

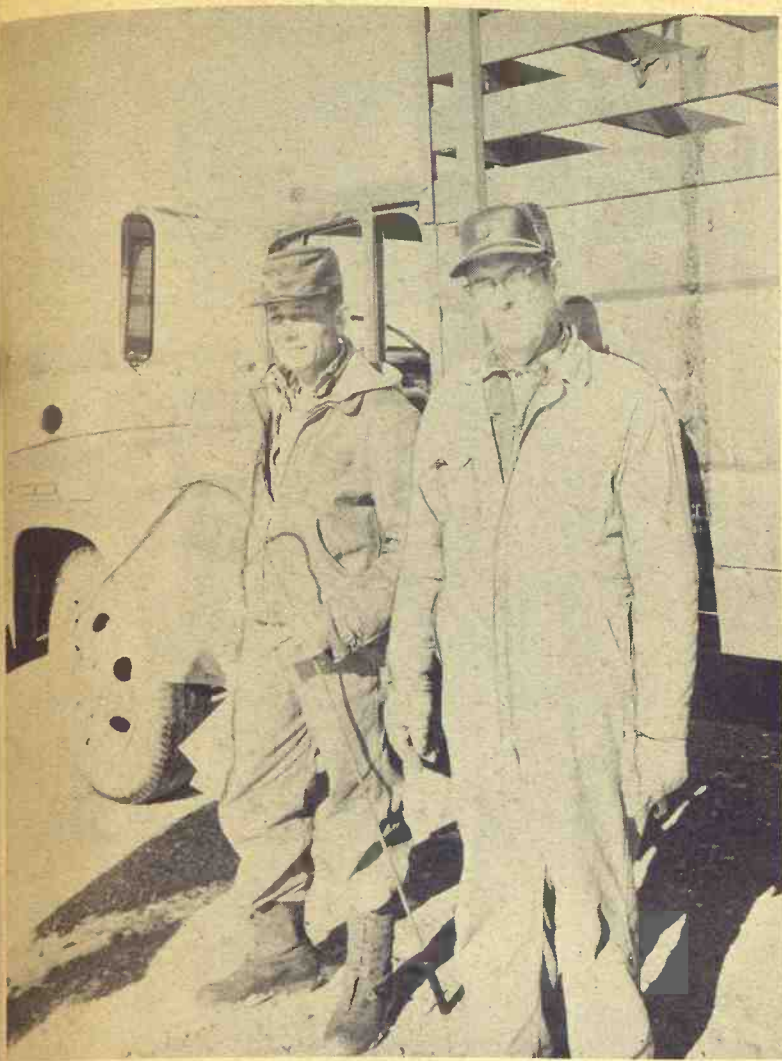

Legal Hinge In Purebred AI

Is an Angus that has been bred artificially any less an Angus than one that has been bred naturally?

The Justice Department has charged that an Angus breeders association is unfairly discriminating between the two.

The government says an An-

gus is an Angus no matter how it's produced, and the Angus Breeders Association has been placing unfair restrictions on those that have been bred by artificial insemination.

The government said in papers filed in U.S. District Court in Kansas City, the association re-

fuses to register artificially conceived purebred Angus cattle in the nation. The Justice Department charged it with violating federal antitrust laws.

The association verifies the pedigrees of the American Angus breed and issues a certificate of registration for each animal. But if a calf has been conceived through artificial insemination, the association will not register the animal unless the owner of the sire has obtained an artificial breeding permit from the association, the government said.

The Justice Department asked the court to forbid the association to impose any restriction on the registration of such calves. The government noted in 1966 nearly 8 million cattle were bred artificially in this country.

'Bargaining Power' More Than A Phrase?

—But Who Has A Concrete Plan?

Will farmers get more "bargaining power" this year?

The current holding action of the National Farmers Organization is aimed at giving farmers "muscle in the market place," a goal the NFO has singly-mindedly aimed at since its inception.

It is the NFO which has given bargaining power its most attention, altho other sources have taken up the phrase as the NFO has taken a bona fide place among those organizations which say they speak for farmers.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman has openly talked about bargaining power in the past year, saying "we've gone about as far as we can under existing government programs." But Secretary Freeman has never put forth even the vaguest outline of a concrete program.

The Farm Bureau also has talked of farm bargaining power, altho its members doubtless have different ideas of what bargaining power is than the NFO. The Grange and Farmers Union talk of bargaining power

too, and they have their own ideas about it.

The least vague about bargaining power is the NFO. What that organization has in mind is a plan to organize farmers to the extent that they can hold farm animals and grains from the market until they can get the price they want. They would force processors to enter into contracts to buy their products at "fair" prices.

The NFO has restated what a farmer has long griped about: the feeling that he is the only businessman who takes his products to market and says, "What'll you give me?" yet when he goes to buy he must say, "What do you charge?"

The farmer, it is contended, sells on a wholesale market and buys on a retail market. Industry might not agree that the farmer is the only businessman who finds himself in such a bind, but that is the way the farmer sees it.

The bargaining power way, then, is the way out? One group, clearly self-appointed but with some claim to being expert, has said recently that actually forming a plan for bargaining might be considerably more difficult than making up the phrase.

The National Planning Association — an organization whose name suggests that it is not exactly on the conservative side — concluded that "the possibilities for improving farm income through market bargaining are limited and are confined largely to specialized groups of commodity producers, usually in compact geographical areas."

The group contended that any organization that fixes prices must also have control of production. For this reason, it said, it still is necessary to retain government controls on farm output.

The planning association went into considerable detail in an effort to explain differences between farming and labor when it comes to collective bargaining.

Among factors mentioned were the following:

- Strikes are common and frequently a necessary means of wielding power in labor bargaining. They are less feasible in farming, because withholding products usually is both more difficult and more costly than withholding labor.

- If a particular bargain raises wages or prices, but nothing else is done, more men or products usually will be available than employers or buyers wish to use. Some way of insulating this surplus from the market is essential.

