Development group of five years ago. Its aim is to use the population decline by a better living for those on through fuller development natural resources.

Members of the group are Gerald Huntington, former Sedgwick agent-turned-rancher, and a USDA agent—Glenn Snell, strict conservationist; Ernie county executive director and Dan Shively, county executive.

During World War II, explains Huntington, much of the grassland was plowed and sowed to wheat. These marginal lands should have been broken. They are returned to higher productive uses such as fescue, Bermuda or bluestem.

A major problem facing ranchers is been control of brush and Black Jack trees that reduce productivity of the lands. Tractors powering mist machines have been made available to ranchers to apply chemicals to rid the land of foreign brush. Government assistance is 30 per cent level.

Control of troublesome brush is the thing to do to restore the land of nature despite cries from environmentalists, said conservationist Snell. He said it this way:

When Kansas was young, prairie fires burned off the brush and were useful in destroying brush. Elk and deer ate sprigs of tree branches in winter and kept them under control.

With the coming of the settlers, the elk disappeared and man-control measures must be used.

County residents are on the number of projects to their grasslands more active. These include careful management of grassland without mowing, planting of walnut and areas along river bottoms and ravines, irrigating grasslands and water ponds and turning steep into highly productive fish ponds.

Grain, Grass-Fed Cattle Number Hike In Kansas

Grain-fed cattle marketings from Kansas farms and ranches in 1972 totaled 2,065,000, up 5 percent from the previous year and a new record high, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Grass-fed cattle marketings totaled 1,890,000, the largest number in the last five years. Marketings of all cattle and calves totaled 3,955,000 head during 1971, an increase of 15 percent from a year earlier and 25 percent above the average for the previous five years. Shipments of cattle and calves into Kansas in 1971 totaled 2,440,000, an increase of 14 percent from a year earlier.

Finney County had the largest number of grain-fed cattle marketed for any Kansas county in 1971 with 127,000 head. Haskell County ranked second with 125,000, followed by Barton with 110,000, Ford with 96,000 and Gray with 92,000.

These top counties have been the leaders in grain-fed marketings due to the concentration of large commercial cattle feeding operations in their respective areas. An additional 8 Kansas counties marketed more than 50,000 head of grain-fed cattle each during 1971. Approximately 9,000 farms and commercial feedlots in Kansas produced grain-fed cattle for slaughter market during 1971. The largest numbers of feeders

were in Washington, Nemaha, Dickinson and Brown counties.

Most Grass-Fed Cattle In Barber County

The number of grass-fed cattle and calves marketed exceeded 30,000 head in 11 Kansas counties. Barber County led the list with 40,600 followed by Hodgeman, Marion, Harper, Clark, Ford, Butler, and Ness.

The county totals for grass-fed cattle and calves include those pastured on bluestem and other tall grasses in eastern Kansas, those grazing on short grass ranges and wheat fields in central and western areas and some that were wintered primarily on silage or dry forage with some additional light grain supplement.

County estimates of grain-fed and grass-fed cattle marketings are based primarily on tabulations of numbers reported by farmers and ranchers in the assessors' annual statistical schedule. Allowance has been made for incompleteness and the totals adjusted to the levels of official State estimates of cattle and calves marketed.

Livestock Inshipments

Cattle and calves shipped from Oklahoma into Kansas totaled 682,000 head during 1971, the largest from any State. Texas was next,

supplying 406,000, followed by Missouri, Colorado and Mississippi.

Leading states supplying sheep and feeder lambs to Kansas stockmen were Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Oklahoma and Mississippi. Inshipments totaled 170,000 in 1971, 9 percent more than a year earlier. Excellent wheat pasture forage in the fall of 1971 led to a larger number of lamb inshipments than a year earlier.

Missouri was the leading source of hogs shipped into Kansas with 94,000, followed by Tennessee with 22,000, Oklahoma with 15,000 and Arkansas with 13,000. Total inshipments for 1971 were 166,000, up 6 percent from 1970.

Slightly over one-third of the cattle and calves shipped into Kansas were destined for the southwest crop reporting district, where 825,000 head were received during 1971. The west central district received 340,000 head, followed by the south central and southeast districts. Hog inshipments were largest to the southeast district with 45,000 head, followed by the south central district with 37,000 head. Out-of-state sheep and lambs were brought mainly into the south central district where 80,000 head were received in 1971.

