


Cattle - January's Work and Talk

Less Cost, Fewer Problems In Salt As Best Ice-Melter On Roadways

While the use of salt to de-ice slick highways is coming under attack in other states, local environmentalists generally agree not enough salt is used in this area to cause serious polluting.

In many states, environmentalists claim highway salt is a harmful pollutant that contaminates groundwater supplies, poisons roadside vegetation and endangers fish and animal life.

Several states have banned the use of de-icing salts except at major intersections and steep inclines.

Kansas uses less salt than many other states, primarily because there are fewer snowstorms. For this reason, road maintenance officials and environmentalists agree there is no need to curtail use of highway salt in Kansas.

A spokesman for the state highway maintenance division said a mixture of sand and salt is spread on

highways during snowstorms.

When the snow stops, highway cleanup consists of spreading salt to melt any ice. If temperatures are extremely cold, salt is mixed with calcium chloride. The calcium is to keep the salt from freezing.

Sand is spread on streets and highways primarily to provide traction, while salt is used for melting.

"Overall, I think salt's the most economical and it's the only thing that really does the job—other than the sun," said George Wilton, superintendent of maintenance for Wichita.

Wilton said street salt has these advantages over sand, especially after the snow and ice has melted:

- Sand must be picked up with street sweepers while salt dissolves, saving the city additional labor costs.

- Sanded intersections often are slippery, but salted intersections are not hazardous.

- Dry sand kicked up into windshields can be more hazardous than dry salt spray, which impairs visibility.

A disadvantage of salt, Wilton said, is that it freezes in extremely cold weather, requiring several applications.

"I don't think the amount of salt we use contributes to pollution, although I know there's been a lot of controversy over it (nationwide)," Wilton said.

George Potts, environmentalist and science instructor at Wichita's North High School, agrees the advantages of salting streets outweigh the disadvantages.

Salt, used in large quantities, could increase salinity of the Arkansas River, Potts said. "But sand also would fill in the bottom of the river, to a degree, so it probably would be just as detrimental as salt."

"No more than we use salt in this area I can't see that it would be detrimental," Potts concluded.

Jim Aiken, director of environmental health for the city-

county health department, said he was unaware of any harmful effects from use of salt on city and county roads.

Salting may even be beneficial on county roads by reducing vegetation that must be kept out of ditches anyway, Aiken said.

Salt runoff into the Arkansas River from city storm sewers isn't harmful, he continued, because the river already has extremely high chloride content.

The river's primary source of "natural" salt is one of its tributaries—Rattlesnake Creek near Great Bend—which flows through a heavy concentration of salt, Aiken explained.

"I can't see where the salt would have any great adverse impact, even on fish in the river," Aiken concluded.

Wilton and state maintenance officials agree salt causes structural damage to roads and highways. "There's no question but what salt does some damage but I don't think anyone knows how much," said Wilton.

Salt, the officials said, may accelerate street deterioration by seeping through expansion joints and adding rust to steel undergirders.

A state maintenance official summed up the merits of treating slick streets with salt instead of sand:

"We know salt doesn't do any of the roads any good. But the public demands good roads they can get around on, and salting is the only feasible method we've found for

melting. If we were confined to sand, many roads would be closed for weeks."

6 Counties For Area Development

MANHATTAN—Dr. Robert Newsome of Manhattan, director of the Riley County extension service, has been elected chairman of a six-county planning and coordinating council organized here.

Cosponsored by the Manhattan and Junction City's chambers of commerce, the council will promote economic and social conditions of the area.

All 41 communities within a 30-mile radius of Junction City and Manhattan have been invited to affiliate with the group. Riley, Pottawatomie, Wabaunsee, Geary, Dickinson and Clay counties are included.

Other officers elected were Rod

Wilson of Clay Center, vice chairman, and Lud Fiser of Manhattan secretary-treasurer.

Wilson and Fiser are managers of chambers of commerce.

Cities represented at organizational meeting were Junction City, Manhattan, Clay Center, Paxico, Wakefield, Olathe, St. Marys and St. George.

The group will discuss formation of a regional planning commission for the six-county area Feb. 20 in Manhattan. Federal funds are available for such a commission.



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
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Average Kansas Farm Now 587 Acres

The number of farms in Kansas in 1972 is estimated at 85,000, down slightly from last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Farm numbers are 1,000 fewer than in 1971 and 20,000 fewer than 10

years earlier. Farm numbers have declined steadily since 1935 when there were 175,000 farms.

The average size of farm in 1972 is 587 acres, compared with 580 acres in 1971. The current average size farm is more than double the 274

acres in 1935.

Total land in farms in 1972 is estimated at 49.9 million acres, unchanged from 1971 and down only a little from the State's peak of 50.5 million acres in the 1950's.

Kansas ranks third among the 50 States in acreage of land in farms and fourteenth in number of farms.

United States

A total of 2,831,410 farm units are expected to be in operation in the U.S. during 1972. This is a 2 percent decline from 1971.

The 1972 preliminary estimate of land in farms is 1,114,198,000 acres, more than 3 million acres less than in 1971. The past decade showed a 25 percent decline in number of farms while land in farms decreased 4

percent.

The continued disappearance of small farms along with mergers into larger, more efficient operations contributed most to the change in farm numbers. Urbanization and highway construction were the major causes of decline in land in farms.

Co-ops Dot List Of Major Kansas Business Concerns

Several G&G area co-ops are among the biggest merchandisers in the state, according to an annual list from the College of Business at Kansas State University.

The compilation of the KSU college concerns business statistics for 1970 of firms that are Kansas-headquartered or do most of their business in Kansas. The lists are not complete but contain records from state firms whose records are available.

Many leading merchandisers—roughly translated as retailers—were cooperatives. Biggest of the bunch was Farmway Cooperative of Beloit, which ranked 9th in the state. The Osborne co-op rated 15th among merchandisers. The co-op at Clay

Center was 18th and the Robinson co-op in Brown county ranked 23rd. Thirteen of the top 25 merchandisers listed were co-ops, most of them from western Kansas.

Co-operative electrics and telephone firms also filled the list of top 25 utilities. Biggest was the electric co-op at Scott City. The electric co-op at Great Bend ranked 8th in the state; at Mankato, 13th; Council Grove, 16th; Wellington 19th; Eldorado, 20th; Hutchinson, 21st; Cedar Vale, 22nd; Girard, 23rd; and Iola, 25th. A telephone cooperative, the Craw-Kan at Girard, was the 11th ranking utility.

Among industrial outfits, the National cooperative Refinery at McPherson ranked 5th and the Cooperative Farm Chemicals Association at Lawrence, 10th.

The top 25 merchandisers on the College of Business report had a profit of 11.9 percent on equity, higher than the average rate in the U.S., Joseph Barton-Dobenin, who compiles the K-State report, said.

The utilities' margin—14.9 percent on equity—was also better than the national average. Sixteen of the top 25 utilities were co-ops.

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Pearson Deplores Lag In Funding For Watersheds

A backlog of watershed districts awaiting federal funding has been deplored by Sen. James Pearson, R-Kan.

In remarks prepared for the Kansas Conservation Contractors convention at the Hilton, Pearson said about 50 Kansas watershed districts have been authorized but need federal funding for construction.

Pearson expressed pleasure that the Office of Management and Budget has released about \$55 million for expenditure of the full congressional appropriation for the Rural Environmental Assistance Program.

But the state's senior senator said he regrets "that Congress has not made available more than \$35 million required to meet federal obligations to the Kansas small watershed program.

"Federal funding simply has not been equal to demonstrated need. Each of the 50 watersheds needs from one to 40 reservoirs," Pearson said.

"The federal commitment, which I view as a moral commitment if not a contractual one, must be met. The decline in appropriations for watershed construction in recent years reflects more than anything else a congressional preoccupation with the ills of great metropolitan centers."

Pearson pledged that he will continue to fight for full rural development.

Most of his remarks dealt with "the American land, our most precious heritage."

Among other things, Pearson noted that concern for the land dates back to the nation's beginning when George Washington, in 1789, wrote about land use management.

Turning to the dust bowl days of the 1930s, Pearson said:

"As the good soil disappeared, so did many of the people, leaving behind their homes, hopes and possessions. This was human erosion.

"We ruin men, too, when we ruin the land. We're learning to live with nature, not against her. The plains will have another drought, the tallgrass prairie regions will have other floods, but another dust bowl need not occur. The heavy rains need not destroy communities and wash our heritage into the sea."

Redcedar Still Popular For Windbreak Tree

A hardy, multi-purpose tree, the eastern redcedar is available to the public again this year through Kansas State University's tree distribution program.

The redcedar, which grows in

each of the state's 105 counties, is Kansas' only native evergreen. At one time, it was considered the best Christmas tree.

Now it is more popular in windbreak plantings — one in every three trees now planted to windbreaks in Kansas is a redcedar, point out Extension foresters at KSU.