- In labor it is fairly easy to enforce the contract wage, and employers hire only as many men as they want at that wage. Thus decisions of employers perform the function of supply control. In agriculture, in con-

trast, a high price usually will not stand up when farmers have unsold products on hand. Producers must control supply either by restricting production or by diverting output from the market. A withholding action by farmers perhaps can force prices up, but the price gains cannot be held unless subsequent market supplies are in some way controlled.

- There is also the problem of deciding who will work and who will sell his products when total supply exceeds the amount the market will take. The usual proposal in farming is to assign quotas. In industrial labor, the seniority rule is the rationing device. On the other hand, if the employer hires to replace retirees or for other reasons he makes the decision as to who gets the job.

Western Farm Show At K.C. February 26-28

The Western Farm Show, the largest indoor farm machinery show in the nation, is scheduled for Kansas City February 26-27-28 in the American Royal Exposition Building.

The show, sponsored by the Western Retail Implement and Hardware Association, was attended by 52,000 persons in 1967.

All eight of the major tractor and combine manufacturers and dozens of the short-line companies will display their latest equipment for every type of farming operation.

While no charge is made for the show, free admittance tickets are necessary and may be obtained from dealer members of the association.

Kansas Ranks Third In Total Cropland

Only Texas and Montana have more land in farms than does Kansas. The latest reckoning by the Kansas Crop Reporting Service places the figure for the state at 50.1 million acres.

The trend to fewer but larger farms continues. The service said the number of farms in the state for 1968 is estimated at 91,000, a decline of two percent from the figure of 93,000

a year ago.

The size of the average farm in Kansas in 1968 is estimated at 551 acres compared with 539 acres in 1967.

In 1950 there were 50.5 million acres of land in farms in Kansas. The average farm totaled 374 acres and there were 135,000 farms in the state.

CANTON VOTERS ELECT TO KEEP SCHOOLS

CANTON — Patrons of the unified school district have voted against closing three attendance centers — a high school at Galva, a grade school northeast of Galva, and a grade school south of Canton. The district board said any further effort to close the schools will have to come from the state, not the school district.

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Few Sheep On Feed

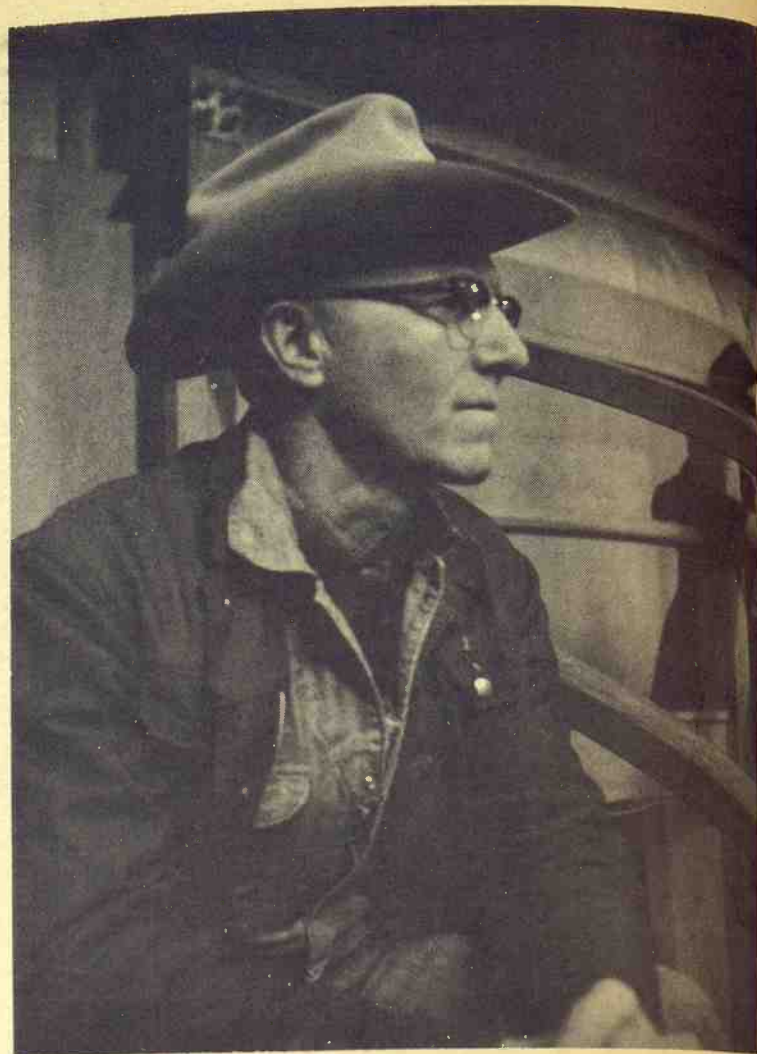
There are about 17 percent less sheep and old crop lambs on feed than a year ago. The Livestock Reporting Service says the current number is about 9,000 head — only about one-third of the 1962-66 average and the smallest since records started in 1930.

There were 43,000 sheep and lambs being fed by large operators either in feedlots or grazing wheat, sorghum stubble or beet tops. This is 23 percent less than the 56,000 head being fed by large operators a year ago.

For the U.S. as a whole, sheep and lambs on feed were 9 percent below a year earlier, the current figure being 2.9 million.

On Substitutes For Farm Products

Finding new uses for farm products has long been a popular subject for articles and speeches for farm audiences. Such writings and talks often tell of the wonderful new products and benefits that will result from the use of farm products in industrial processes.

On the other hand, the development of substitutes for agricultural materials has never been a popular subject. Yet, perhaps we should recognize that much of our economic progress since pioneer times has come directly from the production and use of substitutes for plant and animal products.

Farmers are among the biggest users of substitutes. Their tractors are replacements for horses. The fuel used in tractors has replaced the grains, hay, and pasture formerly required by the horses. Automobiles and trucks — used by farmers and others — are also substitutes for farm products, as is the fuel used in these machines. Fifty years ago, the production of 90 million acres, one-fourth of our cropland, was used for producing feed for horses and mules.