Livestock inshipments represent those destined for local auction houses, farms, commercial feedlots and individuals, as shown by the Port-of-Entry Declaration Certificates. Livestock entering Kansas

and destined for terminal markets or direct to packers are not included in inshipment data.

Numbers of Cattle on Feed

Monthly estimates of the number of cattle on grain feed for the slaughter market in Kansas are

available from November 1, 1971 date. These together with quarterly estimates from 1963 to date are shown below. The number of cattle on feed in Kansas reached a record high of 1,230,000 head on November 1, 1972.

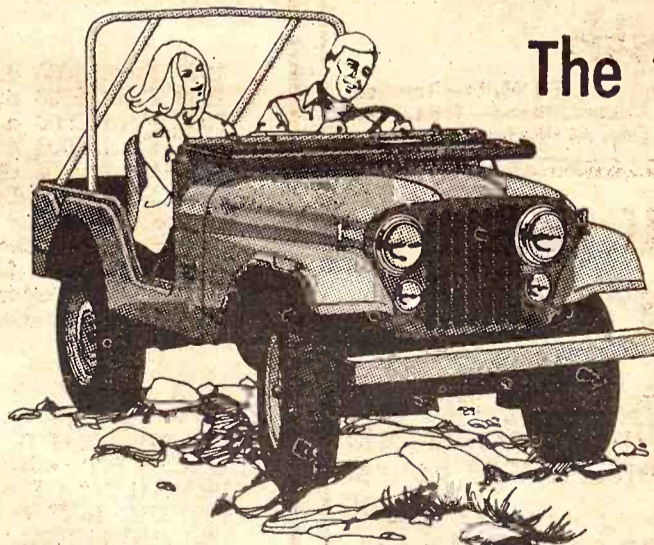

Move To Oust President Convention?

Convention work for the National Farmers Organization (NFO) began in Kansas City amidst rumors that a move will be made at the annual convention to unseat Oren Staley, Rea, Mo., who has been president almost since beginning of 1957.

Dissenters in the organization have solid support from California, Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Nebraska, South Dakota and North Dakota.

Staley's claim has been challenged ever, by George Matson, Mont. Minn., and NFO figure, whose claims support is slight in the 21

states organized by NFO, and that dissenters cannot possibly number more than 500 persons.

A fight for control of national NFO policy and business matters surfaced late last summer with expulsion or resignation of 10 members of the national board of directors from six states.

Expelled from the national board were Donald Kimball, Amarillo, Tex.; Donald Moskal, Santa Rosa, Tex.; John Oster, Ethan, S.D.; Jack Grimmer, Arbuckle, Calif.; Walter Farrar, Hugoton, Kan., and Robert Speer, Mulvane, Kan.

Four other resigned. They are Greg Dahners, Almont, N.D.; Gordon Craighead, Mutual, Okla.; Don Peterson, Ione, Ore., and Kenneth Spitzer, Kensal, N.C.

Farrar and Speer were reinstated to membership in the Kansas NFO and re-elected to the national board

of directors during a hectic state NFO convention in Salina in October.

During the convention, the Kansas by an estimated 2-1 ratio, handed Staley a personal rebuff when they refused him opportunity to speak to the convention at the annual banquet.

Later—after many hours of argument—they permitted Staley to appear for his speech about 1:30 a.m.

The fight in Kansas City is expected to start in the by-laws committee sessions. Also in argument will be the credentials presented by Farrar and Speer at the convention.

They were ousted on a by-laws matter after they allegedly failed to appear before a hearing board to answer charges their activities were not in the best interests of NFO.

There was doubt the by-laws could be changed to allow either their membership reinstatement or their

re-election to the board of directors.

Delegates to the national board must be elected at state level, then affirmed by the national organization at the national convention.

Spitzer has become chairman of the '72 Convention Committee, apparently organized to defeat Staley. Other committee members are Dick Carriere, secretary-treasurer, from Glenn, Calif.; Don Irons, Minneola, Kan.; Wayne Meyer, Sutter, Calif.; Gerald McCathern, Hereford, Tex., and Clayton Litchfield, Forman, N.D.