Sensitive to fire, redcedar wood is soft and colorful with a distinct fragrance. The tree is rarely killed by insects or disease, has a lifespan of 200 to 300 years, and grows better in neutral to slightly acid soils.

The redcedar produces good seed crops every two or three years after reaching 20 years of age. Seeds cling to twigs during the winter and serve as a source of feed for many game and songbirds.

Order forms for the eastern redcedar and other species of trees and shrubs are available at the county Extension office.

A free goldenrain tree seedling will accompany each tree and shrub order this year.

Will People Smoke A Safe Cigaret?

A federal researcher says a safer—even absolutely safe—cigaret can be devised. But would it sell?

"We must take out the danger and leave in the pleasure," said Dr. Gio Gori, head of the major effort in safer-cigaret research, the Tobacco Working Group at the National Institute of Health.

For two years he and his colleagues have been peering at smoke condensate applied to rat

tissue and chicken tracheas. These tests are still to be evaluated and they will lead to more in the next two years.

But Gori said the technical knowledge now exists for developing a less hazardous cigaret.

A perfectly safe cigaret today would filter everything from tobacco smoke. "We have the means of a 100-per-cent filter, but all you would have is hot air," Gori explained.

So the answer involves in no small way the reason people smoke, a relatively undefined field requiring much more study, Gori said.

For instance, a safer cigaret would have less nicotine. Experimental tobacco strains with little or no nicotine in them could be developed in two or three years for a commercially productive harvest, Gori said. But, he added, would smokers stick with a low-or zero-nicotine cigaret or simply smoke many more of them to make up for the loss?

Surgeon General Jesse L. Steinfeld raised the same point in a report calling for renewed efforts to develop safe cigarets.

Dr. Gori said he does not know if the safer cigaret his group can now devise would be less hazardous than all brands on the market. "We haven't tested all the brands."

Senate hearings have been called to consider legislating tar-and-nicotine limits.

Meanwhile, a British chemical executive predicts that people will be smoking synthetic tobacco, mixed with the natural leaf, within three years.

Feed Costs Climb After Dropback In 1968 and 1969

Feed costs, one of the big farm operating expenses, continued to climb last year and for all of 1971 averaged six per cent higher than they did in 1967, a year used for comparison by Agriculture Department economists.

That compared with a two per cent larger average in 1970, according to the Crop Reporting Board in a year-end analysis. In 1969 and 1968 the

feed index averaged less than the 1967 base period.


Last year, for example, alfalfa hay averaged \$37.60 per ton compared with \$34.70 in 1970 and the 1967 price of \$34.10. A 14 per cent protein ration for dairy cattle averaged \$73.00 per ton last year compared with \$70.00 in 1970 and \$69.00 in 1967.

Hog feed, with 14 to 18 per cent protein, cost \$4.75 per 100 pounds in 1971, compared with \$4.60 in 1970 and \$4.53 in 1967.

Grower feed for broilers averaged \$98.00 per ton last year compared with \$95.00 in 1970 and \$93.00 in 1969, the report said.

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
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Research Study Blurs Sire Breed Differences

CLAY CENTER, Neb.—There may be less over-all difference between sire breeds than most cattlemen believe, according to the most recent report issued here by the U.S. Meat Animal Research Center (MARC).

The cattle germ plasm evaluation program here at MARC is designed to characterize breeds from different biological types in the full spectrum of economic traits relating to growth, feed efficiency, reproduction, maternal ability and carcass and meat traits.

Results of the first calf crop, out of Angus and Hereford cows bred to Hereford, Angus, Jersey, South Devon, Limousin, Simmental and Charolais bulls, included calving data and preweaning growth.

The latest release includes reports on post-weaning feedlot growth and feed efficiency, carcass and meat traits postweaning growth and reproductive performance of the heifers in the first calf crop. MARC officials stressed the preliminary

nature of the study which will cover three calf crops at its conclusion.

Steers from the first calf crop were started on a feedlot ration containing 7.5 percent concentrates and gradually shifted to a 35 percent concentrate ration.

The Jersey crossbreds had the lowest postweaning daily gain of 2.20 pounds with the lowest feed efficiency of 6.86-1. Straightbred Angus and Herefords averaged 2.37 pounds per day with a feed efficiency of 6.33. Hereford-Angus and Angus-Hereford steers gained 2.41 with a feed efficiency of 6.45. Other crossbreds recorded the following figures: South Devon—2.53, 6.31; Limousin—2.41, 6.21; Simmental—2.63, 6.13; Charolais—2.60, 6.17; average of all breeds—2.45, 6.35.

Limousin cross steers posted the highest dressing percentage of 61.9, but also recorded the lowest quality grades with none making the choice grade. Jersey-Hereford steers also failed to make the choice grade. Straight Angus steers were the only

ones to make average choice. The balance of the crosses average low choice.

Billed as the carcass breed, the Limousin-cross steers made the highest yield grade of 2.5 and also had the largest rib eyes with an average of 13 square inches. As a whole, the exotic breeds outperformed the British breeds in both categories.

The Limousin steers continued their domination of the other breeds in actual cutability (55 percent), yield of retail product (67.8 percent), and lowest fat trim (19.1).

The Warner-Bratzler Shear Test and Taste Panel Evaluation of cooked steaks performed at Kansas State University revealed no significant difference between steaks from the straight-breeds and cross-breeds.

Straight-bred and crossbred heifers from the first calf crop were retained at the center and evaluated for postweaning growth and reproductive performance. At the 550-day mark, the Charolais heifers were the largest at 771 pounds compared to the average of 720 pounds. Straightbred Herefords were the lightest at 658 pounds.

The date of puberty, defined as the date of the first observed standing

estrus, was determined by checking the heifers for estrus twice daily. The percentage of those reaching puberty at 15 months of age were: straightbreds-69 percent; Hereford-Angus and Angus-Herefords-87 percent; Jersey-98 percent; South Devon-86 percent; Limousin-69 percent; Simmental-86 percent; Charolais-85 percent.

All of the Jersey-Angus, South Devon-Angus and Simmental-Angus reached puberty by 15 months of age. Only 48 percent of the straight Herefords and 42 percent of the Limousin-Herefords reached puberty at 15 months.

Those heifers that reached puberty at 15 months were bred artificially from May 24 to July 7 (45 days) and were then turned out with clean-up bulls for 26 days. The Jersey-Hereford heifers had the highest conception rate of 93 percent and the straight Herefords and

South Devon-Herefords had the lowest conception rate of 67 percent. The average for the entire group was 80 percent.


Area X15 Pilot Here Next Week



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


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Mrs. H.D. Caine Of Manhattan Wins Prize

Mrs. H. D. Caine, 800 Church Avenue, Manhattan, wins the weekly prize: "My family loves this 'leftover' recipe so much they want us to have turkey more often so they can have the stuffed peppers. Leftovers have an advantage. They're flexible to your needs. Proportions vary according to what you have on hand. A little more or less of one ingredient still achieves a tasty result."

POULTRY-STUFFED PEPPERS

1 1/2 cups cooked chicken or turkey, finely diced
4 firm green peppers (more, if peppers are small or if you add more meat. Liquid ingredients remain the same)

- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Pepper to taste
- 1 small grated onion
- 1 teaspoon minced parsley
- 1 teaspoon chutney
- 1/2 teaspoon curry powder
- 4 tablespoons American cheese slivers
- 1 cup boiling water

Cut tops from stem end of green peppers. Remove seeds and fibers. Parboil for five minutes; drain. Prepare filling: Mix eggs with milk, salt, pepper, onion, parsley, chutney and curry powder. Add chicken or turkey. Fill peppers to within 1/2-inch of top. Sprinkle with cheese. Place in baking dish filled with 1 cup boiling water. Bake in moderate 350-degree oven until peppers are tender and filling is set, about 35 minutes. Makes four servings.

1/2 cup whipping cream
1/4 pound white marshmallows, diced

- 1 cup chopped dates
- 3 bananas, diced

Whip the cream until stiff. Fold in the cut up marshmallows, chopped dates, diced bananas and chopped pecans. Shape mixture into a roll about three inches thick and roll in the graham cracker crumbs. Chill. To serve, cut into slices and top with whipped cream. Garnish with red maraschino cherries.



1 package vanilla instant pudding mix (4 serving size)
1 1/2 cups cold milk

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instant pudding, cold milk and vanilla until stiff (three to eight minutes). Immediately frost cake. Cake must be stored in refrigerator and served chilled. Frosted cake may be frozen for storage. Yield: 16 to 20 servings.

Here is a good biscuit recipe: 1/4 cups sour cream, 2 scant cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Sift dry ingredients and whip cream, mix together quickly and bake.