Commercial fertilizers are an-

other substitute for farm products. Each year, farmers spend millions of dollars for nitrogen and other fertilizer materials. The nitrogen is obtained from the air by industrial processes. Fifty years ago, farmers obtained most of the nitrogen that they needed by growing clovers and other legumes.

In pioneer times, wood was the principal building material — in town as well as on farm. Many modern buildings use little or no wood, being made of steel, aluminum, concrete, brick and glass.

The furnishings in early homes were made largely from plant and animal products. Most of the furniture was made of wood. Other articles were made of cotton, wool, linen, silk, horsehair, and feathers. Now, much of our furniture is made of steel, aluminum, and plastics. The feather bed was replaced by a cotton mattress — replaced, in turn, by steel springs, sponge rubber, and plastic foam. The plant and animal fibers have been replaced by rayon, nylon, polyesters, and other synthetic fibers.

There are also substitutes for feeds and foods. Farmers use

urea, an industrial product, as a substitute for farm-produced protein in the rations of beef and dairy cattle. They also use synthetic vitamins in animal feeds.

In some cases, cheaper farm products have been substituted for more expensive ones. An outstanding example is the use of margarine in the place of butter. Margarine is made largely from soybean and cottonseed oils, which cost less than one-fourth as much to produce as butterfat. Today, we also have substitutes for cream and milk — even for meats, such as pork and chicken.

The coming of cheaper substitutes always hurts some people, but the losses are more than offset by the gains for the nation as a whole.

3 cups coconut bar cookie crumbs ("We used to call these washboard cookies")
Cream oleo, sugar and eggs. Blend in nuts, chocolate and crumbs. Spread in 8x8-inch greased pan. Bake at 350 degrees about 30 minutes. Cool and cut into bars. * * * *

STRAWBERRY DESSERT-CAKE
Mix one package of white cake mix as directed and bake. While cake is baking mix 2 packages of strawberry gelatin with 2 cups hot water. Let stand at room temperature. When cake is done immediately punch full of holes with a fork . . . the more holes the better. Pour the gelatin over the cake and refrigerate. "I set mine in the freezer unit for a few minutes until it is completely chilled." Whip two packages of prepared topping. Add 1 package of thawed frozen strawberries to the whip and spread over the top of the chilled cake. Return to refrigerator and let stand for two or three hours before serving. Makes 12 to 15 large servings. * * * *

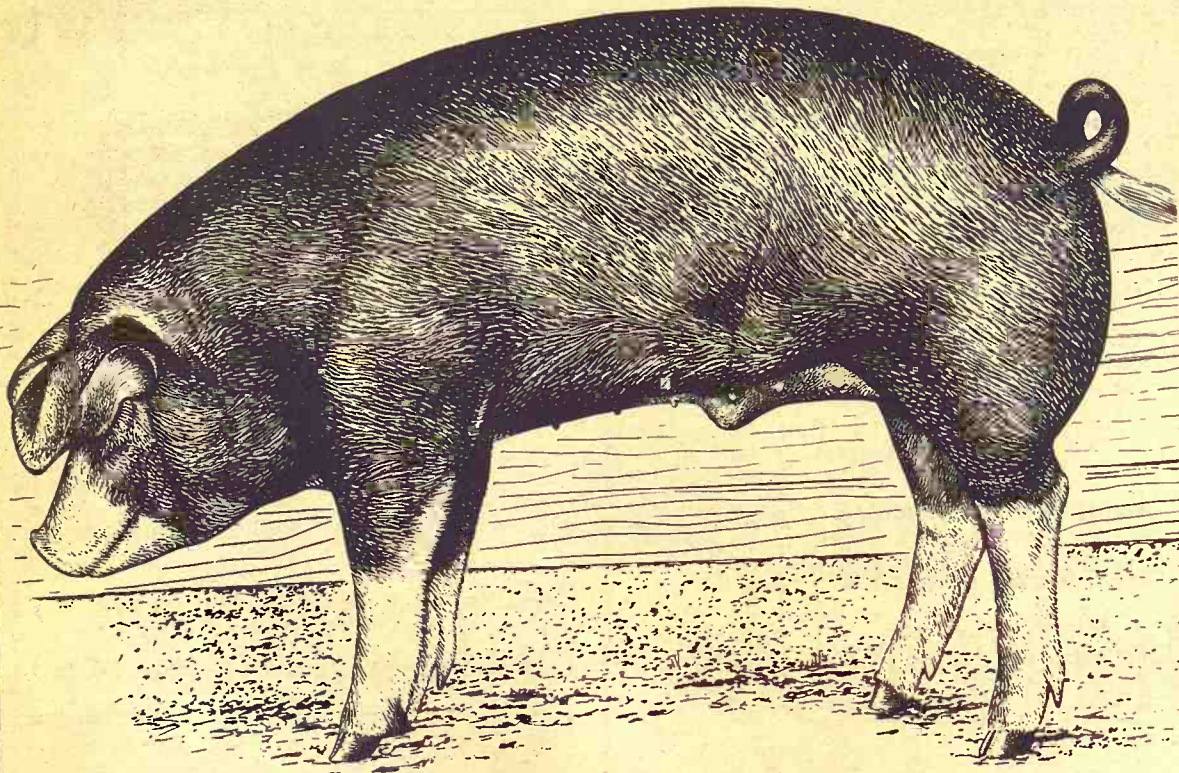

1 teaspoon salt
dash pepper
½ teaspoon oregano, crushed
¼ cup green pepper stripes
1 can (10¼ ounces) beef gravy
¼ cup chopped fresh tomatoes
4 servings instant mashed potatoes, prepared
Parmesan cheese
Mix thoroughly meat, salt, pepper, and ¼ teaspoon oregano. Shape into 16 meatballs. In skillet, brown meatballs and cook green pepper until tender. Pour off fat. Stir in gravy and remaining oregano. Cover; cook over low heat 15 minutes. Add tomatoes; cook uncovered five minutes longer. Stir now and then. Serve with a border of mashed potatoes sprinkled with Parmesan cheese. Serves four.