Staley promised the Kansas delegation that all sides will be heard at the national convention. It is unlikely however, the dissidents will unseat him.

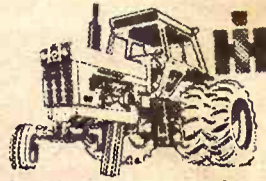

Water District Loan Approved For Bourbon Co.

Approval of a \$967,400 loan and \$35,000 grant from the U.S. Farmers Home Administration to expand the water system of Rural Water District No. 1 of Bourbon County, was announced recently by Senator Robert Dole and FHA Administrator James V. Smith.

The Senator was advised by Smith that FHA will reserve the \$1,002,400 of loan and grant funds for construction of the addition, which is expected to be carried out next year.

Project plans call for the District to add 170 miles of water line to its system and reach 328 more farms and other rural homes south and west of Fort Scott. Five standpipes and one booster pump station will be built in connection with the new segment.

Bourbon County's District No. 1 system, established in 1962 with an FHA loan of \$90,700 was one of the first projects in Kansas' extensive program of rural water service modernization, and has proved one of the most successful in terms of growth. The original system serving 66 farms and homes underwent a \$135,000 expansion in 1964, then received a \$335,000 Farmers Home Administration loan for a second enlargement in 1969. It now supplies water to 650 families. Its service will benefit a total of 978 farms and other homes after completion of the project announced today. Water supply is obtained from the city system of Fort Scott.

The loan portion of financing

announced today will be repaid in 40 years, with 5 percent interest, from proceeds of water service. Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture rural credit service, will assist the project under

December 12, 1972
the Rural Water Facilities program which it administers. The Bourbon County Rural Water District No. 1 organization is headed by James V. Smith, chairman, Fort Scott.

Coffey County Receives \$510,100 for Water District

Approval of a \$308,000 loan and \$100 grant from the U.S. Farmers Home Administration to expand the central water system in Coffey County, was announced Nov. 27 by Senator Robert Dole and FHA Administrator James V. Smith.

The Senator was advised by Smith that FHA will reserve the \$510,100 of loan and grant funds for construction of the project, which is expected to be carried out next year. The project has been organized by Rural Water District No. 3 of Coffey County, under chairmanship of Lawrence N. Hess of Waverly, Mo.

Plans call for a 40-mile network of water line that will carry water from the city system of Lawrence to 133 farms and homes in the rural area of Coffey County.

Standpipes will be built as part of the system.

Senator Dole said the new system will help pave the way for development of the area based on its proximity to John Redd Reservoir in northwestern Coffey County, and enable farmers

Coffey County receives \$510,100 Water District

approval of a \$308,000 loan and \$202,100 grant from the U.S. Farmers Home Administration to build a central water system in northern Coffey County, was announced Nov. 27 by Senator Robert Dole and FHA Administrator James

Smith. The Senator was advised by Smith that the FHA will reserve the \$510,100 of loan and grant funds for completion of the project, which is scheduled to be carried out next year. The project has been organized as Coffey Water District No. 3 of Coffey County, under chairmanship of Senator N. Hess of Waverly, Kansas. Plans call for a 40-mile network of pipes that will carry water from the city system of Coffey County to 133 farms and other structures in the rural area of northern Coffey County. Two water pipes will be built as part of the project.

Senator Dole said the new system will help pave the way for development of the area based on its proximity to John Redmond Reservoir in northwestern Coffey County, and enable farmers to

improve their livestock production as a result of improved water supply.

The loan portion of financing for the project will be repaid in 40 years, with 5 percent interest from proceeds of water service. Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture rural credit service, will assist the project under the Rural Water Facilities program which it administers.

How To Keep The "Merry" In Merry Christmas

Keep the "Merry" in "Merry Christmas" by observing a few basic rules during the holiday season.

Never leave young children alone in a room with a Christmas tree, lighting, and decorations, and adopt a family escape plan for use in event of fire in the house.

One safety measure is to locate the tree away from heat and where it won't block exits. Take it down as soon as possible after Christmas—the more it dries out, the more of a hazard it becomes.