Knit fabrics will dominate the apparel scene for some years so a homemaker who is in the market for a new washer and drier will appreciate machines with knit cycles. The exclusive washer cycle for knits is engineered for gentle, thorough laundering action. This prevents pilling or snagging the delicate synthetic blend apparel that once required hand washing or dry cleaning. A knit cycle on certain drier models protects knits from over-drying and shrinking. Other features to look for include a four-in-one agitator with adjustable vanes, permitting four types of washing action, from extra slow agitator speed for hand washables to heavy duty action for heavily soiled work clothes. A pre-soak cycle will be included for heavily soiled garments. An infinite water level will save water in small loads. Beauty and safety are not neglected or substituted by efficiency, either. For beauty these are stain resistant porcelain finish tops. Safety features that stop the

machine if the load becomes off-balanced during the spin cycle are another boon and when the lid is lifted during the spin cycle, similar features prevent accidents. Matching driers include a wrinkle guard option that keeps permanent press fabrics wrinkle free by tumbling them intermittently without heat for up to 2½ hours after the drying cycle has been completed. An electronic sensor shuts off the drier automatically when the clothes are dry. Soft heat drying prevents baked in wrinkles and eliminates the need to guess at proper temperature settings. A stationary dry rack for such "don't tumble" items as fine sweaters, other delicate garments and tennis shoes is handy. A lint light indicates when the lint screen needs cleaning.





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

with the least amount of erosion. Some northeast Kansas farmers are discovering that waterways seeded to bromegrass put extra money in their pockets. In effect, they are receiving double benefits from their waterways.

D. Dean Dicken, Kansas State University Extension area crops and soils specialist at Hiawatha, and county agents in northeast Kansas, are the prime movers behind the waterway-bromegrass idea.

waterways seeded to bromegrass because it will make farmers money," explains Dicken. "We are pointing out that waterways should be productive areas on a farm." However, he adds, trees and brush prevent waterways from delivering

water with the least amount of erosion. They can turn a productive waterway into a liability. "Unproductive trees and brush should be removed from waterways seeded to bromegrass," says Dicken. "The bromegrass should be fed balanced nutrients from commercial or natural fertilizers each year. "Many farmers in northeast Kansas are discovering that their hay requirements can be supplied on the waterways of the farm. And grain farmers should not forget that waterway hay is a source of cash income."

More Lamb Feeders In Kansas Lots

Sheep and old crop lambs on feed in Kansas for the slaughter market totaled 97,000 head on January 1, 1972, up 29 percent from a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Large operators who normally feed 1,000 head or more had 68,000 head of sheep and lambs on feed, sharply above a year ago, while smaller farm feeders had 29,000 head on feed, unchanged from last year.

The sharp increase in lamb feeding this year reflects better wheat pasture and an abundance of feed.

Wheat pasture in the western two-thirds of Kansas progressed slowly early last fall but by mid-November was the best since 1965. Beet tops have been available for grazing along with crop aftermath from sorghum stubble and corn stalk fields. The relatively mild weather during November and December permitted extensive grazing on crop residue and wheat pasture.

Numbers of sheep and lambs on feed January 1 by weight groups this year and last year were as follows: Under 70 pounds, 13,000 this year, 8,000 last year; 70-79 pounds, 17,000 and 20,000; 80-89 pounds, 36,000 and 30,000; 90-99 pounds, 29,000 and 15,000; 100 pounds or more, 2,000 both years.

Sheep and lambs placed on feed during November and December 1971 totaled 8,000 head, moderately below a year ago. Inshipments of feeder lambs during the last two months of 1971 were up slightly from a year ago. Marketings of fed sheep and lambs during November and December 1971 were estimated at 36,000 head, compared with 47,000 for 1970.

United States
Sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter market in the 26 States on January 1, 1972 totaled 2,715,000 head, 3 percent more than a year earlier.

The North Central States had 1,050,000 sheep and lambs on feed, down 2 percent from January 1, 1971. In the 11 Western States there were 1,220,000 head on feed, a 1 percent decrease from a year earlier. Texas increased 43 percent and Oklahoma 32 percent.

In 7 major feeding States sheep and lambs on feed on January 1, 1972 totaled 1,514,000 head, 7 percent more than a year earlier, and 5 percent above the November 1, 1971 level. These 7 States accounted for 56 percent of the total sheep and lambs on feed in the 26 States on January 1, 1972.

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Almost All Records In '71 Crop Yields

Crop production in Kansas in 1971 was the most bountiful in the State's history, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The index of all crop production was 153 percent of the 1957-59 average, compared with a previous record of 140 percent in 1969 and a range from 32 to 132 for other years in records dating back through 1928.

Record high individual crop production figures set this year were wheat, 313 million bushels; sorghum grain, 234 million bushels; and popcorn, 36 million pounds.

Corn production of 121 million bushels was the largest in more than four decades and production of hay and sugar beets were not far below the record highs.

Small grain production was boosted by favorable spring moisture and ideal filling weather during late May and early June. Good July rains set the stage for abundant production of sorghums, corn and hay. Crop losses from insects and diseases were minor, and late spring or early fall freezes caused little damage to most crops in 1971.

Yields per acre were exceptionally high for major grain crops in 1971. New record highs were set for wheat—34.5 bushels, corn—92 bushels, oats—45 bushels, barley—40 bushels and popcorn—4,400 pounds.

Rye at 22.0 bushels equaled the previous record, while the sorghum grain yield of 54.0 bushels was second high only to the 56.0 bushel record in 1969.

Total acreage of all crops har-

vested in Kansas in 1971 was 19.7 million acres, 4 percent above 1970, and about 1 percent above average harvested acreage during the 1960's.

Some 9.1 million acres of wheat was harvested, the same as a year earlier, but otherwise the lowest since 1963.

Sorghum acreage harvested for all purposes totaled 5.1 million acres, a 19 percent increase from 1970 and the State's fifth largest, and corn for all purposes was harvested from 1.6 million acres, the second largest in a decade.

However, soybeans were harvested from only .9 million acres, down considerably from the previous year. Barley and oat harvested acreages also were down from a year earlier.

Plantings of crops for fall harvest, except for soybeans, moved along rather well in 1971. Stands of most row crops were satisfactory, although crusting resulted in some reseeded of sorghums.

Most row and hay crops developed well during the summer, although dry weather during much of August and early September moderated yields in some areas. Moisture received in mid-September helped late maturing crops.

Most fall crops reached maturity before killing frosts arrived and harvesting was nearly complete before late November and December precipitation delayed the wrap-up of harvest.

Sorghum

Sorghum grain production in 1971 totaled 233,550,000 bushels, a record high for the State. This was sharply above the 145,960,000 bushels

produced in 1970 and the previous record of 182,896,000 bushels in 1969. Yield per acre averaged 54 bushels, 13 bushels above the previous year and only 2 bushels below the record high of 56 bushels in 1969.

Acreage harvested for grain totaled 4,325,000 acres, 21 percent above 1970. Acreage planted for all purposes including grain, silage and forage totaled 5,180,000 acres, 18 percent greater than a year earlier. Sorghum silage was harvested from 337,000 acres with a yield of 11.0 tons per acre.

The 3,707,000 tons of sorghum silage produced in 1971 was 76 percent above 1970. Sorghum forage was harvested from 440,000 acres with a total production of 1,100,000 tons, 10 percent more than a year earlier.

Sorghum planting moved ahead about normally in 1971. Stands were generally good and early growth was favorable. A dry August over much of the State hurt sorghums in some dry land fields, but September rains which followed helped late sorghum fields develop. Combining got underway on a limited scale in late August in southeast Kansas and made excellent progress throughout October. Wet fields delayed completion of final harvest in some areas.

Corn

Corn grain produced in 1971 totaled 120,612,000 bushels, largest in 4 decades. Yield per acre was a record high 92 bushels, some 30 bushels above the previous high of 75 bushels set in 1968.

Grain was harvested from 1,311,000 acres, 2 percent more than a year earlier and largest since 1963.

White corn production in Kansas in 1971 totaled 8,415,000 bushels, representing a yield of 85 bushels per acre on 99,000 acres harvested.

Corn silage cut from 313,000 acres averaged 14.0 tons per acre with a total production of 4,382,000 tons, 22 percent above the previous year.

Corn planting began early and progressed well ahead of usual in 1971. July precipitation was well above normal and weather was favorable for pollination.

Southern corn leaf blight caused some problems in eastern Kansas but overall damage from insects and disease was mostly light. Harvest made good progress through mid-November, but wet fields late in the year slowed completion of tag ends of harvest.

Soybeans

Production of soybeans in 1971 totaled 17,856,000 bushels, up 18 percent from a year earlier but still the second smallest crop since 1964.

From 880,000 acres planted, 871,000 acres were harvested for beans, a decrease of 13 percent from 1970.

Yield per acre was 20.5 bushels, 5.5 bushels above 1970's rather disappointing crop, but the second lowest in 7 years. Planting of soybeans was delayed considerably by wet fields early in the season.

Crop development was hindered by lack of moisture during August and early September and hot weather caused some bloom droppage. Fall rains, together with a long growing season, aided some of the later planted beans.

Hay Production

Production of all hay on Kansas farms in 1971 totaled 5,255,000 tons, up 28 percent from 1970 and the third largest crop on record. Hay was cut from 2,477,000 acres in 1971 and yielded an average of 2.12 tons per acre, compared with 1.72 tons a year earlier.