Good Way To Arrange Shelves In Medicine Chest

Lowest Milk Output Since '52

The nation's milk production in 1967 declined to the lowest level since 1952. Production was put at 119,583,000,000 pounds, down one percent from last year's 120,230,000,000 pounds. Output was sharply lower than the 1961-65 average of 125,660,000,000 pounds.

The decline in production parallels a downturn of many years in the number of dairy farms as well as in dairy cows. Farm officials said generally unfavorable returns from dairy is a major factor in the situation. Little if any increase is expected this year.

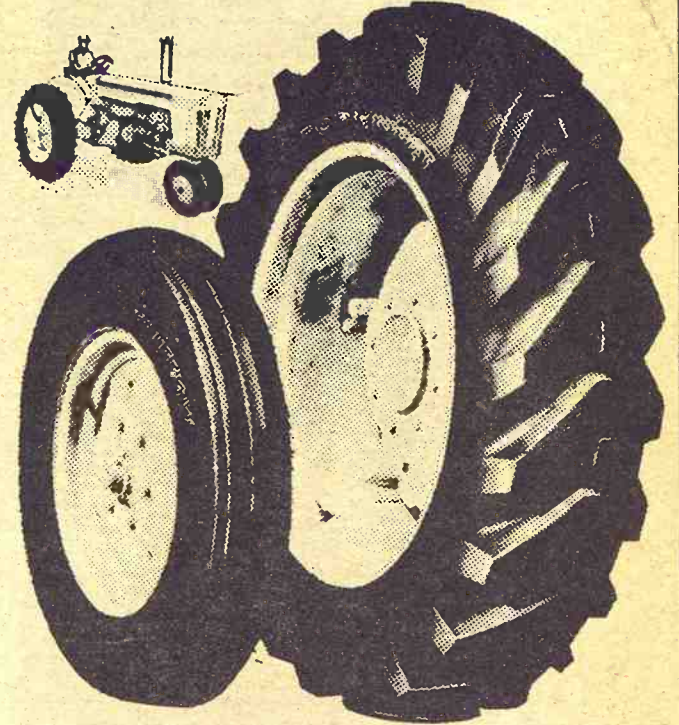

Simplify Drivers License System

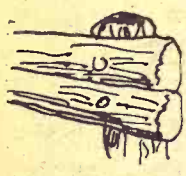
Kansas has begun a new system of numbering drivers' licenses and within two years the old system using 19 digits on each license will be eliminated. Motor Vehicle Supt. L. A. (Bud) Billings said the first of the new licenses was presented to Gov. Robert Docking. The new serial numbers have only 6 digits instead of 19.

The Motor Vehicle Department said the new code will make it easier for police and

other persons taking down drivers' license numbers. There also will be less chance of error.

"Starting this month drivers' license renewals will have the new identification number. It will take two years before the cycle is completed and all persons have a new identification number," Billings said.

An example of a drivers' license number under the new system is D-E L-4 N-T, Billings said. This compares with an old code number: 710080-1913370-414281. The old code numbers included the driver's date of birth.

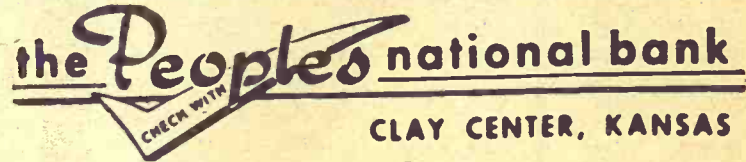

Cattle On Feed At 610,000

The state set a new high Jan. 1 in the number of cattle and calves on grain feed for the slaughter market, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says.

The total on that date was 610,000 head, up 4 percent from a year earlier and up about a third from the Jan. 1 average for the 1962-66 period. The total included 328,000 head on feed in commercial-sized lots of 1000 or more capacity, and that

figure also reflected a new high. Farm type feeding operations accounted for 272,000 head, down about one per cent from a year ago. Marketings of grain-fed cattle for slaughter totaled 285,000

head, up 10 percent from last year. Cattle and calves placed on feed during the quarter totaled 427,000, compared with 370,000 a year earlier.

The feeder stock included 447,000 steers and steer calves — up 10,000 from last year — and 163,000 heifers and heifer calves, up 14,000.

Cheer In Cowherd Cutback

The U.S. Agriculture Department reports there were 5 per cent more heifers and heifer calves on feed for the slaughter market on Jan. 1 than a year earlier.

This indicates the nation's beef cattle breeding may decline this year and possibly next.

This, coupled with the lighter weight of cattle and calves on feed at the beginning of the year, also indicated beef supplies during the first half of

the year may ease off a little from the first half of 1967.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on Jan. 1 in the 32 major feeding states totaled 11,297,000 head, 2 percent more than a year earlier and a seasonal increase of 31 per cent from the 8,591,000 head on feed Oct. 1, 1967.

Marketings of fed cattle for slaughter during October-December 1967 totaled 5,237,000 head — 4 percent above the same quarter of 1966. Fed cattle marketings were up 7 percent in the north central states but down 2 percent in the western states.

Cattle and calves placed on feed during October-December totaled 7,943,000 head, an increase of 3 percent from the same period of 1966. Placements were up 1 percent in the North Central States, up 5 percent in the western states.

The number of head in each weight group and the percentage change from Jan. 1, 1966 are as follows: under 500

pounds, 1,864,000 head, down less than 1 per cent; 500-699 pounds, 3,013,000 head, up 10 per cent; 700-899 pounds, 3,606,000 head, down 2 percent; 900-1099 pounds, 2,427,000 head, up 2 percent; 1100 or more pounds, 387,000 head, down 15 percent.