Never use lighted candles on a tree or near any evergreen

decorations. Check sets of electric lights closely for worn insulation, broken plugs, and loose bulb sockets, and select only sets with a Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) or Canadian Standards Association (CSA) label.

Use extension cords sparingly, and never hang sets of lights on a metallic artificial tree. To avoid shock hazard, use only indirect spot lighting on a metallic tree. The tree should carry the UL label if it has a built-in electrical system.

When leaving the house, turn off all indoor tree and decorative lights. In fact, it is a good idea to turn off the lights before retiring.

Use decorative materials (such as glass and asbestos) that are non-combustible or flame retardant. Keep natural evergreens and polystyrene foam decorations away from candles, fireplaces, and other open flames.

As for gifts, select electric toys that carry the UL or CSA label.

When To Apply Nitrogen Pondered

"What poses the greatest pollution potential, fall or spring-applied nitrogen?"

The question to oft-asked farmer question depends on several factors, says Dr. Harold Jones of Kansas State University.

Jones, Extension soil fertility and management specialist, points out that the soil type, amounts of soil nitrogen applied, status of soil

moisture, and surface soil conditions determine pollution effects of nitrogen.

Heavy applications of nitrogen on sandy soils, particularly in the high rainfall areas of Kansas or under irrigated conditions, can result in loss of nitrate nitrogen by leaching and thus pose a threat to ground water.

Application of solid or liquid nitrogen fertilizers on the top of frozen soils can result in nitrogen losses in runoff and thus threaten surface waters.

Jones cautions farmers against applications of nitrogen fertilizers,

particularly in heavy amounts, under these conditions.

When the material is worked into heavy soils, or when the application is light (fewer than 60 pounds per acre on sandy soils), farmers have little to fear from fall application of nitrogen fertilizers, says Jones.

"In terms of getting the fertilizer on the field, there is a substantial labor and time advantage to applying nitrogen fertilizer in the fall and winter months," adds the specialist. "Where custom application is involved, it is a necessary practice."

of OSHA, officially recommending that the state of Kansas not pass an Occupational Safety and Health Act of its own. Instead, the resolution suggests that since the federal law is as yet unsettled, a state law would involve a duplication of effort and funds.

KLA members officially support legislation that would amend the Delaney amendment to the Pure Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act to permit a "no effect" tolerance level based on "sound scientific conclusion" rather than the zero tolerance not allowed. It is the zero tolerance aspect of the clause which caused DES to be banned from feed.

In other official action at the convention, the KLA proposed a Prairie Parkway in the form of a circle with twenty lookout points; the adoption of Big Bluestem as the official state grass of Kansas; the enactment of legislation exempting controlled agricultural burning from certain state laws now prohibiting same; the adoption of legislation assuring that real estate be appraised on the basis of its ability to produce net rental income; and the elimination of taxation of all personal property except licensed motor vehicles; and revision of the Kansas farm corporation laws so that they "coincide with modern agricultural needs and practices."

All together, the members of the Kansas Livestock Association adopted 22 resolutions during their

KLA Adopts 22 Resolutions In Recent Meeting

Nearly 1,000 Kansas stockmen and their wives gathered in Wichita for the 1972 convention of the Kansas Livestock Association held November 29,30 and December 1. The three-day event was the 60th annual meeting for the organization which began unofficially in 1894.

Among the resolutions passed by the membership was one which called for the enactment of legislation calling for both property tax and income tax to be used as a source of local revenue for schools. The KLA, along with the Kansas Farm Bureau, has submitted a school finance plan to legislative committees that would determine the wealth of an area on the basis of both of these local taxes rather than just on property tax.

The stockmen also called for the adoption of legislation that would legalize pen branding in feedlots licensed by the state of Kansas. The KLA supported reinstatement of the meat import quotas as of January 1, and resolved that foreign meat should be subject to the same rigid inspection as domestic meat.