Alfalfa hay production of 3,245,000 tons accounted for 62 percent of the State's total hay output. Wild hay contributed 17 percent of the total production, while all other hay accounted for 21 percent.

Other Crops

Sugar beet production in 1971 totaled 688,000 tons, 3 percent below the record large 1970 crop, but still

the State's third largest. Beets were harvested from 39,300 acres, 10 percent less than the previous year's acreage. Yield per acre averaged 17.5 tons, 1.4 tons above 1970.

Dry edible bean production of 84,000 cwt. in 1971 was sharply below the 210,000 cwt. produced a year earlier and the smallest dry bean crop since 1964. A sharp reduction in dry bean acreage was responsible for the smaller 1971 crop.

Popcorn production was a record high 36,080,000 pounds. Yield per acre was 4,400 pounds, also a record high for the State, and compared with the previous high yield of 3,900 pounds per acre in 1969.

Potato production was 124,000 cwt., 3 percent above 1970.

Alfalfa seed production totaled 1 million pounds, 33 percent below a year earlier but above that in other recent years.

Production of red clover seed, 1,150,000 pounds was 23 percent above the previous year, while sweet clover seed production at 1,120,000 pounds was 11 percent lower.

Production of Apples was 13 million pounds or 29 percent above a year earlier.

Peach production totaled 1 million pounds, 25 percent less than the previous year's crop.







Army Decides It Liked It Better The Old Way

After a year-long experiment in liberalization, the U.S. Army has decided to tighten up again on its eight-week basic training course, that once-hidebound device used to transform soft, sloppy civilians into hardened, disciplined warriors. The barracks beer machine that quenched the thirst of dusty recruits

and irked crusty sergeants will be removed.

The barracks will no longer be divided into private cubicles with colorful curtains, but instead will revert to the big, open, olive drab dormitories that are familiar to millions of old soldiers. Finally, in a retrenchment that

future recruits will long remember, the basic physical training program will be toughened, with a return to such requirements as jogging from one drill area to the next, and with reinstatement of the "daily dozen," those highly stylized exercises done every morning, en masse, with much grunting and groaning.

"We've taken a long look at things, experimented around, and now we've decided that the relatively Spartan environment is the best for recruits," said Brig. Gen. Ira Hunt, the man in charge of the Army's Training Command, headquartered here.

The experimentation began about a year ago when the Army started to think seriously about how to become an all-volunteer force. One of the conclusions reached was that young men might be more inclined to join up on their own if Army life were made more appealing.

Although the retrenching indicates that the Pentagon has since concluded that some of the experimentation went too far, certain innovations apparently will become permanent as recruiters report that young Americans seem impressed by the "New Army."

For example, there are not plans to reinstitute the reveille formation

for recruits. The recruits now need arise only in time to show up for their first class or work detail.

Furthermore, recruits will continue to receive weekend passes during the final month of their training. Drill sergeants, however, may withhold the passes of men who do not train properly during the week.

The tightening up of the basic training program is scheduled to go into full effect Feb. 14. At that time, the Army also intends to lengthen the training program by three days, in addition to adding courses in weaponry, communications, escape and character guidance. The amount of classroom lecturing will be reduced in favor of more "hands-on," performance-oriented training.

Hunt says the extra training days are needed because of the renewed emphasis on weaponry and physical training. He estimates recruits who enter the Army after Feb. 14 will receive 30 to 40 per cent more exercise than men currently in training.

Use of 6-man juries in civil trials and misdemeanor cases in the 12th judicial district has been approved in an order issued by Judge Lewis McLaughlin, Marysville, and Judge Ronald Innes, Manhattan.

The district includes Riley, Clay and Marshall Counties with courthouses at Manhattan, Clay Center and Marysville.

McLaughlin and Innes said the change will result in improved efficiency at less cost without sacrificing legal rights. State law requires that criminal trial juries contain 12 members.

The 6-man jury was made possible by a 1970 U.S. Supreme Court decision.

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Revision Would Cut Extras Out Of USDA, Reduce Payroll To Half

The Department of Agriculture will be 110 years old this year but it could be starting a new life under President Nixon's reorganization plan.

It would be reduced to an agency strictly for farmers. It would lose more than half of its current 89,742 full-time employees who administer a multiplicity of programs undreamed of when President Lincoln signed the law that made it the eighth executive department May 15, 1862.

President Nixon, in political trouble with farmers, backed down from his original proposal to abolish the department when he named Dr. Earl L. Butz to succeed Clifford M. Hardin in November. As originally planned, the department would have been swallowed up in his proposed reorganization of the executive branch.

Now, according to the revised plan, the department would concentrate on the troublesome problem of federal price supports and crop production controls. It also would be a service agency for farmers through marketing services and farm research.

The federal farm empire, reaching into every county in the nation, would be stripped of what the administration calls "peripheral" activities. These activities range from rural electric programs to food stamps for needy persons.

However the agencies transferred out of agriculture to new departments would continue to serve farmers and ranchers and promote rural development. The aim of the transfers would be to eliminate the fragmentation of programs that have grown at random, encouraged wasteful duplication and permitted conflicts between agencies.

For example, the Farmers Home Administration, which runs a multibillion dollar program of rural community water and sewer systems and rural housing would be transferred intact to the proposed Department of Community Development, which also would get programs from other departments to provide a single office for rural residents to seek federal aid.

The federal housing authority has 42 state offices, 1,700 county offices and 190 district supervisory offices. Under the reorganization, the FHA

would continue its present services on the county level but also would service loans to farmers as an agent of a Department of Economic Affairs, and loans to develop natural resources as an agent of a new Department of Natural Resources.

The community development department also would get the Agriculture Department's rural electrification administration, the recently created rural telephone bank and various research programs related to community development.

Administration officials said they expected the facilities and staffs of the county FHA offices would be expanded to handle all the programs of the proposed community development department.

J. Phil Campbell, undersecretary of agriculture, recently said a Department of Community Development would prevent rural communities "from being overshadowed by their urban counterparts."

He noted the continuing decline in rural population because of the lack of economic opportunity in rural areas. This situation, he said,

resulted from the government's piecemeal approach to rural problems.

To reorient the Agriculture Department wholly to farm problems, the President also would remove to a new Department of Human Resources all the department's food assistance programs, such as food stamps, commodity distribution and school lunches. The Human Resources Department also would get meat, poultry and egg inspection services and research agencies dealing with consumer and nutrition problems.

This would meet the demands of critics who have complained that the Agriculture Department served farmers first and that the needs of consumers were secondary.

The Department of Agriculture also would lose its forest and soil conservation services which would be moved to the new Department of Natural Resources. This department also would get natural resource agencies from other departments, such as the Department of the Interior, which would be abolished under Nixon's plan.

USDA Effort To Cut DDT Use By Cotton Farmer

The government hopes to make a molehill out of the mountainous DDT controversy by getting cotton farmers to use natural methods of insect control as substitutes for the pesticide.

The program, announced by Secretary Earl L. Butz of the Agriculture Department is aimed at cutting DDT use on cotton fields from an estimated 11 million pounds in 1971 to seven million this year and four million no later than 1975.

Sources in the Agriculture Department say officials hope the program will undercut arguments by environmental groups that claim DDT is an imminent hazard to human health and should be banned entirely.

Cotton farmers, who use about 70 per cent of the DDT in this country, will be provided more technical aid on such alternatives as improved methods of cultivation to reduce reproduction of bollworms and weevils; using advice from special field scouts on pest buildups and when to spray, and greater reliance on beneficial insects in controlling the harmful types.

The Agriculture Department has allocated \$2.25 million for the field program this year. An additional \$3.5 million will be added to research projects for developing further biological methods of insect control.

Meanwhile lawsuits brought by the Environmental Defense Fund and other groups are pending in the courts, aimed mainly at getting the government to ban all use of DDT on grounds it is dangerous to humans.

But the Agriculture Department insists the chemical has not been proved a serious threat to human health and maintains DDT still is needed for control of many crop pests and as a standby weapon in case of periodic massive intrusions by insects.

Butz indicated the new emphasis on natural methods of insect control

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is not a move toward organic farming. "Now we can go back to organic agriculture if we must, and there are those in this country who would like to drive us back," he said. "But, before we do that, somebody must decide which 50 million Americans we'll let starve."

If pesticides, antibiotics and other

chemicals were banned from farming, Butz said, we could not feed all Americans.

"Part of the problem today is that two-thirds of us in this country are so young that we've never bit into an apple and saw the worm hole and wondered: Is he in there yet, or did I get him?" Butz said.

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Imports Losing Price Advantage?

Shuffling of prices by the three biggest auto importers into the U.S.—Volks, Toyota and Datsun—means there is chance that at least one U.S.-made mini-car may slightly undersell the imports.

Datsun announced prices last week reflecting changes since currency revaluations, new equipment, and other adjustments that put the price of the Datsun 1200 sedan at \$1976. The Datsun 1200 had been the only popular foreign car previously priced below the Ford Pinto.