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Big Farmers shift to Renting— One-Seventh Control Half Of Output

Farm economists don't really see big corporations running farms in the U.S. in the future, but they do see big farms run by men who see farming less as a way of life and more as a highly technical business.

Figures from the college of agriculture at Kansas State University suggest this trend has already started to a degree yet largely unnoticed.

Dr. Carroll Hess, dean of the K-State school, cites the fact that the top 13 per cent of today's farms, about 400,000, sell over half of the U. S. farm products and represent nearly half the purchasing power for farm supplies.

Another change is the increase in farming rented land. There is no stigma in tenant farming, and more land is be-

ing farmed by non-owners than ever before in history.

The big changes have not been in the land base. Even tho the government has paid farmers to idle some land, the total amount devoted to farming — crops, pasture and timber — is not far from what it used to be.

The acreage actually devoted to cultivated crops has been reduced some, but as mechanization has increased, farmers have concentrated these crops on the more fertile and more nearly level areas while the hilly and eroded land has been shifted to pasture and trees.

The number of farms has been going down for years. At the same time, average size of farms has been increasing and the land area being farmed is down only slightly from what it used to be.

What's happened is that farm owners in many cases operate their own land and all they can rent in addition. Or, "tenants" become big operators by renting large acreages and putting their capital into items of production rather than into land.

It may seem ironic, in view of the tradition of man to want to own his own farm, but a recent study shows that only 7 per cent of fully-owned farms had sales of more than \$20,000 a year, while 24 per cent of the part owners and 16 per cent of the tenants were in this high economic class.

The trend in farming is toward part ownership — that is a man owns some land and rents additional. Presently one-fourth of the nation's farmers are part owners, but they operate one-half the land in farms, renting about 60 percent of the acreage they manage. On the other hand, about one-half of the nation's farmers own thier

land fully and operate that land, but they have only a little more than one-fourth the acreage.

About 500,000 farmers in the nation rent all the land they operate.

The award was given Brummell, past president of the association, for his work in conservation, his activities in the Kansas Contractors Association and on the State Water Resources Board.



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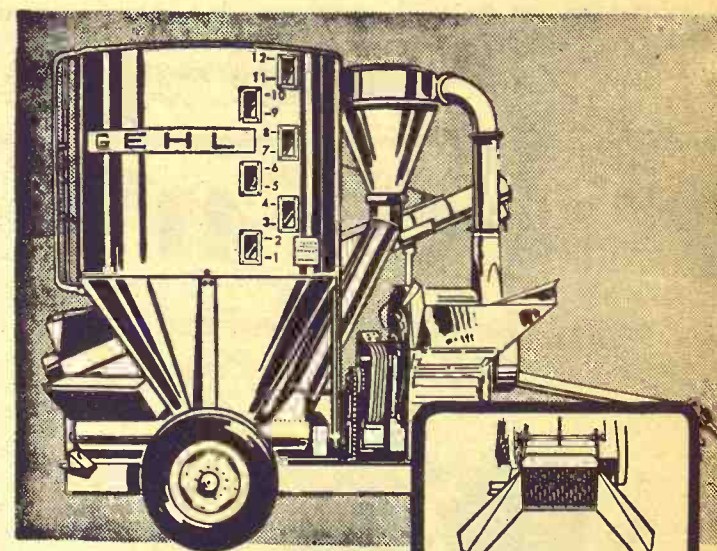

Continue Gain In Farm Power

Farm use of electricity con-
tinues to increase as rural resi-
dents turn more and more to
labor-saving machinery and
convenience devices.

The Agriculture department
reports that farms used an av-
erage of 775 kilowatt hours of
electrical power a month in 1967
compared with 749 in 1966. Us-
age ranged from a monthly av-
erage of 3500 in California to
350 in West Virginia.

The average monthly electri-
cal bill in 1967 was \$16.80, up
20 cents from the 1966 average.
In the Pacific coast region, the
monthly average was \$42.10.
The lowest average was \$10.70
in the East South Central re-
gion.

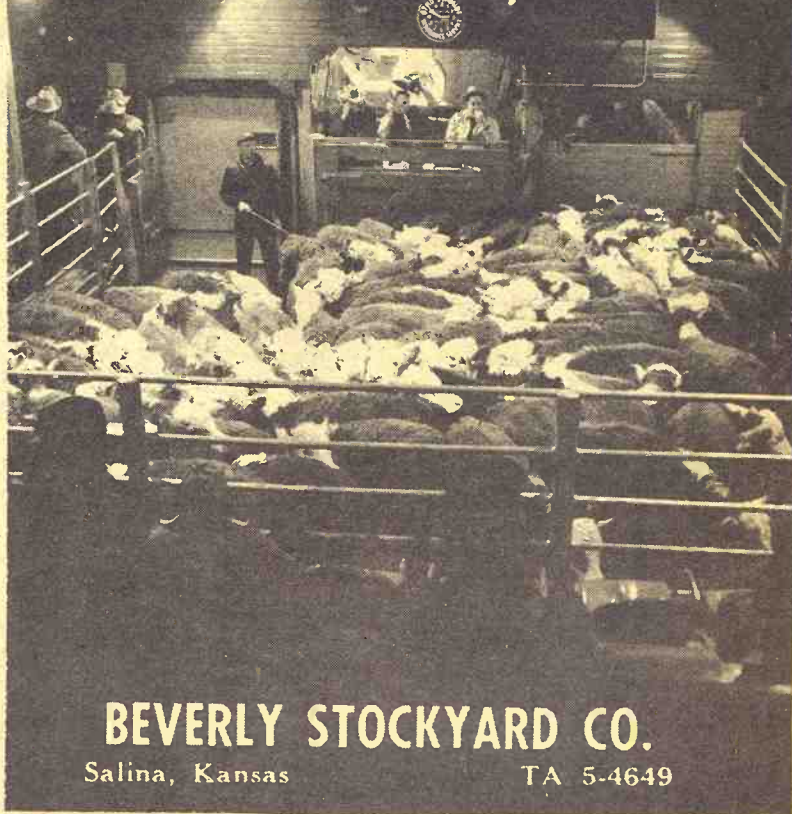

How To Find A Ranch Manager?

by Larry S. Hefty

Where will future ranch managers come from? Currently the supply of managers is barely meeting the demand. More college educated men such as Pat Koons, a 1964 graduate of Kansas State University, are needed in the cattle business.