The Kansas Livestock Association also addressed itself to the question

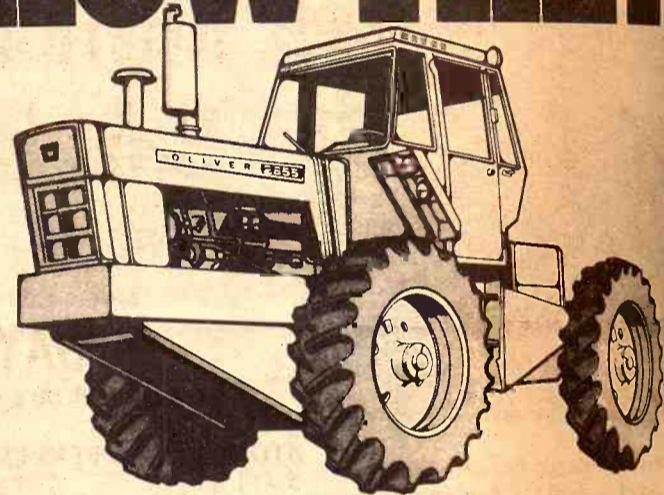

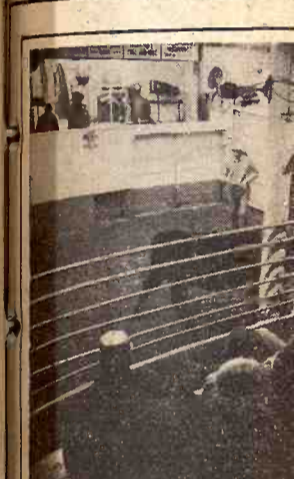

Fuel Shortage Hampering Elevator Grain Dryers

A shortage of liquid petroleum gas is hampering the efforts of elevator

operators and farmers to dry the corn, soybeans and milo being harvested from wet fields.

Most of the grain faces the danger of spoilage if it is stored more than a few days without being dried. Thousands of on-farm and elevator dryers are used to reduce the moisture content. The operators have been notified they can order 3.1 gallons of propane for every one gallon used in a base period of April through Sept. 30.

"That doesn't sound like rationing, but it is," one elevator operator said. "Because with the volume of wet grain coming in we could use 10 gallons for every three

we are able to order."

Don Wienert, of Mid-America Pipe Line Systems, Tulsa, said there really isn't a shortage of LP gas for his company, but it's a matter of pumping capacity. Only so much can be delivered.

"Peak grain drying demands have bumped into peak home heating and industrial demands," another spokesman said.