Last reported suggested selling price on the Pinto was \$1930, although Ford has been expected to increase this to compensate for the cost of new safety equipment.

Prices of Datsun affected by the international monetary situation and excise tax repeal, are up an average of \$325 a car over the 1971 model year prices.

The price on the Datsun pickup truck was increased from \$1916 to \$2236. The latest prices are suggested retail prices and exclude dealer preparation, normal freight costs and taxes but also leave room for bargaining between the dealer and buyer.

Game Commission Testing Engineers On Land Use

With most public attention focused on welfare and higher education as the state programs under greatest legislative siege, little attention has been paid to the heavy fire pouring in on the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

At least three bills directly affecting the commission have been introduced in the House of Representatives through the opening two weeks of the 1972 session.

One would abolish the commission; another would consolidate it with the Park and Resources Authority; and the third would require it to pay \$250,000 annually in lieu of local property taxes to counties where it owns or controls properties.

The adverse legislation comes at a time when the commission has acquired a new director, Richard Wettersten, and most of it is sparked by controversy over his predecessor, George Moore.

Moore was director for 10 stormy years, and his resignation last fall was a step-down forced by the Forestry, Fish and Game commissioners.

"I think a lot of what has been introduced this session is tied to the turmoil over George Moore," Wettersten said.

The newly appointed director, who formally assumed his post on Dec. 1, 1971, said the lush balance on hand in the Fish and Game Commission fee fund is responsible for much of the rest of the unwanted attention.

The fund is expected to have a \$6.4 million balance at the conclusion of this fiscal year on June 30, 1972.

Cloud Co. Water Group Organizing

The Cloud County Rural Water District No. 1, which is forming in northern Cloud and extreme southern Republic Counties, have now completed its feasibility studies.

The members of the steering committee are: Roger Nelson, Chairman; Wayne Neel, Vice Chairman; Mahala Carter, Secretary; Lynn Buckland, Treasurer; Margaret Kerner, Robert Whitley and Robert Nelson.

The proposed district lies in the Republican River Valley, south and west of the Republican River and will have 117 users in an area of about 77 square miles. The City of Jamestown is proposed as a wholesale user. Water will be ob-

tained from wells in the Republican River Valley.

The engineering is being performed by White, Hamele and Associates in Salina, Kansas.

No DES Paper Will Cost Seller About \$2 cwt

Ed Durbin, a Kansas livestock auction owner, says that cattle and sheep presented for slaughter without the necessary certification of DES (Diethylstilbestrol) withdrawal could cost the producer \$1.50 to \$2 per hundredweight.

Durbin, who operates auction markets at Winfield and Moline, and is immediate past president of the Kansas Livestock Auction Association, said most auction market owners have expressed a desire to be fair to their clients but that they can't afford to go out on a limb and sign the certification themselves.

Durbin said, "I'm going to go ahead and buy the cattle myself and hold them for seven days. Then I can sign the certification, but I'll pay \$1.50 or \$2 per hundredweight less than the market. I think that is about what it will cost to keep the animals and feed them for a week."

He indicated he believed most of the auction market owners in the state would do the same thing.

The DES certification rules went into effect Jan. 8 as a result of recent findings of DES residues in some beef livers.


Drys Against Gambling Too

Kansas United Dry forces are against more than alcohol. They're also distrustful of legal gambling, and efforts by the organization have recently been aimed against advocates of pari-mutuel betting.

Last week the Dry group had a former Arkansas state official say on tapes made for radio and television use that pari-mutuel betting in that state may have cost more than it brought in in taxes. The man was Robert E. Fisher, former member of the administration of Governor Winthrop Rockefeller in Arkansas.

Fisher said some of the costs of legal gambling included bad debts from many of the bettors, influx of organized crime to betting, and expenses to control the system and take care of people who have lost living expenses in gambling.

Game Commission Under Gun Of Legislature

The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission has joined several other state wildlife conservation agencies in challenging certain restrictions imposed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on wildlife management lands licensed from the Corps.

In making public its disagreement with Corps of Engineer policy, Commission officials said the Kansas agency has, since 1960, leased land from the Corps which is located adjacent to many of the Corps reservoirs for wildlife management purposes.

Since the first land lease between the two governmental agencies in 1960, the Corps according to Commission officials, has become increasingly restrictive of the use of several wildlife management techniques which the department feels it needs. Among these are grazing, sub-leasing agreements, controlled burning and surplus crop disposal.

Former agricultural lands licensed to the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission for wildlife benefits are managed on a share-crop basis. No cash leases are involved in the program. The agency's share of agricultural crops is left in the field for wildlife food and cover. Where this share is surplus to wildlife needs, crops are occasionally harvested and sold, but never with the express purpose of deriving cash income.

"In the past we have, in some cases, traded the share that was surplus to wildlife needs in lieu of much needed fencing, terracing, road maintenance, shrub and tree plantings, grass and legume planting, mowing of wildlife feeds and planting of food plots in remote non-agricultural areas of the project lands," said Richard D. Wettersten, director of the Commission.

But while early Corps of Engineer licenses permitted such an arrangement, that agency became more restrictive and in 1967 declared that "the lands will not be used by the State for the production of crops or any other purpose solely to produce revenue to defray costs of management of the wildlife area."

According to the Corps the land can be managed to provide food for wildlife and to allow for necessary compensation to farmers through share-crop agreements. The Corps also allows for dumping of surplus crops for wildlife foods in poor crop years, however this has long been recognized as a poor wildlife management practice.

"If we are to continue to provide quality habitat for wildlife as was the intent of the General Plan for certain lands on these Corps reservoirs; and if we are to provide the necessary facilities for recreational utilization, namely access roads, adequate boundary posting, boat ramps, and fencing; then this agency must have freedom to enter into unrestricted leasing arrangements, regulate grazing and burning, trade surplus crop shares for necessary services and apply proceeds from surplus crops to offset any other administrative costs associated with managing the

project lands," Wettersten asserts. "These activities are necessary to the successful implementation of a well-rounded wildlife management program including the ultimate goal — recreational utilization of the developed resource, Wettersten continued.

The increasingly restrictive attitude of the Corps regarding their agreements with the Fish and Game agency prompted the following position statement by the Commission:

"It is essential that the Corps of Engineers prepare and amend licenses which permit the State wildlife agency to effectively manage the lands without undue financial hardship. The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission intends to devote every effort necessary to effect this result. Other states which are

challenging similar Corps restrictions on licensed land include: Oklahoma, Nebraska, South Dakota, Missouri and North Dakota.

CLOSE PAPER PLANT RATHER THAN MEET STANDARDS

A major lumber company says it will close its pulp mill at Everett, Wash., rather than try to meet state pollution requirements and "uncertain" federal standards on the effluent that is released from the plant which makes pulp for paper. Gearing To Kilos, Hectares?

A weathered farmer in central Kansas looks out across hilled-out field of wheat, sets his jaw and says: "This patch is 30 hectares. If I make 700 liter to the hectare I'll be damned lucky."

He isn't from another planet. He's simply a mathematically enlightened Kansan. And his day probably isn't far off according to State Sealer John O'Neill, guardian of the weights and measures system for the State of Kansas.

"It's kind of hard for us older people to accept this, but it looks to me like it's on its way," O'Neill said.

And what seems to be on the way is the metric system for the United States. Land would be measured by the hectare (2.5 acres) and wheat by the liter (there are 35 liters to a

bushel.)

A perfect Miss Kansas by today's 36-24-36 standards would be 91-60-91, and consumers would be buying meat by the kilo (2.2 pounds), and gas by the liter (1.1 quarts). And a weatherman who announced tonight's low at 20 degrees wouldn't be suggesting that viewers get out their long johns. Twenty degrees centigrade, a metric standard is 68 degrees Fahrenheit today.

And those are only a few of the changes.

It won't be easy in Kansas, but the metric system has been legal here for a long time so I don't think it will have all that much trouble," O'Neill said.

"But I'll have to admit I had hoped I'd be retired before we started into

it. It's going to be a lot like the (daylight) time thing, I'm pretty sure. It's going to be confusing," said O'Neill, who became the state sealer in August of last year after 20 years with the department. His office is part of the State Board of Agriculture.

The state sealer's office has a low profile, but it has a vital function. It checks the net contents of packages, propane gas meters, binder and baler twine and vehicle and small capacity scales for accuracy. It acts as the custodian for all state weights and measure standards.

The proposed changeover from the customary system to the metric system comes at an ironic time for Kansas. The state is one of only 10 in the union that is just now being drawn into the use of US Bureau of Standards scales.

The first standards for weights and measurements for the state arrived in 1869 at the University of Kansas. The duties were transferred to the Board of Agriculture in 1947.

"The standards we have been using are really antique. We're just getting into this thing and we'll be starting the metric thing too. We'll have two sets of weights during the conversion, O'Neill said.

The Agriculture Department has rented an office in Topeka to use as a laboratory to work on the new standards.