Born near Council Grove and a member of 4-H and FFA during his high school years, Koons did not fit or show cattle for projects.

But Don Good, head of the Animal Husbandry Department, and Miles McKee, then herdsman of the KSU beef cattle herd began to bring out Koons' qualities as a cattleman and showman when he entered K-State in 1959.

At K-State Koons learned much from Good and McKee. In 1963, he was the Grand Champion Beef Showman and

Grand Champion Showman at the KSU Little American Royal. In 1962 he was high individual in the Jr. Division Livestock contest and the next year one of the five high individuals in the Sr. Division of livestock judging. He won the Jr. Beef Bulls showmanship class.

Miles McKee said "Pat also helped students ready their animals for shows like the Little American Royal. Pat worked his way through college at the beef barns and was always ready to help others." "Assisting Miles in fitting the cattle for shows such as the National Western Livestock Show, Denver, and the American Royal, Kansas City, was good training," said Koons.

After graduating from KSU in 1964, Koons entered the Army and served as an MP at Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio, Tex-

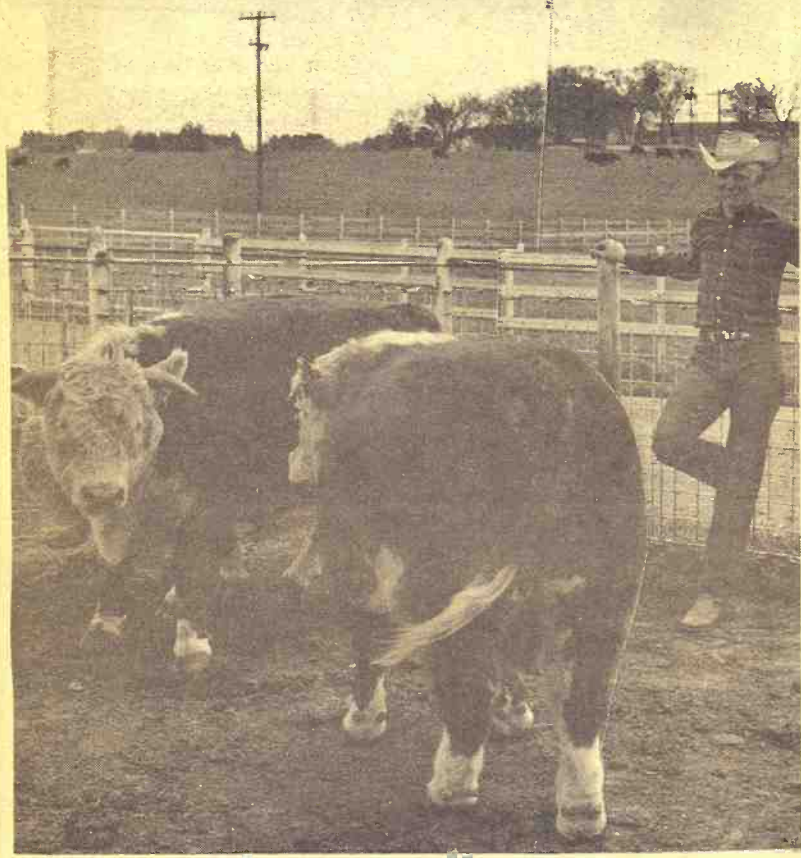
as. In June 1966 he was released and took a job on the Dewey Ranch, south of Manhattan. While there, he worked with their purebred Hereford herd. In May 1967 he accepted management of the OK Ranch near Junction City.

It is Koons' responsibility to supervise the management of 2200 acres of irrigated farm land, and 200 head of registered and commercial cows. It is the goal of Koons and Winton Winter, ranch owner, to develop one of the top pure breed herds in Kansas. "Eventually after we show cattle at cattle shows and fairs, we hope to establish a reputation as raising a premium product at OK Ranch," said Pat.

One of the problems facing Koons on the ranch was the quality of cattle. He sold those and bought replacement breeding stock which he feels will be popular in the future. Don Good said, "Pat is quick to make decisions. He keeps up-to-date on his purebred production practices and knows the needs of his industry as far as beef cattle breeding is concerned."

"In the future, I think the cattle business will have to become more organized. Feed lots, commercial herds and purebred herds will be organized to protect themselves from low prices," Pat mentioned. Talking of the labor shortage throughout the Flint Hills, he noted that when a laborer receives enough training to be given a great responsibility, he feels he might as well be on his own or a manager himself.

The responsibility Pat Koons shoulders as a manager indicates his success at what he loves to do. His field of work is dominated by veterans of 20 to 40 years experience; however, they are looking for more young men of his caliber to insure a better beef industry of tomorrow.

Delay Feed-Grain Payments?

The Johnson administration is considering withholding payments normally made to farmers when they sign for government programs in February and March, Cowles publications reported.

A copyrighted story in the Des Moines Register and the Washington Post quoted a leading agriculture official in Washington as saying the decision is being discussed at the highest levels of government, with the Bureau of the Budget and the White House involved.

The story quoted an unidentified USDA official as saying, "The administration could ease

its budgetary problems by delaying these payments until the new fiscal year beginning July 1, 1968. By so doing, the government could ease the deficit in fiscal 1968 and cut down on government interest costs."

The story added: "Thousands of feed-grain farmers will have to borrow additional money this spring if the Johnson administration follows

through on its tentative decision to withhold price-support payments until later in the year."