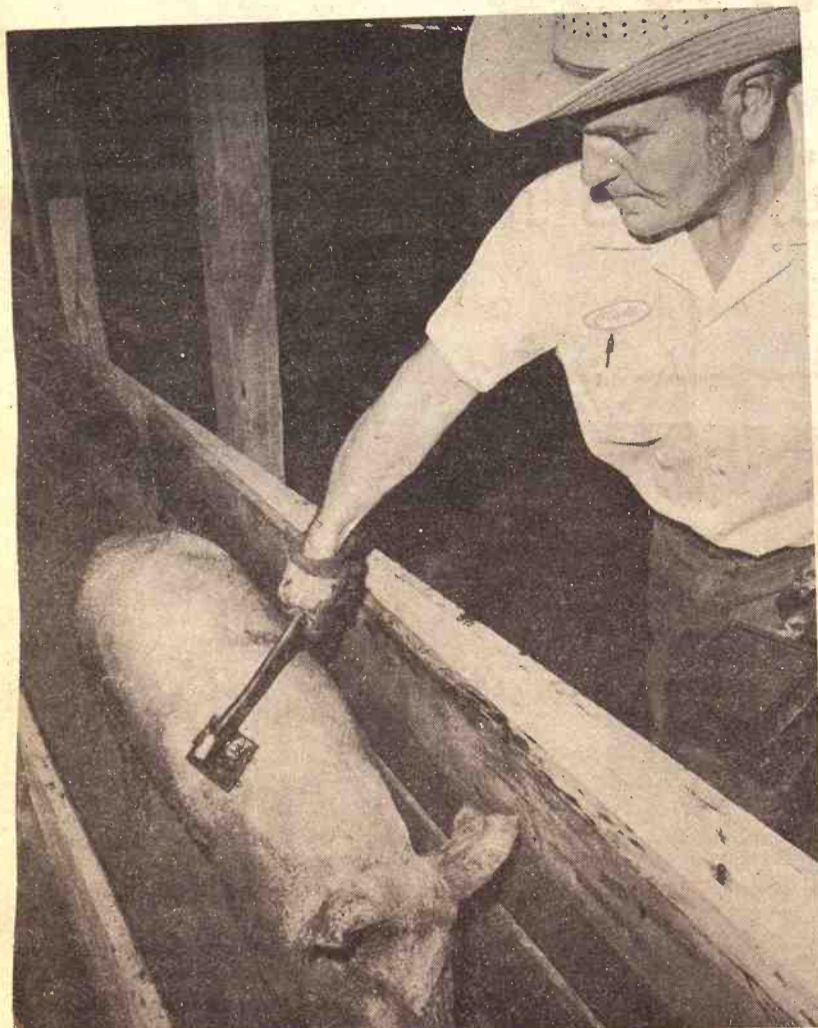

SWINE IDENTIFICATION FOR DISEASE ERADICATION



STOP HOG DISEASE

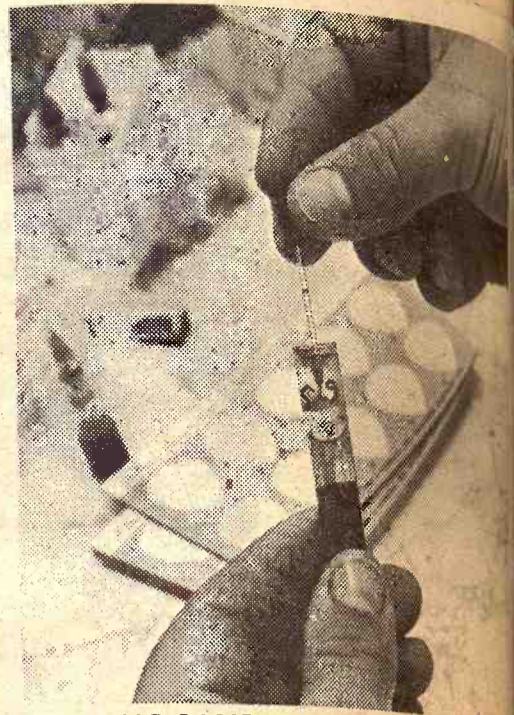
Recent field studies of a slap-tattoo identification system show that by its use diseased hogs can be quickly traced back to their herds of origin. The trials were conducted by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service with the cooperation of stockyards at East St. Louis, Ill., Kansas City, Mo., St. Paul, Minn., and Sioux Falls, S. Dak.

APHIS officials say that the rapid movement of animals through commercial marketing channels these days makes it essential to locate and eradicate sources of disease as rapidly as possible. Thus, the nationwide use of the tattoo system would be a major step toward the eradication of such diseases of swine as tuberculosis, brucellosis and trichinosis.



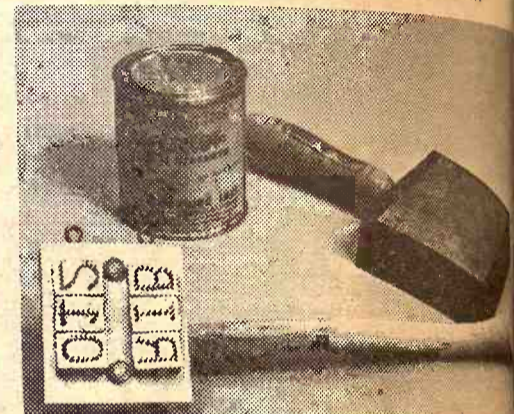
NUMBERS LEGIBLE

As the carcass moves through the scalding and dehairing processes, the tattoo numbers remain clearly legible on the skin.



TESTING SAMPLES

During carcass inspection samples of blood and tissue are taken for brucellosis and tuberculosis testing. If lesions of tuberculosis are found in tissue samples or if blood samples test positive for brucellosis, the diseased hog can be traced back to the farmer using the recorded tattoo number.



TATTOO EQUIPMENT

The tattoo used in the trials consists of six digits: the top three letters indicating the market and the bottom three digits indicating the lot number. The tattoo is applied on the shoulder of the hogs either when they are in pens or when they move through chutes. Tattoo identification numbers are entered on the dock ticket, scale ticket, invoice, or other document retained by the marketing agency.