The metric system was first made legal in the United States in 1877, and the Kansas legislature legalized it sometime between then and 1900. But its widespread use has been repeatedly shoved aside in the belief that other nations might come to accept the US system of weights and measurers.

All other major countries in the world are either converting to the metric system or have already established it.

Metric system proponents say it is much easier to use because it has a scientific basis and is computed in units of 10. They insist that while it may be uncomfortable in everyday use for some persons, it can be made easy for the average man by inexpensive conversion wheels.

There is no guarantee that the plan will be put into force by congress. But George Washington was the first US President to suggest a change in the weights and measures standards in this country.

The US Commerce Department insists the metric system is one "whose time has come" and has set

down a 10-year plan for the conversion.

O'Neill said he believes it will take more than that for the transition in Kansas.

"There are some third grade students who know more about the metric system than us old timers . . . but I think Kansas will go along and be in step with the other states, he said.

Some businesses in the state already are measuring by both the customary standards and by metric standards, according to O'Neill. Some packages, mostly in grocery stores, already shows both. Plants in Kansas that ship products all over the world also show both measurements in specifications.

At Ft. Riley, roads are already marked in miles and in kilometers. The signs went up recently, and are the only dual signs in the state.

It is estimated that it would cost the entire nation between \$10 billion and \$40 billion a year to convert to the metric system. O'Neill said he "couldn't even guess" what it would cost in Kansas.

Third More Corn But Only 8% More Income

Corn farmers produced four bushels of corn in 1971 for every three they harvested in 1970. But their income off the crop went up only to \$1.08 for every dollar they collected the year before.

That's the comparison from the crop Reporting Board which noted that the 1971 corn crop was worth about \$5.89 billion—an average of about \$1.06 a bushel.

The comparisons:
1970 4.1 billion bushels \$5.44 billion \$1.33 bu.

1971 5.5 billion bushels \$5.89 billion \$1.06 bu.

The figures indicate gross value of production for the 1971-72 marketing year and not net returns to farmers. Neither do they include government payments to farmers who participated in 1971 crop programs.

When government payments are added, the report said, the 1971 corn crop was worth almost \$6.8 billion, an average of \$1.22 a bushel. The 1970 crop including payments was put at slightly more than \$6 billion, an average of \$1.47 a bushel.

The report included breakdowns of other major crops. Altogether these totaled a record market value

of \$26.13 billion last year, compared with \$24.03 billion in 1970.

The record 1.6 billion bushel wheat crop last year was valued on the market at nearly \$2.17 billion, an average of \$1.32 a bushel, compared with \$1.82 billion in 1970 when the average was \$1.33 a bushel.

Including government payments, 1971 wheat was put at \$3.05 billion, an average of \$1.86 a bushel, compared with \$2.63 billion and \$1.92 a bushel in 1970, the report said.

The second-ranked crop value was for soybeans, a total of \$3.46 billion last year, an average of \$2.96 a bushel, compared with \$3.2 billion and \$2.96 a bushel, compared with \$3.2 billion and \$2.85 in 1970. There are no government payments for soybeans.

Cotton lint production last year was valued at \$1.42 billion, an average of 28.2 cents a pound, compared with less than \$1.12 billion in 1970 when the market value average 21.9 cents.

Cotton payments last year boosted the crop value to \$2.25 billion, an average of 44.5 cents per pound, compared with \$2.01 billion and 39.5 cents in 1970, according to the report.

Cross-Board Land Value Cut Could Equalization

The acting state property valuation director today urged counties to avoid blanket reductions in land valuation until procedures can be established for hearings on such reductions.

"Any blanket changes may destroy equalization between counties," said Clarence J. Malone. "If everyone keeps reducing the valuations to the lowest one around the state, it becomes a vicious circle."

Malone made the comments following an appearance this morning before the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

Malone's appearance before the committee was scheduled so he could discuss the Property Valuation Dept.'s supplemental budget request. But committee members' questions shifted much of the testimony to the department's plans for equalizing property valuations among counties.

Tom Van Sickle, R-Fort Scott, committee chairman, had urged to complete work on the \$13.1 million supplemental appropriations and send it to the Senate floor.

Changes requested by the Property Valuation Dept. in its original supplemental budget request resulted in committee members asking for a day's delay to study the changes.

The greatest problem we have is where counties order blanket reductions in land or in a classification of land without finding the effect on neighboring counties and taxing districts which straddle county lines," Malone said.

"I am suggesting that before any county goes through with this, it should contact the Property Valuation Dept. so we can schedule a hearing. This would give the neighboring counties and overlapping taxing districts an opportunity to voice objections if they have any."

Malone said he has not established procedures for such hearings, so he requested any blanket reductions be avoided.

Malone told the committee that reclassification of land according to clear definitions and uniform procedures is necessary before equalization can be carried out.

Present guidelines for appraising and classifying the various kinds of land have confused local county officials, who have interpreted the guidelines differently.

One county will have no land in a given classification, while an adjoining county will have thousands of acres classified in the category, for example. Confusion has arisen on how to treat wasteland, minerals,

Forecasters Shining Up Crystal Balls

The men who do the forecasting on crop, income, and profit prospects for farmers are going to Washington next month to see if they can sharpen their pencils and shine their crystal balls so that farm outlook forecasts can become more accurate.

A National Agricultural Outlook Conference will be held February 22-24, with officials from USDA and a few outside sources meeting for the 50th time to assess the year ahead.

The forecasts usually contain enough "ifs" and "maybes" that the forecasters can say they don't do a bad job. But the forecasting on the 1971 feed grain crop was off the mark enough that some experts think the mis-forecast affected the market price on corn and milo as much as the impact of the size of the crop itself.

A year ago, when predictions were made for 1971, the forecasters were accurate when they said: "Gross farm income will increase and net income of farm operators is expected to improve later in 1971. However, net income for the year probably will total slightly below 1970."

Gross farm income did sput last year, mainly because of improved livestock prices and the huge grain harvests, including record crops of corn and wheat.

The prediction on net farm income also came to pass. While lagging during the first half of 1971, farm

profits did pick up later in the year. But net farm income in 1971 failed to gain from 1970's mark of \$15.7 billion, and probably did drop a bit. Final estimates for last year have not been made, however.

Where the outlook predictions made a year ago really fell flat was on feed-grain production in 1971. Rex. F. Daly, an Economic Research Service analyst, put it this way:

"Prospects for 1971 crops, still very uncertain, will remain more difficult to appraise than usual. Producers must weigh impacts of the new farm program and the possibility of a recurrence of the corn blight."

Daly's caution at last year's outlook conference was prompted by the sharp reduction in the 1970 corn crop by Southern leaf blight, drought and other ailments. From expected production of 4.8 billion bushels in July 1970, farmers wound up with 4.1 billion.

USDA specialists apparently were caught far off base by what actually occurred in 1971.

In another 1971 outlook report, by ERS analyst Malcolm Clough, it was indicated farmers planned to in-

crease feed-grain plantings by nearly seven million acres, based on a million acres, based on a January 1971 survey. That projection included a corn boost of four million acres.

Clough said: "Even with blight damage about the same as in 1970, but with more favorable weather in the western corn belt production on the planned acreage could be around 8 to 10 percent above the 1970 crop."

"With a favorable growing season for the other feed grains," he added, "total feed grain production could increase around 10 percent above the short crop of 1970."

What actually happened was that farmers planted nine million more acres to feed grains for harvest in 1971, including a corn boost of seven million. Blight was not a serious problem generally and weather conditions over-all were superb for corn production.

The result: a 1971 corn crop of 5.5 billion bushels, some 35 percent larger than 1970. Total for the four feed grains was a record 26.5 billion tons, 29 percent larger than in 1970 — about triple the increase. USDA experts had indicated in February 1971.

This year's outlook conference will have a central theme entitled "Foreign Trade and the U.S. Farmer."



Buffalo Breeder Gets His Taxes Reduced

If you have a buffalo or two in your backyard, you're probably ready for some good news: Your taxes are going down.

Clarence Malone, acting director of the Property Valuation Department, has ruled that beginning next year, the assessed valuation on buffalo will be reduced from \$90 to \$40.

The ruling came following a hearing at which the owner of a 117-herd of buffalo argued the valuation on buffalo should be no more than it is on beef cattle.

"I'm trying to get along in the corn-fed buffalo business and you guys are trying to bankrupt me," pleaded D.L. Wallace, Winchester, whose Green Acres Ranch is located in Jefferson County 20 miles west of Leavenworth.

The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission at Pratt charges \$300 for a buffalo, which led property valuation officials to think the official state animal should be assessed at \$90 — 30 per cent of \$300.

"There's been nothing like it since the days of Jesse James," Wallace quipped, and then displayed canceled checks showing he paid \$200 or less for buffalo he purchased from the government.

And if he wants to sell his buffalo on the hoof — assuming he stumbles across somebody who wants to buy one — the top price he can expect to get is \$200. Beef cattle

owners, by comparison, pay substantially less for feeder cattle and sell the finished cattle for substantially more.

