 do not give little if any relief  
 to the inconvenience of the  
 radiator in the shop. It is  
 that the steam pipe fills with  
 water and all has to be  
 through the radiator before it  
 can be heated. It takes nearly an  
 hour of connection to heat them  
 up. There are several small holes  
 which annoy and the valves  
 need packing, & work, in various  
 places. We have no other now  
 for two weeks except fine for sending.