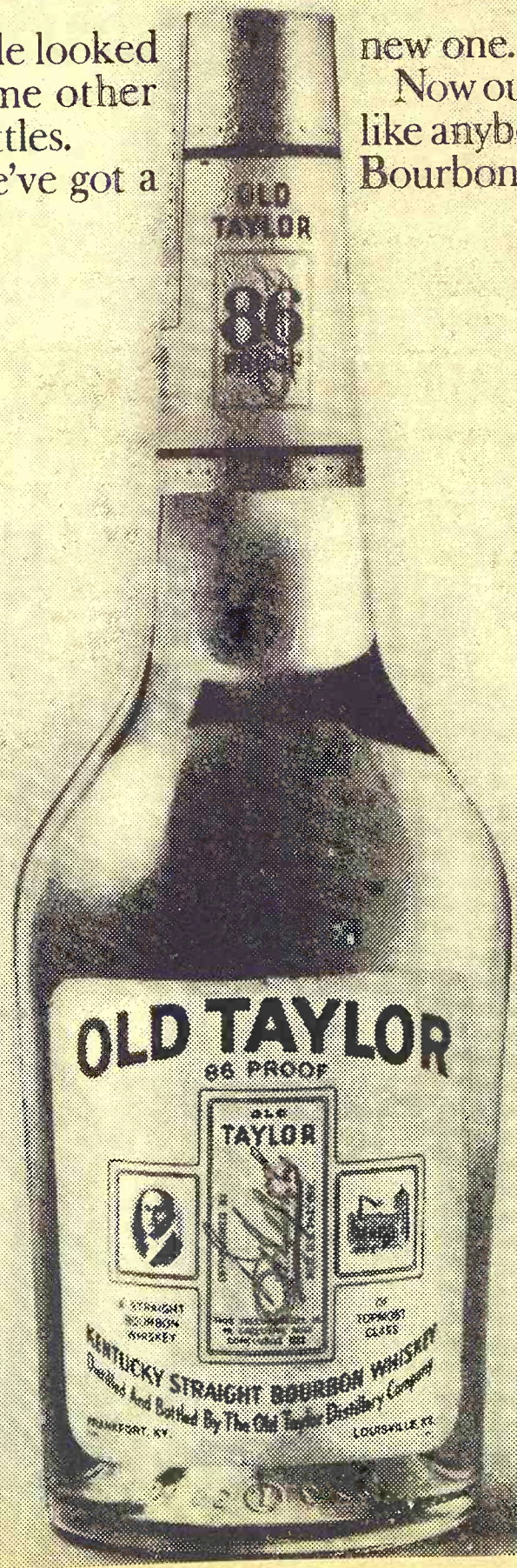

Some Favor To Limit Payments, Get Government In Farm-Buying Business

There is a new move in the federal government to cut down on payments USDA makes in crop-control programs, in the opinion of AP farm writer Ovid Martin.

Martin noted in a recent column that a commission set up to study rural poverty suggested that the government might

get into the farm-buying and farm-selling business.

Advocates see that method of helping poor farmers get out of agriculture to enable others to enlarge units so they can stay on the land and make a living.

Currently production control programs cost the federal treas-

ury some \$3.5 billion a year, but the commission noted that 10 percent of the small wheat growers got only 1.5 percent of the total payments since 1960, while the top 10 percent got 44 percent of the benefits.

The figures for cotton growers were even more extreme.

One single-farm payment totaled \$2.8 million and nine farms got over a million dollars.

USDA officials do not look very favorably on limiting payments. They argue slashing benefits to big farms would tend to drive them out of the production-control programs and thus cripple efforts to prevent overproduction.

But noting the public concern over the size of payments, the commission recommended that the secretary of agriculture have some authority to fix limits on total farm program payments. In meeting the needs of the low income farmers, the commission said there is need for programs that would help those who want to leave farming for new non-farm opportunities. It said these farmers should be allowed to sell their farms — usually inadequate in size and inefficiently operated — to the government.

The government in turn would be directed to sell these units to operators of other inadequate units who want to remain in agriculture.

Such a farm-enlargement program would require greatly expanded government credit facilities.

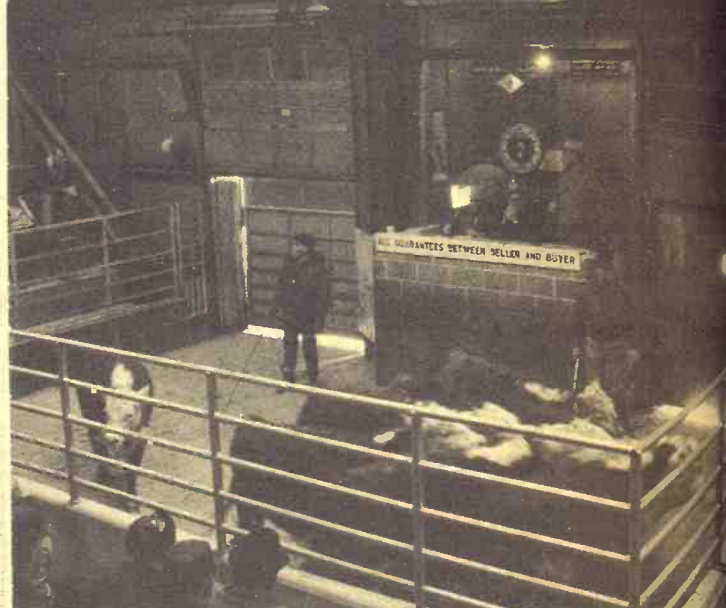

The national NFO board has declared a grain holding action effective this month. "The NFO is giving farmers an opportunity to stop their present low prices," Evertson said. The board has advised members to hold grain for the following prices: Yellow corn, \$1.50 per bushel; white corn, \$1.70;

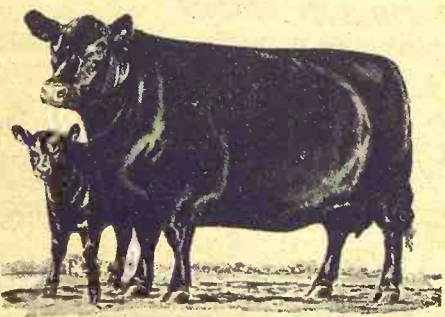

Heifer Test: Weaning Weight Of First Calf

The weaning weight of a beef calf from a first-calf heifer is a predictor of weight of future products of that heifer. On the average, this prediction is about 46 percent accurate, Dr. Keith O. Zoellner, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University, says.