"And on top of that, they pay less than half the taxes I do on buffalo," he said.

Wallace brought along a bundle of weekly livestock price reports to prove his point that cattle are substantially underassessed.

"If you guys would give me a job in here, I'd take care of that," Wallace said. "Then (Gov. Robert) Docking wouldn't be short of money."

"I sure hope I don't run into any livestock men after this or they will fix me," he added, laughing.

Wallace also argued that buffalo don't gain weight as readily as cattle and are more work to raise.

"I seem to spend most of my time fixing fences and trying to find the dumb things," he said.

The market for buffalo meat is limited. "Right now, I'm still eating buffalo meat I put in the freezer two years ago, so you know it isn't moving along too fast." His principal customer is a Kansas City, Mo., restaurant, he added.

After considering all the evidence, Malone consulted a dictionary and learned that buffalo and beef cattle are Bovines and all things considered, decided they should be taxed alike "in the interests of equity and fairness."

"I sure do thank you," responded Wallace. "I felt you people would be fair."

Not Clean Enough For Pet Food, Say Inspectors

A restraining order is being sought to stop Farmland Industries in Garden City, from manufacturing, processing and shipping animal food products because government inspections have turned up unsanitary conditions.

A hearing on the motion has been set for Feb. 7 in the court of U.S. District Judge Wesley E. Brown, in Wichita.

The beef processing operations of the plant are not affected by the injunction, explained John Immel, assistant U.S. attorney. The alleged unsanitary conditions were discovered in areas where beef scraps are processed for such items as dog food and other animal foodstuffs.

According to an affidavit filed by Leonard L. Blanton, Kansas City, Mo., the acting deputy regional director for the Food and Drug Division, inspectors had discovered food handling tools lying on the floor, raw liquids dripping on cooked products, and bird droppings on conveyers.

Cattle and calves on grain feed for slaughter market in Kansas totaled 1,100,000 head on Jan. 1, 1972, 20 percent more than a year ago and a new record according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The number on feed was up from December 1 and added Kansas to fourth place

nationally. Of the 1,100,000 cattle on feed, 813,000 were in large feedlots with 1,000 head or more capacity, and 287,000 were in farm feedlots of smaller size. Cattle placed on feed during the past quarter numbered 665,000, one-sixth more than in the same period last year.

Marketings of grain fed cattle for slaughter during the October-December period were 495,000, one-tenth more than last year. Cattle feeder intentions to market indicates 616,000 to be marketed during the first quarter of 1972.

United States

Cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market in 39 feeding States are estimated at 13,796,000 head on January 1, 1972, 8 percent more than a year earlier. Numbers on feed January 1 in the other 11 States, estimated for the first time this year, totaled 37,000 head.

The 23 major feeding States had 13,250,000 on feed this January 1, up 9 percent from a year earlier. Cattle and calves placed on feed in the 23 major feeding States during October-December 1971 totaled 8,807,000 head, 10 percent more than during the same 1970 quarter. Marketings of fed cattle for slaughter during the last quarter of 1971 totaled 6,223,000 head, slightly above the same quarter of 1970.

During January-March, cattle feeders in the 23 States intend to market 6,698,000 head, 7 percent more than a year earlier.

penses plays an important part in calculating the monthly index of prices paid by farmers and also is used to determine net farm income.

Mennonite Farmers See Feeder Calves As Way Of Giving To Church

NEWTON—A "God's Little Calves" project has been launched for the financial benefit of the western district of the General Conference of the Mennonite Church in Oklahoma and Kansas.

Mennonite Agri-Urban Inc., a non-profit corporation organized by the conference, is distributing 170 head of feeder calves to 60 to 70 farmers in two states for care until they are ready for market.

When that time comes, the farmers will ship the cattle to market, along with their own stock, and return the proceeds of the church sale to the corporation.

Individual farmers, all members of the church, can designate which programs their funds will support. These range from the Bethel College endowment to the church's retreat program.

To start the project, 54 head of feeder calves are being placed on the farm of John Classen, who lives northeast of Newton. Another 90 head are going to the Wesley Kroeker farm near Enid, Okla.

Several other Mennonite farmers have 25 cattle each under their care. The cattle assigned to the Classen and Kroeker farms eventually will

be parceled out to farmers belonging to Mennonite churches in the western district and will be marketable in about a year.

Feed and care of the cattle will be considered a donation to the church by the farmers.

Church officials reported most of the \$25,000 gathered to begin the project came from urban members of the church.

Iowa Proposal To Identify All Hogs With Number

A "social security" number for every pig born in Iowa has been proposed by two Iowa extension veterinarians. Drs. John Herrick and John Berthelsen say that individual identification is necessary to help producers control costly swine diseases.

For a swine producer to make profits, he must control disease. And now a swine producer's disease control efforts must extend beyond the boundaries of his own farm.

Individual identification of pigs is the key to swine industry disease control efforts, the veterinarians say.

Swine disease control efforts are complicated by the complexity and sheer size of the swine industry. Berthelsen and Herrick point out that Iowa pork producers turn out about 22 million swine annually. About two million hogs are kept for breeding purposes. Nearly one million feeder pigs are imported into Iowa annually, and many thousands more move within the state. Every Iowa swine producer is affected by this mobility since disease organisms frequently move with the animals.

Diseases such as dysentery, TGE (transmissible gastroenteritis), and brucellosis can rapidly infect a herd. And since these diseases can be spread by trading in apparently healthy swine, presence of these diseases anywhere in a marketing area jeopardizes all swine herds in that area.

Present Iowa law requires that pigs be identified if moved from farm to farm. But no identification is needed if pigs are moved from farm through a market to another farm. Often, pigs can be in the beginning stages of a disease, yet appear healthy. It's important that such pigs can be traced back to the farm of origin so that the disease source can be treated and not left to spread the disease to other producers' herds, the veterinarians said.

One method that could be used to identify the farm where pigs originate would be an ear tag with the owner's social security number. Or the owner's social security number might be tattooed in a pig's ear. The veterinarians point out that all adults already have their own unique social security number. Present systems of ear-notching could be used for litter and individual identification.

Berthelsen and Herrick agree that there are problems in using a number with as many digits as a social security number. Further analysis may show that use of the last six digits might be sufficient for identification. And they welcome identification ideas from swine producers.

The extension veterinarians also see a need for stricter health requirements on the movement of breeding swine.





IRS Changes Affect Stockman

The revenue act of 1971 contains provisions of special interest to stockmen, two of which are beneficial and one which eliminates essential loopholes.

One change allows breeding livestock (except horses) such as breeding cattle or sheep, with a useful life of three years or more will qualify for the investment credit if the livestock is eligible for depreciation.

The full credit of seven percent of purchase price is available for animals with a useful life of seven years or more, two-thirds of the credit for animals with useful lives of five to seven years and one-third of the credit for animals with useful lives of three to five years.

Excess credit taken is recaptured if an animal is prematurely sold. The credit is available on the purchase of used livestock, i.e., which has been previously used for breeding purposes, up to an aggregate cost of \$50,000 a year.

To prevent possible abuse, the cost

eligibility for the credit on breeding livestock is reduced by the amount received from the sale of substantially identical livestock during a one-year period beginning six months before the date you purchased the livestock otherwise eligible for the full credit. This latter limitation does not apply if the sale of the substantially identical livestock was caused by drought or disease.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 provided that losses from activities not entered into for profit may not be deducted against other income. However, a taxpayer is entitled to a presumption that he was engaged in the activity for profit if he makes a profit in two out of five consecutive taxable years (two out of seven in the case of horses).

There has been some disagreement as to when those profitable years had to occur during the five-year period. The 1971 Act clarified this by providing a transi-

tional rule (i.e., applicable only during 1970 through 1974 (1976 for horses) or for an equivalent number of years for taxpayers commencing an activity after 1970), to the effect that the presumption would be granted regardless of when the profit years occurred.

Thus, profits in 1973 and 1974 would give rise to a presumption that the activity was entered into for profit during 1970 through 1972 even though losses were experienced in those years. A waiver of the statute of limitations may be required to take advantage of this new rule.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 added the Excess Deductions Account rule (EDA) which provides generally that capital gains from the sale of farm property such as breeding livestock shall be treated as ordinary income to the extent that farm losses were previously deducted against nonfarm income. This rule only applies to individuals, partners, and cor-

porations which are taxed somewhat like partnerships if nonfarm income for the year exceeds \$50,000 and then only farm losses in excess of \$25,000 are added to the EDA.

If a taxpayer transfers his farm operations to a Subchapter S corporation with little or no nonfarm income in an attempt to avoid the imposition of the EDA rule, the 1971 Act provides that the corporation shall be deemed to have an amount of nonfarm income equivalent to that of one of its shareholders who has the largest nonfarm income for the year. The use of multiple Subchapter S corporations to reduce the



Orchards Finding Pick-Your-Own Customers

Interest is growing in the "pick-your own" style of harvesting fruits and vegetables, a University of Illinois horticulturist said at a combined meeting of Kansas Vegetable Growers Association and Kansas Fruit Growers Association at Topeka.

"One report shows that in Wisconsin 10 years ago, 90 per cent of the fruit in one area was picked by

hired help," said Dr. J. W. Courter, U of I extension specialist in small fruits and vegetables. "The reverse was true last year; 90 per cent was picked by the consumers themselves."

In a business session, the vegetable growers re-elected Jack Rees, Topeka, president; William Stoughton, Hutchinson, vice president; Frank Morrison, Manhattan, secretary-treasurer, and Jack Weisgerber, Salina, director.

The fruit growers re-elected Roy Sargeant, Wichita, president; Ted Morse, De Soto, vice president; Charles Marr, Manhattan, secretary-treasurer; Charles

Sargeant, Wichita, and Leonard Meier, Topeka, directors.

Dr. Courter said the results of a survey in Illinois show some pick-your-own customers will drive as much as 100 miles, one way for the privilege of picking field-ripe fruit and vegetables.

Twenty per cent of strawberry customers surveyed said they drove more than 50 miles, one way, in areas where there were few sources of berries.

The strawberry survey also showed:

- There is a ratio between the distance driven and the amount each person picked. (The greater the distance, the larger the amount of strawberries);

- 60 percent of those berries picked were put into the home freezer;

- 55 per cent of those surveyed picked berries only once during the season;

- 33 per cent said price was the reason for picking the berries; 25 per cent said they would rather pick berries than have them picked;

- 51 per cent said a friend told them about the pick-your-own farms; 20 per cent said they learned about the farms from a newspaper;

- 36 per cent said they found out about the time for picking ripe berries from reading a postcard sent by the grower; 23 per cent said a friend told them; 20 per cent said they read about it in a newspaper; 6 per cent said they heard about it on the radio.

- 87 per cent picked less than 20 quarts of berries;

- 63 per cent said picking berries was fun;

- 93 per cent said they would like the grower to diversify so they could pick other crops.

New Grass Will Hold Sandy Soil

MANHATTAN—Soil scientists, quite constantly since the dirty thirties, have worked to improve the

ecology of the Great Plains by developing plants and cultivation methods to hold the soil. Clouds of dust polluted the air during the 1930's.

Another small step in that large battle was taken with the recent announcement of a new grass to hold sandy soil. Called Bend sand lovegrass, it is being released by the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service and the Plant Science Research Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Bend sand lovegrass is a perennial bunchgrass that matures uniformly,

produces seed well, establishes easily, and has been relatively free from plant diseases at Manhattan. Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director of the Kansas ag experiment station which has headquarters at Kansas State University, said the new grass should improve grazing as well as help stabilize sandy soils in the Kansas Arkansas River basin and adjacent areas in north-central Oklahoma.

Foundation seed is available from the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center, Manhattan, Kansas 66502.



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Hay-Hauling A Mealticket Thru College For K-State Grad

A recent accounting graduate of Kansas State University has worked his way through college hauling baled hay.

Allen Taylor, known on the campus as the "hay king," has supervised hauling of enough hay bales that if laid end to end to reach from Yates Center, his home, to the KSU campus.

His investment in a truck instead of a car while he was a junior in high school really has paid off. He now owns four trucks and has hauled nearly a half million bales since he began at age 18.

Yates Center, where his crews operate is also known as the "Hay Capitol of the World."

Taylor operates a custom service for farmers and ranchers. Attachments on the side of the trucks enables him to pick up bales in fields for restacking.

Taylor hires women to drive his trucks while his crew of nine older high school and college students are stacking hay. "Women keep morale up," he said, but women drivers do have drawbacks.

"One time a spider slid down the windshield and the girl got scared and jumped out of the truck leaving it to amble across the field without a driver," he added.

Taylor's crews begin hauling about July 4. They do not quit in their seven-day week until the season ends in August.

About 1,800 bales are picked up and delivered in a 130-hour working day. Once during a threatening storm, the crews hauled 976 bales in five hours.

Now that he has graduated, Taylor plans to do off-season hauling grain and hedge posts.

Taylor has "mixed emotions" about continuing in the hay business. "I would like to get a job as an accountant for a time at least," he said.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Taylor, he lives on an 850-acre farm five miles west of Yates Center.

Gas Service Out Back To Some G&G Area Users

It was cold enough last week that parts of the G&G area got a taste of what has been mostly a problem in the East: not enough capacity of gas companies to keep furnaces warm as most people want them.

The Gas Service Co., which provides parts of the western G&G area kept the gas flowing to homes by told some industrial and commercial customers they would be back on gas while the temperature was the lowest and demands for gas were highest.

At Hutchinson, for example, thermostats in some city offices such as the library and the sports arena, were cut back to 60 degrees. The city was included among commercial customers of the company. Industrial and commercial users pay lower rates for gas, partly for their volume, partly for assuming the risk that gas service can be interrupted in case of shortages of energy.

Trends Indicate Area To Lose Congressional Vote

Kansas and Nebraska will hold to their congressional representation after the 1980 census but both states will lose one House seat by the year 2000, if the projections of a Presidential Commission on Population Growth prove to be accurate.

A study by Richard Lehne of the Department of Housing and Urban Development figures that Kansas will hold onto its five House seats after 1980 and Nebraska will continue to have three congressmen. But by the year 2000 both states will lose one voice each in their congressional representation.

The study presumes that 435 seats will continue to be the size of the House of Representatives, and that a state's representation will be roughed on the one man - one vote theory. Tho neither Kansas nor Nebraska have lost population in the past decades, neither have gained at as fast a rate as the average of other states.

Thus, Kansas, which had eight Congressmen as recently as 1933, may have only half that representation at the end of this century. The state had eight congressional districts formed in 1907, and shortly before that had an eighth voice in the House thru a Congressman elected at large.

The rest of the US grew faster than Kansas in the 1920s and as a result of the census of 1930 the state lost one congressman, the official paring not taking place until 1933.

Ten years later the state lost another representative because of population changes, leaving the state with only six men in the House. Twenty years later, in 1963, the Kansas delegation was reduced to five, with the formation of the huge 1st district in western Kansas largely the merger of two former districts.

The one man - one vote mandate has resulted in regular shifting from

district to district since, but the state has maintained its 5-voice complement in Washington. The census if 1970 did not reduce it, nor will the 1980 head-counting, if the federal study projects accurately.

By 1990 or 2000, however, the state figures to lose one more man.

Nebraska, which generally has had two less men in Washington than Kansas has, will likely continue that representation, says the study, maintaining its 3-representative team thru 1980 but likely being cut to two men by the year 2000, unless there are new population trends between now and then.

What the Population Growth study foresees is largely a continuation of trends of the past three decades. California, now with 43 seats, is seen to have 48 seats after 1980 and 59 seats by 2000. California had only 30 seats in 1950.

With California leading the way the West is seen as getting the most new representation in the next 30 years.

Most of this gain will come from the East and Midwest. The South will largely hold its own in this period.

In fact, the study indicates that the South, sometimes thought to be losing its political impact in Washington, may actually be the voting beneficiary of population shifts.

Dividing the country into four general regions, East, Midwest, South and West, shows that in 1950 there was almost an equal division of votes in the House among three of the regional blocks. In 1950 the East - 12 states extending thru West Virginia and Maryland - had 129 congressmen. The 12 states of the Midwest - starting with Ohio and extending thru Kansas counting all states north of that line extension - had 129 House votes also. The South - 13 states counting Texas and

Oklahoma to the west and everything south of Ohio - had 120 votes. At the time, the 11 Western states - everything west of Kansas - had only 57 votes.

The current House of Representatives gives the South 121 votes, the Midwest 121, the East 117 and the West 73. The other three votes have been acquired by the new states, Hawaii and Alaska. The population study figures that those two states will still have but three House seats by the year 2000.

By the end of the century the regions will vote like this: East 107, Midwest 110, West 94, South 121. The South's voting edge at that time, if the projection proves true, will be based not on outgrowing the rest of the country but holding its own, while the West gains its votes from the East and Midwest.

Whatever is lost by Southern states will be matched by the gain in Florida and Texas. Florida, now with 15 congressmen, is projected to have 23 by the end of the century, nearly three times its voting clout 50 years before. Texas is figured to gain two seats in the next 30 years.

Losers in this projection will be New York, which is figured to lose six seats in the next 30 years, and Pennsylvania, which might subtract five.

South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana and Idaho are figured to drop from two seats in the House to one. North Dakota figures to lose its extra seat in the apportionment.

The loss of two congressmen in the 50-year period from 1950 by both Nebraska and Kansas will be matched by similar losses in Minnesota, North Carolina and Tennessee. But seven states will lose three votes in that period - Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Mississippi, and Missouri.

Iowa and West Virginia will lose

four in that period. New York and Pennsylvania figure to lose 10 seats each in the five decades.

Besides California and Florida, the big gainers will be Arizona and Texas, four each; Maryland, three; and Colorado, two.