The prediction is on the repeatability of traits in the calves. Conformation predictability is 19 to 21 percent - not as accurate as weaning weight.

First-calf heifers in experiments that first produced calves of good grade also produced good-grading calves later. However, with low predictability of conformation, some deviation is expected in a herd.

Continued emphasis on seed quality will be the theme for the annual Kansas Crop Improvement Association meeting Friday, February 2, on the Kansas State University campus, reports Howard D. Wilkins, secretary-treasurer of the organization.

The 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. program in Umberger Hall will include several crop improvement reports and a business meeting. The noon luncheon at the Student Union will feature presentations of two premier seed grower awards to outstanding producers.

James Enix, USDA grain marketing specialist at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, will discuss the growing "Cost of Seed Processing."

K-State will be represented on the program by Dr. Richard Vanderlip, research agronomist, discussing "Variability in Seed Production," and Ted L. Walter, crop testing agronomist, reviewing the "New Crop Variety Roundup."

Wilkins will also make his annual business report on the past year's operation of the KCIA during the business meeting.

Membership in the organization, started in 1905, now exceeds 2000. This self-supporting organization consists of farmers and businessmen interested in the production and distribution of pure seed of known superior heredity, says John Hammon, Valley Falls, president of the group. O. R. Caldwell, Emporia, is vice president.

Secretary Wilkins indicates that each member of the KCIA is entitled to a free luncheon

ticket, and may secure extra tickets for guests at a nominal cost. Non-members are also welcome to attend the sessions, he says.

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Less Sweeping Corporation Farm Bill Under Study In Senate Committee

TOPEKA — The Kansas Senate debated and sent back to its judiciary committee last week a bill that would have permitted an increase from 10 to 15 in the number of stockholders in a corporation allowed to engage in farming in Kansas.

Sen. Steadman Ball, R-Atchison, argued against referring the bill back to committee, saying that the committee had al-

ready given enough consideration to it and that he did not know what more the committee could do. Ball is chairman of the committee.

Ball said the bill was "not the same thing that the unrestricted corporation farming bill was." He said it would not have permitted an expansion of the acreage to be farmed by corporations.

He said it merely permitted an increase of five in the number of persons who may hold stock in a corporation engaged in farming.

Ball cited a hypothetical case of a stockholder living in another state who owns stock in a family-type corporation which has 10 stockholders. He said that if the out-of-state stockholder dies and leaves stock to three persons, the corporation would be unlawfully engaged in farming because it would have more than 10 stockholders.

But Sen. Charles Joseph, D-Potwin, argued it could be opening the door to farming in Kansas by even larger corporations. He added he wants a more careful look at it.

The senate then voted to refer the bill back to the judiciary committee.

Gain In Underground Irrigation Setups

MANHATTAN — Underground irrigation systems are gaining popularity in Kansas and are being installed at the rate of about 1 million linear feet each year. Some advantages are given by Lynn R. Shuyler, Extension irrigation engin-

eer at Kansas State University.

Pipes buried below frost line will save labor of moving surface lines and release ditched areas for cultivation. Water lost by seepage or evaporation is practically eliminated with buried systems, and Shuyler says this saving alone can help irrigators stretch their water supply to 10-20 percent more acres.

An underground system, if feasible, may cut expenses enough to interest many irrigators.

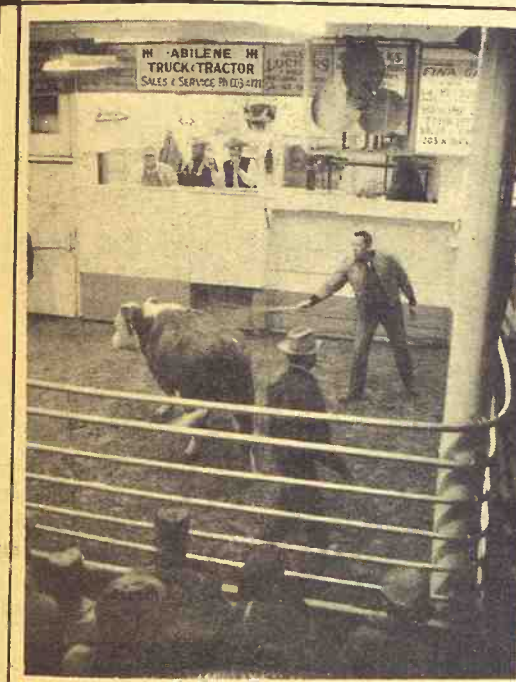

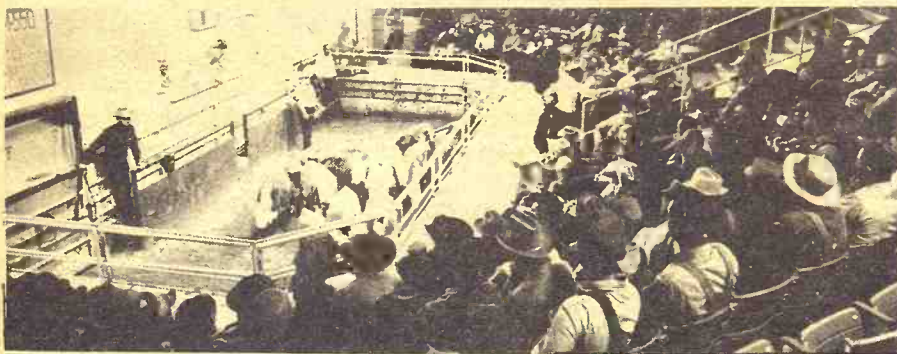
